

from time to time continued by divers subsequent Acts, and lastly by an Act passed in the session of the twenty-eighth and twenty-ninth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred and nineteen, it is (amongst other things) enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Privy Council, or any two or more of them, from time to time, to make such Orders and Regulations as to them may seem necessary for the purpose of prohibiting or regulating the removal to or from such parts or places as they might designate in such Order or Orders, of sheep, cattle, horses, swine, or other animals, or of meat, skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or other parts of any animals, or of hay, straw, fodder, or other articles likely to propagate infection, and to make any other Orders or Regulations for the purpose of giving effect to the provisions of the said Act, and again to revoke, alter, or vary any such Orders or Regulations; and that all provisions for any of the purposes aforesaid in any such Order or Orders contained shall have the like force and effect as if the same had been inserted in the said Act:

And whereas the said Act has been amended and explained by an Act passed in the twenty-ninth year of Her present Majesty's reign, intitled "An Act to amend the Act of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred and seven, to prevent the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals:"

And whereas a contagious or infectious disorder generally designated as the "Cattle Plague," has lately appeared, and now prevails, amongst cattle in England, and has also prevailed among sheep in many parts of England:

And whereas divers Orders have been made by the Lords of the said Council in relation to the cattle plague, which were consolidated and amended by an Order bearing date the twenty-fourth day of March last, which Order has been altered and extended by subsequent Orders:

And whereas by the said Order of the Privy Council, it is ordered that no exhibition of cattle shall be held in England and Wales; and it is expedient that provisions should be made for exhibition of fat stock intended for immediate slaughter;

Now, therefore, the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council do hereby order as follows:—

1. From and after the fifteenth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, exhibitions of fat stock intended for slaughter immediately after such exhibition may be held in any county in England and Wales, with the licence of the Lords of the said Council, provided that no such licence shall be granted unless their Lordships shall be satisfied that no case of cattle plague has occurred within ten miles of the town or place at which such exhibition is to be held within one calendar month prior to the date of such licence, nor unless the exhibition is to be held at a distance exceeding ten miles from any place declared to be infected according to the provisions of the said Order of the twenty-fourth day of March last, and that such licence shall be null and void if at any time, exceeding forty-eight hours, previous to the holding of the said exhibition cattle plague shall break out within ten miles of the place where such exhibition is to be held.

2. Any cattle exhibited at any exhibition held under this Order must be slaughtered within the

town or place wherein such exhibition is held, and within four days after the close of the exhibition; and if any case of cattle plague shall occur to any of the animals within such exhibition, all the animals within such exhibition shall be immediately slaughtered, but there shall be no claim for any compensation either on the Local Authority or the Government.

3. Provided that nothing herein contained shall affect any licence already granted by the Privy Council for any market for the sale of animals for immediate slaughter.

4. The words herein contained shall be construed as in the said Order of the twenty-fourth day of March last, and all the provisions therein contained relative to the offences for the contravention thereof, and the penalty for the same, and otherwise, now in force, and the provisions of the said Order in regard to the powers of officers employed under that order, shall apply to the regulations contained in this Order, and the enforcing of the same, and to the officers employed under it.
