TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S COURTS AT
BUCKINGHAM PALACE.

By Her Majesty's Command.

The number of Ladies and Gentlemen attending each Court will be limited to two hundred and sixty, including those who will be presented to Her Majesty.

It is expected that Gentlemen will present themselves at Her Majesty's Court only when in attendance upon the Ladies of their families.

Those Gentlemen who have not been presented to The Queen will, under such circumstances, be eligible for presentation to Her Majesty at these Courts.

The presentation of Ladies and Gentlemen will be limited to one hundred at each Court.

Ladies and Gentlemen wishing to attend Her Majesty's Courts must send in their names and addresses to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, S.W., on or after Thursday, the 21st instant, and these names will be submitted for Her Majesty's approval in the order of their receipt at the Office.

All applications must be made in writing, and no names will be received previous to the 21st instant.

Ladies and Gentlemen who desire to be presented to Her Majesty must, in like manner, send in their names and addresses to the Lord Chamberlain's Office on or after the 21st instant. A letter from the Lady or Gentleman by whom each presentation is to be made must in all cases be forwarded.

The Queen has been graciously pleased, with regard to these Courts, to dispense with the regulation that the Lady or Gentleman must attend

the Court at which they propose to make presentations to Her Majesty.

The Lord Chamberlain will forward to all persons who can be received under the above regulations, cards for their admission to Buckingham Palace at the Court which Her Majesty shall be pleased to appoint for their reception.

In sending in their names Ladies and Gentlemen are requested to mention the Court which they would prefer to attend.

All those Ladies and Gentlemen who receive cards of admission to Buckingham Palace are requested to bring with them two large cards with their names clearly written thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in attendance and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to Her Majesty. In the case of presentation the name of the presenter must be inserted on the card.

By Her Majesty's Command.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levees, at St. James's

Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Leves, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that a letter from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, stating it to be his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations shall be made at Leves, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and seven, intituled "An Act to prevent until the "first day of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty, and to the end of the then session "of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or "infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and "other animals," and from time to time continued by divers subsequent Acts, and lastly by an Act passed in the session of the twenty-eighth and twenty-ninth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred and nineteen, it is (amongst other things) enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Privy Council, or any two or more of them, from time to time to make such Orders and Regulations as to them may seem necessary for the purpose of prohibiting or regulating the removal to or from such parts or places as they may designate in such Order or Orders of sheep, cattle, horses, swine, or other animals, or of meat, skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or other parts of any animals, or of hay, straw, fodder, or other articles likely to propagate infection, and to make any other Orders or Regu-

lations for the purpose of giving effect to the provisions of the said Act, and again to revoke, alter, or vary any such Orders or Regulations; and that all provisions for any of the purposes aforesaid, in any such Order or Orders contained, shall have the like force and effect as if the same had been inserted in the said Act:

And whereas the said Act has been amended and explained by an Act passed in the twenty-ninth year of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the Act of the eleventh and "twelfth years of Her present Majesty, chapter "one hundred and seven, to prevent the spreading "of contagious or infectious disorders among "sheep, cattle, and other animals:"

And whereas divers Orders, in pursuance of the said recited Acts, have been made by the Lords of the said Council, in relation to the contagious or infectious disorder generally designated as the "Cattle Plague," which now prevails in certain parts of England, and particularly by an Order bearing date the 4th day of October, 1866, whereby, among other things, it is ordered that animals may be moved from Scotland into England and Wales, with a licence in the form described in the Order of Council bearing date the 11th day of April, 1866, and designated "Store Stock Licence," together with the declaration and certificate which accompany the same.

And whereas by another Order bearing date the 7th day of November last, the said Lords of the Council did make provision for the granting of licences for the holding of markets for the sale of animals in England and Wales, and did thereby provide that when they license any market for the sale of animals, such animals might be moved to such market whether in or out of the county in which the market is to be held, with a licence in the form called a store stock licence in an Order of the said Lords of the Council bearing date the 8th day of August last, but not without it; and whereas a similar provision is contained in another Order of the said Lords bearing date the 16th day of January last in regard to the sales of animals in England and Wales; and whereas the store stock licence set forth in the said Order of the 8th of August last is not applicable to animals moved from Scotland into England, and it is expedient to make further provision for such case.

Now, therefore, the Lords of the Council do hereby order that in the case of any market or sale heretofore licensed or hereafter licensed under the Orders aforesaid, animals may be moved from any place in Scotland to such market, or the place of such sale, with a store stock licence, to be granted in conformity with the said Order bearing date the 11th day of April last.

WHEREAS by an Order of the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council, bearing date the 24th day of March last, reciting certain

provisions of the Act of the 11th and 12th years of Her present Majesty's reign, chapter 107, which has been continued by divers Acts, and lastly by an Act of the last session of Parliament, until the first day of August next, and the end of the then next session of Parliament, and the appearance and prevalence of a contagious and infectious disorder, generally designated the Cattle Plague amongst cattle in England and Wales, and sundry other matters, the said Lords did in exercise of the powers given by the said Act so continued as aforesaid, make divers rules and regulations, and did among other things, order that until the 1st day of June, 1866, all cattle brought by sea from any place out of the United Kingdom into any town or place in England, should be marked, by clipping the hair off the end of the tail; and that no such cattle should be removed alive from such town or place, except by sea, and that town or place in such regulation should according to circumstances be the area of any borough or such other limits as may be defined by the Privy Council in respect of such borough:

And whereas such Order hath, by a subsequent Order bearing date the 26th day of May last, been continued and amended until the Lords of the said Council should thereafter otherwise order:

And whereas cattle are brought by sea from places out of the United Kingdom into the borough of Liverpool, in the county of Lancaster, but it is expedient that certain limits should be prescribed within the said borough, into which such cattle may be brought:

Now, therefore, the Lords of the Council do hereby define the limits of the said borough into and within which cattle may be brought by sea from places out of the United Kingdom as follows; that is to say:—

All that space within the said borough which is bounded on the north by the south side of Battery-street, Bankfield street, and Bankhall-street, the west side of the Southport Railway, to the boundary of the borough, and thence to the east side of the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway; on the east by the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway, so far as the south side of Athol-street; on the south by the south side of Athol-street, to the west side of Great Howard-street; on the west by the west side of Great Howard-street, to the south side of Sandhill-lane; and thence by Sandhill-lane to the west side of Regent-road.

All cattle brought by sea from any place out of the United Kingdom, so landed at the port of Liverpool, in the said borough shall be slaughtered within such limits and not elsewhere, and no cattle brought within such limits shall be removed therefrom alive:

And the said Lords do further order that all the regulations of the said Order of 24th March, now in force, and not inconsistent herewith, shall apply to this Order, and any contravention of any provision herein contained shall be deemed to be an offence within the operation of the said Order of the 24th day of March last, and be punishable as therein provided:

And further that the said Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the said borough of Liverpool, shall publish this Order by causing a copy thereof to be advertized in some newspaper circulating in the said borough, and by causing a copy thereof to be affixed in some conspicuous place of the port aforesaid.

WHEREAS by an Order, bearing date the 7th day of June, 1866, reciting certain provisions of the Act of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and seven, and that it was amended and explained by an Act passed in the last session of Parliament, and the existence of the contagious or infectious disorder of the cattle plague amongst cattle in England and Wales, and that divers orders had been made by the Lords of the said Council in relation thereto, which had been consolidated by an Order bearing date the 24th day of March last, and that certain provisions were contained in the said Order of the Privy Council to regulate the movement of cattle on any highway, and such movement without a licence as therein described was prohibited, except for a distance not exceeding five hundred yards, from one part of the same farm to the other:

And that the holding of markets for the sale of cattle was prohibited by the said Order until the 1st day of June, 1866, except in the case of a market held with the licence of the Privy Council for the sale of cattle intended for immediate slaughter, which term had, by an Order of the said Council, been extended from the said 1st day of June until the said Lords of the Council should otherwise direct:

And that there is a market held in the borough of Wolverhampton, in the county of Stafford, for the sale of cattle, and the holding thereof had been licensed by the Lords of the said Council, by instrument bearing date the 31st day of May then last, for the sale of cattle intended for immediate slaughter, so long as the said above-mentioned Orders should remain in force, or until the revocation thereof as therein provided, subject to all the conditions, provisions, and regulations in the said first-mentioned Order contained applicable to such market:

And that it was provided by the said Order of the 24th March last, that in the case of cattle brought to any market other than the Metropolitan Cattle Market, they should in no case be taken beyond such limits as might be described in the licence of the Privy Council allowing such market, and under such conditions with respect to their movement within such limits as might be imposed by such licence:

And that in the said licence for the holding of the above-mentioned market it was provided that no cattle brought into the said market should be taken alive beyond the limits of the municipal boundaries of the borough of Wolverhampton, and it was expedient that certain other regulations should be made in that behalf, the Lords of the said Council did thereby order that notwithstanding such provision in the said licence, cattle sold in the said market might, until the thirtieth day of September then next, which time hath by subsequent Orders been extended to the thirty-first

day of March next, if the said licence shall so long continue in force, be moved to any slaughter house within a district therein described, to be there immediately slaughtered under such regulations as the Local Authority of the several counties in which the places therein-mentioned should be situated respectively should from time to time make and issue in regard to the movement, and the places, times, and manner of the slaughtering of such cattle :

And that if the said Local Authority made regulations in such behalf, cattle might be moved under such regulations from the said market by railway only to the Spon-lane Station of the London and North-Western Railway, or to the West Bromwich Station of the Great Western Railway, and thence respectively to slaughter-houses within the parish of West Bromwich, and there be forthwith slaughtered, or to the Brierley-hill Station of the Great Western Railway, to be forthwith slaughtered, within one mile of such station : And subject to regulations to be made by the said Local Authority, cattle might be slaughtered within the parts of the parishes of Willenhall, Wednesbury, and Sedgley, which were not included in the district above described :

And it was provided that nothing therein contained should allow the cattle to be kept alive for more than four days after exposure in the said market.

And whereas it is expedient to make further regulations in regard to cattle sold in the said market at Wolverhampton.

Now, therefore, the Lords of the said Council do hereby order that from and after the twenty-second day of this present month of February, cattle sold in the said market, in the borough of Wolverhampton, may be moved to slaughter-houses situated within the parliamentary boundaries of the boroughs of Birmingham, in the county of Warwick, and of Wolverhampton and Walsall, in the county of Stafford ; and in the following towns and places, all in the said last-named county, that is to say, Handsworth, Smethwick, Darlaston, Wednesbury, West Bromwich, Tipton, Rowley Regis, Great Bridge, Harborne, and the parish of Kingswinford, and to the towns and places of Aston, Warwick, Coventry, and Saltley, all in the county of Warwick ; and at all intermediate places, in the respective counties of Stafford and Warwick, between any of the above-named boroughs, towns, and places, and the parliamentary boundaries of the said borough of Wolverhampton, to be there slaughtered under such regulations to be made and issued as aforesaid, and subject to the same provisions as to the time of slaughter aforesaid.

Provided also, that the cattle shall be moved from the said market to the borough of Birmingham by railway only, but may be moved to the town of West Bromwich or to Brierley Hill by road or by railway.

Nothing in the Order of the Lords of the Council bearing date the 22nd day of June, applicable to the counties of Warwick and Worcester, shall prevent the operation of this Order.

This Order shall be published, by the Local Authority of the county of Stafford, in some newspaper circulating in the borough of Wolverhampton, and by a notice affixed in some conspicuous place in the said market ; and every regulation of a Local Authority made under this Order shall be published in like manner.

Every person who shall contravene this Order, or any regulation of the Local Authority made

under it, shall be guilty of an offence, and be subject to the like penalty as in the case of a contravention of any regulation in the said Order of the 24th of March last.

WHEREAS by an Order bearing date the 5th day of May last reciting certain provisions of the Act passed in the session of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and seven, intituled "An Act to prevent until the first day of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty, and to the end of the then next session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders amongst sheep, cattle, and other animals," duly continued by subsequent Acts, and that the same had been amended and explained by an Act of the last session of Parliament, and the appearance and prevalence of the Cattle Plague amongst cattle in England and Wales, and that divers Orders had been made by the Lords of the Council which had been consolidated and amended by an Order bearing date the 24th day of March last, and further reciting certain provisions in the said Order, and particularly one prohibiting the holding of markets for the sale of cattle without a licence, and that a market was held for the borough of Liverpool at Stanley, in the township of West Derby, which had been licensed by the Lords of the Council under the said Order for a limited time, and further reciting certain matters relating to the township of Birkenhead, in the county of Chester, the said Lords did make certain provisions to be in force until the 1st of June then next following, or until further Order in that behalf should be sooner made in reference to the movement of cattle from the said market into the said township of Birkenhead :

And whereas by an Order, bearing date the 31st day of May last, the said Order was continued until the said Order of the 24th day of March last, applicable to the sale of cattle in markets, should cease to be in force, or until the Lords of the Council should make other Order in that behalf :

And whereas the said Order of the 24th of March last still continues in force ; but it is expedient that the said Order of the 5th day of May last shall be determined.

Now, therefore, the Lords of the said Council do hereby order, that from and after the twenty-second day of this present February, the said Order of the 5th day of May last shall be determined and be no longer in force, except in respect of any matter or thing commenced under it and not completed, and in respect of any offence committed against it and not yet punished.

And the said Lords do further order that the Local Authority of the borough of Liverpool shall publish this Order by causing the same to

be advertized in some newspaper circulating within the said borough, and by causing a copy thereof to be affixed in some conspicuous place in the said market.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Minister at Munich, reporting that, according to an announcement in the "Bavarian Gazette" of the 7th instant, the levying of Navigation Dues on the Bavarian portion of the Rhine ceased entirely on the 1st of January of this year, 1867; in execution of the stipulations of Article No. 10 of the Treaty of Peace with Prussia, similar measures having been adopted by the other German Rhine bordering States.
