(Quarantine, No. 49.)

THE Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs has received from the Acting British Consul-General at Naples Despatches, of which the following are copies:—

Naples, August 29, 1867.

I HAVE the honour to report to your Lordship that the quarantine on vessels arriving at this port from Messina, which sailed on or after the 25th instant, has been increased from seven to fifteen days; and the quarantine of fifteen days imposed on vessels from Palermo and Trapani has been reduced to seven days.

Naples, September 2, 1867.

I HAVE the honour to report to your Lordship that owing to the continuance of cholera in this city notice has been received from the Ministry that all vessels from Naples, which sailed on or after the 31st August, will be subjected to a quarantine of seven days in other Italian ports, which are free from cholera.

All quarantines at this port have been abolished except on vessels from the Bay of Palermo, and the ports of Messina and Trapani which will still be subjected to a quarantine of seven days.

Foul bills of health for cholera are now issued to vessels leaving Naples.
