The Queen has been pleased to give and grant unto Doctor John Patterson, Her Royal licence and authority that he may accept and wear the Insignia of the Imperial Order of the Medjidie of the Fifth Class, which His Imperial Majesty the Sultan hath been pleased to confer upon him in approbation of his services while actually and entirely employed, beyond Her Majesty's dominions, by His Highness the Viceroy of Egypt, in the Sanitary Department of His Highness's Administration.
