THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a copy of a Notice which appeared in the Madrid Official Gazette of the 31st ultimo, stating the places vessels arriving from which are subject to quarantine in Spain.

A translation of the Notice is appended:—

(Translation).

*Ministry of the Interior.*

Direction-General of Public Charities, Health, and Penal Establishments.

In consequence of various enquiries which have been addressed to this office as to the foreign countries declared infected or subject to quarantine of observation, I beg to inform you that vessels from the following places are now subject to quarantine in our ports, by the Orders quoted below:—
