THE Board of Trade have received from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs two Despatches from Her Majesty's Acting Consul at Malaga, reporting that the following taxes have been imposed on goods shipped and landed at that port, for the purpose of raising funds for deepening and improving the harbour:—

On goods to or from colonies and foreign countries other than European, 688 milesimas of a peseta (about 6½d.) per Spanish ton of 1000 kilogrammes; and on goods to or from European countries, 575 milesimas of a peseta (about 5½d.) per ton.

Also a further tax, subsequently imposed for the same purpose, ranging from 4 to 35 cents. of a peseta per 100 kilogrammes, or from 4d. to 2s. 11d. per ton on all merchandise shipped and landed.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 108.)—GIBRALTAR STRAIT—AFRICAN SHORE.

*Sunken Rock near Blanca Point.*

INFORMATION has been received from the Senior Naval Officer at Gibraltar of the existence of a detached rocky patch lying 3 cables off Blanca Point (3 miles north-westward of Cueta), and on which the steamship *Susan* was recently wrecked.

This rock (*Susan Rock*) is about 30 yards in extent north and south, and 10 yards east and west, has 16 feet water on it and is steep-to, having 6 to 9 fathoms close around it.

From Susan Rock the following bearings were taken, viz. :—

Point Leona, W. by N.  $\frac{2}{3}$  N.,  $1\frac{1}{2}$  miles.

Blanca Point Tower (ruin), S. by W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  W., 600 yards.

North angle of old Cueta Wall just open of Bermeja Point, S. by E.  $\frac{3}{4}$  E.,  $\frac{3}{4}$  mile.

This detached danger lies E. by S.  $\frac{3}{4}$  S., 3 cables from the well-known Benzus Shoal, and there is from 7 to 8 fathoms between them.

WE, whose names are hereunder written, having been sworn this twenty-first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five, before the Queen's Remembrancer, at Goldsmith's Hall, in the city of London, have made the Assays and Trials of Her Majesty's Gold and Silver Coins in the Pyx of the Mint, and which, according to accounts produced by the officers of the Mint, were coined in the said Mint from the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four to the thirtieth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five, both days inclusive. We ascertained that the number of coins, both of gold and silver, in each packet produced to us, corresponded with the number which the officers of the Mint represented it to contain, and we took a coin or coins from each of such packets of Gold coins, making altogether one sovereign or twenty shilling piece, and six half-sovereigns or ten shilling pieces, and we weighed each of the said coins separately, so as to ascertain whether they were within the remedy prescribed in the First Schedule of the Coinage Act, 1870. We found that the amount of variation from the standard of weight specified in the said First Schedule of the said Act was minus three thousandths of an ounce (or  $\cdot 003$ ) on the whole of such coins, and that, therefore, they were within the prescribed remedy as to weight. We then melted the said Gold coins so taken out and weighed, into an ingot, and assayed such ingot, comparing it with the Standard Gold Trial Plate produced by the Board of Trade, so as to ascertain whether the metal was within the remedy as to fineness prescribed in the said First Schedule to the said Act, and we found that the amount of variation thereof from the Standard of Fineness specified in the said First Schedule to the said Act was minus three ten-thousandths (or  $\cdot 0003$ ), and, therefore, that the said metal was within the prescribed remedy as to fineness. We weighed the residue of the said Gold coins in bulk, and we ascertained that they were within the remedy as to weight. We then took from such residue one sovereign and two half-sovereigns, and weighed and assayed them separately, and we found that such sovereign weighed 123.274 grains ; and that such half-sovereigns weighed respectively, the first 61.697 grains, and the second also 61.697 grains. We then assayed the said sovereign and two half-sovereigns separately, and we found the millesimal fineness of such sovereign to be 916.7, and the millesimal fineness of such half-sovereigns to be 916.5 and 916.3, respectively. We also took a coin from each of such packets of Silver coins, making altogether ten half-crowns, two florins, eighteen shillings, eight sixpences, and of Maundy monies, one fourpenny piece and eighteen threepences, and weighed each of the said Silver coins separately, so as to ascertain whether they were within the remedy of the said First Schedule of the said Coinage Act, 1870. We found that the amount of variation from the Standard of Weight specified in the said First Schedule of the said Act was minus sixty-six thousandths of an ounce (or  $\cdot 066$ ) on the whole of such coins, and that, therefore, they were within the prescribed remedy as to weight. We then melted the said Silver coins, so taken out and weighed, into an ingot, and assayed such ingot, comparing it with the Standard Silver Trial Plate produced by the Board of Trade, so as to ascer-

tain whether the metal was within the remedy as to fineness prescribed in the said First Schedule to the said Act, and we found that the amount of variation from the Standard of Fineness specified in the said First Schedule to the said Act, was minus nine ten-thousandths (or .0009), and, therefore, that the said metal was within the prescribed remedy as to fineness. We weighed the residue of the said Silver coins in bulk, and we ascertained that they were within the remedy as to weight. We then took from such residue two half-crowns, two florins, one shilling, and one sixpence, and weighed and assayed them separately, and we found that such half-crowns weighed, respectively, 218.206 and 218.203 grains, that such florins weighed, respectively, 174.565 and 174.518 grains, that such shilling weighed 87.262 grains, and that such sixpence weighed 43.606 grains. We then assayed the said two half-crowns, the said two florins, the said shilling, and the said sixpence separately, and we found the millesimal fineness of such half-crowns to be 924.3 and 924.5, respectively, of such florins to be 925.0 and 926.5, respectively, of such shilling to be 924.2, and of such sixpence to be 925.3.
