It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations shall be made at the Levee, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Minister at Buenos Ayres, enclosing a copy of a Decree dated the 7th February, containing the following modifications of Articles 16 and 21 of the Regulations respecting Pilotage in the Argentine Republic, viz. :—

ART. 16.—Every individual who shall pilot a vessel in Argentine waters without being a pilot licensed by the Republic shall pay to the Board of Direction of the Society of Pilots a sum equivalent to the pilotage provided for by the tariff in such cases.

ART. 21.—All seagoing vessels bound for Argentine ports must take from Point Indio Light-vessel a pilot having an Argentine license.

With a view to carry this arrangement into effect there shall be at all times at that point a sufficient number of pilots either free or belonging to the Society and licensed by the Republic in order to conduct vessels destined as above.

It is stated that the foregoing modifications were to come into force 30 days after the date of the above decree.
