

Bishop's Itchington shall be subject to thirteen pounds six shillings and eight pence first fruits, and one pound six shillings and eight pence tenths; and the perpetual curacy of Gaydon and Chadshunt to thirteen pounds six shillings and eight pence first fruits, and one pound six shillings and eight pence tenths.

"I the Right Reverend Henry Lord Bishop of Worcester the patron or person entitled to present to the benefice of Bishop's Itchington in the county of Warwick and diocese of Worcester (the same being now vacant) do hereby signify my consent to the annexed scheme proposed and set forth and to every matter and thing therein contained. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand this twelfth day of February one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine.

And whereas the said Lord Bishop hath transmitted the said scheme to the said Lord Archbishop together with the said consent.

And whereas the said Lord Archbishop being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with such scheme hath certified the same and such consent as aforesaid, to Her Majesty in Council, by his report dated the 14th day of February, 1879, which report is in the words and figures following:—

"To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

"We the undersigned Archibald Campbell Lord Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury do hereby report to your Majesty in Council.

"That the Right Reverend Henry Lord Bishop of Worcester has represented unto us (amongst other things):—

"That the parish of Bishop's Itchington in the county of Warwick and diocese of Worcester comprises two chapelries known by the names of Gaydon and Chadshunt respectively the boundaries of which are well known and defined.

That each of the said chapelries contains a consecrated building or chapel in which Divine service has been celebrated for many years past the said two chapels being distant about a mile and a half from each other and about four miles from the parish church of Bishop's Itchington.

That it appears to the said Lord Bishop that the said chapelries may under the provisions of the Acts of Parliament of the first and second years of your Majesty's reign chapter 106, and the second and third years of your Majesty's reign chapter 49 be advantageously separated from the said parish of Bishop's Itchington and be together constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes.

"That the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a scheme in writing describing the mode in which it appears to him the proposed alteration may best be effected and how the changes consequent upon such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction dues rates and payments and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested which scheme together with the consent thereto in writing of the patron of the said benefice (which is now vacant) has been transmitted by the said Lord Bishop to us for our consideration.

"The representation and scheme of the said Lord Bishop and the consent before referred to are hereunto annexed.

"And we the said Archbishop being on full consideration and inquiry satisfied with the said scheme do hereby pursuant to the Act of the first and second years of your Majesty's reign chapter

106 certify the same and such consent as aforesaid to your Majesty in Council to the intent that your Majesty in Council may in case your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for carrying the said scheme into effect.

"As witness our hand this fourteenth day of February one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine.

Now therefore Her Majesty in Council by and with the advice of Her said Council is pleased to order and it is hereby order that the said scheme of the said Lord Bishop of Worcester be carried into effect.

THE following Despatch has been received at the Admiralty from Commodore Sullivan:—

FORWARDING REPORTS ON THE ENGAGEMENTS AT INYEZANE AND ISANDHLWANA.

"Active," off Natal,
February 3, 1879.

SIR,

I HAVE the honour to forward herewith the report of Commander Campbell on the engagement with the enemy of the column under Colonel Pearson, on 22nd ultimo, at Inyezane.

2. Their Lordships will learn with pleasure the distinguished part taken by the Naval Brigade in this action, and the gallant behaviour of Commander Campbell, Lieutenant Hamilton, and other officers mentioned in the report.

3. I beg to recommend Commander Campbell to the especial consideration of their Lordships. His zeal and energy are ever conspicuous; and I learn from unofficial but reliable sources that his skill and courage on this occasion were remarkably so.

4. Lieutenant Craigie has rendered good service both during the late war in the Cape Colony, when his services were brought to their Lordships' notice, and again during the present war; he but narrowly escaped with his life a few weeks ago, being swept into river when working the pontoon at the time D. Martin, A.B., was drowned.

5. Lieutenant Hamilton's gallantry has before been brought to their Lordships' notice, and was by all accounts I have received especially conspicuous on this occasion. I rely with confidence on his merits being duly appreciated by their Lordships.

6. Sub-Lieutenant Fraser is mentioned as having done good service.

7. Lieutenant Dowding, Royal Marine Light Infantry, appears to have handled his men with skill, and to have shown here, as he did in the late war in the Cape Colony, all the attributes of a good soldier.

8. Mr. L. Coker, Midshipman, under considerable difficulties, brought his gun into action with promptitude, gallantry, and skill, and I learn by reliable sources did considerable execution with the Gatling under his charge.

9. Mr. Cotton, Boatswain, also, as stated by Colonel Pearson in his despatch "contributed to the success of the day with the rockets under his charge." He is an old and valuable officer, and did good service with the pontoons at the Tugela drift. He also served in the trenches during the Crimean war before Sevastopol. I commend him to their Lordships' favourable consideration.
