TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S DRAWING ROOMS AT BUCKINGHAM PALACE.

By Her Majesty's Command,

The Ladies who propose to attend Her Majesty's Drawing Rooms, at Buckingham Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in Attendance, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to The Queen.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Lady who proposes to be presented to The Queen must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Drawing Room, a card with her name written thereon, and with the name of the Lady by whom she is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulations, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary than an intimation from the Lady who is to make the presentation, of her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command, that no presentations shall be made at the Drawing Room, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

It is not expected that Gentlemen will present themselves at Drawing Rooms, except in attendance on the Ladies of their families.

Any Gentleman who under these circumstances should desire to be presented to The Queen, will observe the same regulations as are in force for Her Majesty's Levees.

REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEE TO BE HELD BY HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, ON BEHALF OF HER MAJESTY, AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

By Her Majesty's Command,

The Noblemen and Gentleman who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace; *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulations that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, of his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations

shall be made at the Levee, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

The State Apartments will be open for the reception of Company coming to Court at half-past one o'clock.

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by "The Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862," it was enacted, that on and after the first day of June one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, or such later day as might be fixed for the purpose by Order in Council, the regulations contained in the table marked C in the Schedule to the said Act should come into operation and be of the same force as if they were enacted in the body of the said Act; but that Her Majesty might from time to time on the joint recommendation of the Admiralty and the Board of Trade, by Order in Council, annul or modify any of the said Regulations, or make new Regulations in addition thereto or in substitution therefor; and that any alterations in, or additions to, such Regulations made in manner aforesaid should be of the same force as the Regulations in the said Schedule:

And whereas, by the same Act, it was further provided, that whenever it should be made to appear to Her Majesty that the Government of any foreign country was willing that the regulations for preventing collisions contained in Table C in the Schedule to the said Act, or such other regulations for preventing collisions as are for the time being in force under the said Act, should apply to the ships of such country when beyond the limits of British jurisdiction, Her Majesty might, by Order in Council, direct that such regulations should apply to the ships of the said foreign country, whether within British jurisdiction or not; and it was further provided by the said Act, that whenever an Order in Council had been issued applying any Regulation made by or in pursuance of the said Act to the ships of any foreign country, such ships should, in all cases arising in any British court, be deemed to be subject to such Regulation, and should, for the purpose of such Regulation, be treated as if they were British ships:

And whereas, by an Order in Council made in pursuance of the said recited Act, and dated the ninth day of January one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, Her Majesty was pleased to direct: that there should be substituted for the Regulations contained in the Schedule to the said Act certain Regulations appended to the said Order, and that the said appended Regulations should, on and after the first day of June one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, apply to French ships, whether within British jurisdiction or not:

And whereas by several Orders in Council subsequently made, Her Majesty was pleased to direct that the Regulations appended to the said recited Order should apply to ships of the countries specified in the said Orders, whether within British jurisdiction or not:

And whereas by Order in Council dated the

thirtieth day of July one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, Her Majesty was pleased to make certain additions to the Regulations appended to the said first-recited Order in Council;

And whereas by Order in Council dated the fourteenth day of August one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine, Her Majesty, on the joint recommendation of the Admiralty and the Board of Trade, was pleased to direct that on and after the first day of September one thousand eight hundred and eighty, the said Regulations and the additions thereto should be annulled, and that there should be substituted therefor the new Regulations contained in the First Schedule thereto, and that the same should, from and after the first day of September one thousand eight hundred and eighty, apply to ships of the countries mentioned in the said Second Schedule thereto, whether within British jurisdiction or not:

And whereas Article numbered 9 of the Regulations appended to the said recited Order in Council of the ninth day of January one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, is as follows; that is to say,

ART. 9. Open fishing boats and other open boats shall not be required to carry the side lights required for other vessels; but shall, if they do not carry such lights, carry a lantern having a green slide on the one side and a red slide on the other side; and on the approach of or to other vessels, such lantern shall be exhibited in sufficient time to prevent collision, so that the green light shall not be seen on the port side, nor the red light on the starboard side.

Fishing vessels and open boats when at anchor, or attached to their nets and stationary, shall exhibit a bright white light.

Fishing vessels and open boats shall, however, not be prevented from using a flare-up in addition, if considered expedient.

And whereas the Article numbered 10 of the said new Regulations, contained in the First Schedule of the said recited Order in Council of the fourteenth day of August one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine, which said Article is to be in substitution for the said recited Article numbered 9, is as follows; that is to say,

ART. 10. (a.) Open fishing boats and other open boats when under way shall not be obliged to carry the side lights required for other vessels; but every such boat shall in lieu thereof have ready at hand a lantern with a green glass on the one side and a red glass on the other side; and on the approach of or to other vessels, such lantern shall be exhibited in sufficient time to prevent collision, so that the green light shall not be seen on the port side, nor the red light on the starboard side.

(b.) A fishing vessel, and an open boat, when at anchor, shall exhibit a bright white light.

(c.) A fishing vessel, when employed in drift net fishing, shall carry on one of her masts two red lights in a vertical line one over the other, not less than three feet apart.

(d.) A trawler at work shall carry on one of her masts two lights in a vertical line one over the other, not less than three feet apart, the upper light red, and the lower green, and shall also either carry the side lights required for other vessels, or, if the side lights cannot be carried, have ready at hand the coloured lights as provided in Article 7, or a lantern, with a red and a green glass as described in paragraph (a.) of this Article,

(e.) Fishing vessels and open boats shall not be prevented from using a flare-up in addition, if they desire to do so.

(f.) The lights mentioned in this Article are substituted for those mentioned in the 12th, 13th, and 14th Articles of the Convention between France and England scheduled to the British Sea Fisheries Act, 1868.

(g.) All lights required by this Article, except side lights, shall be in globular lanterns so constructed as to show all round the horizon.

And whereas the Admiralty and the Board of Trade have jointly recommended to Her Majesty that the operation of the said recited Article numbered 10 of the new Regulations contained in the First Schedule of the said Order in Council of the fourteenth day of August one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine, shall be suspended until the first day of September one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, and that, in lieu thereof, and in substitution therefor, the recited Article numbered 9 of the Regulations appended to the said Order in Council of the ninth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, shall continue and remain in force until the said first day of September one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Her by the said recited Act, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to direct that the operation of the said recited Article numbered 10 of the new Regulations contained in the First Schedule of the said Order in Council of the fourteenth day of August one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine, shall be suspended until the first day of September one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, and that in lieu thereof, and in substitution therefor, the said recited Article numbered 9 of the Regulations appended to the said Order in Council of the ninth day of January one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, shall continue and remain in force until the said first day of September one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one.

WHEREAS in pursuance of the Bishoprics Act 1878 the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England on the 18th day of March 1880 certified to Her Majesty under their common seal that the annual value of the Liverpool Bishopric Endowment Fund together with the annual sum which will ultimately be derived in pursuance of the hereinbefore mentioned Act from the endowment or income of the Bishopric of Chester was not less than three thousand pounds a year and that contributions to that fund sufficient to raise the same annual value within five years from the date of the same Certificate up to three thousand five hundred pounds a year had been guaranteed to the satisfaction of the Commissioners.

Now, therefore, in pursuance of the above-mentioned Act, Her Majesty is pleased by and with the advice of Her Most Honourable Privy Council, to order and declare as follows:—

1. The Bishopric of Liverpool is hereby founded.

2. The diocese of the said bishopric shall consist of the West Derby Hundred of the county of Lancaster, with the exception of so much of the said hundred as is now in the diocese of Man-

chester, and to include the whole of the ancient parish of Wigan as provided in the schedule to the before mentioned Act.

3. The parish church of St. Peter, in Liverpool in the county of Lancaster subject to the rights of the patron and incumbent thereof, is assigned as a Cathedral Church to the said bishopric.

4. The Bishop of Liverpool is constituted a body corporate and is hereby invested with all such rights, privileges, and jurisdictions as are possessed by any other bishop in England and is subjected to the metropolitan jurisdiction of the Archbishop of York.

5. This Order shall come into operation on the publication of the same in the London Gazette.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of Her Majesty, chapter eighty-two; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-sixth day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty, in the words and figures following; that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy, of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of your Majesty chapter ninety-seven, of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of your Majesty chapter eighty-two have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint John the Evangelist situate in the township of Chelford in the parish of Prestbury in the county of Chester and in the diocese of Chester.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of Prestbury and of the antient chapelry of Over Peover otherwise called Peover Superior in the parish of Rostherne in the county and diocese aforesaid which said extremities lie contiguous one to another and are described in the schedule hereunder written there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of the said parish of Prestbury and of the said antient chapelry respectively.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said parish of Prestbury and of the said antient chapelry of Over Peover otherwise called Peover Superior should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint John the Evangelist situate in the township of Chelford as aforesaid.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend William Bishop of the said diocese of Chester as such Bishop, with the consent of Charles Richard Banastre Legh of Adlington Hall near Macclesfield in the said county of Chester Esquire, the patron of the vicarage of

the said parish of Prestbury, and with the consent of Sir Philip Tatton Mainwaring, Baronet, of Over Peover aforesaid, the patron of the incumbency of the said antient chapelry of Over Peover otherwise called Peover Superior as aforesaid (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly represent that it would in our opinion be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Prestbury and of the said antient chapelry of Over Peover otherwise called Peover Superior which are described in the schedule hereunder written all which portions together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint John the Evangelist situate in the township of Chelford aforesaid and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint John the Evangelist Chelford with Old Withington.'

"We therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint John the Evangelist Chelford with Old Withington being:—

"All those portions of the parish of Prestbury in the county of Chester and in the diocese of Chester which are comprised within and are co-extensive with the limits of the two townships of Chelford and of Old Withington which two said townships have heretofore been held to constitute the antient chapelry of Chelford and also all that contiguous portion of the antient chapelry of Over Peover otherwise called Peover Superior in the parish of Rostherne in the county and diocese aforesaid which is comprised within and is co-extensive with the limits of the township of Snelson save and excepting all that portion of the said lastly-mentioned township which forms the north-western corner thereof and contains by admeasurement forty-nine acres or thereabouts and which is situate to the west and north of an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said township of Snelson from the particular district or new parish of Marthall in the county and diocese aforesaid at a point at or near to Snelson House where the road which leads from Merehills turnpike-gate and which is called or known as Pepper-street is joined by the cross road which leads from Snelson House aforesaid into the road which passes along the western side of Highfield Cottage and extending thence that is from Pepper-street aforesaid first south-eastward along the middle of the said cross road for a distance of ten chains or thereabouts (thereby passing along the north-eastern side of the triangular plot or close numbered 55 on the map of the ordnance survey of the said parish of Rostherne on the scale of $\frac{1}{2500}$ and upon the map hereunto annexed) and then south-westward along the middle of the same cross road for a distance of thirty-four chains or thereabouts (thereby passing along the south-eastern side of the said plot or close) to a point on the western side of Highfield Cottage aforesaid upon the boundary which divides the said township of Snelson from the township of Over Peover otherwise called Peover Superior in the antient chapelry of Over Peover otherwise called Peover Superior as aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Chester.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act further to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England," it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time, to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit:

And whereas Orders in Council have been made directing the discontinuance of burials in the churchyards hereinafter mentioned from the time specified in such Orders; and whereas it seems fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the time for discontinuing burials in the said churchyards be postponed:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time for the discontinuance of burials in such churchyards be postponed as follows; viz. :—

In the Saint Neot's Churchyard and Saint Neot's Independent and Baptist Burial-grounds, in the county of Huntingdon, to the twenty-fifth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty.

In the churchyard of Llanbedrog, in the county of Carnarvon, to the thirtieth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty.

ARTICLE II.—The duties of the Vestry Clerk for the time being appointed under the authority

of the Statutes in that behalf and of this Order shall be as follows :

To give notice of and attend the Meetings of Vestry and Committees appointed thereat.

To summon and attend Meetings of the Churchwardens, when required, and to enter the minutes thereof respectively.

To keep and make out the accounts of the Churchwardens, and to present such accounts to the Vestry or other legal authority to be passed.

To ascertain and make out the list of persons liable to serve on juries, and to cause them to be printed and duly published and returned to the Justices.

To make all returns required of the Churchwardens by law or proper authority.

To advise the Churchwardens in all the duties of their office.

ARTICLE III. The Churchwardens and Overseers of the Poor of the said Parish shall pay to the person for the time being appointed to the office of Vestry Clerk, under the authority of this Order, a salary at the rate of fifteen pounds per

annum, or such other remuneration for the performance of the duties of that office as the Local Government Board may, with the consent of such person, from time to time direct or approve.

ARTICLE IV. Such remuneration, in the case of an annual salary, shall be considered as accruing from day to day, and be apportionable in respect of time accordingly, in pursuance of the provisions of "The Apportionment Act, 1870," and shall be paid quarterly at the usual Feast Days in the year, namely, Lady Day, Midsummer Day, Michaelmas Day, and Christmas Day.

ARTICLE V. A copy of this Order shall be published in the London Gazette by the Churchwardens and Overseers of the Poor of the said Parish.
