Will you call, therefore, the attention of your Sanitary Authorities to the strict supervision and application of these sanitary measures.

THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a copy of a Quarantine Notice issued by the Norwegian Government, a translation of which is as follows, viz.:

Circular relating to places infected with cholera and to the consignment of vessels with cholera patients on board to the Port of Christiansand.

From the Royal Norwegian Department of Justice and Police.

The following foreign places shall, until further notice, be considered as infected with cholera, viz.:

The Ports of the Red Sea.

Japan.

Philadelphia.

Fez, Mequinez, and Dar el Beida, in Morocco; and

Uruquayana, in Brazil.

Vessels with cholera patients on board and bound for Norwegian ports shall be directed by the pilots to repair to the Quarantine Establishment at Christiansand. In other ports the masters of vessels will be required to keep their sick on board and to remain meanwhile in quarantine.

The above is hereby communicated for the information and notice of all concerned.
