REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEE TO BE HELD BY HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, ON BEHALF OF HER MAJESTY, AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

By Her Majesty's Command,

The Noblemen and Gentlemen who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulations that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, of his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations

shall be made at the Levee, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

The State Apartments will be open for the reception of Company coming to Court at half-past one o'clock.

An area comprising so much of the township of Marishes, in the North Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the east the North-Eastern railway, on the south Marishes Cow-lane from the railway gates to the Pickering and Malton-road, on the west the Pickering and Malton-road, and on the north Thornton-lane from the Pickering and Malton-road to the Marishes railway-station, and seven fields on the north side of Thornton-lane known as the Crabtree Field, Over Lane Field, Chapel Field, Willow Field, Nigh Willow Field, Eight Acres Field, and Little Field all in the occupation of Francis Bower, and Jeffrey Nicholson.

THE CONTAGIOUS DISEASES (ANIMALS) ACT, 1878

THE following areas are now *Areas Infected with Foot-and-Mouth Disease* under the above-mentioned Act (except the lines of railway within those areas as far as those lines are used or required for the transit of animals through those areas, without untrucking):—

Berwickshire.—An area in the parishes of Edrom, Swinton, Wuitsome, Dunse, and Fogo, in the county of Berwick, comprising Bellshiel farm, Kimmerghame Mains farm, Kimmerghame Mill farm, Harcarse farm, Harcarse Hill farm, Crowfootbank farm, Greenrig farm, Wuitsome South Laws farm, Greenknowe farm, Middlestots farm, Kimmerghame Policies and Parks, Mount Pleasant farm, Mungoswalls farm, Wedderburn Policies and Parks, Cairnhill farm, Nisbet Hill farm, Nisbet Mill farm, Nisbet Policies and Parks, Bogend farm, together with all roads, public and private, bounding or intersecting the same.

Cheshire.—(1.) So much of the township of Hellingworth, in the county of Chester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Manchester and Saltersbrook turnpike-road, Green-lane, then the fence running to Widdows Croft, then the fence dividing Widdows Croft and Fields farm to Mill brook, then the brook to the Manchester and Saltersbrook turnpike-road aforesaid.

(2.) So much of the township of Kingsley, in the county of Chester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, from Kingsley Church, thence by Wood-lane to the footpath leading to Kingsley, by fence to water pits, by stream to stile, thence by the fence leading to the junction of Hall on the Hey-lane and Ball-lane to Crewood Common, road to Mill-lane, Mill-lane to Beech-lane junction with Frodsham-

road, Frodsham-road to Newton five lane ends to Kingsley Church aforesaid.

(3.) So much of the township of Tintwistle, in the county of Chester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Manchester and Saltersbrook turnpike-road, Green-lane, then the fence running to Widdows Croft, then the fence dividing Widdows Croft and Wains farm to the wall on the Manchester Water Works running to the reservoir bank, along the reservoir bank to Armfield Tower to the Manchester and Saltersbrook turnpike-road to Green-lane aforesaid.

(4.) So much of the township of Chorlton, in the county of Chester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Newcastle-road, commencing at the Wybunbury-road at Hough to brook bridge near Weston Hall, then the said brook to the bridge in Weepit-lane, along Weepit-lane to the gateway leading to Mr. Hodgkiss's Gousley farm, then a straight line across fields to Enoch Ellison's farm, Hough Heath, then along the Hough and Wybunbury-road to Newcastle-road aforesaid.

(5.) So much of the township of Torkington, in the county of Chester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the river Goyt on the north, an occupation-road leading to Torkington farm on the south, a plantation terminating near Dom Bank Toll Bar on the east, and by the fence forming the boundary of the township of Offerton and Bosden on the west.

(6.) So much of the township of Hooton, in the county of Chester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, New Chester-road commencing in the township of Hooton at the boundary of Hooton Hall farm and lands of J. Aspinall Tobin to Hooton Toll Gate, a lane known as Hooton Green to Hooton Cottages, the boundary fence between lands in the occupation of Richard Littler to Hooton Church, the boundary fence on the south side of Hooton Park dividing the Park from lands in the occupation of Joseph Howard and James Kellet to the river Mersey, and from the river Mersey the boundary fence of Hooton Park to Chester-road.

(7.) So much of the township of Siddington, in the county of Chester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Siddington Old Toll Bar site along Congleton-road to and along Occupation-road by Enoch Massey's farm, Marton to Marton brook, the permanent fence between William Slack's and Thomas Adshead's farms, across Blackdair-lane to Old Mere Wood side to Congleton-road and Old Toll Bar aforesaid.

(8.) So much of the borough of Stalybridge as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the river Tame on the north, High-street and Grosvenor-street on the south, Melbourne-street, Castle-street, and Caroline-street on the east, and Bayley-street on the west, all of which area is situate in that part of the said borough of Stalybridge which is in the township of Dukinfield, in the county of Chester.

(9.) So much of the township of Norton, in the county of Chester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, by Norton-lane to Halton-lane, by Halton-lane to Halton, then by Norton Priory Park wall to Astmore Bridge, then by the Bridgewater Canal to Norton Town Bridge and Norton-lane aforesaid.

Cornwall.—(1.) The parish of St. Gluvias, in the county of Cornwall.

(2.) The parish of Gwinear, in the county of Cornwall.

(3.) The parish of Budeck, in the county of Cornwall.

(4.) The parish of Stithians, in the county of Cornwall.

(5.) The parish of Camborne, in the county of Cornwall.

(6.) The parish of St. Agnes, in the county of Cornwall.

Derbyshire.—(1.) An area in the hamlets of Ambaston, and Thulston, in the parish of Elvaston, in the county of Derby, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the river Derwent near Borrowash Mills at the spot where the north-west fence of the Big meadow reaches the said river, thence down the said river until it is joined by New Dyke-brook near the Wiln Mills, thence along the north bank of the said brook until it reaches the three lane ends, and along Cow Lane, leading to Brook meadow by Mr. Robinson's farm, and thence along the north-west fences of Brook meadow and Big meadow until the latter reaches the river Derwent at the point of starting.

(2.) So much of the township of Fernilee, in the county of Derby, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the north by a foot-path from the river Goyt to Horwich House, on the east by the foot-path from Horwich House to the London and North-Western Railway bridge, on the south by the Chapel-en-le-Frith and Stockport turnpike-road from the London and North-Western Railway bridge to Shallcross Hall and the river Goyt to the west, and by the Goyt to the White Hart on the north.

(3.) So much of the township of Glossop, in the county of Derby, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Hargate Hill-lane on the north, the road from Hargate Hill-lane to Charlesworth Chapel and along the borders of Coombs Rocks on the east, the new road from Coombs Rocks to Hole House on the south, and the Ludworth and Glossop turnpike-road from Hole House to Hargate Hill-lane end on the west.

(4.) So much of the township of Linton, in the county of Derby, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Burton and Measham main-road on the east, from Highcross Banks to Linton Drift, the fence along the boundary of the counties of Leicester and Derby to a point opposite Tilly's Beer House on the south, the main-road through the village of Linton to Brooky-lane on the west, and along Brooky-lane to Highcross Banks on the north.

(5.) So much of the parishes and townships of Measham, Willesley, Oakthorpe, Stretton-en-le-Fields, Appleby, and Snarestone, in the counties of Derby and Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road from Gallows Gate along Gallows-lane to junction with the Bosworth-road, to left down Bosworth-road to the bridge over the Snarestone brook, to right along the brook course (the boundary of the counties of Derby and Leicester) to Pepper Bridge, to the left along the Atherstone and Measham-road by Snarestone Church to point opposite Snarestone railway station, thence to the right under the railway bridge and along the Snarestone-road to Appleby, turning to the right by Black Horse Inn along Stoney-lane to junction with

Heath-lane, to the right along Heath-lane to junction with Measham and Tamworth-road at point opposite Manor House Gate, to the right down Tamworth-road to Measham Tape Mill, thence to the left along the river Mease to the foot-bridge, thence to the right along the Stretton-en-le-Fields and Oakthorpe foot-road to the Burton and Measham main-road, crossing it and up Pickering-lane by Jent's brickyard up the hill by the Shoulder of Mutton Inn, through Oakthorpe Village to the Gin Stable-lane End, thence to the left along Gin Stable-lane crossing the Moira and Measham turnpike-road, along the Oakthorpe Colliery-road and occupation-road by Pastures farm to Willesley-lane, and to the right along Willesley-lane to Gallows Gate aforesaid.

(6.) So much of the parishes of Overseal, Gresley, and Ashby-de-la-Zouch, in the counties of Leicester and Derby, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, turf and arable land in the occupation of Mr. Mason and also an Occupation-road in the parish of Gresley, in the county of Derby, on the north, turf and arable land in the occupation of Mr. Whitehead on the south, turf and arable land in the occupation of Messrs. Adams and Winterton, and the Bosworth and Burton-upon-Trent turnpike-road on the west, and grass land in the occupation of Mr. Clamp, in the parish of Ashby-de-la-Zouch, on the east.

Devonshire.—(1.) So much of the parish of Ilfracombe, in the county of Devon, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, a stream of water opposite Wigmouth farm on the west, the south fence of the new Ilfracombe and Combmartin-road and the south fence of Watermouth-park on the north, the east fence of the Home meadow and Horse park on the east, and the south fence of Lydford farm on the south.

(2.) The parishes of Buckland Monachorum, Meavy, and Walkhampton, in the county of Devon.

Essex.—So much of the parish of East Ham, in the county of Essex, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Romford-road on the north, the London, Tilbury, and Southend railway on the south, Red Post-lane, East Ham, on the east, and Upton-lane, West Ham.

Flintshire.—So much of the townships of Llygany-wern, and Llygany-lan, in the petty sessional division of Northop, in the county of Flint, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Hare and Hounds Gate, Nant-y-Flint, Nant Mill, Halkin Chain Gate, Halkin Village, Fron and Pentre Halkin.

Hampshire.—(1.) So much of the parish of Nursling, in the county of Southampton, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Plantation-road leading to Baddesley and Southampton on the east, Redbridge-lane to Yew Tree farm on the west, Upton-lane adjoining the Romsey and Southampton turnpike-road to the Andover and Redbridge-railway on the north, and Brown Hill-road leading to Redbridge and Millbrook on the south.

(2.) So much of the parish of Millbrook, in the county of Southampton, and of the parish of St. Mary, in the borough of Southampton, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the south by Alexandra-road, on the west by Shirley-road from Alexandra-road to Anglesea-road, on the north by Anglesea and Winchester roads to Point Out, hence on the east by Hill-lane to Alexandra-road on the

borders of Southampton Common, and the whole of Southampton Common on the east of Hill-lane.

Herefordshire.—The whole of the town of Ross as defined by The Ross Improvement Act, 1865, and all the lands and premises lying within the boundaries hereinafter mentioned, that is to say, the road leading from the foot of Alton-street part of the town of Ross to the Ross and Gloucester main-road on the south-east, the said main-road from the junction of such roads to a place called Hildersley on the south-east, the occupation-road on Hildersley Farm from the said main-road to and under the Hereford, Ross, and Gloucester railway on the east, the said railway to a point opposite the western boundary of the lands held with Rudhall House on the south, thence as the crow flies from such point in a northerly direction to the foot-path from Rudhall to Ross, thence following such foot-path and the occupation-road from Messrs. Goolds' Tannery and having such foot-path and occupation-road on the north to the junction of such road with the Ross and Ledbury-road, thence westward as the crow flies to the river Wye, down the river to Wilton Bridge, and from that Bridge along the road to the Royal Hotel in the town of Ross, in the county of Hereford.

Lancashire.—(1.) So much of the borough of Bury, and of the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Bury and Rochdale Old-road, Makin-lane, Birtle Moor-road, Mouldin-lane, and Elbert-lane.

(2.) So much of the township of Lower Booths, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Brow Edge on the east, farm buildings known as Newbarn, in the occupation of Samuel Heyworth, on the west, Heightside-farm on the north, and Chapel Hill farm on the south.

(3.) So much of the township of Newchurch, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Newchurch and Burnley turnpike-road on the east, Bury and Burnley turnpike-road on the west, Seatnaze Hill on the north, and Haslingden and Todmorden turnpike-road on the south.

(4.) So much of the township of Higher Booths, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Hill Top Height side on the east, Mr. Brook's reservoir on the west, Kitline plantation to reservoir on the north, and Short Clough plantation to Hill Top on the west.

(5.) So much of the township of Spotland, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Cheesden-brook on the north; Royds-brook on the south; Ashworth-brook on the west; and Knowe Hill-brook on the east.

(6.) (7.) So much of the township of Walmersley-cum-Shuttleworth, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Rugby Coal Pit-road on the east, Dark-

lane on the west, Black Bare Side stream on the north, and Buccuks-road on the south.

(8.) So much of the township of Ightenhill Park, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the boundary of the borough of Burnley on the east, west, and south, and a fence dividing Pollards farm from Old Home farm on the north.

(9.) So much of the township of Abram, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Warrington-road on the west, Bickershaw lane on the north, Wigan Junction railway on the east, and Wigan Junction Old Tram-Way on the south.

(10.) So much of the township of Read, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the south by the Padiham and Whalley-road commencing at Newtown, thence in a westerly direction to Dunkirk Gate, thence along a fence past Clough Side Wood to Cobkerr Nook, thence along a bye-lane to Newhall Gate, thence along the highway to Winns Quarry, thence by a foot-path to Symonstone Old Toll Bar, and thence by the Padiham and Whalley-road to Newtown aforesaid.

(11.) So much of the township of Thornton, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Warrenhurst, a line from the shore to the Preston and Wyre railway, on the west, Albert-street on the east, the shore on the north, and the Preston and Wyre railway on the south.

(12.) So much of the township of Spotland, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Meadow Bank farm off Burnley-road in Newchurch on the north, Higher Rockcliffe farm, Rockcliffe, off Rochdale-road Bacup in Spotland on the south, Top oth Bank farm Bacup in Newchurch on the west, Greave farm, Greave, Bacup in Spotland on the east.

(13.) So much of the township of Higher Booths, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Burnley and Bury highway on the east, Fair Bank and New Barn farms on the west, Love Clough Printworks and Scar Foot farm on the north, and Cranberry Height and Mill Gate farms on the south.

(14.) So much of the township of Butterworth, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Broadshaw farm on the north, Knott Booth farm on the south, Moorbank farm on the west, and Garside farm on the east.

(15.) So much of the township of Chadderton, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the boundary of the township of Chadderton and the borough of Oldham on the north, the Lancashire and Yorkshire railway on the west, Oldham Cemetery (Chadderton) on the south, and Brook-street, Busk, on the east.

(16.) So much of the hamlet of Mossley, in the parish of Ashton-under-Lyne, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Lancaster-street on the north, Market-street on the south, Stamford-road on the east, and Old-road on the west.

(17.) So much of the township of Castleton, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Fenn's farm on the north, Broadshaw farm on the south, Mayfield farm on the west, and Higher Moorbank farm on the east.

Leicestershire.—(1.) The parishes of Barwell, and Stapleton, in the county of Leicester.

(2.) So much of the parish of Barkstone, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway from Nottingham to Belvoir Castle on the north, the highway from Newark to Melton Mowbray on the east, the highway from Plungar to Melton Mowbray on the south, and the highway from Granby to Plungar on the west.

(3.) So much of the parish of Carlton-Cur-lieu, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Albert Norman's farm on the east, Barnett field and Clump Close on the north, the road leading from Kibworth to Carlton on the west, and the road leading from Tur Langton to Kibworth on the south.

(4.) So much of the parish of Great Bowden, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, certain fields in the occupation of Messieurs Danby, Walker, Knight, J. Bolton, George Webb, Sedgley, W. Tebbutt, Ashwell, and Smeeton.

(5.) So much of the parish of Carlton-Cur-lieu, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Merr-road and the extreme boundary of A. Norman's farm.

(6.) So much of the parish of Great Bowden, in the county of Leicester, and of the parish of Little Bowden, in the county of Northampton, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the extreme boundary of John Watson's farm, William Gatty's farm, Sir W. de Capell Brooke's Bridge field, Barber's meadow, Messrs. Bird and Tebbett's fields, the Barn fields, and J. Brown's meadow, all in the parish of Little Bowden, on the south-east, Mr. Fisher's farm, Great Bowden, on the north-east, Clark's and Patrick's fields on the north-west, and the boundary of Market parish on the south-west.

(7.) The whole of the parishes of Goadby, and Keythorpe, and so much of the parish of Tugby as is included within the following boundaries, that is to say, Mr. Kendall's Church Close, Neather Meadow, and Sir A. (10.) So much of the parish of Castle Donington, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Midland railway company's line from Trent to Melbourne, the highway from Castle Donington to King's Mills, the river Trent and Stud brook, and a bridge-road from Park-lane to G. T. Eaton's Bottom farm.

(11.) The whole of the parish of East Langton, in the county of Leicester.

(12.) So much of the parish of Great Bowden, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Leicester turnpike-road on the west, the Union Canal on the north, the road from Harborough to Great Bowden on the east, and thence northwards to the point where the canal crosses the road leading from Great Bowden to the Leicester

(13.) (16.) So much of the parish of Glooston, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Gartree-road on the south, Stouten Wood on the west, two ploughed fields and Bush meadow in the occupation of Mr. Rudkin on the north, and Goadby-road on the east.

(17.) The whole of the parish of Blaston, and so much of the parish of Holt as lies on the east side of Blaston and bounded by five ploughed fields in the occupation of Mr. Burton, in the county of Leicester.

(18.) So much of the parishes of Kilworth, and South Kilworth, in the county of Leicester, and of the parishes of Stanford, and Welford, in the county of Northampton, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, certain fields in the occupation of Messrs. Wood and George Gee in the parish of Kilworth, Wood in the parish of Stanford, and Wood, W. Gardiner, Haynes, and John Butlin in the parish of Welford, and W. Hill in the parish of South Kilworth.

(19.) So much of the township of Kibworth-Harcourt, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road from Kibworth to Wistow on the west, Wistow brook on the north, and the Midland railway on the east and south.

(20.) The whole of the parish of West Langton, in the county of Leicester.

(21.) So much of the parish of Allexton, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Uppingham turnpike-road on the north, East Norton station, railway, and bridle-road leading to Horninghold on the west, and Allexton-road leading to Hallaton on the east and south.

(22.) So much of the parish of Noseley, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Noseley-road and brook on the south and east, Rolleston Wood and Village road leading to New Inn and Noseley on the north and west.

(23.) So much of the parish of Theddingworth, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road from Lubenham to Mowsley on the north, the London and North-Western railway on the south, the road from Theddingworth to Laughton on the east, and the road from Theddingworth to Mowsley on the west.

(24.) At Burbage, in the parish of Aston Flamville, in the county of Leicester, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, Thomas Gilbert's farm on the north, the

Hinckley and Lutterworth turnpike-road on the south, Soar brook on the east, and Jibbett's-lane on the west.

(25.) So much of the parishes and townships of Measham, Willesley, Oakthorpe, Stretton-en-le-Fields, Appleby, and Snarestone, in the counties of Derby and Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road from Gallows Gate along Gallows-lane to junction with the Bosworth-road, to left down Bosworth-road to the bridge over the Snarestone brook, to right along the brook course (the boundary of the counties of Derby and Leicester) to Pepper Bridge, to the left along the Atherstone and Measham-road by Snarestone Church to point opposite Snarestone railway station, thence to the right under the railway bridge and along the Snarestone-road to Appleby, turning to the right by Black Horse Inn along Stoney-lane to junction with Heath-lane, to the right along Heath-lane to junction with Measham and Tamworth-road at point opposite Manor House Gate, to the right down Tamworth-road to Measham Tape Mill, thence to the left along the river Mease to the foot-bridge, thence to the right along the Stretton-en-le-Fields and Oakthorpe foot-road to the Burton and Measham main-road, crossing it and up Pickering-lane by Jent's brickyard up the hill by the Shoulder of Mutton Inn, through Oakthorpe Village to the Gin Stable-lane End, thence to the left along Gin Stable-lane crossing the Moira and Measham turnpike-road, along the Oakthorpe Colliery-road and occupation-road by Pastures farm to Willesley-lane, and to the right along Willesley-lane to Gallows Gate aforesaid.

(27.) So much of the parish of Great Bowden, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road from Bowden to Thorpe Langton on the east, Langton brook on the north, Mr. Walker's big field on the south, and Mr. J. W. Walker's Far Close on the west.

(28.) So much of the parish of Foston, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the turnpike-road from Countesthorpe to Kilby, the turnpike-road from Leicester to Welford, plough land belonging to and occupied by the Reverend Wing, and the bye-road from Foston to Peatling.

(29.) So much of the lands in the county of Leicester as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the bridle-road from Medbourne to Welham on the north, and so much of the lands in the county of Northampton as lie within the following boundaries, that is to say, the London and North-Western railway on the east and south, and so much of the lands in the counties of Leicester and Northampton as lie within the following boun-

daries, that is to say, the road leading from the point where the railway line crosses the Welham-road through Welham to the point at which the bridle-road enters the road from Welham to Slawston on the west.

(30.) So much of the parish of Merevale, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the north by The Green Lanes, on the south and east by the brook which adjoins Beenhills farm, and on the west by the brook which separates the counties of Leicester and Warwick.

(31.) So much of the parishes of Lubenham, and Theddingworth, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the north the extreme boundary of Theddingworth parish, on the south the road from Lubenham to Theddingworth, on the east the road from Lubenham to Laughton, and on the west the road from Theddingworth to Laughton.

(32.) So much of the parishes of Overseal, Gresley, and Ashby-de-la-Zouch, in the counties of Leicester and Derby, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, turf and arable land in the occupation of Mr. Mason and also an Occupation-road in the parish of Gresley, in the county of Derby, on the north, turf and arable land in the occupation of Mr. Whitehead on the south, turf and arable land in the occupation of Messrs. (5.) So much of the parish of Braybrooke, in the county of Northampton, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road leading from Braybrooke to Desborough on the south for half a mile, the turnpike-road from Harborough to Desborough half a mile each side of the Commons Lodge on the north, the road leading from Braybrooke to Market Harborough on the west, and the extreme boundary of Jonathan Clater's farm on the east.

(6.) So much of the parish of Great Bowden, in the county of Leicester, and of the parish of Little Bowden, in the county of Northampton, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the extreme boundary of John Watson's farm, William Gatty's farm, Sir W. de Capell Brooke's Bridge field, Barber's meadow, Messrs. Bird and Tebbett's fields, the Burn fields, and J. Brown's meadow, all in the parish of Little Bowden, on the south-east, Mr. Fisher's farm, Great Bowden, on the north-east, Clark's and Patrick's fields on the north-west, and the boundary of Market parish on the south-west.

(7.) So much of the parish of Braybrooke, in the county of Northampton, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, certain fields in the occupation of Messrs. Parker, Cowley, Kilhorn, Soak, King, and Battams.

(8.) So much of the parishes of Kilworth, and South Kilworth, in the county of Leicester, and of the parishes of Stanford, and Welford, in the county of Northampton, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, certain fields in the occupation of Messrs. Wood and George Gee in the parish of Kilworth, Wood in the parish of Stanford, and Wood, W. Gardiner, Haynes, and John Butlin in the parish of Welford, and W. Hill in the parish of South Kilworth.

(9.) So much of the lands in the county of Leicester as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the bridle-road from Medbourne

to Welham on the north, and so much of the lands in the county of Northampton as lie within the following boundaries, that is to say, the London and North-Western railway on the east and south, and so much of the lands in the counties of Leicester and Northampton as lie within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road leading from the point where the railway line crosses the Welham-road through Welham to the point at which the bridle-road enters the road from Welham to Slawston on the west.

(10.) So much of the parish of Warmington, in the county of Northampton, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the London and North-Western railway on the east, the village of Tansor on the south, the river Nen on the west, and the parish of Fotheringhay on the north.

Nottinghamshire.—(1.) So much of the parish of Tollerton, in the county of Nottingham, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, a line drawn from the Top farm of Alfred Broadhurst at Tollerton to the Glebes farm in the occupation of John Brunt at Tollerton, and from there to Johnsons field in the occupation of J. H. Sanders at Tollerton, and from there to the Rough field in the occupation of Samuel Wild at Tollerton.

(2.) So much of the parish of Cotgrave, in the county of Nottingham, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Grantham Canal, the highway leading from Cotgrave to Plumtree, the highway leading off the Cotgrave and Plumtree-road to Tollerton village, and the highway leading from Cotgrave to Holme-Pierrepont.

(3.) So much of the parishes of Kinoulton, and Owthorpe, in the county of Nottingham, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway from Kinoulton to Widmerpool, a line drawn from Kinoulton Hill Top to New Fields farm in the occupation of Edwia Keyworth, and from thence to Winstow Gorse.

(4.) So much of the township of Brough, in the parish of North Collingham, in the county of Nottingham, as is comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, on or towards the north by Norrell-lane, on or towards the east by a line leading from Mr. Barlow's farm to Norrell-lane, on or towards the south by Danethorpe-lane leading from Mr. Barlow's farm to the Foss-road, and on or towards the west by the Foss-road leading from Newark to Lincoln.

Rutland.—(1.) The parish of Thistleton, in the county of Rutland.

(2.) So much of the county of Rutland, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road leading from the parish of Oakham Deanshold through Barleythorpe and Langham to Cold Overton, in the county of Leicester, on or towards the east and north, the said county of Leicester towards the west, and the parish of Oakham Deanshold aforesaid, and the road leading from the said parish to Knossington until it reaches the said county of Leicester on or towards the south.

(3.) So much of the parish of Lyndon, in the county of Rutland, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the river Gwash towards the north, the road leading from Lower Hambleton where it crosses the said river through Edith Weston and Lyndon to Pilton until it crosses the river Chater on the

east and south-east and part of the south, by the river Chater on or towards the remaining part of the south, and by the Midland railway on or towards the west.

(4.) The whole of the parish of Thorpe-by-Water, in the county of Rutland.

(5.) So much of the parish of Liddington, in the county of Rutland, as lies between the parish of Thorpe-by-Water, and the following roads, that is to say, the road from Liddington to Gretton, Northamptonshire, and the road from Liddington to Thorpe-by-Water.

(6.) So much of the parish of Caldecott, in the county of Rutland, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the river Welland on the south, the road leading from Thorpe-by-Water to Rockingham railway station on the north and west, and the road from Liddington to Gretton on the east.

Shropshire.—(1.) So much of the parish of Lilleshall, in the county of Salop, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, His Grace the Duke of Sutherland's private drive from Lilleshall to Sheriff Hales, and the highway from Honnington to Sheriff Hales, and the Canal from Donnington Wood to Pave-lane.

(2.) So much of the parish of Sheriff Hales, in the county of Salop, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Lodge Wood and private road leading from thence to Lilleshall Abbey and to Lilleshall House, thence His Grace the Duke of Sutherland's drive to Sheriff Hales Manor, and thence to Lodge Wood aforesaid.

(3.) So much of the parish of Baschurch, in the county of Salop, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the water-course from Walford Heath to Fenemere brick-yard, thence the boundary fence which divides T. Slaney Eyton's property to the high-way leading from Merrington Green to Walford Heath water-course aforesaid.

(4.) So much of the parish of Brewood, in the county of Stafford, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Stafford and Wolverhampton road from Gravelly Way Cross-roads to Standeford Bridge, thence by Saredon brook to the river Penk, by the river Penk to Stone Bridge, thence by the highway to Engleton Cross-roads, and by the highway from there through Crateford to Gravelly Way Cross-roads aforesaid.

(3.) Apesford farm in the township of Bradnop, in the county of Stafford, in the occupation of Samuel Bailey, together with the several farms in the occupation of George Tetterton,

James Bassett, William Bailey, William Whieldon, John Fearnihough, William Rider, Herbert Eardley, Thomas Robinson, and Thomas Plumb, and all roads and bye-roads passing through such area.

(4.) So much of the parishes of Stoke-upon-Trent, and Caverswall, in the county of Stafford, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the main-road from Ash Hall to Withy Stakes, thence by the highway to Denman's Grave, thence by the road to Hanley Hays, and thence by the highway to Ash Hall aforesaid.

(5.) So much of the township of Marchington Woodlands, in the county of Stafford, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Stock-lane from Danbridge Mill to the foot-road leading out of Stock-lane to Moat brook by that foot-road, thence by Moat brook to Danbridge Mill aforesaid.

(6.) So much of the parish of Brewood, in the county of Stafford, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Wolverhampton and Stafford turnpike-road, from where it crosses the boundary of the parish of Brewood at Coven Heath, to the Canal Bridge at Slade Heath; thence by the Staffordshire and Worcestershire Canal to the boundary of the parish of Brewood at The Laches; and thence by that boundary southward to the aforesaid turnpike-road at Coven Heath.

(7.) So much of the township of Fazeley, in the county of Stafford, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the river Tame from Bourne brook to Lady Bridge, thence by the turnpike-road from Tamworth to Sutton Coldfield as far as Bourne brook, and by Bourne brook to the river Tame aforesaid.

(8.) So much of the parish of Harborne, in the county of Stafford, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, from the boundary of the borough of Birmingham by Greenfield-road, by the portion of High-street between the western end of that road and Moor Pool-lane, by Moor Pool-lane to the Moor Pool, thence by the brook flowing from that Pool to the boundary of the borough of Birmingham, and by that boundary to Greenfield-road aforesaid.

(9.) So much of the parishes of Betley, Audley, and Madeley, in the county of Stafford, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway from Betley village to Cook's Gate, thence by the highway which passes Heighley Castle to the turnpike-road from Madeley to Betley, and thence by that road to the first-mentioned highway at Betley village aforesaid.

Suffolk.—(1.) So much of the parish of Holbrook, in the county of Suffolk, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the out fall stream from Holbrook Fish Ponds on the north, the road from Holbrook Fish Ponds to Holbrook Sluice on the east, the river Stour on the south, and the Mill-stream running into the river Stour on the west.

(2.) So much of the parish of Harkstead, in the county of Suffolk, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road leading from Rence Park to Crouch House on the north, the lane known as Taylors-lane on the east, the road from Taylors-lane to Nimbletons Corner on the south, and the road from Nimbletons Corner to Rence Park on the west.

(3.) So much of the parish of Harkstead, in the county of Suffolk, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road leading

from Harkstead to Erwarton on the north, the watercourse from the said road leading to the river Stour at Beaumonts Hall on the east, another watercourse from the said road to the river Stour at a farm known as Knights farm in the occupation of Robert Kemball on the west, and by the river Stour on the south.

Warwickshire.—(1.) So much of the parish of Elmdon, in the county of Warwick, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Coventry turnpike-road on the north, Olton-road on the south, Elmdon-lane leading to Solihull on the east, and Olton-road leading to the Birmingham and Coventry-road on the west.

(2.) So much of the parish of Alveston, in the county of Warwick, as is bounded on or towards the west by the road leading from the ford on the river Avon into the Stratford and Wellesbourne-road in the village of Tiddington, and from thence on or towards the south by the said Stratford and Wellesbourne-road.

(5.) So much of the parish of Holy Trinity, in the county of Warwick, as lies within the following boundaries; that is to say, the road from Radford to Brownhill Green on the north, the Coventry and Nuneaton railway on the south, the Coventry and Fillongley-road on the east, and Coundon-lane on the west.

(6.) So much of the hamlet of Erdington, in the county of Warwick, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Midland railway on the south, Chester-road on the east, Grange-lane on the north, and the road leading from Bromford to Erdington on the west.

(9.) So much of the parish of Yardley, in the county of Worcester, and of the parish of Aston, in the county of Warwick, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Church-road on the east, Hob-lane on the west, Coventry-road on the south, and Steteford-road on the north.

(10.) So much of the parish or township of Walsgrave on Sowe, in the county of Warwick, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Wythen-lane on the south and south-

west, Shilton-lane on the north and north-west, the Oxford Canal on the north, and the boundary of Sowe Common on the east.

(11.) So much of the parish of Sutton Coldfield, in the county of Warwick, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Readyap Hill-road on the south, the outside of Church Grove farm, Sindridge-road by Whitehouse Common to the Blue Houses on the east, by road to White Horse Inn, Brick Kiln-lane, and Rectory-road to the Gas Works on the north and west.

(12.) So much of the parish of Monks Kirby, in the county of Warwick, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the turnpike-road from Lutterworth to Coventry on the north, the parish of Churchover on the south, and Muntlase-lane leading from the Lutterworth and Coventry turnpike-road to the parish of Harborough Magna on the west.

(13.) So much of the parish of Aston, in the county of Warwick, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Chester-road from Castle Bromwich Hall to the Midland railway, thence to Bromford Bridge, to Stetchford Bridge, the river Cole to Coleford, the lane by Bucklands End, over the Green to the Coleshill turnpike-road, and on to the road to Castle Bromwich Hall aforesaid.

(14.) So much of the hamlet of Whittington, in the parish of Grendon, in the county of Warwick, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the parish of Atherstone on the east and south, the London and North-Western railway on the west, and the lane leading from Alder Mill to the Merevale Crossing on the north.

(15.) So much of the parish of Chilvers Coton, in the county of Warwick, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road from Astley to Stockingford on the west, the road to Temple House on the north, Park Wood on the east, and High Park Wood on the south.

(16.) So much of the parish of Atherstone, in the county of Warwick, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Long-street on the north, Hall-lane on the west, Welcome-street on the east, and South-street on the south.

(17.) So much of the parish of Stoke, in the county of Warwick, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Coventry and Binley-road on the south, the river Sowe on the east, certain property in the occupation of J. Gulson on the west, and certain property in the occupation of W. Fridmore on the north.

(18.) So much of the parish of Stoneleigh, in the county of Warwick, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Coventry and Tile Hill-road on the south, Banner-lane on the east, and Broad-lane on the north and west.

(19.) So much of the borough of Birmingham, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the river Tame from Lichfield-road to the Midland railway on the north and north-east, Warwick Junction canal from Tame to Church-road, Nechells, on the west and north-west, Church-road, Nechells, on the west and south-west, Washwood Heath-road on the south, and Common-lane to the Midland railway on the east.

(20.) So much of the county of Worcester and of the borough of Birmingham as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Moseley-road on the east, from Leopold-street, Birmingham, parish of Aston, to Edgbaston-

lane, parish of Kings Norton, Edward-road, Pershore-road, parish of Edgbaston, to Macdonald-street, Sherlock-street, Birmingham, parish of Aston, on the west, Macdonald-street, Adelaide-street, Darwin-street, and Leopold-street on the north, and Edgbaston-road from Pershore-road to Moseley-road on the south.

Worcestershire.—(1.) So much of the borough of Birmingham, and of the county of Worcester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Birmingham and Warwick canal on the north; Warwick-road, Greet, in the parish of King's Norton, from Anderton's-road to Golden Hillock-road on the south, Golden Hillock-road from canal bridge to Warwick-road on the east, and Anderton's road as far as the said canal bridge from Sparkbrook-road on the west and north-west.

(2.) So much of the parish of Yardley, in the county of Worcester, and of the parish of Aston, in the county of Warwick, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Church-road on the east, Hob-lane on the west, Coventry-road on the south, and Steteford-road on the north.

(3.) So much of the township of Oldbury, in the county of Worcester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Newbury-lane as far as the Twin Colliery, from the Twin Colliery by the boundary line of the counties of Worcester and Stafford to the Dudley and Oldbury-road at Brades village, from Brades village by the Dudley and Oldbury-road to Furnace Bridge on the Birmingham and Wolverhampton Canal, and from Furnace Bridge by the Birmingham and Wolverhampton Canal to Newbury-lane aforesaid.

THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a copy of a Law recently promulgated in France for the protection of buoys, beacons, &c., at sea, of which the following is a translation, viz. :—

LAW TO PROTECT BUOYS AND BEACONS AT SEA.

The French Senate and Chamber of Deputies having adopted,

The President of the Republic promulgates the Law, of which the following clauses give the tenour :—

ART. 1. It is forbidden to every captain, commander, or master of a vessel to moor to a floating light, beacon, or any buoy not destined for that purpose.

It is equally forbidden to cast anchor within the range of the cable of a floating light or of a buoy.

The only exception to this rule is when the ship, vessel, or boat is in danger of being lost.

ART. 2. Any infringement of the provisions of the Article given above is punished with a fine of from 10 francs to 15 francs inclusive. The offender can, moreover, be condemned to imprisonment for not more than five days.

ART. 3. The captain or master of any ship, boat, or vessel which, by anchoring or mooring, or any other accidental cause, has displaced, upset, or injured a floating light, a buoy, or a beacon is bound to declare it within twenty-four hours of his arrival at the first French port he comes to to the officer in charge or harbour-master, or, if they are absent, to the syndic of mariners. In a foreign country this declaration should be made to the French consular agent nearest to the point of arrival.

If he omits to declare, he may be punished by imprisonment of from ten days to three months, and by a fine of from 25 to 100 francs.

If the declaration is made under the conditions stated above, he is excused from repairing the damage he has caused.

ART. 4. The declaration required by the preceding Article is obligatory, under the same penalties, on the captain or master of a ship, vessel, or boat which, when in danger of being lost, has anchored to a floating light, to a beacon, or to a buoy not intended for such uses.

ART. 5. Whoever intentionally destroys, tampers with, or injures a floating light, a buoy, or a beacon is punished by imprisonment from six months to three years, and by a fine of from 100 francs to 500 francs, without including the reparation of the damage caused.

ART. 6. The penalty of imprisonment, as laid down in Articles 2, 3, 4, and 5, can be doubled in cases of repetition.

It is considered as repetition when the delinquent has been condemned within the preceding twelve months for infringement of the present law.

ART. 7. The regulations of Article 463 of the Penal Code are applicable in all cases where the judicial tribunals, or the police merely, apply the preceding regulations.

ART. 8. Infringements and offences are verified by the officers commanding state vessels, port officers, and harbour-masters, conductors and other agents in the service of roads and bridges, the officers of marine in command of vessels for the protection of fisheries, the syndics of sailors, the marine gendarmes, men in charge of semaphores, and pilots, who ought to be specially sworn to this effect, as well as by the agents and representatives of the customs.

ART. 9. The procès-verbaux drawn up in virtue of the preceding Article hold good until the contrary is proved.

They should, under pain of nullity, be confirmed within three days of the closure of the said procès-verbaux, or when the agent who has proved the offence returns to shore, either before the juge de paix of the canton, or before the mayor of the commune, where the agent who has drawn up the procès-verbal resides.

But procès-verbaux drawn up by officers commanding state vessels, harbour-masters, marine officers in command of vessels for the protection of fisheries, officers of gendarmerie, and custom-house officers in no case require to be confirmed in this manner.

ART. 10. The procès-verbaux are remitted or sent, either directly or through the officer or harbour-master of the nearest port, to the engineer of roads and bridges in charge of the marine service.

Prosecutions are undertaken either by the Government or by the engineer of the marine service, who has the right in this latter case of stating the matter before the tribunal and of being heard in support of his assertions.

The case is carried, according to the nature of the offence proceeded against, either before the police court or the penal court of the harbour nearest to the spot where the offence was committed, or before the court of the French port in which the vessel may have been found, or else of the port to which the French vessel belongs.

The present law having been discussed and adopted by the Senate and by the Chamber of Deputies, will be carried out as a State Law.

Depths of 7 to 8 fathoms, over mud, were obtained around the rock, with the exception of a shoal east of 3½ fathoms rocky bottom, about one cable's length eastward of it.

NOTE.—Dart Rock, unless the sea is breaking on it, is not discernible—caution therefore is necessary when navigating in the vicinity.

BOMBAY HARBOUR.

(2.) Intended Light on Sunken Rock.
