PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the first session of Parliament holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to abridge the holding of benefices in plurality, and to make better provision for the residence of the clergy," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That whenever it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, with respect to his own diocese, and whenever it shall be represented to him by the Bishop of any diocese, or by the Bishops of any two dioceses, that two or more benefices, or that one or more benefice or benefices, and one or more spiritual sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages, in his or their diocese or dioceses, being either in the same parish or contiguous to each other, and of which the aggregate population shall not exceed one thousand five hundred persons, and the aggregate yearly value shall not exceed five hundred pounds, may, with advantage to the interests of religion, be united into one benefice, the said Archbishop of the Province shall inquire into the circumstances of the case; and if on such inquiry it shall appear to him that such union may be usefully made, and will not be of inconvenient extent, and that the patron or patrons of the said benefices, sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages respectively, is or are consenting thereto, such consent being signified in writing under the hands of such patron or patrons, the said Archbishop shall, six weeks before certifying such inquiry and consent to Her Majesty as herein-after directed, cause, with respect to his own diocese, a statement in writing of the facts, and in other cases a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation to be affixed on or near the principal outer door of the church, or in some public and conspicuous place in each of such benefices, sinecure rectories or vicarages, with notice to any person or persons interested, that he, she, or they, may, within such six weeks, show cause in writing under his, her, or their hand or hands, to the said Archbishop, against such union; and if no sufficient cause be shown within such time, the said Archbishop shall certify the inquiry and consent aforesaid to Her Majesty in Council, and thereupon it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make and issue an Order or Orders for uniting

"such benefices, sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages, into one benefice, with cure of souls, for ecclesiastical purposes only; and it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to give directions for regulating the course and succession in which the patrons, if there be more than one patron, shall present or nominate to such united benefice, from time to time, as the same shall become vacant."

And whereas the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury pursuant to the provisions of the said Act, hath duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a certificate in writing, bearing date the nineteenth day of June, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, in the words following, that is to say:—

"To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

"We the undersigned Edward White Lord Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury Primate of all England and Metropolitan do hereby certify to Your Majesty in Council.

"That the Honourable and Right Reverend John Thomas Lord Bishop of Norwich having represented unto us that the rectory of Saint Peter Southgate and the vicarage or perpetual curacy of Saint Etheldred both in the city and diocese of Norwich being contiguous to each other and of which the aggregate population does not exceed one thousand four hundred and twenty-two persons might with advantage to the interests of religion be united into one benefice. We enquired into the circumstances of the case.

"That on such enquiry it appeared to us that such union might be usefully made and would not be of inconvenient extent and that the said Lord Bishop being the patron or person entitled to collate to the said rectory of Saint Peter Southgate if the same were now vacant and the Trustees of the Great Hospital in the city of Norwich being the patrons or persons entitled to present or nominate to the said vicarage or perpetual curacy of Saint Etheldred the same being now vacant have signified their consents in writing to the union of the said benefices into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes.

"That six weeks and upwards before certifying such enquiry and consents to Your Majesty in Council we caused a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation of the said Lord Bishop to be affixed on the principal outer door of the parish church of each of the said benefices with notice to any person or persons interested that he she or they might within such six weeks show cause in writing under his her or their hand or hands to us the said Archbishop against such union and no such cause has been shown.

"The representation of the said Lord Bishop of Norwich our inquiry into the circumstances of the case the statement of circumstances in reply thereto the consent in writing of the patron and the copies of the representation and notice before-mentioned are hereunto annexed.

"And we the said Archbishop do hereby certify the enquiry and consent aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for uniting the said benefices into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes only and for declaring that the course and succession in which the respective patrons for the time being shall collate present or nominate to the said benefices after the same shall be united into one benefice as the same shall become vacant shall be as follows, that is to say, the patronage of and

right of collation presentation or nomination to the said united benefices shall be alternately in the Lord Bishop of Norwich for the time being his successors and assigns and in the Trustees for the time being of the said Great Hospital their successors and assigns and that the first turn or right of presentation or nomination to the said united benefice shall belong to the said Trustees their successors and assigns.

"As witness our hand this nineteenth day of June one thousand eight hundred and eight-threc.

diocese shall be united into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes only.

And Her Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of Her said Privy Council, is pleased to direct that the course and succession in which the respective patrons for the time being shall collate present or nominate to the said benefices after the same shall be united into one benefice as the same shall become vacant shall be as follows, that is to say, the patronage of and right of collation presentation or nomination to the said united benefices shall be alternately in the Lord Bishop of Norwich for the time being his successors and assigns and in the Trustees for the time being of the said Great Hospital their successors and assigns and that the first turn or right of presentation or nomination to the said united benefice shall belong to the said trustees their successors and assigns.

WHEREAS a Declaration between Great Britain and Turkey, amending the Convention of the twenty-fifth January one thousand eight hundred and eighty between Her Majesty and the Sultan for the suppression of the Slave Trade, was signed at Constantinople on the third day of March one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, in the following terms, that is to say :—

"HER Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and His Majesty the Emperor of the Ottomans, being mutually animated by a sincere desire to co-operate for the extinction of the traffic in African slaves, have resolved to conclude a Convention for the purpose of attaining this object, and with this view have named as their Plenipotentiaries, that is to say :—

"Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, the Right Honourable Sir Austen Henry Layard, Her Majesty's Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary at the Sublime Porte ;

"And His Majesty the Emperor of the Ottomans, Sawas Pasha, His Majesty's Minister for Foreign Affairs ;

"Who, having communicated to each other their respective full powers, found in good and due form, have agreed upon and concluded the following Articles :—

"ARTICLE I.

"His Imperial Majesty the Emperor of the Ottomans, whilst renewing absolutely the prohibition of the Slave Trade, engages to forbid from henceforward the importation of African slaves into any part of the Ottoman dominions or its dependencies, or their transit through Ottoman territories by sea ; and to punish, in the manner provided by Ottoman law, and in conformity with the provisions of the firman of the year A.H. 1273 (A.D. 1857), any person or persons amenable to Ottoman jurisdiction who may be found engaged, directly or indirectly, in the traffic in African slaves. His Majesty further engages to prohibit the exportation of black slaves from the Ottoman Empire to foreign parts, except when accompanying their masters or mistresses as domestic servants, in which case each slave, man or woman, shall be furnished with a certificate stating his or her age, and otherwise describing them, and

"Et Sa Majesté l'Empereur des Ottomans, Sawas Pacha, son Ministre des Affaires Etrangères ;

"Lesquels se sont communiqués mutuellement leurs pleins pouvoirs respectifs, trouvés en bonne et due forme, et ont convenu et arrêté les Articles suivants :—

"ARTICLE I.

"Sa Majesté l'Empereur des Ottomans, renouvelant d'une manière absolue la défense du trafic des nègres, s'engage à prohiber l'importation des esclaves d'Afrique dans toutes les parties de l'Empire Ottoman ou ses dépendances, leur passage à travers le territoire Ottoman par mer, et à punir, suivant les dispositions prévues par la loi Ottomane et conformément aux dispositions du firman de l'année 1273 (A.D. 1857), toute personne ou toutes personnes justiciables des tribunaux Ottomans qui se trouveraient mêlées soit directement, soit indirectement, au trafic des noirs. stating the particular capacity in which they accompany their master or mistress; and in the event of their not being furnished with such certificates they shall be set free, and the parties attempting to export them shall be liable to punishment; and all free blacks leaving the Ottoman territories shall, on application to the Ottoman authorities, be furnished with passports certifying that they are free and at liberty to dispose of themselves without restriction or reserve.

"ARTICLE II.

"Any person or persons not being Ottoman subjects, who may be found engaged in the African slave traffic, either directly or indirectly, within the Ottoman dominions, or on board Ottoman vessels, shall, together with their accomplices, if any, be handed over for trial according to the laws of the country with the depositions (procès-verbaux) drawn up by the Ottoman superior authority of the place where the traffic has been proved; and all other documents or evidence ('éléments de conviction') handed over by the said authority, and destined to serve as proofs at the trial of the offenders, so far as those laws may admit of such proof.

"All African slaves found in the possession of a dealer in slaves shall be liberated and dealt with in conformity with the provisions of Article III of the present Convention.

"ARTICLE III.

"Taking into consideration the impossibility of sending back to their homes African slaves who may be captured from slave-dealers and liberated, without exposing them to the risk of perishing from fatigue or want, or from falling again into slavery, the Ottoman Government engages to adopt adequate measures to insure the freedom of such captured Africans, and to see that they are properly cared for.

"ARTICLE IV.

"His Imperial Majesty engages to pursue as criminals all persons who may be found engaged in the mutilation of, or traffic in, children. If such persons are amenable to Ottoman jurisdiction they shall be handed over to the Ottoman tribunals and punished according to Ottoman law; if they are not amenable to Ottoman jurisdiction, that is to say, if the criminals are not Ottoman subjects and the crime has not been committed on Ottoman territory, then they shall be handed over to the competent tribunals, to be dealt with according as the law of their country directs, together with the depositions (procès-verbaux) and other documents or evidence ('éléments de conviction'), as laid down in Article II.

"ARTICLE V.

"With the view to the more effectual suppression of the traffic in African slaves in the Red Sea, His Majesty the Emperor of the Ottomans agrees that British cruisers may visit, search, and, if necessary, detain, in order to hand over to the nearest or most convenient Ottoman authority or to the competent authorities according to Article IV, for trial, any Ottoman vessel which may be found engaged in the traffic in African slaves, as well as any Ottoman vessels which may fairly be suspected of being intended for that traffic, or which may have been engaged in it on the voyage during which she has been met with.

"ARTICLE III.

"This right of visit and detention may be exercised in the Red Sea, in the Gulf of Aden, on the coast of Arabia, in the Persian Gulf, and on the East Coast of Africa, and in Ottoman maritime waters where no constituted authorities exist; and any vessel which may be detained by a British cruiser under the provisions of this Convention shall, together with her cargo and crew, be handed over for trial to the nearest or most convenient Ottoman authority, or to the competent authorities according to Article IV.

"Should there be good reason for believing that vessels sailing under the Ottoman flag which may be found in Ottoman harbours or waters have African slaves on board for purposes of traffic, or have been employed in the African slave traffic during the voyage on which they have been last engaged, such vessels, on being denounced by the commander, or other commissioned officer of a British cruiser, or by a British Consular Officer, shall be immediately searched by the Ottoman authorities, and any slaves who may be found on board shall be released and manumitted, and the vessel, her master, officers, and all persons who shall be proved to have acted in connivance with them, handed over to the competent Ottoman authorities, to be dealt with in accordance with Ottoman laws for the suppression of slave traffic.

"All African slaves captured by a British cruiser on board an Ottoman vessel shall be at the disposal of the Ottoman authorities, or of the nearest authorities in the event of their being no Ottoman authorities in the vicinity, with a view of securing to such slaves their freedom; and the vessel and her cargo shall be handed over for trial to the nearest or most convenient Ottoman authority or to the competent authorities, according to Article IV.

"Her Majesty the Queen of Great Britain and Ireland agrees, on Her part, that all persons navigating under the British flag in the Red Sea, in the Gulf of Aden, on the Coast of Arabia, in the Persian Gulf, and on the East Coast of Africa, or in the inland waters of the Ottoman Empire and its dependencies, which may be found engaged in the traffic in African slaves, or which may fairly be suspected of being intended for that traffic, or which may have been engaged in it on the voyage during which she has been met with, may be visited, seized, and detained by the Ottoman authorities or cruisers; but it is agreed that the vessel and its cargo shall, together with its crew, be handed over to the nearest British authority for trial.

"The captured slaves shall be released by the Ottoman authorities, and shall remain at their disposal.

"If the competent tribunal should decide that the seizure, detention, or prosecution was unjustifiable, the Government of the cruiser making the capture will be liable to pay to the Government of the prize a compensation appropriate to the circumstances of the case.

"It is expressly and formally understood that none of the foregoing provisions apply to the ships of war of either country, which cannot in any case, nor under any pretext, be searched.

"ARTICLE VI.

"With the view to avoid any undue interference on the part of British cruisers engaged in the suppression of the slave trade with Ottoman vessels whose crews may be composed in whole

"Tous les esclaves d'Afrique capturés par un croiseur Anglais à bord d'un navire Ottoman seront placés à la disposition des autorités Ottomanes, et dans le cas où il n'y aurait pas d'autorité Ottomane à proximité, aux autorités les plus rapprochées, à l'effet de les proclamer libres. Le navire et son chargement seront consignés pour être jugés à l'autorité Ottomane la plus proche ou la plus compétente, ou à qui de droit conformément aux prescriptions de l'Article IV.

"ARTICLE VI.

or in part of African slaves, it is hereby agreed that every Ottoman vessel manned wholly or partly by African slaves shall be furnished with papers stating the voyage or employment on which she is engaged, and the number and description of the slaves on board, and any larger number of African slaves found on board than is authorized by the ship's papers shall render the vessel liable to detention and to be sent for adjudication before a competent tribunal.

"ARTICLE VII.

"His Majesty the Emperor of the Ottomans engages to take the necessary measures and to issue the necessary orders for giving effect to the present Convention.

"ARTICLE VIII.

"The present Convention shall be ratified, and the ratification shall be exchanged at Constantinople as soon as possible.

"The present Convention shall come into operation six months after the date of its signature.

"In witness whereof the respective Plenipotentiaries have signed the same, and have affixed thereto the seals of their arms.

"Done at Constantinople this twenty-fifth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and eighty.

And whereas it is expedient that the amendments made by the said Declaration in the said Treaty or Convention should be brought within the operation of "The Slave Trade Act, 1873."

Now therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in this behalf, is pleased by and with the advice of Her Privy Council to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

The said Treaty or Convention of the twenty-fifth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and eighty, as amended by the said Declaration, shall from the third day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, being the day of the date of the said Declaration, be deemed to have been and to be an existing Slave Trade Treaty within the meaning of the said Slave Trade Act, 1873.

And the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, the Right Honourable the Earl Granville, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

And whereas by "The Common Law Procedure Act 1860" it is enacted that it shall be lawful for

Now therefore Her Majesty by and with the advice aforesaid is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that sections 6 and 7 of the said Act of the first and second years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth hereinbefore referred to and sections twelve (excepting so much thereof as relates to giving relief where an action has been commenced in respect of a common law claim for

the recovery of money or goods), thirteen, fourteen, fifteen, sixteen (excepting that part thereof relating to bringing of error upon a special case), seventeen and eighteen of the Common Law Procedure Act 1860 shall apply to the said Tolzey Court and Pie Poudre Court of the city and county of Bristol.

And Her Majesty is further pleased by and with the advice aforesaid to direct that the powers and duties incident to the provisions so referred to and applied as aforesaid which are exercisable thereunder by the Court or a Judge thereof respectively shall and may with respect to matters in the said Tolzey Court and Pie Poudre Court be exercised by the Recorder or his duly appointed Deputy and that the powers and duties which are exercisable under the said provisions by the Master shall and may with respect to matters in the said Courts be exercisable by the Registrar or his duly appointed Deputy, and that actions and issues (without pleadings) directed under the said provisions shall be deemed to be suits pending in the said Courts respectively and the procedure for the time being of the said Courts in or in relation to suits pending in the said Courts respectively shall so far as the same may be applicable apply thereto, and every rule or order entered of record pursuant to the provisions aforesaid and every judgment in respect of any action or issue directed as aforesaid shall have the force and effect of a judgment of the said Courts respectively and shall be enforceable in like manner as such judgments may be and not otherwise.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the first and second years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and seven; of the Act of the second and third years of Your Majesty chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Thomas situate at Shepherd's Bush, in the district parish of Saint Stephen, Hammersmith, in the county of Middlesex, and in the diocese of London.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Thomas situate at Shepherd's Bush aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend John Bishop of

the said diocese of London and with the consent of the Reverend William Lloyd Collett Clerk in Holy Orders the vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said district parish of Saint Stephen, Hammersmith, (testified by their having signed and sealed this representation) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said district parish of Saint Stephen Hammersmith, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Thomas, situate at Shepherd's Bush as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Thomas, Shepherd's Bush.'

"And with the like consents of the said John Bishop of the said diocese of London and of the said William Lloyd Collett (testified as aforesaid) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint Thomas, situate at Shepherd's Bush, as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the forgoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Thomas, Shepherd's Bush, being:—

"All that part of the district parish of Saint Stephen, Hammersmith, in the county of Middlesex, and in the diocese of London, wherein the present incumbent of such district parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls, which is bounded on the east and on the greater part of the north by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Saint John the Evangelist, Hammersmith, in the said county and diocese, from the district parish of Saint Stephen, Hammersmith aforesaid, at the point where New-road is joined by Southbrook-street, and extending thence northward along the middle of the said street for a distance of seven and three quarters chains or thereabouts to its junction with Scotts-road and extending thence westward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of three chains or thereabouts to its junction with Devonport-road and extending thence northward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of seventeen chains or thereabouts to its junction with Uxbridge-road and extending thence westward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of twelve chains or thereabouts to the boundary at the junction of the same road with Bloemfontein-avenue which boundary divides the said district parish of Saint Stephen, Hammersmith, from the new parish (sometime district

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein recited, that is to say the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Your Majesty, chapter thirty-nine and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and fourteen have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to, the church and cure (which said church and cure are hereinafter called the said benefice) of Littleworth sometime part of the parish of Faringdon in the county of Berks and in the diocese of Oxford.

"Whereas the said advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Littleworth is vested in the Bishop of the said diocese of Oxford and his successors.

"And whereas the Provost and Scholars of the House of the Blessed Mary the Virgin in Oxford commonly called Oriel College, of the foundation of Edward the Second of famous memory sometime King of England (which said House is hereinafter called Oriel College only) have to our satisfaction

made a certain benefaction in favour of the said benefice of Littleworth to wit a sum of one hundred pounds which has been by them paid over to us for the benefit of the said benefice and a piece or parcel of land of the estimated value of one hundred pounds or thereabouts which they have undertaken to convey to us as a site for a parsonage house for the same benefice of Littleworth and the said benefaction has been so made upon the understanding and condition that a transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to, the same benefice from the Bishop of Oxford (in whom as such Bishop the same right of patronage is now vested as aforesaid) to them the said Provost and Scholars should be effected by the agency of us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England.

"And whereas the Right Reverend John Fielder now Bishop of Oxford and as such Bishop the patron of the said benefice of Littleworth as aforesaid is willing that the said advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Littleworth should be transferred to the said Provost and Scholars as aforesaid and in testimony of such his willingness and in order to effect the same transfer and also in order to express that consent of the Bishop of the diocese which is by the Acts hereinbefore mentioned or by some or one of them made necessary, he the said John Fielder, Bishop of the said diocese of Oxford has executed this scheme as hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas it appears to us that the transfer of the patronage of the said benefice of Littleworth which is hereinbefore mentioned and is hereinafter recommended and proposed will under and in consequence of the circumstances hereinbefore set forth tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the parish or district in or in respect of which the said right of patronage and advowson arises and exists.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said John Fielder Bishop of Oxford (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal) and also with the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Edward White Archbishop of Canterbury, in testimony of which consent he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal, we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of an Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Littleworth now vested in him the said John Fielder, Bishop of Oxford as such Bishop shall be transferred from him the said John Fielder, Bishop of Oxford and from his successors to the said Provost and Scholars of Oriel College and their successors and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Provost and Scholars and their successors for ever.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Joseph Barber Bishop of the said diocese of Durham (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said parish of Hetton le Hole which is mentioned and described in the schedule hereunder written and which is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and that the same shall be named 'The District of Eppleton.'

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or to any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The district of Eppleton, being:—

"All that part of the parish of Hetton le Hole within the original limits of the parish of Houghton le Spring in the county of Durham and in the diocese of Durham, wherein the present incumbent of the said parish of Hetton le Hole now possesses the exclusive of souls, which said part of the last-named parish is bounded on the west and upon the south by an imaginary line commencing at a point in the middle of Houghton-lane about two chains south-east of Rough Dean Burn upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Houghton le Spring from the parish of Hetton le Hole aforesaid and extending thence southward along the middle of the said lane for a distance of sixty-five chains or thereabouts to its junction at Hetton le Hole with Caroline-street and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the said street for a distance of eighteen chains or thereabouts to its junction with Downs-lane and with Downs Pit-lane and extending thence generally eastward along the middle of the last-named lane for a distance of forty-nine chains or thereabouts to its junction with Carr House-lane and extending thence first eastward and then generally south-eastward along the middle of the last-named lane for a distance of one mile and four chains or thereabouts to the boundary on the western side of Carr House Plantations which boundary divides the said parish of Hetton le Hole from the parish of Dalton le Dale in the county and diocese aforesaid.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," it is enacted that, in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that for the protection of the public health the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-grounds or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require) that, after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burials, shall be discontinued wholly or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require: provided, always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation one month before such representation is so considered; provided also, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish:

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir William Vernon Harcourt, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous consent of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein, with certain modifications:

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the twentieth day of April last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the fifth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three; and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any of the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials in the said parishes shall be discontinued (except as herein otherwise directed), as follows, viz.:

STOURTON-CAUNDLE.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Stourton-Caundle, in the county of Dorset; and also in the churchyard, except as follows:

(a.) In such partly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those already interred therein as can be buried at or below that depth:

(b.) In such earthen graves now existing in the churchyard as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains burials may be allowed of so many of the following relations of those already interred therein, viz.: widows and widowers, as can be buried at or below that depth.

SOUTHWICK.—Forthwith and entirely in Southwick Church, in the parish of Monkwearmouth, in the county of Durham; and also in the churchyard, after the thirty-first December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, except as follows:

(a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented:

(b.) In such partly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those already interred therein as can be buried at or below that depth:

(b.) In such partly walled graves as are now existing in this portion of the churchyard, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those already interred therein as can be buried at or below that depth :

And also in the new portion of the churchyard, after the thirty-first December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, except as follows :

(a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in this portion of the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented :

(b.) In such partly walled graves as are now existing in this portion of the churchyard, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those already interred therein as can be buried at or below that depth.

"**BEXLEY HEATH.**—Forthwith and entirely in "the churchyard of Christ Church, Bexley "Heath, in the county of Kent, except as "follows :—

"In such wholly walled graves as are now "existing in the churchyard burials may be "allowed on condition that every coffin buried "therein be separately enclosed by stonework "or brickwork properly cemented."

And whereas it seems fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the said Order be varied as regards burials in the said churchyard :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows, viz. :—

That burials be discontinued entirely in the said churchyard of Christ Church, Bexley Heath, except as follows :

(a.) In such wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented :

(b.) (c.) In such earthen graves now existing in the churchyard as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains burials may be allowed of so many of the following relations of those already interred therein, viz., widows, widowers, parents, children, brothers and sisters, as can be buried at or below that depth :

(d.) In such reserved grave spaces in the churchyard as have never before been buried in, and, when opened, are free from water, burials may be allowed of so many of the members of the families to whom they have been allotted as can be buried at or below the depth of five feet.

Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that for the protection of the public health the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-grounds or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require) that, after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered; provided also, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish:

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir William Vernon Harcourt, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbent and the Churchwardens of the parish hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial ground should be opened in the under-mentioned parish without the previous consent of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein, with certain modifications:

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the twenty-second day of May last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the tenth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial ground shall be opened in the under-mentioned parish without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials in the said parish shall be discontinued, as follows, viz.:—

LONGPARISH.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Longparish, in the county of Hants; and also in the churchyard after the thirty-first August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, except as follows:

(a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately en-

closed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented:

(b.) In such reserved grave spaces in the churchyard as have never before been buried in, and, when opened, are free from water, burials may be allowed of so many members of the families to whom they have been allotted as can be buried at or below the depth of five feet. *C. L. Peel.*

And whereas the United Kingdom appears to be threatened with a certain epidemic disease, that is to say, the Asiatic Cholera: and whereas it is expedient to make provision thereanent:—

Now, therefore, in exercise of the powers conferred upon them by the above recited section of the said recited Act, the Lords of the Council do order, and it is hereby ordered, that the provisions for the prevention of diseases, contained in Part III of the Act thirty and thirty-first Victoria, chapter one hundred and one, be put in force in Scotland, for the space of six calendar months, after the publication of this Order in the Edinburgh Gazette. *C. L. Peel.*

(FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE.)
