PRESENTATIONS.

Any Lady who proposes to be presented to The Queen must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Drawing Room: a card with her name written thereon, and with the name of the Lady by whom she is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulations, that no presentation can

be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Lady who is to make the presentation, of her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command, that no presentations shall be made at the Drawing Room, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to the Queen.

It is not expected that Gentlemen will present themselves at Drawing Rooms, except in attendance on the Ladies of their families.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulations that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, of his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations shall be made at the Levee, except in accordance with the above regulations.

Her Majesty's Most Gracious Speech, delivered by the Lords Commissioners, to both Houses of Parliament on Tuesday, February 5, 1884.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

I HAVE called you together for the Fifth Session of this Parliament, that you may again address yourselves to the discharge of your arduous and ever-growing duties.

I continue to hold friendly and harmonious relations with all Foreign Powers.

My communications with the President of the French Republic, arising out of special incidents in Madagascar, have closed, as I had anticipated, in a manner such as tends to confirm the cordial understanding between the two countries.

I have likewise, in conjunction with the President, appointed a Commission, which is now sitting in Paris, to discuss a basis of arrangement, which I had proposed, for the future regulation of the Newfoundland fisheries and the avoidance of disputes.

An Agreement has been arrived at with Portugal respecting the River Congo and the adjacent territories. This Agreement will be presented to you forthwith.

Arrangements are in progress for the resumption of diplomatic relations with Mexico, and Special Envoys have been dispatched by each Government to promote that end.

Negotiations for a Treaty of Commerce with Turkey have commenced; an Agreement on commercial arrangements with Spain has been signed, which awaits the sanction of the Cortes; a revision of the Commercial Treaty with Japan, on a basis generally agreed to by the Treaty Powers, is nearly completed; and a Treaty of Commerce and Friendship has likewise been signed with Corea.

Having had every reason to be satisfied with the tranquillity of Egypt, and with the progress made in the establishment of orderly institutions, I gave, during the autumn, instructions for the evacuation of Cairo, for the further reduction of my military forces, and for their concentration mainly in Alexandria.

But in the month of November the Egyptian

Army, appointed to maintain the rule of the Khedive in the Soudan, was defeated and broken up with heavy loss.

Upon the occurrence of this defeat, I deemed it wise to recall the order I had given, as a precaution against the possible effects of the military reverse in Egypt itself, and to preclude all doubt as to the certain maintenance of its tranquillity.

While an unforeseen and calamitous necessity has thus required me to suspend the measure I had adopted, the aim of my occupation, which has been explained to you at former times, continues without change.

I have offered to the Egyptian Government such counsels, as appeared to be required by a prudent regard to the amount of its resources, and to the social condition of the country. I have also dispatched Major-General Gordon to report on the best means of giving effect to the resolution of the Khedive to withdraw from the Interior of the Soudan, and have permitted him to act in the execution of the measure.

Papers relating to this and to several of the foregoing subjects will be presented to you.

I have directed communications to be held with the Delegates, whom the Government of the Transvaal has sent to this country for the purpose of urging a reconsideration of the Convention of Pretoria.

In this interchange of views, attention has been principally turned to the question, always one of difficulty in South Africa, how best to make provision for the maintenance of order, and the prevention of oppression, on the frontier.

Nothing has occurred to discourage the expectation that these communications may be brought to a favourable issue.

Papers will be presented to you on the subject in due course; and likewise with respect to the condition of Zululand, which continues to be unsettled; as well as to the resumption of direct Imperial authority in Basutoland, which is in immediate contemplation.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

The Estimates of charge for the public services during the year 1884-85 have been prepared, and will speedily be laid before you.

I anticipate that the Revenue of the current year will not fall short of the expectations upon which you founded your financial arrangements.

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

The condition of Ireland continues to exhibit those features of substantial improvement, which I described on the two occasions when I last addressed you.

A measure will at once be presented to you which will have for its principal object the enlargement of the Occupation Franchise in Parliamentary Elections throughout the United Kingdom. The experience, gained during half-a-century by the progressive admission of augmented numbers to a share in our representative system, happily warrants the belief that again, as heretofore, the result of a judicious extension of the franchise will be a still closer attachment of the nation to the Throne, the law, and the institutions of the country.

I anticipate a like effect from the extension and the reform of Local Government.

This comprehensive subject embraces all that relates locally to the greater efficiency of administration, to the alleviation of burdens by improved arrangements, and to the enlargement of the powers of ratepayers through the representative system, including among them the regulation of the traffic in intoxicating liquors.

A plan will be laid before you for the extension of Municipal Government to the whole Metropolis.

The preparation under this head, however, which has been made by my directions, has not been limited to London; but the actual presentation of further Bills of the same class must depend upon the progress you may be enabled to make with the weighty business which has been already set forth.

Other public wants have not been neglected; and you will be invited to consider Bills relating to the Security of Life and Property at Sea, to the Railway Commission and its powers, and to the repression of Corrupt Practices at Municipal Elections.

Measures will likewise be laid before you for the better administration of Scottish business; for the promotion of Education, and for the closing of Public Houses on Sunday, in Ireland; and also for the improvement of Intermediate Education in Wales.

I humbly commend your efforts in the matters I have named to you, and in all other particulars, to the blessing of Almighty God.

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Order made by Her Majesty in Council on the 18th day of November, 1867 it was ordered that except as therein mentioned the law of England as it existed on the 22nd day of August 1867 should be thereafter in force in Gibraltar so far as it might be applicable to the circumstances thereof.

And whereas it is expedient to amend the said Order.

And whereas doubts have arisen as to the jurisdiction of the Supreme Court of Gibraltar and it is expedient that such doubts should be set at rest.

And whereas the Orders in Council Ordinances and Proclamation mentioned in the Schedule to this Order in Council may be regarded as spent or have by lapse of time and change of circumstances become unnecessary and it is expedient that the same should be expressly and specifically revoked and repealed.

It is hereby ordered by Her Majesty by and with the advice of Her Privy Council as follows:—

1. The 2nd clause of the said Order in Council of the 18th day of November, 1867 is hereby revoked.

2. Except in respect of matters which now are or hereafter may be provided for by any Order in Council or local Ordinance for the time being in force in Gibraltar (other than those hereby revoked or repealed) or by certain Letters Patent dated the 1st day of September 1830 and commonly called the Charter of Justice or by any Act of Parliament expressly or by necessary inference extending to Gibraltar or by any Proclamation or other instrument issued under the authority of such Order in Council local Ordinance Charter of Justice or Act of Parliament the law of England as it existed on the 31st day of December 1883 shall be hereafter in force in the city garrison and territory of Gibraltar, so far as it may be applicable to the circumstances thereof.

3. Notwithstanding anything contained in the said Charter of Justice the Supreme Court of Gibraltar shall hereafter have and be capable of exercising in the city garrison and territory of Gibraltar the civil jurisdiction which is in England vested in and capable of being exercised by Her Majesty's High Court of Justice except such jurisdiction as before the commencement of the Supreme Court of Judicature Act 1873 was vested in the High Court of Admiralty or the Court for Divorce and Matrimonial Causes.

4. The said Charter of Justice shall henceforth be construed and take effect as if instead of the words "Our Courts of Record at Westminster" wherever those words occur therein the words "the Supreme Court of Judicature in England" had been inserted therein.

5. No Court having jurisdiction in criminal cases within the garrison or territory of Gibraltar (other than a court martial), has or shall have jurisdiction in criminal cases over any officer, soldier or other person in actual pay as a member of the garrison, except by leave of the Governor first obtained in writing, and no such officer, soldier or other person as aforesaid, shall be arrested or imprisoned under or in the course of any criminal process commenced by leave of the Governor, except after an order in writing signed by the Governor, and any such officer, soldier, or other person as aforesaid who may have been so arrested or imprisoned may at any time be discharged from such arrest or imprisonment by order in writing signed by the Governor.

6. The Orders in Council Ordinances and Proclamation described in the schedule to this Order are hereby revoked and repealed to the extent in the third column of the said schedule mentioned.

Provided that such revocation and repeal shall not revive or restore any Order in Council Ordinance or Enactment which has been revoked or repealed by any Order in Council Ordinance or Proclamation hereby revoked or repealed.

And the Right Honourable the Earl of Derby one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by Order in Council, made in pursuance of the Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862, and dated the fourteenth day of August one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine, Her Majesty, on the joint recommendation of the Admiralty and the Board of Trade, was pleased to direct that, on and after the first day of September one thousand eight hundred and eighty, the Regulations for preventing collisions at sea, contained in an Order in Council dated the ninth day of January one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, and the additions by an Order in Council dated the thirtieth day of June one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, made thereto, should be annulled, and that there should be substituted therefor the new Regulations contained in the First Schedule to the said first-named Order in Council, and that the same should, from and after the first day of September one thousand eight hundred and eighty, apply to ships of the countries mentioned in the said Second Schedule thereto, whether within British jurisdiction or not.

And whereas, by Order in Council, dated the twenty-third day of August one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, Her Majesty was pleased to direct that the operation of the Article numbered 10 of the New Regulations contained in the First Schedule of the said Order in Council of the fourteenth day of August one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine should be suspended until the first day of March one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, and that in lieu thereof, and in substitution therefor, the Article numbered 9 of the Regulations appended to the said Order in Council of the ninth day of January one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three should continue and remain in force until the said first day of March one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four.

And whereas the Admiralty and the Board of

Trade have jointly recommended to Her Majesty that the operation of the said Article numbered 10 shall be further suspended until the first day of September one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, and that, in lieu thereof, and in substitution therefor, the said Article numbered 9 shall continue and remain in force until the said first day of September one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Her by the said recited Act, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to direct that the operation of the said Article numbered 10 of the New Regulations contained in the First Schedule of the said Order in Council of the fourteenth day of August one thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine shall be suspended until the first day of September one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, and that, in lieu thereof, and in substitution therefor, the said Article numbered 9 of the Regulations appended to the said Order in Council of the ninth day of January one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three shall continue and remain in force until the said first day of September one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four. *C. By Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

To all to whom these presents shall come the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England and the Right Reverend Anthony Wilson, Bishop of the Diocese of Rochester, send greeting:

WHEREAS a church has lately been built within the limits of the particular district, now new parish, of Saint Stephen, South Dulwich (some-time part of the parish of Camberwell), in the county of Surrey, and in the said diocese of Rochester, by and at the expense of certain well disposed persons, who have, with the approbation of the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, and of the said Anthony Wilson, Bishop of the said diocese of Rochester, secured to the said new church an endowment and a repair fund in accordance with the provisions of the several Acts of Parliament called "The Church Building Acts," or of some of them, and particularly of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her present Majesty, chapter ninety-seven.

Now know ye, that the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in exercise and execution of the powers or authorities for this purpose contained in the several Acts of Parliament called "The Church Building Acts" as aforesaid, or in some of them, and particularly in the Act of the first and second years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter thirty-eight, in the said Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her said Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, and in the said Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said Majesty, chapter fifty-five, and of all other powers or authorities in anywise enabling them in this behalf, do hereby, with the consent of the said Anthony Wilson, Bishop of the said diocese of Rochester (testified by his being a party to and executing these presents), assign to the said church of Saint Peter, Dulwich Common, as a particular district, all those portions of the said particular district, now new parish, of Saint Stephen, South Dulwich, of the said parish of Camberwell, and of the said particular district, now new parish, of Saint John the Evangelist, East Dulwich, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, and are delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto appended, and do direct that the same shall be called "The Particular District of Saint Peter, Dulwich Common."

And the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, with the like consent of the said Anthony Wilson, Bishop of the said diocese of Rochester (testified as aforesaid), in further exercise and execution of the powers or authorities contained in the said Acts of Parliament called "The Church Building Acts," or in some of them, and particularly in the said Act of the first and second years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter thirty-eight, in the Act of the third and fourth years of Her present Majesty, chapter sixty, in the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Her said Majesty, chapter fifty-six (such two lastly-mentioned Acts being also two of "The Church Building Acts" before named), in the said Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her said Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, and in the said Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said Majesty, chapter fifty-five, and of all other powers or authorities in anywise enabling them in this behalf, do hereby determine and declare that banns of matrimony shall be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials shall be solemnized or performed at the church of the said particular district of Saint Peter, Dulwich Common, and do hereby order and direct that all the fees, dues, offerings, or other emoluments to be received in respect of such publication of banns of matrimony, and of such solemnization or performance of marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials at the same church shall, from and after the next avoidance of

the three cures aforesaid, namely, the particular district, now new parish, of Saint Stephen, South Dulwich, the parish of Camberwell, and the particular district, now new parish, of Saint John the Evangelist, East Dulwich, as such avoidance shall respectively, occur belong to the Incumbent for the time being of the said particular district of Saint Peter, Dulwich Common: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism, or for the registration thereof.

And whereas the Churchwardens of the said Parish have made application in writing to the Local Government Board, pursuant to the above resolution:

Now therefore, We, the Local Government Board, in pursuance of the powers given to Us by the Statutes in that behalf, hereby Order as follows:—

ARTICLE I.—So much of the Act passed in the fourteenth year of the reign of Her Majesty, intituled “An Act to prevent the holding of Vestry or other Meetings in Churches, and for regulating the Appointment of Vestry Clerks,” as relates to the appointment of a Vestry Clerk, shall forthwith be applied to and be put in force within the said Parish of Heston.

ARTICLE II.—Every person for the time being appointed to the office of Vestry Clerk for the said Parish as aforesaid, shall give to the Churchwardens and Overseers of the Poor of the said Parish, a Bond, in a penal sum of not less than One Hundred Pounds, in the names of himself and two sufficient sureties, not being officers of that Union, conditioned for the due and faithful performance of the duties of the office; and shall give immediate notice to the said Guardians of the death or bankruptcy of either of such sureties, or of either of them having compounded with his creditors or liquidated his affairs by arrangement, and shall, when required by the said Guardians, produce a certificate, signed by two householders, that his sureties are alive and believed by them to be solvent, and shall supply a fresh surety in the place of any such surety who may die, or become bankrupt or who may have compounded with his creditors or liquidated his affairs as aforesaid.

Provided that the Guardians may accept as a security the guarantee of any Company or Association which shall undertake to guarantee the good conduct of such officer, and shall give their guarantee in a security, the form whereof shall have been approved by the Poor Law Board or the Local Government Board under their Seal.

ARTICLE III.—The Churchwardens and Overseers of the Poor of the said Parish shall pay to the person for the time being appointed to the office of Vestry Clerk, under the authority of this Order, a salary at the rate of Fifty Pounds per annum, or such other remuneration for the per-

formance of the duties of that office as the Local Government Board may, with the consent of such person, from time to time direct or approve.

ARTICLE IV.—Such remuneration, in the case of an annual salary, shall be considered as accruing from day to day, and be apportionable in respect of time accordingly, in pursuance of the provisions of “The Apportionment Act, 1870,” and shall be paid quarterly at the usual Feast Days in the year, namely, Lady Day, Midsummer Day, Michaelmas Day, and Christmas Day.

ARTICLE V.—A copy of this Order shall be published in the London Gazette by the Churchwardens and Overseers of the Poor of the said Parish.
