(FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE.)

AT the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 3rd day of March, 1884.

By Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :

1. The following Area (namely),—the whole of Hadfield Ward (Municipal), in the borough of Glossop, in the county of Derby, with the exception of the township of Dinting,—which was declared by Order of Council to be an Area infected with foot-and-mouth disease, is hereby declared to be free from foot-and-mouth disease, and that Area shall, as from the commencement

of this Order, cease to be an Area infected with foot-and-mouth disease.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :

1. The following Place (namely),—the whole of the Goods Station of the London and North-Western Railway, in Water-street and Liverpool-road, and the yards, premises, and pig market adjoining thereto, all being the property of the said Company, in the borough of Manchester, in the county of Lancaster,—which was declared by Order of Council dated the sixth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, to be a Place infected with foot-and-mouth disease, is hereby declared to be free from foot-and-mouth disease, and that Place shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be a Place infected with foot-and-mouth disease.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four.

1. The following Place (namely),—all those three meadows used as lairage situate in the parish of Trowse Newton, in the county of Norfolk, in the occupation of Messrs. Gowing and Savage, and bounded by the road from Norwich to Bixley on the north and north-east, by arable land in the occupation of George Gowing on the south and east, and a meadow and premises in the occupation of the said George Gowing on the west,—which was declared by Order of Council dated the thirteenth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, to be a Place infected with foot-and-mouth disease, is hereby declared to be free from foot-and-mouth disease, and that Place shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be a Place infected with foot-and-mouth disease.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four.
