(FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE.)

At the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 6th day of June, 1884.

By Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :

1. The following Area (namely),—so much of the parishes of Winnall, Easton, Chilcombe, St. Peter Cheesehill, and St. John, within the petty sessional division of Winchester, in the county of Southampton, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the west by the river Itchen from the point of the county boundary opposite Winnall Church, running in a northerly direction to the boundary of the parishes of Winnall and Easton, thence in an easterly direction across certain arable fields and the road leading from Winnall to Easton, and the road called Long Walk into the road leading from the village of Easton into the London and Winchester-road at a point eight hundred yards or thereabouts to the north of the farm buildings at Larkwhistle farm, thence in a southerly direc-

tion by the said road on the east into and across the aforesaid London and Winchester-road, thence in a southerly direction across the Valley into the Petersfield-road, thence in a westerly direction along the northern side of the said road to the line of the city boundary near Chilcombe Lodge, thence in a northerly direction across the road called East Hill near the Lime Works and following the same boundary line crossing the aforesaid London and Winchester-road, and terminating at the aforesaid point in the river Itchen opposite to Winnall Church,—which was declared by Order of Council dated the twenty-second day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, to be an Area infected with foot-and-mouth disease, is hereby declared to be free from foot-and-mouth disease, and that Area shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be an Area infected with foot-and-mouth disease.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the seventh day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four.
