May it please Your Majesty,

WE, Your Majesty's faithful and dutiful subjects, the Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, assembled this day to celebrate our sixty-third anniversary, our branches, and sister societies mentioned underneath, humbly desire to assure Your Gracious Majesty of our most loyal devotion and fervent attachment to Your Majesty's Throne and Person.

We sincerely thank Almighty God for His great goodness in extending Your Majesty's life until now, and for permitting us, and all Your subjects, in this present time of peace, to celebrate with unbounded joy and gladness, and with one mind, a jubilee of Your prosperous Reign.

We respectfully desire to congratulate Your Majesty on the happy circumstance, that in no other time of the people of Your realms, have the arts, sciences, industry, commerce, education, general knowledge, and the moral and material elevation of our countrymen, been developed and extended as during the last half-century, for which blessings, we, and all Your Majesty's subjects, are unfeignedly thankful.

WHEREAS by the "Foreign Deserters Act, 1852," it is provided that, whenever it is made to appear to Her Majesty that due facilities are or will be given for recovering and apprehending seamen who desert from British merchant ships in the territories of any foreign power, Her Majesty may by Order in Council, stating that such facilities are or will be given, declare that seamen, not being slaves, who desert from merchant ships belonging to a subject of such power, when within Her Majesty's dominions, shall be liable to be apprehended, and carried on board their respective ships, and may limit the operation of such Order, and may render the operation thereof subject to such conditions and qualifications, if any, as may be deemed expedient.

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that due facilities will be given for recovering and apprehending seamen who desert from British merchant ships in the dominions and possessions of His Majesty the King of the Hellenes.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in Her by the said "Foreign Deserters Act, 1852," and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order and declare, and it is hereby ordered and declared, that from and after the publication hereof in the London Gazette, seamen, not being slaves, and not being British subjects, who, within Her Majesty's dominions, desert from merchant ships belonging to subjects of His Majesty the King of the Hellenes, shall be liable to be apprehended and

carried on board their respective ships : Provided always, that if any such deserter has committed any crime in Her Majesty's dominions, he may be detained till he has been tried by a competent court, and until his sentence, if any, has been carried into effect.

And the Secretary of State for the Home Department, the Secretary of State for the Colonies, and the Secretary of State for India in Council, are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly. *C. L. Peel.*

WHEREAS by the three hundred and thirty-third section of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for every Pilotage Authority, by bye-laws made with the consent of Her Majesty in Council from time to time to do within its district all or any of the things specified in that behalf by the said section :

And whereas the Pilotage Board of Gloucester, being the Pilotage Authority for the Port of Gloucester within the meaning of the said recited Act, have, in exercise of the powers in them vested by that Act, and by "The Bristol Channel Pilotage Act, 1861," from time to time made and submitted for the consent of Her Majesty certain bye-laws and regulations, the latest of which were approved by Order in Council, dated the twenty-eighth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four :—

And whereas the said Pilotage Board have made and submitted for the consent of Her Majesty certain bye-laws and regulations, which are set forth in the schedule hereto, in substitution for the existing bye-laws and regulations of the Pilotage Board, with respect to pilots, pilotage, and pilotage dues within their district, and under their jurisdiction :

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that the said bye-laws and regulations are reasonable and proper :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in Her by the said Merchant Shipping Act, 1854, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council is pleased to approve of, and signify Her consent to, the said bye-laws and regulations of the said Pilotage Board, as set forth in the schedule hereto annexed and to their substitution for the existing bye-laws and regulations. *C. L. Peel.*

SCHEDULE referred to in the foregoing Order.
BYE-LAWS for the Regulation of Pilots and

Pilotage at the Port of Gloucester.

1. Subject to the provisions contained in the 24th Section of the Bristol Channel Pilotage Act, 1861, no person shall be eligible, or shall be appointed to act as a pilot, unless he shall have served a regular apprenticeship for five years to a pilot of the district, and been at least one year in the coasting or over sea trade, or shall have been engaged as master in the coasting trade in the waters of the district for not less than five years ; and no person shall be eligible if less than twenty-three years or more than forty-five years of age.

2. No person shall be licensed to act as a pilot in the district unless he shall have passed a creditable examination on the following subjects, viz. :—

He must be able—

- (1.) To read and write.
- (2.) To produce a Board of Trade Certificate as to colour blindness.
- (3.) To give the course and distance between any two places within the limits of the Channel.
- (4.) The rise, velocity, and set of the tides.
- (5.) The depth and character of the soundings.
- (6.) The best anchorages, and where to stop for a tide.
- (7.) The sand banks, rocks, shoals, and other dangers.
- (8.) The land marks, buoys, lights, their different bearings and distances.
- (9.) The appearance of the different headlands.
- (10.) The management of a vessel—to bring her to anchor—to keep her clear of her anchor in a tideway—to moor—unmoor—to get under weigh and to handle a vessel under any circumstances.

3. As well as the general power conferred upon the Commissioners to grant licenses, the Pilotage Board shall also have power to grant the following Licenses to Pilots :—

From the date of appointment and for 2½ years, a license to pilot vessels not exceeding 300 tons register.

After 2½ years and up to 5 years, a license to pilot vessels not exceeding 500 tons register.

After 5 years and up to 7 years, a license to pilot vessels not exceeding 1,000 tons register.

After 7 years, a full license.

The Board shall have full power to withhold any such license if they should be of opinion that any pilot is not fully entitled to receive the same.

4. No junior pilot shall take charge of a ship going to sea above the tonnage for which he is licensed unless a senior pilot is not present, notwithstanding that such junior pilot may have brought the ship into port, and no pilot shall take charge of any ship above the tonnage for which he is licensed unless in the absence of a senior pilot, and if by reason of such absence a junior pilot has taken charge of any such vessel he may be superseded by a senior pilot between Kingroad and Lundy, unless the master of such vessel shall desire to retain his services. But no junior pilot is on any account to take charge of vessels above 500 tons between Kingroad and Sharpness, and vice versa, if the services of a senior pilot can be obtained.

5. The pilots must keep log sheets showing how, when, and where employed, and copies of the same shall be made out by the respective pilots, and handed in once a month to the Pilot Master not later than the 12th day in the succeeding month.

6. The Board may require each pilot to provide himself with a good and efficient boat, which shall be approved and registered by the Board. The Board may permit more than one pilot, but not more than three, to sail in the same boat upon such terms as the Board may order.

There shall be one indentured apprentice to each boat.

7. Every licensed pilot employed in piloting vessels to or from the Port of Gloucester, shall be paid the pilotage rates, according to the register tonnage of the vessel, according to the schedule hereto, one-fifth shall be deducted for vessels propelled or towed wholly by steam power between Kingroad and Sharpness.

8. In lieu of the rates charged in the Schedule to the said Bye-laws and referred to in Bye-law No. 7, the following reduced rates shall be paid from Kingroad to Sharpness or Lydney for all vessels coming light to Sharpness or Lydney bona fide for coal, and for all such vessels laden with coal from Sharpness or Lydney to Kingroad.

9 and 10. All vessels piloted to Chepstow or to Lydney shall pay the same pilotage rates as to Sharpness, and vice versa.

Vessels piloted from Sharpness to Lydney, or from Lydney to Sharpness, and then to Kingroad, shall pay the same rates as between Sharpness and Kingroad.

Vessels piloted to and from any place in the River Severn above Sharpness shall pay one-fourth more than the rates between Sharpness and Kingroad.

11. Vessels piloted from Sharpness to Lydney or vice versa, and then to Kingroad shall pay the same rates as between Sharpness and Kingroad, and the proportion of such pilotage shall be one-third as between Sharpness and Lydney, and two-thirds as between Lydney and Kingroad.

12. All vessels bound to Lydney or Sharpness or to any place in the River Severn above Sharpness, requiring and having the service of a pilot, shall also employ on board, as assistants to the pilots from Kingroad, the following number of men, at the undermentioned charge:—

Of 200 tons, and under 300 tons, 1 man at 7s. 6d. for the first tide and 2s. 6d. for every other tide the vessel moves.

300 tons, and under 500 tons, 2 men at 7s. 6d. for the first tide and 2s. 6d. for every other tide the vessel moves.

500 tons, and under 700 tons, 3 men at 7s. 6d. for the first tide and 2s. 6d. for every other tide the vessel moves.

700 tons, and upwards, 4 men at 7s. 6d. for the first tide and 2s. 6d. for every other tide the vessel moves.

13. All vessels propelled or towed wholly by steam power between Kingroad and Sharpness and vice versa, and Kingroad and Lydney and vice versa, shall be entitled to a reduction of one-fifth of the pilotage charges for that portion of the district.

14. A pilot licensed by any other port in the Channel having taken charge of a vessel below the Nash, bound to Gloucester, shall not be superseded by a Gloucester pilot until she has reached Kingroad unless by desire of the Captain of such vessel.

15. Pilots taken on board of any vessel inward bound to the westward of Ilfracombe, shall be

paid the same pilotage rates as from Lundy Island; if between the Nash Point and Ilfracombe, the same rates as from the Nash Point; if between the Nash Point and the Holmes, the same rates as from the Nash Point; and if between the Holmes and Kingroad, the same rates as from the Holmes.

16. Pilots, discharged from any vessel on the outward voyage between any of the stages mentioned in the above scale of rates, shall be paid the same pilotage rates as if they had been taken to the next stage beyond the place where they were discharged.

17. Any pilot who shall remain on board of any vessel, at the request of the master, owner, or agent of the vessel after he shall have discharged the duties for which he was engaged, shall be paid ten shillings a day for every day or part of a day he may be employed; and any pilot who shall be required to move any vessel in the Dock, Harbour, or River occupying only one tide, shall be paid for any vessel under

18. Any pilot who shall be detained at the request of the master, or owner, or agent of any vessel in Kingroad, waiting for water up the River Severn; or outward bound in any roadstead on account of contrary winds, longer than twenty-four hours, shall be paid ten shillings a day for each day's detention, in addition to the pilotage rates.

19. In case any vessel shall be compelled to bear up and return from the westward from stress of weather or accident, the pilot in charge shall be entitled to, and shall be paid one-third of the pilotage charge in addition, according to the distance such vessel may have reached before she shall have put back.

20. Every master, owner, or agent of any vessel employing a pilot, shall in addition to the foregoing charges, pay a clerk or collector's fee as follows:

21. The pilots are permitted to collect their own pilotage rates, or they may be collected by a person who may be appointed for the purpose by the Board; and every pilot is required to make a monthly return to the Board of the pilotage earned by him not later than the 20th of the following month, whether in piloting vessels to or from the Port of Gloucester or elsewhere, the name and tonnage of the vessels piloted, where belonging, where from and where bound, the cargo, and the distance piloted; paying over at the same time a poundage of one shilling in the pound on the amount earned to the person appointed by the Board to receive it. The pilots shall also state in such return all cases where vessels bound to or from Gloucester have been piloted over any and what portion of the district by a pilot not licensed for the port. Pilots making a false return shall be subject to a penalty of not exceeding twenty pounds, and may, at the discretion of the Board forfeit their licenses.

22. Each pilot's boat shall be painted black or tarred on the outside, shall have the number of the pilot's license painted in white on each bow,

and the name of the pilot or pilots, as well as her own name and the name of the port to which she belongs, painted on her stern in white letters, at least one inch broad and three inches long, and shall also have the letter G marked in black paint, of not less than three feet in length on her main-sail, and shall by day carry at her masthead a flag of not less than four feet by three feet of two colours, the upper horizontal half white and the lower part red; and at night each pilot's boat shall carry a white light only at the masthead, and shall exhibit a flare-up light or flare-up lights at short intervals, which shall never exceed fifteen minutes. Every pilot shall, immediately on boarding any vessel and taking charge thereof, cause to be hoisted a similar flag to the one described in some conspicuous place, and keep the same flying during the time he so remains in charge. In case of default in any of the above requirements, the pilot to be liable under a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds for every breach thereof.

23. Whenever any qualified pilot is carried off in a boat or ship not in the pilotage service, he shall exhibit a flag of the above description, in order to show that such boat or ship has a qualified pilot on board, and if he fails to do so without any reasonable cause he shall incur a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds.

24. Any pilot who shall refuse, or neglect, or wilfully delays to proceed to sea when ordered by the Pilot Master or other person duly appointed by the Board, unless prevented by illness or unavoidable circumstances, or who shall be guilty of drunkenness when in the discharge of his duty, or of insolent and unwarrantable conduct towards the Pilot Master, or his agent, or the Board, or any master, owner, or agent of any vessel for which he may be engaged, shall be liable to a penalty of not exceeding twenty pounds or the loss of his license.

25. Any pilot who may absent himself from duty without the written consent of the Board, or the Pilot Master, shall be liable to a penalty of not exceeding twenty pounds: and no pilot shall be absent from Sharpness more than seven days at a time under a like penalty unless from unavoidable circumstances.

26. Any pilot having charge of a vessel inward bound, except to a port to which he is not licensed, shall not be released from his duties or responsibilities until such vessel is securely moored in the dock, basin, or harbour of the port; but if in charge of a vessel bound to a port to which he is not licensed, he shall be released from his duties and responsibilities when such vessel is securely anchored in the nearest roadstead to the port to which she is bound, and if outward bound, to such distance or stage for which he has been engaged. Any pilot violating this rule shall be subject to a

penalty not exceeding twenty pounds or the loss of his license.

27. Every master, owner, or agent of any vessel who shall employ within the limits of this pilotage district, any unlicensed person to act as, or perform the duty of pilot, unless proved that no licensed pilot could be obtained, or who shall retain such unlicensed pilot on board to act as a pilot, after a licensed pilot shall have offered his services, shall be subject to a penalty of not exceeding fifty pounds for every such offence.

28. If any vessel, whilst in charge of a pilot, does, or receives damages, the pilot shall immediately report the same to the Pilot Master, and the circumstances of the accident will be investigated by the Board, and the Board may, if it sees fit, require the license of the pilot to be given up to the Board.

29. The pilots shall make a survey of the River Severn between Kingroad and Sharpness, at low water, once a month at least, and shall report from time to time to the Board any changes which may have taken place in the navigable channel.

30. Every pilot shall strictly conform to the directions of the Harbour or Dock Master, touching the bringing into port or going out of port, the mooring or unmooring, placing or removing any ship or vessel which such pilot may have under his charge.

31. The licenses of the pilots shall be renewed annually, or otherwise, at the discretion of the Board, on the first week in January, and a fee of two pounds and two shillings shall be paid by each pilot to the Board upon receiving his license, and one pound one shilling upon each renewal of it; and each pilot shall pay to the Board an annual sum of two shillings and sixpence for registering his boat.

32. In cases of dispute between masters of vessels and pilots, the decision of the Board shall be final.

33. Each pilot shall be furnished with and keep in his possession, a printed copy of these bye-laws and regulations, and he shall produce the same to the master of any vessel or other person employing him when required to do so, under a penalty, in case of default, of not exceeding five pounds.

34. The Board shall have full power to enquire into the conduct of pilots towards their apprentices and vice versa, and to investigate all complaints made by pilots against their apprentices, and also by apprentices against pilots, whether they may be the masters to such apprentices or not, and also into the general conduct of apprentices and pilots; and the Board shall have full power to make such orders or to inflict fines or penalties in reference thereto. And also to direct any apprenticeship indenture to be cancelled upon such terms and conditions as shall be determined.

From this date vessels leaving those two points of the Italian coast shall undergo medical inspection at the ports of arrival, and persons suspected

of illness shall be kept in isolated observation ; and in all cases shall such vessel be forbidden to disembark linen or woollen goods, either of personal or household use, which are not perfectly clean, in conformity with Ordinance No. 5 of 20th June, 1887.

Ordinance of Maritime Health, No. 9.

The Minister of the Interior decrees :—

ART. I. All ships leaving the Port of Catania after this date must first undergo a medical inspection, in order to detain all passengers, or members of the crew suspected of illness, and to prevent the exportation of dirty woollen or linen goods of personal or household use susceptible of containing the germs of disease.

ART. II. Steamers embarking passengers in the ports and harbours of the east coast of Sicily, between Messina and Syracuse, and the west coast of Calabria, between Pizzo and Cotrone, inclusively, must undergo medical inspection in every port at which they touch. Persons ill, or suspected of illness, must be landed with their baggage, in order to be treated in an isolated place and their goods disinfected.

ART. III. Ships having had cases of cholera on board shall be disinfected according to the terms of Ordinance No. 7, of June 21, 1887.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WE, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in pursuance of the Acts relating to Her Majesty's Post Office, and in exercise of all powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant, made on the representation of Her Majesty's Postmaster-General (testified by his signing the same), and under the hands of two of us, the said Commissioners, order, direct, and declare as follows :—

Definitions.

1. In this Warrant :—

- (1.) The expression "Parcel" means a Postal Packet which is posted as a Parcel in accordance with the provisions of this Warrant, or any Warrant amending the same.
- (2.) The expression "United Kingdom" includes the Channel Islands and the Isle of Man.

Places between which Parcels may be Transmitted.

2. From and after the date when this Warrant comes into operation, Parcels may, subject to the provisions of this Warrant, be transmitted by post between the United Kingdom and Sarawak.

Rates of Postage.

3. On all Parcels posted in the United Kingdom addressed to Sarawak, and transmitted by post under this Warrant, there shall be charged and paid the following rates of postage, that is to say :—

On every Parcel not exceeding one pound in weight one shilling.

On every Parcel exceeding one pound and not exceeding eleven pounds in weight, for the first pound one shilling, and for every additional pound or fraction of a pound in weight one shilling.

Maximum Dimensions and Weight.

4. No Parcel, the dimensions of which shall exceed in length three feet six inches or in length and girth measured together six feet (such girth being measured round the thickest part of such Parcel) or which shall exceed in weight eleven pounds, shall be conveyed or tendered for conveyance by post under this Warrant.

Prepayment.

5. The postage chargeable under this Warrant on Parcels posted in the United Kingdom, shall in all cases (except as otherwise provided in this Warrant), be prepaid at the time of posting, and such prepayment shall be effected by means of adhesive postage stamps.

Times of Posting.

6. Parcels intended to be transmitted by post, may, in the United Kingdom, be posted on any day of the week except Sunday, but shall not be posted on Sundays, or in England or Ireland on Christmas Day or Good Friday, and in Scotland on either of the two Sacramental Fast Days, except in the cases next hereinafter mentioned, that is to say :—

Where the delivery of Parcels on Sundays, or any of the other days aforesaid, at certain Post Offices, to addressees calling for the same, may hereafter be specially authorized by the Postmaster-General, the posting of Parcels on Sundays, or such other days as aforesaid, at such offices respectively, shall also be permitted within such times and in such manner as may be directed by the Postmaster-General.

Mode of Posting.

7. Except as otherwise provided in this Warrant, all Parcels shall, in the United Kingdom, be posted by being handed in at a Post Office in the manner hereinafter provided, within the hours during which such office shall be open to the public for the posting of Parcels.

Posting at Post Offices.

8. The following provisions shall apply to the posting of Parcels at any Post Office in the United Kingdom, that is to say :—

- (1.) It shall be the duty of the person bringing a Parcel to hand it to an officer on duty at the counter in such office.
- (2.) Such Parcel must be accompanied by or have affixed to it a declaration of such kind, and stating the contents of the Parcel in such manner and form, and with such other particulars as the Commissioners of Customs and the Postmaster-General may prescribe.
- (3.) Such Parcel shall be measured and weighed by such officer, and (if such Parcel do not exceed the limits of measurement or weight hereinbefore mentioned) the postage thereof according to the rates hereinbefore mentioned, shall be prepaid as hereinbefore provided, and shall be verified by such officer, and no such Parcel shall be forwarded by the Post without being accompanied by or having affixed thereto such declaration as aforesaid, and until such Parcel has been so measured and weighed and the postage chargeable thereon shall have been properly paid; and if any such Parcel shall be left at a Post Office without being accompanied by or having affixed thereto such declaration, and without being so measured and weighed and the postage chargeable thereon properly paid as aforesaid, such Parcel shall be detained and may be returned or given up to the sender thereof, or otherwise dealt with or disposed of in any manner authorized by this Warrant.

Collection of Parcels.

9. The Postmaster-General may, if he think fit, from time to time authorize such officers as he may direct to receive Parcels for the Post under such regulations and conditions as he may from time to time prescribe.

Irregular Posting of Parcels.

10. Any Packet transmissible by Parcel Post from the United Kingdom which, from any words or marks thereon, or other external evidence appears to have been intended for transmission as a Parcel, but which has not been tendered for transmission as a Parcel, but has been posted in a Post Office Letter Box, or otherwise than according to the manner hereinbefore prescribed for the posting of Parcels, may, in the discretion of the Postmaster-General, either be detained and returned or given up to the sender, or be dealt with as follows, that is to say :—

- (1.) If the said Packet is fully prepaid with the Letter or Book Packet rate of postage, and otherwise conforms to the Regulations as to the Letter or Book Post, the same may

be forwarded as a Letter or Book Packet (as the case may be).

- (2.) If the said Packet is not fully prepaid with the Letter or Book Packet rate of postage the same may be forwarded to its destination as a Parcel charged with the sum of one penny in addition to all other postage payable upon such Packet as a Parcel. Provided that the postage prepaid upon any such Packet shall be allowed in part payment of any postage or other sum charged under this clause.

Return and Disposal of Undelivered Parcels.

11. With regard to—

- (a.) Parcels which are addressed to a Post Office in the United Kingdom to be called for, or to a place in the United Kingdom beyond the limits of the free postal delivery of any town or district, or to a ship at any port in the United Kingdom, and which are not called for or delivered within such reasonable times as the Postmaster-General may from time to time prescribe; and
- (b.) Parcels which cannot be delivered in the United Kingdom for want of a true direction, or by reason that the addressee is dead, or cannot be found, or has refused the same, or has refused to pay any charges thereon, or for any other sufficient reason:

The following provisions shall apply, that is to say:—

- (1.) The Parcel shall, as the Postmaster-General may from time to time direct, be retained at or forthwith forwarded to such place as the Postmaster-General may from time to time appoint, and may, if necessary, be there opened and examined.
- (2.) Where the name and address of the sender can be ascertained from the Parcel or the Declaration accompanying the same, notice shall be given by Post to the sender through the Post Office of Sarawak that the Parcel will, in default of any claim on the part of the addressee, be given up to the sender or his agent upon personal application at such place as aforesaid, or, at the request of the sender, will be forwarded to a corrected address or returned to him by post in either case upon the conditions hereinafter mentioned.
- (3.) Where the name and address of the sender cannot be ascertained from the Parcel notice shall be publicly given (by affixing the same at such place or places or in such other manner as the Postmaster-General may direct) and notice shall also be given to the Post Office of Sarawak that the Parcel will, in default of any claim on the part of the addressee and upon payment of such charges as are hereinafter mentioned, be given up upon the personal application of the sender or his agent, or be returned to the sender by Post.
- (4.) In any case the notice shall state that in default of the receipt by the Postmaster-General of an application for the Parcel, during a period to be specified in such notice, from some person who, in the Postmaster-General's judgment, is entitled to receive the Parcel, it will be disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may direct.
- (5.) The Postmaster-General may, in his discretion, specify in any such notice, or otherwise, the periods during which Parcels may be returned to the senders thereof, and in so

doing may have regard to the nature and contents of Parcels.

- (6.) Where in the case of a Parcel which cannot be delivered for want of a true direction, the sender corrects the address of the Parcel, the Parcel shall be forwarded to the corrected address, subject to the following conditions:—

- (a.) Where the corrected address of the Parcel is within the same free delivery as the original address, and the Parcel is not, at the time of such correction, lying at a Returned Letter Office, no new charge shall be made with respect to the delivery of the Parcel.
- (b.) Where the corrected address of the Parcel is not within the same free delivery as the original address, or the Parcel at the time of such correction is lying at a Returned Letter Office, there shall be paid a new and distinct rate of postage equal in amount to the rate of postage which would have been chargeable on such Parcel as an Inland Parcel.
- (7.) A Parcel shall not be given up or returned by post to the sender except upon payment by him of any charge for redirection or other charge to which the Parcel has become liable under the provisions of this Warrant, or of any such Regulations as are referred to in section 14 of "The Post Office (Parcels) Act, 1882."
- (8.) Where the sender requests a Parcel to be returned to him by post, such Parcel shall not be returned to the sender except upon payment by him of a new and distinct rate of postage, according to the rates fixed by this Warrant, and in such case the said rate of postage and all other charges to which the Parcel has become liable if not prepaid by the sender shall be collected on the delivery of the Parcel to him.
- (9.) The Postmaster-General may require proof to his satisfaction that an applicant for a Parcel is entitled to receive the same.
- (10.) Where no application is made for a Parcel within the period specified in any such notice as aforesaid, or an applicant fails to prove to the satisfaction of the Postmaster-General that he is entitled to receive the Parcel, or refuses or fails to pay the charges to which the Parcel has become liable under this Warrant, the Parcel may be dealt with or disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may in his discretion direct or authorize.
- (11.) If at any time while a Parcel remains in the possession of the Postmaster-General, it becomes offensive or injurious to any Officer of the Post Office or other person, or to other Parcels, it may forthwith be dealt with or disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may in his discretion direct or authorize, notwithstanding that the provisions of this Warrant as to the return of such Parcel have not been or have only partially been complied with.

Re-direction of Parcels.

12. Any Parcel may be re-directed from its original address, or any substituted address, within the United Kingdom, to any country or place with which a Parcel Post to or from the United Kingdom or Sarawak is established, and in every case of such re-direction there shall be charged on such Parcel in respect of such re-direction a new and distinct rate of postage according to the

rates for the time being payable in respect of the transmission of a like Parcel from the United Kingdom to the country or place to which it may be re-directed, and such postage, if not paid at the time of such re-direction, shall be collected on the delivery of the Parcel to the addressee.

13. Any Parcel may be re-directed from its original address, or any substituted address, within the United Kingdom to any other address within the United Kingdom, and in every case of such re-direction there shall be charged on such Parcel in respect of each such re-direction, and (if not previously paid) paid by the addressee thereof in money upon the delivery of such Parcel, a new and distinct rate of postage, equal in amount to the rate of postage which would have been originally chargeable on such Parcel as an Inland Parcel.

Remission of Re-direction Rates.

14. The Postmaster-General may wholly remit the rate of postage for re-direction on any Parcel addressed to the United Kingdom, which may, on the request of the addressee thereof, be re-directed by an Officer of the Post Office, and again forwarded by post to the same person at any address within the limits of the same free postal delivery as the address from which such Parcel was so re-directed.

Prohibitions.

15. There shall not be posted or conveyed or delivered by post any Parcel—

- (1.) Consisting of or containing any indecent or obscene print, painting, photograph, lithograph, engraving, book or card, or any indecent or obscene article whether similar to the above or not ; or
- (2.) Having thereon or on the cover thereof any words, marks, or designs of an indecent, obscene, or grossly offensive character.
- (3.) Consisting of or containing—
 - (a.) Any explosive substance.
 - (b.) Any dangerous substance.
 - (c.) Any filth.
 - (d.) Any noxious or deleterious substance.
 - (e.) Any sharp instrument not properly protected.
 - (f.) Except with the special permission of the Postmaster-General, any living creature.
 - (g.) Any article or thing whatsoever which is likely to injure other Parcels in course of conveyance, or any receptacle in which the same are conveyed, or an officer of the Post Office or other person who may deal with such Parcel.

Any such Parcel, if posted or tendered for conveyance by post may be detained, and either returned or given up to the sender thereof or dealt with or disposed of in such other manner as may be authorized by the Postmaster-General.

16. (1.) There shall not be posted or conveyed or delivered by post any Parcel consisting of or containing two or more Parcels or other Postal Packets (of the same or of different descriptions) addressed to different persons at different addresses.

(2.) If any such Parcel be posted or tendered for conveyance by post the contents thereof so far as the same consist of Parcels may be forwarded to the addressees of such Parcels charged with new and distinct rates of postage according to the rates fixed by this Warrant and so far as the same consist of other Postal Packets may be treated and charged as unpaid Postal Packets or

such Parcel may be otherwise dealt with or disposed of as the Postmaster-General may authorize.

Non-compliance with Regulations.

17. In any case not in this Warrant expressly provided for, where any Parcel shall be posted or tendered for conveyance by post which in any respect infringes or fails to comply with the Regulations in this Warrant contained, or any of them, such Parcel may, at the option of the Postmaster-General, either be dealt with as in this Warrant provided, with reference to Parcels which cannot be delivered, or be dealt with or disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may in his discretion direct or authorize.

Provision for Safety of Parcels.

18. In any case where any officer of the Post Office may find it necessary or expedient for the safety or protection of Parcels that any Parcel should be forwarded or delivered by some later despatch or delivery than that for which the same was posted or despatched, or intended to be posted or despatched respectively, he may delay the despatch or delivery of such Parcel, or make such other and special arrangements as to the despatch or delivery thereof, not, however, involving a greater delay than 24 hours in the whole, as may be deemed by such officer necessary or expedient in the circumstances of the case.

Parcels not to interfere with Letter Post.

19. Where the despatch or delivery from a Post Office in the United Kingdom of letters would be delayed by the despatch or delivery therefrom at the same time of Parcels, such Parcels, or any of them, may be detained in the Post Office until the despatch or delivery next following that by which they would ordinarily be despatched or delivered.

Postmaster-General not liable for Loss or Damage.

20. Nothing contained in or done under or in pursuance of this Warrant shall render the Postmaster-General liable, either personally or in his official capacity, to any action or other legal proceeding in respect or in consequence of any loss or damage of any Parcel, whether such loss or damage be occasioned by or arise from any act or neglect of any officer of the Post Office or any other person.

Customs Regulations.

21. Parcels intended to be transmitted by post under the provisions of this Warrant shall not be posted, forwarded, conveyed, or delivered, except subject to such Regulations as are referred to in section 14 of "The Post Office (Parcels) Act, 1882."

Remission of Postage.

22. The Postmaster-General may, in any case in which he may consider it just or reasonable so to do, remit any postage or any sum made payable under this Warrant.

Commencement of Warrant.

23. This Warrant shall come into operation on the twenty-third day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven.
