In order to carry out the existing regulations, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Lady who necessary that an intimation from the Lady who resentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command, that no presentations shall be made at the Drawing Rooms, except in accordance with the above regulations.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, before twelve o'clock, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulations that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, of his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. Lord Chamberlain.

Her Majesty's Most Gracious Speech, delivered by the Lords Commissioners to both Houses of Parliament, on Thursday, February 9, 1888.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

CONTINUE to receive from all other Powers cordial assurances of their friendly sentiments, as well as of their earnest desire to main-

tain the peace of the world.

My officers, in conjunction with those of the Emperor of Russia, have completed the demarcation of the Afghan boundary in conformity with the terms of the Convention of last year. trust that the work which has thus been brought to a conclusion may tend to remove the possibility of misunderstanding between the two Powers in regard to their Asiatic possessions.

Animated by a desire to prevent the effusion of blood, I despatched a Mission to the King of Abyssinia, with the hope of dissuading him from engaging in a war with Italy. I deeply regret

that my efforts have not been successful.

The deliberations of the Conference assembled at Washington to adjust questions which have asisen between the Dominion of Canada and the United States are still in progress.

The negotiations which were commenced in 1885, with respect to the regulation of the Suez Canal, have been brought to a conclusion so far as points of difference between myself and the French Republic are concerned.

I have also entered into an agreement with the French Republic for the protection of life and property in the group of the New Hebrides by a

Joint Naval Commission.

A Conference of Delegates from the Powers interested in the sugar industry was summoned in London in the autumn to consider the possibility of putting an end to the injurious system of bounties; and they have made considerable progress towards the conclusion of a satisfactory arrangement.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

The Estimates for the Services of this year, which will be laid before you, have been framed with due regard to economy. You will be asked to make provision for the improvements in the defence of the ports and coaling stations of my Empire which have been rendered urgently necessary by the advance of military science. will also be asked to sanction an arrangement for providing a special squadron for the protection of Australasian commerce, the cost of which will be partially borne by the Colonies themselves.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

The measures which, at the cost of great labour, you passed during the last session for the benefit of Ireland have been carefully carried into effect during the period which has since elapsed.

The result of this legislation, so far as it has been tested by a short experience, has been Agrarian crime has diminished; and the power of coercive conspiracies has sensibly abated. Measures tending to develop the

in the number of the proprietors of the soil, will be laid before you.

Your attention will be invited to the subject of Local Government in England, and measures will be submitted to you for dealing with it, in combination with proposals for adjusting the relations between Local and Imperial finance, and for mitigating the burdens at present imposed upon

the ratepayers.

The prospects of commerce are more hopeful than any to which I have been able to point for many years past. I deeply regret that no corresponding improvement is observable in the condition of agriculture. I commend the interests of that great industry to your attentive care, in the hope that means may be discovered for enabling it to meet more effectively the difficulties under which it labours.

You will be invited to consider legislative proposals for cheapening the Transfer of Land; for modifying the procedure by which Tithe Rentcharge is collected; for the promotion of Technical Education; for preventing undue preferences in the Rates charged by Railway Companies on foreign and domestic produce; for remedying abuses in the formation of Companies under limited liability: and for amending the Law as to the Liability of Employers in case of accidents.

Measures for improving the position of the Scottish Universities, and for regulating the Borough Police in Scotland, will be laid before you; and proposals will be submitted to you for diminishing the cost of Private Bill Legislation.

In these and all other efforts that you may make to promote the well-being of my people, I pray that you may be guided by the hand of Almighty God.

THEREAS by an Act passed in the tenth year of the reign of Her Majesty, intituled "An Act for the more easy recovery of small debts and demands in England," it is, among other things, enacted that it should be lawful for Her Majesty, with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that the said Act be put in force in such county or counties as to Her Majesty, with the advice aforesaid, should seem fit, and to divide the whole or part of any such county (including all counties of cities, and counties of towns, cities, boroughs, towns, ports, and places, liberties, and franchises therein contained or thereunto adjoining) into districts; and to order that the County Court should be holden for the recovery of debts and demands, under the said Act, in each of such districts; and, from time to time, to alter such districts, as to Her Majesty, with the advice aforesaid, should seem fit; and, from time to time, with the advice aforesaid, to declare by what name, and in what towns and places, the County Court should be holden in each district:

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by an Order in Council, of the ninth day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fortyseven, to order that the said Act be put in force in the counties and places therein specified, and the same was put in force accordingly:

And whereas by certain other Acts made and passed in the thirteenth, in the fourteenth, in the sixteenth, in the twentieth, in the twenty-second, resources of Ireland, and to facilitate an increase in the twenty-ninth, in the thirty-first, in the thirty-ninth, in the forty-sixth, and in the fortyninth years of the reign of Her Majesty, the provisions of the said recited Act have been amended and extended:

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased by an Order in Council of the fifteenth day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight, to order that the County Court of Essex, holden at Rochford, should be holden at Southend as well as at Rochford:

And whereas it hath been found that it is inexpedient that the said County Court should continue to be held at Rochford as well as at Southend:

Her Majesty, having taken the premises into consideration, is thereupon pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the thirty-first day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, the County Court of Essex, holden at Rochford and Southend, shall cease to be holden at Rochford, and shall be holden at Southend, under the name of the County Court of Essex, holden at Southend.

And whereas the Hardepool Pilotage Commissioners, being the Pilotage Authority for the Port of Hartlepool within the meaning of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," in exercise of the powers vested in them by that Act, made and submitted for the consent of Her Majesty certain Bye-laws and Regulations with respect to Pilots, Pilotage, and Pilotage dues in the Hartlepool district, which were approved by an Order in Council, dated twenty-seventh day of June, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six:

And whereas it has been deemed expedient by the said Commissioners to repeal one of the said Bye-laws, and to make a new Bye-law in lieu thereof as set forth in the Schedule hereunto

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that the said new Bye-law is reasonable and proper:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in Her by the said Merchant Shipping Act, 1854, is pleased to approve of and signify Her consent to the said new Bye-law.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Luke situate at Dunham-on-the-Hill as aforesaid.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend William Bishop of the said diocese of Chester (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent that it would in our opinion be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Thornton-le-Moors which is comprised within and is co-extensive with the limits of the two townships of Dunham-on-the-Hill and of Hapsford all which part, together with the boundaries thereof is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Luke situate at Dunham-on-the-Hill as aforesaid and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Luke Dunhamon-the-Hill.' And with the like consent of the said William Bishop of the said diocese of Chester (testified as aforesaid) we the said Ecclesias:ical Commissioners further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimouy should be published, and that marriages baptisms churchings and burials should be sclemnized or performed at the said church of Saint Luke situate at Dunham-on-the-Hill as aforesaid and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of I such banus and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being. Provided always that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We therefore humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty in

Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Chester.

W HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of Her Majesty, chapter eighty-two; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the first day of December in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, in the words and figures following; that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Your Majesty chapter seventy, of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Your Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter fifty-five, and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of Your Majesty, chapter eighty-two, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Benedict situate at Everton within the limits of the parish of Walton-on-the-Hill in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese

of Liverpool.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of Walton-on-the-Hill and of the district chapelry of Saint Saviour Everton, in the said county and diocese which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such parish and of such district chapelry respectively.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that certain contiguous portions (comprising the population aforesaid) of the said parish of Walton-on-the-Hill and of the said district chapelry of Saint Saviour Everton should be formed into a

consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Benedict situate at Everton as aforesaid.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend John Charles, Bishop of the said diocese of Liverpool as such Bishop, and with the consent of Eleanor Lucy de Falbe of Luton Hoo Park in the county of Bedford, wife of his Excellency Christian Frederick de Falbe His Danish Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary and with the consents of the Reverend James Gerard Leigh, Clerk in Holy Orders, rector of the rectory of the said parish of Walton-on-the-Hill, and of John Frederick Leigh of Walton-on-the-Hill, Gentleman (the said Eleanor Lucy de Falbe being the patron of the said rectory of the parish of Walton-on-the-Hill aforesaid, and the said James Gerard Leigh and the said John Frederick Leigh being joint patrons of the vicarage of the same parish) and with the consents of the said John Charles, Bishop of the said diocese of Liverpool, and of Alexander Hargreaves Brown of Druid's Cross, Wavertree, in the said county of Lancaster Esquire, a Member of the Commons House of Parliament and of Francis Alexander Hamilton of Brent Lodge Finchley in the county of Middlesex Esquire and of Clarke Aspirall of Laurel Bank, the Grove, Lower Bebington in the county of Chester, Justice of the Peace, and of the Reverend George Winter Warr, Clerk in Holy Orders, the vicar of the vicarage of the parish of Childwall in the county of Lancaster aforesaid, the patrons of the perpetual curacy of the said district chapelry of Saint Saviour, Everton (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly represent, that it would in our opinion be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Walton-on-the-Hill and of the said district chapelry of Saint Saviour Everton which are described in the schedule hereunder written all which portions together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Benedict situate at Everton as aforesaid and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Benedict Everton.'

"We therefore humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing

Representation has reference.
"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Benedict,

Everton, comprising:-

1. "All that portion of the parish of Walton-on-the-Hill in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Liverpool wherein the present incumbent of such parish still possesses the cure of souls, which is isolated for all ecclesiastical purposes, and which is bounded on the east by the hereinafter-described portion of the district chapelry of Saint Saviour, Everton, upon the south-east and upon the south by the new parish of Saint Augustine, Everton, upon the west partly by the district chapelry of Saint Ambrose Everton and partly by the particular district of Saint Peter Everton and upon the north by the district chapelry of Saint George Everton, all the said abutting cures being within the original limits of the parish of Walton-on-the-Hill aforesaid.

"2. "We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty chapter thirtyseven, sections six and eight have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for authorizing the sale and disposal of certain property situate in the parishes of Stretton-on-Fosse and Tredington in the counties of Warwick and Worcester and now vested

in us.

"Whereas under and by virtue of a certain indenture bearing date the thirtieth day of March in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three and made or expressed to be made between Nathaniel Hartland of the Oaklands, near Cheltenham in the county of Gloucester, Esquire, of the first part, William Baldwyn of Ashton-under-Hill in the said county of Gloucester, Gentleman, of the second part, John Gibbs of Glascote near Tamworth in the county of Stafford, Coal and Iron Merchant, of the third part and us the Ecclesiastical Commissioners of the fourth part, the lands and hereditaments described in the schedule hereto annexed situate in the aforesaid parishes of Stretton-on-Fosse and Tredington became with their appurtenances and are now vested in us.

"And whereas the said lands and hereditaments are not subject to any outstanding beneficial lease or grant but are now in our possession but some portions thereof on account of their character or situation are unsuitable or inconvenient to be held or applied for the purposes for which estates vested in us are applicable under the Acts by which our procedings are governed.

aforesaid with their appurtenances and all our estate right title and interest therein or in any part or parts thereof unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same and his or their heirs executors administrators or assigns or otherwise as he or they shall direct or appoint and for such consideration as shall upon due calculation and inquiry appear to us to be just and reasonable it being our intention to invest the proceeds of such sale from time to time as occasion may arise in the purchase of other lands tithes rent-charges tenements or heredita-

ments or of some estate or interest therein convenient to be held by us for the purposes of the Acts by which our proceedings are governed as aforesaid and in the meantime to invest the said proceeds in some Government or Parliamentary stock or other publice securities in England.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any other Act of Parliament.

VHE following Statute, passed on the twentyseventh day of January, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, by the Governing Body of Lincoln College, Oxford, has been submitted for the approval of Her Majesty in Council, and notice of its having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions contained in the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877 :-

Lincoln College.

AT a General Meeting of the Governing Body of the College, specially summoned for the purpose on Friday, the 27th day of January, 1888, the subjoined Amendments to the College Statutes were voted upon and passed by a majority of two-thirds of those present and voting.

A. Amendment to cap. $2 \S 5$.

"Subject to the conditions hereinafter stated, " the Rector and Fellows may from time to time, " either with or without Examination, elect to a "Fellowship, tenable for a period not exceeding " seven years from the date of his admission as a "Probationer, any person who undertakes to perform a definite literary or scientific work to "be approved by the College at the time of " election.

"The conditions under which an election may be made under this clause are as follows;—

"No election shall be made unless the Candidate shall have obtained two-thirds at least of
the votes given at the election.

"No person who holds a Fellowship with complements in any other College shall be eligible.

"There shall not be at any one time more than one Fellow hölding a Fellowship under this clause.

"If at a Special Meeting held in full Term, of which at least 80 days' notice shall have been given, a resolution shall be passed that, in the judgment of the Rector and Fellows, a Fellow elected under this clause has ceased to perform the work he has undertaken, such Fellowship shall thereupon cease and determine.

"A Fellow elected under this clause shall not "at any time be a Tutor or Officer of the College,

" nor shall he be capable of re-election.

B. Amendment to cap. 2 § 10.

"Any Fellow may make application to the Rector and Fellows for leave to retain his "Fellowship after marriage. Such application shall be made before marriage, and leave shall not be granted except in accordance with the following conditions:—

"1. Such leave shall be granted only by a majority of at least two-thirds of the votes given—such votes being taken by secret ballot, at a Special Meeting held in full Term, of of which at least 30 days notice shall have been

"given.

"2. No such leave shall be granted unless at
the time there shall be at least two unmarried
Fellows, besides the applicant, holding the
office of Tutor, Lecturer, or Bursar, resident in

" the College.

"Any Fellow to whom such leave shall be granted shall retain his Fellowship, the provisions of cap. 2 § 10 nothwithstanding, for a period not exceeding seven years from the day on which such leave is granted, provided he shall remain so long in the service of the College as Lecturer: but he shall not be demed eligible for the office of Tutor, or Sub-Rector, or Bursar. At the end of that period he shall not be incapable of retaining his Fellowship for a further period not exceeding seven years, and so on from time to time, subject to the granting of leave by the Rector and Fellows under the same conditions."

AMENDMENTS to the Statutes of Exeter College, Oxford, passed by a majority of two-thirds of the Governing Body of the College, at a Meeting

specially summoned for the purpose.

That in Statute III § 7 for the words, "Whenever the Chaplain Fellowship becomes vacant, the College shall proceed to the election of a fit and proper person to be Probationary Chaplain Fellow. Such election may be with, or without examination, as the College shall think fit" shall be substituted the words

"The election to the Chaplain Fellowship may be with or without examination as the College shall think fit. If at the time when a vacancy in the Chaplain Fellowship occurs there shall be two members of the Governing Body of the College resident in Oxford in Holy Orders of the Church of England, it shall be lawful for the College if it shall think fit to suspend the election to the Chaplain Fellowship. But if at the time when the vacancy occurs, or at any time during the suspension of the election, there shall be fewer than two members of the Governing Body of the College resident in Oxford in Holy Orders of the Church of England then the College shall proceed to the election of a fit and proper person to be Probationary Chaplain Fellow."

And that in the same Statute and Section after the words "on the ordinary day of election" shall

be inserted the Clause :-

"During any temporary vacancy of the Chaplain Fellowship the College shall make due provision for the performance of the services in the College Chapel."

And that in Statute V in the part entitled "The Exhibitioners" § 1 in the clause referring to the Symes and Michell Exhibitions the words "who shall be of not less than two Terms standing in

the University on the day of election" be struck

out.

The College Seal was ordered to be affixed to the above Amendments at a Meeting of the Rector and Fellows being the Governing Body of the College specially summoned for the purpose on the thirtieth day of January 1888.

STATUTES for Magdalen College, made by the College under the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877.

Preliminary.

These Statutes are supplementary to the existing Statutes, dated the 16th day of June, 1881, made for the College by the University of Oxford Commissioners, and hereinaster referred to as the existing Statutes.

Election of President.

1. When a vacancy occurs in the office of President, the Vice-President if in residence, or if he be not in residence then the senior Fellow in residence, shall within seven days of the vacancy becoming known to him and by notice to all Fellows given or sent as mentioned in the existing Statute as to Meetings and their powers, convene an Extraordinary General Meeting of the Fellows, to be held not less than seven nor more than fourteen days from the date of such notice, for the purpose of appointing a day and hour for a General Meeting of the Fellows for the election of a President, which day shall not be less than one calendar month nor more than two calendar months from the day for which the first-mentioned Meeting shall be convened, unless

the vacancy shall take place between the 30th day of June and the 1st day of September, in which case the said Meeting for election may be on any day not earlier than the 1st nor later than the 14th day of October.

- 2. The Vice-President if in residence, or if he be not in residence then the senior Fellow in residence, shall within one week next after the day for which the said first-mentioned Meeting shall be convened and by notice to all Fellows given or sent as mentioned in the said existing Statute as to Meetings and their powers and also by notice affixed to the doors of the College Chapel, convene a General Meeting of the Fellows accordingly for the election of a President to be held on the day and at the hour so appointed.
- 3. On the day and at the hour appointed a General Meeting of the Fellows for the election of a President shall be held accordingly in the College Chapel, unless some other place shall have been appointed for that purpose by the resolution fixing the day for the Meeting, in which case the Meeting shall be held at the place so appointed. The Vice-President if present at the commencement of the Meeting, or if not then the senior Fellow present at the commencement thereof, shall preside thereat, and the two seniors of the Fellows present, other than the Vice-President or the Fellow presiding, shall act as scrutators and receive the votes, and on any voting the Fellows present and voting other than the scrutators shall give their votes in writing to the scrutators, who shall record in writing their own votes last. Each written vote shall bear the voter's name, and on the conclusion of any voting the scrutators shall report the result thereof to the Vice-President or other Fellow as the case may be presiding at the Meeting, and the person, if any, who on any voting shall have an absolute majority of the votes given at that voting shall be declared elected.
- 4. If on the first voting no person has an absolute majority, then the names of the persons voted for and the number of votes given for each person shall be declared; and there shall be a second voting, and persons may be voted for thereat who may not have been voted for at the
- 5. If on the second voting no person has an absolute majority, then the names of all the persons voted for and the number of votes given for each person at each voting shall be declared, and there shall be a third voting, but no person shall be voted for at the third or any subsequent voting who shall not have been voted for at the first or second voting, and if any such vote shall be given it shall not be counted.
- 6. If on the third or any subsequent voting no person has an absolute majority of votes, then the person, if any, who has the least number of votes shall be withdrawn from the election, or if two or more persons have the same least number of votes, or if all the persons voted for have the same number of votes, then, and in either of such cases, the person for whom the junior of all the Fellows voting for such persons shall have voted shall be withdrawn, and there shall be another voting between the persons not withdrawn, and save as mentioned in the next clause this process shall be repeated until an absolute majority is
- 7. If on the third or any subsequent voting two persons only be voted for and have the same number of votes, then the person for whom the junior of all the Fellows voting for such two persons shall have voted shall be withdrawn, and

the other person voted for shall be declared elected.

- 8. The Meeting for the election of a President shall after the declaration of the result of each voting stand adjourned for a period not greater than one hour or less than half an hour, and further may by resolution of a majority thereat be adjourned from time to time within the period, whether original or extended as hereinaftermentioned for the election of a President.
- 9. The Visitor shall have power from time to time on the request in writing of any three or more Fellows, and either before or after the expiration of the period hereinbefore limited for convening the hereinbefore-mentioned Extraordinary General Meeting, or the period for convening the Meeting for the election of a President, to extend the period for convening each or either of the same Meetings, and shall also have power upon the request in writing of the Vice-President, whether he shall or shall not have presided at the said Meeting for the election, or of the other Fellow, if any, presiding at the said Meeting, or of any three or more Fellows, to decide conclusively any questions that may arise upon or with respect to any such election.

10. The clauses numbered 2 and 3 of the existing Statute as to the President are hereby

repealed.

Fellows.

1. On the election of any person to an Official Fellowship, his period of probation may be dispensed with by a resolution then passed by all or a majority of two-thirds at least of the electors present and voting.

2. Any Fellow who shall before, or within one calendar month next after, the determination of his Fellowship be again elected to a Fellowship, shall retain in respect thereof the same rank and seniority in the College that he had in respect of

the first-mentioned Fellowship.

3. The clause numbered 14 of the existing Statute as to Fellows, so far only as is necessary for the purposes of the last preceding clause is hereby repealed.

4. During the discussion at any College Meeting of any resolution for the election or re-election of any Fellow to any Fellowship, such Fellow shall not be present nor shall he vote on such

resolution.

5. It shall be lawful for the President and Fellows at any Stated General Meeting upon twenty-eight days' notice by the President to all Fellows given or sent as mentioned in the existing Statute as to Meetings and their powers, and by a majority of not less than three-fourths of the votes of those present and voting, to elect or re-elect and admit to a Fellowship without emolument any person who is or shall have been an actual Fellow of the College, and whose services as a Fellow would in their opinion be of advantage to the College as a place of religion, learning, and education, and that without public notice and without examination and without any period of probation, and although the person elected be married, and although he be in possession of any benefice, property, pension, or office, which would in ordinary cases render the possessor ineligible, and any Fellowship under this clause shall be held for the same term and subject to the same power of deprivation, and generally in the same manner as an Ordinary Fellowship under the existing Statute as to Fellows, save that the holder thereof shall not be subject to vacate the same by reason of his becoming entitled to any benefice, property, pension, or office which would cause him to vacate the same if it were an Ordinary

Fellowship under the said existing Statute. The number of Fellows elected under this clause shall not at any time exceed one-eighth of the total number of Fellows otherwise elected existing at the time of any such election, and they shall not be counted in estimating the maximum number of forty Fellows allowed by the said existing Statute, and the time of filling up any vacancies in Fellowships under this clause shall be wholly at the discretion of the President and Fellows.

6. A person elected under the last preceding clause to a Fellowship without emolument shall not, save as provided by the said existing Statute as to Fellows, be entitled to rooms in College, nor shall he be entitled to any allowance in respect of his dining at the common College Dinner.

Pensions.

In clause 1, sub-clause (c), of the existing Statute as to Pensions, the words General Meeting shall mean and be read Extraordinary General Meeting.

Demyships.

1. Every Junior Demy hereafter to be elected shall hold his Demyship for two years from a day to be fixed by the Board of Electors to such Demyship, which day shall not be after he shall have attained the age of nineteen years and six calendar months, and his Demyship shall determine at the expiration of such period of two years, unless the Tutorial Board shall by certificate in writing have declared themselves satisfied with the industry and good conduct of the Demy, in which case the tenure of his Demyship shall be renewed for a further term of two At the end of the latter term the Tutorial Board may extend the tenure of any such Demyship for one year longer, if for special reasons they deem it advisable so to do. Provided always that nothing in this clause shall prevent the exercise at any time for any sufficient cause of the power of deprivation conferred by clause 12 of the existing Statute as to Demyships, or of any power of inflicting fines or penalties less than deprivation under any Bylaw of the College for the time being in force.

2. The clause numbered 5 of the said existing Statute as to Demyships is hereby repealed as regards Junior Demies hereafter to be elected.

Visitor.

The Visitor shall have power at any time at his discretion, on the application or request in writing of the President and any three Fellows, absolutely to make valid and confirm anything done that might be done under the Statutes for the time being of the College, but which by reason of any irregularity or omission, or other matter whatever preliminary thereto or connected therewith, may be invalid or of doubtful validity, if in the judgment of the Visitor such irregularity or omission or other matter is not one of substantial importance with reference to the thing proposed to be made valid or confirmed.

STATUTES made by the Governing Body of Jesus College, Oxford, at a meeting specially summoned under section 54 of the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877, and held on January sixteenth, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight.

Statute V, Clause 3.

AT end of the clause after the words Foundation Scholarship insert the words "other than a Welsh Foundation Scholarship," so that the clause shall read "No person shall be eligible to a Foundation Scholarship other than a Welsh Foundation Scholarship who has exceeded the age of nineteen

years on the day of election."

Statute concerning the Meyricke Endowment, Clause 6, after the words "the Principal and Fellows may, if they think fit, apply a part not exceeding one moiety of the capital towards the erection of additional buildings for the accommodation of undergraduate members of the College," insert "and may contribute out of the income thereof, until it shall be so applied, in aid of the Tuition Fund, a sum not exceeding in any one year £5 for each undergraduate member of the College for the time being receiving tuition in the College; provided that this contribution shall not be paid under this Statute, and also under Statute VII, Clause 5, or they may apply the income thereof in such other manner as they may see fit for promoting the greater efficiency of the College as a place of religion, learning, and education."

TREASURY WARRANT.

WE, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in pursuance of the Acts relating to Her Majesty's Post Office, and in exercise of all powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant, made on the representation of Her Majesty's Postmaster-General (testified by his signing the same), and under the hands of two of us, the said Commissioners, order, direct, and declare as follows:—

Definitions.

- 1. In this Warrant:-
- (1.) The expression "Parcel" means a Postal Packet, which is posted as a Parcel, in accordance with the provisions of this Warrant, or any Warrant amending the same.
- (2.) The expression "United Kingdom" includes the Channel Islands and the Isle of Man.

Places between which Parcels may be transmitted.

2. From and after the date when this Warrant comes into operation Parcels may, subject to the provisions of this Warrant, be transmitted by post between the United Kingdom and the Republic of Colombia.

Rates of Postage.

3. On all Parcels transmitted by post under this Warrant, from the United Kingdom to the said Republic there shall be charged and paid the following rates of postage, that is to say:—

On every Parcel not exceeding three pounds in weight—two shillings and six pence.

On every Parcel exceeding three pounds and not exceeding seven pounds in weight—four shillings and five pence.

On every Parcel exceeding seven pounds and not exceeding eleven pounds in weight—six shillings.

Maximum Dimensions and Weight.

4. Except by permission of the Postmaster-General, no Parcel, the dimensions of which shall exceed in length three feet six inches or in length and girth measured together six feet (such girth being measured round the thickest part of such parcel), or which shall exceed eleven pounds in weight shall be conveyed or tendered for conveyance by post under this Warrant.

Prepayment.

5. The postage chargeable according to the rates hereinbefore mentioned shall in all cases (except as otherwise provided in this Warrant) be prepaid at the time of posting, and such prepayment shall be effected by means of adhesive postage stamps, or at such Post Offices, within such hours and under and subject to such regulations as the Postmaster-General shall from time to time prescribe, in money.

Times of Posting.

6. Parcels intended to be transmitted by post may, in the United Kingdom, be posted on any day of the week except Sunday, but shall not be posted on Sundays, or in England or Ireland on Christmas Day or Good Friday, and in Scotland on either of the two Sacramental Fast Days, except in the cases next hereinafter mentioned, that is to say:—

Where the delivery of Parcels on Sundays, or any of the other days aforesaid, at certain Post Offices, to addressees calling for the same, may hereafter be specially authorized by the Postmaster-General, the posting of Parcels on Sundays, or such other days as aforesaid, at such offices respectively, shall also be permitted within such times and in such manner as may be directed

by the Postmaster-General.

Mode of Posting.

7. Except as otherwise provided in this Warrant, all Parcels shall in the United Kingdom be posted by being handed in at a Post Office in the manner hereinafter provided, within the hours during which such office shall be open to the public for the posting of Parcels.

Posting at Post Offices.

8. The following provisions shall apply to the posting of Parcels at any Post Office in the United Kingdom, that is to say:—

(1.) It shall be the duty of the person bringing a Parcel to hand it to an officer on duty at

the counter in such office.

(2.) Such Parcel must bear the name and address of the sender, and the exact direction of the addressee, and must be packed in a manner adequate for the length of the journey, and for the protection of the contents. The Parcel must also be so packed as to prevent any tampering with its contents without leaving an obvious trace of its violation, and must be sealed by means of sealing wax, lead, or otherwise, with some impress or mark of the sender. Such Parcel must also be accompanied by or have affixed to it a declaration of such kind, and stating the contents of the Parcel in such manner and form and with such other particulars as the Commissioners of Customs and the Postmaster-General may prescribe.

(3.) Such Parcel shall be measured and weighed by such officer, and (if such Parcel do not exceed the limits of measurement or weight hereinbefore mentioned) the postage thereof according to the respective rates hereinbefore mentioned shall be prepaid as hereinbefore mentioned, and shall be verified by such officer, and no such Parcel shall be forwarded by the post without the before-mentioned requirements being complied with; and if any such Parcel shall be left at a Post Office without such requirements being complied with, such Parcel shall be detained, and may be returned or given up to the sender thereof or otherwise dealt with or disposed of in any manner authorized by this Warrant.

Collection of Parcels.

9. The Postmaster-General may, if he thinks fit, from time to time authorize such of his officers as he may direct to receive Parcels for the Post under such regulations and conditions as he may from time to time prescribe.

Irregular Posting of Parcels.

10. Any Packet transmissible by Parcel Post from the United Kingdom, which from any words or marks thereon, or other external evidence appears to have been intended for transmission as a Parcel, but which has not been tendered for transmission as a Parcel, but has been posted in a Post Office letter-box or otherwise than according to the manner hereinbefore prescribed for the posting of Parcels may, in the discretion of the Postmaster-General, either be detained and returned or given up to the sender, or if the said Packet is fully prepaid with the Letter or Book Packet rate of postage, and otherwise conforms to the Regulations as to the Letter or Book Post, may be forwarded as a Letter or Book Packet (as the case may be).

Return and Disposal of Undelivered Parcels.

11. With regard to

(a.) Parcels which are addressed to a Post Office in the United Kingdom to be called for, or to a place in the United Kingdom beyond the limits of the free postal delivery of any town or district, or to a ship at any port in the United Kingdom, and which are not called for or delivered within such reasonable times as the Postmaster-General may from time to time prescribe; and

(b.) Parcels which cannot be delivered in the United Kingdom for want of a true direction, or by reason that the addressee is dead, or cannot be found, or has refused the same, or has refused to pay any charges thereon, or

for any other sufficient reason.

The following provisions shall apply, that is to

(1.) The Parcel shall, as the Postmaster-General may from time to time direct, be retained at or forthwith forwarded to such place as the Postmaster-General may from time to time appoint, and may, if necessary,

be there opened and examined.

(2.) Notice shall be given to the sender through the Post Office of the said Republic that the Parcel will, in default of any claim on the part of the addressee, be given up to the sender's agent upon personal application at such place as aforesaid, or at the request of the sender will be returned to him by Post upon payment of such charges as are hereinafter mentioned.

(3.) The notice shall state that in default of the receipt by the Postmaster-General of an application for the Parcel, during a period to be specified in such notice from some person who, in the Postmaster-General's judgment, is entitled to receive the Parcel, it will be disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may direct.

(4.) The Postmaster-General may, in his discretion, specify in any such notice, or otherwise, the periods during which Parcels may be returned to the senders thereof, and in so doing may have regard to the nature and

contents of Parcels.

(5.) Where in the case of a Parcel which cannot be delivered for want of a true direction, the sender corrects the address of the Parcel, the Parcel shall be forwarded to the corrected address, subject to the following conditions:-

(a.) Where the corrected address of the Parcel is within the same free delivery as the original address, and the Parcel is not at the time of such correction lying at a Returned Letter Office, no new charge shall be made with respect to the delivery of the Parcel.

(b.) Where the corrected address of the Parcel is not within the same free delivery as the original address, or the Parcel at the time of such correction is lying at a Returned Letter Office, the sender shall pay a new and distinct rate of postage equal in amount to the rate of postage which would have been chargeable on such Parcel as an Inland Parcel.

(6.) A Parcel shall not be given up or returned by post to the sender except upon payment by him of any charge for redirection or other charge to which the Parcel has become liable under the provisions of this Warrant, or of any such Regulations as are referred to in section 14 of "The Post Office (Parcels) Act, 1882."

(7.) Where the sender requests a Parcel to be returned to him by post, such Parcel shall not be returned to the sender except upon payment by him of a new and distinct rate of postage, according to the rates fixed by this Warrant, and all other charges to which the Parcel has become liable.

(8.) The Postmaster-General may require proof to his satisfaction that an applicant for a Parcel is entitled to receive the same.

(9.) Where no application is made for a Parcel within the period specified in any such notice as aforesaid, or an applicant fails to prove to the satisfaction of the Postmaster-General that he is entitled to receive the Parcel, or refuses or fails to pay the charges to which the Parcel has become liable under this Warrant, the Parcel may be dealt with or disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may direct or authorize.

(10.) If at any time while a Parcel remains in

the possession of the Postmaster-General it becomes offensive or injurious to any officer of the Post Office, or other person, or to other Parcels, it may forthwith be dealt with or disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may in his discretion direct or authorize, notwithstanding that the provisions of this Warrant as to the return of such Parcel, have not been or have only partially been complied with.

Charge for Re-direction.

12. Any Parcel may be re-directed from its original address, or any substituted address, within the United Kingdom, to any country or place with which a Parcel Post to or from the United Kingdom or the said Republic is established, and in every case of such re-direction there shall be charged on such Parcel in respect of such re-direction a new and distinct rate of postage according to the rates for the time being payable in respect of the transmission of a like Parcel from the United Kingdom to the country or place to which it may be re-directed, and such postage, if not paid at the time of such re-direction, shall be collected on the delivery of the Parcel to the addressee.

13. Any Parcel may be re-directed from its original address, or any substituted address, within the United Kingdom to any other address within the United Kingdom, and in every case of such re-direction there shall be charged on such Parcel in respect of each such re-direction, and (if not previously paid) paid by the addressee thereof in money upon the delivery of such Parcel, a new and distinct rate of postage, equal in amount to the rate of postage which would have been originally chargeable on such Parcel as an Inland

Remission of Re-direction Rates.

14. The Postmaster-General may wholly remit the rate of postage for re-direction on any Parcel addressed to the United Kingdom which may, on the request of the addressee thereof, be redirected by an Officer of the Post Office, and again forwarded by post to the same person at any address within the limits of the same free postal delivery as the address from which such Parcel was so re-directed.

Prohibitions.

15. There shall not be posted or conveyed or delivered by post any Parcel:-

(1.) Consisting of or containing any indecent or obscene print, painting, photograph, lithograph, engraving, book or card, or any indecent or obscene article whether similar to the above or not, or

(2.) Having thereon or on the cover thereof any words, marks, or designs of an indecent, obscene, or grossly offensive character.

(3.) Containing or bearing any letter or communication in the nature of a letter.

- (4.) Containing any article or thing not authorized by the Customs or other laws of the Republic of Colombia.
- (5.) Consisting of or containing:-
 - (a.) Any explosive substance.(b.) Any dangerous substance.
 - (c.) Any filth.
 - (d.) Any noxious or deleterious substance.
 - (e.) Any sharp instrument not properly protected.
 - Except with the special permission of the Postmaster-General any living creature.
 - (g.) Any article or thing whatsoever which is likely to injure other Parcels in course of conveyance or any receptacle in which the same are conveyed or an officer of the

Post Office or other person who may deal with such Parcel.

Any such Parcel, if posted or tendered for conveyance by post, may be detained, and either returned or given up to the sender thereof or dealt with or disposed of in such other manner as may be authorized by the Postmaster-General.

16. There shall not be posted or conveyed or delivered by post any Parcel consisting of or containing two or more Parcels or other Postal Packets (of the same or of different descriptions) addressed to different persons at different addresses, and any such Parcel if posted or tendered for conveyance by post may be detained and either returned or given up to the sender thereof, or dealt with or disposed of as the Postmaster-General may authorize.

Non-compliance with Regulations.

17. In any case not in this Warrant expressly provided for, where any Parcel shall be posted or tendered for conveyance by post which in any respect infringes or fails to comply with the regulations in this Warrant contained, or any of them, such Parcel may, at the option of the Postmaster-General, either be dealt with as in this Warrant provided, with reference to Parcels which cannot be delivered, or be dealt with or disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may in his discretion direct or authorize.

Parcels not to interfere with Letter Post.

19. 21. Parcels intended to be transmitted by post under the provisions of this Warrant shall not be posted, forwarded, conveyed, or delivered, except subject to such Regulations as are referred to in section 14 of "The Post Office (Parcels) Act, 1882."

Remission of Postage.

22. The Postmaster-General may, in any case in which he may consider it just or reasonable so to do, remit any postage or any sum made payable under this Warrant.
