The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS by the four hundred and tenth section of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," it is enacted that, upon the completion of any new lighthouse, buoy, or beacon, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, fix such dues in respect thereof, to be paid by the master or owner of every ship which passes the same, or derives benefit therefrom, as Her Majesty may deem reasonable, and may from time to time alter the amount thereof; and that such dues shall be paid and collected in the same manner, by the same means, and subject to the same conditions, in, by, and subject to which the light dues authorized to be levied by the said Act are paid and collected:

And whereas by the said Act "buoys and beacons" include all other marks and signs of the

And whereas by "The Merchant Shipping (Miscellaneous) Act, 1887," it is enacted, that—

"In the Merchant Shipping Act, 1854, and the "Acts amending the same, the expression "'lighthouses' shall, in addition to the "meaning assigned to it by the Merchant "Shipping Act, 1854, include sirens, and all "other descriptions of fog signals, and the "expression 'new lighthouse' shall include "the addition to any existing lighthouse of any improved light, or any siren, or any description of fog signal."

And whereas the Corporation of Trinity House of Deptford Strond have greatly improved the light heretofore exhibited from the lighthouse on Saint Catherine's Point on the coast of the Isle of Wight, and such improved light has been exhi-

And whereas it is fit and proper that, in respect of the said improvement, and by reason of the expenditure involved, dues should be levied as hereinafter mentioned:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in exercise of the powers vested in Her by the said recited Acts, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to direct that, from and after the date of this Order in Council, or from and after the time of the receipt of a copy of this Order by the officers authorized to collect light dues, the tolls of eight-sixteenths of a penny per ton over sea, "ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other

and sixpence per vessel coasting now levied in respect of the lights exhibited at Hurst Point, the Needles and Saint Catherine's Point shall cease, and in lieu thereof there shall be paid for every ship, whether British or foreign, the toll of twelvesixteenths of a penny per ton of the burden of every such ship for each time of passing or deriving benefit from all or any of the said lighthouses if on an over sea voyage, and nine pence per vessel if on a coasting voyage.

The said tolls shall be levied subject to the regulations and exemptions contained in the Consolidated Table of Light Duties, sanctioned by Orders in Council, dated respectively the twentyfourth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and seventy, and the sixteenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one, and in the Order in Council dated the twenty-first day of February, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, and also in the special section of the Consolidated Tables prepared in pursuance of an Order in Council, dated the sixth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and eighty, or to such other regulations and exemptions as may from time to time be duly sanctioned, and subject also to the gross abatement or discount of sixtyfive per centum, mentioned in an Order in Council, dated the third day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, or to such other abatement or discount as may for the time being be in C. HEREAS by an Act passed in the first session of the Parliament holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to abridge the holding "of benefices in plurality, and to make better provision for the residence of the clergy," after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, "hamlets, chapelries, and other places or districts "may be separated from the parishes or mother churches to which they belong, with great "advantage, and places altogether extra-parochial "may in some instances with advantage be annexed "to parishes or districts to which they are con-"tiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for

things, enacted, "That when with respect to his I "own diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop "of the Province, or when the Bishop of any "diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop "that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or "district within the diocese of such Archbishop, " or the diocese of such Bishop, as the case may "be, may be advantageously separated from any "parish or mother church, and either be consti-"tuted a separate benefice by itself or be united "to any other parish to which it may be more " conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining "tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a "separate parish or benefice, or that any extra-" parochial place may with advantage be annexed "to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be "constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said Archbishop or Bishop "shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his consideration) describing the "mode in which it appears to him that the altera-"tion may best be effected, and how the changes "consequent on such alteration in respect to "ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, "rent-charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, "and payments, and in respect to patronage and "rights to pews, may be made with justice to all "parties interested; and if the patron or patrons " of the benefice or benefices to be affected by "such alteration shall consent in writing under "his or their hands to such scheme, or to such "modification thereof as the said Archbishop may "approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full "consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any "such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall "certify the same and such consent as aforesaid "by his report to Her Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to "make an Order for carrying such scheme, or 'modification thereof, as the case may be, into " effect."

And whereas by another Act of Parliament passed in the second and third years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to "make better provision for the assignment of " Ecclesiastical Districts to Churches or Chapels " augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of "Queen Anne; and for other purposes," it is, amongst other things, further enacted, "That when by any Order of Her Majesty in Council as " aforesaid, a separate parish for ecclesiastical pur-" poses is constituted, the same shall, on regis-"tration thereof, and with the consent in writing " of the incumbent or incumbents of the benefice "or benefices to be thereby affected, become a " perpetual curacy and benefice, and the minister "thereof, duly nominated and licensed thereto, "and his successors, shall be a body politic and "corporate, with perpetual succession, and may " receive and take to himself and his successors " all such lands, tenements, tithes, rent-charges, " and hereditaments as shall be granted unto him " or them, and such perpetual curate shall thence-"forth have within the limits of the district parish formed under the Church Building Acts, " for the church of such perpetual curacy, sole "and exclusive cure of souls, and shall not in " anywise be subject to the controll or interference " of the incumbent or incumbents of the benefice " or benefices to be affected by such Order, if he " or they shall have consented to such Order as " aforesaid."

And whereas the Right Reverend George, together with the consent thereto of the said Lord Bishop of Southwell, hath represented in a Sydney William Herbert Earl Manvers as patron writing dated the sixteenth day of April one

thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Edward White Lord Archbishop of Canterbury as follows:—

"To the Most Reverend Edward White, Lord Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury.

"I, the Right Reverend Father in God George by Divine permission Bishop of Southwell do hereby represent to your Grace that to the benefice (being a vicarage) and parish church of Edwinstowe in the county of Nottingham and my diocese of Southwell belongs amongst other places the ancient parochial chapelry known by the name of Ollerton the limits and boundaries whereof are well known and defined.

"That according to the last census the population of the parish of Edwinstowe exclusive of the said chapelry of Ollerton is one thousand five hundred and thirty-nine and that according to the same census the population of the said chapelry of Ollerton is eight hundred and eighteen.

"That there is in the said chapelry a church or chapel affording accommodation for about three hundred and fifty persons and being distant two miles and one hundred yards from the parish church of Edwinstowe.

"That baptisms, marriages and churchings have for the last seventy-five years at least and are now solemnized and performed in the said church or chapel of the said chapelry and the said chapelry is for all civil purposes a separate and distinct parish from Edwinstone.

"That the annual value of the said benefice with the said chapelry is seven hundred and nine ponds nine shillings and eleven pence or thereabouts of which ninety-nine pounds ten shillings and eight pence or thereabouts arises in respect of or within the said chapelry of Ollerton.

"That the patronage of the said benefice of Edwinstowe with the chapelries thereto belongs to the Right Honourable Sydney William Herbert Earl Manvers and the Reverend Henry Telford Hayman is the present incumbent thereof.

Hayman is the present incumbent thereof.

"That it appears to me that under the provisions of the Acts of Parliament passed in the sessions holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty cap. 106 and in the second and third years of the same reign cap. 49 the said chapelry of Ollerton may be advantageously separated from the said benefice and parish church of Edwinstowe and be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes and a perpetual curacy and benefice.

"That the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have agreed subject to certain conditions, to grant to the proposed separate parish and benefice of Ollerton (1) Such an annual sum as shall be sufficient together with all other endowments emoluments and payments arising within or in respect of the said chapelry and to be enjoyed by the incumbent for the time being of the said proposed separate parish and benefice, to raise the income thereof as at the present time to a yearly sum of three hundred pounds and (2) a capital sum of one thousand five hundred pounds to be applied towards the cost of providing a suitable parsonage or house of residence for the incumbent for the time being of the said separate parish and benefice of Ollerton, in accordance with plans and a specification to be approved by tl:em

"That pursuant to the direction contained in the twenty-sixth section of the said first-mentioned Act I have prepared the following scheme which together with the consent thereto of the said Sydney William Herbert Earl Manvers as patron and the consent of the said Reverend Henry Telford Hayman the incumbent of the said benefice I do submit to your Grace to the intent that your Grace may if on full consideration and enquiry you shall be satisfied with such scheme certify the same and such consents as aforesaid by your report to Her Majesty in Council."

And whereas the said scheme drawn up by the said Bishop, and the consents referred to in the said representation are as follows:—

"The SCHEME above referred to

"That the said chapelry of Ollerton shall be separated from the said benefice and parish church Edwinstowe and be constituted a separate parish and benefice for ecclesiastical purposes and a perpetual curacy and benefice by the name or style of 'The Perpetual Curacy of Ollerton' of which the said church or chapel within the said chapelry shall be the parish church.

"That the proposed separate parish and benefice of Ollerton shall be subject to the same ecclesiastical jurisdiction as the said benefice of Edwinstowe and the incumbent of such separate parish and benefice shall have exclusive cure of

souls within the limits of the same.

"That all the vicarial glebe lands, all the tithe commutation rent-charges arising out of lands situate in the township of Ollerton as set forth in the first and second schedules hereunder written and all other yearly payments for or in lieu of tithes and all other endowments whatsoever situate or arising within or in respect of the said chapelry and at present belonging to the said benefice of Edwinstowe shall henceforth belong and be attached to the said proposed separate benefice of Ollerton for ever and be held received and enjoyed by the incumbent thereof for the time being.

"That all fees and other ecclesiastical dues and payments for churchings marriages burials and other ecclesiastical offices solemnized and performed within the proposed separate parish and benefice of Ollerton and all such other ecclesiastical dues offerings and emoluments usually payable to the incumbent of a parish or benefice as shall arise within the said proposed separate parish or benefice shall belong to the incumbent thereof.

"That the patronage or right of nomination of or to the said proposed separate parish of Ollerton shall belong to and be vested in the Bishop of Southwell his successors and assigns for ever. Provided always that the right of nomination or presentation of or to the said proposed separate parish shall for the first turn only belong to and be exercised by the said Sydney William Herbert Earl Manvers his heirs and assigns.

"That the parishioners of the said proposed separate parish shall not be entitled to church accommodation in any other church than in the church of the said proposed separate parish nor shall the parishioners of Edwinstowe or of any other chapelries belonging thereto be entitled to any accommodation in the church of the said separate benefice except nevertheless such person or persons (if any) as may possess a legal right by faculty or otherwise to the exclusive use of any pews or sittings in either of the said churches who may not be willing to relinquish and give up the same.

"Given under my hand this sixteenth day of April in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight,

"I, the Right Honourable Sydney William Herbert Earl Manvers, being the patron of the benefice (being a vicarage) of Edwinstowe with (amongst other places) the said chapelry of Ollerton annexed if the same were now vacant and I, the Reverend Henry Telford Hayman the incumbent of the same benefice do hereby respectively signify our consent to the scheme above proposed and set forth and to every matter and thing therein contained.

And whereas the said Archbishop being satisfied with the said scheme, hath certified the same and the consents aforesaid to Her Majesty in Council by his report dated the eleventh of May one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, which said report is in the words and figures following :-

"To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

"We the undersigned Edward White Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury do hereby

report to Your Majesty in Council.
"That the Right Reverend George Lord
Bishop of Southwell has represented unto us

(amongst other things):

"That to the benefice (being a vicarage) and parish church of Edwinstowe in the county of Nottingham and diocese of Southwell belongs amongst other places the ancient parochial chapelry known by the name of Ollerton the limits and boundaries whereof and well known and defined.

"That it appears to the said Lord Bishop that the said chapelry of Ollerton may be advantageously separated from the said benefice and parish of Edwinstowe and be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes and a

perpetual curacy and benefice.

"That the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a scheme in writing describing the mode in which it appears to him the proposed alterations may best be effected and how the changes consequent upon such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction glebe lands tithes rent charges, dues rates and payments and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested which scheme together with the consents thereto in writing of the Right Honourable Sydney William Herbert Earl Manners the patron of the said benefice and of the Reverend Henry Telford Hayman the incumbent of the said benefice has been transmitted by the said Lord Bishop to us for our consideration.

"The representation and scheme of the said Lord Bishop and the consents before referred to

are hereunto annexed.

"And we the said Archbishop being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with the said scheme do hereby pursuant to the Act of the first and second years of Your Majesty's reign chapter 106 certify the same and such consents as aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for carrying the said scheme

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her Majesty chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein-mentioned that is to say, the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen and the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her Majesty chapter thirty-nine and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her Majesty chapter one hundred and fourteen duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the thirty-first day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, in the

words following, that is to say :-"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the thirtythird and thirty-fourth years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-nine and of the Acts thereinmentioned, that is to say, the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen and the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-nine and the Act of the thirty-first and thirtysecond years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and fourteen, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the church and cure (hereinafter called the said benefice) of Charlton Kings in the county of Gloucester and in the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol.

" Whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Charlton Kings is vested for an estate in fee simple without incumbrances in the Principal and Fellows of Jesus College in the University of

Oxferd and their successors.

" And whereas the Reverend Hugo Dani l Harper, Doctor in Divinity now Principal of Jesus College aforesaid acting on behalf of the Principal and Fellows of the same College has signified to us his desire that the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Charlton Kings now vested as aforesaid in the said Principal and Fellows should be transferred to and be vested in the Bishop for the time being of the said diocese of Gloucester and Bristol.

" And whereas the Right Reverend Charles John, now Bishop of the said diocese of Gloucester and Bristol is willing to accept such transfer and in token of such his willingness and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the diocese which by the Acts in the hereinbefore firstly mentioned Act recited or by some or one of them is made necessary he the said Charles John, Bishop of the said diocese of Gloucester and Bristol has executed this scheme as hereinafter-mentioned.

"And whereas a sum of money has been paid over to us in augmentation of the income of the said benefice of Charlton Kings but upon the understanding that the patronage of the same benefice shall be transferred as is hereinafter

recommended and proposed.

"And whereas under these circumstances we are of opinion that the transfer of the patronage of the said benefice of Charlton Kings which is hereinbefore-mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed will tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the parish or district in or in respect of which the right of patronage or advowson so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or exists that is to say, in the parish of Charlton

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Hugo Daniel Harper the Principal, and of the Fellows of Jesus College in the University of Oxford (in testimony whereof the said Principal and Fellows have affixed their common or corporate scal to this scheme) and with the consent of the said Charles John, Bishop of the said diocese of Gloucester and Bristol (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Charlton Kings now vested in them the said Principal and Fellows of Jesus College in the University of Oxford as aforesaid shall be transferred from them the said Principal and Fellows and from their successors to the said Charles John, Bishop of the said diocese of Gloucester and Bristol and his successors Bishops of the same diocese and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Charles John, Bishop of the said diocese of Gloucester and Bristol and by his successors, Bishops of the same diocese for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased -hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the respective Registrars of the said diocese of Gloucester and Bristol at Bristol and at Gloucester. WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of Her Majesty chapter eighty-four duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the thirty-first day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, in the words and figures following, that is to say: -

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundredand thirteen, and of the Act of the seventeenth and eighteenth years of Your Majesty chapter eightyfour have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for apportioning the income of the benefice (being a rectory) of Brown Candover with Chilton Candover in the county of Southampton and in the diocese of Winchester, between that benefice and a certain other benefice namely the benefice (being a rectory) of Swarraton with Northington which said last-named benefice is also situate in the said county of Southampton and in the said diocese of Winchester.

"Whereas the Right Honourable Alexander Hugh Baron Ashburton is the patron of the said benefice of Brown Candover with Chilton Candover and also of the said benefice of Swarraton with Northington and as such patron has expressed to us his desire that the apportionment of income between the said two benefices which is hereinafter set forth should be effected.

"And whereas it has been made to appear to us that the said benefice of Swarraton with Northington is at present insufficiently endowed and that the said benefice of Brown Candover with Chilton Candover has endowments of such an amount as that, after the apportionment of the same endowments which is hereinafter recommended and proposed shall have been effected and shall have come into operation the last mentioned benefice will notwithstanding such apportionment be sufficiently endowed.

"And whereas the Right Reverend Edward Harold, Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester is of opinion, and we the said Commissioners are of opinion that it is desirable that additional provision should be made for the cure of souls within the parish of Swarraton with Northington aforcsaid by means of that apportionment of the income of the said benefice of Brown Candover with Chilton Caudover which is hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas the said benefice of Brown Candover with Chilton Candover is now vacant.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Alexander Hugh Baron Ashburton acting as patron of each of the said two benefices as aforesaid, and with the consent of the said Edward Harold, Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester acting as such Bishop (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed this scheme and sealed the same with their several seals the seal of the said Edward Harold, Bishop of Winchester being his episcopal seal) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day on which any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be published in the London Gazette the following apportionment of the income of the said benefice of Brown Candover with Chilton Candover shall without any converance or assurance in the law other than this scheme and such duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same as aforesaid take place that is to say all those the apportioned tithe commutation rent-charges belonging to the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty | said benefice of Brown Candover with Chilton

Candover and amounting to one hundred and thirty-nine pounds thirteen shillings and eleven-pence per annum or thereabouts, the particulars of which said apportioned tithe commutation rentcharges are set out in the schedule to this scheme appended shall be severed from the said benefice of Brown Candover with Chilton Candover and shall be annexed and belong to the said benefice of Swarraton with Northington.

"And we further recommend and propose that without any conveyance or assurance other than as aforesaid the incumbent for the time being of the said benefice of Swarraton with Northington shall as to the tithe commutation rent-charges to be

annexed to his benefice as hereinbefore mentioned have all such rights and powers of ownership in respect of the same as would be enjoyed by the incumbent of the said benefice of Brown Candover with Chilton Candover were the same last mentioned benefice now full.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall present us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament.
