REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEE TO BE HELD BY HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, ON BEHALF OF HER MAJESTY, AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

By Her Majesty's Command,

The Noblemen and Gentlemen who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulations that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, of his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations shall be made at the Levee, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

The State Apartments will be open for the reception of Company coming to Court at half-past one o'clock.

WHEREAS one of the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company's vessels, called the "Neva," has lately arrived, from the Brazils, and has been directed to proceed to, and remain under quarantine at, the Motherbank, off the Isle of Wight, and during and in the course of her voyage from the Brazils, the Yellow Fever, being a dangerous and infectious disease, appeared on board the said vessel, and attacked persons on board thereof, and the said vessel arrived under alarming and suspicious circumstances; and whereas a sick person who was on board the "Neva" on her arrival, has since been ordered to be removed to the Quarantine Lazarette or Hulk called the "Menelaus," lying at the Motherbank:

And whereas it is expedient to make provision for the disposition of the other persons remaining on board the said ship:

Now, therefore, the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, in exercise of the powers vested in them, do hereby order,—

1. That the said vessel called the "Neva," shall remain and continue at the Motherbank aforesaid until the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, or any two or more of them, shall make further order.

2. That the persons now on board the said vessel called the "Neva," not ordered to be removed to the "Menelaus," shall be removed to the ship called the "Edgar," unless ordered to remain on board the "Neva," by the Medical Superintendent of Quarantine at Ryde.

3. That all persons so removed on board the "Menelaus" Quarantine Hulk, or who shall hereafter be removed on board the said Hulk, or on board the "Edgar," and who shall have been on board the "Neva," shall be kept and detained on board the said Hulk, or the "Edgar," until the Lords of the Council, or any two or more of them, shall make further order.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to

give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a copy of a Despatch, dated 4th instant, from Her Majesty's Representative at Copenhagen, enclosing the following copy of a quarantine Notice issued by the Danish Government:—"Considering that the epidemic of small-pox at Lisbon has now ceased, the Decree of the Ministry of Justice of the 12th of March last is withdrawn which related to vessels arriving from that town, and which ordered a general inspection of the same, in pursuance of Section I. 2 of the law of July 2, 1880, as is likewise the prohibition contained in the aforesaid Decree against the importation from thence of the Articles mentioned in S. 32 of the Law, and also the purification which was enjoined under official supervision of linen, wearing apparel, and bedclothes appertaining to the travelling

effects of persons coming from thence, which is similarly repealed.

There are no quarantines in force at present.

The provisions of section I. 2 of the Law for the prevention of the introduction of contagious disorders into the Kingdom of July 2, 1880, will be henceforward in force as regards the following places:—Marseilles; ports in Sicily; Trieste; all ports in Egypt; ports in Tonkin and Cochin China, and in the East Indies, including the Netherlands East Indian Colonies; ports in the Red Sea; Brazilian ports; Cuba; Haiti; Porto Rico.

The prohibition against the importation into this Kingdom of used linen, worn clothing, and used bed clothes, saving where the said articles belong to travellers' personal effects, rags, used wadding, carded wool, and paper waste, will apply to all the places above enumerated.

In addition, there will have to be carried out under official supervision a purification of all linen, wearing apparel, and bed clothes brought as travelling effects from any of the before-mentioned places.

This Notice takes effect immediately.

FACTORY AND WORKSHOP ACT, 1878.

41 Vict., c. 16, s. 58.

NIGHT WORK. MALE YOUNG PERSONS ABOVE 16. Order of Secretary of State extending Special Exception.

WHEREAS the Factory and Workshop Act, 1878, section 58, contains a special exception to the effect that nothing in the Act shall prevent the employment, in factories to which the exception applies, of male young persons during the night, if they are employed in accordance with the following conditions:

(1.) The period of employment shall not exceed 12 consecutive hours, and shall begin and end at the hours specified in the notice in the Act mentioned; and

(2.) The provisions of Part One of the Act with respect to the allowance of times for meals to young persons during the period of employment shall be observed, with the necessary modifications as to the hour at which the times allowed for meals are fixed; and

(3.) A male young person employed during any part of the night shall not be employed during any part of the 12 hours preceding or succeeding the period of employment; and

(4.) A male young person shall not be employed on more than 6 nights, or in the case of blast furnaces or paper mills 7 nights, in any two weeks:

And the said Act declares that the provisions of the Act with respect to the period of employment on Saturday, and with respect to the allowance to young persons of 8 half holidays in every year or of whole holidays in lieu of them, shall not apply to a male young person employed in day and night turns in pursuance of this exception:

And whereas this special exception is by the Act declared to apply to the factories referred to in the said section:

And whereas it has been proved to my satisfaction that in non-textile factories of the class mentioned in the schedule hereunder it is necessary, by reason of the nature of the business requiring the process to be carried on throughout the night, to employ male young persons of sixteen or upwards at night, and that such employment will not injure the health of the male young persons employed:

Now I, the Right Honourable Henry Matthews, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, by this Order, made under Part 2 of the said Act, extend the said exception to factories of such class so far as regards male young persons of sixteen or upwards.

This Order shall come into effect on 15th June, 1889, and shall continue in force until revoked.

PATENTS, DESIGNS, AND TRADE MARKS ACT, 1888.

REGISTER OF PATENT AGENTS RULES, 1889.

FOR the purpose of giving effect to the provisions of the Patents, Designs, and Trade Marks Act, 1888, relating to the registration of patent agents, the Board of Trade, by virtue of the provisions of the said Act, hereby make the following Rules:—

Register to be kept.

1. A Register shall be kept by the Institute of Patent Agents, subject to the provisions of these Rules and to the Orders of the Board of Trade, for the registration of patent agents in pursuance of the Act.

Contents of Register.

2. The Register shall contain in one list all patent agents who are registered under the Act and these Rules.

Such list shall be made out alphabetically, according to the surnames of the registered persons, and shall also contain the full name of each registered person, with his address, the date of registration, and a mention of any honours, memberships, or other additions to the name of the registered person which the Council of the Institute may consider worthy of mention in the Register. The Register shall be in the Form 1 in Appendix A., with such variations as may be required.

Printed Copies to be Published Annually, and to be Evidence of Contents of Register.

3. The Institute shall cause a correct copy of the Register to be, once every year, printed, under

their direction, and published and placed on sale. Such correct copy shall, in the year 1889, be printed and published at as early a date as is possible, and in every year subsequent to the year 1889, shall be printed and published on the 31st day of January. A copy of the Register for the time being purporting to be so printed and published shall be admissible as evidence of all matters stated therein, and the absence of the name of any person from the Register shall be evidence, until the contrary is made to appear, that such person is not registered in pursuance of the Act.

Registrar.

4. The Institute shall appoint a Registrar, who shall keep the Register in accordance with the provisions of the Act and these Rules, and, subject thereto, shall act under the directions of the Institute, and the Board of Trade.

Registration of Persons who were Patent Agents prior to the passing of this Act.

5. A person who is desirous of being registered in pursuance of the Act, on the ground that prior to the passing of the Act he had been *bonâ fide* practising as a patent agent, shall produce or transmit to the Board of Trade a statutory declaration in the Form 2 in Appendix A; provided that the Board of Trade may in any case in which they shall think fit, require further or other proof that the person had prior to the passing of the Act been *bonâ fide* practising as a patent agent. Upon the receipt of such statutory declaration or of such further or other proof to their satisfaction as the case may be, the Board of Trade shall transmit to the Registrar a certificate that the person therein named is entitled to be registered in pursuance of the Act, and the Registrar shall on the receipt of such certificate cause the name of such person to be entered in the Register.

Final Qualifying Examination for Registration.

6. Subject to the provisions of the Act in favour of every person who proves to the satisfaction of the Board of Trade that prior to the passing of the Act he had been *bonâ fide* practising as a patent agent, no person shall be entitled to be registered as a patent agent unless he has passed, and produces or transmits to the Registrar a certificate under the seal of the Institute that he has passed, such final examination as to his knowledge of patent law and practice and of the duties of a patent agent as the Institute shall from time to time prescribe.

Exemption of Pupils and Assistants from Preliminary Examination.

7. Any person who has been for at least seven consecutive years continuously engaged as a pupil or assistant to one or more registered patent agents, and any person for the time being entitled to practise as a Solicitor of the Supreme Court of Judicature in England or Ireland, or as a Law Agent before the Court of Session in Scotland, shall be entitled to be registered without passing any examination other than the final examination provided for in the last preceding Rule. The Registrar shall before registering the name of any such person as a patent agent (in addition to the final examination certificate) require proof satisfactory to the Registrar that such person has been for at least seven consecutive years continuously engaged as such pupil or assistant, or is entitled to practise as such Solicitor or Law Agent.

Qualifications of Persons Generally for Registration.

8. Any person who is not qualified under Rule 7

must, in order to be entitled to present himself for the final qualifying examination, be—

A person who has passed one of the preliminary examinations mentioned in Appendix B., or such other examination as the Institute shall, with the approval of the Board of Trade, by regulation prescribe.

Final Qualifying Examinations to be held by the Institute.

9. The Institute shall hold at least once in the year commencing with the 1st day of July, 1889, and in every other succeeding year, a final qualifying examination, which shall be the final qualifying examination required under Rules 6 and 7; and the Institute shall, subject to these Rules, have the entire management and control of all such examinations, and may from time to time make Regulations with respect to all or any of the following matters, that is to say:—

- (a.) The subjects for and the mode of conducting the examination of candidates;
- (b.) The times and places of the examinations, and the notices to be given of examinations;
- (c.) The certificates to be given to persons of their having passed the examinations;
- (d.) The appointment and removal of examiners, and the remuneration, by fees or otherwise, of the examiners so appointed; and
- (e.) Any other matter or thing as to which the Institute may think it necessary to make Regulations for the purpose of carrying out this Rule.

Corrections of Names and Addresses in Register.

10. The Registrar shall from time to time insert in the Register any alteration which may come to his knowledge in the name or address of any person registered.

Erasure of Names of Deceased Persons.

11. The Registrar shall erase from the Register the name of any registered person who is dead.

Erasure of Names of Persons who have ceased to Practise.

12. The Registrar may erase from the Register the name of any registered person who has ceased to practise as a patent agent, but not (save as hereinafter provided) without the consent of that person. For the purposes of this Rule the Registrar may send by post to a registered person to his registered address a notice inquiring whether or not he has ceased to practise or has changed his residence, and if the Registrar does not within three months after sending the notice receive an answer thereto from the said person, he may, within fourteen days after the expiration of the three months, send him by post to his registered address another notice referring to the first notice, and stating that no answer has been received by the Registrar; and if the Registrar either before the second notice is sent receives the first notice back from the Dead Letter Office of the Postmaster-General, or receives the second notice back from that office, or does not within three months after sending the second notice receive any answer thereto from the said person, that person shall, for the purposes of this Rule, be deemed to have ceased to practise, and his name may be erased accordingly.

Erasure of Name for Non-payment of Fees.

13. If any registered person shall not, within one month from the day on which his annual registration fee becomes payable, pay such fee, the Registrar may send to such registered person to his registered address a notice requiring him, on or before a day to be named in the notice, to pay his annual registration fee; and if such

registered patent agent shall not within one month from the day named in such notice pay the registration fee so due from him, the Registrar may erase his name from the Register: Provided that the name of a person erased from the Register under this rule may be restored to the Register by direction of the Institute or the Board of Trade on payment by such person of the fee or fees due from him, together with such further sum of money, not exceeding in amount the annual registration fee, as the Institute or the Board of Trade (as the case may be) may in each particular case direct.

Registrar to Act on Evidence.

14. In the execution of his duties the Registrar shall, subject to these Rules, in each case act on such evidence as appears to him sufficient.

Erasure of Incorrect or Fraudulent Entries.

15. The Board of Trade may order the Registrar to erase from the Register any entry therein which is proved to their satisfaction to have been incorrectly or fraudulently inserted.

Erasure of Names of Persons Convicted of Crimes, and Persons Found Guilty of Disgraceful Conduct.

16. If any registered person shall be convicted in Her Majesty's dominions or elsewhere of an offence which, if committed in England, would be a felony or misdemeanour, or after due inquiry, is proved to the satisfaction of the Board of Trade to have been guilty of disgraceful professional conduct, or having been entitled to practise as a Solicitor or Law Agent shall have ceased to be so entitled, the Board of Trade may order the Registrar to erase from the Register the name of such person. Provided that no person shall be adjudged by the Board of Trade to have been guilty of disgraceful professional conduct unless such person has received notice of, and had an opportunity of defending himself from, any charge brought against him.

Restoration of Erased Name.

17.—(1.) Where the Board of Trade direct the erasure from the Register of a name of any person, or of any other entry, the name of the person or the entry shall not be again entered in the Register, except by order of the Board of Trade.

(2.) The Board of Trade may in any case in which they think fit restore to the Register any name or entry erased therefrom either without fee, or on payment of such fee, not exceeding the registration fee, as the Board of Trade may from time to time fix, and the Registrar shall restore the name accordingly.

(3.) The name of any person erased from the Register at the request or with the consent of such person shall, unless it might, if not so erased, have been erased by order of the Board of Trade, be restored to the Register by the Registrar on his application and on payment of such fee, not exceeding the registration fee, as the Institute shall from time to time fix.

Inquiry by Board of Trade before Erasure of Name from Register.

18. For the purpose of exercising in any case the powers of erasing from and of restoring to the Register the name of a person, or an entry, the Board of Trade may appoint a committee consisting of such persons as they shall think fit. Every application to the Board of Trade for the erasure from, or restoration to, the Register of the name of any patent agent shall be referred for hearing and inquiry to the committee, who shall report thereon to the Board of Trade, and a report of the committee shall be conclusive

as to the facts for the purpose of the exercise of the said powers by the Board of Trade.

Appeal to Board of Trade.

19. Any person aggrieved, by any order, direction, or refusal of the Institute or Registrar may appeal to the Board of Trade.

Notice of Appeal.

20. A person who intends to appeal to the Board of Trade under these Rules (in these Rules referred to as the appellant) shall, within 14 days from the date of the making or giving of the order, direction, or refusal complained of, leave at the office of the Institute a notice in writing signed by him of such his intention.

Case on Appeal.

21. The notice of intention to appeal shall be accompanied by a statement in writing of the grounds of the appeal, and of the case of the appellant in support thereof.

Transmission of Notice of Appeal to Board of Trade.

22. The appellant shall also immediately after leaving his notice of appeal at the Institute send by post a copy thereof with a copy of the appellant's case in support thereof addressed to the Secretary of the Board of Trade, 7, Whitehall Gardens, London.

Directions as to Hearing of Appeal.

23. The Board of Trade may thereupon give such directions (if any) as they may think fit for the purpose of the hearing of the appeal.

Notice of Hearing of Appeal.

24. Seven days' notice, or such shorter notice as the Board of Trade may in any particular case direct, of the time and place appointed for the hearing of the appeal shall be given to the appellant and the Institute and the Registrar.

Hearing and Decision of Appeal.

25. The appeal may be heard by the President, a Secretary, or an Assistant Secretary of the Board of Trade, and the decision and order thereon of the President, Secretary, or Assistant Secretary, as the case may be, shall be the decision of the Board of Trade on such appeal. On the appeal such decision may be given or order made in reference to the subject-matter of the appeal as the case may require.

Fees.

26. The fees set forth in Appendix C. to these Rules shall be paid in respect of the several matters, and at the times and in the manner therein mentioned. The Board of Trade may from time to time, by orders signed by the Secretary of the Board of Trade, alter any of, or add to, the fees payable under these Rules.

Alteration of Regulations.

27. Any regulation made by the Institute under these Rules may be altered or revoked by a subsequent regulation. Copies of all regulations made by the Institute under these Rules shall, within twenty-eight days of the date of their being made, be transmitted to the Board of Trade; and if within twenty-eight days after a copy of any regulation has been so transmitted, the Board of Trade by an order signify their disapproval thereof, such regulation shall be of no force or effect; and if, after any regulation under these Rules has come into force, the Board of Trade signify in manner aforesaid their disapproval thereof, such regulation shall immediately cease to be of any force or effect.

Report to Board of Trade.

28. The Institute shall once every year in the month of December transmit to the Board of Trade a report stating the number of applications for registration which have been made in the preceding year, the nature and results of the final examinations which have been held, and the amount of fees received by the Institute under these Rules, and such other matters in relation to the provisions of these Rules, as the Board of Trade may from time to time, by notice signed by the Secretary of the Board of Trade and addressed to the Institute, require.

Definitions.

29. In these Rules, unless the context otherwise requires—

"The Act" means the Patents, Designs, and Trade Marks Act, 1888.

"The Institute" means the Institute of Patent Agents, acting through the Council for the time being.

"The Registrar" means the Registrar appointed under these Rules.

"Registered Patent Agent" means any agent for obtaining patents in the United Kingdom whose name is registered under the Act and these Rules.

Commencement.

30. These Rules shall commence and come into operation on the 12th day of June, 1889, but at any time after the making thereof any appointment or regulations may be made and things done for the purpose of bringing these Rules into operation on the said day.

Title.

31. These Rules may be cited as the Register of Patent Agents Rules, 1889.

SEARCH FOR REPORTED DANGERS IN SOUTH PACIFIC.

SOUNDINGS obtained by Captain P. Aldrich, Her Majesty's surveying-vessel "Egeria," during the year 1888, have revealed the presence of very uneven bottom between the Kermadec Group, and the Fiji and Tonga Islands; and though no dangers have been discovered, the region immediately southward of the latter group, for the distance of about 250 miles, should be regarded with suspicion.

The following reported dangers were searched for by Captain Aldrich:—

1. Vibilia reported in 1877 as in lat. 31° 50' S., long. 178° 20' E.

Three days were spent in this vicinity, and many deep casts obtained for 30 miles in either direction east and west, and 10 miles north and south of above position. As the soundings are very deep, varying from 2,179 fathoms to 1,537 fathoms, with a perfectly even upward slope to the eastward, in the direction of Kermadec Islands, with no sign of irregularity of bottom, and as the original report of this danger was very vague and doubtful, it has been expunged from the Admiralty Charts.

2. Edith and Somme reported respectively in lat. 30° 50' S., long. 178° 23' E., and in lat. 30° 58' S., long. 178° 4' E., and placed on the charts as one danger.

An extensive search was made embracing the positions of both these dangers. Here also the water is deep and regular, the soundings varying from 2,291 fathoms on the west to 1,881 fathoms on the east, showing the same even slope.

No details of "Edith's" report have ever reached the Admiralty. The French transport "Somme" passed the position at night in November, 1869, and the description given would apply to a cloud of marine animalcula, with fish feeding on them; no sounding was obtained.

Having regard to these circumstances, and seeing that this is the second unsuccessful search, the shoal has been removed from the Admiralty Charts.

3. Wolverine and McLeod.—Soundings of 27 and 40 fathoms reported by Her Majesty's ship "Wolverene," 1877, in lat. 25° 37' S. and 25° 24' S., and about long. 179° 4' W., and

McLeod, 17 fathoms, in lat. $25^{\circ} 20' S.$, long. $178^{\circ} 30' W.$

Near this position ("Wolverene's") an extensive bank was found, but a search of nine days over an area for 15 miles north and south, and 10 miles east and west of the shoalest cast, resulted in finding no less water than 204 fathoms.

The bank runs generally north and south, and is probably a shallower part of the ridge that seems to extend from the Tonga to the Kermadec Islands. The 204 fathoms is in lat. $25^{\circ} 30' S.$, long. $179^{\circ} 2' W.$

Circumstances were very favourable during the search, but the "Wolverene's" soundings (although, being at night with ship under sail, they are not above suspicion) will be retained on the Admiralty Charts.

Nothing is known of the origin of the sounding marked McLeod in this vicinity. It will be expunged from the charts.

4. *Wolverene*.—Her Majesty's ship "*Wolverene's*" sounding of 38 fathoms reported in 1879 in lat. $24^{\circ} 59' S.$, long. $174^{\circ} 46' W.$

Soundings of over 3,000 fathoms were found in this vicinity. There was always considerable doubt as to whether this sounding was really obtained. The "*Wolverene*" was going five knots at the time, and when hove-to no bottom was found.

This sounding has therefore been removed from the Admiralty Charts.

5. *Kremhilda* Rock in lat. $24^{\circ} 50' S.$, long. $174^{\circ} 0' W.$

Soundings of about 3,000 fathoms were obtained around this position. No further details than a report from Auckland, that the "*Kremhilda*" had said that she had seen a rock in this position, has ever been received.

This rock has therefore been removed from the Admiralty Charts.

6. *Pelorus* Reef reported in 1861 to be in lat. $22^{\circ} 52\frac{1}{4}' S.$, long. $176^{\circ} 27' 50'' W.$

The "*Egeria*" found a bank here also, and anchored in 19 fathoms. Sounding round the ship in the boats, however, found nothing less than 14 fathoms.

A patch of organic matter, which had every appearance of a shoal, and was reported at several miles distance from the masthead, was found floating near the shoal water.

It is a remarkable coincidence that the "*Pelorus*" and "*Egeria*" were both on this spot at the same time of year, the one on the 13th, the other on the 14th July, and it appears probable that a similar patch of organisms, hatched on the bank, misled the officers of "*Pelorus*." No sounding was obtained by the "*Pelorus*."

It would be prudent, however, to avoid the *Pelorus* Bank. The 14 fathoms lies in lat. $22^{\circ} 51' S.$, long. $176^{\circ} 26' W.$

7. *Seymour* Bank reported by Her Majesty's Ship "*Pelorus*" in 1861, as six fathoms in lat. $21^{\circ} 43' S.$, long. $176^{\circ} 42' W.$

Deep soundings were obtained over and around this position over an area 20 miles in diameter, the depths ranging from 1,100 to 1,300 fathoms.

The original report was from a sounding given by a leadman, the ship going about six knots. When thrown up into the wind, no bottom could be found.

Consequent on this search, *Seymour* Bank has been removed from the Admiralty Charts.

8. *La Rance* Bank.—Twenty miles westward of the position given for this danger, a large bank was also found, but diligent search for four days found no depth less than 279 fathoms; and on the position as reported, there are 600 to 800

fathoms. Tide rips were noticed on several occasions in the deep water.

The original report being of several very shoal patches plainly visible from the deck of a ship; it appears certain that such shoals, did they exist, would have been seen by the "*Egeria*."

The statement (*Pacific Islands Pilot*, Vol. II, page 6) that soundings were actually obtained from a boat, is believed to be founded on a mistake. Patches of floating matter, so often seen in these seas, probably misled "*La Rance*."

Seeing that this area has been before unsuccessfully examined several times, the shoal soundings will be removed from the Admiralty Charts.

9. A bank with least water of 108 fathoms was passed over, 40 miles east of *Pelorus* Bank, but was not thoroughly examined.

Position of 108 fathoms, lat. $22^{\circ} 58' S.$, long. $175^{\circ} 40' W.$

10. *Pylstaart* Island was carefully fixed by the "*Egeria*," by observations from the ship lying off it. It is situated in lat. $22^{\circ} 20' S.$, long. $176^{\circ} 12\frac{1}{2}' W.$, or $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles W. by N. of the position now given on the charts.

(1.) *Particulars of Sacramento Shoal.*

THE following particulars concerning *Sacramento* Shoal have been received from Commander A. Carpenter, R.N., in charge of the India Marine Survey:—

The shoal consists of a sand bank, which nearly dries, its outer edge is distant 2 miles from the nearest shore, and the 10-fathoms line of soundings is 2 miles seaward of it. The sea always breaks on the shoal, except at the outer extreme; it lies with *Hope* Island lighthouse bearing North, distant $13\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

Position, on Admiralty Charts, lat. $16^{\circ} 35\frac{1}{2}' N.$, long. $82^{\circ} 18\frac{1}{2}' E.$, or $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles N.E. of the position heretofore assigned it.

An arm of the *Godavari* River has formed two spits, the southern of which is named *Sacramento* spit. There is good anchorage in 4 fathoms water under the lee of the northern spit. Between the spits there is a channel into the river, with 9 feet on the bar at low water.

The other lies 100 yards to the westward of Sultan Rock, and has also a least depth of $3\frac{1}{2}$ fathoms on it. There are depths of 7 fathoms between the two patches.

The wreck of Her Majesty's ship "Sultan" lies sunk between the two shoal heads above described.

The illuminating apparatus is catoptric, or by reflectors, of the sixth order.

This light will be shown throughout the year, but its exhibition may be interrupted by drift ice or heavy weather.

5. A fixed red light is shown from each of the outer angles of the lock gate, which are screened so that the lights first become visible to vessels approaching from the northward, when they are in the direction of the North Mole. They are

elevated 16 feet above high water, and are shown from posts, 9 feet high.

Also, that a fog signal is established on the highest light beacon on the North Mole Head at Esbjerg:—

The signal is a bell, which, during thick or foggy weather, is sounded every two minutes.
