"To the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Father in God Edward White by Divine Providence Lord Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury Primate of All England and Metro-

politan.

"I Thomas Legh by Divine permission Bishop of Saint Albans do in pursuance of the twenty-sixth section of an Act of Parliament of the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty chapter one hundred and six hereby represent to your Grace as follows:—

"1. There is in the county of Essex in my diocese of Saint Albans the vicarage of Littlebury the parish whereof contains according to the census of one thousand eight hundred and eightyone a population of eight hundred and eighty.

"The net annual value of the benefice of Littlebury arising from rent of glebe land and annual payments from the Ecclesiastical Commissioners and the lay rector is two hundred

and seventy pounds.

"2. There is in the same county and diocese the rectory of Strethall the parish whereof lies adjoining to the parish of Littlebury aforesaid and contains according to the census of one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one a population of forty-five.

"The net annual value of the benefice of Strethall arising from tithe rent charge and rent of glebe lands is one hundred and seventy-eight

pounds.

"3. There is in the same county and diocese the vicarage of Saffron Walden the parish whereof lies adjoining to the parish of Littlebury aforesaid and contains according to the census of one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one a population of six thousand and fifty-six.

"The net annual value of the benefice of Saffron Walden arising from tithe rent charge and rent of glebe land is one hundred and eighty pounds.

"4. A certain district of the parish of Littlebury

lies to the south of the parish of Strethall and adjacent to it the westernmost extremity of which said district lies at a distance of two and a half miles from the parish church of Littlebury and lies at a distance of two hundred yards from the parish church Strethall. The inhabitants of such district are in the habit of attending Divine service at the parish church of Strethall which lastmentioned church lies at a distance of six hundred yards from the central portion of the said district.

"7. The benefices of Littlebury and Saffron Walden are in the patronage of the Right Honourable Charles Cornwallis Baron Braybrooke. The benefice of Strethall is in the patronage of Hector Mouro of Edmondsham in the county of Dorset Esquire, Charles Mansfield Clarke of the United Service Club Pall Mall in the county of Middlesex a Major-General in Her Majesty's Army C.B. Turner Collin of Saffron Walden Esquire and Richard Llewellyn of the Army and Navy Club Pall Mall in the county of Middlesex a Colonel in Her Majesty's Army

"8. The Reverend Ernest Edward Edgerley is the present incumbent of the benefice of

Littlebury.

"The Reverend Joseph Collin is the present incumbent of the benefice of Strethall.

"The Reverend Thomas Stevens is the present incumbent of the benefice of Saffron Walden.

"9. Pursuant to the directions contained in the twenty-sixth section of the first mentioned Act of Parliament I the said Bishop have drawn up a scheme in writing annexed to this representation describing the several districts so as aforesaid proposed to be annexed to the parishes of Strethall and Littlebury respectively and the mode in which it appears to me that the alterations may best be effected and how the changes consequent thereon in respect of ecclesiastical jurisdiction glebe lands tithes rent charges and other ecclesiastical dues and payments and in respect of patronage and right to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested and I do hereby submit the same to your Grace together with the consents in writing of the said patrons and incumbents and in case you shall on full consideration and enquiry be satisfied therewith I request that your Grace will be pleased to certify the same and the consents aforesaid by your report to Her Majesty in Council.

And whereas the said scheme drawn up by the said Bishop of St. Albans, and the consents referred to in the said representation are as follows:—

"SCHEME.

"It is proposed to separate a district from the parish of Littlebury and to annex the same for ecclesiastical purposes to the adjoining parish of Strethall. The said district is delineated and described in the plan hereto annexed and is there coloured red and consists of the lands which on

the Ordnance Map for the said parish of Littlebury are numbered 90, 122, 123, 124, 126 to 139 inclusive 209, 210, 212 to 217 inclusive and 219 to 227 inclusive.

. "The boundaries of such district will therefore

be as follows:-

are hereunto annexed.

. "That the net annual value of the benefice of Amble, not reckoning the house of residence as an item is two hundred and thirty pounds."

"That the patronage of the said vicarage of Amble is vested in the Crown and the Lord Bishop of Newcastle alternately and the Reverend James Fairbrother is now the perpetual curate thereof.

"That the said parish of Amble already comprises a portion of the said township of Togston.

"That that portion of the said township of Togston which is coloured round with a dotted red line on the said map or plan is contiguous to the said parish of Amble and is distant from the parish church of Amble at the nearest point one mile and one-half of a mile and at the remotest point two and a half miles.

"That there is also in the said county of Northumberland and my diocese of Newcastle the vicarage of Chevington the boundaries of the parish whereof are well known and defined and are more particularly delineated and described in the said map or plan and thereon coloured round with blue.

"That the population of the said parish of Chevington according to the last census amounts to two thousand three hundred persons.

"That the net annual value of the benefice of Chevington not reckoning the house of residence as an item is two hundred and fifty pounds."

"That the patronage of the said vicarage of Chevington is vested in the Lord Bishop of New-

castle and the Reverend Albert Lawrence is now the perpetual curate thereof.

"That that portion of the said township of Togston which is coloured round with a dotted blue line on the said map or plan is contiguous to the said parish of Chevington and is distant from the parish church of Chevington at the nearest point one mile and one quarter of a mile and at

the remotest point one and a half miles.

"That the said portion of the township of Togston which is coloured round with a dotted red line on the said map or plan is bounded on the north by the township of Amble on the east by an imaginary line extending along the middle of the line of the Amble branch of the North Eastern Railway, on the west by the township of Acklington on the south by an imaginary line commencing at the centre of a level crossing over the line of the said railway near to the shaft of Togston Old Colliery such imaginary line continuing in a northerly direction along the centre of the road leading from the said level crossing until it reaches the centre of the Amble and Acklington-road at a point opposite to Togston Barns, locally known as Togston-square and such imaginary line proceeding thence along the centre of the said Amble and Acklington-road in a northerly direction until it reaches a point opposite to the southern fence of the field known as Temple Hill, such imaginary line thence continuing westwards along the middle of the said fence until it reaches the boundary of the township and that the said portion of the said township of Togston which is coloured round with a dotted blue line on the said map or plan is bounded on the north by an imaginary line commencing at the centre of a level crossing over the line of the Amble Branch of the North Eastern Railway near to the Shaft of Togston Old Colliery such imaginary line continuing in a northerly direction along the centre of the road leading from the said level crossing until it reaches the centre of the Amble and Acklington-road at a point opposite to Togston Barns locally known as Togston-square and such imaginary line proceeding thence along. the centre of the said Amble and Acklington-road in a northerly direction until it reaches a point opposite to the southern fence of the field known as Temple Hill, such imaginary line continuing westwards along the middle of the said fence until it reaches the boundary of the township. "That it appears to us that the said portion of the township of Togston may under the provisions of the Acts of Parliament passed in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty chapter 106 and the second and third years of the reign of Her present Majesty chapter 19 be advantageously separated from the said parish of Warkworth and that the said portion of the said township of Togston which is coloured round with a dotted red line on the said map or plan may advantageously be annexed to the said parish of

"Whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Covenham Saint Bartholomew is vested for an estate of inheritance in fee simple free from incumbrances in the Reverend James Grenville Smyth, Clerk in Holy Orders, Prebendary of Lincoln Cathedral and Vicar of North and South Elkington in the said county of Lincoln and his

"And whereas a certain augmentation of the said benefice of Covenham St. Bartholomew to wit a donation of one hundred pounds sterling has through us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England and to our satisfaction been made by the said James Grenville Smyth, but upon condition nevertheless that the transfer of the advowson of the same benefice which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter proposed shall be effected and upon this further condition that if an union as aforesaid of the said benefice

of Covenham Saint Bartholomew with the said benefice of Covenham Saint Mary shall have been completed within a period of two years from the day on which any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this present scheme shall have been published in the London Gazette, then, but not otherwise the said sum of one hundred pounds shall be repaid by us to the said James Grenville Smyth his executors or administrators.

V. No body shall be buried in any vault or walled grave unless the coffin be separately entombed in an air-tight manner, that is, by properly cemented stone or brickwork which shall never be disturbed.

VI. One body only shall be buried in any common earthen grave on the same day unless the bodies be those of members of the same family, and that every coffin be forthwith covered with earth at least a foot thick, which shall be closely rammed down, never

to be again disturbed.

VII. No unwalled family grave shall be reopened within fourteen years after the burial
of a person above twelve years of age or
within eight years after the burial of a child
under twelve years of age, unless to bury
another member of the same family; in every
case a layer of earth not less than one foot
thick shall be left undisturbed above the
previously buried coffin; but if, on re-opening
any grave, the soil be found to be offensive,
such soil shall not be disturbed, and in no
case shall human remains be removed from
the grave.

VIII. No coffin shall be buried in any unwalled grave within four feet of the ordinary level of the ground, unless it contains the body of a child under twelve years, when it shall not be less than three feet below that level.

(a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every cossin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b.) In such partly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of the Order as can be buried at or below that depth.

Also that burials be discontinued forthwith and entirely in the Baptist Chapel, in the parish of Rushden; and also in the chapelyard,

THE RABIES (CITY AND METROPO-LITAN POLICE DISTRICTS) ORDER OF 1889.

T the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 9th day of July, 1889.

By Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

PRESENT:

Lord President. Duke of Richmond and Gordon. Duke of Rutland. Viscount Lewisham.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1886, as extended by The Rabies Order of 1887, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Short Title.

1. This Order may be cited as THE RABIES (CITY AND METROPOLITAN POLICE DISTRICTS) . ORDER OF 1889.

Extent and Enforcement.

2. This Order applies to and shall be in force in the City of London and such Districts or parts of Districts of Local Authorities as are included within the Metropolitan Police District, and shall be enforced by each of such Local Authorities within their District or part of their District to which this Order applies.

Commencement and Duration.

3. This Order shall commence and take effect from and immediately after the thirty-first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eightynine; and shall, unless previously revoked by Order of Council, cease to have effect from and immediately after the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, without prejudice to the institution or prosecution

mitted on or before that day.

${\it Interpretation.}$

4. In this Order-

Public place includes any street, highway, thoroughfare, public bridge, royal park, public park garden or pleasure ground, common, uninclosed land, or other place to which the public have for the time being

The Act of 1878 means The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878:

Other terms have the same meaning as in The Rabies Order of 1887.

Slaughter of Dogs Affected with or Suspected of Rabies.

5. The Local Authority of each of the Districts to which this Order applies shall cause all dogs affected with or suspected of rabies or having been bitten by a dog affected with or suspected of rabies within their District to be forthwith slaughtered.

Muzzling of Dogs.

6.—(1.) No dog shall be allowed to be in or on any public place unless such dog is muzzled with a muzzle so constructed as to render it impossible for such dog while wearing the same to bite any person or animal, but not so as to prevent such dog from breathing freely or lapping water.

2.) If any dog is found in or on any public place without being muzzled in manner prescribed by this Article, the person for the time being in charge of the dog, and the owner thereof, and the person allowing the same to be in or on such public place in contravention of this Article, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

(3.) Provided that the provisions of this Article shall not apply to packs of hounds, harriers, or beagles, or greyhounds or other sporting dogs, while being used for sporting purposes, or to any dogs while being used for the capture or destruction of vermin, and in charge of competent

Seisure and Detention of Stray Dogs and of Dogs not Muzzled.

7. The Local Authority of each of the Districts to which this Order refers shall cause all stray dogs, and all dogs not muzzled in accordance with the provisions of this Order, to be seised, and such dogs so seised shall be dealt with as follows:

(i.) If the dog is affected with, or suspected of, rabies it shall be forthwith slaughtered.

(ii.) If the dog is not affected with, or suspected of, rabies it shall be detained in some proper place and be there kept for such period as the Local Authority think expedient: Provided that where the person having charge of or the owner of a dog so detained is known, the Local Authority shall cause notice to be forthwith given to such person or owner of the fact of the dog having been so seised and detained, and the dog shall, without prejudice to the recovery of any penalty for the infringement of this Order, be given up to such person or owner on payment of the reasonable expenses incurred by the Local Authority in respect of such detention.

Food and Water during Detention,

8. A Local Authority, or an Inspector, officer, or constable detaining a dog under this Order shall cause it to be supplied with requisite food and water during its detention; and the expenses incurred by the Local Authority, or by the Inspector, officer, or constable in respect thereof may be recovered summarily by the Local Authority from the person having charge of the dog or from its owner.

Expenses of Local Authority.

9.—(1.) All expenses incurred in respect of the seisure or detention of any dog under the authority of this Order shall be defrayed by the Local Authority within whose District the dog was seised and such expenses and all other expenses incurred in carrying out the provisions of this Order shall be expenses of the Local Authority for the purposes of the Act of 1878.

(2.) A Local Authority, in any case where a dog is detained under the provisions of this Order, may recover summarily from the person having charge of the dog or from its owner the expenses incurred in respect of the detention of such dog.

Temporary Suspension of Local Authority's Special Regulations as to Dogs.

10. The operation of any Regulation made by a Local Authority under Article 12 of The Rabies Order of 1887 (Special Regulations of Local Authority as to Dogs) or under Article 10 of The Rabies Order of 1886 and continued by the said Order of 1887, is hereby suspended during the continuance of this Order so far as any such Regulation may be applicable to any District or part of a District to which this Order applies.

General Provisions of The Rabies Order of 1887

11. Subject to the last foregoing Article of this Order, all the provisions of The Rabies Order of 1887 shall, so far as the same are applicable, continue to apply, during the continuance of this Order, to the Districts or parts of Districts to which this Order applies.
