A DESPATCH, and its Enclosures, of which the following are copies, have been received by the Secretary of State for War, from the General Officer Commanding in Egypt :—

From Major-General the Honourable Sir J. C. Dormer, K.C.B., Commanding in Egypt, to the Right Honourable the Secretary of State for War.

SIR, Cairo, August 17, 1889.

I HAVE the honour to forward the Despatch

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(and enclosures) of Major-General Sir F. Grenfell, K.C.B., Sirdar, with account of the action fought by him near Toski on the 3rd instant.

It would be superfluous on my part to add any words of commendation, as I feel sure that the admirable manner in which the battle was fought, the strategical and tactical skill, as well as the ability shown by Sir F. Grenfell, and the bravery and gallant behaviour of his troops, must be fully appreciated after perusal of his despatch; but I trust I may be permitted to call attention to the good services rendered by the Officers who are specially mentioned by the Sirdar, and particularly to those of Lieutenant-Colonel Wodehouse, Royal Artillery, who engaged the forces of Nejumi, and never lost touch of the enemy from the time when he crossed our frontier, until the action of August 3, 1889.

From Major-General Sir F. Grenfell, K.C.B., A.D.C., Commanding the Nile Field Force, to Major-General the Hon. Sir J. C. Dormer, K.C.B., Commanding in Egypt.

SIR, Toski, August 4, 1889.

I HAVE the honour to forward a report on the action which was fought near Toski on August 3rd.

From information obtained by a reconnaissance under Lieutenant Beech, 21st Hussars (E.A.), on the 2nd instant, I ordered a reconnaissance of all mounted troops, as per margin,* under the command of Colonel Kitchener, to leave Toski on the early morning of the 3rd instant. I accompanied this reconnaissance with my Staff.

The object was to show a force in the enemy's front, cut off stragglers, obtain information, and see if Nejumi's camp still remained in the same place.

On getting near the Dervish position some camel-men were captured, who stated that Nejumi was just leaving on his northward march. Shortly afterwards the enemy was seen on the move, and our reconnaissance having been sighted, their riflemen were pushed to the front and opened fire on the Cavalry.

I ordered Colonel Kitchener to withdraw the Cavalry behind a small hill half a mile to the north of the enemy's camp, and to line a ridge with the dismounted Camel Corps.

A second position was then taken up on the chance of drawing the enemy north. This was eventually relinquished, and the force fell back on a strong position about 900 yards further north.

The enemy being reported as coming on in force, I sent in to Toski for the 1st Infantry Brigade, consisting of the 9th, 10th, and 13th Soudanese Battalions (strength as per margin),† and two guns of Horse Artillery.

A steady fire from our dismounted Cavalry and Camel Corps was kept up on the Dervish skirmishers, who were gradually being reinforced.

At 8.30 A.M. the Dervish spearmen appeared in strength from two ravines directly north of their camp, and with numerous banners formed a dense second line directly behind their skirmishing riflemen. They advanced rapidly, and a farther retirement became necessary, our

relinquished position being quickly occupied by the enemy.

The position then taken up was at the foot of a hill situated about two miles south-west of Toski, towards which the enemy steadily continued their advance.

At 9 A.M. two guns of the Horse Battery came up and opened fire, checking the advance, which was deflected to the north-west, and appeared to form gradually into a line of march, the whole Dervish force crossing our front at a distance of about two thousand yards in a dense mass, on which the Artillery continued to fire with effect.

It was then observed that under cover of this advance a great mass of camp followers and baggage camels were making for the high ground to the north-west, and were soon hidden from view.

From this movement it was evident that the enemy must be making for their new camp in the direction of Ibrim.

From here I sent into Toski for the 2nd Infantry Brigade, consisting of the 1st and 2nd Egyptian Battalions, the 11th Soudanese Battalion (strength as per margin*), and the 2nd Egyptian Field Battery.

The 2nd Infantry Brigade was eventually merged into the 1st Brigade, the whole being placed under the command of Lieutenant-Colonel Wodehouse, R.A. (E.A.), with Brevet Major Hunter, Lancashire Regiment (E.A.) in command of the 1st Brigade.

I then desired Colonel Kitchener to move the mounted troops round the enemy's front in order to head their main column, which was continuing its march north, covered by rifle and spear men.

By taking up successive positions in advance of the extreme right, Colonel Kitchener succeeded in his object, and the head of the Dervish column was stopped.

By 10 A.M. the 1st Infantry Brigade had arrived and took up the position already occupied by the Artillery, dismounted Cavalry, and Camel Corps. This was a rocky ridge some four miles from the river and running almost due north and south to the extent of about 2,000 yards.

In the meantime the Dervish rifle and spear men had seized some rocky hills opposite to our position and about 800 yards distant where they were rapidly reinforced, numbers of banners being planted on the hills, which were crowned by riflemen, while the spearmen massed in rear.

Seeing the prospect of enfilading the Dervish left flank, I ordered Colonel Wodehouse to prolong the line of Infantry to the right, and no sooner was this extension of the 9th Battalion in line seen by the Dervish spearmen, than, led by the Emir Abdel Halim, they charged in force the right of our position—they came on with a determined rush, but were shot down to a man by this Battalion, under the command of Brevet Major Lloyd, Yorkshire Light Infantry (E.A.).

I then ordered the 9th Battalion, which was reinforced by a company of the 2nd Battalion, under Captain Martyr, Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry (E.A.), to advance and occupy the left Dervish position, at the same time advancing the whole line simultaneously with both flanks thrown forward to envelop the rest of the position.

The centre was stormed with great steadiness by the 10th Soudanese Battalion, under Brevet

Major Donne, Sussex Regiment (E.A.), who drove the Dervishes from the heights, inflicting great loss on them, as they retreated from their cover behind the hill, and capturing a large number of standards.

The 13th Soudanese Battalion under Captain Kempster, Leinster Regiment (E.A.), stormed the extreme right of the Dervish position, which was an isolated hill. Here the Dervish riflemen were in such force that a temporary check ensued—the Battalion losing 12 killed and 53 wounded in a few minutes. Captain Kempster, however, gallantly leading on his men, a hand to hand fight ensued with the Dervishes, who charged again and again with desperate bravery. This and the centre position were eventually found to have been the Dervish stronghold, where most of the principal Baggara and Jaalin Emirs were killed, and where the bodies of Abdel Halim, Wad Gubbara, Makin el Nur, and several others, who were subsequently identified (a complete list is appended) were found.

In rear of the left centre of the Dervish position over a thousand Dervishes lay dead.

The Artillery massed under Brevet Major Rundle, R.A. (E.A.); 1st Egyptian Battalion under Captain Coles, East Kent Regiment (E.A.); 2nd Egyptian Battalion, under Major Shapesspear, R.M.A. (E.A.); 11th Soudanese Battalion, under Captain McDonald, Gordon Highlanders (E.A.), materially assisted in the capture of the left Dervish position by pouring steady enfilading fire on the Dervish masses collected in rear.

The 1st Battalion joined the 13th as the position was finally rushed, and these two battalions here captured upwards of thirty standards.

The combined attack on this position was directed by Brevet Major Hunter, who received a spear wound in the arm during the hand to hand encounter on the top of the hill.

During these operations the Cavalry and Camel Corps on the right of the line prevented by their fire the Dervishes reinforcing their first position as well as enfilading ours.

On the capture of their first position the Dervishes retreated across a broad plain towards the high ground to the west; at this stage, Nejumi, on a horse, trying to rally the scattered Dervishes, was pointed out to me by a Dervish prisoner, and I then ordered the 20th Hussars, under Lieutenant-Colonel Irwin, and the Egyptian Cavalry, under Lieutenant Beech, 21st Hussars (E.A.), to charge, while the Camel Corps, advancing rapidly, brought a close fire to bear on the retreating enemy's flank, and the division of Horse Battery, moving to the left front at a gallop, opened at case range.

The Dervishes with a few standards now took up a second strong position due west of their first position and some 2,000 yards from it, in the direction towards which camp-followers and baggage camels had been seen diverting in the early stage of the action.

At noon I ordered the 11th Soudanese, with 1st and 2nd Egyptian Battalions on either flank, supported by the 10th and 13th Soudanese, with the 9th Soudanese on right-rear flank, to advance against this position, which had been previously shelled by the Artillery.

The 11th Soudanese advanced with great steadiness, drums beating and bugles blowing, the Dervishes, however, had already suffered so heavily that they made but little opposition; the hills were rapidly cleared, while the Egyptian Cavalry, coming round on the right flank, entered into pursuit.

On gaining the heights the enemy's camp was found on the low ground just beyond; it was captured, and with it large numbers of drums, spears, swords, saddles, chain armour, tent equipage, banners, &c., numbers of the enemy being killed in and about the camp.

The remnant of the Dervish force was now in full retreat in a south-westerly direction, being followed into the desert to a point upwards of eight miles distant from Toski, when the horses, being tired out, and the men exhausted from fatigue and thirst after so long and trying a day, I ordered the pursuit to cease at 2 p.m.

Shortly before the halt a loaded camel was observed by the Cavalry trying to escape, surrounded by about twenty Dervishes. It was supposed at first to be carrying a gun, and was shot by the Egyptian Cavalry, the men around it being apparently killed by the fire of the dismounted men. On advancing to within a few yards the Dervishes sprang up and charged in a determined way, wounding some Egyptian troopers; [but they were eventually all killed. It was subsequently found that the camel carried the body of Wad el Nejumi, around whom his Mulazimeen or body-guard had rallied and died. His body was brought into camp, where it was identified by many of his own tribe.

All troops then returned to camp, which they reached at 5 p.m.

I estimate the Dervish losses in this action to have been 1,500 killed and upwards of 3,000 prisoners, amongst whom were many wounded.

I cannot speak too highly of the conduct of all ranks in this action—English Cavalry, Egyptian Cavalry, Artillery, Camel Corps, and Infantry—all did excellent service. As regards the Infantry, all movements were promptly executed, the Dervish charges received steadily in line, and positions were taken with great dash and gallantry. I would particularly mention the 1st Brigade under Major Hunter, who bore the brunt of the fight, and has been in the field since the 2nd July.

The advance of the 11th Battalion on the second Dervish position was well carried out, and the 1st and 2nd Egyptian Battalions, both on that occasion and earlier in the fight, showed the same eagerness as the Soudanese battalions to close with the enemy.

I have now to bring to your notice the services of officers engaged in the action:—

Colonel Kitchener, C.M.G., A.D.C., R.E., commanded the mounted troops with his usual activity and forethought, heading the enemy till arrival of the Infantry, and making dispositions which greatly conduced to the success of the action and subsequent heavy Dervish loss. He calls attention to the good services rendered by the officers of his Staff:—

Captain T. E. Hickman, Worcester Regiment, Brigade Major (Major E.A.).

Lieutenant A. M. McMurdo, Highland Light Infantry, A.D.C. (Major E.A.).

Lieutenant E. J. Dent, King's Own Scottish Borderers, Orderly Officer.

Lieutenant-Colonel Wodehouse, R.A. (E.A.), has been in touch of the enemy with his column ever since Nejumi crossed the frontier. In the action at Arguin on July 2nd he inflicted heavy loss on the Dervish force, and by good arrangements and great activity he has severely punished the enemy, and greatly reduced the number of his fighting men; and he conducted the whole operations up to date of my arrival in

a most able and soldierlike manner. He calls attention to the good services rendered by—
Brevet Major A. Hunter, D.S.O., Royal Lancaster Regiment.

Captain T. P. B. Ternan, Manchester Regiment, Brigade Major (horse shot).

Quartermaster and Honorary Lieutenant H. W. Drage, Army Service Corps.
and this I fully endorse.

Lieutenant-Colonel Settle, R.E., Senior Staff Officer, again displayed those soldierlike qualities and knowledge of Staff duties which I have reported on former occasions; his services were invaluable.

Lieutenant-Colonel Irwin, 20th Hussars, commanded his men both in reconnaissance and fight with judgment, and charged the retreating Dervishes with effect.

Brevet Major A. Hunter, D.S.O., Royal Lancaster Regiment, has been invaluable during the late operations as second in command of the Frontier Force. He commanded his Brigade in a cool and soldierlike manner, and remained on the field after having received a spear wound in the arm when leading a charge on the Dervish positions.

Major H. M. L. Rundle, D.S.O., Royal Artillery, ably commanded the Artillery. His two guns, Horse Battery, did excellent service, first at long range, and later at close quarters, firing case. His guns, both Horse and Field Battery, were always in the right place.

The Field Artillery was well commanded by Lieutenant W. S. Gordon, R.E., and the Egyptian Artillery Officers did remarkably well.

Major F. R. Wingate, Royal Artillery, was very useful to me, both as Staff Officer in the Field, and before and after the action, as Assistant Adjutant-General for Intelligence Department, the duties of which have been very onerous.

Captain J. G. Maxwell, D.S.O., Royal Highlanders, A.D.C., conveyed my orders to various parts of a very extended field, often under very hot fire, with great promptitude and coolness.

The Cavalry under Second Lieutenant J. R. Beech, C.M.G., 21st Hussars, Commanding Halfa Cavalry, has throughout the operations hung on to the Dervish flanks and rear, and punished them severely. Lieutenant Beech has shown great qualities as a Cavalry leader, and in the charge both he and Lieutenant G. C. C. D'Aguilar, 17th Lancers, led their men with great gallantry. His subordinate native officers behaved remarkably well.

The Camel Corps was engaged from 6 A.M. till 1 P.M. and always in the front, their fire being well under control. They were admirably led by Captain H. G. Dunning, Royal Fusiliers, who showed great gallantry in the personal encounter with Nejumi's body-guard in their repeated charges, while protecting the body of their leader.

The following Officers commanded Infantry Battalions, and I have already reported their good service in the body of my despatch:—

9th Battalion (Soudanese), Brevet Major G. E. Lloyd, D.S.O., Yorkshire Light Infantry.

10th Battalion (Soudanese), Brevet Major B. D. A. Donne, Royal Sussex Regiment.

13th Battalion (Soudanese), Captain F. J. Kempster, D.S.O., Leinster Regiment.

2nd Egyptian Battalion, Major A. B. Shakespear, Royal Marine Artillery.

1st Egyptian Battalion, Captain A. H. Coles, East Kent Regiment (horse shot).

When the reconnaissance developed into a general action, Surgeon-Major Hayes quickly returned to camp, arranged an increase of 80 beds on the 70 already organised, improvised a Bearer Column, and all wounded received first field dressings as they fell, and seriously wounded men were conveyed to hospital by stretcher parties and camels. This rapid organisation reflects great credit on Surgeon-Major Hayes, and the following Officers of his Department:—

and I have every reason to be satisfied with all his arrangements for Egyptian wounded.

In addition to the care of Egyptian wounded, Surgeon-Major Hayes had arranged for a large number of Dervish sick and wounded, and has worked night and day to alleviate their sufferings. He is a most able, active, and energetic Officer.

I have refrained in this despatch from specially mentioning the names of Egyptian Officers, as I propose submitting a full Despatch to His Highness the Khedive, in which the good services they performed will be brought to notice; but I would here beg to state that the Egyptian Officers all behaved well and showed an excellent example in leading their men.

I am anxious to acknowledge the services of Major-General the Honourable R. H. de Montmorency, commanding the British Frontier Field Force, and Staff who were indefatigable in pushing up British troops, and also the hard work done by Officers and men of the British brigade.

I regret that owing to circumstances which I have explained above it was imperative to fight the action before their arrival.

1. When dug up the Local Authority shall forthwith cause the carcase to be examined with a view to ascertain whether the animal was affected with a contagious or infectious disease, and the Local Authority shall then cause the carcase to be re-buried as soon as

possible, and shall cause it to be covered with a sufficient quantity of quick lime or other disinfectant, and with not less than six feet of earth.

2. The expenses of and incidental to the digging up, examination, and re-burial of the carcase shall be defrayed by the Local Authority.

THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a copy of a despatch, dated 30th ultimo, from Her Majesty's Representative at Copenhagen, transmitting copy of a Quarantine Notice, issued by the Danish Government, of which the following is a translation:—

"In view of the outbreak of cholera in Trieste having now ceased, the preventive quarantine measures against arrivals from that port, as decreed in the notices issued by the Ministry of Justice, on the 27th April and 30th June, 1887, are hereby raised. The prohibition to import into the kingdom the articles mentioned in § 32 of the law of July 2, 1880, is also raised, together with the compulsory purification of all linen, wearing apparel, and bedding, belonging to the personal effects of persons arriving from the above port.

"For the present there is no quarantine. The provisions of chap. 2, § I, of the law relating to preventive measures against the introduction of contagious diseases into the kingdom, of the 2nd July, 1880, are in force until further notice against arrivals from the following places—Marseilles, Sicilian ports, all Egyptian sea ports, Tonkin and Cochin China sea ports, together with those of the East Indies and the Dutch East Indian Colonies, Red Sea ports, Brazilian ports, Cuba, Hayti, Porto Rico.

"The importation from the above-mentioned places of old linen, second-hand clothes or bedding (provided they do not form part of travellers' personal effects), rags, old wadding, carding wool, and waste paper, is forbidden.

"All wearing apparel and bedding brought as personal effects from the above places, will be submitted to purification under the superintendence of the proper officers.

"The measures set forth in this notice to come into force from the present date.
