By Her Majesty's Command,

Gentlemen who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levees, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

PRESENTATIONS.

Gentlemen who propose to present others must send in writing the name of such Gentlemen to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, not later than *two days* previous to the Levee, in order that the Lord Chamberlain may submit the names to Her Majesty, when, if they are approved, Presentation Cards will be forwarded. Forms for the purpose can be obtained at the Lord Chamberlain's Office.

Gentlemen who wish to be presented officially should communicate with the heads of their Department, who will provide them with the necessary cards and instructions.

WHEREAS by the provisions of the Patents Designs and Trade Marks Act, 1883, as amended by the Patents Designs and Trade Marks (Amendment) Act, 1885, it is amongst other things provided :—

That, if Her Majesty is pleased to make any arrangement with the Government or Governments of any foreign state or states for mutual protection of inventions, designs and trade marks, or any of them, then any person who has applied for protection for any invention, design, or trade mark in any such state shall be entitled to a patent for his invention, or to registration of his design or trade mark (as the case may be) under the said Act in priority to other applicants; and such patent or registration shall have the same date as the date of the application in such foreign state.

Provided that his application is made in the case of a patent within seven months and in the case of a design or trade mark within four months from his applying for protection in the foreign state with which the arrangement is in force.

Provided that nothing in the aforesaid provision contained shall entitle the patentee or proprietor of the design or trade mark to recover damages for infringements happening prior to the date of the actual acceptance of his complete specification or the actual registration of his design or trade mark in this country as the case may be.

The publication in the United Kingdom or the Isle of Man during the respective periods aforesaid of any description of the invention or the use therein during such periods of the invention or the exhibition or use therein during such periods of the design or the publication therein during such periods of a description or representation of the design or the use therein during such periods of the trade mark shall not invalidate the patent which may be granted for the invention or the registration of the design or trade mark.

The application for the grant of a patent or the registration of a design or the registration of a trade mark under the said provisions must be made in the same manner as an ordinary application under the said Act: Provided that in the case of trade marks any trade mark the registration of which has been duly applied for in the country of origin may be registered under the said Act.

And it is further provided that where it is made to appear to Her Majesty that the legislature of any British possession has made satisfactory provision for the protection of inventions, designs and trade marks patented or registered in this country, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty from time to time by Order in Council to apply the provisions first recited, with such variations or additions if any, as to Her Majesty in Council may seem fit, to such British possession.

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that the legislature of the Colony of New Zealand has made satisfactory provision for the protection of inventions, designs and trade marks patented or registered in this country.

Now therefore Her Majesty by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, and by virtue of the authority committed to Her by the said first-mentioned Act, doth declare, and it is hereby declared that the provisions of the said Acts hereinbefore specified shall apply to the Colony of New Zealand.

And it is further ordered and declared that this Order shall take effect so far as regards patents at the expiration of seven months, and so far as regards designs and trade marks at the expiration of four months from the day and date first above written.

WHEREAS by the Coinage Act 1889 it is enacted as follows:—

“ Any gold coin of the realm coined before the reign of Her present Majesty which is below the least current weight as provided by the Coinage Act 1870 may within the time and in the manner from time to time directed by Her Majesty the Queen in Council, be tendered for exchange, and if it has not been illegally dealt with, shall (notwithstanding anything in section seven of the Coinage Act 1870) be exchanged or paid for by or on behalf of the Mint at its nominal value.

“ For the purpose of this Act a gold coin shall be deemed to have been illegally dealt with where the coin has been impaired, diminished or lightened otherwise than by fair wear and tear, or has been defaced by having any name, word, device, or number stamped thereon, whether the coin has or has not been thereby diminished or lightened.”

And whereas by an Order in Council of the thirteenth day of December one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine directions were given as to the time and manner in which coins were to be tendered for exchange in pursuance of the said Act;

And whereas it is expedient to extend the time and vary the manner;

Now therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, in pursuance of the said Act and of all other powers enabling Her Majesty in this behalf, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. The time within which any coin mentioned in section one of the Coinage Act 1889 may be tendered for exchange shall be the thirty-first day of March next.

2. The manner in which any coin mentioned in the Coinage Act 1889 may be tendered with a view to being exchanged or paid for at its nominal value shall be as follows namely:

The same may be tendered during business hours at the Bank of England in London and shall be there left for such time prior to the exchange or payment as may be reasonably necessary for examination and weighing in order to ascertain whether any coin has been illegally dealt with within the meaning of the said Act.

And the Master of Her Majesty's Royal Mint in England is hereby directed to carry into effect the provisions of the said Act for exchanging or paying for at their nominal value all such coins as are so tendered and have not been illegally dealt with.

IT having been represented to Her Majesty in Council by the Governor and Company of the Bank of England in a memorial sealed with the seal of the said Governor and Company and dated the fifth day of December one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine:—

(1.) That between the date of Her Majesty's Order in Council of the fifteenth day of September one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven and the presentation of the said memorial, certain bankers in the said memorial named, who, on the

sixth day of May one thousand eight hundred and forty-four, were issuing their own bank notes to the extent of sums amounting in the aggregate to the sum of £373,667 have ceased to issue their own bank notes.

(2.) That the total of the authorized issues of bankers who subsequently to the said sixth day of May one thousand eight hundred and forty-four, have ceased to issue their own bank notes including the above sum of £373,667 amounts to £3,693,904, whereof the proportionate part of two-thirds amounts to £2,462,602 13s. 4d.

(3.) That the aggregate increase of issues by the Bank of England of their own bank notes authorized by Orders of Her Majesty in Council, under the provisions of the hereinafter-mentioned Act, during the same period, have amounted only to £2,200,000, and

(4.) That the difference between such aggregate increase of issues by the Bank of England, and the proportionate part of two-thirds of the aforesaid lapsed issues by other banks is £262,602 13s. 4d.

And the said Governor and Company having thereupon humbly made application to be authorized under the provisions of the Act passed in the seventh and eighth years of the reign of Her Majesty cap. 32. intituled "An Act to regulate the issue of Bank Notes and for giving to the Governor and Company of the Bank of England certain privileges for a limited period," to increase the amount of securities in the Issue Department of the Bank of England and to extend the issue of their own bank notes to an amount not exceeding the above-mentioned difference between the increase of issues by the Bank of England that has been already authorized and two-thirds of the aggregate issues by the Banks that have lapsed subsequently to the sixth day of May one thousand eight hundred and forty-four.

Now therefore it is this day ordered by Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the said Governor and Company shall be and they are hereby authorized and empowered to increase the amount of securities in the Issue Department of the Bank of England to the extent of £250,000 beyond the total sum or value of £14,000,000 in the said Act mentioned, and of the further sums of £475,000 £175,000 £350,000 £750,000 and £450,000 authorized by Her Majesty's Orders in Council dated the seventh day of December one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five the twenty-sixth day of June one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one the third day of February one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six the first day of April one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, and the fifteenth day of September one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven and thereupon to issue additional Bank of England notes from the said Issue Department, in manner in the said Act mentioned, to the amount £250,000.

WHEREAS by the three hundred and thirty-third section of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for every Pilotage Authority, by Bye-law made with the consent of Her Majesty in Council, from time to time to do within its district all or any of the things specified in that behalf in the said section :

And whereas the North British Railway Company, being a Pilotage Authority within the meaning of the said Act, have, in exercise of the powers vested in them by that Act, made and submitted for the consent of Her Majesty Bye-laws fixing the rates to be henceforth demanded and received for pilotage, and the Regulations with respect to Pilots and pilotage to be henceforth observed within the Harbours of Leven and Methil, copy of which Bye-laws is set forth in the schedule hereto annexed:

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that the said Bye-laws are reasonable and proper :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Her by the said Merchant Shipping Act, 1854, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to approve of, and signify Her consent to the said Bye-laws, as set forth in the schedule hereto annexed.

SCHEDULE.

I. The North British Railway Company being the Pilotage Authority within the limits of the Port and Harbour of Leven, as defined by the "Leven Harbour Act, 1876," and within the limits of Methil Harbour, as defined by the "Methil Harbour Order, 1883," appoints the following enactments and regulations to be strictly enforced within the limits of the Pilotage Authority; and all Pilots licensed as hereinafter provided for, shall be subject to these and such other Bye-laws and Regulations as may be from time to time appointed, and also the provisions of that portion of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," which relates to the pilotage in so far as incumbent on them.

II. The limits of the Pilotage Authority under the above-named Act and Order, shall be the Port and Harbour of Leven, and Harbour of Methil, and shall include that portion of the Firth of Forth bounded by an imaginary line drawn one thousand yards due south, from the point at which the boundary between the parishes of Scoonie and Largo is intersected by high-water mark of ordinary spring tides, thence westward in an oblique line, until it meets the southernmost point of an imaginary radius line six hundred yards from the southernmost point of the pier or breakwater, authorized by the said "Methil Harbour Order, 1883," and thence along the said radius line to the westmost point thereof.

III. No Ship-Master shall be bound to employ a Pilot either inward or outward.

IV. No person shall take charge of any vessel as Pilot within said limits without a licence from the North British Railway Company, unless in the exceptional circumstances specified in the three hundred and sixty-second section of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854." An unlicensed person assuming or continuing in the charge of any ship as Pilot after a licensed Pilot has offered to take charge of her, or using a licence which he is not entitled to use, for the purpose of making himself appear to be a qualified Pilot, shall for each offence incur a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds.

V. Every person desirous of being licensed, shall lodge with the Company at their Head Office, No. 4 Princes-street, Edinburgh, an application in his own handwriting, setting forth his usual place of abode, his age, height, complexion, and any other circumstances or peculiarity descriptive of his person, and his employment during the three years preceding, and he shall also produce satisfactory certificates of character.

VI. The Company shall examine and enquire into the skill, ability, and character of any person who shall offer himself to be admitted as a Pilot for the Harbours, and within the Pilotage limits, by such ways and means as to them shall seem proper, and if upon such enquiry the person offering himself as a Pilot shall be approved of, a licence may be granted, certifying that such person is duly qualified to act as Pilot within the Pilotage limits, which licence shall be subscribed by two Directors of the Company and the Secretary of the Company, and shall be sealed with the common seal of the Company, provided always that no person shall be appointed Pilot of the said limits unless he shall at least have been three years regularly engaged as Fisherman or Sailor at or frequenting the said Harbours; and the Company, by granting such licence or certificate to any Pilot, shall not be responsible for any accident, damage, or loss sustained, by any vessel, cargo, or person, by or through the inadvertence, negligence, or wilful act of the Pilot so licensed by them, provided that nothing herein contained shall exempt the Harbours from the provisions of any existing or future general Act of Parliament relating to Pilots.

VII. Every person shall, on his first admission as a Pilot, pay for his first licence the sum of 10s. 6d. (ten shillings and sixpence), and for every renewal of the said licence, 5s. (five shillings). Every licence must be renewed annually, but may be recalled as aftermentioned.

VIII. Masters and Mates of vessels may be licensed by the Company, in terms of sections three hundred and forty and three hundred and forty-one of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854." The fees paid by the said Masters and Mates shall be ten shillings and sixpence each upon the granting of certificates, and five shillings upon each renewal thereof, and these fees shall be applied to cover the general expenses connected therewith.

IX. The rates for pilotage services shall be those specified in the table annexed hereto, and must be paid to the Collector of Dues at the Harbour, and to no other person. These rates shall be paid over to the Licensed Pilots by the Collector of Dues, subject to deduction of five per cent. to cover expenses of collection.

X. Any qualified Pilot demanding or receiving, and also any Master offering or paying to any Pilot any other rate in respect to pilotage services, whether greater or less than the rate for the time being demandable by law, shall for each offence incur a penalty not exceeding ten pounds.

XI. The Pilots are required to make themselves thoroughly acquainted with the signals of the Harbour, the Bye-Laws and Regulations thereof, also with the Harbour itself, the berths therein, the channel and fair-way thereof, the flow and ebb of the tides, and every other circumstance connected therewith, essential for the due performance of their duties with safety and dispatch. They must implicitly obey the directions of the Harbour Master, who will have power to see that all the Pilots execute their duties efficiently, and to report to the Company all failures on their part to do so, and all breaches of these Regulations.

XII. Every Pilot shall have a sufficient boat properly found to the satisfaction of the Company and Harbour Master. Every Pilot boat must be distinguished by the characteristics stated in the three hundred and forty-sixth section of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854."

XIII. The Pilots must always be in readiness with their boats fully found and manned, to take charge of any vessel when required. They shall

attend exclusively to the vessel under their charge, until she is berthed, if entering inwards, and so long as their services are required. No Pilot shall leave the vessel under his charge to assist other vessels, except with the consent of the Master, given in cases of great necessity and extreme danger.

XIV. Harbour Pilots, unless they are also Firth Pilots, shall not proceed in search of or board vessels outwith the limits, as defined in Article I hereof.

XV. All Pilots must observe strict sobriety and civility in discharge of their duties, and when a Pilot shall fail to observe or commit any breach of the Regulations, or shall discharge his duties insufficiently, or shall use improper language to any of the Harbour Officials while in discharge of their duties, or shall refuse to take the charge of any vessel upon a proper signal being made, or a gun fired by any vessel inward bound, or upon the application of the Master, Owner, or Agent of any vessel outward bound, or shall fail to attend before any of the Company's Officers, to answer for any misconduct, such an offender shall be punished by temporary suspension or permanent deprivation of licence, or by the infliction of a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds, recoverable in terms of section three hundred and thirty-two of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854." The Company will also enforce the provisions of the three hundred and sixty-fifth, three hundred and sixty-sixth, and three hundred and sixty-seventh sections of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," against any Pilot committing any of the offences therein mentioned. Persons having cause of complaint against any Pilot, are requested to communicate the same, in writing, to the Harbour Master.

XVI. The Master of all vessels desiring the services of a Harbour Pilot shall display and keep flying the usual signal for a Pilot, and shall, by all means consistent with safety, facilitate the getting on board of the first duly qualified Pilot who arrives at his vessel in answer to said signal.

XVII. The Master of every vessel employing a Pilot shall sign and deliver, if so requested, to the Pilot in charge of his vessel, a certificate, stating the registered tonnage and draught of water of his vessel. In case of refusal, or making a false declaration, the Master shall incur a penalty for every such offence not exceeding double the amount of Pilotage.

XVIII. Vessels bound for the Harbour, and requiring a Pilot, must, if necessary, heave to in the roads until a Harbour Pilot is obtained, and vessels waiting for the tide shall be so placed as to be ready to come in immediately on the proper signal being given.

XIX. Vessels not entering the Harbour, but merely passing through the Pilotage limits, shall not be bound to employ a Harbour Pilot. If a vessel bound to Leven or Methil for orders is brought to anchor within the Harbour limits by a Firth Pilot—not licensed as a Harbour Pilot—such Pilot shall be entitled to stay by such ship until orders are obtained, when, if such ship is to proceed to another port, he shall be entitled to take her away; but if she receive orders to unload, or enter the Harbour, he shall cease to act as Pilot, and the Pilotage, if any, shall be undertaken by a Harbour Pilot.

XX. Ship Masters are directed to apply at least four hours before high-water, at the Harbour Master's Office, for Pilots, previous to sailing.

XXI. The Harbour Master shall have power to direct the attendance of a sufficient number of Pilots at his office four hours before high-water,

so that they may be in readiness to perform the pilotage duties required.

XXII. The Harbour Master has power to give directions to Pilots, and to order them to take charge of any vessel when wanted.

XXIII. On arrival, vessels must be moored or berthed as ordered by the Harbour Master or his assistants, and Pilots who may be in charge of vessels must comply with such orders before their pilotage is considered to be due.

XXIV. All numbers, whether of money or tonnage of vessels, shall be stated by Masters of vessels and others in words, and not in figures.

Extra Attendance.

For each twenty-four hours' Extra Attendance on board when requested by the Master, the charge to the Master Pilot shall be six shillings, and to each of the boatmen, three shillings and six pence.

For Extra Attendance, not exceeding twelve hours, when requested by Ship Masters (other than Piloting), to the Master Pilot, three shillings, and to each of the boatmen, one shilling and six pence.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the first and second years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and seven; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twelfth day of December, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the first and second years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and seven; of the Act of the second and third years of Your Majesty chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter fifty-five have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a district

chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Peter Allerton situate within the limits of the district parish of Wilsden-cum-Allerton in the county of York and in the diocese of Ripon.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Peter Allerton situate as aforesaid.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend William Boyd Bishop of the said diocese of Ripon and with the consent of the Reverend William Noblet, Clerk in Holy Orders, the vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said district parish of Wilsden-cum-Allerton (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent, that it would in our opinion be expedient that all that part of the said district parish of Wilsden-cum-Allerton which is described in the schedule hereunder written all which part together with the boundaries thereof is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Peter Allerton situate as aforesaid and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Peter Allerton.'

"And with the like consent of the said William Boyd Bishop of the said diocese of Ripon, and of the said William Noblet (testified as aforesaid) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published and that marriages baptisms churchings and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint Peter Allerton situate as aforesaid and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being Provided always that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Peter, Allerton, being:—

"All that part of the district parish of Wilsden-cum-Allerton in the county of York and in the diocese of Ripon which is bounded upon the south partly by the new parish of Saint James Thornton partly by the new parish of Saint John Clayton and partly by the new parish of Great Horton, all in the county and diocese aforesaid, upon the north-east partly by the new parish of Saint Philip Gillington and partly by the new parish of Saint Barnabas Heaton both in the county and diocese aforesaid, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the north and upon the west, by an imaginary line, commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Barnabas Heaton from the district parish of Wilsden-cum-Allerton, at a point at Swain Royd-lane Bottom, in the middle of Swain Royd-lane near to its junction with Stony-lane and with Sandy-lane and extending

Ex parte the Master and Fellows of the Great Hall of the University commonly called University College in Oxford.

A STATUTE to amend Statute iii § 22 framed by the Commissioners appointed under the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act 1877 (40 and 41 Victoria chapter 48) in relation to the College of the Great Hall of the University commonly called University College in the University of Oxford duly made at an Extraordinary General Meeting of the Master and Fellows being the Governing Body of the said College specially summoned for this purpose held on the thirtieth day of November one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine and passed at such Meeting by the unanimous votes of those present and voting and submitted for the approval of Her Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by Statute iii § 12 (a.) such number of Fellows (not exceeding seven) as the Master and Fellows shall from time to time determine who shall reside and serve the College in one or both of the offices of Prælector and Tutor are entitled to hold their Fellowships during such residence and service in College and by Statute iii § 22 the sum of one hundred pounds per annum payable from the Corporate Revenues of the College is attached to the office of Tutors or Prælectors holding their Fellowships under the provisions of the above-named Statute iii § 12 a.

And whereas the Corporate Revenues of the College are now and are likely to continue to be insufficient to do more than meet the ordinary expenses of the College and the charges laid upon them by the Statutes, and the College is therefore debarred from appointing to such Tutorial

Fellowships as are contemplated by Statute iii, 12 a, and 11 a.

And whereas it is highly desirable that the College should be able to elect or retain as members of the Society able and experienced Teachers as long as they are willing to serve the College.

We the said Master and Fellows do hereby, in exercise of the powers given to us by the 54th section of the said Act and by Statute XI framed by the Commissioners appointed by the said Act in relation to the said College alter and amend Statute iii § 22 by substituting for the words

"In addition to this emolument every Prælector or Tutor holding his Fellowship under the provisions of clause 12 (a) of this Statute shall be entitled to receive out of the Corporate Revenue the annual sum of one hundred pounds free of income tax together with such payment as may be assigned to him out of the Tuition Fund hereinafter-mentioned provided"

"In addition to this emolument every Prælector or Tutor elected under clause 11 (a) or holding his Fellowship under the provisions of clause 12 (a) of this Statute shall be entitled to receive out of the Corporate Revenues such annual sum not exceeding one hundred pounds free of income tax as the Master and Fellows shall from time to time determine in the case of each such Prælector or Tutor together with such payment as may be assigned to him out of the Tuition Fund hereinafter mentioned; Provided that in fixing and from time to time varying such annual sum the Master and Fellows shall have regard both to the merits of each particular case and to the state of the corporate revenues for the time being: Provided also."

Voting papers may be delivered to the Returning Officer, if there should be a default in the collection, before noon on the 12th day of April, 1890.

The casting up of the votes shall commence on the 12th day of April, 1890.

ARTICLE 2.—The Returning Officer shall make his Certificate with respect to the Election on the 12th day of April, 1890, or as soon after such date as may be practicable.

ARTICLE 3.—The Unions and Separate Parishes herein referred to are those of the Unions and Separate Parishes named in the Schedules to the above-cited General Order of the Twenty-ninth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, in which an annual or triennial Election of Guardians will take place in the current year; and also any new Union to which the provisions of the above-cited General Orders may have been or may be applied for the purpose of an Election of Guardians in the months of March and April in the current year.
