WHEREAS by "The Coinage Act 1889" it is enacted as follows:—

"Any gold coin of the realm coined before the reign of Her present Majesty which is below the least current weight as provided by the Coinage Act 1870 may within the time and in the manner from time to time directed by Her Majesty the Queen in Council, be tendered for exchange, and if it has not been illegally dealt with, shall (notwithstanding anything in section seven of the Coinage Act 1870) be exchanged or paid for by or on behalf of the Mint at its nominal value."

"For the purpose of this Act a gold coin shall be deemed to have been illegally dealt with where the coin has been impaired, diminished or lightened otherwise than by fair wear and tear, or has been defaced by having any name, word, device, or number stamped thereon, whether the coin has or has not been thereby diminished or lightened."

And whereas it is expedient to determine the time and manner of tendering coins for exchange in pursuance of the said Act in Her Majesty's Australasian Colonies.

Now therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, in pursuance of the said Act and of all other powers enabling Her Majesty in this behalf, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. The time within which any coins mentioned in section one of the Coinage Act 1889 may be tendered for exchange in Her Majesty's Australasian Colonies shall be on or before the thirtieth day of April one thousand eight hundred and ninety.

2. The manner in which any coins mentioned in the Coinage Act 1889 may be tendered in Her Majesty's Australasian Colonies with a view to

being exchanged or paid for at their nominal value shall be as follows namely:—

The same may be tendered during business hours at the branch of Her Majesty's Royal Mint at Sydney or at the branch of Her Majesty's Royal Mint at Melbourne, and shall be left there for such time prior to the exchange or payment as may be reasonably necessary for examination and weighing in order to ascertain whether any coin has been illegally dealt with within the meaning of the said Act.

And the Master of Her Majesty's Royal Mint is hereby directed to carry into effect the provisions of the said Act for exchanging or paying for at their nominal value all such coins as are so tendered and have not been illegally dealt with.

Now therefore Her Majesty doth hereby, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, order, direct, and declare that, on and after the first day of April, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety, the second part of the Medical Act 1886 shall be deemed to apply to the Colony of Victoria in Australia.

WHEREAS in accordance with the Bishops' Resignation Act, 1869, and the Act 38 Vic. c. 19, intituled "An Act for making perpetual the Bishops' Resignation Act, 1869," a representation has been made to Her Majesty by the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Edward White, by Divine Providence Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, Primate of all England and Metropolitan at the instance of the Right Reverend Thomas Legh, by Divine permission Lord Bishop of Saint Albans being a Bishop of and within the province of Canterbury, that the said Bishop is desirous of resigning his Bishopric by reason that he is incapacitated by age and permanent physical infirmity from the due performance of his duties as Bishop.

And whereas Her Majesty is satisfied of such incapacity, and that the said Bishop has canonically resigned.

And whereas it has also been made to appear to Her Majesty that the said Bishop is of great age and has served for many years as a Bishop of the said province successively of the Sees of Rochester and Saint Albans and that the said Bishop is desirous of occupying the episcopal residence at Danbury now occupied by him during his life and that the said house of residence with the chapel and other buildings occupied therewith is now insured against loss or damage by fire with the Sun Assurance Company of London in the sum of ten thousand pounds and whereas the said Bishop has undertaken and agreed and promised that so long as he shall continue to occupy the said house of residence that he will keep on foot an insurance of the said house and buildings to the amount of ten thousand pounds by duly paying the premium or premiums due and to become due on the policy or policies thereof or any other policies which may be necessary to effect such insurance with the said Company or some other insurance company, to be approved of by the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England and that he will pay over all sums received under such insurance to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in trust to be applied to the re-instatement of the said residence and also (in addition to any dilapidations which may be payable by him the said Bishop his executors or administrators in respect of his past occupation) that he and his executors and administrators shall continue liable for and shall pay the dilapidations and sums in the nature of dilapidations on the said house of residence and all buildings occupied therewith so long as his occupation of the same shall continue or which shall happen during such occupation. And whereas the said matters and the said agreement undertaking and promises appear to Her Majesty to be special grounds for assigning the said residence to the said Bishop for his residence during his life :—

Now therefore Her Majesty by and with the advice of Her Privy Council is pleased to and hereby does declare the said Bishopric of Saint Albans to be vacant.

And Her Majesty by and with the like advice is pleased to and hereby in consideration of the special grounds and of the promises aforesaid doth assign to the said Bishop for his residence during his life the episcopal residence aforesaid hitherto occupied by him :

And Her Majesty by and with the like advice is pleased to and hereby doth direct that this Order be forthwith duly registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Saint Albans.

WHEREAS by Orders in Council made by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty on the twelfth February, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, twenty-seventh June, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, ninth December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, and fifteenth July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, Her Majesty did, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, order, among other matters, that a Lower Division of the Civil Service should be constituted, to consist of Men Clerks

and Boy Clerks engaged to serve in any Department of the State to which they might from time to time be appointed or transferred; that the salaries of Men Clerks in the Lower Division should commence at eighty pounds and should rise by triennial increments of fifteen pounds to two hundred pounds; but that in any office where a regular attendance of seven hours a day was required the commencing salary might be ninety-five pounds and the maximum salary might be two hundred and fifty pounds.

And whereas by an Order in Council dated the twenty-eighth May, one thousand eight hundred and eight-nine, it was provided that Men Clerks appointed after the date of that Order should give a regular attendance of not less than seven hours a day and that the salaries of such Men Clerks should commence at seventy pounds per annum.

And whereas it appears that certain Men Copyists were approved by the Commissioners of the Treasury before the twenty-eighth May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, for appointment to Men Clerkships under Clause twelve of the Order in Council of the twelfth February one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, but did not receive certificates of qualification from the Civil Service Commissioners before the twenty-eighth May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine.

Now therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order and it is hereby ordered as follows:—

Any Copyist who was approved by the Commissioners of the Treasury before the twenty-eighth May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, for appointment to a Man Clerkship of the Lower Division under Clause twelve of the Order in Council of the twelfth February, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, shall commence his service as a Man Clerk of such Lower Division at the minimum rate of salary in force for such Men Clerks before the twenty-eighth May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, and shall rise by such increments to such sums as may hereafter be fixed for such Lower Division by Order in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the session of Parliament holden in the seventh and eighth years of Her Majesty's reign intitled "An Act to amend the Law respecting the Office of County Coroner" it is (amongst other things) enacted that when and as often as it shall seem expedient to the Justices of any county that such county should be divided into two or more districts for the purposes of that Act, or that any alterations should be made of any division theretofore made under that Act, it shall be lawful for the said Justices in General or Quarter Sessions assembled to resolve that a petition shall be presented to Her Majesty praying that such division, or alteration, be made; and thereupon to adjourn the further consideration of such petition until notice thereof shall be given to the Coroner or Coroners of such county as in that Act hereinafter provided, and that the Clerk of the Peace shall give notice of any such resolution to every Coroner for such county, and of the time when the petition will be taken by the said Justices into consideration and the Justices shall confer with every such Coroner who shall attend

the meeting of the Justices for that purpose touching such petition having due regard to the size and nature of each proposed district, the number of inhabitants, the nature of their employment, and such other circumstances as shall appear to the Justices fit to be considered in carrying into execution the provisions of that Act, and that such petition, with a description of the several proposed districts and of the boundaries thereof, with the reasons upon which the petition is founded, shall be certified to Her Majesty under the hands and seals of two or more of the Justices present when such petition shall be agreed to, and the Clerk of the Peace for such county shall forthwith give or send a proper copy of such petition certified under his hand to every Coroner for such county, and that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, if She shall think fit, with the advice of Her Privy Council, after taking into consideration any such petition, and also any petition which may be presented to Her by any Coroner of the same county concerning such proposed division or alteration, or whenever it shall seem fit to Her Majesty to direct the issue of a writ de coronatore eligendo for the purposes of authorizing the election of an additional Coroner above the number of those who have been theretofore customarily elected in such county to order that such county shall be divided into such and so many districts for the purposes of that Act as to Her Majesty, with the advice aforesaid, shall seem expedient, and to give a name to each of such districts, and that every such Order shall be published in the London Gazette:

And whereas by an Order in Council (duly made at a Court holden at Windsor on the twenty-sixth day of September one thousand eight hundred and forty-six) under and in accordance with the said Act the county of Devon was divided into six districts for the purposes of the said Act respectively named the "Honiton District," "Crediton District," "Barnstaple District," "Okehampton District," "Stoke Damorel District," and "Totnes District," and such districts were respectively to comprise the several parishes and places, and have the boundaries in that behalf in the said Order mentioned and set forth:

And whereas previous to, and at the date of, the said Order, and thenceforward until after the coming into operation of the Local Government Act, 1888, the boroughs of Bideford and Dartmouth in the said county respectively were Municipal Boroughs within the meaning of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1835, and the Municipal Corporations Act, 1862, respectively, and a separate Court of Quarter Sessions was at the said times holden in and for each of the said boroughs:

And whereas previous to and at the date of the said Order and since the borough of South Molton in the said county was a Municipal Borough within the meaning of the said two last-mentioned Acts, and since the date of the said Order, and before the passing of the Local Government Act, 1888, Her Majesty was pleased to and did grant that a separate Court of Quarter Sessions be holden in and for the said borough:

And whereas the said boroughs each having a separate Court of Quarter Sessions as aforesaid and each containing, according to the census of one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one a population of less than ten thousand became, under and by virtue of the Local Government Act, 1888, on the first day of April one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, and since have been parts of the county of Devon for all pur-

poses relating to Coroners, and subject to the jurisdiction of the County Coroners :

And whereas the said boroughs have none of them been annexed to any of the Coroners' Districts of the said county :

And whereas, under and by virtue of the Local Government Act, 1888, the powers and business of the Justices of the said county in General or Quarter Sessions assembled in relation to the matters aforesaid have been transferred to the County Council of the said county :

And whereas a petition was, on the twentieth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, presented to Her Majesty by the Devon County Council praying for an alteration of the division of the said county into six districts made as aforesaid under the Act above first mentioned, which said petition, together with a description of the several proposed districts and of the boundaries thereof with the reasons upon which the petition is founded, was duly certified to Her Majesty :

And whereas all the provisions of the hereinbefore firstly recited Act in that behalf have been strictly complied with in relation to the said petition :

And whereas Sidney Hacker, one of the Coroners for the said county, acting for the said "Totnes District," has presented a petition to Her Majesty praying that Her Majesty would be graciously pleased to order that the area of the borough of Dartmouth should be annexed by the said County Council to the said "Totnes District.":

And whereas the other Coroners for the said county have not presented any petition to Her Majesty :

And whereas Her Majesty has, with the advice of Her Privy Council, take into consideration the said petition, and is minded to make such alteration as aforesaid, and also to direct the issue of writs de Coronatore eligendo for the election of three additional Coroners for the said county :

Now therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, direct, and declare, and it is hereby ordered, directed, and declared that :—

1. Writs de Coronatore eligendo for the election of three additional Coroners for the said county shall forthwith be directed to the Devon County Council :

2. From and after the date hereof the county of Devon shall be divided into nine districts for Coroners' purposes, and for the purposes of the said firstly-mentioned Act :

3. The said nine districts shall be named as is in the schedule to this Order directed, and shall respectively comprise the several parishes and places, and have the boundaries prescribed and mentioned in that behalf in the schedule hereto.

4. This Order shall be published in the London Gazette.

“We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting under the provisions of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Your Majesty, chapter ninety-four, of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Your Majesty, chapter ninety-four, and of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Your Majesty, chapter ninety-four, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme or Representation for altering the boundaries of the new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Hammersmith in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London.

“Whereas by the authority of an Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the ninth day of June in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty and published in the London Gazette upon the twelfth day of the same month a part of the parish of Saint Paul Hammersmith in the said county of Middlesex and diocese of London aforesaid was assigned as a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint John the Evangelist situate at Bradmore within the limits of such parish and was called ‘The District Chapelry of Saint John the Evangelist Hammersmith.’

“And whereas the said district chapelry of Saint John the Evangelist Hammersmith has under the provisions of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and four become a new parish of the character contemplated by that Act and by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, and by the above-mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Your Majesty, chapter ninety-four.

“And whereas by an Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the sixteenth day of August in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, and published in the London Gazette on the twentieth day of the same month a portion of the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Hammersmith was severed therefrom and was annexed to and became part of the consolidated chapelry of Saint Simon Hammersmith in the county and diocese aforesaid.

“And whereas it has been represented and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Hammersmith should be further altered in the manner hereinafter-mentioned.

“Now therefore with the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Frederick Bishop of the said Diocese of London (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this Scheme or representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any

Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme or Representation and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Hammersmith shall be altered so that all that portion of the same new parish which is described in the Schedule hereunder written and is delineated or set forth on the map or plan hereunto appended and is thereon coloured pink shall be dissevered from such new parish and shall be restored to and shall in future form part of the said parish of Saint Paul, Hammersmith.

"And we further represent recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore-mentioned Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

"The territory to be dissevered from the new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Hammersmith in the county of Middlesex, and in the diocese of London, and to be restored to the parish of Saint Paul Hammersmith in the same county and diocese, being:—

"All that part of the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Hammersmith which is bounded upon the north by the new parish of Saint Simon Hammersmith in the county and diocese aforesaid, upon the east for a short distance by the new parish of Saint Matthew, Hammersmith in the same county and diocese, and upon the remaining and greater part of the east and upon the south by the parish of Saint Paul Hammersmith aforesaid, and upon the remaining side, that is to say, upon the west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Saint Paul Hammersmith from the new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Hammersmith aforesaid, at a point in the middle of the Broadway opposite to the middle of the northern end of Queen-street and opposite to the Hammersmith Station on the line of the Hammersmith and City Railway, and extending thence, that is, from the said boundary northward for a distance of twenty-five chains or thereabouts through the said railway station and along the middle of the said line of railway to the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist, Hammersmith, from the new parish of Saint Simon, Hammersmith aforesaid."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme or representation have been transmitted to the patrons and to the incumbents of the cures affected by the arrangements which are contemplated by such scheme or representation and such patrons and incumbents have respectively signified their assent thereto.

And whereas the said scheme or representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme or representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular part of the said parochial chapelry of Horbury which is hereinafter mentioned and described should be constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed district any con-

secrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship.

"And whereas the Right Reverend William Walsham Bishop of the said diocese of Wakefield has contributed and paid to the credit of our account at the Bank of England a capital sum of one thousand eight hundred and fifty pounds in aid of an endowment for the minister for the time being of the said district and so soon as the said district shall have become a new parish under the provisions of the hereinbefore secondly mentioned Act then of the incumbent of the said new parish.

"And whereas the Reverend John Sharp the incumbent of the said parochial chapelry of Horbury has contributed and paid to the credit of our account at the Bank of England a capital sum of two thousand one hundred and fifty pounds in further aid of the endowment of the said proposed district or new parish (as the case may be) and of the maintenance of the minister or incumbent thereof for the time being.

"And whereas we have in respect of the two above-mentioned capital sums of money amounting together to four thousand pounds agreed and undertaken to provide and pay by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November in each and every year to such minister or incumbent as aforesaid when duly licensed in accordance with the provisions of the herein secondly mentioned Act the sum of one hundred and twenty pounds in each and every year during which the said capital sums shall continue in our hands.

"And whereas the said sum of four thousand pounds has been so contributed and paid as aforesaid upon the understanding that we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners should out of the common fund created by the firstly herein-mentioned Act grant to the said proposed district or new parish a capital sum of one thousand pounds in respect of which there shall be paid by us to the minister or incumbent for the time being of the said proposed district or new parish (as the case may be when duly licensed as aforesaid a yearly sum of thirty pounds and upon the further understanding and condition that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) the whole right of patronage of the said district or new parish and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereof should be assigned in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas the said grant of one thousand pounds will after the publication in the London Gazette of an Order of Your Majesty in Council

ratifying this scheme be made and secured by an instrument to be executed by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners under our Common Seal in accordance with the provisions of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and eleven.

"And whereas the said John Sharp has with the concurrence of the said William Walsham Bishop of the said diocese of Wakefield nominated to us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners as the persons in whom it is desired that the said right of patronage and nomination should be vested the Right Honourable Charles Lindley Viscount Halifax the Venerable Archdeacon Joshua Ingham Brooke now vicar of the vicarage of Halifax in the said county of York the Reverend Frederick Ralph Grenside Clerk in Holy Orders now rector of the rectory of Thornhill in the same county the Reverend Bernard Moultrie Clerk in Holy Orders of Saint James' College Southleigh in the county of Oxford and Michael Edwin Sanderson Esquire of South Parade Wakefield one of Your Majesty's Justices of the Peace their heirs and assigns for ever.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said William Walsham Bishop of the said diocese of Wakefield (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said parochial chapelry of Horbury which is mentioned and described in the schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth in the map or plan hereunto annexed shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint Mary the Virgin, Horbury Junction.'

"And we further recommend and propose that the whole right of patronage of the said district so recommended to be constituted and so soon as the said district shall have become a new parish as aforesaid then of the said new parish and the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereof shall without any assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid be assigned to and become vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised jointly by the said Charles Lindley, Viscount Halifax Joshua Ingham Brooke Frederick Ralph Grenside Bernard Moultrie and Michael Edwin Sanderson their heirs and assigns for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in conformity with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Saint Mary the Virgin, Horbury Junction, being:—

"All that part of the parochial chapelry of Horbury within the original limits of the parish of Wakefield, in the county of York, and in the diocese of Wakefield, which is bounded upon the south-west by the new parish of Saint Luke, Middlestown, upon the south-east and upon the east by the new parish of Saint James Chapelthorpe, upon the north by the new parish of

Thornes all in the county and diocese aforesaid, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the north-west and upon the west, by an imaginary line, commencing at the point, where the boundaries of the said new parish of Thornes, of the new parish of Saint Michael, Westgate Common, in the county and diocese aforesaid, and of the parochial chapelry of Horbury aforesaid, all meet, in the middle of the Wakefield and Huddersfield-road, at or near to the buildings called or known as the Horbury Dye House and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the said road for a distance of forty-six chains or thereabouts to its junction with Walker-lane and extending thence southward along the middle of the last-named lane for a distance of five chains or thereabouts to its junction with the street called or known as Cluntergate, and extending thence westward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of seven chains or thereabouts to its junction with Cross-street, and extending thence southward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of three and a-half chains or thereabouts to its junction with Back-lane and with the public footpath which leads towards the River Calder and continuing thence first southward and then alternately south-eastward and south-westward along the middle of the said footpath for a distance of thirty-five and a-half chains or thereabouts (thereby following in part the course of a certain occupation-road and crossing the line of the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway) to the junction of the same footpath with the public footpath which extends along the northern bank of the River Calder aforesaid, and leads from Horbury Bridge to Dudfleet Mill, and extending thence in a direction due south and in a straight line for a distance of one chain or thereabouts to the boundary in the middle of the said River Calder which boundary divides the said parochial chapelry of Horbury from the new parish of Saint Luke, Middlestown aforesaid."

And whereas the patron of the said parish of Wakefield and the incumbent of the said parochial chapelry of Horbury have respectively signified their assent to such scheme.

And whereas the Venerable Archdeacon Straton as the vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Wakefield and as such vicar or incumbent, the patron of the said parochial chapelry of Horbury has offered certain objections to the said scheme.

And whereas notwithstanding such objections the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Wakefield.

WHEREAS the Right Honourable Henry Matthews, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has, under the provisions of an Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intitled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial ground should be opened in the under-mentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein with the following modifications, viz. :—

WINTERBORNE SAINT MARTIN.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Winterborne Saint Martin in the county of Dorset.

LUTTON, LONG SUTTON.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Lutton, Long Sutton, in the county of Lincoln; and also in the churchyard except as follows :—

(a.) In such vaults and walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b.) In such reserved grave spaces in the churchyard as have never before been buried in and which when opened are free from water burials may be allowed of so many of the following relations of those interred in the churchyard at the date of the Order, viz. :—widows and widowers, as can be buried at or below the depth of five feet.

LONG EATON.—Forthwith and entirely in Long Eaton Church in the county of Derby; and also in the churchyard except as follows :—

(a.) In such partly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of the Order as can be buried at or below that depth.

(b.) In such reserved grave spaces in the churchyard as have never before been buried in and which when opened are free from water burials may be allowed of so many of the following relations of those interred in the churchyard at the date of the Order, viz. :—widows, widowers, parents and unmarried children, as can be buried at or below the depth of five feet.

GAMLINGAY.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Gamlingay, in the county of Cambridge; and also in the churchyard after the thirty-first of December, one thousand eight hundred and ninety, except as follows :—

In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

CASTLE HEDINGHAM.—Forthwith and entirely

in the parish church of Castle Heddingham, in the county of Essex; and also in the churchyard, except as follows :—

(a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b.) In such partly walled graves and such earthen graves now existing in the churchyard as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of the Order as can be buried at or below that depth.

BERRIEW.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Berriew, in the county of Montgomery, and in the churchyard within twelve feet of any dwelling; and also in the rest of the churchyard after the thirty-first of December, one thousand eight hundred and ninety, except as follows :—

(a.) In such vaults as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b.) In such partly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of the Order as can be buried at or below that depth.

ELMDON.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Elmdon, in the county of Essex; and also in the churchyard, except as follows :—

(a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b.) In such partly walled graves and earthen graves now existing in the churchyard as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of the Order as can be buried at or below that depth.

INGATESTONE.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Ingatestone, in the county of Essex, and in the parts of the churchyard which lie to the west and north-west of the church; and in the rest of the churchyard, except as follows :—

(a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b.) In such earthen graves now existing as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of the Order as can be buried at or below that depth.

(c.) In such reserved grave spaces as have never before been buried in and which when opened are free from water burials may be allowed of so many of the members of the

families to whom they may be allotted as can be buried at or below the depth of five feet.

Also that no interment shall be allowed within thirty-three feet of a dwelling-house.

SAINTE JUST.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Saint Just, in the county of Cornwall; and also in the churchyard after the thirty-first July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety, except as follows:—

In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

GLANOGWEN, LLANLLECHID.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Glanogwen, Llanllechid, in the county of Carnarvon; and in the churchyard except as follows:—

(a.) In such partly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of the Order as can be buried at or below the depth of five feet.

(b.) In such reserved grave spaces in the churchyard as have never before been buried in and which when opened are free from water and remains burials may be allowed of so many members of the families to whom they may be allotted as can be buried at or below the depth of five feet.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the fifth day of May next.

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette; and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation one month before the said fifth day of May. *C. or (as the case may require) that, after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered; provided also that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and vestry clerk or churchwardens of such parish;

And whereas by another Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intitled "An Act further to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England," it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time, to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit:

And whereas the Right Honourable Henry Matthews, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbent and the churchwardens of the parish hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that he is of opinion that the Order of Her Majesty in Council of the thirteenth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, in so far as it affects burials in the parish of Saint Mary Magdalene, Colchester, in the county of Essex, should be varied, and that the following directions should be substituted for those contained in the said Order, with respect to burials in the church and churchyard, of Saint Mary Magdalene, Colchester, viz.:

That burials be discontinued forthwith and entirely in the church of Saint Mary Magdalene, Colchester, in the county of Essex; and also in the churchyard after the thirty-first August, one thousand eight hundred and ninety, except as follows:—

(a.) In such partly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of the Order as can be buried at or below that depth.

(b.) In such earthen graves now existing in the churchyard as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of the Order as can be buried at or below that depth.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is

pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the fifth day of May next :

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette, and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parish affected by such representation, one month before the said fifth day of May. *C. L. Peel.*

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the said Order of the thirteenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, in so far as it affects burials in the said chapel and chapelyard, be read and construed as if the following words had been inserted therein after the words "at or below that depth" in the paragraph above quoted :

"Also except in such part of the chapelyard as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains for the re-interment of such remains as it may be found necessary to remove from the graves in which they are now interred to admit of the enlargement of the chapel." *C.
