DESPATCHES, of which the attached are copies, have been received from Edmund Robert Fremantle, C.B., C.M.G., Commander-in-Chief on the East Indies Station, reporting Operations against Vitu:—

"Boadicea," at Mombasa,

Sir,

1st November, 1890.

The operations against the late Sultanate of Vitu undertaken by the squadron under my command in accordance with the orders of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, in order to inflict punishment for the murder of nine Germans in that territory on the 15th, 16th, and 18th September last, having now been brought to a successful conclusion, I have the honour to make the following detailed report on the subject.

2. It is unnecessary for me to go into any detail with respect to these murders which have been fully reported by Her Majesty's Agent and Consul-General to Her Majesty's Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs; but it is necessary to call attention to the localities in which they took place as being naturally the objective points in any operations which had to be undertaken.

Of the nine murders, seven were effected on the 15th September in or near the town of Vitu, the Germans endeavouring to escape, and being pursued by an infuriated rabble armed in various ways, some with bows and arrows.

On the following day, the eighth, Karl Horn was murdered in cold blood at Mkonumbi, as alleged, by direct order of Fumo Bakari, the Sultan of Vitu, and on the 18th, the ninth, Herr Behnke was murdered on his estate at Baltia under the orders of a local Chief named Bana Heri Mkatna by the inhabitants of the two villages of Hadiskoma and Hadisiggio, his estate being completely burned and destroyed.

3. In accordance with instructions received from Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs and from the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, I agreed with Her Majesty's Agent and Consul-General, Colonel Euan-Smith, on the 14th October, on the course to be followed, which was briefly to summon the Sultan of Vitu to come himself with those implicated in the murders to Lamu, to have a fair trial, and in default that I should lead an expeditionary force to Vitu to inflict all possible adequate punishment.

This proposal having received the approval of Lord Salisbury on the 15th October, and in Admiralty telegrams Nos. 51 and 53, I despatched the "Cossack" to Lamu on the 17th October, following myself in the "Boadicea"

with the Consul-General on the 20th idem.

Our letters\* of the 17th and 19th October to Fumo Bakari and his replies of the 19th and 22nd October are enclosed.

On the 20th October in accordance with instructions received from H.M. Government, I declared martial law\* throughout the Sultanate of Vitu, to take effect from the 21st October.

The Sultan of Vitu's replies being unsatisfactory, and the two days' grace allowed to him expiring on the morning of the 24th October, the contingency had arisen which had been foreseen and stated in the telegram of H.M. Consul-General and myself; and from that date I considered myself justified in commencing active operations.

- 4. The nature and scope of the operations were clearly indicated by the places where murders had been committed, and although the objective point was Vitu, it was important to punish the inhabitants of Mkonumbi and the villages near Baltia.
- 5. Before leaving Zanzibar I had issued orders, engaged porters, and generally arranged for the expedition to Vitu, but although, as will be seen from orders enclosed,† I thought it probable that the advance would be from Kipini, I reserved my final decision till after my arrival at Lamu when I should be in possession of the latest information both as to the enemy, and the assistance the Sultan of Zanzibar's troops could render.
- 6. Having satisfied myself that the Sultan of Vitu had concentrated all the force at his disposal at Vitu, where he was stated to have numbers variously estimated at from 3,300 to 8,800 fighting men, while he did not appear to be prepared for an attack on the Coast towns, I determined on the evening of the 23rd October on sending expeditions to the villages of Mkonumbi, and those near Baltia on the following morning.
- 7. Both these places were situated up tidal creeks some 15 miles from where we were lying, off the entrance to Lamu, and fortunately it was high water at 2 p.m.

The attack on Mkonumbi I entrusted to Captain the Hon. A. G. Curzon-Howe, commanding my flagship, with the boats of H.M.S. "Boadicea;" and that on the villages near Baltia to Commander John Mackenzie McQuhae commanding H.M.S. "Cossack," with the boats of that ship and those of the "Brisk," which ship had arrived off Lamu early on the 24th October. orders, and the reports of the Officers in command are enclosed.

Both Captain the Hon. A.G. Curzon-Howe and Commander McQuhae carried out my orders with thorough success, showing skill and judgment in the prevention of any accident: in both cases some opposition was encountered, especially at Mkonumbi, where several of the Sultan's soldiers were seen; but we escaped all loss, and the expeditions returned to their respective ships late on the 24th October.

- 8. These operations having been brought to a successful conclusion, I felt free to devote myself to the expedition to Vitu itself, to which I will now returń.
- 9. The plan of operations which I formed at Lamu after procuring information and conferring with the Lewali of Lamu, Saood Bin Mahomed, was as follows:-

The main body consisting of about 700 Bluejackets and Marines with 4 7-pr. guns and 4 machine guns, under my command, was to advance on Vitu from Kipini, a distance of about 14 miles. A column of 600 men, composed, as per footnote, under Captain William H. Henderson, of H.M.S. "Conquest," to be sent about 15 miles up the Ozy River to Kau, which I believed to be only 7 miles from Vitu, to advance simultaneously with the main column.

At the request of H.M. Consul-General the 200 troops from Zanzibar had been sent up to Lamu by His Highness the Sultan some days previously, and on the morning of the 23rd, these men and 200 Kirabotos were to have embarked in the "Somali" and "Cossack."

50 Bluejackets, 150 Indian Police, 200 Sultan of Zanzibar's Troops, 200 Kirabotos, or Sultan's

Irregulars from Lamu.

I decided in consequence of this disaffection on advancing by Kipini only, and I ordered the 200 Zanzibar troops to embark in the "Cossack." Her Majesty's Consul General arranged with my approval for 100 of these men to act as porters, and the remainder I proposed to employ to garrison ports.

My available force now consisted of 950 fighting men, as per footnote,\* and I decided to garrison Kau with 100 men, as per footnote,† the Officer in command having orders to reconnoitre towards Vitu in order to create a diversion and arrest fugitives. This, Lieutenant N. A. H. Budd, Bombay Staff Corps, who was in command, effectually did on the 27th inst., assisted by a small flotilla of boats under Commander Fleet (N.) of the "Boadicea."

The remaining 50 Zanzibar troops I made use of to protect the case at Kipini, leaving 800 men ‡ available for the advance on Vitu.

10. Before leaving Zanzibar I had directed Captain Henderson with H.M.S. "Conquest," "Kingfisher," and "Redbreast" to arrive at Kipini on the evening of the 23rd, and Kipini being in the British East Africa Company's sphere, and presumably friendly, he was to examine and survey the bar, to find suitable anchorages and a good landing-place for boats and stores, and if he considered it prudent to do so, he was to form a depôt of water a few miles towards Vitu. Owing, however, to information received of the probability of our being attacked soon after landing, I sent the hired transport "Somali" to direct Captain Henderson not to advance beyond Kipini before my arrival.

At Zanzibar I left Captain Brackenbury with orders to remain till the 23rd in the "Turquoise" and to come to Kipini with his own ship and the "Humber," the latter to bring all available porters which could be procured.

11. As in most African expeditions the question of porters was the greatest difficulty. We wanted at least 400, and though His Highness the Sultan promised, at the request of Her Majesty's Consul-General, to meet our requirements, there was such a natural disinclination to take part in an expedition of which they exaggerated the dangers, that only a few could be procured.

This difficulty was eventually overcome in various ways. I gave leave to ships to enter more Seedies, which Captain Brackenbury subsequently made still more general; but our great reliance was on Mr. Martin, the well-known experienced caravan leader, who was fortunately at Zanzibar engaging porters for the Imperial British East Africa Company, who most zealously and loyally offered his valuable assistance, if the Administrator-General would allow of his doing so. This was willingly granted, Sir Francis de Winton lending the services of the Company's steamer "Juba" and the little steamship "Henry Wright," which were both at Zanzibar, as well as every available porter from Mombasa.

Eventually over 300 porters were thus engaged, mostly at Mombasa, and sent on to Kipini, the "Juba" also bringing the contingent of 150 Indian Police under Captain Smith, 1st Life Guards, to the base. So far as circumstances would allow, all the Seedies and porters were organised by the unremitting exertions of Captain the Hon. A. G. Curzon-Howe and Mr. Martin, amd I felt no further apprehension on this score.

12. Before noon on the 25th October, all my force had reached Kipini. consisting of H.M.S. "Boadicea," "Turquoise," "Conquest," "Cossack," "Brisk," "Kingfisher," "Redbreast," "Pigeon," and "Humber," with the "Somali" and "Juba."

Captain Henderson had already landed with parties from the "Conquest," "Kingfisher," and "Redbreast," and in the afternoon Commander Montgomerie, with the guns and machine guns, landed, carrying out my orders to advance and form a zareba a few miles out from Kipini.

Owing to the shoal water necessitating the "Boadicea" lying 5 miles out from the landing-place, and a bar which was dangerous at times, and impassable at low water, the disembarkation, and subsequent re-embarkation occupied some time, but the arrangements made worked satisfactorily; Captain Brackenbury who was in general charge on the beach, relieved at times by Captain Henderson, was indefatigable.

The zareba with a good store of water was occupied before night fall.

13. The position of this zareba is shown on the accompanying chart.\* had every confidence that Commander Montgomerie, from his previous experience in the Soudan and his general character, was fully capable of holding his own and repulsing the enemy with the force under his command, consisting of 400 men, if necessary, though I scarcely expected any serious attack at such a distance from Vitu; every precaution was however taken. His report of the attack which was made upon him that evening at about 11 p.m. is enclosed and speaks for itself.† The enemy appear to have advanced with some boldness and determination, and I have little doubt were severely punished: they carried off their dead and wounded, but frequent marks of blood on the road showed that they had suffered considerable loss. Our casualties of three wounded are shown in the return of Fleet-Surgeon Martin of the "Boadicea," who acted as Principal Medical Officer of the expedition.

14. Before daylight on the morning of the 25th October, I landed with the remainder of the force and the advance on Vitu commenced. The enclosed

chart shows fairly our route and is pretty accurate.‡

The country we had to march through was as favourable as we could expect, and though the work of dragging guns along bush paths and occasionally through very high grass under a burning sun was very trying, no great difficulties were experienced. For more than a mile from Kipini we had to march through heavy sand with high scrub on either side; thence for about a mile along a level plain which forms a marsh at high water, spring tides, and after heavy rains; thence through a grassy country interspersed with occasional palm trees for two miles; then the clumps of bush got thicker and grass higher, until the 2nd zareba, which I called "Water Camp," was reached, 7½ miles from Kipini. From Water Camp to the 3rd zareba or "Karibu (near) Camp," 31 miles, the grass was higher, being in places over men's heads, making marching more difficult. From the 3rd zareba to Vitu, 3 miles, about half of which was a similar country, but rather more open and hilly, with swampy places in wet weather, till, from a hill rather more than a mile from Vitu, the plain in which the town is situated opened, looking down across which the thick bush with some fine trees, in which the town itself was situated, came into full view.

There is a hill some 1,200 yards to the east of the town commanding the entrance to the bush, about 60 yards within which lies the southern gate which is built of stout poles crossed, the entrance being entirely closed up when the place was assaulted. The plan attached shows that there are two gates, one for the Mkonumbi Road, and one for that from Kipini. The bush is extraordinarily thick all round the town and has innumerable bush paths, but towards Kipini Road it has little depth, and the space between the gate and the entrance in the bush could be easily shelled.

The whole distance I put at 14 miles, viz.,

15. The advance was made with one Company in skirmishing order in front, with two flanking companies, this order being maintained during the whole of the advance until nearing Vitu. Halts were made every hour, but after marching some miles, it being a very hot day, the men were getting much exhausted; our guides, furnished by the Lewali, were not reliable; and

as some porters had been found to be starting water to ease their loads, the prospect was not cheering. At 10, I halted, hoping to find water, which, after some fruitless endeavours, was fortunately discovered close to, and a convoy of provisions coming up, I pushed on at 2 p.m., leaving Commander Winsloe with 50 Blue-jackets and two machine guns in charge of the camp, with orders to form a zareba. At about 4-30, having reached a spot suitable for a zareba, and, as I hoped, well within striking distance of Vitu, I decided to halt for the night, water having been found close to.

16. A few shots had been fired ahead just as we halted, and I had sent my Orderly Officer, Sub-Lieutenant Ogilvie, forward to communicate with those in front, Captain Smith, 1st Life Guards, with a few Askaris, Commander McQuhae, who acted as Quartermaster-General and led the advance, and Captain Curzon, who had pushed on looking for water; and it was evident that we were being watched, but I ordered the zareba to be commenced, out-

posts and sentries being posted for some distance round.

Very shortly afterwards some of the Indian Police on outpost duty on the right were driven in, and a considerable force of the enemy were observed creeping towards the camp on the right and centre. Leaving two companies of Marines to defend the camp and guard the baggage, I turned the remainder of the force out, the Indians being on the extreme right, the Marines right and centre, the Blue-jackets on the centre and left. Tired as they were, all turned out with the greatest spirit and attacked the enemy, skirmishing in sections; for about half an hour there was quite a smart fire, when they gave way in all directions, being apparently surprised at the brisk offensive action on our part.

The attack was principally delivered on the right and centre, along the Vitu Road. Being myself on the right, I was struck with the cool conduct of the Marines under Lieut.-Colonel Poole and Lieutenant Lalor, R.M.L.I., a considerable body of the enemy being at one time in front of them at less than 200 yards. On the centre, where Captain Curzon had gone to observe the attacking force, he found himself in a gap in the line, and for some minutes was much exposed till a company of Blue-jackets, under Lieutenant Walker of the "Boadicea," came up in support, but in this part of the field I am told that the enemy were even in greater force than further to the right, and it is

certain that the attack lasted longer on that side.

Feeling sure that it was the best policy to push the enemy smartly, I acted on this principle, without losing time in making special dispositions; the result was satisfactory, for the enemy was dispersed, carrying away several dead, and the zareba was not attacked during the night.

17. At 6-30 a.m. on the 27th October, leaving the zareba in charge of Mr. Newman, Gunner of the "Kingfisher," who had been affected by the sun the previous day, with 12 Bluejackets and 30 Indian Police, I advanced with the

remainder of the force on Vitu.

About one mile from the camp the enemy were reported in considerable force and the advance proceeded with caution, a desultory fire gradually developing itself from the right centre round to the left. There was some rising ground on the right, which I hoped commanded the town, towards which I ordered the guns to advance, which they did, covered by two companies of Bluejackets under Lieutenant Wm. Ainger, 1st Lieutenant of the "Turquoise," with Marines in reserve, a portion of the latter acting as rear guard in charge of the baggage, as I feared a stampede among our numerous porters who, however, behaved very well, not dropping a load.

There was some sharp skirmishing on the centre and left, the left companies being under the command of Lieutenant Jerrom of the "Conquest" with Lieutenant Hewett, both of whom directed their men admirably, and as we advanced, the plain in which Vitu stands opened, and many of the enemy

fell as they fled across it.

It was then about 8-30 a.m., and thinking that the enemy would make a stand at the town, I recalled the skirmishers and formed for the attack, the position of the entrance being pointed out to me by Mr. Menschel, one of the Germans who had accompanied us.

Commander Montgomerie was directed to take 3 guns on to a hill on the right, whence the bush was commanded, two machine guns under command of

Lieutenant Winter of the "Kingfisher" being pushed on further, supported by some Indians, so as to command, if possible, the road to Mkonumbi.

The force then advanced, Marines with one gun to force the gate, rocket and guncotton party in the centre,  $2\frac{1}{2}$  companies formed of Bluejackets or Indians on each flank, one half-company skirmishing, the remainder as supports and reserves, my intention being to advance the Bluejackets in the

bush while the Marines attacked the gate.

As we advanced across the plain, Commander Montgomerie threw several shell and rockets with good effect towards the entrance, and on arriving near two shots were fired at close quarters at the gate from the 7-pr. with the Marines, but there was no response, and Mr. Jennings, Gunner (T.) in charge of the gun-cotton party of the "Boadicea" was directed to run in and blow up the formidable obstruction which barred the entrance; this he did very gallantly; a few seconds afterwards the gate blew up, forming a cloud of dust, seeing which I sounded the advance and our men rushed in, meeting with no opposition.

I directed the Indian Police with the machine guns to endeavour to fellow the enemy towards Katawa, a village at some hours' distance, where it was thought Fumo Bakari would escape, which was done for a few miles: the Indians were not able to advance alone, our men were too exhausted to

pursue, and I was forced to recall them.

18. The town was found quite deserted, except by one or two wounded

men, but evidently had been very recently occupied.

On reaching the Sultan's Palace very soon after the town was taken, I found some articles of value—a tusk, a handsome gun (a present from the German Emperor), the German Emperor's portrait, the Sultan's state chair, and a good many guns, chiefly trade guns, besides some papers and a magazine full of powder.

Putting sentries on the Palace and magazine, I then walked round the town with Captain the Hon. A. G. Curzon-Howe, who was acting as my Chief of the Staff, and I decided on destroying it at once, commencing the work of

destruction to the north.

Very shortly afterwards flames were observed in several places to windward (W. and S.W.) of the Palace and magazine, and I was obliged to order everyone out of the town. The most valuable articles and all papers were, however, saved.

After the fire had burnt itself down we again entered the town, and the Sultan's Palace was blown up by the gun-cotton party, the work of destruction being completed by a fortunate find of a reserve magazine of powder in the bush.

After bivouacking outside the town until 3 p.m., the force retired to

Karibu Camp for the night.

Before leaving Vitu I again examined the ruins, which were complete, and Mr. Vice-Consul Berkeley and Mr. Charles Woolley, Assistant-Paymaster, my secretary's clerk, who were on my Staff, affixed proclamations,\* in Arabic and Swahili, offering ten thousand rupees (Rs. 10,000) for the apprehension of Fumo Bakari, to trees and posts which had escaped the conflagration.

19. Altogether our loss is shown by the returns of Fleet-Surgeon Martin, who acted as P.M.O. to the Expedition, to amount to only twelve wounded in the three actions, this small loss being undoubtedly due to the bad firing of

the enemy.

Dr. Martin's report is enclosed.

The enemy's loss I estimate as between 50 and 100.

We had probably not more than 800 opposed to us at any one time, and I doubt if those who attacked Commander Montgomerie were the same who engaged us nearer Vitu, but the enclosed reports! and estimates of the force of Fumo Bakari show that his numbers were considerable, and I am convinced that had any check occurred we should have seen 3,000 or 4,000 men ready to oppose us.

20. In referring to the success of the Expedition, I feel that much is due to the determined energy and spirit with which the enemy was met on every occasion, and the care taken by all the principal Officers not to allow them-

selves to be taken at a disadvantage.

21. The return journey requires little remark. We were not molested in any way, and I reached the ship on the afternoon of the 28th October. was blowing very fresh, and the bar, being dangerous that day, delayed the embarkation of men and stores somewhat, and the Kau garrison had to be withdrawn; by 2 p.m. on the 30th everything had been re-embarked except a detachment of 50 Indians, left by the Company at Kipini, and the ships sailed for their several destinations, the Sultan's Zanzibar troops returning to Zanzibar in H.M.S. "Humber."

22. The whole operations, including the boat attacks on Mkonumbi and Baltia lasted less than a week, having been begun on the 24th, and concluded

on the 30th October.

23. In a General Memorandum, I expressed my thanks specially to Sir Francis de Winton, the Administrator-General of the Imperial East Africa Company (British), for his liberal assistance both with the Indian Police and with porters. Captain Smith, 1st Life Guards, who commanded the former, was indefatigable in his exertions, and he was able to furnish me with useful scouts and messengers. I have referred before to Mr. Martin's services to the expedition; he zealously and loyally assisted, and his practised tact in dealing with porters was simply invaluable. I trust that the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty will give him some reward in recognition of his good work.

His Highness the Sultan of Zanzibar kindly assisted us with horses and donkeys, as well as with the Zanzibar troops, and the Lewali of Lamu, Sacod Bin Mahomed, being unable to come himself, sent the Lewali of Faza, Abdallah Bin Sultan, to represent him, who accompanied us to Vitu, furnished guides,

and was generally useful, as setting an example to other Mahomedans.

To Colonel Euan-Smith, H.M. Agent and Consul-General, the force is much indebted in various ways, especially for his knowledge of the country

24. It remains for me to refer specially to the numerous Officers of the Royal Navy and Royal Marines who so loyally assisted me in the operations, a task of some difficulty, as where all worked zealously and well it is difficult to

Captain the Hon. A. G. Curzon-Howe, my Flag Captain, performed the duties of Chief of the Staff with great ability, being untiring in his exertions at all times. I am indebted to him for his careful and painstaking organisation beforehand, his prescience and forethought, and his energy and dash in the field.

Captain J. W. Brackenbury, C.B., C.M.G., who was at the base, and in general charge during my absence, sustained his previous character as a most capable and zealous officer, working heart and soul for the success of the Expedition. Forced, by the distance of the ships from the shore and the various requirements afloat, to be a good deal away from the beach, his place was ably filled by Capt. W. H. Henderson, who was untiring and unsparing in his exertions to ensure all wants being supplied.

Fleet-Surgeon Martin, as Principal Medical Officer, marched the whole way, and was unremitting in his attention to the sick. In his report, the speaks highly of the Staff-Surgeon and Surgeons who assisted him.

Staff-Paymaster F. R. C. Whiddon in charge of the Commissariat, showed great capacity in the arrangement for the supply of provisions, and I felt confident that there would be no failure on his part in having everything in readiness that might be required at the front.

Lieutenant Arthur H. D. Ravenhill of H.M.S. "Cossack," in charge of the transport, and Messrs. William F. Pamphlett and William H. Pallett. Engineers, in charge of the water supply, had important duties to perform,

and carried them out with zeal and ability.

All the officers in command, Lieut.-Colonel Edwin Poole, R.M.L.I., Commander Alexr. M. Gardiner, commanding the Infantry Brigade, Commander Robert A. J. Montgomerie, commanding the Field Battery, showed themselves able and efficient Officers.

Lieutenant William Ainger, First Lieutenant of H.M.S. "Turquoise," in charge of the 1st Battalion of Seamen, and Lieutenant Thomas H. M. Jerrom, in charge of the 2nd, both did well, and I would specially recommend

Lieutenant Ainger, as a deserving Officer of long standing, whose name I

have previously brought forward for promotion.

I feel bound to mention specially Lieutenant Walter C. Slater (T) in command of the Field Guns, and Lieutenants Edward M. Hewett and Allen T. Hunt, Royal Navy, and Lieutenant James N. Lalor, R.M.L.I., as efficient Company Officers.

In Commander Winsloe, I had a trustworthy Officer, in command of an

important post.

Commander John M. McQuhae, who acted as Quartermaster-General, led the advance with great determination and energy, proving himself a most valuable Staff Officer.

Lieutenant and Commander Francis W. Keary, who was on my Staff as Intelligence Officer, was of great assistance to me, from his typographical knowledge, and attention to every detail.

Lieutenant Reginald G. O. Tupper (G) was most zealous, always to the

front, and regulating every movement.

The services of Commander Fleet (N), and Lieutenant Thomas F. C.

Dundas (N), on the beach, are specially deserving of mention.

Lieutenant and Commander Henry R. P. Floyd, in command of the "Pigeon," was of great service in running despatches, although with a much reduced crew.

Mr. Charles E. A. Woolley, Assistant Paymaster, who accompanied me to Vitu was always at my side and was of great service in writing orders, rendering ready help in all emergencies; and I should like to mention the names of Sub-Lieutenants Edward D. Ogilvie and Frederick W. Dean who acted as Orderly Officers to myself and Captain The Hon. A. G. Curzon-Howe

respectively, both of whom were most zealous and active.

25. The list of wounded I have referred to previously. Although, in all, 27 cases of sun-stroke occurred, 20 on the return journey, I am glad to report that there has been no loss of life either by climate, the landing, or the enemy, and this is mainly due to the ability and zeal shown by the Officers under my orders, many of whose names I have mentioned; and owing to the short time the operations lasted, heavy though the exertions undoubtedly were, I believe that the health of our men has not suffered.

26. I cannot conclude without a reference to the peculiar nature of the service on which we have been engaged, this being the first occasion within my knowledge in which a campaign even of such short duration has been undertaken by Naval resources alone, the whole of the Transport and Commissiariat having been organised and arranged by Officers of Her Majesty's Navy whose individual energy and ready resource enabled them to surmount many difficulties and to supply the lack of experience.

27. I personally have every reason to be satisfied with the way my orders were carried out both by Officers and men, and I trust that the result will

receive the approval of Her Majesty's Government and the Admiralty.

28. In leaving Vitu at once without any attempt at further pursuit or establishing any Government, I was acting in obedience to orders and in accordance with political considerations.

After the capture of the town, I believe that a small force of 200 or 300 white men would have been ample to hold the whole of the late Sultanate, had such a course been considered advisable, but I was glad to embark our

men so as to avoid sickness and to keep the ships efficient.

- 29. By the arrival of the "Cossack" with Sir Francis de Winton from Malindi to-day, I hear that about 100 of the adherents of Suliman Bin Abdalla, who fought against us, have returned to Mambrui in very sorry plight, two Arabs wounded and the remainder having thrown away guns and clothes and being in a starving condition. Suliman Bin Abdalla is said to be still with Fumo Bakari at Katawa
- 30. I should like to mention, that, when near Vitu, search was made for the bodies of the murdered Germans but nothing could be seen of them. Messrs. Hassler and Menschel, two of the Kuntzel party, were with us and assisted in the search.
- 31. I regret that I am unable at this moment to state the expenses which have been incurred, but I confidently expect that the Expedition will prove

not only to be a very successful and useful one, but one of the cheapest on record.

32. From my visit to Mombasa, I am at least certain of its value from a political point of view, as increasing the respect in which Great Britain is held on this Coast and in consolidating the position of the Imperial British East Africa Company; but it is important that some Government should be established in the late Sultanate of Vitu while the power of our arms is still fresh in the memory of the inhabitants.

(Copy— W. A. Harvey, Secretary.) General Memorandum A.

"Boadicea," at Zanzibar, 16th October, 1890.

The following orders with reference to an expedition which may become necessary to Vitu are issued confidentially for the information of Commanding Officers.

It is proposed in a few days to summon the Sultan of Vitu to appear at Lamu accompanied by those of his subjects who were implicated in the murder of nine Germans in and near Vitu recently, to be tried by a mixed tribunal ordered by myself, the members being nominated jointly by me and Her Majesty's Agent and Consul-General.

To give this Court some authority and to afford a free hand for subsequent action, it is intended that I should declare martial law over the Sultanate of Vitu, Lamu, and certain parts of the Sultan's dominions adjacent to Vitu.

In case the Sultan of Vitu should fail to appear at Lamu, I propose to march a Naval expedition to the town of Vitu to procure redress or to inflict punishment.

# Plan of Operations and Nature of Force.

The Naval Force to consist of some 700 combatants and 150 non-combatants with four 7-pr. and four machine guns, as per attached list, is intended to be landed either at Kipini (or Kau), Kau (or Kipini) being occupied by a detachment of 50 men, probably assisted by some native auxiliaries to secure the base and arrest fugitives.

The main body will march on Vitu, which is stated to be 5 hours' march

from Kipini, 3½ hours from Kau.

The selection of the route will depend upon the result of further inquiry after arrival at Lamu.

At the same time a native force will probably proceed direct to Vitu by Utianga, under the Lewali of Lamu.

A detailed plan of operations will be issued subsequently.

It is important not to mention the idea of an attack by Kipini or Kau, as the preparations to be made at Lamu will probably lead the enemy to suppose that the attack will be delivered by the usual road.

# Preparations-Commissariat.

It is not intended that the force should be absent more than 48 hours; each man will carry 24 hours' provisions; another 24 hours' provisions will be supplied by the Commissariat.

The men are to be warned as to saving their food and water, as the supply is very doubtful; there will probably be a considerable store of grain, manioc,

&c., in the town, but the water is doubtful.

Water bottles are to be filled with cold tea.

Porters will carry 50 lbs. weight of provisions or spare ammunition.

Commanding Officers are to pack up for their own men. Battery and Company Officers must arrange in their own ships for cooking and food. The camp party of each ship will carry the camp kettles, and, under the direction of the Camp Master, prepare the food on arrival.

# Dress.

Officers to wear helmets, brown belts, water-bottles, knives, pistols, and swords, blue tunics (or monkey jackets) and trousers and gaiters. Junior Officers to wear cutlasses instead of dirks.

Men will wear white hats, belts, and braces, with water-bottles, Wallace spades, haversacks as before, knives and blankets (with pipes and tobacco), and gaiters, and blue serge suits.

# Guns and Ammunition.

Guns to have limbers fully packed, viz.:—24 rounds half double shell (if on board), the remainder shrapnel. The Reserve ammunition party to carry 24 rounds per gun, one-half empty common (to be filled with petroleum) one-half shrapnel, with R.L. percussion fuzes.

Small-arm men to carry 80 rounds per man.

The Reserve ammunition party to carry 100 rounds per rifle.

The Machine Guns to carry 1,200 rounds per gun.

The Reserve ammunition party to carry 2 boxes=1360 rounds per gun.
All guns to be provided with long extra drag ropes so that if necessary a whole company may be clapped on.

The Guns' crews all to have rifles.

Spare Clothing.—No Officer will be allowed more than 40 lbs. weight of baggage.

# General Memorandum B.

When the force is disembarked the transport department will assemble in the following manner:—Flags A.P.W. will be displayed on boarding pikes at the place chosen for the assembly of each department, viz.;—

Flag A. Spare Ammunition.

" P. Provisions.

,, W. Water.

The various stores will be landed from the respective ships with complete fittings of poles, &c., to enable their being carried easily by the porters. They will be distinctly marked with the name of the ship to which they belong, and the nature of the stores contained, and will be conveyed with all despatch to the flag to which their nature belongs, where on arrival they will be arranged and distributed among the porters by the Officers and petty officers of the department to which they respectively belong.

The available fatigue parties (Englishmen) and Seedies will be divided

as follows:-

I. A party of 75 Seedies, detailed as under, to convey spare ammunition and water (first 24 hours' ration) to the men actually engaged, and to accompany them on the march.

II. The fatigue parties (Englishmen) and the remainder of the Seedies

detailed to carry provisions and water for the second 24 hours' ration.

III. A body of native porters, under the command of Mr. Martin, to carry the remainder of the spare ammunition and water, and, if necessary, to continue the supply of provisions, &c., from the base to the front.

# ORGANISATION OF II.

By the returns sent in, 63 porters are required to carry 60 packages of provisions for the second 24 hours, and there are 136 fatigue party and Seedies available for this service. Of these the Englishmen will take the mess kettles, which in many cases will contain the tea, cocoa, sugar, &c., or lanterns, the Seedies carrying the heavier loads. The remainder—namely, 73 Seedies—are available for carrying 37 barricoes.

Seedies are to be provided with cutlasses as far as possible.

#### ORGANISATION OF III.

There will be 62 packages of spare ammunition and 102 water barricoes to be carried. Mr. Martin will endeavour to forward these by the natives to the front as speedily as circumstances will admit, bearing in mind that it may

be necessary to keep up a supply of rations in the front daily.

If it is necessary to supply any further rations to the brigade in addition to the first and second 24 hours' ordered previously by the Commander-in-Chief, they will be supplied in bulk from H.M.S. "Boadicea," and issued to each company by the Commissariat Staff at the front, the Officer in charge of each detail furnishing the Commissariat Officer with a requisition for rations for the number of men in his detachment.

No provision has been made for the conveyance of Officers' baggage; they

are expected to arrange this exclusive of the numbers in the returns.

# General Memorandum C.

On the arrival of the Commander-in-Chief at the place selected for the disembarkation, an advanced guard consisting of the Field Battery and two Small-Arm companies (of "Boadicea") of No. 1 Battalion, in command of Lieutenant Ainger, will be ordered to land together with their water, &c., as ordered, Organisation I., Transport Orders, General Memorandum B, immediately after an early dinner.

Commander Montgomerie will advance this force as far as he can towards Vitu, halting in sufficient time to make a zareba before dark: he will bivouac

his force inside the zareba that night.

The remainder of the Expedition will be landed at 4 a.m. the following day, and, after assembling, will be advanced as follows:

Battalion of Seamen.
Rocket Party, &c.
Staff.
Porters of Organisations I. and II.
Royal Marines.

Scouting and flanking parties will be supplied by Native troops if procurable, otherwise, by a company, or companies, told off for that purpose.

The advance will be made by companies in column, fours, file, or single

file, according to the practicability of the country.

In the event of a general attack, or should an attack be expected, the force will be halted and formed into a hollow square.

The Seamen forming the front and the front flanks, the Royal Marines

forming the rear and rear flanks.

For a desultory attack by a few, Commanding Officers will detain Seedies or companies to put them to flight.

Whenever the nature of the country permits, the advance will be made

in the square formation.

Upon reaching the advanced guard's zareba, the whole force will advance together within striking distance of the town of Vitu, when it will be decided by the Commander-in-Chief whether the attack should be delivered that evening or the following morning at daybreak.

On each signal to land being made, Commanding Officers of ships will despatch their boats to the beach, having previously organised the disembarkation of their own men, bearing in mind that it is important to march as soon

as possible, so all stores, ammunition, and water ordered, Organisation I., General Memorandum B, should be placed in the boats previously, and as much more of the provisions and water of Organisation II. as can be con veniently carried.

The advanced guard will take their tea and mess kettles with them in addition to stores, &c., Organisation I., but will not take the provisions, &c., ordered in Organisation II., these being brought up by the main body next

day.

Captain Brackenbury, assisted by Commander Fleet as beach master, Mr. Rock, Fleet Engineer in charge of steam boats, and Mr. Anderson, boatswain, will superintend the disembarkation, despatching the men's provisions, water, &c. to the spots indicated by flags, as shown in the attached list where they will be organised by Lieut. Ravenhill.

If space admits, the Fleet numbers will be displayed on the shore, and each ship will send its boats to that part of the beach marked by her Fleet number.

Commanding Officers must impress upon their men the absolute necessity of the most rigid abstinence and care in the consumption of the water, there being no water known of between the sea coast and Vitu. Men are particularly cautioned as to smoking on the march, especially those who are made thirsty by so doing.

Men will wear hat covers stained with coffee water.

A list of distinguishing flags and a rough chart of Vitu are forwarded

Spirits will be issued at the evening meal instead of at midday.

The method of attack will depend upon the nature of the ground, which is

not accurately known (see plan).

All Officers possessing compasses are to wear them; should skirmishing take place in bush or cultivation the compass (or sun) may be the only guide as to direction or where our men are likely to be, so as to avoid firing into them.

N.B.—Vitu is about N.E. by N. by ⊕ from Kipini.

In skirmishing, Officers commanding companies should encourage their men to advance, as this has been found to be the plan which most disconcerts

All interpreters will be attached to Head Quarter Staff and be distributed

as required.

In marching, a halt of at least five minutes is to be made in every hour. Should the town be stormed, the rendezvous is to be near the Sultan's

flagstaff, which it is understood is very conspicuous.

The Commander-in-Chief relies on fire discipline being well maintained and that when the advance is sounded, the obstacle will be carried with the dash and spirit of British sailors.

## General Memorandum D.

The march of the column will be conducted as ordered in Memoran-

On arrival at the place selected for bivouac, pioneers will at once proceed under the direction of Mr. Roberts, carpenter, to clear away the brushwood and grass.

The camp will be in the form of a single square, or three squares, a shelter trench dug, with a machine gun at each angle, four 7 pr. guns parked in the centre, with the porters, &c., placed in the centre. Pioneers must construct the latrines and cooking places. The R.N. Seedies will construct a boma if the materials are forthcoming, otherwise the shelter trench must be enlarged.

The companies will always lie in their proper positions behind the trench,

each company having two sentries in the trench.

Outposts will be posted by the Staff-Officer, and composed of one company during the day. They should be posted immediately after halting.

Sentries will always be posted double on either a mound thrown up or built up, so as not only to give them a view round, but also to keep them awake.

The "Alarm" bugle will only be used for a real attack, and on all occasions of exercise the command will be given by word of mouth. The order "Stand to your Arms," will be given every morning at least one hour before daybreak: every man will fall into his proper position, the trench manned, and machine guns prepared. When sufficiently light to see surrounding objects, and if nothing is seen, arms will be piled, and breakfast prepared.

The men will be divided into messes of company sections or gun detachments. The leading hand will see that the rations are supplied and that no

man goes short, if it is possible to prevent it.

Each day one man will be told off as cook; he will prepare the food and be excused all fatigue duties for this purpose, and also patrol, outpost, and trench sentry.

The fetching of water will be carried out by the water transport party (native). The woodcutters, grasscutters, &c., will always be covered by a

company of S.A. men told off in turn by the Officers Commanding.

No nuisance to be committed anywhere in the camp, except in the

appointed places.

The camp-party in the charge of the Master-at-Arms of the flag-ship will prepare meals, clear up the bivouac, assist in preparing and serving out rations, and look out for the supply of fuel.

Blankets having been well shaken out will, when time and opportunity

offer, be spread out to dry in the sun, and made up in horse-collar form.

# Bugle Calls.

R. N. Battalion will be called by "Assembly," preceded and followed by one or two G's.

Royal Marines by their Regimental call.

There will be as little bugling (except under fire) as possible.

As a rule, when in the vicinity of the enemy, only the Headquarter's

bugle to be sounded.

Whistles will be provided for Company Officers; they are invariably to be used when in extended order to attract the attention of the men in the same manner as a pipe on board ship. Boatswain's calls are very suitable for this purpose, but in all cases one long blast on the whistle means "Cease fire—pay attention to the order."

The Officers Commanding will attend at the Headquarter's Flag for orders daily before marching, and when the "Halt" is called for the night will bring with them a field state of the respective corps.

All orders will be initialled by the recipient, noting hour and date, and

returned to Headquarter Staff.

All correspondence, requisitions, &c., are to be addressed to the Chief of the Staff; all intelligence is to be sent to the Commander-in-Chief as quickly as possible.

Company Officers are warned that there are, or were, numerous holes with

stakes at the bottom.

All Officers' and Marines' helmets and puggarees are to be stained brown-tea is recommended.







General Memorandum F.

Before the Expeditionary Force to Vitu breaks up, I desire to express my cordial thanks to the whole of the Officers and men engaged for their arduous exertions, and the good conduct shown by them on every occasion, whether in action, during the march, in camp, or in the difficult and important work of landing and forwarding stores to the front.

On Saturday afternoon the 25th instant, the first men were landed, the

main body landing on Sunday morning.

After a march of 14 miles, during which the force was engaged three times, Vitu was taken at 9 a m., on the 27th instant, and by yesterday evening all had been re-embarked with the exception of the garrison of 100 men sent to Kau, and some spare provisions and ammunition.

When the difficulties of the distance the ships had to lie from the shore, with frequently a bad bar, impassable at low water, hindering communication, the rough nature of the ground over which men had to march dragging

guns, the improvised transport, and natural difficulties with porters of every African expedition, which were enhanced in this instance by a disinclination to act against those of their own religion, or to incur the dangers of a military expedition, are considered, I have reason to be proud of the success which has attended our efforts, which I trust will receive the approval of Her Majesty's Government and the country.

The Expedition I was informed was to be considered as one of punishment only, and it was thought advisable that a force, almost purely naval, should restrict itself to showing the power of Great Britain to avenge the savage murders which had been committed in Vitu, without making any

attempt to occupy the country.

In this we have entirely succeeded, the enemy were driven off and energetically pressed whenever they attacked us, and no real defence of the

town was made when the attacking force reached the gates of Vitu.

You are well aware that they were so thoroughly beaten that the country could easily have been held by a small force, and that our prompt re-embarkation was only the result of orders received in view of the nature of the climate, the force employed, and political considerations.

It will be my pleasing duty to point out in a despatch to the Admiralty the services rendered by the Officers and men of the Royal Navy and Royal Marines more immediately under my command; and I will only say now that I was much impressed by the general zeal, activity, and spirit shown by the Officers, which set a good example to the men, and which in my experience of similar operations I have never seen surpassed.

My thanks are specially due to Sir Francis de Winton and the Imperial British East Africa Company for their ready help, both with a body of 150 Indian Police under Captain Smith, 1st Life Guards, and for the all-important assistance rendered by allowing me to engage the invaluable services of Mr.

Martin, and placing at our disposal all their available porters.

The Indian Police under Lieutenant Rogers marched well and did good

service, and I trust that the experience will prove of value to them.

I desire to express my special thanks to Captain Smith, 1st Life Guards, for his zealous assistance generally, especially in furnishing scouts and runners

and in placing all his resources at my disposal.

Lieutenant Budd with the detachment at Kau carried out my orders intelligently, especially in reconnoitring towards Vitu, acting with a small flotilla of boats under Commander Fleet of the "Boadicea," on the 27th instant.

It had been my intention to have made an attack with a column from Kau, simultaneously with my advance from Kipini, but owing to disaffection

among the Kirabotos or irregulars at Lamu this had to be given up.

I have, however, to thank His Highness The Sultan for the assistance given me in sending the 200 Zanzibar troops, who were useful in garrison and as porters, and for providing horses and donkeys, as well as for the orders given by him to Saood bin Mohamed, the Wali of Lamu. The latter being unable to come himself sent the Wali of Faza, Abdallah bin Sultan, who came with us to Vitu and was useful in furnishing guides and giving information about the country.

To Colonel Euan-Smith, H.M. Agent and Consul-General at Zanzibar, I feel that the whole force is indebted for his energy, ability, and knowledge of the country and people which he placed unreservedly at my disposal, and I take this opportunity of acknowledging the services of Mr. Vice-Consul

Berkeley who accompanied me to Vitu as a member of my Staff.

The intelligent help of the German gentlemen, Messrs. Hassler and Menschel, in pointing out the country, and their determination to be always ready and in the front, deserves my special acknowledgment, and I only regret that we were able to recover so little of their property or that of Mr. Friedrich who accompanied the Expedition under Commander McQuhae to Baltia.

It is a source of great satisfaction to me that the operations have been concluded without the loss of a single life on our part, either by the enemy, the climate, or the difficulties of crossing the bar, and landing.

That we had only 12 men wounded is I feel sure almost entirely due to the spirit and determination shown by our men in following the enemy up energetically, speedily convincing them that, unless they were prepared to come to close quarters, they had no resource but flight.

TO FUMO BAKARI, SULTAN OF VITU.

After compliments. Be it known to you that the news of the shameful deeds that have been done in your town and territory of Vitu, and all the details connected with the treacherous, foul and disgraceful murder of the nine German subjects of His Imperial Majesty the Emperor of Germany, and the causeless devastation and destruction of the plantations of other German subjects, all this news has reached us and has been made known to our great Government.

And now we have received the necessary orders from our Government that inquiry be made, that the criminals be arrested, and that justice be done. Now therefore we summon and require you, Sultan Fumo Bakari, to meet us at Lamu on the 7th day of the month of Rabia Owel 1308 (October 22, 1890), in order that inquiry be made and justice be done. You are required to bring with you, and to deliver up to us for trial, all the Jumbes and other criminals connected with, or implicated in the shameful and disgraceful deeds that have been done in Vitu, and in the villages. Everyone shall have a fair trial before God, and will receive strict justice.

In coming to Lamu neither you yourself, nor anyone else, has anything whatever to fear so long as he may be innocent of any knowledge or of any complicity in these dreadful crimes. Every innocent man will be allowed to return in safety as he came. Nothing is required by the great Government but that justice alone shall be done. But we warn you that if you do not present yourself as herein required, and if you do not deliver up the criminals, and make full restitution of the property of the murdered Germans, by sending in at once to the British Consul at Lamu all property belonging to the murdered Germans, which is still in your Sultanate, if you do not do all these things as you are ordered, you must take the consequences, which will be upon your own head.

Copy of Translation.

From Sultan Fumo Bakari, to Vice-Admiral Fremantle, &c., &c., and Colonel Euan-Smith, English Consul at Zanzibar.

Your honoured letter has reached me, and I understand the contents thereof, that you say I am doing bad things. All that you mention, it was not done by me. During the time I enjoyed German protection, I looked after Europeans thoroughly, and also when I was put under your protection, I was even more careful to look well after any European that came to my place. And those (the murdered men), I took their arms because they came to interfere with me.

When I saw that they intended to behave badly, I took their arms in order to keep them quiet until I informed the English Government, and their Somali interpreter was present, They refused to give up their arms, and they went to the gate, and they killed one of my doorkeepers. And there were some soldiers at the gate with whom the Germans fought. I told them (the Germans) that if they wished to work in Vitu, they must obtain a letter from the Consul in Zanzibar. They refused, i.e. the Somali and the Germans. These Europeans were at that time at . . . . And when the Europeans were going out, I sent my people to bring them back in order to keep them until I could inform your Government, but when my men went to bring them, the Europeans killed some of them. And when my people saw this they could not restrain themselves, they did the same. This is how the thing happened.

And I have written to the Englishman who was at Lamu, to inform him that the Germans were behaving badly. He replied to me that there was no

date to my letter: what kind of reply is this?

And we did not wish this (the murders) to happen in order to get their property. Their property remains where it was. I have not touched it. The Europeans came to ask about Shambas, but here are no Europeans who have got Shambas, except one, and he has nothing beyond one horse, and sheep and goats, about 20 altogether. And with regard to my coming to Lamu, it is not the custom for the Sultan to leave his own place. If you have got anything more to say, you can say it, and I will send you a reply.

To Fumo Bakari, Sultan of Vitu.

After compliments.

We have received your letter and understand its contents. It was not necessary for us to write to you again, but we have remembered that perhaps you are not acquainted fully with European customs, and that you do not understand fully the danger that you are running, in not obeying the summons to come to Lamu, which we sent to you in the first letter. Again, therefore, we tell you that you should, in your interests, and that of all your subjects, obey all that is written in that first letter, and to do this, and from good feeling, two more days are given to you. Should you not do this, and should you not come in with all the criminals, and all the stolen property by Friday morning, the 24th October (10 Rabia Owel 1308), it will be too late. This is the last word that we have to say to you.

To Admiral Fremantle, and Colonel Euan-Smith, English Consul-General.

Written at Vitu, 8th Rabia Owel, 1308 (October 23rd, 1890).

After compliments. I have received your honoured letter, and I understand perfectly that you wish me to come to Lamu: this is a very difficult matter to me, and I must beg of you to excuse me. And about the criminals who killed the Europeans—I do not myself know them; I cannot say that such and such a man has done this because there was war, and your people it was that began the fight, killing some of my people, consequently my people did the same.

And we are much annoyed that this should have happened, and we did not commence to do bad, but this has happened by the will of God, and your people began it; and if any one goes to another person's place and beats and kills people, is it not your custom and law to punish the wrongdoers? Please let us know, so that we can learn. Or is it that only you want to come against us for nothing? At anyrate, what your Honours think, it is good and sufficient.

And regarding the property of the Europeans—all their goods are at

Mkonumbi and Hindi.

I told you in my first letter—no European has property here. Let this be known to you.

If anything is going to happen from you, please let me know.

"Boadicea" at Lamu: 23rd October, 1890.

Memorandum.

You are to proceed to-morrow morning with the boats of H.M.S. "Boadicea," manned and armed, to attack Mkonumbi, the object being to punish the inhabitants for the murder of the German subject Karl Horn, on the 16th ultimo.

The German Menschel and the Somali Jama are well acquainted with the place, and will accompany you. The latter will be able to point out those more immediately concerned in the murder, if necessary, of which I understand Bana Heri, the Alzida, to have been one of the principals.

Should you be opposed, you are to endeavour to overcome the resistance,

and you will use your discretion as to landing.
Should there be no opposition, or should it be only of a slight nature, you should secure as many as possible of the head men, destroy their houses, and

save any German property you conveniently can.

From the information which has reached me I do not contemplate that you will encounter serious resistance, but it is essential that the exposure and loss should be as small as possible, commensurate with the attainment of the objects in view, bearing in mind subsequent operations.

Memorandum,

You are to proceed to-morrow morning with the boats of the "Cossack" and "Brisk," if the latter ship has arrived in time, to Baltia, to take such steps as may seem to you advisable to punish the natives for the murder of Mr. Behnke, a German, on the 17th or 18th ultimo.

This man was, I understand, murdered at a place called Hidiojiza by the natives of another place called Hidiomkoma, both of these villages being, I am informed, near Baltia; but Mr. Friedrich, the partner of Mr. Behnke,

who will accompany you, will be able to point the places out.

He has named a large number of people, as per his letter enclosed, as being implicated in the murder, and should there be little or no opposition you are to endeavour to secure any of them who may be pointed out to you, but you are not to risk unnecessarily your small force, or to delay too long while resistance is being organised.

The object will have been attained if the houses of some of the principal

offenders in the villages named above, are destroyed.

I do not expect that you will encounter serious opposition, if any, but should this prove not to be the case you are to do as much damage as possible to the villages named above without landing your men.

## MKONUMBI.

H.M.S. "Beadicea." Lamu, 24th October, 1890.

Sir.

In obedience to your Memorandum VI/152 of 23rd October,\* I have the honour to report that the boats of H M.S. "Boadicea" proceeded to punish the inhabitants of Mkonumbi for the murder of the German subject, Karl

Horn, on the 16th ult.

- 2. Thanks to your dispositions and the force you placed at my command, all your orders have been carried out punctually. Herr Menschel and the Somali Jama guided us up the creeks, and with the assistance of a native fisherman we picked up on the way, we arrived safely and in time in the neighbourhood of Mkonumbi. Here we were guided down a wrong turning, and, as we were on the point of retracing our course, some 20 men—two or three, Mr. Menschel avers, in the uniform of the Sultan of Vitu—opened fire upon the leading gig from the bank at a distance of 30 to 40 yards. We therefore landed and attacked the village, which was speedily evacuated and burnt.
- 3. Re-embarking, the boats proceeded to Mkonumbi, some four miles further, and were met with lively fire from about 100 men, some with Vitu flags, and obeying the signals of a horn. Commander Montgomerie most cleverly pushed down a side creek so as to flank them, while the remainder of the boats under Commander (N.) Fleet and Lieutenant Reginald Tupper proceeded to attack the town. The defenders were few, and, after meeting us with a few shots, the moment our men advanced with a rush, bolted. It was

impossible to bring away the German property, it being too heavy, but we found it and left it quite safe; the rest of the town was utterly destroyed with all the goma and food stuffs we could find. Whilst doing this we cleared the ground with skirmishers for about a mile round the place, principally to endeavour to find the remains of Karl Horn for decent sepulture. In this we failed. We then burnt two lesser villages, the inhabitants of which had turned out, and fired on us, and re-embarked.

4. The behaviour of the men was excellent, most willing and with great spirits and go; and to having been able to carry out your orders is entirely due to the dispositions and orders received, and to the invaluable help of Commander Montgomerie, Commander Fleet, Lieutenant Tupper, the Officers of your flagship, and to the zeal and spirits of the men. Dr. Harries' dispositions for the care of the sick were admirable, and the arrangements for the Commissariat by Mr. Whiddon left nothing to be desired. The arrangements of Commander Montgomerie were correct to the minutest detail, and were the principal cause of success together with the admirable piloting of Commander Fleet.

5. I am happy to say there was not a single casualty.

REPORTING PUNISHMENT OF NATIVES FOR MURDER OF MR. BEHNKE.\*

H.M.S. "Cossack," at Lamu. 25th October, 1890.

I have the honour to report that in compliance with your orders of the 23rd October, I left the anchorage of Lamu at 8 a.m. on that day in command of six boats belonging to the "Cossack," and three boats belonging to the "Brisk," for the purpose of punishing those implicated in the murder of Mr. Behnke, as reported in the letter of Mr. Friedrich, attached to your orders. The force consisted of a landing party of 62 men and six Officers, the Officers in command of the respective boats being Lieutenants Ravenhill, Bird, Baker, Greville, Mr. Carr, midshipman, and Mr. King, Gunner, Staff Surgeon Christie, of the "Cossack," accompanying the Expedition as Medical Officer.

On arrival at Baltia at 12.30 p.m. I found that the river was becoming too narrow and shallow for the larger boats to proceed further, and as the villages of Mansumarabu and Hidiomkoma were still from two to three miles further up the river, I decided to divide the force, landing one party at Baltia on the left bank under Lieutenant Ravenhill, to proceed by land to Hidiomkoma, while I pushed on with the smaller boats by the river. It was essential to take the boats because the two villages are a quarter of a mile apart and on opposite sides of the river.

Mansumarabu, which is much the larger of the two and is the head quarters of Heri M'katna, an important chief, is situated on the right bank, along which it was impossible to advance on account of extensive man-

The two steam cutters and the three double-banked boats were left

anchored in the middle of the stream of Baltia, with a guard on board.

As the distance to be travelled by land was less than by boat, I ordered Lieutenant Ravenhill, with whom were Lieutenant Bird and Mr. Carr, to wait for fifteen minutes after I had started, and then to push on as fast as possible to Hidiomkoma, which he was to attack and destroy; the people of this village being the people who first attacked Mr. Behnke and set fire to his house.

At 1 p.m. I proceeded up the river with my galley and the whaler and gig of the "Cossack," under the command of Lieutenant Greville and Mr. King, gunner, respectively, and the whaler of "Brisk" under Lieutenant Baker.

A short distance above Baltia, the river became so narrow and obstructed

with mangroves that the oars could with great difficulty be used.

At about a mile above Baltia, fire was opened on the boats at very short range from the thick mangrove swamp on the right bank, but it was soon silenced by the fire from the boats, and I presume, in consequence of the advance of the party under Lieutenant Ravenhill along the left bank, by a path

parallel to the river, no attack at all was made from that side.

At 1.45 p.m., I arrived off Hidiomkoma, and finding the village apparently deserted I left it to be dealt with by Lieutenant Ravenhill, and pushed on to Mansumarabu. At 2 p.m. the boats arrived opposite the village, which stands about 200 yards from the bank of the river, and the boats' crews landed. On landing, a few shots were fired at us from the village, but on our returning the fire and advancing to the attack, the enemy bolted, and on our reaching the village it was found to be completely deserted.

As the chief of this place is the man who was chiefly responsible for the murder of Mr. Behnke, and as it was impossible to capture him or any other of the persons mentioned in the letter of Mr. Friedrich, I determined to destroy the town. It was, therefore, fired in many places and completely burnt, including a considerable store of grain and hides, which was found in the village store-

house—and the house and flag staff of Heri M'katna, the chief.

Shortly after 3 p.m. the party re-embarked and returned down the river. On passing Hidiomkoma the destruction of the village was found to have been completed. The two parties, therefore, returned to Baltia, the one by river

and the other by road, without meeting with any attack.

On arrival at Baltia, Lieutenant Ravenhill reported that he had carried out his part of the programme without meeting with any resistance, and had destroyed everything burnable in Hidiomkoma. There still remained the village of Hidiojiza, in which village the murder of Mr. Behnke actually took place, which is situated about a mile to the east of Baltia. I therefore proceeded at once with the party under Lieutenant Ravenhill and Lieutenant Bird to that place, which we reached without opposition, and found deserted, the people having apparently left only a few minutes before we arrived; this place was also entirely destroyed by fire. The party then returned to the boats. On arrival there Lieutenant Baker informed me that while he was getting the boats ready for the re-embarkation of the whole party, a few shots were fired at them from the bush, which struck the water near the boats. He therefore threw out some skirmishers in the direction from which the shots had come. They were, however, unable to find an enemy, and were retired.

All hands were then re-embarked, and the boats returned to the ships,

where they arrived at 9 p.m.

The houses and estate of Messrs. Behnke and Friedrich at Baltia had been reduced to a blackened ruin, and Mr. Behnke had been murdered in cold blood. The three villages nearest to that estate, the people of which villages were all implicated more or less in these misdeeds, have also been reduced to ashes, and I think that this must be admitted to be an appropriate and certainly not excessive punishment for the offence.

I have very great pleasure in expressing my sense of the zeal and discipline shown by all the Officers and men of the Expedition. The actual resistance met with was slight and ineffective, but a good deal of very hard work had to be done in a short time in a trying climate, and this was

admirably done. The attack upon the boats proceeding along a narrow and obstructed stream by men firing on them from the thick bush, where it was impossible to see them, was of a harassing nature, and was steadily met and repulsed.

Lieutenant Ravenhill, who was the senior lieutenant present, carried out his portion of the Expedition with the same zeal and good judgment which I have more than once had occasion to bring to your notice with regard to that

officer.

Lieutenant Bird, in command of the boats of "Brisk," gave me the most zealous assistance and support.

Mr. Friedrich, the partner of the late Mr. Behnke, accompanied me, and was of the utmost use as guide and interpreter.

## Expedition to Vitu.

H.M.S. "Boadicea," Kipini, 30th October, 1890.

Sir.

I have the honour to report that in compliance with the Commander-in-Chief's General Memorandum C, of the 19th October, I proceeded on shore at Kipini on the afternoon of the 25th, for the purpose of taking command of the Advance Guard of the Vitu Expeditionary Force.

2. On landing, I found that the "Conquest's" Marines and one company of her Blue-jackets, with 3 guns, the whole under Lieutenant Jerram, had started half-an-hour previously, taking with them a canvas water tank, and

120 porters carrying water.

I rode after, and overtook this force about 4-30 p.m., and found them

halted, and the greater part of the water in the tank.

The position I did not consider good for halting for the night, but unless I abandoned the water I had no option but to remain where I was. I therefore made a strong zareba, with a shelter trench behind it.

3. At 5 p.m., Lieutenant Slater, with 5 guns, marched in, and at 8-30 two companies of the "Boadicea's" Blue-jackets, under Lieutenant Ainger, and accompanied by you, arrived. The force then consisted of the following:—

4. On your leaving the zareba, I again assumed command, and have the

honour to report the following:—
At about 11 p.m., we were a

At about 11 p.m., we were attacked by the enemy who had very nearly surrounded the zareba, only leaving the road to Kipini open. They opened a heavy fire with small arms, which fortunately was very high, and which we returned.

Whenever, by the flashes, I could see there were a number of the enemy together, I ordered the 7-prs. and machine guns to be used, which generally

silenced that part for the time being. The enemy were tolerably bold, many of them coming up within 50 yards of the zareba. After about 20 minutes the enemy's fire slackened, and 10 minutes later ceased altogether, they having drawn off. I cannot give any exact estimate of the enemy's force, but I should judge they must have had at least 500 riflemen, and probably three times that number of spearmen and bow and arrow men.

5. At daylight, on the 26th, I formed the force up outside the zareba, and at 5.30 a.m. marched in the direction of Vitu, leaving Lieutenant Jerram with half a company of the "Boadicea's" Bluejackets to hold the zareba and take care of the wounded and water, pending the arrival of the main body.

At 6.15 a.m. Lieutenant Tupper rode up and ordered me to halt. Half

an hour afterwards you came up with the main body.

6. In summing up my report, I beg to bring to your favourable notice, the names of Lieutenants Ainger, Jerram, and Slater. These Officers gave me every assistance and rendered valuable services during the attack by checking and steadying the men's fire when they were a little excited. I also beg to mention the name of Surgeon Harries, who was most assiduous and attentive in the care of the wounded, and I cannot speak too highly of the conduct of the Officers and men generally.

7. Attached is a list of casualties, observing that some Officers and men, though not sufficiently hurt to be incapacitated for duty, received contusions from slugs and bullets, whose force was much spent by passing through the

bushes forming the zareba.

8. Commander McQuhae, the Acting Quartermaster-General, was in the zareba during the attack, and I have to thank him for much valuable advice.

The Expedition to Vitu having been brought to a conclusion, I have the honour to enclose herewith a list of petty officers and men who were wounded in the recent actions. I would also bring to your notice the fact that, though seven men fell out during the advance through exhaustion induced by heat and their heavy equipment, and twenty on the return march, owing to zarebas being erected at short intervals where patients were received and treated, these casualties in no way retarded the march of the column. All these men, sent by easy stages to the base hospital, recovered sufficiently to rejoin their ships with their respective companies.

I would here venture to suggest that in any future operations on this coast, Seedie boys only should be employed in the stretcher parties. The

general health of the force was most satisfactory.

Dangerous Banks off Phelans Point.

INFORMATION has been received, that a recent survey by Commander P. McGiffin, of the Chinese Imperial Navy, shows a dangerous bank lying about two miles in a north-west direction from Phelans Point, in the southern approach to

Ping Yang Inlet by Febigers Channel:—
This bank (McGiffin Bank) extends about 3½ miles in a north-east and south-west direction, with a breadth of about 11 miles, and has a least depth of three feet on its north-east extreme, and ten feet on its south-west extreme, with a depth of about 12 feet between. The 3-feet spot lies with Phelans Point bearing SS.E., distant about 2½ miles; and the 10-feet spot with that point bearing E. by S., distant about two miles. Between McGiffin Bank and Phelans

Point, also to the south-westward, there are apparently no dangers.

Approximate position of 3-feet spot on Admiralty Charts, lat. 38° 25' N., long. 124° 41' E.

Also, that a bank, with a least depth of three feet, is shown in the approach to Febiger Channel from the westward, lying with the west extreme of Choda Island bearing N.E. by N., distant about five miles. About one mile eastward of the bank there is a depth of three fathoms, and one mile westward ten fathoms.
