

“ and Fellows from time to time, for such term
 “ not exceeding ten years, as to the Warden and
 “ Fellows shall seem fit, and who shall be capable
 “ of reappointment for any like period from time
 “ to time, after the expiration of such term.

“ He shall receive as stipend such sum, not less
 “ than £150 per annum, as the Warden and
 “ Fellows shall fix from time to time, exclusive of
 “ any sum that may be paid him for Hebrew
 “ teaching, if such teaching be assigned to him
 “ by the Warden and Fellows. Such stipend
 “ shall be paid as to £31 10s. part thereof, out of
 “ the fund bequeathed by Dr. Wills for that pur-
 “ pose, and the residue out of the Tuition Fund
 “ hereinafter-mentioned.

“ The holder of the said office of Divinity
 “ Lecturer shall be bound to reside within the
 “ College, unless the Warden and Fellows shall
 “ at any time think fit to permit his residence
 “ elsewhere within the University, which they
 “ shall have power to do.

“ Any such Divinity Lecturer may at any
 “ time be removed from his office by the Warden
 “ and Fellows for inefficiency, neglect of duty, or
 “ other reasonable cause, subject to such right of
 “ appeal as hereinafter-mentioned.

“ The Divinity Lecturer shall be deemed to be
 “ a Lecturer of the College within the meaning
 “ of Statute III, clause 13.”

And we do further alter the ninth clause of the
 said Statute by substituting for the clause as
 hereinbefore set out the following clause:—

“ For the performance of Divine Service
 “ in the College there shall always be two
 “ Chaplains, who shall be appointed by the
 “ Warden, and shall receive, each of them, a
 “ yearly stipend of £50, to be paid out of the
 “ Corporate Revenue of the College.”
