PRESENTATIONS.

The privilege of making presentations to The Queen at a Drawing Room is restricted to those Ladies who have themselves been previously presented to Her Majesty, and who are themselves present at the Drawing Room.

Under such circumstances a Lady has the privilege of presenting one Lady only at a Drawing Room in addition to her Daughters or

Daughters-in-law.

This restriction does not apply to Ladies who, from official position or other circumstances, are specially privileged to make presentations to Her

Majesty

The Lady who proposes to present another must send in writing the name of such Lady to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, no later than two days previous to the Drawing Room, in order that the Lord Chamberlain may submit the name to Her Majesty, when, if it be approved, presentation cards will be forwarded.

Printed Forms for this purpose can be obtained

at the Lord Chamberlain's Office.

It is particularly requested that the names of the Lady to be presented be very distinctly written on the presentation cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain at the Drawing Room, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

It is not expected that Gentlemen will present themselves at a Drawing Room, except in attend-

ance on the Ladies of their families.

Any Gentleman who under these circumstances should desire to be presented to The Queen will observe the same regulations as are in force for Her Majesty's Levees.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in this behalf by "The Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890," or the Act of the sixth of George the Fourth, chapter eightyseven, or otherwise in Her vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered as follows:—

1. The said Order in Council, dated the twenty-

1. The said Order in Council, dated the twenty-sixth October, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five, is hereby revoked without prejudice to any right or liability existing at the commencement of this Order.

2. The Ottoman Order in Council, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three, and any Orders for the time being in force amending the same, shall have effect as if for the Third Schedule to that Order there were substituted the Schedule to this Order.

3. This Order shall commence and have effect on the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, or such later day as one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State by order under his hand published in the London Gazette may direct.

And the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, and the Most Honourable the Marquis of Salisbury, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

HEREAS by "The Medical Act 1886" it is provided (amongst other things) that Her Majesty may, from time to time, by Order in Council declare that the Second Part of the said Act shall be deemed, on and after a day to be named in such Order, to apply to any British possession which, in the opinion of Her Majesty, affords to the registered medical practitioners of the United Kingdom such privileges of practising n the said British possession as to Her Majesty

may seem just; and that, from and after the day named in such Order in Council, such British possession shall be deemed to be a British possession to which the said Act applies within the meaning of the said Second Part thereof, but that until such Order in Council has been made in respect of any British possession the said Second Part of the said Act shall not be deemed to apply to any such possession.

And whereas the Province of South Australia is a British possession within the meaning of the said Act, and affords to the registered medical practitioners of the United Kingdom, under and by virtue of certain Acts of the Parliament of the said Province of South Australia, namely "The Medical Act 1880," and "The Medical Act Amendment Act 1889," such privileges of practising in the said Province as to Her Majesty seem just.

Now therefore Her Majesty doth hereby, by

and with the advice of Her Privy Council, order, direct, and declare that on and after the first day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one the Second Part of "The Medical Act 1886" shall be deemed to apply to the Province of South Australia.

IN pursuance of the Spring Assizes Act, 1879, Her Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Most Honourable Privy Council, to order as follows:—

1. The Northern and Salford Divisions (as defined by the Order in Council of the 4th day of May, 1864) of the County of Lancaster shall, for the purpose of the next Spring Assizes, be united together under the name of the Spring Assize County, No. 2.

2. The said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County shall be held at Manchester.

3. The Court at the said Spring Assizes at Manchester shall have jurisdiction to try any prisoner committed in the said Spring Assize County who may be brought before it, and shall have the same powers with respect to the trial of and passing sentence upon such prisoner as a Court of Oyer and Terminer and Gaol Delivery would have had at the Assizes in the county where, but for the said Spring Assizes Act, 1879, such prisoner would have been tried.

The provision of Section three of the Spring Assizes Act, 1879, shall apply to the execution of any capital sentence passed at such Assizes as herein mentioned; provided that the expression in the said section "the Sheriff of the county for which such Assizes were held" shall mean the Sheriff of the county in which the prisoner so sentenced would have been tried if the Spring Assizes Act, 1879, had not been passed.

4. The Sheriff of the County of Lancaster shall act for the purpose of the said Spring Assize County.

5. The precepts of the Judges to the said Sheriff shall direct him to summon the Grand Jurors and Petty Jurors from the County of Lancaster.

6. The Gaol Delivery precept of the Judges to the said Sheriff shall direct him to cause the prisoners from all the prisons in the said Spring Assize County who under the provisions of this Order will have to be tried at Manchester, to be brought there, and the Sheriff shall cause such prisoners to be brought accordingly without any

Writ of Habeas Corpus.

7. All Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Coroners, Escheators, Stewards, Bailiffs, Gaolers, Constables, Officers, and persons having authority and being under an obligation to attend the Assizes for either Division comprised in the said Spring Assize County, or to certify, transmit, or deliver to the Court of Assize, or the proper officer thereof, any indictment, inquisition, recognizance, examination, deposition, or document, shall have the same authority, and be under the same obligation to attend at the said Spring Assizes held for the said Spring Assize County, and to certify, transmit, or deliver to the Court of Assize, or the proper officer thereof, such indictment, inquisition, recognizance, examination, deposition, or document.

8. In all indictments and presentments at the said Spring Assizes the venue laid in the margin the Clerk of Assize in the county where such

thereof shall, in addition to the name of the county where the offence is charged to have been committed, contain the words "Spring Assize County, No. 2."

9. Any person who after the date of this Order and before the said Spring Assizes, enters into a recognizance to appear and prosecute, or give evidence, or to appear and answer before a Court of Oyer and Terminer or General Gaol Delivery to be holden for either of the Divisions constituting the said Spring Assize County, shall be bound to attend at the said Spring Assizes for

the said Spring Assize County.

10. In all cases in which the like recognizances have been entered into in respect of any offence committed in either of the Divisions constituting the said Spring Assize County prior to the making of this Order, such recognizances shall be deemed to have been entered into for attendance at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County, and every person bound by such recognizance shall be bound to appear at such lastmentioned Spring Assizes or forfeit his recognizance

11. Ten days before the day fixed for the opening of the Commission at Manchester, a list of the prisoners to be removed for trial at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County, so far as the same list can then be made out, shall, together with a short statement of the offences with which they are charged, be transmitted by the Gaoler of each prison in which such prisoners may be, to the Sheriff of the County of Lancaster, and the said Sheriff shall cause to be inserted in one or more newspapers in the Spring Assize County the said list and statement, and a notice that the persons bound by recognizances to appear and prosecute or give evidence for or against the prisoners so removed shall appear and prosecute

and give evidence at Manchester.

12. It shall be lawful for the Gaoler of the Gaol in which prisoners who are to take their trial at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County shall be in custody, three days before the day upon which the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County are appointed to be held, to send, without any Writ of Habeas Corpus, such prisoners to Her Majesty's Gaol at Strangeways, Manchester, in the county of Lancaster, for the purposes of their trial, and to take all proper steps for their transmission to the said Gaol, and their maintenance by the way, and the Gaoler of the said Gaol shall receive such prisoners into his charge and custody on their arrival, and shall keep and maintain them in the said Gaol until they are either ordered to be discharged or remanded by proper authority, or until they shall have been tried and sentenced, and proper arrangements have been made for their being sent back to the prison from which they were sent for trial, or sent to any other prison which has been duly appointed as an alternative for such prison. If, however, the said Gaol has itself been duly appointed as an alternative prison for the prison from which such prisoners were sent to trial, the Governor of the said Gaol shall, subject to the orders of the Secretary of State, keep and maintain in the said Gaol such prisoners after sentence, until they are

discharged in due course of law.

13. The Clerk of Assize at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County, shall have all powers of taxation of Bills of Costs, expenses of prosecution and witnesses, and all other powers necessary for checking and paying such costs relating to the trial of prisoners that the Clerk of Assize in the county where such

prisoners were committed would have had if such | powers with respect to the trial of and passing prisoner had been tried at the Assizes held in such | sentence upon such prisoner as a Court of Oyer

last-mentioned county.

Where any person is committed for trial, or is bound by any recognizance to appear and answer, in the said Spring Assize County, any Judge of the High Court of Justice, or the committing Justice or Justices, or any two of the Justices of the county or place from which he is committed or admitted to bail, may, upon the application of such person, direct the Treasurer of the county or place where such person was committed, or entered into any recognizance to appear and answer as aforesaid, to advance to such person a sum exceeding 201. to enable him to fray the travelling expenses of such of his witnesses as may have been bound recognizances to appear on his behalf, and the Treasurer shall advance such sum, and shall deduct it out of the amount ultimately allowed in respect of such witnesses.

14. In any case where money is ordered by the Court at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County to be paid in respect of costs and expenses of prosecutors and witnesses, the same shall be paid by the Treasurer of the county or place by whom the same would have been payable had a like order been made by a Court of Oyer and Terminer or Gaol Delivery in the county where the trial would have taken place but for the Spring Assizes Act, 1879, and this Order; and every such Treasurer, or some known agent on his behalf, shall attend the said Spring Assizes during the sitting of the

Court to pay all such orders.

15. Where the Court at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County remand a prisoner or adjourn any trial, or otherwise make an order respecting a prisoner committed for trial but not acquitted or convicted, the Court may make such order with respect to the removal of such prisoner to a prison in the county or place in which he was committed for trial as to the Court seems just, and the prisoner may be removed accordingly, without any Writ of Habeas Corpus.

16. Except where the context otherwise requires, terms used in this Order shall have the same meaning as that which the same terms have in the

Spring Assizes Act, 1879.

The North and East Riding Division and the West Riding Division (as defined by the Order in Council of the 9th day of July, 1864) of the County of York and the County of the City of York, shall, for the purpose of the next Spring Assizes, be united together under the name of the Spring Assize County, No. 3.

2. The said Spring Assizes for the said Spring

Assize County shall be held at Leeds.

3. The Court at the said Spring Assizes at Leeds shall have jurisdiction to try any prisoner committed in the said Spring Assize County who may be brought before it, and shall have the same

powers with respect to the trial of and passing sentence upon such prisoner as a Court of Oyer and Terminer and Gaol Delivery would have had at the Assizes in the county where, but for the said Spring Assizes Act, such prisoner would have been tried.

The provision of Section three of the Spring Assizes Act, 1879, shall apply to the execution of any capital sentence passed at such Assizes as herein mentioned; provided that the expression in the said Section "the Sheriff of the County for which such Assizes were held" shall mean the Sheriff of the County in which the prisoner so sentenced would have been tried if the Spring Assizes Act, 1879, had not been passed.

4. The Sheriff of the County of York shall alone act for the purpose of the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County, and subject to the provisions of this Order shall have jurisdiction for that purpose over the whole district constituting the said Spring Assize County, and precepts and other documents relating to the said Spring Assizes shall be addressed to him

alone.

5. The Gaol Delivery precept of the Judges to the said Sheriff shall direct him to summon the Grand Jurors and Petty Jurors from the County of York; and the Jurors so summoned shall be deemed to be good and lawful men of the body of the several counties constituting the said Spring Assize County; and the Grand and Petty Jury formed out of those Jurors shall be deemed to be a Grand and Petty Jury respectively of the body of the said Counties respectively, and shall have jurisdiction accordingly.

6. The precepts of the Judges to the said

6. The precepts of the Judges to the said Sheriff shall direct him to cause the prisoners from all the prisons in the said Spring Assize County who under the provisions of this Order will have to be tried at Leeds, to be brought there, and the Sheriff shall cause such prisoners to be brought accordingly without any writ of Habeas

Corpus

7. In all matters not before specifically mentioned the precepts to the said Sheriff shall direct him to issue, and he shall issue the like notices, precepts, warrants, and documents, and perform the same acts (mutatis mutandis) as if he were Sheriff for the whole of the said Spring Assize County, and all Under Sheriffs, Bailiffs, Constables, and Officers in the said Spring Assize County shall obey accordingly.

8. The said Sheriff shall, as to all matters in relation to such Spring Assizes for which no specific provision is made by this Order, have the same power, jurisdiction, and responsibility as if he were Sheriff for the whole of the said Spring Assize County, except that this provision shall not authorize the said Sheriff to carry sentences into execution outside the county of York, or to levy outside the said County fines imposed or recognizances estreated at the said Spring Assizes.

9. All Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Coroners, Escheators, Stewards, Bailiffs, Gaolers, Constables, Officers, and persons having authority and being under an obligation to attend the Assizes for either of the Counties comprised in the said Spring Assize County, or to certify, transmit, or deliver to the Court of Assize or the proper officer thereof any indictment, inquisition, recognizance, examination, deposition, or document, shall have the same authority, and be under the same obligation to attend at the said Spring Assizes held for the said Spring Assize County, and to certify, transmit, or deliver to the Court of Assize or the proper officer thereof such indictment, inquisition, recognizance, examination, deposition, or docu-

WHEREAS by "The Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act 1862" it is provided that in the case of any harbour, river or other inland navigation for which rules concerning the lights and signals to be carried by vessels navigating the waters thereof, or concerning the steps for avoiding collisions to be taken by such vessels, are not and cannot be made by or under the authority of any Local Act, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council, upon application from the Harbour Trust or body corporate (if any) owning or exercising jurisdiction upon such waters, to make rules concerning the lights and signals to be carried, and concerning the steps for avoiding collision to be taken by vessels navigating such waters; and that such rules, when so made, shall, so far as regards vessels navigating such waters, have the same effect as if they were regulations contained in the table (C) in the Schedule to the said Act, notwithstanding anything in the said Act or the Schedule thereto contained.

And whereas the Parliamentary Trustees on the River Clyde and Harbour of Glasgow for the time being empowered to carry into effect the provisions of the Clyde Navigation Consolidation Act 1858 (hereinafter called "the Clyde Trustees") are the Harbour Board owning and exercising jurisdiction over the River Clyde and Harbour of Glasgow.

Rules made by the CLYDE TRUSTEES concerning the lights to be carried and concerning the steps for avoiding collision to be taken by dredgers moored in the River Clyde and Harbour of Glasgow.

Every dredger moored in the River Clyde, within the jurisdiction of the Clyde Trustees, shall, between sunset and sunrise, exhibit three bright white lights from globular lanterns of not less than eight inches in diameter, placed in triangular form, not less than six feet apart, on the top of the framework athwart-ships, and of sufficient power to be distinctly visible, with a clear atmosphere on a dark night at a distance of at least one mile'

HEREAS by section twenty-six of the Pluralities Act, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-eight, after reciting that "Whereas " in some instances tithings, hamlets, chapelries, " and other places or districts may be separated "from the parishes or mother churches to "which they belong, with great advantage, "and places altogether extra-parochial may "in some instances with advantage be annexed parishes or districts to which they "are contiguous, or be constituted separate "parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "That when with " respect to his own diocese it shall appear to the "Archbishop of the Province, or when the Bishop "of any diocese shall represent to the said Arch-" bishop that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, 'place or district within the diocese of such "Archbishop, or the diocese of such Bishop, "as the case may be, may be advantageously "separated from any parish or mother church " and either be constituted a separate benefice by "itself or be united to any other parish to which " it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any " other adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, " or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to " form a separate parish or benefice, or that any "extra-parochial place may with advantage be "annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous, " or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesi-"astical purposes; and the said Archbishop or "Bishop shall draw up a scheme in writing (the "scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the "said Archbishop for his consideration) de-"scribing the mode in which it appears to "him that the alteration may best be effected, "and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical juris-"diction, glebe lands, tithes, rent-charges, and "other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, " and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, "may be made with justice to all parties in-"terested; and if the patron or patrons of the "benefice or benefices to be affected by such "alteration shall consent in writing under his or "their hands to such scheme, or to such modifi-"cation thereof as the said Archbishop may ap-"prove, and the said Archbishop shall, on full "consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with "any such scheme, or modification thereof, "and shall certify the same and such consent as 'aforesaid, by his report to Her Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in "Council to make an Order for carrying such " scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may " be, into effect."

And whereas by another Act of Parliament passed in the second and third years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to "make better provision for the Assignment of "Ecclesiastical Districts to Churches or Chapels "augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of "Queen Anne; and for other purposes," it is, amongst other things, further enacted, "That "when by any Order of Her Majesty in Council, "as aforesaid, a separate parish for ecclesiastical "purposes is constituted, the same shall, on registration thereof, and with the consent in writing of the incumbent or incumbents of the benefice or benefices to be thereby affected, become a perpetual curacy and benefice, and the minister thereof, duly nominated and licensed thereto,

"and his successors, shall be a body politic a n "corporate, with perpetual succession, and may " receive and take to himself and his successors " all such lands, tenements, tithes, rent-charges, " and hereditaments as shall be granted unto him " or them, and such perpetual curate shall thence-"forth have within the limits of the district parish formed under the Church Building Acts, "for the church of such perpetual curacy, sole "and exclusive cure of souls, and shall not in " anywise be subject to the control or interference " of the incumbent or incumbents of the benefice " or benefices to be affected by such Order, if he " or they shall have consented to such Order as " aforesaid."

And whereas, on the twentieth day of November one thousand eight hundred and ninety, the Right Reverend Ernest Roland Lord Bishop of Newcastle, made a represention to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend William the then Lord Archbishop of York, in the words and figures following that is to say :-

" To the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Father in God William by Divine Providence Lord Archbishop of York, Primate of England

and Metropolitan.

"We Ernest Roland by Divine permission Lord Bishop of Newcastle do in pursuance of the twenty-sixth section of an Act of Parliament of the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria chapter one hundred and six hereby represent to your Grace as follows:

"There is in the county of Northumberland and within our diocese of Newcastle the vicarage and benefice of Felton-with-Long Framlington which comprises the township and parish of Felton and the township and chapelry of Long Framlington.

"The said parish of Felton-with-Long Framlington according to the last census contains a population of one thousand eight hundred and seventy-two.

"The gross annual value of the benefice of Felton-with-Long Framlington is two hundred

and thirty-eight pounds.

"The patronage of the said vicarage of Feltonwith-Long Framlington is vested in the Crown and the Reverend Parkes Willy is the present vicar thereof.

"There is also in the same county and diocese and adjoining Long Framlington the township of Brinkburn in which there is an ancient priory known as Brinkburn Priory which has been used as a chapel.

"The said township of Brinkburn according to the last census contains a population of one

hundred and ninety-nine.

"There is an allowance of a pension of six pounds thirteen shillings and fourpence from the time of the dissolution of the priory to a chaplain

" Arthur Hodgson Cadogan Esquire claims that the said building known as Brinkburn Priory and the site thereof form part of the family estates of which he is the present owner.

"The appointment of chaplain to the said building known as Brinkburn Priory is also claimed

by the said Arthur Hodgson Cadogan.
"There is an ancient consecrated church or chapel within the boundaries of the said chapelry and township of Long Framlington sufficient for the accommodation of the inhabitants of the said township and also for that of the said township of Brinkburn in case the separation and annexation hereinafter proposed are carried into effect.

"That there is no consecrated church or chapel within the boundaries of the said township of Brinkburn which is used for the purposes of public worship except the said building known as Brinkburn Priory which for many years past has been disused except for the purposes of the private chapel of the family of the late Cadogan Hodgson Cadogan the predecessor in title of the said Arthur Hodgson Cadogan.

"That by an Order of Court bearing date the twenty-sixth day of February one thousand eight hundred and ninety in the High Court of Justice. Chancery Division in a suit between Cadogan Hodgson Cadogan (since deceased) Plaintiff the Venerable George Bland (since deceased) and Her Majesty's Attorney-General Defendants and Arthur Hodgson Cadogan and Lindsay Eric Smith Plaintiffs and the Venerable George Bland (since deceased) and Her Majesty's Attorney-General Defendants and in the matter of the Charitable Trusts Acts 1853 to 1869 it was ordered (amongst other things) 'That upon the 'registration in the Registry of the diocese of 'Newcastle pursuant to the Act one and two 'Victoria chapter one hundred and six section 'twenty-six of an Order of Her Majesty in ' Council for carrying into effect a scheme drawn up by the Bishop of Newcastle and approved by ' the Archbishop of York with the consent of the Crown as patron of the curacy of Long Fram-' lington and of the patron or persons claiming to be patrons of the curacy of Brinkburn for separating such two curacies from the Mother 'Church (if any) and uniting them and constituting them an united and separate benefice to be called Long Framlington-with-Brinkburn 'under the provisions of the said Act (such registration to be certified) it be referred to the Taxing Master to tax as between Solicitor and client the costs of the Attorney-General of and consequent upon the petition presented in March one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three in ' the matter of the Act fifty-two Geo. III chapter one hundred and one and of the "Brinkburn and " Lucker Funds" and this suit and the Order of the twenty-fourth June one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four including therein the costs properly incurred of the Bishop of Newcastle the Archdeacon of Northumberland and the vicar of Felton respectively in reference to the 'communications between them and the Solicitors of the Attorney-General with respect to the 'enquiry and scheme directed by the Order of the twenty-fourth June one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four and of this application and the costs of the aforesaid scheme to be drawn up by the Bishop of Newcastle and of the Order to be obtained of Her Majesty in Council for carrying such scheme into effect. And it was ordered that the funds in Court after 'the aforesaid registration of the said Order in · Council to be certified as aforesaid should be dealt with as directed in the schedule to the said Order.

" 'And it was ordered that the dividends or 'interest to accrue from time to time upon the 'India Three Pounds Per Centum Stock directed 'by the said schedule to be transferred to the 'Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England be · paid by such Commissioners to the vicar for the ' time being of the united benefice of Long Fram-'lington-with-Brinkburn.

"And it was ordered that all further proceedings in that action except for the purpose of carrying that Order into effect be stayed but 'that Order was to be without prejudice to any question as to who was entitled to the patronage ' of the curacy of Brinkburn or to any recognition of the late plaintiff's title to such patronage contained in the Order of the tenth May one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven.

"That an office copy of the said Order of Court is hereunto annexed.

"It appears to us that under the provisions of the said Act of one and two Victoria chapter one hundred and six section twenty-six as extended by the Act of two and three Victoria chapter forty-nine the said chapelry and township of Long Framlington may be advantageously separated from the said united benefice of Felton-with-Long Framlington and be united for ecclesiastical purposes to the said township or place of Brinkburn.

" Pursuant to the Order of Court above-recited and the directions contained in the twenty-sixth section of the first and second Victoria chapter one hundred and six referred to therein we the said Bishop have drawn up a scheme in writing annexed to this representation describing the mode in which it appears to us that the alteration may best be effected and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction glebe lands tithes rent-charges and other ecclesiastical dues rates and payments and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested. And we do hereby submit the same to your Grace together with the consent in writing of the said patrons and incumbent and in case your Grace shall on full consideration and inquiry be satisfied therewith we request that you will be pleased to certify the same and the consents aforesaid by your report to Her Majesty in Council.

And whereas the said scheme drawn up by the said Bishop, and the consents referred to in the said representation are as follows:—

SCHEME.

"It is proposed to separate the township and chapelry of Long Framlington shown on the plan hereunto annexed and thereon coloured blue from the vicarage of Felton-with-Long Framlington in the county of Northumberland and diocese of Newcastle of which it at present forms part and to annex the same for ecclesiastical purposes to the township or place of Brinkburn in the same county and diocese also shown on the said plan and thereon coloured pink and that the said township and chapelry of Long Framlington with the township or place of Brinkburn shall be constituted a benefice and parish in the said diocese and shall be known henceforth by the name of the vicarage and parish of Long Framlington-with-Brinkburn of which the church or chapel situated at Long Framlington shall be the parish church and that the said parish of Long Framlington-with-Brinkburn upon this Scheme receiving the sanction of Her Majesty in Council be considered to be in the rural deanery of Rothbury in the diocese of Newcastle.

"That the incumbent of the said vicarage and parish of Long Framlington - with - Brinkburn when so formed shall have exclusive charge of souls within the limits thereof.

"That the fees for marriages, churchings and burials and other ecclesiastical dues offerings and emoluments arising within the said parish of Long Framlington - with - Brinkburn when so united as aforesaid shall belong to the vicar and incumbent thereof.

"That the patronage or right of presentation or nomination of a minister to serve the said Proposed united vicarage benefice and parish of in the matter of the Charitable Trusts Acts one

Long Framlington-with-Brinkburn shall be vested in the said Ernest Roland Lord Bishop of Newcastle and his successors Bishops of Newcastle for ever.

"That this scheme shall not in any way affect the right title or interest claimed by the said Arthur Hodgson Cadogan in respect of the said building known as Brinkburn Priory or the site thereof or the appointment of a chaplain thereto. "E. R. Newcastle."

"I the Right Honourable Hardinge Baron Halsbury Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain the patron or person entitled to present to the vicarage of Felton-with-Long Framlington were the same now vacant do hereby give my consent to the foregoing representation and scheme and the several matters and things therein stated and proposed.—Dated this fourth day of December one thousand eight hundred and ninety.

"I Arthur Hodgson Cadogan the patron or person claiming to be the patron of the chaplaincy or curacy of Brinkburn do hereby give my consent to the foregoing representation and scheme and the several matters and things therein stated and proposed.—Dated this twenty-eighth day of November one thousand eight hundred and ninety.

And whereas the said Archbishop, being satisfied with the said scheme, hath certified the same, and the consents aforesaid, to Her Majesty in Council by his report dated the tenth day of December one thousand eight hundred and ninety, which said report is in the words following, that is to say:—

"To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

"We the undersigned William by Divine Providence Lord Archbishop of York Primate of England and Metropolitan do hereby report to Your Majesty in Council:—

Your Majesty in Council:—
"That the Right Reverend Ernest Roland Lord Bishop of Newcastle hath represented to us that it appears to him that the chapelry and township of Long Framlington may be advantageously separated from the united benefice of Felton-with-Long Framlington in the county of Northumberland and diocese of Newcastle and within our province of York and be united for ecclesiastical purposes to the township or place of Brinkburn in the same county and diocese.

"That pursuant to an Order of Court bearing date the twenty-sixth day of February one thousand eight hundred and ninety in the High Court of Justice, Chancery Division in a suit between Cadogan Hodgson Cadogan (since deceased) plaintiff the Venerable George Bland (since deceased) and Your Majesty's Attorney-General defendants and between Arthur Hodgson Cadogan and Lindsay Eric Smith plaintiffs and the Venerable George Bland (since deceased) and Your Majesty's Attorney-General defendants and in the matter of the Charitable Trusts Acts one

thousand eight hundred and fifty-three to one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine the said Lord Bishop hath drawn up a scheme in writing proposing that the said chapelry and township of Long Framlington shall be severed from the vicarage of Felton-with-Long Framlington aforesaid and be annexed for ecclesiastical purposes to the said township or place of Brinkburn and be constituted therewith a separate parish and a benefice by the name of the vicarage and parish of Long Framlington-with-Brinkburn and that the patronage thereof shall be vested in the said Lord Bishop and in his successors Bishops of Newcastle for ever.

"That the said scheme describing the mode in which it appears to the said Lord Bishop that the proposed alterations may be best effected and how the changes consequent upon such alterations in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, dues rates and payments may be made with justice to all parties interested together with the consents thereto in writing of the patrons and incumbent whose interests are affected thereby have been transmitted to us by the said Lord Bishop for our consideration.

"An office copy of the said Order of Court together with the representation and scheme of the said Lord Bishop and the consents before referred to are hereunto annexed.

"And we the said Archbishop being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with the said scheme do hereby pursuant to the Act of the first and second years of Your Majesty's reign chapter one hundred and six certify the same and such consents as aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for carrying such scheme into effect.

And Her Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is further pleased to direct that the course and succession in which the respective patrons for the time being shall present or nominate to such united benefice, from time to time, as the same shall become vacant, shall be as follows, that is to say :- After the avoidance of the united benefice by the survivor of the present incumbents the first turn in every three turns shall belong to and be exercised by the said William Nelthorpe Beauclerk, his heirs, executors, administrators, and assigns, and the second and third turn in every three turns shall belong to and be exercised by the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain for the time being, his successors, and assigns; and so on in the same order for ever. HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-four, of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-four, and of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her Majesty chapter ninety-four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme or representation, bearing date the fifteenth day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England acting under the provisions of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four and of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme or Representation for altering the boundaries of the new parish of Christ Church, Hornsey and of the new parish of All Saints Highgate both in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of No. 26139.

Your Majesty in Council bearing date the first day of November in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two and published in the London Gazette upon the fourth day of the same month a part of the parish of Hornsey in the said county of Middlesex and diocese of London aforesaid was assigned as a district chapelry to the consecrated church called Christ Church situate at Crouch End within the limits of such parish and the same district chapelry was called 'The District Chapelry of Christ Church Hornsey.'

"And whereas by the authority of another Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the twentieth day of October in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four and published in the London Gazette on the same day certain contiguous portions of the new parish of Saint Michael Highgate of the new parish of Saint James Muswell Hill, and of the said parish of Hornsey all in the county and diocese aforesaid were assigned as a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of All Saints situate within the limits of the said new parish of Saint Michael Highgate and the same consolidated chapelry was called 'The Consolidated Chapelry of All Saints Highgate.'

Highgate.'
"And whereas both the said district chapelry of Christ Church Hornsey and the said consolidated chapelry of All Saints Highgate have each of them under the provisions of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and four become a new parish of the character contemplated by that Act and by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-seven and by the above-mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-four

"And whereas it has been represented to us and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said new parish of Christ Church Hornsey and of the said new parish of All Saints Highgate should be altered in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Frederick Bishop of the said diocese of London (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the boundaries both of the said new parish of Christ Church Hornsey and of the said new parish of All Saints Highgate shall be altered so that all that portion of the said new parish of Christ Church Hornsey which is described in the schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto appended and is thereon coloured pink shall be dissevered from such new parish and shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said new parish of All Saints Highgate.

"And we further represent recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore-mentioned Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

"The territory to be dissevered from the new

parish of Christ Church Hornsey in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London and to be annexed to the new parish of All Saints Highgate in the same county and diocese being:

THE PLEURO-PNEUMONIA (SUPPLEMENTAL) ORDER of 1891, No. 3.

By the Board of Agriculture.

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Board of Agriculture Act, 1889, and The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1890, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as

1.—(1.) Notwithstanding anything in Article 12 of The Pleuro-Pneumonia Order of 1891, foreign cattle landed at the Landing-Place for foreign animals (in this Order called the Landing-Place) at the port of Leith (such Landing-Place being within the limits of a Scheduled District declared by the Board of Agriculture under the said first-named Order) may with the permission in writing of an Inspector of the Board of Agriculture be moved out of that Scheduled District to any place of destination, whether such place of destination be within the limits of another Scheduled District or not, on the following conditions:

The cattle shall be loaded direct from the Landing-Place into railway trucks on the line of rails adjoining the Landing-Place on the dock side, and shall then be moved through and out of the Scheduled District to their place of destination without untrucking.

(2.) If any head of cattle to which such permission applies be moved in contravention of the aforesaid conditions, the owner of the animal, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or con-veying the animal, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it knowing it to have been moved in contravention as atoresaid, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

2. This Order may be cited as THE PLEURO-PNEUMONIA (SUPPLEMENTAL) ORDER OF 1891,

No. 3.

3. This Order shall commence and take effect from and immediately after this twenty-fourth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one.
