

On arrival in the Choir, the Coronet and Insignia of His late Royal Highness were placed on the Coffin.

His Royal Highness The Chief Mourner stood at the head of the Coffin, with his Supporters on either side.

The other Royal Personages and Representatives of absent Royal Personages stood near, and their Attendants behind them.

The Supporters of the Pall stood on either side, and The Lord Chamberlain and The Lord Steward at the foot of the Coffin.

As soon as The Choir reached their places, the 90th Psalm was chanted, music by Felton. The Dean of Windsor read the Lesson.

The three sentences, "Man that is born of a woman," &c., were sung by The Choir to the music of Croft and Purcell.

The Bishop of Rochester then read the sentence, "Forasmuch as it has pleased," &c. During which earth and flowers were cast upon the Coffin by The Reverend Canon Dalton.

The Choir then sang "I heard a voice from Heaven," &c., by Croft.

The Bishop of Rochester read the concluding Prayers.

Garter King of Arms then Proclaimed the Style of His late Royal Highness as follows:—

"Thus it hath pleased Almighty God to take out of this transitory life unto His Divine Mercy the late Most High, Mighty, and Illustrious Prince Albert Victor Christian Edward, Duke of Clarence and Avondale, Earl of Athlone, Duke of Saxony, Prince of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha, Knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, Knight of the Most Illustrious Order of Saint Patrick, Eldest Son of Their Royal Highnesses The Prince and Princess of Wales, and Grandson of Her Most Excellent Majesty Victoria, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith, Empress of India, and of His Royal Highness The Prince Consort.

"May God bless and preserve Her Majesty with long life, health, and honour."

After which was sung Sir Arthur Sullivan's Anthem from the Martyr of Antioch, "Brother, thou hast gone before us."

In conclusion, The Bishop of Rochester pronounced the Blessing, and Chopin's Funeral March was played as His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales, followed by The Royal Family, Royal Personages, and other Representatives of Royal Personages, with their Attendants, retired from the Chapel to the Deanery.

Others who had taken part in the Procession and those who had been invited to the Ceremony left the Chapel by the South Entrance.

Her Royal Highness The Princess of Wales, accompanied by Their Royal Highnesses The Princess Louise, Duchess of Fife, The Princesses Victoria and Maud of Wales, The Princess Mary Adelaide, Duchess of Teck, and Her Serene Highness The Princess Victoria Mary of Teck, were present in the Queen's Pew during the Ceremony, with Miss Knollys and Sir Francis Knollys, K.C.M.G., C.B., in attendance, and afterwards went to Windsor Castle.

Their Royal Highnesses The Princess Helena, Princess Christian of Schleswig-Holstein, The Princess Beatrice, Princess Henry of Battenberg, The Duchess of Connaught and Strathearne, and The Duchess of Albany, attended by the Baroness von und zu Egloffstein, Miss Minnie Cochrane, Honourable Mrs. N. Dalrymple, and Miss Beatrice Heron-Maxwell were also present at the Ceremony in one of the Royal Pews.

At half-past four o'clock, the Remains of His late Royal Highness were privately removed to the Memorial Chapel, borne by the men of the 10th Royal Hussars, and followed by His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales, K.G., and the Royal and distinguished personages above-mentioned, while the Dead March in "Saul," by Handel, was played on the Organ, at which Dr. Parratt presided.

His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales, K.G., with The Prince George of Wales, K.G., and The Duke of Fife, K.T., then proceeded to Windsor Castle, The Royal Family and Royal Personages returning to London.

Levée Dress was worn.

A Special Train conveying those invited to the Ceremony left Paddington Station at two o'clock, and returned from Windsor at half-past four and five o'clock.

Carriages were in waiting to convey them to St. George's Chapel, and to the South-Western Station to join the Funeral Procession there, and to return afterwards.
