The Ladies who propose to attend Her Majesty's Drawing Room are requested to bring with them to the Drawing Room two large cards, with their names clearly written thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in Attendance, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to Her Royal Highness.

PRESENTATIONS.

The privilege of making presentations at a Drawing Room is restricted to those Ladies who have themselves been previously presented to Her Majesty, and who are themselves present at the Drawing Room.

Under such circumstances a Lady has the privilege of presenting one Lady only at a Drawing Room in addition to her Daughters or

Daughters-in-law.

This restriction does not apply to Ladies who, from official position or other circumstances, are specially privileged to make presentations to Her

Majesty.

.The Lady who proposes to present another must send in writing the name of such Lady to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, not later than two days previous to the Drawing Room,"in order that the Lord Chamberlain may submit the name to Her Majesty, when, if it be approved, presentation cards will be forwarded.

Printed Forms for this purpose can be obtained at the Lord Chamberlain's Office.

It is particularly requested that the names of

the Lady to be presented be very distinctly written on the presentation cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain at the Drawing Room, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

It is not expected that Gentlemen will present themselves at a Drawing Room, except in attend-

ance on the Ladies of their families.

Any Gentleman who under these circumstances should desire to be presented to The Queen will observe the same regulations as are in force for Her Majesty's Levees.

The State Apartments will be open for the reception of Company coming to Court at two o'clock.

THEREAS by "The Consular Salaries and Fees Act, 1891," Her Majesty the Queen is authorized by Order in Council to fix the fees to be taken in respect of any matter or thing done by a Consular officer in the execution of his office, and to vary such fees by way of increase or decrease, and to abolish fees, and to create new

And whereas by an Order in Council dated the twenty-fourth November, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one (hereinafter referred to as "The Foreign Marriages Order in Council, 1891"), and made under the said Act and the Foreign Marriage Acts, certain fees are prescribed to be taken by Consular officers and others in respect of marriages:

And whereas "The Consular Fees Order in Council, 1887," continues in force under the provisions of the first-recited Act as if it had been issued in pursuance thereof, but the marriage fees comprised therein have in certain particulars been altered by "The Foreign Marriages Order in

Council, 1891."

And whereas under "The Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890," Her Majesty in Council has power to make Orders in Council, and also to revoke and vary Orders in Council made, or deemed to have been made, in pursuance of that Act:

And whereas it is expedient that "The Consular Fees Order in Council, 1887," should be repealed, and that the fees established thereby, including the marriage fees fixed by "The Foreign Marriages Order in Council, 1891," should be fixed by an Order in Council made under the provisions of "The Consular Salaries and Fees Act, 1891":

Now, therefore, in pursuance of the beforementioned Acts, it is hereby ordered by Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, as follows : -

1. This Order may be cited as "The Consular Fees Order in Council; 1892."

2. The several fees set forth in the Tables annexed to this Order are hereby established, and the said Tables and notes thereto shall be construed as part of this Order.

3. Such provisions of any Order in Council made or continued in force under the provisions of "The Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890," as are inconsistent with anything in this Order are hereby revoked and the provisions of this Order and of the said Tables shall be and are hereby substituted for such first-mentioned provisions, and the fees herein prescribed may or shall be taken accordingly

4. This Order shall not extend to any place in

China, Japan, or Corea.

W HEREAS by "The Consular Salaries and Fees Act, 1891," Her Majesty the Queen is authorized by Order in Council to fix the fees to be taken in respect of any matter or thing done by a Consular officer in the execution of his office, and to vary such fees by way of increase or decrease, and to abolish fees and to create new fees:

And whereas by an Order in Council, dated the twenty-fourth November, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one (hereinafter referred to as "The Foreign Marriages Order in Council, 1891"), and made under the said Act and the Foreign Marriage Acts, certain fees are prescribed to be taken by Consular officers and others in in respect of marriages:

And whereas "The China, Japan, and Corea (Consular Fees) Order in Council, 1887," continues in force under the provisions of the first recited Act as if it had been issued in pursuance thereof, but the marriage fees comprised therein have in certain particulars been altered by "The Foreign Marriages Order in Council, 1891:"

And whereas under "The Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890," Her Majesty in Council has power to make Orders in Council, and also to revoke or vary Orders in Council made, or deemed to have

been made, in pursuance of that Act:

And whereas it is expedient that "The China, Japan, and Corea (Consular Fees) Order in Council, 1887," should be repealed, and that the fees established thereby, including the marriage fees fixed by "The Foreign Marriages Order in Council, 1891," should be fixed by an Order in Council made under the provisions of "The Consular Salaries and Fees Act, 1891:"

(Now therefore, in pursuance of the beforementioned Acts, it is hereby ordered by Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as "The China, Japan, and Corea (Consular Fees) Order in Council, 1892."

2. The several fees set forth in the Tables annexed to this Order are hereby established, and the said Tables and notes thereto shall be con-

strued as part of this Order.

3. Such provisions of any Order in Council made or continued in force under the provisions of "The Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890," and relating or applicable to China, Japan, or Corea, as are inconsistent with anything in this Order, are hereby revoked, and the provisions of this Order and of the said Tables, shall be and are hereby substituted for such first-mentioned provisions, and the fees herein prescribed may or shall be taken accordingly.

4. This Order shall apply to all places in

China, Japan, and Corea.

5. "The China, Japan, and Corea (Consular Fees) Order in Council, 1887," is hereby repealed as to all places to which this Order applies, but this repeal shall not revive any Table, provision, or Order in Council abolished or repealed by the said Order, or affect any right or liability existing at the commencement of this Order in any place.

6. This Order shall come into operation in respect of each Consular jurisdiction on the first of August, one thousand eight hundred and ninetytwo, or at such later date as, in the case of any particular Consular jurisdiction or part thereof, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State by any general or particular instructions may from time to time direct.

THEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter Majesty King William the Fourth; chapter seventy seven; and of the Act of the fifth year of Her Majesty (Session two) chapter twenty-six duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the twenty-eighth day of April, in the year one thousand eight I

is provided in Part IV of | hundred and ninety-two, in the words following,

that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven, and of the Act of the fifth year of Your Majesty (Session two) chapter twenty-six have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for authorizing certain alterations and improvements at the episcopal residence belonging to the See of Llandaff which is situate at Llandaff in the county of Glamorgan.

"Whereas the Right Reverend Richard, now Bishop of the Diocese of Llandaff is desirous that certain permanent improvements should be made at the said episcopal residence at Llandaff, and has submitted to us the particulars of such pro-

posed improvements.

1," And whereas the said Bishop is also desirous and it appears to us to be expedient that towards the cost of effecting the said proposed improvements a sum of three hundred pounds being a sum which does not exceed two years' income of the See should be provided by borrowing the same by way of mortgage upon the security of all and every part of the lands tenements and hereditaments endowments or emoluments which now belong or may hereafter belong to the Bishoprick of Llandaff.

Now therefore with the consent of the said Richard, Bishop of the said diocese of Llaudaff (testified by his having affixed his signature and episcopal seal to this scheme) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly recommend and propose that the said Bishop be authorized to borrow from the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and that the said Governors be empowered to lend under the provisions of the above-mentioned Acts, any sum not exceeding three hundred pounds, and that as a security for the same, the said Bishop do mortgage all and every part of the lands tenements and hereditaments and endowments or emoluments which now belong or may hereafter belong to his said See to the said Governors by deed for the term of twenty years or until the said sum of three hundred pounds with the interest for the same as hereinafter - mentioned and all costs and charges which may attend the recovery thereof, shall be fully paid and satisfied and that such principal sum shall be repaid with interest in manner following, that is to say :--during and in respect of the first period of twelve months of the said term of twenty years computed from the day of the date of the mortgage, no part of the said principal sum shall be repayable, but the said Bishop or his successors shall yearly at the end of the second period of twelve months so computed and at the end of every such like period of twelve months thereafter pay to the said Governors their successors or assigns one-fifteenth part of the said principal sum of three hundred pounds until the whole thereof shall be repaid, and shall also at the end of the first and each succeeding period of twelve months computed as aforesaid, pay interest at the rate of four pounds per cent. per annum on the said principal sum or on so much thereof as shall from time to time remain unpaid, and that if and when it shall happen that either the principal or the interest directed to be paid as hereinafter-mentioned shall be in arrear and unpaid for the space of forty days after the same shall have become due, it shall and may be lawful for the said Governors their successors and assigns to recover the same and the costs and charges

attending the recovery thereof by distress and sale, in the like manner as rents may be recovered by landlords or lessors from their tenants by the laws in force at the time of such distress and sale. And that such mortgage deed shall be in the form and to the effect to be approved by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, and shall bind as well the said Richard now Bishop of the said diocese of Llandaff as every succeeding Bishop of the same diocese until the principal money and interest costs and charges shall have been paid off and discharged.

"And we further recommend and propose that the said sum of three hundred pounds shall be paid to us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners and that the receipt of our joint treasurers for the time being endorsed on the said mortgage deed shall be a good and sufficient discharge to the said Governors and their successors for the same, who shall not be bound or required to see to the application thereof, and that upon the receipt of the said sum of three hundred pounds the whole or any part or parts thereof shall be applied by us at such times and in such manner as shall appear to us to be expedient towards effecting the said proposed improvements at the episcopal residence aforesaid.

"And we further recommend and propose that the Bishop for the time being of the said diocese of Llandaff shall at his personal charge insure against loss or damage by fire, and keep insured the said episcopal residence, the said insurance to be for a sum of seven thousand and two hundred pounds, and to be effected in one or more of the public offices of insurance in London or Westminster and that in case of loss or damage by fire to the same house of residence the moneys receivable in respect of the said insurance shall be paid over to us by the said Bishop and shall with any interest or accumulations thereon be applied by us in rebuilding or repairing the same house of residence with the concurrence of the said Bishop.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in conformity with the provisions of the herein named Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts, and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Llandaff.

REGULATIONS AS TO FOREIGN TELEGRAMS.

I, THE Right Honourable Sir James Fergusson, Baronet, G.C.S.I., M.P., Her Majesty's Postmaster-General, with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, given under the hands of two of the said Commissioners, whose names are hereunder signed and written, by virtue of the power vested in me by the Telegraph Act (1885), and of every other power enabling me in this behalf, do hereby make the following Regulations for fixing the sums to be from time to time paid for the transmission of Foreign Telegrams, and for services rendered in connexion therewith, and for the general conduct of Telegraphic business in relation to Foreign Telegrams.

Short Title.

I. These Regulations may be cited as the Foreign Telegram Regulations, 1892.

II. In these Regulations, unless the context

otherwise requires:

The expression "Foreign Telegram" means a Telegram originating in or destined for a place out of the United Kingdom.

The expression "United Kingdom" includes

the Channel Islands and the Isle of Man.

The expression "European Telegram" means a Foreign Telegram originating in a place and destined for a place both of which places under the provisions of the International Telegraph Convention belong to the European system of telegraphy.

The expression "Extra European Telegram" means a Foreign Telegram originating in or destined for a place which does not belong to the

European system of telegraphy

The expression "Inland Telegram" means a Telegram originating in a place and destined for a place each within the United Kingdom.

The expression "Ordinary Telegram" means a Foreign Telegram written in plain language, that is to say, in words, figures, or letters, com-bined into sentences or phrases, conveying an intelligible meaning in any language admitted in International Telegraph correspondence in any State a party to the International Telegraph Convention (hereinafter referred to as an admitted telegraph language), and such expression shall include part of a Telegram.

The expression "Code Telegram" means a

Foreign Telegram written in preconcerted language, that is to say, in words intelligible in themselves, but not combined into sentences or phrases conveying an intelligible meaning in an admitted telegraph language; and such expression

includes part of a Telegram.

The expression "Cypher Telegram" means a Foreign Telegram, which, though composed of groups of figures (or of letters in the cases hereinafter mentioned) does not comply with the definition of an Ordinary Telegram or a Code Telegram, and such expression includes part of a

Telegram.

The expression "Service Telegram" means a Telegram forwarded from a place within the United Kingdom to a Foreign Telegraph Office, or from a Foreign Telegraph Office to a place within the United Kingdom at the request and cost of the sender or receiver of an original Foreign Telegram for the purpose of obtaining information or giving instructions respecting such original Foreign Telegram.

The expression "Authorized List of Offices"

the time being published by the International Telegraph Office at Berne.

Classes of Telegrams.

III. (1.) Foreign Telegrams are of three classes-

(a.) Ordinary Telegrams.

(b.) Code Telegrams, and (c.) Cypher Telegrams.

(2.) A Telegram may be partly an Ordinary Telegram, partly a Code Telegram, and partly a

Cypher Telegram. (3.) Code Telegrams and Cypher Telegrams

shall be accepted for transmission to such countries only as are willing to receive and deliver them.

Code Telegrams.

IV. (1.) Code Telegrams (whether European Telegrams or Extra-European Telegrams) may contain words taken from any or all of the following languages, viz., English, French, German, Italian, Spanish, Portuguese, Dutch, and Latin, but if any word used in a Code Telegram shall exceed ten letters in length, such word shall be charged for extra as hereinafter mentioned.

(2.) Proper names shall not be used in the text of Code Telegrams except in their natural

sense

The following words forming part of a Code Telegram shall be chargeable as Cypher,

(a.) Any proper name used otherwise than in

its natural sense.

(b.) Any word of more than ten letters used otherwise than according to its ordinary meaning in plain language.

(c.) Any other word not admissible in a Code,

Telegram.

- (4.) If there is any doubt as to whether a proper name is used in its natural sense or not the sender may be required to produce and explain
- (5.) If there is a doubt whether any expression is a genuine word the sender may be required to show it in a standard dictionary to be selected by the Postmaster-General.
- 6.) Any word in plain language occurring in a Code Telegram shall be charged for as if it formed part of an Ordinary Extra-European Telegram.

Cypher Telegrams.
V. (1.) A Cypher Telegram sent or received by a private person must be wholly in figures except that it may comprise trade marks composed of secret letters, and also that the signals of the Universal Commercial Code may be included in Telegrams to and from Semaphore Stations.

(2.) Government Cypher Telegrams may consist either of figures or of letters, but may not

contain both figures and letters.

(3.) Any word in plain language or in Code occurring in a Cypher Telegram shall be charged for as part of an Ordinary or Code Telegram, as the case may be.

(4.) Words incorrectly spelled, so as to reduce the number of letters below the maximum number of letters allowed as one word or words incorrectly joined together, contrary to the usage of the language, shall be charged for as Cypher in any Telegram in which they occur.

(5.) When a Telegram is expressed in the language of the country of the office of delivery the decision of that office in any question arising

under the last sub-section shall be final.

Charges for Transmission. The expression "Authorized List of Offices" VI. (1.) The charges for the transmission of means the list of Foreign Telegraph Offices for a Foreign Telegram shall be at such rates per word, and all other charges in connexion with Foreign Telegrams shall be such as respectively are or may be from time to time fixed by the various Telegraph Administrations in accordance with the provisions of the International Telegraph Regulations for the time being in force, and so far as they are concerned by the private Telegraph Companies.

Provided always, that the minimum charge for a Telegram transmitted from the United Kingdom to any other place in Europe or for a prepaid reply to such a Telegram shall be the sum of 10d.

(2.) The name and address of the addressee of a Foreign Telegram, and likewise the name and address of the sender thereof, when forming part of the matter telegraphed, shall be counted as part of the words for which payment is required.

(3.) The Postmaster-General shall from time to time publish in the London Gazette the several rates per word for the time being fixed as provided in these Regulations, and in any proceeding by or against the Postmaster-General relating to the sum payable in respect of a Foreign Telegram the production of a copy of the Gazette containing the rate in question, shall be conclusive evidence that such rate is the rate for the time being fixed as aforesaid.

Mode of Payment of Charges.

VII. (1.) All charges in respect of the transmission of Foreign Telegrams, and of all other services rendered in connexion with Foreign Telegrams, shall (except as hereinafter provided) be paid by means of stamps.

(2.) Except as otherwise provided all such charges as aforesaid shall be paid in advance by

the sender of the Telegram.

(3.) Where it is found by the Office of delivery that an insufficient sum has been paid for the transmission of a Telegram, or for any services rendered in connexion therewith, any additional charges payable in respect of the Telegram shall be payable in the first instance by the addressee either by means of stamps or in money; and the Telegram may be withheld until such charges have been paid. If, nevertheless, such charges are not paid by the addressee, they shall be payable by the sender.

Mode of Counting Ordinary and Cypher Telegrams.

VIII. (1.) For the purpose of calculating the charge for a Foreign Telegram the maximum length of a word is fixed in the case of Ordinary European Telegrams at 15 letters, and in the case of Ordinary Extra-European Telegrams at 10 letters

(2.) Any additional letters shall be charged for as extra (words at the rate of 15 or 10 letters respectively to the word, any number of letters over and above an exact multiple of 15 or 10 (as the case may be) being treated as one word.

Examples.

Responsibility (14 letters) 1 word. 2 words.

Irresponsibility (16 letters) 2 words. 2 words.

(3.) Cypher Telegrams shall be counted accord-

ing to the rules applicable to figures and to letters and groups of letters not conveying an intelligible

meaning in an admitted telegraph language.

(4.) In Ordinary Telegrams and in Code Telegrams "Ch" counts as one letter, but in Government Cypher Telegrams, in Trade Marks occurring in Private Cypher Telegrams, and in the signals of the Universal Commercial Code occurring in Telegrams to or from Semaphore Stations, as two letters.

Examples.

Archduchess = 9 characters 1 word. European. 1 word. 2 words. Envelope 2 words. 2 words.

Compound Words.

IX. (1.) Subject to the provisions of these Regulations as to the maximum length of words, the following rules shall apply to words occurring in the body of a Foreign Telegram:—

(a.) Ordinary compound words and names shall, when written without break, be counted as single words, but when written with a hyphen, apostrophe, or other sign, shall be

counted as separate words.

(b.) A word denoting a part of a town, such as street, square, road, shall be always counted as a separate word, whether added to a name or not.

(2.) The following Rules shall apply to the name of the office and to the name of the place of destination when occurring in the address of a Foreign Telegram.

(a.) Each of the names aforesaid shall be charged for as one word whatever number of letters or words such name may contain.

(b.) In order to secure the benefit of the lastmentioned rule, such names must be written in accordance with the accepted method of spelling, or as they are given in the authorized list of offices.

Examples of the application of the foregoing Rules as to counting words in ordinary Foreign Telegrams.

Numbers expressed in Words.

X. Subject to the provisions of these Regulations as to the maximum length of words, words expressing numbers or fractions shall, when written without a break, be counted as single words; but when not so written shall be counted as separate words.

Figures and Letters.

XI. (1.) Numbers expressed in figures shall be counted, in the case of a European Telegram, at the rate of five figures to one word, and in the case of an Extra-European Telegram, at the rate of three figures to one word.

(2.) Any single figure, and any number consisting of figures less than five or three, as the case may be, shall be counted as one word.

(3.) Any surplus over an exact multiple of five or three, as the case may be, shall be counted as one word.

(4.) Any letter used separately (as for example an initial letter of a name) shall be counted as one word.

(5.) Letters and groups of letters not conveying an intelligible meaning in an admitted telegraph language, when used in a private Cypher Telegram to denote trade marks; or in a Govern-

ment Cypher Telegram, or in the Universal Commercial Code in a Telegram to and from a Semaphore Station, shall be counted in the same way as figures and groups of figures.

(6.) Letters added to figures to form ordinal numbers shall be counted as part of the same

group with the figures.

(7.) Letters added to figures otherwise than to form ordinal numbers shall be counted separately from the figures.

ately from the figures.
(8.) Bars of division, decimal points, and stops used in the formation of numbers shall be counted as figures.

Underline and other Marks and Signs.

XII. Each of the following marks or signs shall be counted as one word, viz.:—

(1.) A line under a word or passage.

(2.) The two signs or marks used to indicate a parenthesis.

(3.) Inverted commas used to indicate a quotation.

Necessary Contents of Telegrams.

XIII. (1.) A Foreign Telegram shall always contain, as part of the matter telegraphed, the name and address of the person to whom it is sent; and this must always consist of two words at least, one word being the name of the addressee, and the other the name of the terminal Telegraph Office.

(2.) The sender must sign his name and write bis address on the form of the Telegram in the space provided for the purpose, but his name and address need not form part of the matter

(3.) A Foreign Telegram must contain, as part of the matter telegraphed, one or more words of text in addition to the name and address of the

person to whom it is sent.

(4.) The address of a Foreign Telegram shall contain the particulars requisite to ensure the delivery of the Telegram at its destination without difficulty or the necessity for making inquiries.

(5.) No correction or alteration in, or addition to, an address, can be made except by means of a fresh Telegram paid for at the ordinary rate.

Telegrams to follow Addressee.

XIV. (1.) Where the sender of an European Telegram is not certain of the exact place at which the addressee will be found, he may address the Telegram to several places, and may insert in parenthesis before the addresses the affix F.S., meaning "Faire Suivre," which shall be charged for as one word.

(2.) In such case all the addresses shall be charged for as part of the Telegram at the rate of

charge applicable to the first address.

(3.) A reply to a "Faire Suivre" Telegram cannot be prepaid by the sender of such Telegram.

Registration of Addresses and Special Instructions. XV. (1.) Any person may register at the Chief Telegraph Office of the Town in which he resides an abbreviated or arbitrary address to be used by his correspondents in Telegrams intended for delivery to him in that town, together with the corresponding full or correct address, and during the period of 12 months after such registration telegrams received with the abbreviated or arbitrary address shall be delivered at the corresponding full or correct address, but the abbreviated or arbitrary address shall consist of not less than two words, one of which shall be the Town or place of delivery.

(2.) Any person may register at the Chief Telegraph Office of the Town in which he resides special instructions as to the delivery of Telegrams at a different address in the case of a change of residence or place of business, and as to the delivery of Telegrams at times when his place of business is closed; and Telegrams shall be delivered in accordance with such instructions.

(3.) The charge for the registration of an abbreviated or arbitrary address shall be one

guinea per annum.
(4.) The charge for the registration of special instructions as to delivery shall be one guinea

.per annum, provided that-

(a.) In the case of a change of residence or place of business, such instructions shall be registered free of charge, if not applicable to a longer period than one month.

(b.) When an arbitrary or abbreviated address is registered, special instructions as to delivery of Telegrams at such address may be registered at the same time and for the same period free of charge.

(5.) The Postmaster-General may refuse registration of any address or special instructions, or

cancel such registration at any time.

Delivery.

XVI. (1.) Foreign Telegrams shall, as regards delivery within the United Kingdom, be subject to the regulations from time to time in force respecting Inland Telegrams.

(2.) Foreign Telegrams shall, as regards delivery abroad, be subject to the regulations from time to time in force respecting the delivery of Telegrams within the respective countries to which they are addressed.

- (3.) In the following cases, namely: (a.) Where a Foreign Telegram is addressed to a place not entered in the authorized List of Offices.
- (b.) Where it is desired that a Foreign Telegram shall be delivered by special means beyond the free delivery of the Terminal Office, the sender shall give instructions by what special means the Telegram is to be forwarded from the Terminal Office.

(4.) Such instructions as last aforesaid shall be written in the Telegram before the addressee's

(5.) The sender may prepay the cost of delivery by special means, and in such case must make a

deposit for that purpose.

(6.) Where the cost of delivery by special means is prepaid, the letters XP (meaning " express paid") shall be inserted in the Telegram before the address, and shall be charged for as one word, and the cost of a Notice of the delivery of the Telegram (which Notice shall be charged for as ten additional words) shall also be prepaid. Such notice shall state the expense incurred in such delivery.

Delivery by Post.

XVII. (1.) A Foreign Telegram may be posted abroad.

(2.) If it is to be posted in a Foreign Country for delivery in the same country no charge for postage shall be made except in the case of those countries from which a notification is received that a special charge must be made.

(3.) If it is to be posted at a Frontier Town in a Foreign Country for delivery in another Foreign Country not beyond sea, double postage will be charged on delivery, and no charge for postage shall be collected from the sender.

(4.) If it is to be posted in a Foreign Country for delivery in another Foreign Country beyond sea, postage shall be prepaid at rates which will

be notified from time to time.

(5.) The sender may direct that a Foreign Telegram shall be posted from any office as a Registered Letter, and in any such case the following rules shall apply:—

(a.) The prefix PR (meaning " post registered ") shall be inserted in the Telegram before the address, and such prefix shall be charged for

as one word.

(b.) A fee of 5d. shall be paid by the sender as

a Registration Fec.

(6.) A Foreign Telegram may be sent by post from the United Kingdom to a place abroad. In such case the requisite amount for its conveyance by post shall be prepaid, in addition to the amount chargeable for the transmission of the Telegram as an Inland Telegram. The word "post" and the name of the Town from which the Telegram is to be posted must be added to the address, and shall be charged for as part thereof.

Charges upon Telegrams to and from Semaphore Stations.

XVIII. (1.) A Foreign Telegram may be sent to a Semaphore Station for the purpose of being signalled to a ship.

(2.) Any such Telegram must be written either in the language of the country in which is situated the Semaphore Station to which it is addressed, or by which it is to be signalled, or in the Univeral Commercial Code of signals for ships. In the latter case it shall be charged for as a

Cypher Telegram.

(3.) Telegrams to Semaphore Stations shall only be accepted for transmission to such countries as are willing to receive and deliver them.

(4.) The sender of a Telegram to a Semaphore Station shall pay a signalling charge of 10d., in addition to all other sums chargeable under the Regulations.

(5.) The receiver of a Telegram from a Semaphore Station abroad shall pay a like signalling charge of 10d., in addition to all other sums

chargeable under these Regulations.

(6.) The Postmaster-General may, at his discretion, refuse to transmit or to deliver any Telegram from a Semaphore Station abroad upon which any charge or charges is or are due or chargeable under these Regulations.

Telegrams to be called for.

XIX. (1.) A Foreign Telegram intended to be left until called for at a Telegraph or Post Office must have the words "Telegraphe restante," or "Poste restante," as the case may be, added to the address; and such words shall be charged as part of the address.

(2.) Any Telegram so addressed shall not be kept at the office to which it is addressed for more than six weeks, and if not called for within that

time shall be destroyed.

Deposit of Telegrams in Letter Boxes.

XX. (1.) A Foreign Telegram bearing stamps representing the full charges for the transmission thereof, and deposited in a wall or pillar-box, or in a letter-box of an ordinary Post Office (not being a Telegraph Office), shall, on the first collection of letters from the place of deposit, be conveyed to a Telegraph Office, and forwarded thence in due course by telegraph.

(2.) No Telegram so deposited as aforesaid will be forwarded unless it bear such stamps as according to these Regulations are required for

the due transmission thereof.

Prepaid Replies.

XXI. (1.) The sender of a Foreign Telegram (except a "Faire Suivre" Telegram, as aforesaid) may pay for the transmission of a reply thereto at the rates chargeable under these Regu-

(2.) If the sender desires to pay for a reply of 10 words he must insert before the address of the receiver the letters RP., which shall be charged

for as one additional word.

(3.) If he desires to pay for a reply of more or less than 10 words he must insert the letters RP. and the specific number of words for which he desires to pay (for example, RP. 15), and two additional words shall then be charged for.

(4.) In the case of a Foreign Telegram having multiple addresses (according to No. XXVIII of these Regulations) the sender must insert the letters RP., or RP. and the specific number of words, before each address in respect of which he desires to pay for a reply.

(5.) A reply of more than 30 words cannot

(6.) In the case of those Countries for which a minimum charge per Telegram has been notified, a reply the normal charge for which would be less than such minimum charge cannot

be prepaid.

(7.) A Voucher for the reply is issued by the office of delivery, and the person receiving it may within six weeks after the date of the issue thereof use it in payment, or part payment, as the case may be, of a Foreign Telegram to any destination.

(8.) If the addressee do not use the reply form in the case of an European Telegram, no claim for the return of the sum paid for a reply will be entertained, but in the case of an Extra-European Telegram the amount paid for a reply shall be returned to the sender, provided the addressee returns the form to the Post Office within three months from the date of its issue, and requests that the money may be refunded.

(9.) No sum shall in the case of an European Telegram be returned to the sender on the ground that the charge for the reply is less than the amount prepaid; but in the case of an Extra-European Telegram any excess of charge shall be refunded to the sender of such Telegram on

his application.

(10.) When a Telegram is received to which a reply has been prepaid abroad, the prepaid reply form delivered with the Telegram, shall specify the amount prepaid. If the reply costs more than the amount prepaid, the sender of the reply must pay the balance.

Repeated or Collated Telegrams.

XXII. (1.) A Foreign Telegram may, at the request of the sender, be collated, i.e., repeated from Office to Office, for an additional payment at the rate of a quarter of the ordinary charge. Fractions of a halfpenny shall be charged as a halfpenny in the case of European Telegrams and fractions of a penny shall be charged as a penny in the case of Extra-European Telegrams.

(2.) In the case of those Countries for which a minimum charge per Telegram has been notified, the lowest charge for collation shall be a quarter

of such minimum charge.

(3.) The affix TC, indicating collation, must be written in parentheses before the address, and shall be charged for as one word.

(4.) No copy of the repetition shall be handed

to the sender.

Repetition or Collation within the United . Kingdom.

XXIII. (1.) A Foreign Telegram may be collated between the office of origin in the United Kingdom and the office from which the Telegram is despatched abroad, or handed over to a Cable

(2.) The charge for such collation shall be at the rate for the transmission of an ordinary

inland Telegram.

(3.) No copy of the repetition shall be handed to the sender.

Rectification of and Inquiries respecting Telegrams.

XXIV. (1.) The receiver of a Foreign Telegram may, within 72 hour after its delivery, request the repetition of words or passages which appear to him to be incorrect.

(2.) For this purpose he shall pay for two separate Service Telegrams (which shall, except as hereinafter mentioned, be charged for like

Ordinary Telegrams) viz.:—

(a.) A Telegram requesting the repetition and containing an indication of the length of reply paid for. In this Telegram the name

of the place of destination is not charged for.
(b.) A Telegram conveying the words or passages to be repeated, plus the Receiver's

(3.) The sender of a Foreign Telegram may ikewise, within 72 hours after the despatch of such Telegram, correct the same, or any part thereof, on payment of the charge for the Service Telegram necessary for such purpose.

(4.) The Sender or Receiver of a Foreign Telegram may, within 72 hours after the despatch or delivery thereof, and upon prepayment of the Service Telegram or Telegrams necessary for the purpose, make inquiries or give instructions respecting such Telegram.

Repetition of Received Telegrams.

XXV. (1.) The Receiver of a Foreign Telegram may, within 24 hours after its delivery, have it repeated from the office in the United Kingdom at which it was received by the Post Office.

(2.) The charge for such repetition shall be at the rate of charge for an Inland Telegram of

the same length.

Notice of Delivery.

XXVI. (1.) The sender of a Foreign Telegram may have a notice of the time at which it was delivered abroad transmitted to him by Tolegraph.

(2.) If the sender desires to receive such notice he must insert before the address of the receiver the letters CR, which shall be charged

for as one word.

(3.) The charge for such notice shall be at the rate of charge for a Telegram of 10 words, and shall in every case be prepaid by the sender of the original Telegram.

Receipts for Telegrams.

XXVII. (1.) The sender of a Foreign Telegram shall be entitled to a receipt, signed by the forwarding Postmaster or Telegraphist, in the following form, or in such other form as the Postmaster-General shall from time to time approve, that is to say :-

This is to certify that I have this day received a Telegram No. to be forwarded

and that charges thereon, , have been duly

(2.) The charge for such receipt shall be 2d.

Multiple Addresses.

XXVIII. (1.) A Foreign Telegram addressed to several persons in the same town, or to the same person at different addresses in the same town, shall be charged for as a Single Telegram, plus a sum of 5d. for every extra copy to be delivered, if the total number of chargeable words, including all the addresses, does not exceed 100; an additional sum of 5d. per extra copy being charged for every additional 100 words or part of 100 words.

(2.) In the charge for the transmission of the Telegram all the addresses shall be charged for as

part of the Telegram.

amounting to

(3.) Telegrams having multiple addresses shall not be accepted for transmission to countries which do not admit them.

Cancellation of Telegrams.

XXIX. The sender of a Foreign Telegram may cancel it, subject to the following provisions:

- (a.) If transmission has not commenced, or if it has commenced but is not completed, the Telegram shall be cancelled by the words, "Cancelled at the request of the Sender, being written across it.
- (b.) If transmission to the next office is completed, whether by wire or tube, the sender shall pay for a Service Telegram to the Terminal Office.
- (c.) If the sender desires to be informed by telegraph whether his request has been complied with, he shall pay in addition for a reply of ten words.

(d.) If the sender does not desire to be informed by telegraph, he shall receive the information

by post.

Reimbursement.

XXX. (1.) The sum paid for the transmission of a Foreign Telegram shall be refunded:

(a.) When the Telegram has failed to reach its destination owing to an error on the part

of the Telegraph Service.
(b.) When a Telegram has been delayed beyond two days if a European Telegram, or beyond six days if an Extra-European Telegram.

(c.) In the case of a Collated Telegram, when the Telegram is rendered wholly uscless by

inaccuracy of transmission.

(2.) A portion of the sum paid for transmission of a Foreign Telegram is refunded in the following cases and according to the following rules:

- (a.) In the case of an Extra-European Telegram, when any word has been omitted in transmission, the amount paid for such word shall be refunded unless the addressee has had the error rectified in the manner prescribed by these Regulations.
- (b.) When the telegram has been cancelled at the office of origin before transmission has commenced, the amount prepaid shall be refunded less the sum of 5d.
- (c.) If the Telegram is cancelled after transmission has commenced, but before it reaches the Terminal Office, any balance of charges due to the Sender shall be returned to him.

(3.) The sum paid by the addressee for the rectification of a Foreign Collated Telegram shall

be refunded.:

(a.) Wholly, if the words repeated wholly differ from the words originally transmitted.

(b.) To the extent of a proportional part, if some only of the words repeated differ from the words originally transmitted.

(4.) Where by rectification at the request of the addressee of an uncollated Telegram errors of any kind are discovered, it shall be a question for the several Telegraph Administrations concerned whether the payment by the addressee for the rectification of such Telegram or any part of such payment shall be reimbursed to him.

(5.) The sum paid by the addressee for the rectification within the United Kingdom of a Foreign Telegram, whether collated or uncollated, shall be refunded if it be found that any error has occurred in the Telegram during its transmission over the Telegraph System of the United Kingdom.

(6.) Any claims for reimbursement must in the case of an European Telegram be made within two months after the day on which the original Telegram was handed in for transmission and in the case of an Extra-European Telegram within six months after such day.

Office Hours for Telegraphic Business.

XXXI. The offices appointed by the Postmaster-General to be places for the receipt and despatch of Foreign Telegrams shall be open for such purposes during such hours as the Postmaster-General shall from time to time in respect of each office appoint.

Telegrams tendered out of Office Hours.

XXXII. Postmasters may accept Foreign Telegrams after the appointed hours for transmission abroad, and may retain for their own use and the use of their telegraphists and messengers the following fees in manner and subject to the provisions hereinafter mentioned, by way of remuneration for such special service, that is to

(1.)—(a.) If the office is not open at the time for either Postal or Telegraph business, 1s.

for the Postmaster, 1s. for the telegraphist, and 1s. for a messenger, if one be required

to call the telegraphist.

(b.) If the office is open for ordinary Postal business but not for Telegraph business, 1s. for the telegraphist, and 6d. for a , messenger, if one be required to call the telegraphist.

(c.) If the office is open for the receipt of Press news, but not for other Telegraph business or for ordinary Postal business, 6d. for the postmaster, and 6d. for the

telegraphist.

(2.) If a Postmaster or telegraphist be specially disturbed to send off a Telegram, and it sub-sequently appears that the Telegram cannot be despatched, the person desiring to send it must nevertheless pay the same fees as he would have done if the Telegram had been despatched.

(3.) When Telegrams are handed in to be transmitted through an office in the United Kingdom when that office is closed for Telegraph business, or has to be kept open more than ten minutes beyond the appointed hour for closing, a fee of 1s. shall be charged for

the telegraphist at such office.

Objectionable Telegrams not transmitted.

XXXIII. No Foreign Telegram shall be transmitted which contains anything indecent, obscene, or libellous, or of a grossly offensive character.

Postmaster-General not to be liable for Losses.

XXXIV. The Postmaster-General shall not be liable for any loss or damage which may be incurred or sustained by reason or on account of any mistake or default in the transmission or delivery of a Foreign Telegram, or for any other loss or damage incurred or sustained in connection with Foreign telegrams.

International Telegraph Convention.

XXXV. So far as these Regulations do not extend, and subject to the provisions hereof, the International Telegraph Convention and the Service Regulations annexed thereto respectively for the time being in force shall apply to Foreign Telegrams, and be binding on the senders and addressees of such Telegrams in all respects as if the same had been set out in these Regulations.

XXXVI. These Regulations shall be deemed to have come into operation on the first day of July one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one.

THE KENT (MOVEMENT AND SALES) ORDER OF 1892.

By the Board of Agriculture.

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Board of Agriculture Act, 1889, and the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1890, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Short Title.

1. This Order may be cited as THE KENT (MOVEMENT AND SALES) ORDER OF 1892.

Limitation,

2. This Order does not extend to-

(i.) Foreign Animals Wharves or Foreign Animals Quarantine Stations or Landing-

places for foreign animals.

(ii.) Foot-and-Mouth Disease Infected Zones (for which Zones provision is made as regards public and private sales of cattle, sheep, and swine by the Foot-and-Mouth Disease Order of 1892, No. 2).

(iii.) Swine-Fever Infected Areas (for which Áreas provision is made as regards public and private sales of swine by the Animals

Order of 1886).

Commencement.

3. This Order shall commence and take effect from and immediately after the eighteenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two.

Interpretation.

4. In this Order-

The Act of 1878 means the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878:

Fat cattle, or fat sheep, or fat swine, means cattle, sheep, or swine intended for slaughter: Store cattle, or store sheep, or store swine, means cattle, sheep, or swine other than fat

cattle, or fat sheep, or fat swine: Public sale includes a market or fair, and any sale, whether conducted by auction or not, which is open to the public, whether on payment of entrance-money or other payment or not, whether it is held in a public place or not, and whether animals of different owners are exposed thereat or not; and includes also an exhibition:

Private sale means any sale (not being a public sale) where fat or store animals of two or more owners are sold or exposed, or where two or more persons purchase, or offer to purchase, or are invited to purchase, animals, fat or store:

.. Expose means expose for sale or in any manner put up or offer for sale, or exhibit at an

exhibition:

Farm or premises includes two or more adjoining farms or premises in the same occupation: Other terms have the same meaning as in the Animals Order of 1886.

Revocation of Orders.

5. The Orders mentioned in the First Schedule to this Order to the extent described in that Schedule are hereby, from and after the commencement of this Order, revoked: Provided that such revocation shall not revive any Order revoked by or otherwise affect the past operation of the Order or part of Order hereby revoked, or invalidate or make unlawful anything done under the Order or part of Order hereby revoked, or affect any licence or authority granted, or any right, title, obligation, or liability accrued thereunder before the commencement of this Order, or interfere with the institution or prosecution of any proceeding in respect of any offence committed against, or any penalty incurred under, the Order or part of Order hereby revoked before the commencement of this Order.

Prohibition of Movement from District described in Second Schedule.

6. No cattle, sheep, goats, or swine shall be moved out of the district described in the Second Schedule to this Order.

Provided that nothing in this Article shall be deemed to apply to the movement of animals by Railway through the said district from a place outside the said district, to another place outside the said district, without untrucking within the said district.

Public and Private Sales.

7. No public or private sale of cattle, sheep, or swine, shall be held in the district described in the Second Schedule to this Order except as expressly authorized by this Order.

Public Sales of Fat Cattle, Sheep, or Swine by Licence of Local Authority.

8.—(a.) A public sale of fat cattle or fat sheep or fat swine may be held with a licence of the Local Authority on the following conditions (namely):

(i.) Cattle, sheep, and swine exposed at the public sale so licensed shall, after their arrival thereat, and before they are moved therefrom, be marked by and at the expense of the owner, consignee, or other person exposing them, as follows:

Cattle.—By the clipping of a broad arrow, about five inches long, on the left hind

quarter of each of the cattle.

Sheep and Swine.—By the painting or stamping of the letter M, about six inches long, on the left side of each of the sheep or swine with the following composition, namely:—Rosin, five parts; oil of turpentine, two parts; and blue or red ochre, one part; melted and used warm: or with some other adhesive composition of a blue or red colour.

(ii.) Every head of cattle, and every sheep, and every pig that is exposed at the public sale so licensed, whether it is sold thereat or not, shall be slaughtered within six days after the day on which the sale is held.

(iii.) Cattle, sheep, and swine exposed at the public sale so licensed shall not afterwards be exposed at any other public sale.

(b.) A licence of a Local Authority for a public sale of fat cattle, sheep, or swine under this Article shall be signed by the clerk of the Local Authority, by special direction of the Local Authority, and shall give notice of the conditions contained in this Article by specifying the same as conditions on which the licence is granted, and may impose such further conditions, if any, as the Local Authority think expedient, and shall be granted to the person entitled to hold the sale (as owner of a market, or as an auctioneer, or otherwise), and shall specify the place where the sale is to be held, and may authorize the holding of periodical sales on stated days, but may be renewed from time to time, and shall be published in such manner as the Local Authority consider best fitted to insure publicity for the same.

(c:) If the Board of Agriculture are of opinion, with respect to any licence of a Local Authority for a public sale of fat cattle, sheep, or swine under this Article, that the holding of the public sale thereby licensed is inexpedient, or that the licence is objectionable in any particular, and direct the revocation thereof, the same shall there-

upon cease to operate.

Sales by Licence of the Board of Agriculture.

9. Without prejudice to the foregoing provisions and in addition thereto, a public or private sale of cattle, sheep, or swine, fat or store, may be held in any circumstances, with a licence of the Board of Agriculture.

Offences.

10.—(a.) If a head of cattle or a sheep or a goat or a pig is moved out of the district described in the Second Schedule to this Order in contravention of this Order, the owner of the animal, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the animal, and the owner and the charterer and the master of the vessel in which it is moved, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

(b) If a public or private sale of cattle, sheep, or swine, fat or store, is held in contravention of this Order or of the conditions of a licence of the Local Authority or of the Board of Agriculture thereunder, the person holding the sale, and the occupier of the place or farm or premises where the sale is held, and the owner or consignee of each animal exposed thereat, and the person exposing the same thereat, and the auctioneer, if any, or other person conducting the sale, and the person, if any, taking entrancemoney or other payment for admission thereto, and the purchaser thereat of any animal, such last-mentioned person or such purchaser knowing the sale to be held in contravention as aforesaid, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

(c.) If a head of cattle, or a sheep, or a pig is not marked as required by this Order, the owner, consignee, or other person exposing the same, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the purchaser thereof, and the person holding the sale, and the auctioneer, if any, or other person conducting the sale, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

(d.) If any person, with a view to unlawfully evade or defeat the operation of this Order, by clipping, or washing, or in any other manner, takes out, effaces, or obliterates, or attempts to take out, efface, or obliterate, any mark clipped, painted, or stamped on any cattle, sheep, or swine, as required by this Order, the person doing the same, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the same to be done, and the owner of the animal, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

(e.) If a head of cattle, or a sheep, or a pig is

(d.) If any person, with a view to unlawfully not slaughtered as required by this Order, the evade or defeat the operation of this Order, by elipping, or washing, or in any other manner, takes out, effaces, or obliterates, or attempts to the Act of 1878.
