Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, May 31, 1892.

NOTICE is hereby given, that His Royal Highness The Duke of Connaught will, by command of The Queen, hold a Levee at St. James's Palace, on behalf of Her Majesty, on Monday, the 18th of June next, at two o'clock.

It is The Queen's pleasure that Presentations to His Royal Highness at the Levee shall be considered as equivalent to Presentations to Her Majesty.

REGULATIONS

TO DE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEE AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE, ON BEHALF OF HER MAJESTT.

By Her Majesty's Command,

Gentlemen who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

PRESENTATIONS.

Gentlemen who propose to present others must send in writing the name of such Gentlemen to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, not later than two days previous to the Levee, in order that the Lord Chamberlain may submit the names to Her Majesty, when, if they are approved, Presentation Cards will be forwarded. Forms for the purpose can be obtained at the Lord Chamberlain's Office. Gentlemen who wish to be presented officially should communicate with the heads of their Department, who will provide them with the necessary cards and instructions.

It is particularly requested that the names of the Gentlemen to be presented be very distinctly written on the Presentation Cards delivered to the Lord Chamberlain at the Levee, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

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A DESPATCH has been received from Her Majesty's Ambassador at Constantinople, calling attention to the fact that persons leaving England with the intention of travelling in Turkey are required to provide themselves with passports

properly viséd at the Turkish Embassy or Consulate General in London.

For journeys in the interior of Turkey, "Mourour teskeressi" (Turkish local passports) are necessary, which must be obtained from the local authorities in Turkey.

For this purpose British subjects should apply to the nearest British Consular Officer on their arrival in Turkey.
