THE Secretary of State for the Colonies has received the following Despatch from the Governor of Lagos:—

Government House, Lagos, May 24, 1892.

I HAVE the honour to enclose a copy of a report which I received at about eleven o'clock last night from Colonel Scott, commanding the Jebu Expeditionary Force.

2. In accordance with your Lordship's directions I have despatched a telegram this day giving details of the wounds received by the Officers, taken from Dr. Henderson's report which accompanied that of Colonel Scott.

3. Your Lordship will perceive from Colonel Scott's report that the Jebus proved to be a more formidable enemy than was anticipated. There have been many contradictory rumours afloat, and it was difficult to form any correct opinion as to the real intentions of the Jebus, but the general

consensus of opinion in Lagos undoubtedly was in favour of regarding them as a weak and contemptible enemy, who would not be likely to make any resistance against a well armed force officered by Europeans. There can however be no doubt that had the arrangements for the expeditions been less complete, a disaster might easily have happened, and I think that Colonel Scott and his comparatively small force might well be congratulated on the marked success of their efforts.

YOUR EXCELLENCY, May 22, 1892.

1 HAVE the honour to submit the following report on the operations carried out by the force under my command.

The force embarked at Lagos on Thursday, the 12th instant, and arrived off Epe late that night, from which place it had been arranged to commence our advance on Jebu Ode.

On disembarking at daybreak the next morning, Friday 13th, I found it was not possible to advance owing to the paucity of carriers, the majority of those whom it was intended to employ at Epe having deserted the town and run away inland, On finding the next day that carriers were still unprocurable, I despatched the yacht "Margaret" to Leckie, a station on the Lagoon under British rule, and succeeded in procuring a sufficient number of carriers to enable me to advance.

The town of Epe consists of two quarters, the northern half being the Jebu quarter of the town, which was completely deserted, and the remaining portion inhabited by people from Lagos who were friendly to us, and from whom I received great help in my endeavours to procure carriers. One man in particular, Braima Eddo, being of much assistance to me.

The force advanced from Epe on Monday, 16th, and firet met the enemy posted at the approach to a village called Pobo, about seven miles distant, where a slight engagement took place; the Jebus, however, retired without

making any stand, and the force encamped that night in Pobo. Our losses during the day were 7 Ibadans slightly wounded, 1 severely wounded,

and 1 carrier shot through the lungs.

The next morning, Tuesday, 17th, having burnt the village, I advanced and again met the enemy, after marching about six miles, in a good position outside the village of Majoda, where they made a stand, and a sharp fight took place before I eventually occupied the town. During that afternoon the Jebus attempted to attack our position, but were repulsed with heavy loss on their side. I regret to say that during the morning's engagement Mr. Willoughby, a Native Interpreter, was killed. Captain Hon. A. S. Hardinge was also slightly wounded in the thigh.

The next day, Wednesday, 18th, having destroyed the above village, I advanced and occupied a village called Layon, about eight miles distant, but met with no resistance from the

I advanced the following morning, Thursday, 19th, and after an hour's march encountered the whole Jebu army in force, posted in a most powerful position on rising ground in dense undergrowth on either side, and in front of a steep and narrow ravine terminating in a deep pool of running water, through which the column had to advance, and a severe engagement took place which lasted for three hours. The Jebus fought in a most determined manner, sending to their front fresh relays of hundreds of men whenever either losses or expenditure of ammunition re-

They attacked the whole length of the column which owing to the extreme narrowness of the pass was in single file and extended nearly two miles, as well as its front and rear, and it was only owing to the splendid efforts of both Officers and men that the position was eventually carried.

The losses on the enemy's side were very great. It was impossible to count the numbers, however,

owing to the dense bush.

Their strength, judging from the size and number of huts in their camp at the village of Magbon, near by, must have been between 7,000 and 8,000.

Among the Officers of the force Captain Owen was wounded in the head and the thigh and Lieu-

tenant Lawrie was also slightly wounded.

I am attaching, however, a detailed report by the Chief Medical Officer, who was in charge. Considering that our force numbered only some 350 fighting men, the result was most satisfactory. Officers and men did their work well.

I beg to bring to your notice Captain Owen for the able manner in which he conducted the attack on this occasion, also Lieutenant Lawrie, who commanded the Artillery, and Captain Larymore,

my Staff Officer.

Captain Honourable A. S. Hardinge commanding the Ibadans, and Captain Gordon, Intelligence Captain Hardinge was entirely alone with the Ibadans during the engagement, and the cool and soldier-like manner in which he did his

work deserves great praise.

I marched from Magbon the next morning, Friday 20th, with a view to attacking the capital, Jebu Ode, about six miles away. I was met, however, by a flag of truce and an emissary from

the Awujale, or king, begging for peace.

The force marched into the town at about 11.30 A.M., which I found deserted, with the exception of the King and a few followers, who I at once interviewed. The King appears to have no authority over his people, and throws himself on Your Excellency's mercy.

I | I would mention that the hospital arrangements made by Dr. Henderson, chief Medical Officer of the expedition, worked well, and he was ably assisted by Surgeon-Captain Crofts.

The Transport, in charge of Captain Ussher, was a most trying duty with the number of carriers that had to be employed, and he deserves

great credit for its excellent working.

The detachment of the West India Regiment, commanded by Major Madden, and the Lagos Hausas and Gold Coast Hausas, under Captains Tarbet and Bayly respectively, behaved in a most efficient manner.

I have taken up a strong position in this town to withstand any attack that might be made. am told, however, that the road passing through Oru, about ten miles north from here, is not yet I intend therefore sending a flying opened. column to that place to-morrow, as it is indispensable that the main road which passes through Orn from the interior should be declared open by us I have, &c., F. P.S.—I should mention that many of the enemy were armed with Snider Rifles, and a quantity of this ammunition was afterwards found, also a large quantity of powder with the name of Regis Ainé et Cie. on the barrels.

WHEREAS We have thought fit, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, to dissolve this present Parliament which stands prorogued to Friday, the fifteenth day of July next: We do, for that end, publish this Our Royal Proclamation, and do hereby dissolve the said Parliament accordingly; and the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses, and the Commissioners for shires and burghs, of the House of Commons, are discharged from their meeting and attendance on the said Friday, the fifteenth day of July next: And We, being desirous and resolved, as soon as may be, to meet Our people, and to have their advice in Parliament, do hereby make known to all Our loving subjects Our Royal Will and Pleasure to call a new Parliament; and do hereby further declare, that, with the advice of Our Privy Council, We have given order that Our Chancellor of that part of Our United Kingdom called Great Britain and Our Chancellor of Ireland do respectively, upon notice thereof, forthwith issue out writs, in due form and according to law, for calling a new Parliament. And We do hereby also, by this Our Royal Proclamation under Our Great Seal of Our United Kingdom, require writs forthwith to be issued accordingly by Our said Chancellors respectively, for causing the Lords Spiritual and Temporal and Commons who are to serve in the said Parliament to be duly returned to, and give their attendance in, Our said Parliament on the fourth day of August next, which writs are to be returnable in due course of law.

HEREAS We have in Our Council thought fit to declare Our pleasure for summoning and holding a Parliament of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, on Thursday, the fourth day of August next ensuing the date hereof; in order, therefore, to the electing and summoning the Sixteen Peers of Scotland who are to sit in the House of Peers in the said Parliament, We do, by the advice of Our Privy Council, issue forth this Our Royal Proclamation, strictly charging and commanding all the Peers of Scotland to assemble and meet at Holyrood House, in Edinburgh, on Thursday, the fourteenth day of July next, between the hours of twelve and two in the afternoon, to nominate and choose the Sixteen Peers to sit and I

vote in the House of Peers in the said ensuing Parliament by open election and plurality of voices of the Peers that shall be then present, and of the proxies of such as shall be absent (such proxies being Peers, and producing a mandate in writing duly signed before witnesses, and both the constituent and proxy being qualified according to law); and the Lord Clerk Register, or the two Principal Clerks of the Session appointed by him to officiate in his name, are hereby respectively required to attend such meeting, and to administer the oaths required by law to be taken there by the said Peers, and to take their votes, and immediately after such election made and duly examined to certify the names of the Sixteen Peers so elected, and to sign and attest the same in the presence of the said Peers the Electors, and return such certificate into Our High Court of Chancery of Great Britain. And We do, by this Our Royal Proclamation, strictly command and require the Provost of Edinburgh, and all other the Magistrates of the said city, to take especial care to preserve the peace thereof during the time of the said election, and to prevent all manner of riots, tumults, disorders, and violence whatsoever. And We strictly charge and com-mand that this Our Royal Proclamation be duly published at the Market-Cross at Edinburgh, and in all the county towns of Scotland, ten days at least before the time hereby appointed for the meeting of the said Peers to proceed to such election.

And whereas, in order to the due fulfilment of the said obligation as respects territories and places, within the limits of the above-mentioned Order, which Her Majesty shall have declared to be under the protection of Her Majesty, it is necessary that the subjects of the Signatory Powers, other than Her Majesty, should be justiciable under the said Order in like manner as British subjects, and for this purpose that the provisions of the said Order referring to British subjects should, as far as practicable, be extended to the subjects of those Powers;

And whereas it is expedient that the powers conferred upon a Secretary of State by the Africa Order in Council, 1889, should be extended so as to provide for the application to territories and places within the limits of that Order, of such Acts and enactments for the time being in force in British India as may be deemed necessary for

the due administration of justice:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers by "The Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890," or otherwise, in Her Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:-

1. In this Order the expression "foreigners to whom this Order applies" means subjects of any of the Signatory Powers (except Her Majesty) or of any other Power which has consented that its subjects shall be justiciable under the Africa Order in Council, 1889, and this Order.

Other expressions, defined in the Africa Order in Council, 1889, and used in this Order, have

the same meaning.

2. Where. Her Majesty has declared any territory or place within the limits of the Africa Order in Council, 1889, to be a Protectorate of Her Majesty, the provisions of that Order having reference to British subjects, except Part XIV thereof, shall extend in like manner to foreigners to whom this Order applies, and all such foreigners shall be justiciable by the Courts constituted by the said Order for the Protectorate, under the same conditions as British subjects, and to the extent of the jurisdiction vested by law in those Courts; and Part XII and so much of the rest of the Order as requires the consent of any foreigner as a condition of the exercise of jurisdiction shall be of no force or effect in the Protectorate, so far as respects foreigners to whom this Order applies.

3. A Secretary of State may, from time to time, by order published in such manner as he directs, declare that any Act or enactment for the time being in force in British India or any Presidency thereof, and not inconsistent with the Africa Order in Council, 1889, and this Order, shall have effect and be administered in relation to any place or places within the limits of any local jurisdiction with such modifications or adaptations as may be necessary, and thereupon such Acts or enactments, as so modified and adapted, shall have effect in accordance with such order as if they had been applied by the said Order.

And whereas it is deemed expedient that the Order in Council bearing date the thirty-first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty, declaring what is requisite to entitle a Volunteer to be deemed an efficient Volunteer, be amended so far as relates to the particulars shown in the schedule hereof, a draft of which schedule was on the fifth day of May last, laid before both Houses of Parliament in the words therein mentioned and set forth, and one lunar month having elapsed since that time, the amendments of the Scheme of Efficiency for which provision is made in the said schedule have this day been submitted to Her Majesty in Council for Her approval thereof:

AMENDMENT of the Scheme relative to the Efficiency of Volunteers, in force under Her Majesty's Order in Council of thirty-first July one thousand eight hundred and eighty, or other Orders in amendment thereof, issued in accordance with the provisions of the Volunteer Act, 1863.

3. That he attended during the twelve months ending the 31st October; 18 of this Corps, ordered by the Commanding Officer. each of such drills being of not less than one

hour's duration.

4. That he is in possession of a Certificate signed by his Employer that he has been employed as a Driver for a period of not less than six months consecutively in the past year, and that he is qualified in Postilion Driving.

This Certificate may exempt men from driving drills other than those referred to in the Regula-

lations for the Volunteer Force.

5. That he possesses a sufficient knowledge of squad and company drill.

If present at Inspection, thirty drills, including Inspection, twenty-four of these drills to be at mounted arades, four of which to be those referred to in the Regulations for the Volunteer Force. + At the other twenty parades there should not be less than two waggons with their teams available for instruction.
At the mounted parades the first two hours will at the mounted parades the first two hours will count as two drills, and each subsequent two hours as one drill. The remaining six drills (each drill to be of not less than one hour's duration) to be reserved for instruction in elementary marching and other dismounted drills.

Second year:

Third and fourth years, and in subsequent years; also in the case of ordinary Volunteers:—

If present at Inspection twelve driving drills (each drill to be of not less than one hour's duration) including Inspection.

If absent from Inspection with leave of the Commanding Officer, or through sickness duly certified, fourteen driving drills.

Volunteers when they have completed the 60 or 62 drills as the case may be during their first two years of service and have been returned four times as efficient:—

(a) If present at Inspection, 9 driving drills, including the Inspection.

(b) If absent from Inspection with leave of the Com-manding Officer, or through sickness duly certified, 11 driving drills.

Attendance at a brigade drill or a review may be counted as one of such drills.

WHEREAS by the "Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," it was (amongst other things) enacted that Her Majesty might from time to time, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, fix the Establishment to be maintained by each of the General Lighthouse Authorities on account of the services of lighthouses, buoys, and beacons, or the annual or other sums to be paid out of the Mercantile Marine Fund in respect of such Establishments, and that no increase of any Establishment, or part of an Establishment, so fixed shall be made without the consent of the Board of Trade:

And whereas Her Majesty by an Order in Council, dated the tenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, was pleased to fix the Establishment which might be maintained by the Commissioners of Irish Lights, and to fix that in respect of such said Establishment the aggregate amount of the salaries which, under the provisions of the said Order in Council, should for the time being be paid to the officers of the said Establishment, should be paid out of the Mercantile Marine Fund:

And whereas it is expedient that the Establishment by the said recited Order fixed to be maintained by the Commissioners of Irish Lights on account of the services of lighthouses, buoys, and beacons, should be varied in manner hereinafter appearing:

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that such variation in the Establishment of the Commissioners of Irish Lights has, in pursuance of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1854, been made with the consent of the Board of Trade:

And whereas it is not at present clear at what age it is compulsory on the officers of the said Commissioners to retire from the lighthouse service, and it appears desirable that the Regulations in respect of retirement from the public service contained in clause ten of an Order in Council dated the fifteenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and ninety, should be made applicable to the Establishment of the said Commissioners:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in Her by the Merchant Shipping Act, 1854, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to revoke, and Her Majesty hereby revokes the Order in Council dated the tenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, relating to the Establishment of the Commissioners of Irish Lights, and to fix, and doth hereby fix, the Establishment which may be maintained by the said Commissioners as follows, that is to

The Establishment of the Commissioners of Irish Lights shall consist of the officers named in the schedule to this Order, at the salaries, of which the minimum, annual increase, and maximum are respectively mentioned in the same schedule, but the annual increments of such officers shall (except in the case of the Secretary, the Engineer and Inspector of Works, and the Inspector of Lights) be only granted on a certificate by the Commissioners of Irish Lights that the preceding period of the officers' service has been distinguished by zeal, industry, and regularity.

Provided as follows:-

- (1.) Every officer who prior to the date of this Order was on the Establishment of the Commissioners of Irish Lights, and who shall now become a member of the Establishment fixed by this Order, may continue to receive the salary payable to him prior to the date of this Order, in lieu of the minimum salary of his office mentioned in the schedule to this Order, and while he holds the same office, the annual increments of salary to which he may thereafter become entitled shall accrue on the same anniversaries as before.
- (2.) No officer in the service of the Commissioners of Irish Lights shall by appointment to a post specified in the schedule to this Order, suffer immediate pecuniary loss, but in no case shall he receive more than the maximum salary attached to such post.

(3.) The salary of Mr. Owen Armstrong, the present Secretary, shall as from the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, be not less than six hundred and

seventy-five pounds per annum.

(4.) A salary of six hundred pounds per annum shall continue to be paid to the present Accountant and Cashier, Mr. Michael John O'Grady, during his tenure of the office in lieu of the maximum salary specified in the schedule to this Order.

(5.) The salary of Mr. Andrew Knox Galwey, the present Inspector of Lights, shall as from the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, be not less than five

hundred pounds per annum.

(6.) If Mr. Karl Emil Nabholz be appointed Assistant Engineer, his salary as from the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, shall be not less than two hundred and sixty-six pounds seven shillings and sixpence per annum, and his service for superannuation purposes shall be reckoned from that date.

(7.) The annual salary of Mr. John Cyprian Doherty, one of the Clerks, shall as from the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, be increased by twenty pounds, and the annual salary of Mr. Hubert Guy Cook, one of the Clerks, shall as from the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, be increased by

thirty pounds.

All persons appointed to Clerkships or to Lower Grade Clerkships of the Establishment of the Commissioners of Irish Lights shall previously to their appointment pass before the Civil Service Commissioners such examination as may be arranged between the Civil Service Commissioners, the Commissioners of Irish Lights, and the Board of Trade, and shall at the time of such examination be over the age of eighteen years and under the age of twenty-five years.

Provided nevertheless, that in exceptional cases, with the consent of the Board of Trade, appointments to Clerkships of the Establishment of the Commissioners of Irish Lights may be made from among the Lower Grade Clerks in the

service of the said Commissioners of Irish Lights at a minimum salary not exceeding the rate payable at the time of promotion if the aggregate previous service, either as Supernumerary Clerk or Lower Grade Clerk of each person so appointed amounts to ten years, and if he is under the age of thirty-five years, and provided also that his service as a Supernumerary Clerk shall not count towards his subsequent superannuation (if any).

And Her Majesty is further pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to direct that the following provisions in respect of retires ment, shall take effect from and after the date of

this Order, that is to say:

(a) It shall be competent for the Commissioners of Irish Lights to call upon any officer whose salary is fixed by the schedule to this Order to retire at the age of sixty on such pension as by the length of his service he is qualified to receive.

(b) Retirement shall be compulsory for every officer whose salary is fixed by the schedule to this Order, on attaining sixty-five years of age, but in special cases the Board of Trade may, at the instance of the Commissioners of Irish Lights, extend the employment of any such officer for a further period, in no case exceeding five years, on being satisfied that such officer's retirement at sixty-five would be detrimental to the interests of the lighthouse service.

And Her Majesty, by virtue, and in further exercise of the power so vested in Her as aforesaid, and by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to fix, and doth hereby fix, that the salaries, which, under the provisions of this present Order in Council, are, for the time being, payable to the officers of the Establishment of the Commissioners of Irish Lights, shall be paid out of the Mercantile Marine Fund.

HEREAS by section 26 of "The Pluralities Act, 1838," after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, "chapelries, and other places or districts may be separated from the parishes or mother " churches to which they belong with great advan-4 tage, and places altogether extra-parochial may " in some instances with advantage be annexed to "parishes or districts to which they are con-"tiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for "ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "That when, with respect to his own diocese, it shall appear to the Archbishop " of the Province, or when the Bishop of any "diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop "that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place or "district within the diocese of such Archbishop, " or the diocese of such Bishop, as the case may " be, may be advantageously separated from any " parish or mother church, and either be consti-"tuted a separate benefice by itself or be united "to any other parish to which it may be more "conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining "tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, parochial, or extra-parochial so as to form a " separate parish or benefice, or that any extra-" parochial place may with advantage be annexed "to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be "constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said Archbishop or Bishop " shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme "of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said "Archbishop for his consideration), describing the " mode in which it appears to him that the altera-" fion may best be effected, and how the changes "consequent on such alteration in respect to "ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent-charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, 46 and payments, and in respect to patronage and " rights to pews, may be made with justice to all " parties interested; and if the patron or patrons " of the benefice or benefices to be affected by "such alteration shall consent in writing under " his or their hands to such scheme, or to such " modification thereof as the said Archbishop may "approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full 46 consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any " such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall " certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, "by his report to Her Majesty in Council, it "shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to "make an Order for carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into

And whereas by section six of another Act of Parliament, passed in the second and third years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An "Act to make better provision for the assignment " of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels " augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of "Queen Anne, and for other purposes," it is, " amongst other things, further enacted " That any " such scheme or modification as aforesaid may be " drawn up according to the regulations and direc-"tions in the hereinbefore in part recited Act contained, subject to the consent in writing of the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices " to be affected thereby under his or their hands, " notwithstanding the vacancy of such benefice " or benefices; and that it shall be lawful for "Her Majesty in Council thereupon to make an "Order for carrying such scheme, or modification

T the Court at Windsor, the 28th day of i thereof, as [the case may be, into effect; and " that such Order being registered in the registry " of the diocese, as directed by the hereinbefore in part recited Act, shall come into operation, "and shall be forthwith binding on all persons "whatsoever, notwithstanding such vacancy or " vacancies."

> And whereas the Right Reverend William, Lord Bishop of Oxford, hath, pursuant to the provisions of the said Pluralities Act, 1838, represented in a writing, dated the twenty-third November one thousand eight hundred and ninetyone to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Edward White Lord Archbishop of Canterbury as follows:

> "To the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Father in God Edward White by Divine Providence Lord Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury, Primate of All England and Metropolitan.

"I William by Divine Permission Bishop of Oxford, do in pursuance of the twenty-sixth section of 'The Pluralities Act 1838,' hereby represent to your Grace as follows:

" 1. There is in the county of Buckingham and my diocese of Oxford the benefice (being a rectory) of Hartwell Saint Mary with Little Hampden, Little Hampden being a chapelry, the boundaries whereof are well known and defined.

"2. The population of the said parish of Hartwell Saint Mary exclusive of the said chapelry of Little Hampden is one hundred and forty-six and the population of the said chapelry is forty-six.

"3. The net annual value of the said benefice of Hartwell Saint Mary with the said chapelry (including the value of the rectory house) is two hundred and seventy-three pounds or thereabouts.

"4. There is within the said chapelry a church providing accommodation for thirty-five persons. Such chapelry is distant nine miles or thereabouts from Hartwell. Baptisms churchings marriages and the service for the burial of the dead have from time immemorial been solemnized and performed in the said chapel.

"5. It does not appear that any of the inhabitants of the said chapelry of Little Hampden possess a right by faculty or otherwise to the exclusive use of any pews or sittings in any church other than in the church or chapel of the said chapelry.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend John Charles, Bishop of the said diocese of Liverpool (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Walton-on-the-Hill (being a part of the conventional district of Saint Mary, Bootle) which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delinented and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Matthew, Bootle, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Matthew, Bootle.'

"And with the like consent of the said John Charles Bishop of the said diocese of Liverpool (testified as afore aid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churching, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint Matthew Bootle, situate as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns, and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices, should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us, the said Commissioners, to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration, and to make such order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

THE following Statute made on the fourth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, by the Governing Budy of the House of Christ Church, Oxford, at a meeting specially summoned for the purpose by the votes of not less than two-thirds of those present has been submitted for the approval of Her Majesty in Council, and notice of its having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions contained in the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877:—

Christ Church Statute XVI, clause near the beginning, as altered by the Governing Body on 4 May 1892, by the additions and alterations of the words in italics.

Statute XVI.

In addition to the Official Students and Non-Official Students, whether the number of Students in either or both of these classes be or be not complete, the Governing Body may from time to time, by a majority of two thirds of those present and voting, and with the consent of the Visitor, elect to a Studentship tenable for a term not exceeding seven years and endowed with a stipend not exceeding £200 a year, any Professor or Public Reader of the University of Oxford.

Provided that, if the emoluments (exclusive of fees) of any Professor or Public Reader so elected shall exceed £700 per annum, he shall not receive as the emolument of his Studentship a greater sum than will amount with the emoluments of his Professorship or Public Readership (exclusive of fees) to £900 per annum.

Any person who, as such Professor or Public Reader shall be elected and become a Student shall ipso facto vacate his Studentship upon ceasing to be such Professor or Public Reader.

The Governing Body may also from time to time, by a majority of two thirds of those present and voting, and with the consent of the Visitor, elect to a Studentship tenable for a term not exceeding seven years and endowed with a stipend not exceeding £200 a year, any person who is distinguished in some brunch of Literature or Science, and who shall undertake, if required, to perform any definite literary, scientific or educational work in the House, or in the University, or (under the direction of the House or the University) elsewhere, which work shall be specified in the resolution by which he is elected.

And any person who as undertaking, if required, to perform such work as afteresaid shall be elected and become a Student, shall ipso facto vacate his Studentship upon declining or ceasing to do such work.

Students elected under these clauses shall take rank as to seniority with the Official Students and shall be re-eligible.

The total amount of stipends payable at any one time under these clauses shall not exceed £400 a year.

THE following Statute made on the 16th day of May, 1892, by the Governing Body of Emmanuel College, in the University of Cambridge, has been submitted for the approval of Her Majesty in Council, and notice of its having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions contained in the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877:—

WHEREAS Emmanuel College in the University of Cambridge is now governed by a Code of Statutes made under the authority of the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877,

And whereas it is expedient to modify certain

of the said Statutes,

Now We the Governing Body of the said College by virtue of the said Act and according to the provisions thereof do by a resolution passed at a general meeting of the said Governing Body specially summoned for the purpose by the votes of not less than two-thirds of the number of persons present and voting make the following alterations in the aforesaid Statutes.

Statute III shall be altered as follows:-

(a) By the omission in section 9 of the words "sections 10 and 11" and the substitution in lieu thereof of the words "the remaining sections."

(b) By the substitution for section 10 of the

following section :--

"Subject to the provisions contained in section "12 of this Statute no Fellow of more than one " year's standing on the 30th day of September " last preceding shall have a vote who shall not "have been present at one-half at least of the " meetings held during Term time in the preceding "year ending on the 30th day of September of "which due notice shall have been given in "accordance with section 3 of this Statute and subject as aforesaid such Fellow shall not be "reckoned a member of the Governing Body for "the purposes of these Statutes during the year " following such 30th day of September. " every Fellow shall be entitled to notice of every " meeting (except those summoned for disciplinary " purposes or other urgent business) and may be " present and speak thereat."

(c) By the addition at the end of section 12 of

the following provision: -

"Provided that if in the case of any Fellow " who shall be so disqualified from voting his " absence from the meetings of the Governing " Body during the preceding year shall have been " owing to illness or for the purpose of study the "Governing Body may at the said first meeting " by a resolution in which two-thirds at least of "the members present concur (such two-thirds "being not less than a majority of the whole "Governing Body) declare that the disqualifica-"tion of such Fellow shall be removed and he " shall thereupon (except for the purpose of voting " upon or calculating the majority in favour of " any resolution under this section; be entitled to "a vote and be reckened a member of the "Governing Body for the current year notwith-" standing the provisions of section 10 of this "Statute but no such resolution shall in the ca-q " of any one Fellow be passed in two consecutive " years.'

For Statute V of the existing Statutes the following Statute shall be substituted:—

"1. The electors to the Mastership shall be the

" Fellows of the College.

"2. Whenever a vacancy occurs in the office of Master the Senior of the Fellows of the College then in residence shall as soon as the vacancy becomes known to him give notice in

"writing to every Fellow of the vacancy and of the day and hour at which a meeting for the election of a new Master will be held.

"3. The meeting mentioned in the foregoing section (hereinafter called the original meeting) shall be held in the College and if the vacancy cocurs during vacation shall be held on the 14th day of the next University Term or if the vacancy occurs during Term time on the 14th day after the notice aforesaid has been given or if such notice is delivered by post has been posted to the Fellows of the College or if in either case such 14th day shall fall on a Sunday on the Monday following such Sunday.

"4. Before proceeding to the election the "Senior of the Fellows present shall read audibly "the foregoing Statute Of the Qualification and "Duties of the Master." And he and all the "Fellows present each in the order of his "seniority shall make the following declara-

" tion :-

"'I, A.B. hereby declare that in this election I "will faithfully observe the Statute just read and "will without favour or partiality choose as "Master that person who is in my judgment best "qualified to discharge the duties of the Office."

"5. The votes shall be taken by means of "written voting papers which shall be filled up "and delivered to the aforesaid Senior by those present. And the aforesaid Senior shall audibly declare his own and the other votes and shall declare that person to be elected Master who "shall have obtained the votes of a majority of the Fellows then existing.

"6. If no person be found to be elected on the first scrutiny the votes shall be taken again in "like manner and the Senior shall declare that person elected who shall have obtained the votes

" of a majority of those present.

"7. If no person be found to be elected on the second scrutiny the votes shall be taken a third time and the Senior shall declare that person elected who shall have obtained the votes of a

" majority of those present and voting.

"8. At the said original meeting and also at any adjournment thereof until some person shall have been elected the electors may by a resolution in which a majority of those present concur at any stage of the proceedings before the third of the aforesaid scrutinies shall have been taken from time to time adjourn the meeting to a day and hour (not being later than the 30th day after the date of the original meeting) then agreed upon or if no day and hour be so agreed upon to a day and hour (not being later than as aforesaid) to be named by the Senior of the Fellows present and the aforesaid Senior shall immediately send notice of the meeting to all absent electors.

"9. At any such adjourned meeting and also at any further adjournment thereof it shall be competent to any elector to propose for election any properly qualified person and the election shall proceed in the manner hereinbefore provided for in the case of the said original meeting without regard to any previous scrutiny.

"10. If at the said original meeting or any adjournment thereof no person be found to be elected on the third scrutiny the Senior of the lected on the third scrutiny the Senior of the lecters the question whether the meeting shall be adjourned or further adjourned as the case may be and if a majority of the electors, present concur in voting for an adjournment the meeting shall be adjourned or further adjourned as the case may be to a day and hour (not being later than the 30th day after the original meeting) then agreed

"to a day and hour (not being later than as "aforesaid) to be named by the Senior of the " Fellows present and the provisions contained in "the foregoing section shall be applicable to any "meeting adjourned in pursuance of this section "but if a majority of the electors present shall " not concur in voting for an adjournment the " meeting for the election of a Master shall there-" upon terminate and the appointment shall lapse " to the Chancellor of the University.

"11. Any vote given by any Fellow in his "own favour shall be null and void.

"12. As soon as possible after the election the "Master elect shall make the following decla-

" 'I, A.B. elected Master of Emmanuel College do solemnly promise that I will perform the " duties of the office with care and diligence that " I will endeavour to the utmost of my power to " 'promote the interests of the College and will "faithfully observe and keep all the Statutes " 'thereof.

"13. After which the Senior of the Fellows " present or if he have been elected Master the "Fellow next in seniority shall admit the Master " elect in the accustomed form and as soon as " conveniently may be shall declare the result of 46 the election to the Vice - Chancellor of the " University.

"14. If the person elected decline to be ad-" mitted to the Mastership the Senior of the " Fellows then resident in College shall forthwith " give notice in writing to every Fellow of the " day and hour of proceeding to another election "which shall be conducted in all respects in " accordance with the provisions of this Statute.

"15. Within fourteen days of the election of "a Master an inventory of all muniments and deeds in the College Treasury and also all "furniture pictures and other College property " reserved for the Master's use in the Lodge shall " be verified and signed by the Master and the " Senior of the Fellows in residence and deposited "in the College Treasury."

For Section 2 of Statute XIII of the existing Statutes the following section shall be substituted:

"2. Until otherwise determined under the " provisions of this section the number of Senior "and of Junior Fellowships shall not differ by a greater number than three. It shall however " be competent to the Governing Body at a meet-"ing called for that purpose and of which at "least 30 days' notice shall have been given in " the manner provided for in Section 3 of Statute -46 III by a resolution in which at least two-thirds " of their whole number concur from time to time - * to declare that it is expedient in the interests of the " College to alter the maximum difference between "the number of Senior and of Junior Fellowships "and from and after the passing of any such " resolution the maximum difference between the "number of Senior and of Junior Fellowships " shall (subject to the power of alteration herein-" before given to the Governing Body) be the " number fixed by such resolution. Provided that "in reckoning the number of Senior and of "Junior Fellowships for the purpose of this " Section Fellowships held for life under the pro-"visions of Section 5 of Statute XV or Section 1 of Statute XLIV or Section 2 of Statute L "shall not be counted as Fellowships. Subject "to the restrictions contained in or authorized by "this Section at any vacancy either a Senior or "Junior Fellow may be elected."

Statute XVII shall be altered by the omission

"upon or if no day and hour be so agreed upon | of the word "Senior" before the word "Fellow" wherever it occurs.

Statute XXXI shall be altered by the omission from Section 4 of the words "or if that day be a Sunday on the 22nd day of November."
For Section 6 of Statute XLIII the following

Section shall be substituted:

" 6. If any person shall have held a Fellowship "for a part only of the year in respect of which "any annual audit shall be taken he shall be " entitled to an apportioned part of the dividend " declared at such audit in respect of such Fellow-"ship for that year proportional to the number " of days in such year during which he held his "Fellowship. Provided that nothing contained " in this Section shall interfere with the provisions " of Section 6 of Statute XV. The parts pay-" able in respect of all vacant Fellowships shall " be payable to the reserve fund."

STATUTES to add to alter and amend the Statutes framed by the Commissioners appointed under "The Universities of Oxford and Cam-" bridge Act 1877" in relation to the University of Cambridge and now submitted for the approval of Her Majesty the Queen in Council.

We the Chancellor Masters and Scholars of the University of Cambridge in pursuance and in exercise of the powers given to us by the 53rd section of the said Act do hereby add to alter and amend the Statutes framed by the said Com-missioners in relation to our said University in manner following:

By substituting for Statute B Chapter I Sections 2 and 3 the following Sections to form amended Sections 2 and 3 of such Chapter of

2. Subject to the deductions mentioned in the clause next following the aggregate sum to be contributed by the Colleges in each of the years 1891, 1892, 1893, 1894, 1895, shall be not less than £20,000 nor more than £24,000; in each of the years 1896, 1897, 1898, 1899, 1900, 1901, 1902, not less than £25,000 nor more than £30,000, and in every subsequent year £30,000, or such larger sum being not greater than £30,500 as may be found more convenient for the purpose of calculating the rate per centum in any year. Provided that in case it appears at any time hereafter to the Financial Board hereinafter constituted that the aggregate income of the Colleges has fallen so low that the contribution required under this Chapter would be an excessive burden upon the Colleges, the Chancellor may, upon the application of the Financial Board, inquire into the matter and if he be satisfied that the fact is so he may at his discretion direct that the amount to be levied under this Chapter be diminished for any period not exceeding five years by any sum not exceeding one fifth part of the minimum amount named in this Chapter for each

year of such period. For the purposes of this proviso the Vice-Chancellor shall not exercise the power herein given to the Chancellor.

3. From the contributions so determined each College shall be entitled to deduct for each Professorial Fellowship in the College held by a Professor of the University:

In each of the years 1891, 1892, 1893, 1894, 1895, £160; and in every subsequent year £200.

STATUTES to add to alter and amend the Statutes framed by the Commissioners appointed under the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act 1877 (40 and 41 Vict. c. 48) in relation to Queens' College in the University of Cambridge duly made at a General Meeting of the Governing Body of the said College specially summoned for this purpose held on the 8th day of June 1892 and passed at such Meeting by the unanimous vote of all persons present and voting (there being then present the President and seven Fellows) and submitted for the approval of Her Majesty the Queen in Council.

We the President Fellows and Scholars of the said College do hereby in exercise of the powers given us by the 54th section of the said Act add to alter and amend the Statutes framed by the said Commissioners in relation to our said College in the following manner, namely:—

Statute I sec. I by substituting the word "eleven" for the word "thirteen" of the Statute framed by the Commissioners which word "thirteen" has been altered to "twelve" in the Statute made by the Governing Body and approved by Her Majesty in Council on the 23rd February, 1891.

Statute X sec. 2 by substituting the word "four" for the word "two."

Statute XIV sec. 3 by adding between paragraphs 5 and 6 the words "If the Senior Tutor, the Second Tutor, the Senior Mathematical Lecturer or the Senior Classical Lecturer shall of his own accord wish to resign his office (or offices if he hold more than one) and if his tenure of any one or more or all of such offices, whether continuous or not, shall have amounted to thirty years or upwards, two-thirds of the Governing Body may, if they think fit, assign him in addition to his Fellowship (which under paragraph 5 of this section he continues to hold for life after holding office for twenty-five years) a further sum of money not exceeding one Fellowship dividend nor less than half one Fellowship dividend in amount to be paid to him yearly so long as he continues to hold his Fellowship and no longer.

ship and no longer.
"If the Senior Tutor, the Second Tutor, the
Senior Nathematical Lecturer or the Senior

Classical Lecturer shall have held any one or more or all of such offices whether continuously or not, for a period of thirty years or upwards, and if it shall appear to two-thirds of the Governing Body specially summoned to consider the question, that the interests of the College would be promoted by his resignation of his office (or affices, if he hold more than one) they may require him to resign after assigning to him in addition to his Fellowship (which under paragraph 5 of this section he continues to hold for life after holding office twenty-five years) a further sum of money not exceeding one Fellowship dividend nor less than half one Fellowship dividend in umount to be paid to him yearly so long as he continues to hold his Fellowship and no longer. This having been done, the office or offices oforesaid shall be ipso facto racant.

"Two-thirds of the Governing Body shall have power to suspend the election to one Fellowship, but not more, and to appropriate the annual income thereof towards providing pensions to retired College Officers as soon as any such pension be granted, provided that the moiety or other fraction of such Fellowship dividend, if there be any, which shall remain after providing one such pension shall until a second pension be granted be applied for the purpose of increasing the Building Fund, the Scholarship Fund or the Education Fund."

Statute XV Sec. 4 by substituting for the words "Every College Officer or Fellow who is fulfilling the duty of residence in College under this Statute shall sleep in College at least five nights in each week and if he shall be absent on either of the remaining nights he shall have a deputy approved by the President and such deputy shall sleep in College." the words "The Governing Body shall provide for every night during full term that at least two of the College Officers shall sleep in College and for every night out of full term in which any members of the College in statu pupillari are in residence, that at least one College Officer or Fellow shall sleep in College."

Statute XVIII Sec. 1 by omitting the words "The President shall receive ninety shillings for every week that he resides in College and" Statute XVIII Sec. 2 by substituting the word "four" for the word "three" and by adding after the words "one to each Fellow" the words "a sum of money not exceeding two to each Fellow who has been specially pensioned on resigning affice after thirty or more years service according to Statute XIV."

Statute XXVII sec. 3 by adding after the words "in the public funds" the words "or in first debenture securities of any of the principal railways in the United Kingdom or in the purchase of land in Great Britain."

Statute XXXIII by substituting the words "first day of October 1892" for the words "fourteenth day of March 1878" wherever they occur in the Statute framed by the Commissioners, which words "fourteenth day of March 1878" have been altered to "first day of June 1890" in the Statute made by the Governing Body and approved by Her Majesty in Council on the twenty-third February one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one.

W HEREAS the Governing Body of Shrewsbury School, in virtue of the powers conferred upon them by "The Public Schools Act, 1868," did, on the twenty-fifth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, make the following Scheme:

And whereas the said Scheme has this day been laid before Her Majesty in Council, the same is published in the London Gazette in pursuance of

the said Act:

And notice is hereby given, that it is lawful for the bodies or persons authorized so to do in that Act, within two months from the date of the publication of this notification, to petition Her Majesty in Council to withhold Her approval from the whole or any part of such Scheme.

SCHEME for amending and altering the Scheme for the removal of Shrewsbury School from its actual site.

WHEREAS by the Public Schools Act, 1868, 31 and 32 Vict. c. 118, it is enacted as follows:—

Section 25. Any scheme authorized to be made under this Act may contain all powers and provisions that may be thought expedient for carrying into effect its objects; and where any scheme authorizes the purchase or acquisition of any lands, there shall be deemed to be incorporated with such scheme "The Lands Clauses Consolidation Act 1845" with the exception of the provisions relating to the purchase of lands otherwise than by agreement and of the provisions relating to entry upon land to intersected lands, and to the recovery of forfeitures, penalties, and costs, and of the provisions relating to access to the Special Act.

And whereas it is further enacted :-

Section 26. The new Governing Body of Shrewsbury School may, if they deem it expedient, at any time after the passing of this Act lay a scheme before Her Majesty in Council for the removal of the School from its actual site to some other place and may provide in such scheme for the sale or mortgage of any property belonging to or held in trust for such School and for its appropriation to building or other purposes, with power to suspend any Scholarships or Exhibitions payable out of such property and for the purchase of other property and for the erection of new buildings on the property so purchased, and generally for all matters (including the sale of any surplus property that may be purchased, and the investment of the money which may be produced by such sale), required to effect, such removal in a convenient manner, to the same extent as if such Governing Body were the absolute owners of any property they may be dealing with under this section as purchasers, vendors, or otherwise; and any such scheme shall be subject to the same provisions, and, if approved, shall take effect, and be subject to alteration in the same manner as Statutes made by a Governing Body.

Provided firstly that any scheme made under this section before the expiration of the powers by this Act conferred on the Special Commissioners shall be approved of by them before being laid before Her Majesty in Council; secondly, that the power of making a scheme under this section shall not pass to the Special Commissioners or cease after the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and seventy, or such further time as may be determined by Her Majesty as hereinafter-mentioned, but shall continue vested in the new Governing Body of the said School; thirdly, that the School shall not be removed to any site exceeding in distance three miles measured in a

straight line from the Market Place in Shrews-

bury.

And whereas divers other Acts of Parliament have since been passed, continuing and enlarging the powers conferred in the abovenamed Act.

And whereas the Governing Body of Shrewsbury School did on the twenty-first day of August one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five propose by virtue and in pursuance of the powers above-mentioned a scheme for the removal of the said School in the terms following that is to say:—

1. With a view to the removal of Shrewsbury School from its actual site, the Governing Body may purchase the messuages, buildings, and several pieces of land situate at Kingsland near Shrewsbury and more particularly described in the schedule hereto (that is to say in the schedule to the scheme now being recited) and delineated upon the map or plan thereof annexed hereto (that is to say to the scheme now being

recited) and thereon coloured pink.

2. The Governing Body may appropriate the said pieces of land or such part thereof as they may deem necessary for the use of the School and may either alter and adapt to the purposes of the School any of the existing buildings on the said pieces of land, or may pull down the existing buildings thereon or any of them, and erect such new buildings thereon as they may deem requisite for the use of the School (including residences for the Masters) and may lay out any further part of the said land as a playground for the Scholars, or gardens for the Masters, or any like purposes.

3. With a view to the erection of residences for the Assistant Masters and of boarding houses, the Governing Body may grant building leases of any part or parts of the said pièces of land, subject to the following restrictions (that is to say):—

 No such lease shall be for any longer term than ninety-nine years, to take effect in possession or within six calendar months

after the making of the demise.

II. The rents to be reserved, shall be the best yearly rents that can reasonably be obtained without the payment of any fine or premium, but a peppercorn rent or any rent less than the rent ultimately made payable may be made during the first two years of the term.

III. The lessee shall covenant to erect on the land demised within a reasonable time, not exceeding two years after the date of the lease, a suitable residence for an Assistant Master with proper offices and outbuildings, and either with or without accommodation for boarders as the case may be.

IV. Every such lease shall contain a proviso for re-entry on non-payment of the rent reserved or non-performance or nonobservance of the covenants contained in the

lease

4. So soon as in the opinion of the Governing Body, the new site shall be ready, the School shall be removed to such new site; and thereupon the actual site and the buildings thereon shall be discharged from the trusts for the use of the School upon which the same are at present held, and shall thenceforth be held upon the trusts and for the purposes hereinafter declared.

5. For the purpose of raising funds for defraying the expenses of carrying this scheme into effect, the Governing Body may sell or mortgage (but subject as to any such mortgage to the restrictions hereinafter provided) any property belonging to or held in trust for the School, and shall apply the proceeds of any such sale or moregage, and may apply any capital funds for

the time being belonging to, or held in trust for the School in or towards payment of such expenses provided that the proceeds of any such sale may be applied in discharging the principal moneys raised by any previous mortgage or any part thereof.

6. No money shall be borrowed by the Governing Body on mortgage of any part of the property of the School to be effected under Article 5 at any higher rate of interest than five pounds per cent. per annum; and the Governing Body shall make provision for discharging the principal moneys borrowed within thirty years either by payment of the same in yearly or other instalments, or by the formation of a sinking or accumulation fund out of the income of the charity.

7. The Governing Body may also sell all or any part of the actual site of the School, or any part or parts of the said pieces of land so to be purchased as aforesaid which may not be required for the purposes of the School, either subject or not to any building lease thereof to be made under the said power for that purpose at such time or times and in such manner and for such sums of money as the Governing Body may think fit. All moneys to arise from any sale made under this Article may be applied to the same purposes to which the moneys raised by any sale under Article 5 are hereinbefore made applicable, and so far as the same may not be required for those purposes, and in the meantime and until the same shall be so applied shall be invested in any of the securities which may for the time being be authorised by the Court of Chancery for the investment of cash under the control of the Court, and the income of the stocks, funds, and securities in or upon which the said sale moneys shall be invested, and also the rents and profits of the said lands until sold shall be applicable to the same purposes as the income of any other property belonging to or held in trust for the School.

8. The Governing Body may from time to time and during such time as they may think necessary, either wholly or partially, suspend any Scholarships or Exhibitions payable out of any property belonging to or held in trust for the School which or the proceeds of the sale or the mortgage of which may have been appropriated for the purposes of this scheme.

9. No person dealing with the Governing Body shall be bound to inquire whether any disposition purporting to be made under the powers hereby conferred is in fact proper or authorised or be bound to see to the application of any moneys to be raised by any sale or mortgage purporting to be made under the powers of this scheme.

And whereas the said scheme was duly laid before and approved and sanctioned by Her Majesty in Council on the twelth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six. And whereas the Governing Body having in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventyeight completed the purchase of the messuages buildings and pieces of land described in the schedule to the hereinbefore recited scheme (with the exception of a piece of land containing two acres and seventeen perches therein described as the property of the representatives of the late Mr. John Beck) and having removed the School to its new site as soon as the buildings then necessary had been erected upon it, thereafter became convinced that owing to the insufficient area of the land originally purchased and the increasing number of the scholars it was necessary to take any favourable opportunity which might occur of providing additional a joining land for the purposes of the School. And whereas the

Governing Body accordingly on or about the nineteenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and ninety purchased from John Beck, Peter Arthur Beck and Edward Beck, sons of the said John Beck deceased a house on Kingsland with the land adjoining thereto containing in the whole twenty acres, three roods and six perches or thereabouts and including the said piece of land containing two acres and seventeen perches the purchase of which was authorised by the hereinbefore recited scheme as hereinbefore mentioned. And whereas on or about the twenty-fifth day of March one thousand eight hundred and ninetyone Edmund Cresswell Peele Esquire and the Venerable Thomas Bucknall Lloyd Archdeacon of Salop two of the members of the Governing Body and the Reverend Henry Whitehead Moss Head Master of Shrewsbury School with the approval and assent of the Governing Body purchased from Robert Alexander Craig and John Craig the trustees of the will of the Reverend James Craig deceased the dwelling-house known as Severn Hill House with the land adjoining thereto containing in the whole fourteen acres one rood and one perch or thereabouts to the intent that the same might be held by them at the disposal of the Governing Body pending the granting of the licence in mortmain next hereinafter recited. And whereas Her Majesty the Queen by Letters Patent dated the sixth of May in the fifty-fourth year of Her reign, granted unto the Governing Body and their successors full and absolute remission of all forfeitures on account of the hereditaments on Kingsland containing twenty acres, three roods and six perches so purchased as aforesaid having been taken and held by the Governing Body without a licence in mortmain and granted unto the Governing Body and their successors full power and authority to hold the same in mortmain in perpetuity and Her Majesty also granted unto the said Robert Alexander Craig and John Craig Her Royal licence and authority to convey to the Governing Body and their successors the dwellinghouse known as Severn Hill House and land containing fourteen acres, one rood, and one perch so purchased as aforesaid and also granted to the Governing Body and their successors Her especial licence and authority to accept a conveyance of the same to hod the same to them and their successors as the Governing Body of the Free Grammar School in the town of Shrewsbury aforesaid in mortmain in perpetuity. And whereas on or about the first day of September one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one the Governing Body sold and conveyed to Elizabeth Harriet Cooper of Claremont-buildings Shrewsbury aforesaid the dwelling-ho-se on King-land so purchased as aforesaid from the sons of John Beck deceased and a portion of the land purchased therewith comprising in the whole together with a small portion of land bought with Severn Hill House (and sold and conveyed to her by the said Edmund Cresswell Peele, Thomas Bucknail Lloyd and Henry Whitehead Moss with the assent and by the direction of the Governing Body) an area of four acres two roods and thirty-seven perches or thereabouts and being lands and hereditaments' not required for the purposes of the said School. And whereas on or about the thirtieth day of September one thousand eight hundred and ninetyone the said Edmund Cresswell Peele Thomas Bucknall Lloyd and Henry Whitehead Moss with the assent and by the direction of the Governing Body sold and conveyed to George Evans of Shr-wsbury aforesaid Gentleman the aforesaid dwelling-house known as Severa Hill House and a portion of the land purchased there with comprising in the whole four acres, one rood, thirty-seven perches seventeen yards or thereabouts and being lands and hereditaments not required for the purposes of the said school. And whereas on or about the seventeenth day of November one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one the said Edmund Cresswell Peele Thomas Bucknall Lloyd and Henry Whitehead Moss conveyed to the Governing Body the remainder of the land purchased with Severn Hill House aforesaid and not sold and conveyed either to the said Ellzabeth Harriet Cooper or to the said George Evans such remainder comprising an area of nine acres and two roods or thereabouts. And whereas the whole of the messuages and land so purchased as aforesaid and also such portions thereof as have been resold as aforesaid are more particularly described in the first schedule hereto and are delineated upon the plan hereto annexed the parts which have not been resold but which still remain the property of the Governing Body and are available for the purposes of the said school being distinguished upon the said plan by being coloured pink and the parts which have been resold being left uncoloured. And whereas the said Henry Whitehead Moss has recently purchased a piece of land containing five acres, one rood and thirty-five perches or thereabouts which adjoins the school playground and is more particularly described in the second schedule hereto and delineated upon the said plan hereto annexed and thereon coloured blue with the intention of giving to the Governing Body the option of purchasing the same from him for five hundred pounds less than the price paid by him. And whereas the acquisition for the purposes of the said school of the land coloured pink on the said plan could not have been carried out except by purchasing the same together with the other lands and hereditaments purchased therewith and subsequently selling such other land and hereditaments and such acquisition has proved and is likely to prove of great benefit and advantage to the said school and was in fact in the events which happened necessary for the proper and effective carrying out of the said recited scheme for the removal of the said school and further it would be of great benefit and advantage to the said school that the Governing Body should be

empowered to acquire for the purposes thereof the said land coloured blue on the said plan. And whereas a sanatorium has been found to be essential to the welfare of the school and the Governing Body are desirous of erecting one accordingly. And whereas the Governing Body requiring for the purposes of the acquisition of the said land coloured pink and blue and of the erection of the said sanatorium to borrow and raise considerable funds in addition to the funds the borrowing and raising of which were contemplated by the said recited scheme are accordingly in need of some relaxation in the requirement contained in the sixth clause of the hereinbefore recited scheme with regard to the discharge of the principal moneys borrowed by them.

The Governing Body of Shrewsbury School do hereby propose, by virtue and in pursuance of the powers above mentioned to alter the hereinbefore recited scheme as follows, that is to say:—

1. The said scheme shall throughout be read and construed as though the pieces of land and hereditaments 'more particularly described in the First and Second Schedules hereto (o'ther than and except such parts of the land and hereditaments described in the said First Schedule as are therein stated to have been sold) and which lands and hereditaments other than and except as aforesaid are delineated upon the plan hereto annexed and thereon coloured pink and blue had been described in the schedule to the said recited scheme and delineated upon the plan thereto annexed and thereon coloured pink, and in particular the purchase and acquisition of the said piece of land coloured pink by and on behalf of the Governing Body as hereinbefore recited by means of pur-chasing those pieces of land together with other lands and hereditaments and subsequently selling such other lands and hereditaments shall be deemed to have been authorised by the said scheme.

2. The said scheme shall be read and construed as though it had been by clause six thereof provided that the Governing Body should make provision for discharging the principal moneys borrowed by them within forty years from the time of borrowing instead of within thirty years

as therein mentioned.
