Forms for the purpose can be obtained at the Lord Chamberlain's Office.

Gentlemen who wish to be presented officially should communicate with the heads of their Department, who will provide them with the necessary cards and instructions.

It is particularly requested that the names of the Gentlemen to be presented be very distinctly written on the Presentation Cards delivered to the Lord Chamberlain at the Levee, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

THE following General Order, dated 15th March, 1895, together with a despatch from Brigadier-General A. H. Turner regarding the operations of the Waziristan Delimitation Escort, including the attack on the camp at Wano, has been received from the Government of India:-

MILITARY DEPARTMENT.

Fort William, the 15th March, 1895. FIELD OPERATIONS.—WAZIRISTAN.

THE Right Honourable the Viceroy and Governor-General of India in Council directs the publication of the subjoined letters from the Adjutant-General in India, submitting, under the orders of the Commander-in-Chief in India, despatches from Brigadier-General A. H. Turner relating to the operations of the force under his command from the 1st October to the 29th November, 1894, including the attack made by the Mahsud Waziris on the camp at Wano on the 3rd November, 1894.

I HAVE the honour, by direction of the Commander-in-Chief, to forward, for the information of the Government of India, the enclosed despatch* from Brigadier-General A. H. Turner of the operations of the Waziristan Delimitation Escort from the 1st October, 1894, including the attack made by the Mahsud Waziris on the camp at Wano on the 3rd November.

No. 99, dated Camp Wano, 16th November, 1894. From Brigadier-General A. H. Turner, Commanding Waziristan Delimitation Escort, to the Adjutant-General in India.

I HAVE the honour to forward, for the information of His Excellency the Commanderin-Chief in India, the following report on the operations of the brigade forming the escort to the Waziristan Delimitation Commission from the 1st October up to, and including, the attack made by the Mahsud Waziris on our camp on the morning of the 3rd November.

2. In accordance with the orders of the Government of India, the brigade, consisting of the troops

as per margin,* was concentrated at Dera Ismail Khan on the 1st October.

Owing to political causes there was some delay in marching from that station, but on the 11th, 12th, and 13th October, the brigade moved out in three detachments, the whole force being again concentrated at Kajuri Kach on the 18th of that month, where it was joined by the members of the Delimitation Commission.

3. Previous to this reconnaissances had been carried out, under my orders, into Spin, and on my arrival at Kajuri Kach a party was sent to examine the road to Karab Kot, via Toi Khula. As a result of these reconnaissances, I decided to march from Kajuri Kach to Wano viâ Spin and Karab Kot.

4. On the 22nd October, accompanied by Mr. Bruce, the British Commissioner, the whole brigade, with the exception of the 20th Bengal Infantry, whom I left behind to bring up a large convoy of supplies, marched via the Karkan Kotal to the head of the Spin Tangi (12 miles), where it encamped for the night. On the 23rd the march was continued to Karab Kot (11 miles), and the brigade halted there the following day to allow of the route into Wano being reconnoitred. The best road was found to be that following the Toi Stream, and accordingly on the 24th we marched to Wano (8 miles), and encamped at the eastern end of the valley.

5. Wano is a large open plain, for the most part stony, about 13 miles long by 11 miles broad. The only running stream is the Toi which skirts the southern and south-eastern edge of the plain. and along the banks of which there is a narrow strip of cultivation surrounding the villages and forts of the Ahmadzai Darweshkhel Waziris.

6. On the 27th October, the 20th Bengal Infantry arrived in camp from Kajuri Kach, bringing supplies for the whole force up to the 20th November.

7. From the time the troops reached Wano it was apparent that individual Waziris were bent on mischief, and the camp was fired into nightly, a naick of the 1st Gurkhas being severely wounded on the 25th October. On the evening of the 28th, the Commissioner informed me that a gathering of some 800 Mahsud Waziris under the leadership of a fanatical Mulla named Powindah, were reported to have collected at Kaniguram and were about to move into the Khaisara Valley, where they might possibly be increased to 1,000 or 2,000 men.

8. On the 30th October a strong reconnaissance, consisting of the troops as per margin† visited the Tiarza Kotal overlooking Khaisara, but no opposition was met with, except a few shots fired at the rear guard when returning to camp. Tiarza Kotal is about 10 miles distant from here and one-and-a-half miles from the Khaisara villages, and the road was found to be practicable for laden camels. On the 1st November the report of the arrival of Mulla Powindah at Kaniguram was confirmed, and on the 2nd news was received that he, with a following of about 1,000 men, had moved into Khaisara.

9. As soon as it was certain that a hostile

gathering had collected at Kaniguram, I assembled all Officers commanding corps and gave instructions for the necessary precautions being taken. lying and inlying picquets were doubled, the weak points of the camp were strengthened by breastworks, and all men were ordered to be under arms in their tents at 4 A.M.

10. On the 2nd November a reconnaissance was sent to the Inzar Kotal (a distance of some six-and-a-half miles) leading into Shakai and Khaisara. On reaching the Kotal the troops were fired on by a small party of Waziris on the slopes of Kotkun. These were driven off without any loss on our side, and the reconnaissance party returned to camp. The road to the Inzar Kotal was found to be practicable for laden mules. The first half of the route leads across the Wano plain, and the road then enters the bed of a ravine which it follows up to the Kotal, being here impracticable for cavalry.

11. On the evening of the 2nd November, the position of the camp was as shown in the accompanying sketch, * the front facing a little to the west of north. On the extreme left was the camp of the 1st Gurkhas, next came the field hospitals and commissariat, then the 1st Punjab Cavalry, 20th Bengal Infantry, Brigade Staff, No. 3 (Peshawar) Mountain Battery, and No. 2 Company, Bengal Sappers and Miners, the extreme right being occupied by the camp of the 3rd Sikhs. transport animals were located along the rear of corps. The civil camp was pitched separately about 100 yards to the right rear of the 3rd Sikhs. This was a source of great anxiety to me, but I consented to this arrangement on the urgent representation of the British Commissioner, who considered that it was necessary on political grounds, as allowing free access to him by jirgas. The country in our vicinity, as indeed all over the Wano plain, is intersected by ravines in every direction. These adjacent to the camp are shown in the accompanying sketch. A ravine runs along the whole front and another along the rear, from which latter the drinking water is obtained. These ravines are both tributaries of the Toi which here runs from south to north, and is not more than 300 yards distant from the east end of the civil camp. Beyond the Toi rise some high hills, out of range except for arms of precision. About 400 yards in rear of the camp is a small rocky ridge with two peaks rising some 75 feet out of the plain; this is known as the "Picquet Hill."

12. It may here be mentioned that the position of the camp had been chosen chiefly on political considerations, as the British Commissioner had urged most strongly that the force should remain at the eastern end of the valley, so as to cover the main passes into the Mahsud country, namely, the Tiarza and the Inzar, already mentioned.

The political officers up to the end of October were fully persuaded that we need anticipate no strong combination among the Mahsuds to molest us, but that we should be prepared for raids or annoyance from small bands. The camp was therefore pitched somewhat more extended for sanitary reasons than it would have been in a purely military expedition.

13. The whole camp was surrounded by a chain of observation picquets, and the position of these and also of their supports on the night of the 2nd-3rd November is shown in the sketch. It had been found that patrolling at night was useless owing to the noise made by our men

moving over the stony ground, which indicated their position and rendered them liable to be surprised and cut off by small parties. picquets were posted with the object merely of observing and reporting, and were not intended to hold their own in the event of a serious attack, in which case they were ordered, after giving the alarm, to fall back on their supports, the latter then retiring on the main body. To have had all picquets strong enough to offer resistance to an attack in force would have made night duty fall very heavy. The positions for the picquets were chosen chiefly with the object of watching the ravines in the vicinity of the camp. Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6 picquets were furnished by the 3rd Sikhs, Nos. 1 and 2 were ordered, in case of attack, to fall back on their support and then to rejoin the regiment. Nos. 3, 4, and 5 were also to fall bank on their support, which was just outside the civil camp, and then to assist in the protection of that camp. There was a detachment of 40 rifles under a British officer posted in a breastwork about 100 yards to the north of the civil camp to protect it from that direction. No. 6 picquet was to retire on No. 7. The latter, as also No. 8, which were both on the Picquet Hill, were furnished by the 20th Bengal Infantry and had a support about 200 yards in rear of them. This support, in case of attack, was ordered to reinforce Nos. 7 and 8 picquets, which, holding positions of vital importance to the safety of the camp, were ordered to retain them at all costs and not to retire. The 1st Gurkhas furnished the picquets on the left flank, viz., 81, 9, 10, the "Bogey," and 11. The first two were ordered to fall back on the Gurkha left support, which was to stand fast and hold its own; No. 10, the "Bogey," and No. 11 to fall back on the right support, the whole then retiring on the main body. The "Bogey" picquet was so called because it was only occasionally held, but on the night of the 2nd-3rd it was occupied. No. 12 was furnished by the 20th Bengal Infantry and had a support in rear, on which it was ordered to fall back and retire with it to camp. It may here be mentioned that when the attack actually took place, the above orders were all duly carried out except in the cases of picquets Nos. 6, 10, and 11. No. 6 did not retire as it was not considered that it was sufficiently threatened, and in the case of 10 and 11, the rush of the enemy prevented their carrying out their orders, as will be seen hereafter. To the north-east of camp and about 500 yards distant, there is a deserted Darweshkhel fort, and this on the night of the 2nd-3rd was occupied by 100 rifles of the 1st Gurkhas, with orders to remain concealed, and if an attempt on camp were made in that direction, they were to attack the enemy in rear. If the attack were made on the left of camp, they were to try and cut off any body of the enemy retreating by the Toi valley. The above brief description of our dispositions will help to explain the events that followed. It may also here be mentioned that the moon was in its first quarter and went down about ten o'clock on the evening of the 2nd.

14. The night passed quietly until 5.30 on the morning of the 3rd when the whole camp was suddenly aroused by hearing three shots followed by wild yells and the beating of drums, and at the same instant a desperate rush of some 500 determined fanatics supported by a heavy fire from the right front was made straight into the left flank and left rear of camp. So rapid was the rush that before the Gurkhas, although already accounted, could get out of their tents, the leading men, had penetrated into their camp, and some 30 of them had passed beyond into the rear of the

field hospitals, commissariat, and cavalry. The Gurkhas, though thus taken by surprise, and getting out of their tents only to find their camp in possession of the enemy, quickly formed rallying bodies and engaged in a desperate hand-to-hand conflict with the enemy, but so dark was the night that friend was undistinguishable from foe at even two or three paces distance.

15. It appears that under cover of this darkness, the enemy had approached camp from the west along the two large ravines. Emerging from these, the main body rushed past Nos. 9 and 10 picquets. In the latter, which was held by seven men, three were killed, and the others after firing three shots made their escape. It was these shots that gave the first alarm of the enemy's approach. A large body of Waziris who had continued their course down the ravine past No. 9 picquet were checked on reaching the left support of the Gurkhas and split up into two bodies, one of which joined the main attack on the left flank of the Gurkhas, and the other continuing down the ravine broke up against the rear guards, many penetrating into camp behind the field hospitals and the commissariat, where they succeeded in inflicting much damage on the unarmed followers and transport animals. of these men, joined by others who had penetrated down the main street, succeeded in reaching the cavalry lines and even as far as the brigade staff tents. Those in the cavalry lines set to work hacking at the heel ropes of the troop horses with the apparent object of causing a stampede. A number of horses were thus set free and galloped out of camp. By some of these also it was that Licutenant Macaulay, R.E., who was apparently making his way towards the sound of the firing, was set on and killed by swordcuts; not, however, before he had shot one man dead and another through the body with his revolver. Surgeon-Major Haig was also attacked by a swordsman when coming out of his tent, and received a cut through the upper part of the arm, completely severing the bone. In the field hospitals three of the enemy were shot dead by some of the sick, whilst two of the latter were wounded, one by: a gunshot and the other by a swordcut.

16. In the meantime the Gurkhas had stopped the main rush from passing down the centre street. The reserve of the regiment under Major Robinson formed a rallying square in the centre of their camp and fought back-to-back and hand-to-hand. Here, among others, the Jemadar Adjutant of the regiment was killed, and Captain Lang and Lieutenant Angelo were wounded, the former severely, and the latter dangerously. Desperate fighting also took place in the breastwork at the north-west corner of the camp, where Lieutenant Herbert was dangerously wounded, and some nine men either killed or wounded.

. 17. When it became apparent that the enemy's main attack was directed against the left flank of the camp, I ordered Colonel Meiklejohn, C.M.G., Commanding the 20th Bengal Infantry, to take two companies of his regiment, which were in reserve, to reinforce the Gurkhas. This he did, clearing the way as he went with the bayonet. I also ordered a company of the 3rd Sikhs to join and assist the Gurkhas. By the time these reinforcements reached our left flank, the Gurkhas had succeeded in completely clearing their camp of the enemy who left behind them some forty bodies. After the main attack had been repulsed, two other separate but far less determined attempts were made by the enemy to get home from the same direction, but were steadily met. Orders were given for the guns to

fire star shell to light up the ground where the enemy were collected, and this enabled the infantry to get in several effective volleys. There still remained a few stray men in the centre of the camp, who, while the fighting was going on, had employed themselves in looting whatever they could lay their hands on. These, finding their friends had failed to hold their ground, turned their thoughts to flight. Several were shot down while attempting to flee, and indeed it is doubtful if any of those who had delayed making their escape till the end of the fight succeeded in getting out of camp at all. I would here mention that, although the main attack was directed against our left flank, men were observed in large numbers on the hills on our right, apparently awaiting events. considerable body was also seen to our front, and it was subsequently reported that it was part of the enemy's plan to assault from this direction simultaneously with the attack on our left, but for some reason not explained this did not come off. There is no doubt, however, that had the first attack not been so speedily met and dealt with, the Waziris were ready to take advantage of any confusion, and would have tried to rush the camp from all sides. I had therefore up to the last to be prepared for a second and perhaps more formidable attack from some other quarter.

18. At 6 A.M., when day was beginning to dawn, the enemy's fire slackened, and it was apparent that their retreat had commenced. I at once sent orders for the cavalry to start in pursuit and inflict as much damage as possible. There was some slight delay in this order being carried out, as during the fight, whilst the sowars were engaged in defending their front and rear, the syces who should have been saddling the horses had run away and hidden themselves, which could hardly be wondered at, considering that the enemy, as already stated, had succeeded in getting among the horses. In spite of these difficulties, the squadron numbering numbering sixty-one sabres under Major O'Mealy, within ten minutes of receiving the order, was trotting to the right flank of the camp with the object of gaining the road to the Inzar Kotal which was apparently the direction of the enemy's retreat. The cavalry was followed almost immediately by the troops as per margin,* under the command of Colonel Meiklejohn, 20th Bengal Infantry, whom I had ordered to push on as rapidly as possible in the direction of the Inzar Kotal and pursue as long as there was any chance of inflicting loss.

19. The cavalry, after trotting about three miles, came in sight of the retreating enemy, the main body of whom they estimate to number some 1,000 or 1,500 men. Here the ground was very broken and covered with large stones, and it was impossible to go faster than a trot. On gaining slightly better ground, the squadron cut into the line of the enemy's retreat, and charged where the crowd was thickest, inflicting great loss. After pursuing some distance, the squadron was re-formed under a fire from both sides and again charged where the enemy was thickest. By this time the Waziris were so scattered and the ground so bad, that "pursue" was ordered, and the enemy was cut down or speared singly, the lance proving its excellence as a weapon of pursuit. The cavalry horses were beginning to tire, so, rallying for a list effort, the squadron charged up a steep slope among olive trees at the last of the enemy within reach. The ground being now quite impracticable for mounted action, sections were dismounted and the recreat harassed by volleys as long as within range. The squadron then recired until it met the main body of the pursuing column which had been joined about two miles from camp by the 100 rifles of the 1st Gurkhas, who had held the deserted Darweshkhel fort already mentioned.

20. On being met by the cavalry Colonel Meiklejohn pushed on with the whole force to the Inzar Kotal and continued the pursuit for some three miles down the other side. The enemy were seen in full retreat, streaming away towards Shakai on the left and Khaisara on the right, but too far off for the guns to be brought into action. Smaller bodies, however, came under the fire of the infantry and suffered loss. As further pursuit would now have been useless, the order was given to retire to the Inzar Kotal, and from there the whole pursuing force returned to camp, which was reached at 4 P.M.

21. Our losses during the attack and in the pursuit are given in the accompanying returns and amounted altogether to 45 killed and 75 wounded, including camp-followers. Of British Officers, Lieutenant Macaulay, R.E., was killed, and the following wounded:—Of the Staff, Lieutenant M. L. Hornby, Orderly Officer, severely; in the 1st Punjab Cavalry, Surgeon-Major P. de H. Haig, Indian Medical Service, severely; in the 1st Gurkhas, Captain A. G. B. Lang, severely; Lieutenant R. D. Angelo, dangerously; and Lieutenant C. Herbert, dangerously; and in the 20th Bengal Infantry, Lieutenant I. F. R. Thompson, severely. Of Native Officers, Subadar Padam Singh Rana and Jemadar Adjutant Kharak Singh Nagarkoti were killed.

22. In addition to our losses in Officers and men, the enemy during the attack succeeded in carrying off a considerable amount of Government and private property, including 35 Martini-Henry rifles, two Martini-Henry carbines, and Rs. 2,600 in cash from the Commissariat Agent's treasure chest. The rifles for the most part belonged to men who were killed or wounded, and the car-bines to two sowars who were wounded in the cavalry pursuit and whose horses went off over the Inzar Kotal. Fifteen cavalry horses (including the two above mentioned) and several horses and ponies belonging to Officers and others were missing, and there is little doubt that these all eventually found their way into Mahsud country, as the majority were seen galloping down the Toi Valley and were probably caught by the enemy who were watching the fight from the Forty-eight Government neighbouring hills. mules were killed, or had to be shot, and 58 were wounded, in addition to five camels killed and

23. The enemy's loss was large; 125 bodies were counted in the immediate neighbourhood of camp, and many others were seen along the road traversed by the pursuing column. During the pursuit itself the cavalry killed some 50, wounding many more, and the infantry accounted for about 25. From information subsequently received, the British Commissioner estimated the enemy's killed at 350. The number of wounded is not known. Ten prisoners were taken, of whom eight are wounded.

24. It is difficult to estimate the number of the enemy engaged, but from the reports since received, I hardly think this could have been less than 3,000. Of this number, only about half took part in the actual attack on the camp, the remainder were awaiting events, ready to join their fellow tribesmen if successful. The enemy con-

sisted of Mahsuds with a few Darwesh Khel of Shakai and Baddar, and appear to have been composed of two classes; first, the followers of Mulla Powindah, who for the most part had come from the neighbourhood of Makin and Maidan, and contained the fanatical element; and secondly, the Nana Khel, including the Abdul Rahman Khel, who were principally bent on plunder. bravery and disregard of death shown by the men who made the first rush into camp, can only be spoken of in terms of the highest admiration.

25. I would especially desire to bring to the notice of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief the conduct of all corps on this occasion. brunt of the fighting fell on the 1st Gurkhas. This regiment, although taken at a disadvantage, behaved with the utmost gallantry and steadines. and succeeded after severe hand-to-hand fighting in clearing their camp of the enemy. The whole of the troops displayed excellent discipline, and a noticeable feature of the fight was the perfect order and absence of all confusion in the camp under very trying circumstances; there was little wild firing, and in the parts of the camp, not directly attacked, there was no firing at imaginary enemies. The manner in which the pursuit was carried out was also most commendable.

I would beg to bring to the favourable notice of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief the following Officers who distinguished themselves during the attack on our camp on the 3rd instant:-

Major G. H. Robinson, Commanding 1st Battalion, 1st Gurkha Rifles, for the steady bravery and resolution with which he held his own on the first assault, and rapidly restored order in his regiment, repelling all further attempts of the enemy.

Colonel W. H. Meiklejohn, C.M.G., Commanding 20th (Dake of Cambridge's Regiment) Bengal Infantry, for excellent service in assisting in clearing the cump of the enemy, and for the manner he carried out my orders when in command of the pursuing column.

Major W. A. D'O. O'Mealy, Commanding Squadron, 1st (Prince Albert Victor's Own) Punjab Cavalry, for the vigour of the pursuit and the gallantry with which he made repeated charges amongst the mass of the flying enemy. This commendation must be extended to all Officers and men of the small number of cavalry.

The Officer Commanding, 1st Gurkha Rifles, brings to notice the following Officers:-

Lieutenant and Adjutant R. D. Angelo, 1st Gurkhas, as being conspicuous in getting his men together, and encouraging them to do their duty.

Lieutenant C. Herbert, 1st Gurkhas, who behaved with gallantry under trying circumstances, his command being attacked in front and rear whilst extended in single rank.

Lieutenant M. L. Hornby, 24th (Baluchistan) Regiment of Bombay Infantry, Orderly Officer, who, though severely wounded, on arriving with a message, gave great assistance after the above Officers were disabled.

The Officer Commanding Squadron, Punjab Cavalry, brings to notice the services of:-

Lieutenant E. W. McK. Bullantyne, both for his pluck and dash in the charges, as well as in going into the horse lines and killing one or more of the enemy who were cutting loose the horses.

Captain A. W. Chaldecott, for the example he

set his men by his coolness and personal bravery.

All these commendations I would beg cordially to endorse.

I will take another opportunity of bringing to notice the services of other Officers of corps and departments, as well as of the Staff who have served me so well on this occasion as well as always since the brigade was formed.

IN continuation of my Letter No. 99, dated 16th November, 1894, I have the honour to submit, for the information of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, the following brief report bringing the operations of the Waziristan Delimitation Escort up to the present date, on which it ceases to exist as a separate command.

2. On the 17th November, the 2nd Battalion, Border Regiment, arrived at Wano, and joined the force under my command.

3. Subsequent to the attack on our camp on the morning of the 3rd instant, the Mahsud Waziris, with the exception of petty offences, such as firing on the grass-cutters' guard, carrying off camels, and interfering with our line of communications, have remained inactive. Reports have been received from time to time of large gatherings with the object of again attacking the camp, but up to the present date no such attack has taken place.

4. On this occasion I would beg to bring to the favourable notice of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief the services of the following Officers in addition to those mentioned in my

former report :-

Lieutenant-Colonel W. O. Thompson, Commanding 3rd Sikhs, is an Officer in whose ability and judgment I have learned to place much confidence, and to whom I am grateful for the readiness he always displays to undertake any duties with his regiment, however arduous.

Brigade-Surgeon-Lieutenant-Colonel G. McB. Davis, Indian Medical Service, Principal Medical Officer with the Escort, possesses thoroughly good administrative abilities and sound common sense; under him the department has been dis-

tinguished by smooth working.
Lieutenant-Colonel A. H. Mason, D.S.O., Deputy - Assistant Quartermaster - General for Intelligence, has been of inestimable service to me, not only for his intimate knowledge of the frontier and the tribes, but also in matters outside his own department.

Veterinary-Major G. J. R. Rayment, Army Veterinary Department, is an Officer devoted to his profession, who has done admirable work in the treatment of sick and wounded animals, and also by his sound advice in all matters connected with his department.

Major B. Duff, Deputy-Assistant Adjutant-General, has earned my entire confidence by his excellent abilities, thorough knowledge of his work, and admirable tact.

Captain F. H. J. Birch, Commanding No. 3 (Peshawar) Mountain Battery, is an Officer of whose great value as commandant of a mountain battery I have had previous experience; with him in command of my guns, I have always had perfect confidence that all a battery can do will be done.

Captain H. Wharry, Brigade Commissariat

Officer, by the excellence of all his arrangements,

has proved himself to possess very high qualifica-

tions for the work of his department in the field.
Captain A. J. Hunter-Weston, Commanding
No. 2 Company, Bengal Sappers and Miners, is an Officer of great energy, who, by his ability and readiness to undertake work, has been of great service to me.

Captain J. M. Stewart, Deputy-Assistant Quartermaster-General, has proved himself to possess the qualifications of a thoroughly good Staff Officer.

Lieutenant F. W. Evatt, Assistant Superintendent, Army Signalling, has carried out the duties of his branch excellently under very difficult conditions, having for a long time to work with native signallers only, most of whom are ignorant of the English language.

5. I trust I may not be considered out of place if I express my gratitude to Mr. R. I. Bruce, C.I.E., and the officers of the Delimitation Commission for their courteous and ready assistance in all matters which affect the comfort and well-

being of the Escort.

6. I would also beg to bring to notice the admirable work done by Major R. A. Wahab, R.E., Survey Officer, which has already been of the greatest assistance in giving me a clearer knowledge of the country, and also in facilitating

signalling work.
6. Mr. W. Van Someren, Postal Department, on his arrival to take charge, rapidly put the working of the department on an excellent footing and freed me from all anxiety on that account

THE Right Honournble the Viceroy and Governor-General of India in Council directs the publication, for general information, of the subjoined communication from the Adjutant-General in India, submitting, under the orders of the Commander-in-Chief in India, a Despatch from Major-General Sir R. C. Low, K.C.B., Commanding the Chitral Relief Force, relating to the action in the Malakand Pass, Swat, on the 3rd April, 1895.

No. 249-G, dated Simla, the 9th April 1895. From the Adjutant-General in India to the Secretary to the Government of India, Military Department.

THE following is submitted for the informa-

tion of the Government of India:

Dated Camp Khar, Swat Valley, the 5th April, 1895 .- From the General Officer Commanding the Chitral Field Force, to the Adjutant-General in India.

I HAVE the honour to make the following report on the action of 3rd April, when the Malakand Pass was captured by the troops under my command.

2. As previously explained by telegram, I learnt on the 1st April that all three passes into Swat, viz., the Malakand, the Shahkot, and the Morah passes, were held by the enemy, and that the majority of them occupied the Shahkot and Morah passes.

At that time, the disposition of the troops of this force was so arranged as to attack the Malakand and the Shahkot passes simultaneously on the morning of the 3rd of April. The 1st Brigade was then at Lundkhwar on the road to the Shahkot Pass. The 2nd and 3rd Brigades were at Jalala on the road to the Malakand Pass.

3. Consequent on the above information, I determined to deceive the enemy as to my intention by advancing cavalry to Pali on the Shahkot road on the 2nd April. The idea that that pass would certainly be attacked was maintained, but I directed the 1st Brigade to join me at Darghai opposite the Malakand Pass on the morning of the 2nd April, and hoped by a forced march on the night of the 1st April to reach Darghai by 8 A.M., and carry the pass on the 2nd April with the three brigades.

4. A storm of wind and rain, however, raged all through the night of the 1st, and at midnight I was obliged to abandon my intention of a night march, it being an impossibility for the men to load up the transport in such darkness, rain, and mud. All that could be done therefore was to start at daybreak, and collect the three brigades at Darghai on the 2nd, and make the

attack on the 3rd April.

5. I may note here that, so far as deceiving and boulders, and that the crossing of the pass lay the enemy as to my intention of attacking only one pass, the plan was completely successful, though the attack took place a day later than I had hoped for. The enemy had not sufficient time to get across the hills and help their comrades on the Malakand Pass between the evening of the 2nd April, when they must have fathomed the plan, to the morning of the 3rd, when the attack took place.

6. The attack took place on the morning of the 3rd with the 2nd and 1st Brigade. It was my intention to use the 2nd Brigade only, the 1st being in rear with its mule transport ready to cross the pass as soon as captured, and march on the Swat River; but, as will be seen, I found the pass so strongly held and so obstinately defended, that to gain the victory I had to utilize both brigades, and at the final moment I had only one regiment in reserve, the other three regiments of the 1st Brigade as well as all four regiments of the 2nd Brigade being engaged in the attack.

. 7. Starting from Darghai, the pass the first goes through a gradually narrowing valley to the north for about two miles, then bends to the north-east for a mile and a half, where the high .hills on the west drop precipitately into the pass. On reaching the bend of the pass to the north east, it was apparent that the pass was strongly held-on the west side, the whole range being lined by men

with flags and banners.

. 18. At this point the 4th S.klis were sent to occupy a spur which jutted out from the range to the west, and they had to remain there, covering

the advance, for the day.

9. The Guides Infantry were directed to ascend the highest point of the western hill, and after -gaining the summit, to turn along the crest, and enfilade the position of the enemy, which evidently extended from the highest point to the end of the range, and where, as already noted, the hill precipitately descends into the pass. The Guides Infantry had a most arduous task to perform; they had to ascend the highest peak of the range about 1,500 feet high, and attack and capture several sangar-full of the enemy, which were held by riflemen and crowds throwing rocks and stones down, and their advance was necessarily gradual.

10. Meanwhile, as the force advanced, the position of the enemy was disclosed. They occupied the whole of the crest of the western hill with numerous sangars down the sides of the hill, each commanding the one below it, and their -main strength was on the northern end of the hill, where it precipitately descended into the valley. The hills on the eastern side of the pass were not held by the enemy till after the point where the western hill dropped into the valley. Full advan-

tage was taken of this fact.

11. There were three mountain batteries with the troops in action, namely, Nos. 3 and 8 Mountain Batteries, Royal Artillery, and No. 4 (Derajat) Mountain Battery of four guns—in all 16 guns; and these took up position after position on the eastern slope of the valley, and most successfully prevented any concentration of the enemy when the infantry advance was ordered:

12. It soon became apparent that if the assault was delayed till the position was turned by the Guides that the action would be unduly delayed. and the Guides themselves seriously outnumbered. . 13. At this time I also ascertained that, although the pass appeared to lie in the valley itself and to round the corner of the western hill swhere it dropped into the valley, yet that beyond othis, point there was no path nor roadway whatever, the valley being blocked with huge rocks

to the left over the heights to our left, and which was so strongly held by the enemy. Action was at once therefore taken to carry the hill to the left, which from this point was about 1,000 feet

high.

14. The Gordon Highlanders were directed up the crest of the western hill from the point where it touched the valley. The King's Own Scottish Borderers were directed up the centre spur. The 60th Rifles were directed up the slopes from further back in the line, whilst the Bedfordshire Regiment and 37th Dogras pushed on, rounded the point from which the Gordon Highlanders commenced the ascent, and; turning to the left, ascended the hill from the northern side, the 15th

Sikhs being held in reserve.

15. As the infantry ascended it was seen how well the defence of the hill had been organized. The Gordon Highlanders and King's Own Scottish Borderers, ascending as they did on a direct attack, met the greatest resistance and suffered most. Sangar after sangar was obstinately held, each sangar as it was rushed coming at once under the fire of the one above it; and here I may note the admirable service done by the artillery and Maxim guns; several attempts were made by the enemy to concentrate from above and hold lower sangars and positions, but all such attempts were frustrated by the admirable practice of the mountain batteries and Maxim guns over the hea's of our advancing infantry, although at several points the sangars were only carried by hand-to-hand fighting. The enemy were gradually driven from position to position, and eventually fled down the other slopes of the western hill as the heads of the attacking columns reached the top, when the pass was captured and fighting over, though they were pursued down the other side as soon as the men got together.

16. The action was begun at 8.30 A.M. and

concluded at 2 P.M.

17. The total numbers of the enemy are variously reported, but the actual numbers on the pass were probably about 10,000 to 12,000 men -some 3,000 armed, and the rest using rocks and stones.

18. The enemy's loss was said by themselves to be about 500, and the road down the other side was covered with signs of numbers of wounded men having been carried away. Our loss was 11 men killed, and 8 Officers and 39 men wounded.

19. The 1st Brigade remained at the top of the pass, holding it, while the mules of the brigade passed up; but the path was so bad that only a few mules reached the top that night.

20. I have already sent by telegram the detail of killed and wounded.

GENERAL ORDER of the Local Government Board: Qualification of Dispenser: Altering

39 Unions and Separate Parishes.
To the Guardians of the Poor of the several Unions and several Parishes named in Schedules A and B to this Order ;- .

And to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS by certain Orders addressed to the Guardians of the Poor of the Unions and Separate Parishes named in Schedules A and B to this Order the Poor Law Board or the Local Government Board prescribed Rules and Regulations with respect to the management of Dispensaries provided for such Unions and Parishes or for certain Districts thereof, and made provision, amongst other things, with regard to the qualification of Dispensers;

And whereas it is expedient that other provision as regards the qualification of persons hereafter appointed to the office of dispenser should be made

as hereinafter mentioned:

Now therefore, We, the Local Government Board, in pursuance of the powers given to Us by the Statutes in that behalf, hereby order as follows:—

ARTICLE I.—So much of the said Orders as prescribes the qualification of the Dispensers

appointed thereunder is hereby rescinded.

ARTICLE II.—We hereby Order, with regard to the qualification of any person who may be hereafter appointed under the said Orders by the Guardians of the Poor of any of the said Unions or separate Parishes to the office of Dispenser at any Dispensary of such Union or Parish, as follows;

No person shall be qualified to be appointed a Dispenser unless he shall be a Licentiate of the Society of Apothecaries of London, or shall hold a Certificate of that Society as to his qualification to act as an Assistant in compounding and dispensing medicines, or shall be a compounder of medicines duly qualified in accordance with the Regulations for the Army Medical Staff Corps, or shall have been duly registered under the Pharmacy Act, 1868, or shall have been duly registered under the Pharmacy Act (Ireland), 1875, and the Pharmacy Act (Ireland), 1875, Amendment Act, 1890, as qualified to compound medical prescriptions.

(iii.) The same parts of the landing-vessel shall have applied to them a coating of lime-wash.

(2.) The scrapings and sweepings of the landingvessel shall not be landed unless and until they have been well mixed with quicklime.

5. The sheep so transhipped shall continue to

be deemed foreign animals.

6. If anything is done or omitted to be done in contravention of any of the provisions of this Order, the owner or consignee of the animals, and the master of the landing-vessel, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts or omissions, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

7. Terms in this Order have the same meaning
