Gentlemen who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names clearly written thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

#### PRESENTATIONS.

Gentlemen who propose to present others must send in writing the name of such Gentlemen to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, not later than two days previous to the Levee, in order that the Lord Chamberlain may submit the names to Her Majesty, when, if they are approved, Presentation Cards will be forwarded. Forms for the purpose can be obtained at the Lord Chamberlain's Office.

Gentlemen who wish to be presented officially should communicate with the heads of their Department, who will provide them with the necessary cards and instructions.

It is particularly requested that the names of the Gentlemen to be presented be very distinctly written on the Presentation Cards delivered to the Lord Chamberlain at the Levee, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

W HEREAS by the twentieth section of "The Finance Act, 1894," it is enacted that Her Majesty the Queen may, by Order in Council, apply that section to any British Possession, where Her Majesty is satisfied that, by the law of such possession, no duty is leviable in respect of property situate in the United Kingdom when passing on death.

And whereas Her Majesty is satisfied that by the law of the Island of Barbados no duty is leviable in respect of property situate in the United Kingdom when passing on death.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the power by the aforesaid Act in Her Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the twentieth section of "The Finance Act, 1894," shall apply to the Island of Barbados.

HEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the Session of Parliament holden in the seventh and eighth years of Her Majesty's reign intituled "An Act to amend the law respecting the Office of County Coroner" it is (amongst other things) enacted that when and as often as it shall seem expedient to the Justices of-any-County-that-such-County should be divided into two or more districts for the purposes of that Act or that any alteration should be made of any division theretofore made under that Act, it shall be lawful for the said Justices in General or Quarter Sessions assembled to resolve that a petition shall be presented to Her Majesty praying that such division or alteration be made and thereupon to adjourn the further consideration of such petition until notice thereof shall be given to the Coroner or Coroners of such County as in that Act thereinafter provided; and that the Clerk of the Peace shall give notice of any such resolution to every Coroner for such county and of the time when the petition will be taken by the said Justices into consideration, and the Justices shall confer with every such Coroner who shall attend the meeting of the Justices for that purpose touching such petition, having due regard to the size and nature of each proposed district, the number of inhabitants, the nature of their employment, and such other circumstances as shall appear to the Justices fit to be considered in carrying into execution the provisions of that Act; and that such petition with a description of the several proposed districts and of the boundaries thereof, with the reasons upon which the petition is founded, shall be certified to Her Majesty under the hands and seals of two or more of the Justices present when such petition shall be agreed to; and the Clerk of the Peace for such county shall forthwith give or send a proper copy of such petition certified under his hand to every Coroner for such county: and that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, if She shall think fit, with the advice of Her Privy Council after taking into consideration any such petition and also any petition which may be presented to Her by any Coroner of the same county concerning such proposed division or alteration, or whenever it shall seem fit to Her Majesty to direct the issue of a writ de coronatore eligendo for the purpose of authorizing the election of an additional Coroner above the number of those who have been theretofore customarily elected in such county, to order that such county shall be divided into such and so many districts for the purposes of that Act as to Her Majesty, with the advice aforesaid, shall seem expedient, and to give a name to each of such districts; and that every such Order shall be published in the London Gazette.

And whereas by an Order in Council dated the twenty-sixth day of October one thousand eight hundred and sixty made under the provisions of the said recited Act the county of Wilts was divided for Coroners' purposes into three districts namely the first, or North Wilts District, the second or Middle Wilts District, and the third or South Wilts

And whereas, under and by virtue of the Local Government Act 1888, the powers and business of the said Justices in relation to the matters aforesaid have been transferred to the County Council for the county of Wilts

And whereas by an Order in Council, dated the eighth day of February one thousand eight hun- I one thousand eight hundred and sixty.

T the Court at Windsor, the 29th day of I dred and ninety, made under the provisions of the said recited Act such part of the county of Wilts as comprised the area and district of theborough of Devizes was for Coroners' purposesconstituted a separate district and named the "Devizes District."

And whereas by a Provisional Order, dated the fourth day of May one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five and made by the Local Government Board in pursuance of section fifty-four of "The Local Government Act 1888" for altering the boundaries between counties, part of the parish of Shalbourn which had theretofore formed part of the administrative county of Berks, and is referred: to in the said Provisional Order as "the Shalbourn Area," was separated from the said county of Berks and became part of the administrative county of Wilts; and it was further provided that the said "Shalbourn Area" should be included in the Middle Coroner's District of that county subject to any alteration which might be made in that district;

And whereas the said Provisional Order was in year one thousand eight hundred and ninetyfive duly confirmed by Act of Parliament;

And whereas a petition dated the eighteenth February one thousand eight hundred and ninetysix has been presented to Her Majesty by the Wilts County Council stating that inconvenience and expense is caused by the fact that the said Shalbourn area forms part of the Middle Coroner's District and praying that the Middle Coroner's District, and the Northern Coroner's District may be altered by the transfer to the Northern Coroner's District of so much of the parish of Shalbourn as forms part of the Middle Coroner's District, which petition with a description of the several proposed districts and of the boundaries thereof, with the reasons upon which the petition is founded was duly certified to Her Majesty:

And whereas all the provisions of the said recited Act have been duly complied with:

And whereas no petition has been presented to Her Majesty by any Coroner of the said county concerning such proposed alteration:

And whereas Her Majesty has, with the advice of Her Privy Council, taken into consideration the said petition and is minded to make such alteration as aforesaid, and to order that the said administrative county of Wilts shall be divided into such and so many districts for Coroners' purposes as are hereinafter set forth:

Now therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, direct, and declare, as it is hereby ordered, directed, and declared as follows, namely :-

(1.) From and after the date hereof so much of the parish of Shalbourn as was by the Provisional Order of the fourth May one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five included in the Middle Coroner's District of the county of Wilts shall cease to be included in the said district, and shall be included in and form part of the North Wilts Coroner's District.

(2.) The Devizes Coroner's District shall, as heretofore, comprise the several parishes and places and have the boundaries prescribed and ordered in that behalf by the Order in Council of the eighth February one thousand eight hundred and ninety.

(3.) The North Wilts Coroner's District shall, in addition to the aforesaid portion of the parish of Shalbourn, comprise as heretofore the several parishes and places and have the boundaries prescribed and ordered in that behalf in and by the Order in Council of the twenty-sixth October

(4.) The Middle Wilts Coroner's District shall continue to comprise the several parishes and places and have the boundaries respectively prescribed and ordered in that behalf in and by the Orders in Council of the twenty-sixth October one thousand eight hundred and sixty and the eighth February one thousand eight hundred and ninety, save and except the aforesaid portion of the parish of Shalbourn.

(5.) The South Wilts Coroner's District shall continue to comprise the several parishes and places and have the boundaries prescribed and ordered in that behalf in and by the Order in Council of the twenty-sixth October one thousand

eight hundred and sixty.

(6.) This Order shall be published in the London Gazette. C. L. Peel.

And whereas it has seemed fit to Her Majesty. by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to dispense with the calling out of the undermen-

tioned units of Militia :-

The Glamorgan Artillery, Western Division,

Royal Artillery,

The Royal Monmouthshire Militia Engineers, Fortress Forces, Royal Engineers,

The Fourth Battalion Devonshire Regiment,

The Third Battalion Welsh Regiment,

and to direct that there shall be no training and exercise thereof in the year one thousand eight-

hundred and ninety-six.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth hereby dispense with the calling out of the four Militia units referred to, and doth order and direct that there shall be no training and exercise thereof in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six, and that this Order be published in the London C. L. Pécl. Gazette.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the forty-fifth and forty-sixth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "The Militia Act, 1882" it is, amongst other things, enacted that Her Majesty may, with the advice of Her Privy Council, order the calling out of all or any part of the Militia to be dispensed with.

And whereas it has seemed fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to dispense with the calling out of the Fourth Battalion Shropshire Light Infantry, and to direct that there shall be no training and exercise thereof in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-

six.

Now therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth hereby dispense with the calling out of the Militia unit referred to and doth order and direct that there shall be no marked A, thereunto annexed, should be levied

training and exercise thereof in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six, and that this Order be published in the London Gazette.

W HEREAS by an Order in Council, dated the twenty-second day of May one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three: After reciting (amongst other things) that by "The Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act 1855," it was enacted that in any case in which any Lighthouse, buoy, or beacon, had been or should be thereafter erected or placed on or near the coasts of any British Possession by or with the consent of the Legislative Authority of such Possession, Her Majesty might by Order in Council fix such dues in respect thereof to be paid by the owner or master of every ship which passes the same or derives benefit therefrom as Her Majesty might deem reasonable, and might in like manner from time to time increase, diminish, or repeal such dues, and that from the time specified in such Order for the commencement of the dues thereby fixed, increased, or diminished, the same should be leviable throughout Her Majesty's dominions in manner thereinafter mentioned:

And reciting that Lighthouses had, by and with the consent of the Legislative Authority of the Colony of Ceylon, been constructed and placed on the Great Basses. Rock and on the Little Basses Rock in the said Colony, and a light had been exhibited from each of such Lighthouses:

And reciting that it was proposed to construct a Lighthouse on the Island of Minicoy between the Maldive and the Laccadive Islands, and to

exhibit a light therefrom:

And reciting that the Legislative Authorities of India, Ceylon, the Straits Settlements, and Mauritius had given such consents as were necessary either to the erection of the Lighthouses or to the collection of dues in respect thereof:

And reciting section 10 of "The Public Works Loans Act, 1881," which provided (amongst other things) that so long as any money was due to the Public Works Loan Commissioners on account of any loan under that section, the dues payable in respect of the Great Basses Lighthouse and the Little Basses Lighthouse, or the Minicoy Lighthouse should be altered only with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury:

And reciting that it was expedient that provision should be made for the payment of such of the said dues as might be payable in India, Ceylon, the Straits Settlements, and Mauritius, including the Seychelles Islands, in the currency of the respective countries in which they are payable:

And reciting that the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury had signified their consent to the dues specified in the two Schedules annexed

to the Order now in recital:

And reciting that the several classes of ships therein particularly specified would pass the said Great Basses Lighthouse and the said Little Basses Lighthouse, and would derive benefit therefrom:

And reciting that the several classes of ships therein also particularly specified would pass the said Minicoy Lighthouse and would derive benefit therefrom

Her Majesty, by the said Order now in recital, was pleased to direct that from and after the date of such Order the dues specified in the Schedule in respect of the Great Basses Lighthouse and the Little Basses Lighthouse:

And that from and after the first exhibition of a light from the said Minicoy Lighthouse the dues specified in the Schedule marked B, thereunto annexed, should be levied in respect thereof:

And whereas all advances made by the Public Works Loan Commissioners in respect of the Great Basses Lighthouse, the Little Basses Lighthouse, and the Minicoy Lighthouse have been

repaid:

And whereas by an Order in Council, dated the ninth day of May one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, Her Majesty was pleased to direct that from the time therein mentioned the dues theretofore levied in respect of the said lighthouses under the hereinbefore recited Order of the twenty-second day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, should be subject to an abatement or discount of fifty per centum:

to an abatement or discount of fifty per centum:
And whereas by "The Merchant Shipping Act,
1894," "The Merchant Shipping Act Amendment
Act, 1855," has been repealed, but the hereinbefore recited provisions of such last-mentioned
Act are re-enacted and continued by the said

"Merchant Shipping Act, 1894":

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty to be expedient that the amount of the dues specified in the Schedules marked A and B, annexed to the said recited Order of the twenty-second day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, as altered by the said recited Order of the ninth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, should be varied by diminishing the same in manner hereinafter mentioned:

And whereas the provisions of section 1 of "The Rules Publication Act, 1893," have been complied with:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in exercise of the powers vested in Her by the said recited Acts, or either of them, doth by this Order in Council fix the dues to be paid in respect of the Great Basses Lighthouse and the Little Basses Lighthouse at three-eighths of one penny per ton of the burden of every ship on every voyage in which she passes or derives benefit from the said lights, that is to say:—

Every ship which, in the same voyage by the southward of Ceylon, shall cross a line drawn from the southernmost point of Ceylon to the north-westernmost point of the Island of Sumatra, and also a line from the southernmost point of Ceylon to Cape Guardafui on the eastern coast of Africa, and vice versâ.

Every ship which, in any voyage to or from any place in the Maldive Islands shall cross a line drawn from the southernmost point of Ceylon to the north-westernmost point of Samatra.

Every ship which in any voyage from any port on the eastern coast of Africa, south of Cape Guardafui, or from any port in Madagascar, Bourbon, Mauritius, or any island adjacent to the same, including the Seychelles and the Chagos Islands, or in any voyage in which such ship shall have rounded the Cape of Good Hope eastward shall cross a line drawn from the southernmost point of Ceylon to the southernmost point of the coast of Tenasterim, and shall, between the first day of April and the thirtieth day of September, both included, arrive at any port situated north of such line.

Every ship which having departed between the first day of October and the thirty-first day of March, both included, from any port directed to be obeyed.

situated to the northward of such last-mentioned line, and also to the westward of the ninetieth meridian of longitude east from Greenwich, in any voyage to any port on the eastern coast of Africa south of Cape Guardafui, or to any port in Madagascar, Bourbon, Mauritius, or any island adjacent thereto, including the Seychelles and the Chagos Islands, or in any voyage in which such ship shall round the Cape of Good Hope westward, shall cross the latitude of the Great Basses Lighthouse, or the Little Basses Lighthouse, ou the eastward side of the said Lighthouse.

And further Her Majesty doth by this Order in Council fix the dues to be paid in respect of the Minicoy Lighthouse at one-eighth of one penny per ton of the burden of every ship on every voyage in which she passes or derives benefit from the said Light, that is to say:—

Every ship which in any voyage shall or may pass between the Laccadive Islands and the Maldive Islands through the channel known as the Nine Degree Channel, north of Minicoy Island, or through that known as the Eight Degree Channel south of Minicoy Island.

And further Her Majesty is pleased to direct that the dues hereby fixed shall be subject to an abatement or discount of twenty-five per centum.

And further that when the said dues are paid or collected in India, Ceylon, Mauritius, or the Seychelles Island, the same may be paid in the currency of those countries at the rate fixed for the time being by the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury for the adjustment of accounts between the Imperial and Indian Governments.

And further that when the said dues are paid or collected in the Straits Settlements, the same may be paid in the currency of that country according to the current rate or value of the dollar in English currency at the port where the

said dues are paid or collected.

And lastly Her Majesty is pleased to order and direct that this Order shall come into operation and take effect on and after the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six, or from the time of the receipt of the notice of this Order (if that be later) by the officers authorized to collect light dues, from which dates respectively the dues specified in the schedules annexed to the said Order of the twenty-second day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, and altered by the said Order of the ninth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, shall cease to be levied.

WHEREAS by "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1894," it is provided that where rules concerning lights and signals to be carried, or the steps for avoiding collision to be taken, by vessels navigating the waters of any harbour, river, or other inland navigation, are not and cannot be made, under the authority of any local Act, Her Majesty in Council on the application of any person having authority over such waters, or if there is no such person any person interested in the navigation thereof, may make such rules, and those rules shall, as regards vessels navigating the said waters, be of the same force as if they werepart of the collision regulations by the said Act directed to be obeyed.

And whereas the Corporation of the city of Bristol being the Body Corporate owning and exercising jurisdiction upon the waters of the Floating Harbour in the city of Bristol have applied to Her Majesty in Council, to make and have submitted for approval certain rules concerning the lights and signals to be carried in the said Floating Harbour by barges, trows, and other vessels to which the said collision regulations do not apply.

And whereas the rules so submitted as afore-

said appear to be reasonable and proper.

And whereas the provisions of section one of "The Rules Publication Act, 1893," have been

complied with.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in Her by the said recited Act and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council doth hereby make the said rules which are set forth in the schedule hereto and Her Majesty doth hereby direct that the same shall come into force on the first day of August one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six.

#### SCHEDULE.

Rules concerning the lights or signals to be carried on the Floating Harbour in the city of Bristol by barges, trows, and other vessels to which the collision regulations, by "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1894," directed to be obeyed,

do not apply.

- J. Every barge trow or other vessel shall while navigating the Floating Harbour in the city of Bristol between sunset and sunrise carry at the bow a bright white light so constructed as to show an uniform and unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of 20 points of the compass, and so fitted as to throw the light from right ahead to 2 points abaft the beam on either side of such barge, trow, or other vessel, and of such a character as to be visible on a dark night with a clear atmosphere, at a distance of at least one mile.
- 2. Every such barge trow or other vessel as aforesaid shall, when navigating the said Floating Harbour, have in addition to the before-mentioned light at the bow a bright white light of the like power ready in the stern, which shall be exhibited over the stern or quarter of such barge, trow, or vessel, on the approach of or to other vessels passing in either direction, in sufficient time to prevent collision.

HEREAS by "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1894," it is (among other things) enacted that Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, fix the establishments to be maintained by each of the General Lighthouse Authorities, on account of the services of lighthouses, buoys, and beacons, or the annual or other sums to be paid out of the Mercantile Marine Fund in respect of these establishments, and that no increase of any establishment or part of an establishment so fixed shall be made without the consent of the Board of Trade:

And whereas Her Majesty, by Order in Council, dated the twenty-eighth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, was pleased to fix the establishment which might be maintained by the Commissioners of Irish Lights, and to fix that,

in respect of the said establishment the aggregate amount of the salaries which, under the provisions of the said Order in Council, should, for the time being, be paid to the officers of the said establishment, should be paid out of the Mercantile Marine Fund:

And whereas it is expedient that the annual sum to be paid in respect of that establishment by the said recited Order fixed to be maintained as aforesaid by the Commissioners of Irish Lights on account of the services of lighthouses, buoys, and beacons, should be varied in manner hereinafter appearing:

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that such variation in the annual sum to be paid in respect of that establishment has, in pursuance of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1894," been made with the consent of the

Board of Trade:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in Her by "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1894," is pleased to vary, and doth hereby vary, the annual sum to be paid in respect of the establishment of the Commissioners of Irish Lights as follows, that is to say:—

The salary of Mr. Owen Armstrong, the present Secretary, shall as from the first day of April, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six, be seven hundred and fifty pounds per annum, rising by annual increments of twenty-five pounds to a maximum of eight hundred pounds per annum, but the said salary shall be personal to Mr. Armstrong and does not attach to the Office of Secretary:

And Her Majesty by virtue and in firther exercise of the power so vested in Her as aforesaid, is pleased to fix and doth hereby fix that the said annual sum as above varied shall be paid out of the Mercantile Marine Fund. C. L. Peel:

W HEREAS by section twenty-six of "The Pluralities Act, 1838," after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, "chapelries, and other places or districts may be " separated from the parishes or mother churches "to which they belong, with great advantage, and places altogether extra-parochial may "in some instances with advantage be annexed " to parishes or districts to which they "are contiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "That when with " respect to his own diocese it shall appear to the "Archbishop of the Province, or when the Bishop "of any diocese shall represent to the said Arch-" bishop that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, "place or district within the diocese of such "Archbishop, or the diocese of such Bishop, "as the case may be, may be advantageously "separated from any parish or mother church " and either be constituted a separate benefice by "itself or be united to any other parish to which "it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any " other adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, " or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to " form a separate parish or benefice, or that any "extra-parochial place may with advantage be "annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous, " or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesi-"astical purposes; and the said Archbishop or "Bishop shall draw up a scheme in writing (the

" scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the " said Archbishop for his consideration) de-"scribing the mode in which it appears to 46 him that the alteration may best be effected, "and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical juris-"diction, glebe lands, tithes, rent-charges, and " other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, " and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, 45 may be made with justice to all parties in-"terested; and if the patron or patrons of the " benefice or benefices to be affected by such " alteration shall consent in writing under his or 44 their hands to such scheme, or to such modifi-"cation thereof as the said Archbishop may ap-"prove, and the said Archbishop shall, on full "consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with "any such scheme, or modification thereof, " and shall certify the same and such consent as "aforesaid, by his report to Her Majesty in "Council, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in "Council to make an Order for carrying such " scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may " be, into effect."

And whereas by section eight of "The Church Building Act 1839" it is, amongst other things, further enacted, "That when by any Order " of Her Majesty in Council, as aforesaid, a " separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes is "constituted, the same shall, on registration "thereof, and with the consent in writing of "the incumbent or incumbents of the benefice " or benefices to be thereby affected, become a " perpetual curacy and benefice, and the minister "thereof, duly nominated and licensed thereto, " and his successors, shall be a body politic and " corporate, with perpetual succession, and may " receive and take to himself and his successors " all such lands, tenements, tithes, rent-charges, " and hereditaments as shall be granted unto him " or them, and such perpetual curate shall thence-"forth have, within the limits of the district " parish formed under the Church Building Acts, " for the church of such perpetual curacy, sole "and exclusive cure of souls, and shall not in " anywise be subject to the controll or interference " of the incumbent or incumbents of the benefice " or benefices to be affected by such Order, if he " or they shall have consented to such Order as 4 aforesaid; but if such Incumbent or Incumbents " shall not have so consented thereto, this last-"mentioned provision shall not come into opera-"tion until the next avoidance of the benefice by " the Incumbent objecting thereto, or by the sur-"viving Incumbent objecting, if more than one " shall object thereto, and in such case the last " mentioned provision shall forthwith after such "avoidance come into operation, and shall be " binding on all persons whatsoever."

Grace as follows :-

"I. There is in the borough of Nottingham within my diocese of Southwell the benefice (being a vicarage and parish church) of Saint Peter Radford the population of the parish being according to the last census twenty-one thousand. The net annual value of the said benefice arising !

from globe lands ground rents invested funds and surplice fees is one thousand four hundred and fifty-nine pounds ten shillings and ten pence.

"2. That there is within the limits of the said parish of Saint Peter Radford a consecrated church or chapel of ease known by the name of All Souls Radford with a densely populated district or place adjacent thereto known as. All Souls District the limits and boundaries whereof are well known and ascertained.

"3. That the said Church of All Souls Radford aforesaid affords accommodation for about six hundred and forty persons and the inhabitants of All Souls District numbering about eight thousand three hundred resort to the said church for the purpose of Divine service and for baptisms marriages and churchings.

"4. That the patronage of the said benefice of Saint Peter Radford belongs to me the said George Bishop of Southwell and the Reverend Charles Lea Wilson is the present Incumbent

thereof.

"5. That it appears to me that under the provisions of the Acts of Parliament passed in the sessions holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty chapter one hundred and six and in the second and third years of the same reign chapter forty-nine the said district of All Souls Radford may be advantageously separated from the said benefice and parish church of Saint Peter Radford and be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes and a perpetual curacy and benefice.

"6. That pursuant to the direction contained in the twenty-sixth section of the said first mentioned Act I have prepared the following scheme which together with the consent thereto of the Reverend Charles Lea Wilson the Incumbent of the said benefice I do submit to your Grace to the intent that your Grace may (if on full consideration and inquiry you shall be satisfied with such scheme) certify the same and such consent as aforesaid by your report to Her Majesty in Council."

And whereas the said scheme drawn up by the said Bishop, and the consents referred to in the said representation, are as follows :-

"The SCHEME above referred to.

"That the said district of All Souls Radford consisting of all that part of the parish of Saint Peter Radford in the borough of Nottingham and diocese of Southwell wherein the present Incumbent of such parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls which is situate on the south of an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary dividing such parish from the parish of Christ Church New Radford at a point where Denmanstreet and Garden-street meet and extending thence westward down the centre of Denmanstreet to the point where Denman-street meets Saint Peter's-street and thence south-westward down the centre of Saint Peter's-street to the point: where Saint Peter's - street meets the Wolleton-road and thence westward down the centre of the Wollaton-road to the boundary dividing such parish from the parish of Lenton and thence following the boundary dividing such parish from the aforesaid parish of Lenton southwards and eastwards and north-eastwards to the point opposite Garden-street where such parish and the aforesaid parishes of Lenton and Christ Church New Radford meet and then northward along Garden-street and the boundary dividing such parish from the aforesaid parish of Christ Church New Radford shall be separated from the said benefice and parish church of Saint Peter Radford aforesaid and be constituted a separate

parish and benefice for ecclesiastical purposes and a perpetual curacy and benefice by the name or style of the Perpetual Curacy of All Souls Radford of which the said church or chapel within the said chapelry shall be the parish church.

"That the proposed separate parish and benefice of All Souls Radford shall be subject to the same ecclesiastical jurisdiction as the said benefice of Saint Peter Radford and the Incumbent of such separate parish shall have exclusive cure of souls within the same. That all the glebe lands and freehold hereditaments and premises situate in or near the Alfreton-road in the said parish of Saint Peter Radford and delineated on the plan hereto annexed and thereon coloured pink subject to the ground leases affecting the same the particulars whereof are set forth in the first schedule hereto to which the said Charles Lea Wilson is now absolutely entitled as Incumbent of the benefice of Saint Peter Radford aforesaid shall henceforth belong and be attached to the said proposed separate parish and benefice of All Souls Radford for ever and be held received and enjoyed by the Incumbent thereof for the time being. That all the glebe lands and freehold hereditaments and premises situate in or near the Alfreton-road aforesaid and delineated on the said plan hereto annexed and thereon coloured blue subject to the ground leases affecting the same the particulars whereof are set forth in the second schedule hereto to which the said Charles Lea Wilson is now

absolutely entitled as Incumbent of the benefice of Saint Peter Radford aforesaid shall upon the said Charles Lea Wilson ceasing to be Incumbent of the said benefice of Saint Peter Radford belong and be attached to the said proposed separate parish and benefice of All Souls Radford for ever and be held received and enjoyed by the Incumbent thereof for the time being. That all fees and other ecclesiastical dues and payments for churchings marriages and burials and other ecclesiastical offices solemnized and performed within the proposed separate parish and benefice of All Souls Radford and all such other ecclesiastical dues offerings and emoluments usually payable to the Incumbent of a parish or benefice as shall arise within the said proposed separate parish or benefice shall belong to the Incumbent thereof. That the patronage or right of nomination of or to the said proposed separate parish and benefice of All Souls Radford shall during the incumbency of the said Charles Lea Wilson belong to and bevested in and exercised by the said Charles Lea Wilson and upon the said Charles Lea Wilson ceasing to be Incumbent of the said benefice of Saint Peter Radford the patronage or right of nomination to the said proposed separate parish of All Souls Radford shall belong to and be vested in and exercised by the Bishop of the diocesewithin which the said benefice of All Souls Radford is situate his successors and assigns for

pher, Ellistown, comprising:

"1. All that portion of the parish of Hugglescote-with-Donington in the county of Leicester and in the diocese of Peterborough which is bounded upon part of the west by the parish of Ibstock in the said county and diocese upon the south partly by the last-named parish and partly by the chapelry of Stanton-under-Bardon in the parish of Thornton in the county and diocese aforesaid and upon all other sides that is to say upon the east upon the north-east upon the north-west and upon the remaining part of the west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said chapelry of Stanton-under-Bardon from the parish of Hugglescote-with-Donington aforesaid at a point in the middle of the Leicester and Burton Branch Line of the Midland Railway where it is crossed by the footpath leading from Ellistown Farm towards Beveridge-lane extending thence northward along the middle of the said branch line of railway for a distance of eleven chains or thereabouts to a point to the east of the house called or known as Little Battleflat Farm in the middle of the footbridge which carries the footpath leading from Clotts Farm to Hugglescote over the same branch line of railway and extending thence first westward then generally north-westward along the middle of the lastdescribed footpath for a distance of one mile and ten chains or thereabouts to the point in the middle of the bridge which carries the line of the Ashby and Nuneaton Joint Railway over the same footpath and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last-named line of railway for a distance of thirty-four chains or thereabouts to a point in the middle of the footbridge which carries the footpath leading from Donington-le-Heath to Nailstone Wiggs Farm over the same line of railway and extending thence south-eastward along the last-mentioned

HE following Statute, made by the Governing Body of Oriel College, Oxford, on the twenty-eighth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six, and sealed on the sixth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six, has been submitted for the approval of Her Majesty in Council, and notice of its having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions contained in the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877:—

A STATUTE to amend a Statute made by the University of Oxford Commissioners under the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877 (40 and 41 Vict. c. 48), and approved by the Queen in Council on the third day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, in relation to Oriel College, in the University of Oxford, duly made at a General Meeting of the Provost and Fellows especially summoned for this purpose held on the twenty-eighth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six, and passed at such Meeting by the votes of two-thirds of the number of persons present and voting, and submitted to Her Majesty the Queen in Council.

WHEREAS the Provost and Fellows of Oriel College in the University of Oxford are of opinion that it is desirable to make such provision as hereinafter appears for regulating the tenure of Scholarships and Exhibitions in the said College.

We the said Provost and Fellows, being the Governing Body of the said College, do hereby, in exercise of the powers given to us by the fifty-fourth section of the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act 1877, alter Statute IV of the Statutes made by the University of Oxford Commissioners under the said Act, and approved by the Queen in Council on the third day of May one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two in relation to the said College, by inserting therein after the eighteenth clause thereof the following new clause:—

"18a. No selected Candidate for the Indian Civil Service shall be eligible to a Scholarship or Adam-de-Brome Exhibition, and any Scholar or Adam-de-Brome Exhibitioner, who shall become a selected Candidate, shall thereby vacate his Scholarship or Exhibition, unless the Provost and Fellows shall otherwise determine. But the Provost and Fellows may, if they think fit, and on such conditions as they may determine, award from time to time to any selected Candidate a Scholarship or Exhibition tenable during residence with emoluments not exceeding fifty pounds a year, the amount of such emoluments within that limit to be determined by the Provost and Fellows."

STATUTES to alter the Statutes made by the University of Oxford Commissioners on the sixteenth day of June one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one and approved by Her Majesty the Queen in Council on the third day of May one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two which amending Statutes were duly made at a General Meeting of the Governing Body of Corpus Christi College Oxford specially summoned for the purpose and held on the sixteenth day of May one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six and having been passed at such General Meeting by the unanimous vote of all persons present and voting are now submitted for the approval of Her Majesty the Queen in Council. We the President and Fellows of Corpus Christi College in the University of Oxford in exercise of the powers given to us by the fifty-fourth Section of the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act 1877 do hereby alter the Statutes so made by the University of Oxford Commissioners as aforesaid in manner following that is to say:-

By substituting in the Statute concerning the Administration of the College for Section forty-eight the following Section to form an amended Section of such Statute.

48. The Library shall be under the superintendence of a Librarian to be appointed annually by the College with a salary of twenty pounds per annum assisted by a Committee consisting of the President the Professor of Latin and three of the Fellows to be appointed annually who shall have the power to make Bye-laws for the regula-tion of the Library. There shall be an annual visitation of the Library by the President and Fellows or such persons as they depute to enquire into the condition of the Library. The sum of fifty pounds in addition to the salary of the Librarian shall every year be placed to the credit of the Library but if the accumulations of the Library Fund amount at the beginning of any financial year to less than two hundred pounds the sum placed to the credit of the Library for that year shall be seventy-five pounds and if they amount to less than one hundred and fifty pounds the sum placed to the credit of the Library for that year shall be one hundred pounds. The accounts of the Librarian shall be submitted to the Auditor at the annual audit.
