THE following Despatches, with their enclosures, have been received from General, the Right Honourable Sir Redvers Buller, G.C.B., South Africa :-

From the General Commanding-in-Chief the Forces in South Africa to the Secretary of State for War, War Office, London, S.W. Cape Town,

November 9, 1899.

I HAVE the honour to forward herewith a report from Lieutenant-General Sir George White, V.C., &c., dated 2nd November, on his operations in Natal, which was handed to me yesterday by Lieutenant-General French on his arrival from Durban. It does not seem to call for any remarks from me.

From Lieutenant-General Sir George S. White, V.C., G.C.B., G.C.S.I., G.C.I.E., to the Secretary of State, War Office, London, S.W. Ladysmith, Natal,

November 2, 1899.

I HAVE the honour to forward the following report on the military operations in Natal since the date of my arrival in that colony :-

2. I reached Durban and assumed command of the forces in that colony on 7th October, 1899, proceeding direct to Maritzburg. I found the troops, Imperial and Colonial, then in the colony, distributed as under :-

At Pietermaritzburg—1st Battalion Manchester Regiment, and Mounted Infantry Company, 2nd Battalion King's Royal Rifle Corps.

At Estcourt—Detachment Natal Naval Volun-

teers, Natal Royal Rifles.
At Colenso—Durban Light Infantry.

At Ladysmith-5th Lancers, Detachment 19th Hussars, Brigade Division, Royal Artillery; 10th Mountain Battery, Royal Garrison Artillery; 23rd Company, Royal Engineers; 1st Battalion Devonshire Regiment; 1st Battalion Liverpool Regiment, and Mounted Infantry Company; 26th (two sections) British Field Hospital, and Colonial troops.

At Glencoe—18th Hussars; Brigade Division, Royal Artillery; 1st Battalion Leicestershire Regiment, and Mounted Infantry Company; 1st Battalion King's Royal Rifle Corps, and Mounted

Fusiliers, and Mounted Infautry Company; 6th Veterinary Field Hospital.

With I Company, 1st Battalion King's Royal Rifle Corps at Eshowe, and a detachment of the Umvoti Mounted Rifles at Helpmakaar.

3. The information available regarding the positions occupied by the armies of the two Dutch Republics showed the great bulk of the forces of the Orange Free State were massed near the passes of the Drakensberg mountains, west of Ladysmith. The troops of the South African Republic were concentrated at various points west, north, and east of the northern angle of Natal. On 10th October His Excellency the Governor informed me that Her Majesty's Government had received an ultimatum from that of the South African Republic, and that the outbreak of war on the evening of 11th October might be regarded as certain.

4. Since my arrival in the colony I had been much impressed by the exposed situation of the garrison of Glencoe, and on the evening of 10th October I had an interview on the subject with his Excellency the Governor, at which I laid before him my reasons for considering it expedient, from a military point of view, to withdraw that garrison, and to concentrate all my available troops at Ladysmith. After full discussion his Excellency recorded his opinion that such a step would involve grave political results and possibilities of so serious a nature that I determined to accept the military risk of holding Dundee as the lesser of two evils. I proceeded in person to Ladysmith on 11th October, sending on Lieutenant-General S'r William Penn Symons to take command at Glencoe.

5. The Boers crossed the frontier both on the north and west on 12th October, and next day the Transvaal flag was hoisted at Charlestown. My great inferiority in numbers necessarily confined me strategically to the defensive, but tactically my intention was and is to strike vigorously whenever opportunity offers. Up to 19th October the enemy from the north were engaged in moving down on the Biggarsberg—Dundee line in three columns. The main column, under General Joubert, occupied Newcastle, and marched south by the road leading thence on Glencoe Junction. A second column, under Viljoen, crossed Botha's Pass, and moved south over the Biggarsberg, cutting the railway from Glencoe Junction to Ladysmith on 19th October at Elands Laagte, where they took up a position. A third Infantry Company; 2nd Battalion Royal Dublin | column, under Lucas Meyer, crossed the Buffalo River, marching west on Dundee, and arrived within striking distance of that place on the night of 19th October. Meanwhile the Free State forces west of Ladysmith contented themselves with occupying the country at the foot of the Drakensberg Range, without approaching within striking distance of Ladysmith, and, though the mounted patrols of both sides were constantly in touch, up to the evening of 19th October, nothing of importance took place in this direction.

6. On the morning of 20th October, at 3.20 A.M., the Mounted Infantry picquet, east of Dundee at the junction of the roads from Landmann's and Vants Drifts, was fired on and compelled to retire. Two companies, 2nd Battalion Royal Dublin Fusiliers, were sent out in support of it by Lieutenant-General Sir W. P. Symons, and at 4.30 A.M. a report was received that the enemy had halted and established themselves at Fort Jones. By 5 A.M. all Sir W. Symons' troops were under arms.

7. At 5.50 a.m. the enemy's guns opened fire from Talana Hill on our camp, at a range of 5,000 yards. Though well directed this fire had but little effect, as the shells, fired with percussion fuzes, buried themselves in the soft earth. Our guns at once returned the fire, but, finding the range too great, the 13th and 69th Field Batteries were moved, at 6 A.M., to a fresh position south of the town of Dundee, with the Mounted Infantry Company of the 1st Battalion King's Royal Rifles as escort. The 67th Field Battery and the 1st Battalion Leicestershire Regiment were detailed to remain in and protect the camp. The 2nd Battalion Royal Dublin Fusiliers and the 1st Battalion Royal Irish Fusiliers were sent through the town to Sand Spruit, the 1st Battalion King's Royal Rifles taking up a position under cover to the east of the town. These preliminary movements were completed by 6.30 A.M.

8. At 7.30 a.m. the Infantry advanced to a small patch of wood, about 1,000 yards beyond Sand Spruit. They moved, in extended order, over open level grass land, the 2nd Battalion Royal Dublin Fusiliers leading, followed in succession by the 1st Battalion King's Royal Rifles and the 1st Battalion Royal Irish Fusiliers. Notwithstanding the open nature of the ground this movement was, owing to the accurate fire of our artillery, completed with but slight loss. Sir W. P. Symons' intention was to make a direct attack on the enemy's position under cover of the wood above mentioned, and of some buildings known as Smith's Farm.

9. At 8 A.M. the batteries were brought forward to a range of 2,800 yards, whence the 69th Battery opened fire on Talana Hill, and the 13th Battery on the hill (marked 4,700) south of the road which was also held by the enemy, the guns and escort being under fire from both hills. At the same time Sir W. P. Symons moved the Infantry through the wood to its front edge, on which a very accurate direct fire was opened from the top of Talana Hill, and also from a stone wall which extended half way up and along the side of that hill. The Infantry here were also exposed to an enfilading fire from the hill marked 4,700.

10. At 8.50 a.m. the Infautry Brigade were ordered to advance. The ground was open and intersected by nullahs, which running generally perpendicular to the enemy's position gave very little cover. At 9 a.m. Sir W. P. Symons ordered up his reserves, and advanced with them through the wood at 9.15 a.m. At 9.30 a.m. the Lieutenant-General was, I regret to report, mortally wounded in the stomach, and the

command devolved upon Brigadier - General Yule, who directed the 2nd Battalion Royal Dublin Fusiliers on the left, and the 1st Battalion King's Royal Rifle Corps on the right. The latter battalion reached the wall, to which two companies of the 1st Battalion Royal Irish Fusiliers were also brought up, the other six companies being held in reserve. The 2nd Battalion Royal Dublin Fusiliers, however, less favoured by the ground were unable, for some time, to make any progress.

11. About 11.30 A.M., the enemy's guns were silenced, and the Artillery moved into a range of 1,400 yards and opened a very rapid fire on the ridge over the heads of our Infantry. This temporarily brought under the enemy's rifle fire, and enabled our infantry to push on. The ground in places was so steep and difficult that the men had to climb it on hands and knees, but by 1 A.M., the crest was reached, and the enemy, not waiting to come to close quarters, retired in the directions of Landmann's and Vants' drifts. Brigadier-General Yule then ordered the Artillery to the nek on the Dundee-Vants' drift road, on arrival at which point the retreating enemy was seen streaming away in clumps of 50 and 100 men, on which guns could have inflicted great loss. The enemy, however, displayed a white flag, although they do not appear to have had any intention of surrendering, and in consequence the Officer Commanding Royal Artillery refrained

12. Turning now to our Cavalry, the 18th Hussars received orders at 5.40 a.m. to get round the enemy's right flank and be ready to cut off his retreat. They were accompanied by a portion of the Mounted Infantry and a machine gun. Making a wide turning movement they gained the eastern side of Talana Hill. Here Lieutenant-Colonel Möller halted with one squadron, 18th Hussars, the machine gun and the Mounted Infantry, sending his other two squadrons further to the east. These two latter squadrons took part in the pursuit of the enemy, who retreated eastward, but Lieutenant-Colonel Möller and the troops with him appear, so far as can be ascertained, to have pursued in a northerly direction, to have come in contact with superior forces not previously engaged, and to have been surrounded and forced to surrender, while endeavouring to return to camp, round the north of the Impati Mountain.

13. The Boer force engaged in this action is computed at 4,000 men, of whom about 500 were killed or wounded. Three of their guns were left dismounted on Talana Hill, but there was no opportunity of bringing them away.

14. Our own losses were severe, amounting to 10 Officers and 31 Non-commissioned officers and men killed, 20 Officers and 165 Non-commissioned officers and men wounded, and 9 Officers and 211 Non-commissioned officers and men missing. The Divisional Staff suffered severely, Lieutenant-General Sir W. P. Symons, K.C.B., being mortally wounded, and both Colonel C. E. Beckett, C.B., A.A.G., and Major Hammersley, D.A.A.G., being severely wounded. Of the Brigade Staff, Lieutenant-Colonel John Sherston, D.S.O., Brigade Major, was killed, and Captain F. L. Adam, Scots Guards, Aide-de-Camp to Brigadier-General Yule, was severely wounded. Lieutenant-Colonel R. Gunning, commanding 1st Battalion King's Royal Rifle Corps, was killed within a few yards of the crest of the position.

through the wood at 9.15 a.m. At 9.30 a.m. the Lieutenant-General was, I regret to report, a Cavalry reconnaissance to Elands Laagte, and mortally wounded in the stomach, and the had obtained definite information that a Boer

force was in position there, but apparently in no considerable strength. I therefore ordered Major-General French, commanding the Cavalry of the Natal Force, to move out by road at 4 A.M. with five squadrons of Imperial Light Horse and the Natal Field Battery, followed at 6 A.M. by half battalion 1st Battalion Manchester Regiment, with railway and telegraph construction companies by rail. Major-General French's orders were to clear the neighbourhood of Elands Laagte of the enemy, and to cover the construction of the

railway and telegraph lines. 16. On arrival near Elands Laagte, the station buildings were found to be in possession of the enemy. Our Artillery opened fire on them, while a squadron of the Imperial Light Horse, under Major Sampson, moved round to the north of them. The enemy at once replied with artillery, and thus disclosed his main position on a commanding group of hills, about one mile south-east of the railway station. This position proving too strong and too strongly held to be dealt with by the force then at Major-General French's disposal, he retired his troops out of fire, and reported to me by telephone. I sent out to him reinforcements, consisting of one squadron 5th Dragoon Guards, one squadron 5th Lancers, and the 21st and 42nd Batteries Royal Field Artillery, all of which moved by road, and of the 1st Battalion Devonshire Regiment, and five companies Gordon Highlanders, which moved by rail. I also sent out Colonel Ian Hamilton, C.B., D.S.O., to take command of the Infantry portion of the force.

17. As the reinforcements gradually reached him, Major-General French pushed forward again, throwing out one squadron 5th Lancers and four squadrons Imperial Light Horse, under Colonel Chisholme, to the right to clear a ridge of high ground parallel to the enemy's position, from which he considered that an attack could best be developed. This movement was well carried out, the enemy's advanced troops being driven back, and the ridge gained.

18. One squadron 5th Dragoon Guards, one squadron 5th Lancers, and one squadron Natal Mounted Rifles, under Major Gore, 5th Dragoon Guards, were sent forward from our left with orders to turn the enemy's right flank, harass his rear, and be ready to take up the pursuit. 3.30 P.M. I arrived on the ground in person, but left the executive command of the troops engaged still in the hands of Major-General French.

- 19. At this hour the ground selected as the first Artillery position having been cleared of the enemy, the Field batteries advanced and opened fire at 4 P.M., at a range of 4,400 yards. After a few minutes the enemy's guns ceased to reply, and our guns were turned on a party of the enemy who were annoying our artillerymen with rifle fire from our right flank at a range of 2,000 yards. This fire quickly drove back the Boers, and the infantry advance commenced.
- 20. The Infantry had been brought up in preparatory battle formation of small columns covered by scouts. The 1st Battalion Manchester Regiment led with a frontage of 500 yards; the 1st Battalion Devonshire Regiment and the 2nd Battalion Gordon Highlanders followed in succession. Finding the line of advance was leading too much to the south, Colonel Hamilton, C.B., D.S.O., commanding the Infantry Brigade, diverted the Devons more towards the north, while the Gordons remained in reserve between the other two batshire Regiment crested a ridge from which the shire Regiment crested a ridge from which the ordered the "cease fire" to be sounded. general position of our infantry was then as follows :-

The 1st Battalion Devonshire Regiment, with a frontage of 500 yards, and a depth of 1,300 yards, were halted on the western extremity of a horseshoe shaped ridge, the opposite end of this horse shoe being very rough and broken, and held by the enemy in force. The 1st Battalion Manchester Regiment had struck the ridge fully 1,000 yards to the south-east, just at the point where it begins to bend round northwards. The 2nd Battalion Gordon Highlanders were one mile in

21. The 1st Battalion Manchester Regiment received orders that as soon as the enemy's guns were silenced, they were to work along the crest of the horse shoe and turn the left flank of the enemy. The 2nd Battalion Gordon Highlanders were to support them, and the 1st Battalion Devonshire Regiment were directed to move right across the open grass plain separating them from the enemy, and to hold him in his position as much as possible by their fire. As soon as the 1st Battalion Devonshire Regiment began to move forward, the enemy reopened their artillery fire on them, but owing to the very open formation adopted, the loss at this period was slight. The 1st Battalion Devonshire Regiment pressed on to about 900 yards from the position, opened fire and maintained themselves there, holding the enemy in front of them till 6 P.M.

22. Meanwhile the batteries advanced to a range of 3,200 yards, and again silenced temporarily the Boer guns, while the 1st Battalion Manchester Regiment and the 2nd Battalion Gordon Highlanders, working along the ridge, had a sharp encounter at the point where the horse shoe bends round to the Boer position. The enemy were forced slowly back along the ridge, fighting

as they retired.

23. The Manchesters and Gordons, with the Imperial Light Horse on their right, continued to press forward, losing but few men until a point was reached about 1,200 yards from the enemy's camp. Here the ridge became, for 200 yards, flat and bare of stones, while to the north; where the Boers were posted, it was very rocky and afforded excellent cover. Our men, well led by their Officers, and strengthened by their reserves, crossed this open neck of land in brilliant style, but the losses here were heavy, the reserves were all used up and the units were completely mixed. Moreover, the enemy's camp, which was evidently his final position, was still 1,000 yards distant. At this moment the enemy's German contingent, who had been out on the west of the railway trying to capture our trains, reinforced the Boers and Hollanders along the ridge. The enemy became much encouraged, and from this point up to the extreme end of the horse-shoe ridge, where it overlooks the enemy's camp, the struggle was bitter and protracted. Our men worked forward in short rushes of about 50 yards. Many of the Boers remained lying down, shooting from behind stones until our men were within 20 or 30 yards of them, and then sometimes ran for it and sometimes stood up and surrendered. latter individuals were never harmed, although just previous to surrendering they had probably shot down several of our Officers and men.

24. At length the guns were reached and captured, and the end of the ridge was gained, from which the whole of the enemy's camp, full of tents, horses, and men, was fully exposed to view at fixed sight range. A white flag was shown

obeyed, and some of them moved a short distance down the hill towards the camp. For a few moments there was a complete lull in the action, and then a shot was heard, which was followed by a deadly fire from the small conical kopje to the east of the camp, and by a determined charge up hill by some 30 or 40 Boers, who effected a lodgment near the crest line within 15 or 20 paces of our men, who fell back for a moment before the fierce suddenness of this attack. Only for a moment, however, for our fire was at once reopened, and, reinforced by a timely detachment of the 1st Battalion Devonshire Regiment, they charged back, cheering, to the crest line, when the remnant of the Boer force fled in confusion towards the north.

25. Meanwhile, the 1st Battalion Devonshire Regiment, who, as already mentioned, had been holding the enemy in front during the first part of the Infantry action, had pushed steadily in as the flank attack began to press on. Our Artillery also had moved in to about 2,200 yards range, whence they kept under the enemy's guns and fired on his infantry position. The 1st Battalion Devonshire Regiment pushed on to 350 yards from the enemy, lay down to recover breath, and then charged with fixed bayonets. Five companies assaulted the detached hill on our left, and three companies the hill on the right, and it was from these latter companies that the detachment referred to in the preceding paragraph joined and assisted the flank attack in the final struggle.

26. The cavalry squadrons on our left, who had been closely watching the progress of events, now charged through and through the retreating enemy, inflicting much loss and capturing many prisoners. The troops bivoucked on the ground, and next morning returned to Ladysmith.

27. The Boer losses were heavy, being estimated at over 100 killed, 108 wounded, and 188 prisoners. Two of their guns were captured, and brought into Ladysmith. Our own losses were also considerable, consisting of 4 Officers and 37 men killed, 31 Officers and 175 men wounded, and 10 men missing. The Imperial Light Horse, and the 2nd Battalion Gordon Highlanders, who encountered the severest resistance during the progress of the attack, suffered the most severely.

28. Turning now to affairs at Dundee, which I have already described up to the evening of 20th October. On the morning of 21st October, it was ascertained that the enemy had cleared off from the east of that place, but very large bodies were reported to be advancing from the north and north-west. General Yule moved his camp on this day to a more defensible position to the south of the previous camp, but the enemy, bringing up heavy Artillery to the shoulder of the Impati mountain, rendered the site untenable, and another move was made to a site still further south. On 22nd October General Yule decided to effect a junction with the troops at Ladysmith. A reconnaissance in force showed that the Glencoe pass was very strongly held, and that to force it would entail heavy loss. The troops therefore moved off at 9 P.M. by the Helpmakaarroad, reaching Beith on 23rd, and Waschbank Spruit on 24th October, at 9.30 A.M. Knowing of General Yule's approach, I moved out this day to Rietfontein, to cover his flank from attack, and there fought an action, which will be described Meanwhile, General Yule, hearing my guns in action, halted his Infantry at Waschbank Spruit, and moved west with his Artillery and mounted troops, in hope of being able to participate in the action. The distance, however, was

at Waschbank Spruit, halting there for the night. On the morning of 25th October, General Yule's force marched to Sunday's River, whence it reached Ladysmith on 25th October, being joined en route by a force detached by me to meet it. The casualties at Dundee, after 20th October, were very slight, and none whatever were incurred on the march to Ladysmith, where the troops arrived fit and well.

29. Reverting to my action at Rietfontein on 24th October, I may mention in general terms that my object was not to drive the enemy out of any positions, but simply to prevent him crossing the Newcastle road from west to east, and so falling on General Yule's flank. This object was attained with entire success, the enemy suffering severely from our shrapnel fire, which was very successful in searching the reverse slopes of the hills on which he was posted. Our own loss amounted to 1 Officer and 11 men killed; 6 Officers and 97 men wounded, and 2 missing. The details of this action, as well as the various plans and returns, which should accompany a despatch, will be forwarded later; but I am anxious that this report should be sent off at once, as it is very doubtful whether any communications by rail with Pietermaritzburg will remain open after to-day.

30. For the same reason, I have omitted all personal mention of the very many Officers and men who have performed services of the utmost gallantry and distinction. In a further despatch, I hope to bring those services prominently to your notice.

General Sir Redvers Buller to Secretary of State for War.

Pietermaritzburg, Natal, December 2, 1899.

IN forwarding the enclosed copy of a report from Major-General Hildyard of a night operation on the 23rd ultimo, I have the honour to remark that though, owing to the dreadful weather that night, a complete tactical success was not secured, yet the operation resulted in a strategical success of the greatest value.

A force of the enemy exceeding 7,000 men, fully equipped, and led by the Commandant-General in person, which was intended to overrun the Colony of Natal, was so severely handled by Colonel Kitchener's small force, that they returned at once to Colenso in a manner that was more of a rout than a retreat.

General Hildyard, Colonel Kitchener, and all concerned deserve the greatest credit for the manner in which this operation was planned and executed.

To General Officer Commanding 2nd Division. Sir., Estcourt, November 24, 1899.

Spruit on 24th October, at 9.30 A.M. Knowing of General Yule's approach, I moved out this day to Rietfontein, to cover his flank from attack, and there fought an action, which will be described later. Meanwhile, General Yule, hearing my guns in action, halted his Infantry at Waschbank Spruit, and moved west with his Artillery and mounted troops, in hope of being able to participate in the action. The distance, however, was found to be too great, and he rejoined his Infantry

hill with half 2nd Battalion Queen's, the 2nd Battalion West Yorkshire Regiment, and seven companies 2nd Battalion East Surrey Regiment, and the Durham Light Infantry. A naval 12pounder gun was placed on the summit of the hill. The 7th Battery Royal Field Artillery was also in position. This force I placed under orders of Colonel Kitchener, whom I directed to attack the hill during the night of the 22nd-23rd November and seize the enemy's guns and laager. Five companies of the Border Regiment were ordered to march from Estcourt camp in the morning of the 23rd November to assist in the operation. Colonel Kitchener's arrangements for carrying this out were that the 2nd Battalion West Yorkshire Regiment and the seven companies East Surrey Regiment, under his immediate command, should seize the position, and that the rest of the force at his disposal, under Lieutenant Colonel Hinde, 1st Battalion Border Regiment, should support him as soon as it was

In taking up the preparatory position on the afternoon of the 22nd November, the exposure of some of the Infantry drew the enemy's artillery fire, which was answered by the Naval gun on Beacon Hill. This led to the enemy being more alert than usual. Early in the night there was a storm of extreme severity, and the men lying out in it amongst the rocks were exposed to its full

From the base of the left flank of the enemy's position a wall led right up to the summit, passing over very steep and precipitous ground. On account of the rocky nature of the ground and the absence of beaten tracks the difficulty of assembling the assaulting troops was also very great. These difficulties were eventually surmounted, thanks to the personal energy of Colonel Kitchener, and to the accurate manner in which the column was led by Mr. Chapman, a guide attached to the Staff, who was unfortunately killed.

The position was successfully reached and seized, but some firing occurred on the way up, and when picquets were encountered the enemy's guns (a 12-pounder Creusot and some Hotchkiss quick-firing guns) were not found in position, and it subsequently transpired that they had been withdrawn about 2.30 A.M., the artillery officer in charge of them being uneasy as to their safety.

About 150 Boers were on the hill when it was seized, and these retired precipitately to a second position, on which the bulk of their force was situated, suffering some loss. About 30 horses were captured and the remains of the laager from which the wagons managed to trek. It was not my intention to remain in the position, a course which would have entailed a division of the forces at Estcourt. The rôle of the supporting troops, was, therefore, restricted to covering the withdrawal of the assaulting battalions. Most of the losses occurred during the retirement; they were chiefly in the 2nd Battalion West Yorkshire Regiment, which was the last regiment to retire.

The mounted troops as per margin,* under Lieutenant-Colonel Martyr, were directed to cooperate at daylight by a movement towards Willow Grange Station, and subsequently to patrol towards Highlands. Bethune's Mounted Infantry Regiment was directed to operate on Colonel Kitchener's right flank. The troops under Lieutenant-Colonel Martyr, after holding a party of some 300 Boers south of Willow Grange, moved to the support of Colonel Kitchener's left flank, where they did valuable service in helping him back and assisting to get the wounded of the 2nd Battalion West Yorkshire Regiment down Mounted Infantry, Detachment Natal Mounted Police.

the hill. It was in doing this that Trooper Fitzpatrick, Imperial Light Horse, was killed. behaviour of Lieutenant Davies, Mounted Infantry Company, King's Royal Rifles, has been specially brought to notice. When under a heavy fire he dismounted, disentangled the reins of a horse he was driving in front of him, and assisted one of his men who had lost his horse to mount and so get away. His conduct on this occasion was very cool, and I consider his services deserve recogni-

Bethune's Mounted Infantry co-operated to the best of their ability on Colonel Kitchener's right flank.

The conduct of all ranks throughout the force engaged was exemplary. Colonel Kitchener led the assaulting force with energy and judgment, and all ranks of the 2nd Battalion West Yorkshire Regiment behaved admirably. Major Hobbs of that battalion was taken prisoner owing to his remaining too long attending to the wounded. He led the first line of the assault with judgment and good sense. The services of Lieutenant Nicholson, 2nd Battalion West Yorkshire Regiment, have been specially brought to my notice for attention to duty and the situation when others were inclined to deal with matters of less importance. I recommend him for special reward. I also recommend Private Montgomery, 2nd Battalion West Yorkshire Regiment, for a distinguished conduct After being wounded in one leg he continued fighting in the firing line until again wounded. Lieutenant-Colonel Harris, 2nd Battalion East Surrey Regiment, commanded the second line, and Major Pearse, 2nd Battalion East Surrey Regiment, the third line of the assaulting force. The behaviour of all ranks of the 2nd Battalion East Surrey Regiment when engaged was satisfactory under great difficulties. Colonel Hinde, 1st Battalion Border Regiment,

commanded the supporting force, which he moved forward by my orders to a supporting position

shortly after daylight.

Five companies of the Border Regiment, commanded by Major Pelly, were on the right, and those of the 2nd Battalion Queen's, under Lieutenant-Colonel Hamilton, on the left. Durban Light Infantry, under Lieutenant-Colonel Meeubin, took up a position in reserve further back. Lieutenant James, Royal Navy, of Her Majesty's ship "Tartar," commanded the Naval 12-pr. gun and did good service, though a Creusot gun, which the enemy brought into action, had the range of him.

Major Ricketts commanded the Bearer Company and did good service both at the time and in connection with the removal of the wounded. Staff Officers, Major Munro, Brigade Major, and Lieutenant Blair, Aide-de-Camp, were of good

value to me.

The services of the guide, Mr. Chapman, who was so unfortunately killed, were of the greatest value. His intimate knowledge of the ground alone made it possible to carry out the operation. I sincerely trust it may be found possible to bestow on his widow, Mrs. Chapman, of Nottingham Road, some mark of recognition of the distinguished service rendered by her late husband.

Despatch from Lieutenant - General Lord Methuen as to engagement at Belmont, 23rd November, 1899.

Sir., Enslin, November 26, 1899.

ON the morning of 22nd I reconnoitred so far as possible the extensive and very strong position held by from 2,000 to 2,500 Boers, lately strengthened from Mafeking. I could not leave this force on my flank. I enclose sketch by Major Reade, and sketch by Lieutenant-Colonel Verner.* The evening of 22nd we had an artillery duel between our guns and the enemy's large gun. We fired well; they aimed well, but had bad fuzes. We had two wounded, they six killed and wounded.

My orders for the 28th were:—At 3 a.m. Guards Brigade to advance from small white house near railway on Gun Kopje, supported by battery on right, plus Naval Brigade; 9th Brigade on west side of Table Mountain; at same hour, bearing already taken, supported by battery on left, 9th Lancers, two squadrons, one company Mounted Infantry, marching north of Belmont Station, keeping one to two miles on left flank and advanced; Rimington's Guides, one squadron Lancers, one company Mounted Infantry from Witte Putt to east of Sugar Loaf; one company Mounted Infantry on right of Naval Brigade, protecting right; the force having got over open ground should arrive at daybreak on enemy; 9th Brigade having secured Table Mountain to swing round left and keep on high ground, and then advance east to west on A†; Guards Brigade conform, being pivot; then Guards advance on east edge of Mount Blanc, guns clearing entire advance with shrapnel; Cavalry to get round

rear of enemy, securing horses and laager. The force marched off silently and correctly; I proceeded to a position in rear of the centre of two brigades. Major-General Sir H. Colvile shows the Grenadiers lost direction, and I found myself committed to a frontal attack; sent orders to 9th Brigade to conform to Guards, and having gained first ridge to wait until the guns shrapnelled second line of height. During this assault Lieutenant Fryer was killed leading his men gallantly. The attack was a complete surprise, for they did not know I had moved from Witte Putt to Belmont, and expected an attack in three or four days. It was perfectly timed, and had the Brigadiers allowed daylight to appear before I reached the foot of the position my losses would have been doubled. Lieutenant-Colonel Crabbe was leading with conspicuous courage when he and Lieutenant Blundell were shot by a wounded Boer—the latter Officer has since died. It is not possible to distinguish any officer in khaki, now all badges have been removed, to say nothing of the difficulty of sending a message, the Aides-de-Camp having to bound from boulder to boulder, endeavouring at the same time to keep under cover. I therefore gave the Grenadiers the direction. This was

from the advanced kopjes, and the troops instinctively moved towards the enemy's position. The Scots Guards carried out their instructions to the letter, and gained the heights at the point of the bayonet. The battalion then advanced to the hill east of Mount Blanc, swinging round the left, and advancing up the narrow end. The greatest credit is due to Colonel Paget for the manner in which he carried out his orders, and for the intelligent handling of his battalion when left to his own resources. with pleasure the valuable services rendered by Lieutenant-Colonel Pulteney, and the courage displayed by Lieutenant Bulkeley and by Lieutenant Alexander. The 9th Brigade had taken a correct bearing, Lieutenant Festing leading, a duty he performed admirably, and I regret he was wounded. Touch was maintained with Guards. A heavy fire was pouring in from enemy's sangars west of Table Mountain. The Northumberland Fusiliers were ordered to hold their ground whilst the Northamptons were pushed on to some high ground on the right to bring a flanking fire on the sangars. This movement had the desired effect of causing the enemy to quit their defensive position. The line then rapidly advanced on Table Mountain, and occupied it after some slight resistance. At 4.30 A.M. the left battery shelled some Boers enfilading our line from our work by Table Mountain and drove them back. Immediately afterwards the first line of kopjes was crowned by Infantry, at 4.30 the batteries were ordered forward to support the Infantry advance; ten minutes later the Commanding Officer, 9th Brigade, was ordered to slacken his advance until the Boer position had been shelled. It was hard work for this support to come forward because the horses have not recovered five weeks' sea voyage. At 5.45 1st Battalion Coldstreams, being annoyed by heavy firing at 800 yards from Mount Blanc swung their left round, and carried this steep high hill in a brilliant manner, and with slight loss. 1st Battalion Scots Guards now joined the right of the 9th Brigade and continued advance.

I ordered the second line, the 9th Brigade, Yorkshire Light Infantry, and two companies Mounted Infantry, to conform to Guards. Now that the enemy's position was clearly seen, it was clear the original plan of giving the 9th Brigade the lion's share of the day's work was over, nor would it probably have been less costly. Battalion Coldstream Guards attacked the ridge south-west of Mount Blanc. Colonel Codrington handled his battalion coolly and well. Captain Feilding, Lieutenant the Honourable C. Douglas-Pennant and Lieutenant Price Jones merit praise for coolness and good company leading. Battalion Coldstreams were well handled, Major the Honourable A. Henniker's services proving of great value; Major Shute is honourably mentioned. At 5.50 the right battery had shelled some heights to the east of Mount Blanc, and 9th Brigade found itself under a heavy fire from a high ridge south of Table Mountain; the Northamptons and part of Northumberland Fusiliers went forward and held this ridge. At this time Major-General Fetherstonhaugh, to the deep regret of all ranks, was wounded; I cannot exaggerate his loss to myself. Colonel Money took over the command, and the party on the ridge suffered from a distant, but severe, cross fire. The enemy was finally dislodged at the point of the bayonet. A coward's trick now occurred. A white flag was displayed, and when within 50 yards our men ceased firing, and whilst the flag was flying a shot was fired by

flag, followed by 11 or 12 Boers, surrendered.

By 5.30 the left flank of the right attack in advancing up a shallow neck, east of Mount Blanc, received a heavy enfilading fire from the heights on the left front, and edged off towards Mount Blanc. The shells from the Naval Brigade cleared this height, and at 6.10 the situation was as follows:-The last height cleared, the enemy in large numbers galloping into the plain, the enemy's laager trekking across me 3,000 yards off, my mounted troops unable to carry out their orders on one side-leftbecause the retreat was covered by kopjes, on the other-right-because too far, the Artillery dead beat, and unable to help me. A Cavalry brigade and a Horse Artillery battery from my right would have made good my success. My losses are no greater than are to be expected; to keep in extended order, covering an enormous front, to get to the enemy's position at daybreak, saves you in the first instance from flanking fire, and in the second from great losses in the plain. There the second from great losses in the plain. is far too great risk of failure in making flank and front attack in the case of a position such as lay before me at Belmont; the very first element of success is to keep touch between brigades from the first. Nor is there any question of taking the enemy in flank, as on horses he changes front in 15 minutes, as will be shown in my next fight. Shrapuel does not kill men in these kopjes, it only frightens, and I intend to get at my enemy. I have accounted for 83 killed, and have 20 wounded in my hospital, and as their wounded were carried away I may assume their losses were greater than mine. I enclose an extract* from the diary of a prisoner holding a high position, which shows the impression made on the enemy. I took more than 50 prisoners, over 100 horses, many dead on the field; have destroyed 64 wagens, and have blown up four large cylinders of gunpowder, taking eight men to lift; 750 shrapnel, 5,000 rounds of small-arm ammunition, a good amount of forage, and as much cattle as I can take with me. Amongst my prisoners are six field cornets, and one German By 10.30 my division was in commandant. camp, by I all my wounded were in a comfortable house being carefully tended, by 5 P.M. next day the hospital train conveyed the less severe cases to Orange River, the graver cases to Cape Town. This is the most perfect work I have ever heard of in war, and reflects the highest credit on Colonel Townsend. The wound of the Brigadier of 9th Brigade unfortunately precludes any mention of Officers who distinguished themselves, nor can I help this fine brigade, for I had little occasion for noticing more than the excellent behaviour of the regiments under fire, and can only select one Officer, namely, Major Earle, Yorkshire Light Infantry, whose leading, knowledge, and coolness were noticeable.

Captain Bulfin, the Brigade Major, on whose shoulders a great responsibility rested, did admir-

able work.

Captain R. Brise is mentioned for good work done, and Captain Nugent's services were of value.

Major-General Sir H. Colvile has already gained my entire confidence, nothing is ever likely to shake his coolness.

The entire force is animated with the best spirit, and my sole regret is that I have lost, and must lose many men whenever I have to fight large

From General Officer commanding 1st Brigade to the Chief Staff Officer, 1st Division.

> Belmont Farm Bivouac, November 23, 1899.

IN accordance with orders received yesterday I marched off the 3rd Battalion Grenadier Guards and the 1st Battalion Scots Guards to rendezvous at the little house on the railway at 3 A.M., whence they were to advance on Gun Hill and assault it. They were guided by my Brigade Major, Captain Ruggles Brise, who led them to the exact spot. Owing to a miscalculation of distance on my part, they did not arrive at the house till 3.30, and owing to the semi-darkness Lieutenant-Colonel Crabbe, Commanding 3rd Battalion Grenadier Guards, mistook the hill appropriated for the Coldstream Guards for the south knoll of Gun Hill, and attacking it on the steep western face, lost heavily; it was during this assault that Lieu-tenant and Adjutant Fryer, who was leading the men with extraordinary gallantry, was killed. Lieutenant-Colonel Crabbe, who was also leading with great gallantry, was not hit in the assault, but by a wounded Boer, as was Lieutenant Blundell. Second Lieutenant Powell's leading

was very noticeable during this assault.

After the capture of this position, the Grenadiers were re-formed and ordered to proceed in a southerly direction along the ridge by the General Officer commanding. This they did, and crossing the intervening valley between the ridge and Mount Blanc, took the valley. The Scots Guards advanced straight to Gun Hill from the rendezvous, and took it at the point of the bayonet, remaining there till ordered by me to form up in the saddle between Gun Hill and the hill which should have been taken by the Coldstream Guards; they advanced along this, then crossed the valley between it and the hill to the north of Mount Blanc, swinging round their left and advancing up the narrow end. I consider the greatest credit is due to Colonel Paget for the manner in which he carried out my instructions, and for the very intelligent handling of his battalion when left to his own resources. He wishes to draw attention to the valuable services rendered by Lieutenant-Colonel Pulteney, and to the pluck displayed by Lieutenants Bulkeley and Alexander, both of whom insisted on going on after they were

I remained with the reserve (the 1st and 2nd Battalions Coldstream Guards) assault on Gun Hill, and, as soon as that appeared to be taken, directed them to advance from the railway, and, leaving it on their right, take the hill assigned to them. Owing, however, partly to too great extension to the right, and partly to an initial error in direction in the semi-darkness, the 1st Battalion Coldstream Guards came under fire from Mount Blanc, at about 800 yards, and Lieutenant-Colonel Codrington swinging his left slightly round to meet this, became committed to a frontal attack on Mount Blanc, which his battalion accomplished in a very brilliant manner, with remarkably little loss.

Our 2nd Battalion Coldstream Guards had a tendency to conform with the 1st Battalion, and thus also got too much to the right, but I was able to secure half the battalion to advance to the right of the Scots Guards along the ridge. This half battalion co-operated with the Scots Guards in the assault of the hill to the south-west of Mount Blanc. In spite of his error of direction, Lieutenant-Colonel Codrington's battalion was well and correctly handled. He draws particular attention to the skilful handling of his company by Captain Feilding, the coolness displayed by Lieutenant the Honourable C. Douglas-Pennant, and the complete control exercised over his company by Second Lieutenant Price Jones.

Lieutenant-Colonel Stopford's battalion had less severe work than the others of my brigade, but I consider its advance under fire was distinctly well performed. Lieutenant-Colonel Stopford particularly calls attention to the services of Major the Honourable A. Henniker-Major and

Captain Shute.

 $ar{\mathbf{I}}$ should like to draw the attention of the General Officer Commanding to the assistance rendered me by my Aide-de-Camp, Captain G. Nugent, and my Brigade Major, Captain Ruggles Brise. latter was entrusted with leading the two battalions to Gun Hill, a task in which he was handicapped by never having seen the ground by daylight.

From General Officer Commanding 9th Brigade to Chief Staff Officer, 1st Division. Belmont, November 23, 1899.

I HAVE the honour to submit the following report of the part taken by the Brigade under my command in the action which took place to-day. The rendezvous was left at 3.7 A.M. in the following formation:—Northumberland Fusiliers, in column of companies, on the left, directing, and 50 paces from them moved the Northamptonshire Regiment in similar formation, and parallel to them. In rear of both these battalions was the 2nd Battalion King's Own Yorkshire Light Infantry and two companies Munster Fusiliers.

The advance was made on a bearing 94 degrees from the point of rendezvous, Lieutenant Festing, Northumberland Fusiliers, acting as guide. This duty was performed admirably by him, and I deeply regret to notice the name of this promising young Officer among the list of wounded.

On crossing the railway line the enemy were observed in small parties on the high ground to Two companies of the Northamberour front. land Fusiliers extended to the left and two companies of the Northamptons prolonged the line to the right. Two companies of the Northumberland Fusiliers were further extended in echelon on our left, while on our right moved the Guards Brigade, which could be heard In this formation the advance was distinctly. steadily continued-still directed by Lieutenant Festing-on Table Mountain, until the Northumberland Fusiliers were checked by a heavy fire from some sangars south of Table Mountain. The Northumberland Fusiliers were directed to hold their ground, while the Northamptons were pushed on to some high ground on the right in order to bring a flanking fire on the sangars. This movement had the desired effect of causing line then rapidly advanced on Table Mountain, and occupied it after some slight resistance. A battalion of the Guards was then on our right, and during the next advance joined on to our line.

About this time the second line of the

Infantry and two companies Munster Funiliers, were detached to some other part of the field by order of the General Officer Commanding the Division. Meanwhile, finding the steady fire coming from a high ridge south of Table Mountain prevented the swinging round of our left flank as had been arranged, the Northamptons, with part of the Northumberland Fusiliers, were sent forward and occupied this ridge; but the smallness of this force and the lack of support rendered it undesirable to do more than merely hold this ridge. About this time I received a bullet in the right shoulder, and handed over the command of the 9th Brigade to Colonel Money, C.B., commanding the Northumberland Fusiliers. I subsequently learnt that the party on this ridge suffered severely from a cross fire directed on them from the high ground about a thousand yards to our front (east), as well as from a still more dangerous close-range fire from a party of the enemy, which had established itself on the northern edge of the crest. This party was finally dislodged at the point of the bayonet, and "independent fire" poured into them at a distance of 50 yards, when a white flag was hoisted by the party. On our men ceasing fire, the white flag still being displayed, a shot was fired by this party at our men; but the actual bearer of the flag of truce, followed by some eleven or twelve unarmed Boers, surrendered themselves to Colonel Money and were made prisoners. The wounded, some twelve in number, were attended to by our Medical Officers. Five dead Boers were found inside the sangar, while a little lower down the slope seven more dead bodies of the enemy were discovered.

All resistance now having ceased the 9th Brigade returned to the bivouac ground, bringing in their dead and wounded. The bivouac ground was reached at 10.30 A.M.

Lieutenant-General Despatch from Lord Methuen as to engagement at Enslin, 25th November, 1899.

I RECEIVED information on afternoon of 24th that a force of 400 Boers and two guns prevented my train from proceeding near Grass Pan, about 7 miles from Belmont. It seemed to me that it would be best to march the division at once to Swinks Pan, which would place me on the left front of the enemy's position, and that if I worked one battery round each flank, sent my Cavalry and Mounted Infantry well forward, the greater part of the Cavalry being on the eastern side, I ought to capture the eastern force. Naval Brigade and 9th Brigade I left for protecting the guns, or assaulting a position, if necessary. The Guards Brigade I left with the baggage to march to Enslin, where I had my next camp. The brigade could always give a hand if wanted. I had left 1st Battalion Scots Guards at Belmont Station, also 2 companies, Munster Fusiliers, because there were 500 Boers and a gun, so it was said, threatening Belmont. I made this my divisional battalion, marching straight from Belmont to Enslin. The armoured train with Infantry was to give me a help from the line. I started at 3.30 A.M., and was in action at 6.30, my troops being in the position assigned. Major-General Sir H. Colvile describes the action of the Guards, but might have said I gave the brigade rather a longer march than necessary, because I heliobrigade, composed of the Yorkshire Light graphed the brigade should march south-east, the

direction the enemy was advancing from. I had better have said: "Come to my support."

My position at 7 A.M., was full of interest, for, instead of 400, I have since ascertained I had 2,500 Boers (300 from Transvaul, six guns, one Hotchkiss, one Maxim), and at the same moment I had reliable information from Major Rimington that 500 fresh Boers, plus a laager behind them, were behind some kopjes two miles off, and in my rear. I then heliographed to the Guards, and continued my attack.

The fighting was far harder than on Thursday, and I would not let a man go forward until I had covered the two high hills with shrapnel. manner in which the batteries were handled, their accuracy in firing, is beyond all praise, and why this action is, to my mind, interesting is that you can compare it to Belmont. In the battle of Belmont you have a surprise and one battalion losing direction and suffering heavy loss; in the battle of Enslin you have a position well prepared by shrapnel, the right battery fires 500 rounds, and you have the Naval Brigade behaving splendidly, but not taking advantage enough of cover and suffering accordingly. The loss was great in both cases, and convinces me that if an enemy has his heart in the right place he ought to be able to hold his own against vastly superior forces, and it does our men great credit that

nothing stops them.

The 9th Brigade consisted of the Northumberland Fusiliers, 2nd Battalion Northamptons, half Battalion Loyal North Lancashires, 2nd Battalion King's Own Yorkshire Light Infantry. The Naval Brigade was attached to this brigade, and was commanded by Captain Prothero. The brigade was distributed as follows: -5 companies Northumberland Fusiliers, remained as a containing line in front of right of the enemy's position, and did not advance until the end of the engagement; 2 companies Northumberland Fusiliers, escort to guns; the remainder of the brigade attacked the kopjes on left of the Boer position. The fire from here was very heavy, and the Naval Brigade suffered severely, keeping in too The Officers, petty officers, close formation. non-commissioned officers led their men with great gallantry, and I have great pleasure in bringing to your notice the plucky conduct of Lieutenant W. T. C. Jones, Royal Marine Light Infantry, who although he had a bullet in his thigh, led his men to the top of the kopje, and only had his wound dressed at the conclusion of the action. The command of the Naval Brigade devolved on Captain A. E. Le Marchant, Royal Marine Light Infantry, when his senior officers were killed or wounded, and he led the remnant of the Naval Brigade up the kopje, with great coolness and ability. The kopje gained, it was found evacuated, and the enemy having gone to the right, their position was enfiladed. The position was taken by the Naval Brigade, Marines, Yorkshire Light Infantry, and Loyal North Lancashires. The attack was ably supported by the fire of the Field Artillery Battery on the right. I beg to bring to your notice No. 1843 Colour-Sergeant Waterhouse, King's Own Yorkshire Light Infantry, who at a critical moment acted with great coolness in shooting down an enemy who had been doing great execution on our men at 1,150 yards. Lieutenant Taylor, Aide-de-Camp, is favourably mentioned. The heights gained, I found I had taken the whole Boer force in flank, and had entirely cut them off from their line of retreat. My guns played on the masses of horsemen, but my few cavalry, dead beat, were powerless, and for the second time I longed for a Cavalry Brigade and a Horse Artil- a divisional battalion. I therefore advanced with No. 27157.

lery Battery to let me reap the fruits of a hard fought action. I buried 21 Boers; there were 50 horses dead in one place. I found over 30 wounded in the Boer hospital here, and I have fought distinctly different Boers on the two days. My casualties were as follows:-

P.S.—I enclose an interesting account of work performed by the Naval Brigade near the line. Their guns were of great value, and the work performed was of great interest. Lieutenants Campbell and L. S. Armstrong displayed great coolness in conducting the fire of their guns. Pett Officers Ashley, "Doris," and Fuller, "Monarch, laid their guns with great accuracy under fire.

I again draw attention to the exceptional organizing power of Colonel Townsend at Swink's Pan at 11.30 P.M. I was informed that owing to all the ambulances having been used for taking the wounded to the train at Belmont, I had scarcely a field hospital mounted officer, only three ambulances, and three stretchers. I knew I had to fight next morning, so got together 50 blankets in order to carry wounded with help of rifles. I also sent to Colonel Townsend to make arrangements for wounded by 3 A M., a messenger having to ride 7 miles to him. He met me on the field with full supply of ambulances, and I never saw anything more of him or the wounded because he had a train ready for them between Grass Pan and Belmont. His only complaint is that there is not much of his mules left, an observation which applies equally to men and animals.

Enslin, November 25, 1899. IN accordance with orders received last night the Guards Brigade fell in as escort to the baggage train at 4 A.M. to-day; it was, however, 6.30 before the whole train was ready to start. followed the guide of Rimington's Horse to within a mile and a half of Grass Pan Station. I saw firing to the north-west and decided to advance, giving orders to Lieutenant-Colonel Codrington to protect the baggage column with the 1st Battalion Coldstream Guards, and extending the 2nd Battalion Coldstream Guards, and the 3rd Battalion Grenadiers, facing north. During the extension a few blind shells fell near the firing line doing no damage. At this time (7.30) the 1st Battalion Scots Guards came up from Belmont, and with them I prolonged the line to the left, but soon afterwards received a telethe Grenadiers and 2nd Battalion Coldstreams, arriving at the east of the Rooi Laagte position as the 9th Brigade was forming up.

There were no casualties in my Brigade to-day,

and no ammunition expended.

From Lieutenant-Colonel Money, C.B., 1st Battalion Northumberland Fusiliers, Acting Officer Commanding 9th Brigade, to Chief Staff Officer, 1st Division.

Enslin, November 26, 1899.

I HAVE the honour to report that, in the action of Enslin, on the 25th November, the Brigade consisted of :—the Naval Brigade, under Captain Prothero, Royal Navy; the Northumberland Fusiliers, 2nd Battalion Northamptonshire Regiment, one-half battalion Loyal North Lancashire Regiment, and the 2rd Battalion King's Own Yorkshire Light Infantry. During the main attack the Brigade was distributed as follows:—Five companies Northumberland Fusiliers remained as a containing line in front of right of enemy's position, and did not advance until near the conclusion of the engagement; two companies Northumberland Fusiliers escort to guns. With the remainder of the Brigade I attacked the kopje on left of Boer position. The fire from this was very hot, and the troops suffered severely during the attack until they reached the dead ground at the foot of the kopje. The Naval Brigade suffered most heavily, owing, I think, to their keeping in too close formation. The Officers, petty officers, and non-commissioned officers led their men with great gallantry, and I wish especially to bring to the notice of the General Officer Commanding, 1st Division, the plucky conduct of Lieutenant W. T. C. Jones, Royal Marine Light Infantry, who, although having a bullet in his thigh, led his men to the top of the kopje, and only had his wound dressed at the conclusion of the operations. The command of the Naval Brigade devolved on Captain A. E. Marchant, Royal Marine Light Infantry, when his senior Officers were killed or wounded, and he led the remnant of the Naval Brigade up the kopje with great coolness and ability.

On reaching the top of this kopje it was found the enemy had just left it, and had gone more towards the right of their position. I was now able to enfilade their position on the right, but was also subject to a heavy enfilading fire from portions of the Boer position between the two kopjies. I saw the enemy clearing off with as many horses as were not wounded (there were a considerable number of wounded horses in rear of the position), and eventually ceased firing about 10 A.M., and reported to the Artillery on the right that they might effectually fire on the retreating Boers if they came up at once, which

they did.

I beg to bring to the notice of the General Officer Commanding, for distinguished conduct in the field, No. 1843, Colour-Sergeant Waterhouse, King's Own Yorkshire Light Infantry, who at a critical moment acted with great coolness, and shot down one of the enemy's sharpshooters who had been doing great execution to our men advancing at a range of 1,150 yards.

My Staff, Captain Bulfin and Lieutenant Taylor, rendered me great assistance, and were near me at the final assault.

From the General Commanding-in-Chief the Forces in South Africa to the Secretary of State for War.

Chieveley Camp,

December 16, 1899. I HAVE the honour to bring the following cases of Distinguished Service in the Field to your notice.

At Colenso, on the 15th December, the detachments serving the guns of the 14th and 66th Batteries, Royal Field Artillery, had all been either killed, wounded, or driven from their guns by Infantry fire at close range, and the guns were deserted.

About 500 yards behind the guns was a donga, in which some of the few horses and drivers left alive were sheltered. The intervening space was

swept with shell and rifle fire.

Captain Congreve, Rifle Brigade, who was in the donga, assisted to hook a team into a limber, went out and assisted to limber up a gun; being wounded he took shelter, but seeing Lieutenant Roberts fall badly wounded he went out again and brought him in. Some idea of the nature of the fire may be gathered from the fact that Captain Congreve was shot through the leg, through the toe of his boot, grazed on the elbow and the shoulder, and his horse shot in three places.

Lieutenant the Honourable F. Roberts, King's Royal Rifles, assisted Captain Congreve. He was

wounded in three places.

Corporal Nurse, Royal Field Artillery, 66th Battery, also assisted. I recommend the above three for the Victoria Cross.

Drivers H. Taylor, Young, Petts, Rockell, Lucas, and Williams, all of the 66th Battery, Royal Field Artillery, rode the teams, each team brought in a gun. I recommend all six for the Medal for Distinguished Conduct in the Field.*

Shortly afterwards Captain H. L. Reed, 7th Battery, Royal Field Artillery, who had heard of the difficulty, brought down three teams from his battery to see if he could be of any use. He was wounded, as were five of the 13 men who rode with him; 1 was killed, his body was found on the field, and 13 out of 21 horses were killed before he got half-way to the guns, and he was obliged to retire.

I recommend Captain Reed for the Victoria Cross, and the following non-commissioned officers and men, 7th Battery, Royal Field Artillery, for the Medal for Distinguished Service in the

Field:

I have differentiated in my recommendations, because I thought that a recommendation for the Victoria Cross required proof of initiative, something more in fact than mere obedience to orders, and for this reason I have not recommended Captain Schofield, Royal Artillery, who was acting under orders, though I desire to record his conduct as most gallant.

Several other gallant drivers tried, but were all killed, and I cannot get their names.

From the General Commanding-in-Chief the Forces in South Africa to the Secretary of State for War.

Chieveley Camp,
December 17, 1899.
I HAVE the honour to report that I moved off from Chieveley and Dornkop Spruit Camps at 4 A.M. on the 15th instant.

Force as in attached list.

I attach a copy of the orders that were by my direction issued by the General Officer Commanding Natal Field Force.

I enclose a reconnaissance sketch of the Colenso

position.*

Colenso Bridge is the centre of a semicircle surrounded by hills, the crests of which dominate it by about 1,400 feet at a distance of about four and a half miles.

Near the bridge are four small lozenge-shaped, steep-sided, hog-backed, hills, each, as it is further from the river, being higher and than the next inner one. These hills, the first of which is known as Fort Wylie, were very strongly entrenched with well-built, rough, stone walls along every crest line that offered; in some cases there were as many as three tiers. It was a very awkward position to attack, but I thought that if I could effect a lodgment under cover of Fort Wylie, the other hills would to a great extent mask each other, and shell fire and want of water would clear them out in time.

All visible defences had been heavily shelled by eight Naval guns on the 13th and 14th, but though some of the defences were damaged and accurate ranges obtained, we failed to induce the enemy to disclose his own position, or to reply in any way to our fire.

My idea was to try and cross the Bridle Drift first; if we got over, the troops would move down the river and help the crossing at the main drift; if we did not get over, the troops there would contain all the enemy on the western side, and would so cover the flank of the attack on the main drift by

General Hartadvanced to the attack of the Bridle Drift, but did not find it. (I heard afterwards that a dam had been thrown below it, and the water made deep.) Watching his advance, I saw his troops pressing on into the salient loop of the river. I saw at once that if he got there he would be under a severe cross fire, and sent to tell him to recall them. In the interval, he had become heavily engaged, and I sent two battalions of General Lyttelton's Brigade and Colonel Parsons' Brigade Division, Royal Field Artillery (two batteries), to help extricate him.

This they did, and subsequently, as ordered, came to the right to support the main advance. At the same time General Hildyard was advancing on the bridge, and as I was proceeding in that direction to superintend the attack, and also to ascertain what Colonel Long's Brigade Division, which was very heavily engaged on the right, was doing, I received a message that he had been driven from his guns by superior Infantry fire.

I believed at the moment that the six Naval had shared the same fate, and I at once decided that without guns it would be impossible for me to force the passage.

I directed General Hildyard to divert the right of his two leading battalions to the east of the railway and direct it upon the guns, his left battalion to advance on Colenso, but not to

become too hotly engaged.

These orders were admirably carried out by the Royal West Surrey and the Devonshire Regiments, but Fort Wylie, which had been silenced by the fire of the 14th and 66th Batteries, was reoccupied, and the fire was so heavy that no troops could live in the open by the guns. At the first attempt to withdraw them, Captain Schofield, Royal Artillery, Captain Congreve, Rifle Brigade, and Lieutenant the Honourable F. Roberts, King's Royal Rifles, with Corporal Nurse, and Drivers H. Taylor, Young, Petts, Rockall, Lucas, and Wil-liams, all of the 66th Battery, brought off two guns, but the enemy then found out what was being done, and such a deadly fire was kept up that although several attempts were made to cover the fatal 500 yards either horses or men, or both, were killed before they got to the guns.

A final most gallant attempt was made by Captain H. L. Reed, of the 7th Field Battery, who came down with three teams to see if he could help. He and five of the 13 men were wounded, and one killed, and 13 horses killed out of 22 before they got half-way up to the guns. After that I would not allow another attempt and the

guns were abandoned.

I am making another representation regarding the Officers and men concerned in these attempts.

Fortunately the Naval guns had not reached the position taken up by the 14th and 66th Batteries when fire was opened; their drivers however bolted, and their oxen were stampeded, or killed; but by dint of hard work all the guns and the ammunition wagons were hauled out of range. All worked well, and Lieutenant Ogilvy, Her Majesty's ship "Tartar," and Gunner Wright, Her Majesty's ship "Terrible," particularly rendered excellent service. These guns, however, had been rendered immobile for the

During all this time, and throughout the day, the two 4.7-inch and four 12-pounder Naval guns of the Naval Brigade, and Durban Naval Volunteers, under Captain E. P. Jones, Royal Navy, were being admirably served and succeeded in silencing every one of the enemy's guns they could locate.

Colonel Long, Royal Artillery, has been dangerously wounded, and I am unable to obtain his explanations. His orders were to come into action covered by the 6th Brigade, which Brigade was not, as he knew, intended to advance on Colenso. I had personally explained to him where I wished him to come into action, and with the Naval guns only, as the position was not within effective range for his field guns. Instead of this he advanced with his batteries so fast that he left both his Infantry escort and his oxen-drawn Naval guns behind, and came into action under Fort Wylie, a commanding trebly entrenched hill, at a range of 1,200 yards and I believe within 300 yards of the enemy's rifle pits.

The men fought their guns like heroes and silenced Fort Wylie, but the issue could never have been in doubt, and gradually they were all shot down. I am told that Second Lieutenant Holford, 14th Field Battery, displayed particular gallantry

when all were good.

After this, I directed a withdrawal to our camps.- It was accomplished in good order. There was no pursuit, and the shell fire was

negligeable and controlled by our Naval guns. The day was fearfully hot, the sky cloudless, the atmosphere sultry and airless, and the country

waterless in most parts.

Colonel Bullock, 2nd Devons, behaved with great gallantry; he did not receive the orders to retire; his party defended themselves and the wounded of the two batteries till nightfall, inflicting considerable loss on the enemy, and it was only when surrounded that he consented to surrender, because the enemy said they would shoot the wounded if he did not.

During the progress of events that I have been describing, the mounted men under Lord Dundonald, supported by two guns of the 7th Battery, Royal Field Artillery, and two battalions, 6th Brigade, were heavily engaged with a considerable force that attacked my right flank, and which they repulsed. The other four guns, 7th Battery, Royal Field Artillery, were enfilleding the Colenso position.

I cannot speak too highly of the manner in which the Mounted Volunteers behaved.

I attach a list of casualties. It is, I regret to say, heavy, though luckily a large proportion are

we were engaged for eight hours with an enemy occupying commanding selected and carefully prepared positions—positions so carefully prepared that it was almost impossible for Infantry to see what to aim at, and I think the force opposed to us must altogether have equalled our own. We had closed on the enemy's works, our troops were in favourable position for an assault, and had I, at the critical moment, had at my disposition the Artillery I had, as I believed, arranged for, I think we should have got in. without the immediate support of guns, I considered that it would be a reckless waste of gallant lives to attempt the assault.

Considering the intense heat, the conduct and bearing of the troops was excellent. I especially noticed the Royal West Surrey, the Devonshire and the Border Regiments, but all were good.

I am unable to give an estimate of the enemy's loss. They were extremely well concealed, but, judging from their fire in places, their trenches must have been very full of men, and our shell fire was constant and very accurate. Among the many conflicting accounts I have received, I incline to believe those, and they are the majority, which state that the enemy's losses were heavier than they had thought possible.

Chieveley, December 14, 1899, 10 P.M.
1. THE enemy is entrenched in the kopjes north of Colenso Bridge. One large camp is reported to be near the Ladysmith Road, about 5 miles north-west of Colenso. Another large camp is reported in the hills which lie north of the Tugela in a northerly direction from Hlangwane Hill.

2. It is the intention of the General Officer Commanding to force the passage of the Tugela

to-morrow.

3. The 5th Brigade will move from its present camping ground at 4.30 A.M. and march towards the Bridle Drift, immediately west of the junction of Dornkop Spruit and the Tugela. The Brigade will cross at this point, and after crossing move along the left bank of the river towards the

kopjes north of the iron bridge.
4. The 2nd Brigade will move from its present camping ground at 4 A.M., and passing south of the present camping ground of No. 1 and No. 2 Divisional Troops, will march in the direction of the iron bridge at Colenso. The Brigade will cross at this point and gain possession of the

kopjes north of the iron bridge.
5. The 4th Brigade will advance at 4.30 A.M. to a point between Bridle Drift and the railway so that it can support either the 5th or the 2nd

Brigade.

- 6. The 6th Brigade (less a half battalion escort to baggage) will move at 4 A.M. east of the railway in the direction of Hlangwane Hill to a position where he can protect the right flank of the 2nd Brigade, and, if necessary, support it or the mounted troops referred to later as moving towards Hlangwane Hill.
- 7. The Officer Commanding Mounted Brigade will move at 4 A.M. with a force of 1,000 men and one battery of No. 1 Brigade Division in the direction of Hlangwane Hill; he will cover the right flank of the general movement, and will endeavour to take up a position on Hlangwane Hill, whence he will enfilade the kopjes north of the iron bridge.

The Officer Commanding mounted troops will also detail two forces of 300 and 500 men to cover the right and left flanks respectively and

protect the baggage.

8. The 2nd Brigade Division, Royal Field Artillery, will move at 4.30 A.M. following the 4th Brigade, and will take up a position whence it can enfilade the kopjes north of the iron bridge. This Brigade Division will act on any orders it receives from Major-General Hart.

The six Naval guns (two 4.7-inch and four 12-pounder) now in position north of the 4th Brigade, will advance on the right of the 2nd

Brigade Division, Royal Field Artillery.
No. 1 Brigade Division, Royal Field Artillery
(less one battery detached with Mounted Brigade), will move at 3.30 A.M. east of the railway and proceed under cover of the 6th Brigade to a point from which it can prepare the crossing for the 2nd Brigade.

The six Naval guns now encamped with No. 2 Divisional Troops will accompany and act with

this Brigade Division.

9. As soon as the troops mentioned in preceding paragraphs have moved to their positions, the remaining units and the baggage will be parked in deep formation, facing north, in five separate lines, in rear of to-day's Artillery position, the right of each line resting on the railway, but leaving a space of 100 yards between the railway and the right flank of the line.

I HAVE the honour to report to you that on November 27 1 promy arrival at Witkop on November 27 1 proceeded to reconnoitre the Modder River, and, from the information I had received, came to the

conclusion that the entire force of the enemy had assembled at Spytfontein, and that I should not meet with any determined resistance on the

Modder. ·I, therefore, decided the next morning, under cover of my Artillery, and protected by my Cavalry and Mounted Infantry, to throw up proper pretection for my railway, leaving the Northamptonshire Regiment, 300 Engineers, the Naval Brigade, and three guns. I intended next

day to have taken my force, with five days' rations, via Jacobsdal, Modder River, to some dams east of Spytfontein, and to have thence delivered my attack.

On the morning of 28th November information reached me through a native that Modder River village was strongly occupied, and I therefore did not feel justified in running any risk regarding the railway, and decided to establish myself on Modder River before proceeding any further.*

I proceeded at 4 A.M. with the mounted troops, the guns coming on so soon as sufficiently protected by the Infantry. In the village itself we could not see any signs of men, guns, or wagons, but to the east of the village we found the enemy

in strong force, and aggressive.
I had arranged with the Officer Commanding Royal Artillery to prepare the Infantry attack with both batteries from the right flank, and the Infantry Division being still some miles distant, I gave them two distinct points to march on, which allowed of the brigades keeping in ex-

tended order and covering a very wide front.

As will be seen in the report of the Officer Commanding Royal Artillery, the guns were soon engaged with the enemy on our right flank, the 9th Lancers and Mounted Infantry co-operating with the guns in protecting this flank. The enemy brought three guns into action under perfect cover, and fired with great accuracy. Our guns, 75th and 18th Batteries, eventually disabled one gun, and with a stronger force of the Cavalry it might have been possible for me to have secured it.

The enemy appeared to be retiring, and there were no signs that the village was held in strength. We all believed the force in our front was fighting a retiring action, and had no idea 8,000 Boers had been brought from Spytfontei

to oppose us.

In no case is it a position to be turned by a wide detour, and I felt sure my right course was to keep my two brigades in touch, widely extended, and trust to their gaining the opposite bank, as was done. Any other course must be attended with great risk when opposite 8,000 horsemen with a river to assist them. In any case the Modder village is not a position I could turn by making a wide detour.

The Guards Brigade had orders to develop their attack first, which they did with the 1st Battalion Scots Guards on the right, with orders to swing their right well round in order to take the enemy in flank, the 2nd Battalion Coldstreams and the 3rd Battalion Grenadiers making the frontal attack, the former on the left to keep touch with the 9th Brigade. The 1st Battalion Coldstreams

in reserve in the right rear.

At 8.10 A.M. a sudden and very heavy fire announced that the enemy held the river in great strength, and perfectly concealed. Many casualties now occurred, and the Scots Guards Maxim detachment were completely wiped out. The two companies pushed on until they suffered again heavily from enfilade fire, Colonel Paget's horse, hit in five places, being killed. At 8.10 A.M. the 1st Battalion Coldstreams extended, and swinging the right round, prolonged the line of the Scots Guards to the right. The Riet River prevented any further advance. The troops then lay down, being fairly under cover in that position. Two companies Scots Guards fell back by order of the Brigadier to a reservoir, to secure the right flank, which I think was quite secured,

as a matter of fact, by my mounted troops. The 3rd Battalion Grenadiers and 2nd Battalion Coldstreams advanced to within 1,100 yards of the enemy, lay down, and held their own. Captain Heneage tried to advance further, and

lost four sergeants.

Meanwhile the 9th Brigade had advanced the Northumberland Fusiliers along the east side of the railway line, supported by half a battalion of the Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders. The Yorkshire Light Infantry advanced along the west side of the railway, supported by the re-maining half battalion of Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders. The half battalion Loyal North Lancashire prolonged the line to the left, and endeavoured to cross the river and threaten the enemy's right flank. The six companies Northamptons acted as a baggage guard.

The 9th Brigade had the same hard task before it that faced the Guards Brigade—on the extreme left an outcrop of rocks and small kopjes on the left bank of the river, considerably in advance of the enemy's main position, were strongly held by the enemy, and checked the advance of the Loyal North Lancashire. Some 600 yards east, the same side of the river, a farm house and kraal on a slight eminence covering the dam and drift at the west end of village, also strongly occupied, checked the advance. A withering fire from these buildings checked the advance of the Brigade. They were, however, carried, early in the afternoon by two companies of the Yorkshire Light Infantry, under Lieutenant-Colonel Barter, together with some Highlanders and Northumberland Fusiliers. Lieutenant Fox, Yorkshire Light Infantry, gallantly led this assault; he was severely wounded. Almost at the same moment the rocks and kopjes on the extreme left were carried by the Loyal North Lancashire. We had now won the river and west side of village, out of which the enemy were soon chased. Major-General Pole-Carew led his men in a gallant manner for threequarters of a mile up the bank, when he was forced back, and had to content himself with holding a fairly good position he had gained on the right bank

I had promised Major-General Pole-Carew to send him what troops I could get, and it was in this successful endeavour that Lieutenant-Colonel Northcott, who never left me, fell mortally wounded. The Army has lost one of the ablest Officers in Her Majesty's Service, and I cannot express the grief his death has caused me. He was beloved by every one who knew him. I received a flesh wound shortly after 5.30, and told Major-General Sir H. Colvile to take over the

command.

During the entire action, the 75th and 18th Batteries had vied with one another in showing gallantry and proficiency. I dare not write more than Colonel Hall has written, his modest account scarcely doing justice to the splendid conduct of our gunners. The 62nd Battery, marching from Belmont, came straight into action, and were of great service.

Colonel Paget, having taken over command of the Guards Brigade, Major-General Sir H. Colvile quite rightly did not care to rush the

passage of the river with tired troops

Colonel Hall points out it would have been better that he should have known the point of attack, but the truth is that when no one can get on a horse with any safety within 2,000 yards of the enemy, orders cannot be conveyed, and, personally, I am first to admit I was for most of the day in positions I had no right to be in, because I could only see how the fight was progressing by going to the front

notice the names of the following Officers and rank and file who distinguished themselves during the day:

Major Count Gleichen, C.M.G., for the coolness shown by him throughout the engagement, especially in attending to the wounded under a

Sergeant Brown and Private Martin, 3rd Battalion Grenadier Guards, who helped him,

were both shot.

Sergeant - Major Cooke, 3rd Battalion Grenadiers, displayed remarkable coolness under

Lieutenant the Honourable A. Russell showed great coolness in working the machine gun, which he did with marked success.

Major Granville Smith, Coldstream Guards, in volunteering to find a ford, which he did in

dangerous mud and a strong river.
Captain and Adjutant Steele, Coldstream Guards, for excellent service during the day.

Sergeant-Major S. Wright, Coldstream Guards, showed great coolness when a change of ammunition carts was being made, and was of great value at a critical time.

Native Driver Matthews for making the other natives stick to their carts, when they would

otherwise have bolted.

Drill and Colour-Sergeant Price, Coldstream Guards, at Belmont, and at Modder River, renclered excellent service whilst commanding half a company

Drill and Colour-Sergeant Plunkett, Coldstream Guards, collected 150 men, and helped the 9th Brigade crossing the river under Captain Lord

Newtown Butler.

No. 1825 Lance-Corporal Webb, Coldstream Guards, twice asked leave to go into the open to bind up the wounds of a Grenadier; under a heavy fire, he succeeded in his object. Captain Hervey Bathurst, Grenadier Guards,

was of great value in rallying a number of Grenadiers and Coldstreams shaken by the fire.

I again call attention to Colonel Paget's cheerfulness and intelligence under the most

trying surroundings.

He draws attention to Captain Moores, Royal Army Medical Corps, who, although wounded in the hand, said nothing, but continued his duties. Also, he draws attention to the good services of the Master of Ruthven, Scots Guards. The valuable services of Captain Nugent, Aide-de-Camp and Captain Ruggles-Brise are again noted.
The names of Lieutenant-Colonel Barter,

King's Own Yorkshire Light Infantry, and Major the Honourable C. Lambton, Northumberland Fusiliers, are mentioned for having rendered invaluable assistance to their Brigadier. Captain Bulfin, Yorkshire Regiment, did his duty admirably.

Lieutenant Percival, Northumberland Fusiliers, managed with great difficulty to establish himself with a small party on a point near the rail-way, from which, by his judgment and coolness, he was able to keep down the fire of the enemy, many of his small party being killed. 3499 Lance-Corporal R. Delaney,

4160 Private J. East,

4563 Private Segar, 4497 Private Snowdon,

Northumberland Fusiliers, under a very heavy fire picked up and brought in a wounded man of the Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders, No. 3955 Private Smarley, Northumberland Fusiliers, No. 1 of a Maxim detachment, who showed great coolness and judgment when wounded.

Major Lindsay, Royal Artillery, 75th Battery, ignored a painful wound, and continued in com-I have much pleasure in bringing to your mand of his battery. Lieutenant Begbie, Royal Artillery, suddenly placed in command of his battery, led it, and brought it into action with

great coolness.

Captain Farrell wounded a second time, continued to do his duty, having first placed a wounded man on one of the gun carriages. Wounded gunners and drivers continued at their

Lieutenant Rochford Boyd, Royal Artillery, on this, as on former occasions, showed himself reliable and capable of acting without orders.

I personally bring to notice the value of Lieutenant-Colonel Rhodes' service and Major Streatfeild's service in sending forward reinforcements to Major-General Pole-Carew, for on this movement the result of the evening's success

depended.

I cannot too highly commend the conduct of the troops, ably assisted by the Naval Brigade, for on them the whole credit of our success rests. The next morning we found the enemy had quitted the position, which I understand was one of very great strength. As regards the losses of the enemy, 23 bodies have been found, and the inhabitants informed me that the dead were buried at once in the gardens, and the wounded conveyed away to Jacobsdal. I have had to bury nearly 200 horses.

All evidence tends to show that at 2 a certain number began to clear, and that at 4 a good number more moved off; that the leaders lunched in the hotel I am now writing from, and were utterly disheartened at our stubbornness. I expect one more fight at Spytfontein will convince a great number of the Orange Free Staters that it is better not to continue fighting. I am thankful the list of casualties is no greater than it is, for many of the cases are slight.

Again I call attention to the splendid hospital arrangements, for at 4.45 P.M. on the day after the fight all my wounded were on their way to Cape Town.

I am glad to have been slightly wounded, because in no other way could I have learnt the care taken of the wounded, and there was nothing Officer or private soldier required that was not provided at once, and the Medical Officers never tired in their endeavour to alleviate suffering.

I suppose our Officers will learn the value of scouting in time, but in spite of all one can say, up to this, our men seem to blunder into the middle of the enemy, and suffer accordingly.

Orange River, December 15, 1899. Str. IHAVE the honour to forward herewith reports*

on the action at Zoutspans Drift, which took place on the afternoon of the 13th instant.

For some days information had been received that a party of Boers was at Dalton's Pont, some 20 miles up the river, and a guide informed us that, from this body, another party was at Zoutspans Drift (the next above Orange River Bridge). Other parties of Boers were believed to be moving on the north bank of the river, from 20 to 30 Boers in each, all found, it is understood, from a Boer laager at Goemansberg.

In these circumstances it was deemed advisable to strengthen the ordinary patrol which proceeds daily from here to the drift. Half the company of Mounted Infantry (South-Eastern Company), under Captain Bradshaw (54 men) and a party of Remington's Guides (16 men), under Lieutenant Macfarlane, were detailed for the duty, and Captain Bradshaw was instructed to proceed to the drift to reconnoitre carefully, and to report strength and position of the enemy.

The party appears to have come upon the enemy somewhat suddenly, and from verbal accounts it appears that their attack was in the nature of a surprise. The attack was pushed on very rapidly, and, unfortunately, Captain Brad-

shaw was killed early in the action.

The Boers retired after about an hour's action: they removed their wounded in carts. wounded were, in the same manner, taken to Mr. Attewell's farm at Ramah, who treated them with the greatest kindness and attention. I sent out the next morning, 13th instant, and brought all in, including the bodies of those killed.

Native reports say that one of the Free State Commandants was killed, but these reports are

very unreliable.

Captain Bradshaw was an energetic and valuable Officer, and I deeply regret his loss.

WILD BIRD PROTECTION.

The Wild Birds Protection (County of Leicester) Order, 1900. Dated 25th January, 1900.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred on me by the Wild Birds Protection Acts, 1880 to 1896, and upon application by the County Council of the Administrative County of Leicester, I hereby make the following Order:-

I. This Order may be cited as " The Wild Birds Protection (County of Leicester) Order, 190?."

BIRDS.

Additions to the Schedule of the Act of 1880.

II. The Wild Birds Protection Act, 1880, shall apply within the Administrative County of Leicester to the following species of Wild Birds in the same manner as if those species were included in the Schedule to the Act:-

Hedge Sparrow, Spotted Fly Catcher, Pied Fly Catcher, Tree Creeper, Sand Martin, Martin,

Swallow, Wagtails, Swift.

Certain Birds protected during the whole of the Year.

III. During the period from the 1st day of August in any year, to the last day of February following, the taking or killing of the Goldfinch and Kingfisher is prohibited throughout the County of Leicester.

Eggs.

Certain Eggs protected throughout the County.

IV. The taking or destroying of the Eggs of the following species of Wild Birds is prohibited throughout the County of Leicester for a period of five years from the date of this Order:

Black Cap Warbler, Buntings, Chiff Chaff, Cole Tit, Ducks (Wild) all species, Fly Catchers, Firecrested Wren, Golden-crested Wren, Goldfinch, Lesser (Dab Chick) Grebe, Great Crested Grebe, Hawks, Buzzard, Honey Buzzard, Kestrel, Merlin, Hobby, Osprey, Kingfisher, Lesser Whitethroat, Long-tailed Tit (Bottle Tit, Jack-o'-Bo-peep)

Marsh Tit, Martins, Nightingale, Night Jar (Goatsucker, Night Hawk, or Fern Owl), Nuthatch, Owls, Rails (Land and Water), Redstart, Reed Warbler, Sandpiper (Summer Snipe), Shrikes (Butcher Birds), Sedge Warbler, Swallow, Swift, Tree Creeper, Wagtails, Willow Wren, Whitethroat, Woodpeckers, Wren, Wryneck (Cuckoo's Mate or Snake Bird).

BYE LAWS made by the County Council of the Administrative County of the Parts of Holland with respect to Locomotives in the said Administrative County.

For prohibiting or restricting the use of Locomotives on any specified highway in the county, on account of the highway being crowded or unfitted for locomotive truffic, or of the inconvenience caused to inhabitants, or of any other reasonable cause; and

For regulating the use of Locomotives, and of waggons drawn by Locomotives on any highway;

For prohibiting or restricting the use of a Locomotive on any specified bridge in the county, if the Council are satisfied that such bridge is unsuited for Locomotive traffic, or that such use would be attended with damage to the bridge or danger to the public.

1. Through ut these Bye-laws the expression "the Council" means the County Council of the Administrative County of the Parts of Holland, Lincolnshire, and the expression "the County" means the said Administrative County.

2. A person in charge of a Locomotive on any highway, shall not use the Locomotive to draw more than three unloaded waggons, with or without any waggon solely used for carrying water for such Locomotive.

Provided that this prohibition shall not apply in any case, where, on application to the Council [or so far as regards any highway situated in a municipal borough, to the Council of that borough], for permission to use a Locomotive on any specified journey to draw more than three unloaded waggons with or without any waggon solely used as aforesaid, such Council may grant such permission.

3. A person in charge of a Locomotive shall not cause or suffer the Locomotive to remain stationary on any part of a highway for more than

twenty minutes at any one time.

Provided that this Bye-law shall not be deemed to apply in any case where the stopping of the Locomotive for a longer period than twenty

(a) is necessary in order to enable the person using the Locomotive to comply with the requirements of any statutory provision or Bye-law for the time being in force for the regulation of the use of Locomotives; or

(b) is rendered necessary by accident, or other

unavoidable cause.

.4. Where for a continuous length exceeding one hundred yards a highway comprises a carriageway or cartway of a width less than sixteen feet, a person in charge of a Locomotive shall not cause or suffer the Locomotive to enter upon the carriageway or cartway unless and until-

(a) he shall have ascertained that throughout the length aforesaid the carriageway or cart-

3 way is clear of vehicles; and

(b) a person accompanying the Locomotive shall have preceded the Locomotive to a sufficient distance to warn the drivers of vehicles of the approach of the Locomotive.

5. A person in charge of a Locomotive shall not cause or suffer the Locomotive to remain

stationary on any highway so that any wheel of the Locomotive rests on any bridge, arch or culvert, or within ten feet from the face of the abutment of any bridge, arch or culvert.

Provided that this prohibition shall not be deemed to apply in any case—

(a) where, in pursuance of the Statutory provision in that behalf, a Locomotive may be required to be instantly stopped; or

(b) when the stopping of a Locomotive may be rendered necessary by accident, or other un-

avoidable cause.

6. A person in charge of a Locomotive shall not use the Locomotive on any of the bridges of which the description appears in the schedule hereunto appended, and which are bridges whereon the use of Locomotives is hereby prohibited.
