**T**HE following Despatches have been received by the Secretary of State for War:—

From the General Officer Commanding in China and Hong Kong to the Secretary of State for War.

*Sir, Hong Kong, July 5, 1900.*

I HAVE the honour to forward herewith a despatch received by me to-day from Major F. Morris, 2nd Battalion Royal Welsh Fusiliers, by which it would appear that his small force was fortunate enough to have been the means of at any rate assisting to open out the relief of Tientsin.

The reason this despatch was addressed direct to me was no doubt the fact that Major Morris had been detailed by me to command the force sent from Hong Kong, and it was only after he had left Hong Kong, and when all telegraphic communication with the north was interrupted, that I learnt that Colonel Dorward had been appointed to the command. Colonel Dorward had not joined at the time this despatch was written.

From what I learn, both Her Majesty's ship "Terrible," in which Major Morris and this force went up, and the transport in which the remainder left, encountered such severe weather as to delay their arrival at Taku; Her Majesty's ship "Terrible," though leaving Hong Kong a day later than the hired transport, arriving first at Taku. As troops were urgently needed, Major Morris started with his party, leaving the rest of the force sent by me to follow as soon as they landed. I learn, from unofficial sources, that these latter joined him later on, and the whole are now under the command of Brigadier-General Dorward.

It will, I think, be a source of satisfaction to you to know that the arrival of a British force enabled the relief to be successfully carried out.

From Major F. Morris, Royal Welsh Fusiliers, Commanding North China Field Force, to the General Officer Commanding, Hong Kong.

*Sir, Tientsin, June 24, 1900.*

I HAVE the honour to make the following report with reference to the relief of Tientsin:—

On 21st June I arrived in Her Majesty's ship "Terrible" at Tonku at 5 A.M., with details as per

margin,\* and left by train a few hours later for the front. I was joined by Captain Craddock, R.N., Royal Welsh Fusiliers, Officers 7, rank and file 328.

with the Naval Brigade. We proceeded to Chunlienshang Station, our advance being greatly retarded owing to the two leading trucks being derailed and overturned at some points, and also through having to repair the line where the sleepers had been burned. At Chunlienshang we encamped for the night, and found a combined force of Russians and United States Marines,† who, on the previous day, had attempted to enter Tientsin, but had been repulsed with the loss of their gun. Major Waller, in command of the United States Marines, informed me that the position was too strong to take without guns, I, therefore, in consultation with Captain Craddock, R.N., agreed that it was advisable to delay a day till a Russian Field Battery should arrive. In the meantime my force was occupied in clearing the line of communications of Boxers and other rebels; this was carried out completely, and a base for stores, &c., established at a place 10 miles west of Tientsin, where the line was so much destroyed that it was impossible for the train to advance further.

On 28rd June a Russian force‡ joined the British force, the latter consisting of seven Officers and 287 non-commissioned officers and men of the Royal Welsh Fusiliers, under myself, and the Naval Brigade, under Captain Craddock, R.N., and advanced to the attack of Tientsin at 4 A.M. The whole advanced along the railway line, the Russians were on the right, and the British and Americans on the left.

At a distance of about 6 miles from Tientsin the attack was opened and a heavy fire returned by the enemy. From this point the Russians made the railway station their objective, and I was ordered by the Russian General in command to diverge, and in conjunction with the Naval Brigade and American Marines, attack the Military School. For about 5 miles the force fought its

way under a very heavy rifle fire ; many villages were rushed and taken at the point of the bayonet. The Military School was not strongly held, and was easily cleared of the enemy, who retreated out of it, leaving 25 killed and wounded. This school was the enemy's strongest position holding the European settlement, the relief of which was effected at 1 P.M., the inhabitants pouring out of their entrenchments to greet our soldiers and sailors as they crossed the river. I wish to testify to the great steadiness of my force under a very heavy fire and the heroic manner in which the various villages were assaulted and the enemy driven out. I attribute my casualties being small to the fact that the men availed themselves of cover on every possible occasion.

The following are my casualties :—

I wish to bring to your notice the names of the following Officers for favourable consideration :—

Captain J. H. Gwynne, Royal Welsh Fusiliers. This Officer has done most excellent work, and was conspicuous in leading some of the principal attacks on the various villages.

Lieutenant F. J. Walwyn, Royal Welsh Fusiliers. This Officer managed, under great difficulties, to make local arrangements to bring up the reserve ammunition into the firing line and assisted in saving the killed and wounded from falling into the hands of the enemy.

Lieutenant O. S. Flower, Royal Welsh Fusiliers, afforded me valuable assistance as Staff Officer.

Major Watson, Royal Army Medical Corps, performed excellent work under great difficulties.

In forwarding this despatch, I should like to point out the difficulties under which I laboured.

The whole of my stores, reserve ammunition, stretchers and medical comforts were on board the chartered steamer "Hansing," which did not arrive till four days after me, so that I had to borrow ammunition and food in small quantities from the Royal Navy at different times.

There is no transport of any kind available, except a few odd mules and donkeys found in the country, but they have no saddlery or gear.

I am now organizing a company of Mounted Infantry, under Lieutenant Walwyn, 100 strong. The ponies and saddlery are provided by the civilians in Tientsin.

I find that the number of Officers under my command is inadequate, and I request that you will send me four more for duty with the present detachment, and one more complete company of 100 men, to include as many men as possible who have been through a course of Mounted Infantry.

From the General Officer Commanding North China British Field Force to the Secretary of State for War.

SIR, Tientsin, July 11, 1900.

I HAVE the honour to submit the following report on the action which took place near here on the 9th instant :—

2. At 3 A.M. on 9th July a combined force of Japanese, Russian, American, and British troops

moved out from the Taku Gate at the southern end of the Foreign Settlements with the object of clearing the Chinese Imperial troops and Boxers and their guns from the villages south of the Mud Parapet and also from the Western Arsenal.

3. The force consisted of 1,000 Japanese, including three troops of Cavalry, a battery of Mountain Artillery, and a party of Engineers, under General Fukushima, and of 950 British,\* 400 Russian, and 200 American troops under my command.

4. The whole force, with the exception of the Americans, who advanced on the Arsenal along the Mud Parapet, proceeded south by the main road for one and a half miles to the village of Tung Lou ; there the force turned to the west and half a mile further on deployed, when opposition from the enemy was met with, the Japanese being on the left and the British troops on the right. The Russians acted as reserve to the British Column.

5. Four guns, that for several days had annoyed the Settlements by their fire from the village of Hei-niu-Chuang, were quickly silenced and captured, and the Japanese Cavalry were able to execute three successful charges among a considerable body of flying enemy, who had made but slight resistance to our attack.

6. The line then wheeled to the right and attacked the Western Arsenal.

7. The Japanese Engineers had to make a bridge across a small stream before the Artillery could advance. The bridge was made under cover of our combined Artillery fire, slowly replied to by the enemy's guns left at the Arsenal.

8. At 7.30 A.M. the Artillery crossed the stream and took up positions on the further side ; the remainder of the force followed, the left of the line resting on the road leading to the Arsenal and the city. The whole of the country to the west of the road had been flooded by the enemy and rendered impassable for troops.

9. The Arsenal was quickly captured by a rush of the Japanese and Americans, and was entered at 9 A.M. by the combined forces, which also spread along the Mud Parapet to the west. Artillery was brought up close to the Parapet and a heavy fire opened on the city, which was answered with vigour by the enemy.

10. It had been intended to leave a force to prevent the reoccupation of the Arsenal by the enemy, but, owing to its gutted condition and exposed position, it was considered untenable. The houses surrounding it, which might give cover to guns or snipers, were burned, and the bridge leading to the city from the south destroyed.

11. The combined forces then returned along the Mud Parapet to the Settlements.

12. The success of the attack has relieved our batteries in the British Settlement from both direct and enfilade fire to which they had been exposed and has also diminished the number of guns bombarding the Settlements.

13. The most arduous work in the day was done by the Chinese Regiment, who, as escort to the guns, worked indefatigably in getting them over broken and swampy country.

14. The casualties in the British Force were—1 private Royal Welsh Fusiliers, 1 private Royal Marine Light Infantry, and 1 Chinese hospital attendant, killed ; 3 privates Royal Welsh Fusiliers, 1 private Chinese Regiment, and 1 Chinese

hospital attendant, wounded. The Americans and Russians had no casualties. The Japanese lost 50 killed and wounded.

15. The Chinese lost 350 killed and the number of their wounded must have been considerable. As a result of the action, General Nieh, one of the best of the Chinese generals, is reported to have been killed or to have committed suicide.

From the General Officer Commanding British Forces, Tientsin, to the Secretary of State for War.

SIR, Tientsin, July 19, 1900.

ON the afternoon of the 11th instant I arranged with General Fukushima, Commanding the Japanese Forces, to carry out as soon as possible the capture of Tientsin City. Owing to our heavy losses during the daily bombardment of the Settlements we considered this movement necessary.

2. The Russian General was approached on the subject and said he would co-operate in the movement by an attack on the Chinese batteries and fort to the north-east of the city. He desired to get his pontoon train in readiness and said that as soon as he had done so he would give me notice of his readiness to move. His Staff Officer gave me that notice at 5 p.m. on the 12th instant, and it was arranged that the Russian Forces, who had the longer march, should move in time to deliver their attack on the batteries about 10 A.M. on the following day and that the Japanese-British Force should deliver their attack on the city as early as possible, in order to attract the bulk of the Chinese troops to their side and so facilitate the capture of the batteries by the Russians.

3. I then called on Colonel de Pelacot, Commanding the French Forces, and Colonel Meade, Commanding the American Forces, and together with them visited General Fukushima to discuss the plan of operations.

4. It was decided that the Allied Forces would parade at 3 A.M. and move in three columns—about 500 yards apart—on the Western Arsenal.

5. The French force 900 strong was to form the right column and, crossing the Mud Parapet in the British Extra Concession, was to move on the south side of it and under its cover direct on the Arsenal, timing its movement to agree with that of the other columns. Two companies were detailed to advance from the French Settlement and clear the houses between it and the city of troops. They were unable, however, in the face of a heavy fire to make much headway.

6. The Japanese column 1,500 strong under General Fukushima was to move out from the Settlement by the Race Course Gate at 3.30 A.M. and move parallel to the Mud Parapet about 500 yards from it.

7. The left column, consisting of 800 British troops (500 military and 300 naval), 900 Americans and 30 Austrians, moved out of the Taku Gate at 3.30 A.M. under my command and marched parallel to the Japanese column and about 500 yards from them. About 500 yards on the left of the left column was the Japanese Cavalry 150 strong.

8. The left column was somewhat delayed in clearing villages of small parties of the enemy, and its head arrived at the road leading to the Arsenal and South Gate of the city about a quarter of a mile behind the head of the Japanese column.

9. The French column suffered a check at a bridge in the Mud Parapet about a quarter of a mile from the Arsenal, in crossing over which their troops were exposed to fire. The Arsenal was cleared of the enemy principally through the agency of the Japanese troops.

10. The advanced British troops, consisting of the detachment 2nd Battalion Royal Welsh Fusiliers, and the American Marines moved forward and lined the Mud Parapet west of the Arsenal, the 9th American Infantry being also brought forward under the parapet as support. The reserve, consisting of two companies Chinese Regiment and the Naval Brigade, were halted about 2,500 yards from the city and suffered some loss from long-range fire.

11. All the artillery of the combined force, consisting of mountain guns with the exception of three 3.2-inch guns belonging to the Americans, formed up a short distance south of the Mud Parapet and bombarded the city (5.30 A.M.).

12. One 4-inch gun three 12-pr. and a few 9-pr. and 6-pr., worked by the Navy from a position in the British Extra Concession, did excellent service in keeping down the fire from the city walls.

13. After about an hour's bombardment it was decided to attack. The French were to be on the right, the Japanese in the centre, and the British on the left, the centre of the attack being the south gate. Owing to the attack being pushed on somewhat too hurriedly in the centre the Fusiliers and American Marines had to move forward rather too quickly under a heavy fire to get into their position on the Japanese left (7.15 A.M.).

14. General Fukushima had asked me to give some support to the left of his line during the attack and the 9th American Infantry was directed by me to give this support and also to support the attack of the Fusiliers and Marines.

15. When the 9th regiment had crossed the Mud Parapet, a body of men estimated at 1,500 strong, made up of cavalry and infantry, appeared about 2,500 yards away from our extreme left. I directed the detachment of the Hong Kong Regiment, who up to this time had been acting as escort to the guns, to take up a favourable position at a bend in the Mud Parapet about one mile from the Arsenal to meet any attack. They had no difficulty in repulsing this threatened attack with the aid of two Maxim guns sent to assist them as soon as possible.

16. The Japanese attack extended considerably more to the left than had been intended, so that the Fusiliers and Marines were pushed more to the left than had been contemplated and brought close to heavy enfilade fire from the suburbs south of the south-west corner of the city. They faced that fire in the steadiest way, taking up a position under fairly good cover, and during the whole day prevented a large body of the enemy from making any forward movement.

17. Meanwhile seven or eight guns of the enemy's artillery were replying to our artillery fire from a fort about  $1\frac{1}{4}$  miles west of the West Gate of the city.

18. The reserves were ordered up to take cover under the Mud Parapet and the whole of the artillery moved inside the parapet and took up the best positions obtainable to continue the bombardment.

19. Moving back from the Hong Kong Regiment position I could see nothing of the 9th American Infantry, but when I reached the Arsenal I saw that only a few Japanese troops were extended on the right of the road, and that the French troops were all in compact bodies in

the villages on the road leading to the south gate behind the Japanese, from which I judged that the fire on the right had been so heavy that the French attacking line could not be formed.

20. At the Arsenal I met the Acting Adjutant of the 9th Regiment, who said he had been sent back with news that his regiment were in a very exposed position, which from his description I made out to be near the French settlement, and that they had lost heavily, their Colonel amongst others being mortally wounded. He said he had been ordered to ask for reinforcements, and I directed 100 men of the Naval Brigade under Lieutenant Phillimore, R.N., to proceed to their assistance.

21. I signalled in to Lieutenant-Colonel Bower, who was in command of the forces left in the Settlement, to send me out two more companies of the Chinese Regiment with all the stretchers he could collect and on their arrival sent the stretchers forward carried by the men of the regiment under Major Pereira. Major Pereira made two trips out to the American position and brought back many of their wounded under a very heavy fire, losing several men and being himself wounded. He told me on returning from his second trip that the Americans and the men of the Naval Brigade had got into a fairly safe position, so I decided to leave them there till nightfall. They detained a considerable body of the enemy in front of them and prevented any attack being made on the right flank of the Japanese.

22. Major Pereira also informed me that the Americans were very badly off for ammunition, so I directed Captain Ollivant and a party of the Chinese Regiment to take a further supply to them. While performing this service I regret to say that Captain Ollivant was killed.

23. A Japanese Staff Officer afterwards told me that he had seen the 9th Regiment moving along the right rear of the Japanese attack in column of fours, and that he was afraid they must have suffered heavy loss.

24. The naval guns were all this time making splendid practice keeping down the fire from the city walls, and we were anxiously waiting for the sound of the explosion which would tell that the Japanese sappers had reached the city gate and blown it in. Shortly after 1 P.M. I received the following note from the Japanese Chief Staff Officer:—

"Mon General. Nos soldats sont déjà entrés dans la cité. Je vous prie donc de faire cesser le feu de vos canons immédiatement.

ASKI, Lieutenant-Colonel."

25. Orders were accordingly given for the cessation of all artillery fire and the advance of all our troops to support the assault on the city. The advancing troops were met with a very heavy fire from the walls, which continued to increase in intensity, and it soon became apparent that the Japanese troops had not entered the city. The troops were then forced to take cover close to the canal round the city. I shortly afterwards heard from the Japanese General that he had been misinformed and that his troops had not entered the city.

26. Orders were sent for all guns to open fire again and owing to the beautiful practice of the naval guns very little loss was suffered by the troops in the advanced trenches.

27. Towards evening the 1,500 troops on the left flank again advanced and began preparing a long line of shelter trenches. I received a request from General Fukushima asking me if I could undertake arrangements for the protection of his troops and the French, while in their

advanced positions, from attack from the left flank or rear, as his Cavalry had informed him that bodies of the enemy were threatening us from those directions.

28. The naval guns were then requested to direct their whole fire on the enemy facing the extreme left of our position and, under cover of that fire and of volleys from the detachment, Hong Kong Regiment, directed on the various points from which the enemy were harassing the retirement, the Fusiliers and American Marines were withdrawn with very slight loss and formed up behind the Mud Parapet. The movement reflected great credit on Colonel Meade, commanding the Marines, and Captain Gwynne, commanding the Fusiliers.

29. The more delicate manœuvre of withdrawing the 9th American Infantry and the Company of the Naval Brigade had then to be undertaken. The naval guns were directed to sweep the barriers constructed along the fringe of houses between the French Settlement and the city from which the fire on the American troops proceeded. The American troops themselves were only about 300 yards from this fringe and there was great danger of the fire from the naval guns injuring them as well as the enemy. The dead and wounded, of which the Americans had still a considerable number with them, were brought back with the assistance of the Company of the Naval Brigade, and shortly afterwards the 9th Regiment arrived at the Mud Parapet in safety. I would specially bring to notice the conduct of Major Jesse Lee during the retirement; in him the regiment possesses an Officer of exceptional merit.

30. The whole force is under the greatest obligation to Captain Bayly and Lieutenant Drummond, Royal Navy, for their working of the naval guns.

31. After posting troops to secure our flank and rear from attack, the troops turned in for the night, during which there was some rain.

32. About 3 A.M. next day the Japanese sappers, crossing the canal by a bridge they had made during the night, blew in the South Gate and in less than an hour, after some desultory street fighting, the city was in our possession.

33. The British force seized a large number of junks and one small steamer on the canal north of the city, which will be useful when we advance on Peking, and also the eight guns which had kept up a steady fire on our artillery throughout the previous day.

34. News was then received that the Russian attack on the other side of the city had been delayed by unforeseen causes, but when made had proved very successful, resulting in the complete rout of the Chinese and the capture of 11 guns; the Russian loss was about 120 killed and wounded.

35. The losses of the Allied Forces in the attack on the South Gate were as follows:—

Royal Marine Light Infantry.—Killed, Captain Lloyd; slightly wounded, Major Luke; wounded, 16 men.

Royal Navy.—Slightly wounded, Lieutenant Field; killed, 5 men; wounded, 19 men.

Royal Welsh Fusiliers.—Killed, 5 men; wounded, 12 men.

Hong Kong Regiment.—Wounded, 8 men, of whom 1 afterwards died.

Hong Kong Companies, Royal Artillery.—Killed, 2 men; wounded, 5 men.

Chinese Regiment.—Killed, Captain Ollivant; slightly wounded, Major Pereira and 1 European non-commissioned Officer; killed, 3 men; wounded, 13 men, of whom 1 afterwards died.



American Forces, 9th Infantry.—Colonel Liscum and 22 men killed, 3 Officers, and 70 men wounded. Marines 5 killed and 27 wounded.

French Forces.—110 killed and wounded.

Japanese Forces.—400 killed and wounded.

Austrians.—5 wounded. The Austrians were my personal escort during the greater part of the day and were sent forward to enter the city with the advanced troops.

36. On returning to the Settlement it was found that 7 men of the Royal Welsh Fusiliers had been wounded, and 1 American killed, and 4 wounded by a shell at the railway station on the 13th instant.

37. Among many instances of personal bravery in the action, I would specially bring to notice the conduct of First Lieutenant Smedley D. Butler, United States Marine Corps, in bringing in a wounded man from the front under heavy and accurate fire. Lieutenant Butler was wounded while so doing, and was himself carried out of the firing line by the Adjutant, First Lieutenant Henry Leonard, who, I regret to say, was dangerously wounded in so doing.

38. Captain Lawton, Acting Adjutant of the 9th Regiment, brought me news of their condition under a heavy fire and, when returning with the reinforcements to guide them to his regiment, was severely wounded.

39. The Royal Welsh Fusiliers were well handled throughout the day by Captain Gwynne; they were very careful of their ammunition and wasted less than any other body of troops on the ground.

40. No. 5653 Private Doodson of the Royal Welsh Fusiliers volunteered to carry back to medical assistance—across 300 yards of open and fire-swept space—Lance-Sergeant Pearce of the same regiment, who was severely wounded; this he successfully accomplished and afterwards brought back a severely wounded Japanese soldier from the advanced trenches to medical assistance and safety.

41. No. 4617 Private Crew of the Royal Welsh Fusiliers attempted to carry back Private Bonner over the same ground; Private Bonner was hit twice during the attempt and Private Crew was shot dead.

42. I would also bring to notice the brave and collected conduct of No. 4575 Sergeant C. W. Taylor of the same regiment, throughout the day. He was prominent in bringing in the wounded men and was generally a splendid example to the half company of which he was in charge.

43. Captain Watson of the Chinese Regiment led his men well and the two companies with him were among the first troops to enter the city. He has specially brought to my notice the conduct of No. 94 Sergeant Gi-Dien-Kwee, who was in command of a half company without any European.

44. The artillery under Major St. John were very well handled and managed to make their ammunition last considerably longer than the artillery of the other nations did. As they were firing black powder, they were at a distinct disadvantage with the artillery of the enemy, which was using smokeless powder, thus rendering the exact location of their guns very difficult. Major St. John has specially brought to my notice the coolness and accuracy of fire of No. 353, Havildar Roshan Khan, who succeeded in putting out of action in four rounds an enemy's gun which had done us much damage.

45. The Naval Brigade under Captain Burke, R.N., had their full share of the fighting in the centre and right of the position and had the

honour of being among the first troops to enter the city. The Companies were splendidly led by Commander Beatty and Lieutenant Phillimore, and nothing could have been finer than their spirit and conduct. I have already brought to notice the exceptionally fine work done by Captain Bayly and Lieutenant Drummond, R.N., and the naval guns. I received at all times the most ready and unquestioning assistance from Captain Burke.

46. The medical arrangements for the treatment, care and removal of the wounded reflected great credit on Major Watson, R.A.M.C., and his subordinates. Not only were those arrangements sufficient for the British wounded, but he was also able to take medical charge of American, French and Japanese patients and to send them into hospital. Captain Prynn, R.A.M.C., and Assistant-Surgeon Pullen, S.M.D., were in the advanced fighting line all day dressing cases under fire. They are both valuable Officers, always cool and collected.

THE following Despatch has been received by the Secretary of State for India from Lieutenant-General Sir Alfred Gaselee, K.C.B., Commanding the British Contingent, China Expeditionary Force:—

Despatch from Sir A. Gaselee, General Officer Commanding China Expeditionary Force, dated Peking, 19th August, 1900.

No. 36 S. *Head-Quarters,  
China Expeditionary Force, Peking,  
August 19, 1900.*

NOW that the first and paramount duty of relieving the Legations has been successfully performed, I am in a position to address to your Lordship a preliminary Despatch, describing the operations of the British forces in Northern China from the 27th July, the date I arrived at Tientsin, to the 14th August, the date on which we entered Peking.

2. On my arrival at Tientsin I at once put myself into communication with the General Officers commanding the American and Japanese forces, and soon came to a satisfactory understanding with them. We decided to collectively impress upon the Allied Commanders the absolute necessity of pressing forward towards Peking at the earliest possible moment, and happily our views were eventually accepted.

At a conference held on the 3rd August it was arranged to commence the advance on the 4th, with approximately 20,000 men, viz.:—

10,000 Japanese with 24 guns.  
4,000 Russians with 16 guns.  
3,000 British with 12 guns.  
2,000 Americans with 6 guns.  
800 French with 12 guns.  
200 Germans.  
100 Austrians and Italians.

20,100 with 70 guns.

3. The Chinese were believed to occupy a strongly intrenched position near Pei-tsang, astride the Pei-ho. It was decided to force this position and push on to Yang-tsun, so as to secure the passage of the river at that important strategical point. The general idea was that the Japanese, British, and Americans should operate along the

right bank of the river, the other allies along the left bank. It was then settled in direct communication with General Chaffee, United States Army, and General Yamaguchi, Japanese Army, that, as regards the left attack, i.e., that on the right bank of the river, the movement should be of a turning nature along the embankment marked A.....B in the attached sketch, the Japanese leading, followed in succession by the British and Americans. The turning movement to commence at 2 A.M. on the 5th.

4. In pursuance of the above agreement, the British troops marginally noted\* moved from Tien-tsin to Hsi-ku on the afternoon of the 4th and bivouacked in the area marked C. Annexure A (Field Force Order No. 140) shows the arrangements for the march. The British were followed by the Americans and Japanese, who bivouacked at the points marked D and E.

5. As arranged, in the early hours of the 5th instant, the turning movement commenced. At daybreak the column came under a heavy fire from the right front and the action began with a vigorous forward movement of the Japanese against the entrenchments, supported on the right by the British. The brunt of the action fell on the Japanese, who attacked and stormed line after line in the most gallant manner. Our troops, in consequence of their position, scarcely fired a shot, and I readily accord to the Japanese the whole credit of the victory. Their loss was, I understand, about 300 killed and wounded, while ours was only 25 (*vide* Annexure B). The Chinese rout was complete, and before noon they had entirely disappeared, having fled to the left bank of the river. The other allied forces were scarcely engaged at all and practically had no loss.

6. After the victory at Pei-tsang we pushed on for a mile or two along the right bank, but, being stopped by inundations, were compelled to return to Pei-tsang, and cross over to the right (*sic*) bank, where we bivouacked for the night, covered by a strong outpost, two or three miles in advance.

7. On the 6th instant the whole of the allied forces marched on Yang-tsun by the right bank, with the exception of about 6,000 Japanese, who continued to advance by the left bank. Owing to the direction taken by the several columns the British troops were leading along the direct road when we came in sight of Yang-tsun, the Americans being on our right flank. The enemy's main position was apparently along the railway embankment, with one flank resting on a village close to the Pei-ho railway bridge. It was at once arranged to attack this position with one Russian battalion on the left, the British troops in the centre, and the Americans on the right, while the 1st Bengal Lancers covered the extreme right flank. I thereupon directed the 1st Sikh Infantry to extend for attack, supported by the Royal Welsh Fusiliers, and the 24th Punjab Infantry, the advance to be covered by the fire of No. 12 Battery Royal Field Artillery. The remainder of our troops were too far in rear to be utilized at the moment. The advance to attack was made in beautiful order over about 5,000 yards of level plain, covered with high crops.

At about half this distance the troops came under a hot shell and musketry fire, nevertheless, owing to the open order in which we worked, the British loss was comparatively small. The further advance was a rapid one, and the embankment was carried by a rush of the 1st Sikh Infantry and 24th Punjab Infantry. The Welsh Fusiliers, owing to the conformation of the ground, were rather wedged out of the assaulting line. This practically ended the fight, as the Chinese fled precipitately in all directions. The enemy's guns were in a retired position and thus escaped capture. Our loss on this occasion was as shown in Annexure C.

8. On the 7th instant the allies halted to bring up supplies, and on the 8th the movement was continued. On the 9th, at Ho-hsi-wu, a squadron of the 1st Bengal Lancers caught up some retreating Tartar cavalry, inflicting on them heavy loss, and on the 12th Tung-chao was occupied without opposition. At a conference held on that day it was decided to send forward strong reconnoitring forces on the 13th, to concentrate on a line about five miles from Peking on the 14th, and to attack on the 15th. The positions of the several forces were assigned, the British taking the extreme left. On the 14th, however, owing to the premature advance of a battalion of one of the allied forces, the intended concentration was abandoned, and the troops all hurried forward to assault the city of Peking.

9. I have above endeavoured to give a connected account of the military operations preceding the attack on Peking, and I will now try to briefly relate what occurred on the 14th, so far as Her Majesty's troops are concerned. Our forces on the night of the 13th were concentrated on the river south-east of Tung-chao, about 15 miles from Peking, with two guns, the 1st Bengal Lancers and the 7th Bengal Infantry about nine miles in advance as an observation force. At 2.30 A.M. on the 14th, hearing heavy firing in the direction of Peking, I caused the rouse to be sounded and marched without delay towards the supposed scene of action. About 7 A.M. I reached the point held by my advanced force, and at once pushed on with the troops there available, directing the main body to follow after an hour's rest. About noon I got into touch with the Americans, who were on the south bank of the canal, and as they and the French were preparing to assault the Tung Tien Gate, I decided to push straight on and assault the south-east gate of the Chinese city, Sha-chia-men. Here I met with no opposition, and about 1 P.M. the British troops passed through the city wall. I then ordered the 1st Bengal Lancers and the 24th Punjab Infantry to march straight to the Temple of Heaven Park, which I wished to secure as a camping ground, and also as a protection to my left and rear, while with the rest of my available troops I pushed on through streets and alleys towards the water gate of the Tartar City, a point which I had learnt from a cypher message from Sir C. Macdonald would probably be the most vulnerable. Our troops were much exhausted by the long march and intense heat, and were much scattered in groups, but they struggled gamely on without attempting to reply to the desultory and ineffective fire of the enemy. At a few minutes before 3 P.M., I, with a few officers of my staff and about 70 men of the 1st Sikhs and 7th Bengal Infantry, reached a point opposite the water gate. The British flag was still flying on that portion of the Tartar wall which we knew the Legations had occupied, but an ominous silence made us fear that the worst had occurred, and that the flag was only a ruse to lure us on;

when suddenly, to our great relief, we saw a flag signal being made, "Come up sluice street by water gate." Our small party at once rushed across the almost dry canal, and entered into the Legation zone through the water gate under the Tartar wall. As we crossed a hail of ill-aimed fire was directed on us from the Hata-Men gate, but not a man was touched, and at 3 p.m. Her Majesty's troops had the supreme gratification of finding they were the first to relieve the sorely pressed beleaguered garrison.

10. Our loss\* during these operations was quite insignificant, which may be attributed to the fact that the enemy had never expected attack from this quarter, and had concentrated their defence on the eastern wall of the Tartar city, where the resistance was, I understand, of a most obstinate description.

11. The operations I have described have, happily, not been attended with the loss that might have been expected; nevertheless, the troops engaged have been subjected to a severe strain on account of the intense heat, the want of good water, the heavy mud or dust which characterises the roads in this country, and, above all, the want of sufficient rest. The patient endurance and ardour of the troops has, however, more than compensated for these difficulties, and I am proud of the manner in which Her Majesty's British and Indian troops have acquitted themselves.

12. In conclusion, I do not propose in this despatch to bring specially to your Lordship's notice the services rendered by many Officers of this force, but I take the opportunity of mentioning the names of those few who had a special opportunity of distinguishing themselves at the action of Yang-tsun. They are:—

Major T. E. Scott, D.S.O., 1st Sikh Infantry (attached).

Lieutenant W. F. Bainbridge, 1st Sikh Infantry.

Captain J. H. Gwynne, Royal Welsh Fusiliers.

No. 4995, Private Jackson, Royal Welsh Fusiliers, whose commanding officer reports that "as some shells from one of the batteries engaged were taking our troops and the Americans in reverse, he volunteered to get up on the embankment and tried to communicate with the battery." While doing so, he was exposed to fire from both sides.

I would also like to mention the names of two American Officers who gallantly supported our fighting line, viz.:—

China Expeditionary Force Orders, Tientsin, 4th August, 1900,

140. Movements.—The enemy is in position in the direction of Pei-Tsang on both banks of the Pei-Ho. The position is believed to be entrenched with outposts thrown forward.

(ii.) The Russian, French, and German Forces will operate on the left bank of the River Pei-Ho,

the British, Americans, and Japanese on the right bank.

(iii.) The British Forces will march to Hsi-Ku to-day, where they will bivouac for the night.

(iv.) The British Forces will march in the order given below:—

Detachment Royal Engineers.

One Field Troop 1st Bengal Lancers.

Head-Quarters Staff of Division.

One half Company 1st Sikhs (General Officer Commanding's escort).

(v.) The route will be by the Temperance Hall on the Taku road, through the Chinese City entering by the South Gate and over the Iron Bridge to Hsi-Ku. The road to be followed will be shown by the Deputy-Assistant Quartermaster-General for Intelligence, who will head the column.

(vi.) The troops will keep closed up as much as possible, water bottles are to be filled with boiled water or tea, and all mussocks filled with good water.

(vii.) The head of the column will leave the Temperance Hall at 2.30 p.m. Officers commanding units will hold their units in readiness to join the line of march in the order detailed above. No interval between units.

(viii.) Camp colour men of all units and one officer or non-commissioned Officer per unit will accompany the advance guard.

(ix.) No fires or cooking will be allowed in bivouac to-night.

(NOTE.—All units not mentioned in paragraph iv had marched to Hsi-Ku the previous evening.)
