WHEREAS by the Medical Act, 1886, it is provided (amongst other things) that His Majesty may from time to time by Order in Council declare that the second part of the said Act shall be deemed on and after a day to be named in such Order, to apply to any foreign country which in His Majesty's opinion affords to the medical practitioners of the United Kingdom such privileges of practising in the said foreign country as to His Majesty may seem just, and from and after the day named in such Order in Council such foreign country shall be deemed to be a foreign country to which the said Act applies, within the meaning of the second part thereof, and that until such Order in Council has been made in respect of any foreign country the said second part of the said Act shall not be deemed to apply to any such country.

And whereas the Kingdom of Italy affords, in His Majesty's opinion, to the registered medical practitioners of the United Kingdom such privileges of practising in Italy as to His Majesty

seems just.

Now, therefore, His Majesty doth hereby, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, order, direct, and declare that the second part of the Medical Act, 1886, shall be deemed to apply to the Kingdom of Italy.

2. The said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County shall be held at Manchester.

3. The Court at the said Spring Assizes at Manchester shall have jurisdiction to try any prisoner committed in the said Spring Assize County who may be brought before it, and shall have the same powers with respect to the trial of and passing sentence upon such prisoner as a Court of Oyer and Terminer and Gaol Delivery would have had at the Assizes in the county where, but for the said Spring Assizes Act, 1879, such prisoner would have been tried.

The provision of Section three of the Spring Assizes Act, 1879, shall apply to the execution of any capital centence passed at such Assizes as herein men ioned; provided that the expression in the said section "the Sheriff of the county for which such Assizes were held" shall mean the Sheriff of the county in which the prisoner so sentenced would have been tried if the Spring Assizes Act, 1879, had not been passed.

4. The Sheriff of the County of Lancaster shall act for the purpose of the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County.

5. The precepts of the Judges to the said

5. The precepts of the Judges to the said Sheriff shall direct him to summon the Grand Jurors and Petty Jurors from the County of Lancaster.

6. The Gaol Delivery precept of the Judges to the said Sheriff shall direct him to cause the prisoners from all the prisons in the said Spring Assize County who under the provisions of this Order will have to be tried at Manchester, to be brought there, and the Sheriff shall cause such prisoners to be brought accordingly without any Writ of Habeas Corpus.

All Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Coroners, Escheators, Stewards, Bailiffs, Gaolers, Constables, Officers, and persons having authority and being under an obligation to attend the Assizes for either Division comprised in the said Spring Assize County, or to certify, transmit, or deliver to the Court of Assize, or the proper officer thereof, any indictment, inquisition, recognizance, examination, deposition, or document, shall have the same authority, and be under the

8. In all indictments and presentments at the said Spring Assizes the venue laid in the margin thereof shall, in addition to the name of the county where the offence is charged to have been committed, contain the words "Spring Assize

Any person who after the date of this Order, and before the said Spring Assizes, enters into a recognizance to appear and prosecute, or give evidence, or to appear and answer before a Court of Oyer and Terminer or General Gaol Delivery, to be holden for either of the Divisions constituting the said Spring Assize County, shall be bound to attend at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County.

10. In all cases in which the like recognizances have been entered into in respect of any offence committed in either of the Divisions constituting the said Spring Assize County prior to the making of this Order, such recognizances shall be deemed to have been entered into for attendance at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County, and every person bound by such re-cognizance shall be bound to appear at such lastmentioned Spring Assizes or forfeit his recog-

Ten days before the day fixed for the opening of the Commission at Manchester, a list of the prisoners to be removed for trial at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County, so far as the same list can then be made out, shall, together with a short statement of the offences with which they are charged, be transmitted by the Gaoler of each prison in which such prisoners may be, to the Sheriff of the County of Lancaster, and the said Sheriff shall cause to be inserted in one or more newspapers in the Spring Assize County the said list and statement, and a notice that the persons bound by recognizances to appear and prosecute or give evidence for or against the prisoners so removed shall appear and prosecute and give evidence at Manchester.

It shall be lawful for the Gaoler of the Gaol in which prisoners who are to take their trial at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County shall be in custody, three days before the day upon which the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County are appointed to be held, to send, without any Writ of Habeas Corpus, such prisoners to His Majesty's Gaol at Strangeways, Manchester, in the county of Lancaster, for the purposes of their trial, and to take all proper steps for their transmission to the said Gaol, and their maintenance by the way, and the Gaoler of the said Gaol shall receive such prisoners into his charge and custody on their arrival, and shall keep and maintain them in the said Gaol until they are either ordered to be discharged or remanded by proper authority, or until they shall have been tried and sentenced, and proper arrangements have been made for their being sent back to the prison from which they were sent for trial, or sent to any other prison which has been duly appointed as an alternative for such prison. If, however, the said Gaol has itself been duly appointed as an alternative prison for the prison from which such prisoners were sent to trial, the Governor of the said Gaol shall, subject to the orders of the Secretary of State, keep and maintain in the said of the County of York and the County of the

Where any person is committed for trial, or is bound by any recognizance to appear and answer, in the said Spring Assize County, any Judge of the High Court of Justice, or the committing Justice or Justices, or any two of the Justices of the county or place from which he is committed or admitted to bail, may, upon the application of such person, direct the Treasurer of the county or place where such person was committed, or entered into any recog-nizance to appear and answer as aforesaid, to advance to such person a sum not exceeding 201. to enable him to defray the travelling expenses of such of his witnesses as may have been bound by recognizances to appear on his behalf, and the Treasurer shall advance such sum, and shall deduct it out of the amount ultimately allowed in respect of such witnesses.

14. In any case where money is ordered by the Court at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County to be paid in respect of costs and expenses of prosecutors and witnesses, the same shall be paid by the Treasurer of the county or place by whom the same would have been payable had a like order been made by a Court of Oyer and Terminer or Gaol Delivery in the county where the trial would have taken place but for the Spring Assizes Act, 1879, and this Order; and every such Treasurer, or some known agent on his behalf, shall attend the said Spring Assizes during the sitting of the

Court to pay all such orders.

15. Where the Court at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County remand a prisoner or adjourn any trial, or otherwise make an order respecting a prisoner committed for trial but not acquitted or convicted, the Court may make such order with respect to the removal of such prisoner to a prison in the county or place in which he was committed for trial as to the Court seems just, and the prisoner may be removed accordingly, without any Writ of Habeas Corpus.

HEREAS by section twenty-six of "The Pluralities Act 1838," after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, "chapelries, and other places or districts may

"be separated from the parishes or mother " churches to which they belong, with great advan-

" tage, and places altogether extra-parochial may

" in some instances with advantage be annexed to "parishes or districts to which they are con-"tiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for "ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "That when with respect to his "own diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop " of the Province, or when the Bishop of any "diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop "that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place or "district within the diocese of such Archbishop, " or the diocese of such Bishop, as the case may " be, may be advantageously separated from any parish or mother church, and either be consti-"tuted a separate benefice by itself or be united " to any other parish to which it may be more " conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining "tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, "parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a "separate parish or benefice, or that any extra-" parochial place may with advantage be annexed " to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be "constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical "purposes; and the said Archbishop or Bishop "shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme "of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said " Archbishop for his consideration) describing the " mode in which it appears to him that the altera-"tion may best be effected, and how the changes "consequent on such alteration in respect to "ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, " rent-charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, "and payments, and in respect to patronage and " rights to pews, may be made with justice to all " parties interested; and if the patron or patrons " of the benefice or benefices to be affected by "such alteration shall consent in writing under "his or their hands to such scheme, or to such " modification thereof as the said Archbishop may "approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full " consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any "such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall " certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, "by his report to Her Majesty in Council, it " shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to "make an Order for carrying such scheme, or "modification thereof, as the case may be, into " effect."

And whereas the Right Reverend Edward Carr, Lord Bishop of Peterborough, hath pursuant to the enactment aforesaid represented in a writing dated the thirteenth December, one thousand nine hundred to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Frederick, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows:

"I the Right Reverend Edward Carr Lord Bishop of Peterborough do hereby represent to your Grace that there is in the county of Leicester within my diocese of Peterborough the perpetual curacy or vicarage of Market Harborough and that there is in the same county and within my said diocese the vicarage of Great Bowden.

"That the parishes of Market Harborough and Great Bowden adjoin and are contiguous and the ecclesiastical boundaries thereof are well known and defined.

"That according to the Census of one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one the population of the said parish of Market Harborough is two thousand one hundred and thirty-one and the population of the parish of Great Bowden is two thousand two hundred and fifty-nine but that the population of the said parish of Great Bowden has increased considerably since then through the growth of the town of Market Harborough outside the boundaries of the parish of Market Harborough.

"That the net annual value of the benefice of

Market Harborough arising from glebe, Queen Anne's Bounty, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners, and Christ Church Oxford is two hundred and seventy-three pounds.

"That the net annual value of the benefice of Great Bowden arising from Queen Anne's Bounty, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners, and Christ Church Oxford is one hundred and seventy pounds.

Church Oxford is one hundred and seventy pounds.
"That there is a church in each of the said

parishes.

"That the church of Market Harborough affords accommodation for seven hundred persons and the church of Great Bowden for four hundred persons.

"That it does not appear that any of the inhabitants or parishioners of the said parish possess any legal right by faculty or otherwise to the exclusive use of any pews or sittings in either of the said churches.

"That the patronage of the said vicarage of Market Harborough and the said vicarage of Great Bowden is vested in me the said Edward Carr Lord Bishop of Peterborough and my successors by virtue of my bishoprick.

"That the Reverend Robert Guinness is the present Vicar or Incumbent of Market Harborough and the Reverend Henry William Brutzer is the present Vicar or Incumbent of Great Bowden.

Great Bowden.

"That the said Henry William Brutzer is willing to relinquish and the said Robert Guinness is desirous of having annexed to the parish of Market Harborough aforesaid that portion of the parish of Great Bowden aforesaid described in the scheme hereunder written the population of which portion is about two thousand five hundred persons but no transfer of the endowments of either of the said benefices is to be made.

"That it appears to me that under the provisions of 'The Pluralities Act 1838' the portion of the parish of Great Bowden described in the scheme hereunder written and also edged with a green line in the plan hereto annexed may with advantage to the interests of religion be separated from the parish of Great Bowden and annexed to the said parish of Market Harborough for all ecclesiastical purposes.

"That pursuant to the directions contained in the said Act of Parliament I have prepared the following scheme which I submit to your Grace to the intent that your Grace may if on full consideration and enquiry you shall be satisfied with such scheme certify the same to Her Majesty in

Council."

And whereas the said scheme drawn up by the said Bishop and the consents of the patron and Incumbents of the said benefices respectively, are as follows:—

"SCHEME.

"It is proposed to separate that portion of the said parish of Great Bowden edged with a green line on the plan hereto annexed and to permanently annex such portion to the said parish of Market Harborough for all ecclesiastical purposes; the proposed new boundary line dividing the two parishes will extend from the centre of Saint Mary's Bridge on the Dingleyroad in a north-eastwardly direction along the course of the River Welland (being also the Great Bowden parish boundary) to the point where the hedge along the northern boundary of the field Number 27 on the Ordnance sheet connects with it, thence in a weatwardly direction along the said hedge and also along the hedge forming the northern boundary of the field Number 40 on the Ordnance sheet to the point where the eastern boundary of the Midland Rail-

way Company's main line connects with it, which boundary the dividing line follows to the bridge by which the Midland and London and North Western Railway Company's lines are crossed by the road leading from Market Harborough to Great Bowden from thence along the north-west side of the said road towards Market Harborough for eighty yards and thence in a westwardly direction along the northern boundary fences of fields Numbers 35, 232 and 400 on the Ordnance map of the parish of Great Bowden thence across the Burn Mill-road to and along the northern and western boundary fence of field Number 398 on the said map thence along a portion of the northern fence of field Number 396. on the said map and the whole of the northern and western fences of field Number 395 on the said map thence along the western fence of field Number 394 on the said map until it reaches the northern boundary fence of field Number 387 on the said map and thence along the whole of the northern fence of that field to the turnpike road leading from Market Harborough to Leicester thence in a northerly direction along the eastern side of the said road to the point where it meets the boundary of the parish of Lubenham and thence along the small rivulet or parish boundary dividing the parishes of Great Bowden and Lubenham to a point where the said rivulet or parish boundary enters the River Welland and from this point along the River Welland dividing the parishes of Great Bowden, Market Harborough and Little Bowden to the Saint Mary's Bridge on the Dingley-road aforesaid.

"That baptisms, churchings, marriages, and burials of the inhabitants of the said portion of the parish of Great Bowden when so annexed to Market Harborough as aforesaid shall be performed in the parish church of Market Harborough aforesaid and that the fees for all such offices and all ecclesiastical dues offerings and other emoluments arising from or in respect of such portion so annexed as aforesaid and usually payable to the incumbent of a benefice and the clerk and sexton respectively shall belong and be payable to the incumbent clerk and sexton respectively of Market Harborough and Great Bowden and that the inhabitants of the said portion of the parish of Great Bowden so annexed to Market Harborough as aforesaid shall not be entitled to pews or sittings in the said church of Great Bowden but shall be entitled to pews or sittings in the said church of

Market Harborough.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Brooke Foss Bishop of the said diocese of Durham (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of an Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint John Hebburn shall be altered so as to dissever therefrom all that portion thereof which is described in the schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto appended and is thereon coloured pink and so as to restore all that same portion to and to comprise it within the limits of the said new parish of Saint Cuthbert Hebburn and that from and after the same date and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the said portion of the said new parish of Saint John Hebburn so to be dissevered therefrom as aforesaid shall be restored to and shall again form part of the said new parish of Saint Cuthbert Hebburn.

And we further represent recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereunbefore mentioned Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

"The territory to be dissevered from the new parish of Saint John Hebburn in the county of Durham and in the diocese of Durham and to be restored to the new parish of Saint Cuthbert Hebburn in the same county and diocese being :-

"All that portion of the said new parish of Saint John Hebburn which is bounded on the south-east by the parish of Jarrow upon the northeast by the new parish of Saint Oswald Hebburn both in the said county and diocese and upon the north-west by the new parish of Saint Cuthbert Hebburn aforesaid and upon the remaining side that is to say upon the south-west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the last-named new parish from the new parish of Saint John Hebburn aforesaid at the point where Shields-road is joined by Pitt-street and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of five chains or thereabouts to its junction with Canning-street and with Quarry-road and extending thence southeastward to and along the north-eastern side of the last-named road for a distance of five chains or thereabouts to a point upon the wall or fence forming the northern boundary of Hebburn Hall Quarry and extending thence first north-eastward then south-eastward and then again north-eastward along the last-described wall or fence for a distance day of the same month a certain part of the said of thirteen chains or thereabouts to its north-

eastern end on the northern side of the footpath leading from Shields-road aforesaid to Monkton and extending thence first eastward to and then south-eastward along the said footpath for a distance of sixteen chains or thereabouts to a point a little to the south of Bede's Burn upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint John Hebburn from the parish of Jarrow aforesaid."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme or representation have been transmitted to the patrons and to the incumbents of the cures affected by the arrangements which are contemplated by such scheme or representation and such patrons and incumbents have respectively signified their assent thereto:

And whereas the said scheme or representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme or representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Durham.

THE following Scheme for the adjustment of the property rights liabilities &c. of the Urban District of Ealing and for other purposes, as settled by a Committee of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council is published in pursuance of the provisions of "The Municipal

Corporations Act, 1882."
WHEREAS, by "The Municipal Corporations Act, 1882," it is enacted that where a Petition for a Charter of Incorporation is referred to the Committee of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, and it is proposed by the Charter to extend the Municipal Corporations Act to the Municipal Borough to be created by the Charter, the said Committee of Council may settle a Scheme for the purposes in the said Act named, and containing such provisions as are in the said Act particularized.

And whereas certain inhabitant householders of the Urban District of Ealing, in the county of Middlesex, in the month of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight, did present to Her late Most Gracious Majesty Queen Victoria a petition praying for the grant of a Charter of Incorporation.

And whereas the said petition for a Charter was referred to the Committee of Council and it was proposed by the Charter to extend the Municipal Corporations Acts to the Municipal Borough to be created by the Charter.

And whereas, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, "The Local Government Act, 1858," came into force in a part of the parish of Ealing, in the said county, and the said part of the parish of Ealing became a district within the meaning of such Act, under the jurisdiction of the Ealing Local Board

And whereas by a Provisional Order of the Local Government Board, dated the sixth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three, and confirmed by "The Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation Act, 1873 (No. 4)," a certain portion of the Rural

ing the Local Government District of Ealing was made part for all sanitary purposes of such lastmentioned District of Ealing as therein more particularly appears.

And whereas on the fourth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight, the Local Board for the District of Ealing made Bye-laws with respect to Ealing Commons in pursuance of "The Metropolitan Commons Supplemental Act, 1877," and the same were allowed by the Local Government Board on the twenty-sixth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and seventyeight, and are now in force within the Urban D:strict of Ealing.

And whereas on the fifteenth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty, the Local Board for the District of Ealing made Bye-laws with respect to (1) the prevention of nuisances arising from snow, filth, &c., and the keeping of animals, and (2) the cleansing of earth closets, privies, ashpits, and cesspools, in the Urban Sanitary District of Ealing, and the same were allowed by the Local Government Board on the ninth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty, and are now in force within the Urban District of Ealing.

And whereas on the fourth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, the Local Board for the District of Ealing acting as the Urban Sanitary Authority made Bye-laws with respect to common lodging-houses in the Urban Sanitary District of Ealing, and the same were allowed by the Local Government Board on the fifteenth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, and are now in force within the Urban District of Ealing.

And whereas, under the provisions in that behalf contained in "The Public Health Act, 1875," the Local Board for the District of Ealing, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, adopted the Baths and Wash-houses Acts, and erected Public Baths, and the same are now vested in and maintained by the Urban District Council of Ealing.

And whereas by a Provisional Order of the Local Government Board, made on the eighteenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, and confirmed by "The Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (No. 7) Act, 1882," the Ealing Local Board, as the Sanitary Authority for the Urban Sanitary District of Ealing, were empowered to put in force in respect of the lands described in the Schedule to the said Order subject to the continuance of any existing public rights of highway, the powers of the Lands Clauses Consolidation Acts, 1845, 1860, and 1869, with respect to the purchase and taking of lands for the purpose of making and erecting a hospital or place with the necessary outbuildings, conveniences, and appurtenances for the reception of the sick within the said district.

And whereas on the sixth of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, the Local Board for the District of Ealing, acting as the Urban Sanitary Authority, made Bye-laws with respect to slaughter-houses in the Urban Sanitary District of Ealing, and the same were allowed by the Local Government Board on the thirteenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, and are now in force within the Urban District of Ealing.

And whereas by a Provisional Order made by the Local Government Board on the eleventh day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eightyfive, and confirmed by "The Local Government Sanitary District of Brentford immediately adjoin- | Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation Act (No. 6), 1885," the Ealing Local Board as the And the same are now in force within the Urban Sanitary Authority for the Urban District of Ealing were empowered to put in force with reference to the lands described in the schedule to the said Order subject to the continuance of any existing public rights of highway the powers of the Lands Clauses Consolidation Acts with respect to the purchase and taking of lands for the purpose of using the same as public walks or pleasure grounds.

And whereas by a Provisional Order made by the Local Government Board on the twenty-first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, and confirmed by "The Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (No. 6) Act, 1885," all those parts of the Ealing District described in the Schedule A to the said Order were included in and made to form part of the Brentford District, and all that part of the Brentford District described in the Schedule B to the said Order were included in and made to form part of the Ealing District as therein more particularly appears.

And whereas on the third day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, the Local Board for the District of Ealing, acting as the Urban Sanitary Authority, made Bye-laws with respect to new streets and buildings in the Urban Sanitary District of Ealing, and the same were allowed by the Local Government Board on the eighteenth of January, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, and as modified by the Bye-laws with respect to new buildings, made on the twentysixth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six, and allowed by the Local Government Board on the twentieth of June, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six, as hereinafter recited are now in force within the Urban District of Ealing.

And whereas a public hall called or known as the Victoria Hall and intended to commemorate the Jubilee year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria was built by public subscription on certain surplus land of the Local Board of Ealing and is now vested in the Members of the Local Board for the District of Ealing and their successors as trustees under the terms of a certain deed being a Declaration of Trust, dated the sixth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, upon the trusts therein appearing.

And whereas it is expedient that provision should be made for the continuance, transfer, and vesting of the rights, powers, and estate of the Members of the Local Board for the District of Ealing and their successors in the said Victoria Hall and under the said Deed of the sixth of November, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, as by this Scheme mentioned.

And whereas under the provisions of "The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1886," and the Dairies, Cow Sheds, and Milk Shops Order of 1885, the Local Board of the District of Ealing made regulations on the sixth October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, with respect to dairies, cow sheds, and milk shops, and the same are now in force within the Urban District of Ealing.

And whereas the Local Board for the District of Ealing adopted the following Acts, viz.:-

- 1. "The Infectious Disease (Notification) Act, 1889."
- 2. "The Infectious Disease (Prevention) Act,
- 3. "The Public Health Acts Amendment Act, 1890," with the exception of Part IV of that
- 4. "The Public Libraries Act, 1892."

District of Ealing.

And whereas by a Provisional Order of the Board of Trade being "The Ealing Electric Lighting Order, 1891," made under the Electric Lighting Acts, 1882 and 1888, and confirmed by "The Electric Lighting Orders Confirmation (No. 2) Act, 1891," the Local Board for the District of Ealing were empowered to supply electrical energy within the Urban Sanitary District of Ealing, for all public and private purposes as defined by "The Electric Lighting Act, 1882," and for such purpose to acquire and use lands subject to the limitations therein specified.

And whereas on the sixteenth of March, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, the Local Board for the District of Ealing made Bye-laws with respect to a pleasure ground known as Lammas Park, and the same were allowed by the Local Government Board, on the nineteenth of June, one thousand eight hundred and ninetythree, and are now in force within the Urban District of Ealing.

And whereas under and by virtue of "The Local Government Act, 1894," the Local Board for the District of Ealing became the Urban District Council for the Urban District of Ealing and the parish of Ealing was then and is now co-extensive with the Urban District of Ealing.

And whereas by an Order made by the Local Government Board on the twenty third of March. one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five, under the provisions of section 33 of "The Local Government Act, 1894," the powers and duties of appointing Overseers for the parish of Ealing were conferred upon the Urban District Council of Ealing.

And whereas on the twenty-sixth of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six, the Urban District Council of Ealing made Bye-laws with respect to new buildings in the Urban District of Ealing, and the same were allowed by the Local Government Board on the twentieth of June, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six, and are now in force within the Urban District of Ealing.

And whereas the Urban District Council of Ealing in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight, adopted Part III of "The Housing of the Working Classes Act, 1890," and the same is now in force within the Urban District of Ealing.

And whereas by a Provisional Order of the Local Government Board, made on the twentysixth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine, and confirmed by "The Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (No. 4) Act, 1899," the Urban District Council of Ealing were empowered to put in force in respect of the lands described in the Schedule to the said Order, the powers of the Lands Clauses Acts with respect to the purchase and taking of lands for the purpose of extending their hospital for the reception of the sick.

And whereas by an Order made by the Local Government Board, on the twenty-third day of August, one thousand eight hundred and ninetynine, under the provisions of sub-sections (1), (3), and (7) of section 33 of "The Local Government Act, 1894," certain powers of a Parish Council were conferred on the Urban District Council of Ealing as by the said Order particularly appears.

And whereas this scheme before being settled by the Committee of Council was referred for consideration to the Home Office and the Local Government Board.

And whereas it is expedient that a Scheme

should be made and settled, containing the provisions hereinafter set forth.

Now therefore pursuant to "The Municipal Corporations Act, 1882," and every other power enabling them in that behalf, the Committee of Council have settled a Scheme containing the provisions herein, and do hereby direct, order and declare as follows:—

Short Title.

This Scheme may be cited for all purposes as "The Borough of Ealing Scheme, 1901."

Commencement of Scheme.

This Scheme, when confirmed, shall be deemed to have come into operation on the day of the first meeting of the Council of the Municipal Borough created by the said Charter, and this Scheme shall be construed and applied as if it had been dated and confirmed by Parliament or Order in Council on the day before the day of the said first meeting, and everything thereunder shall be done and had accordingly. This date is herein referred to as "the commencement of this Scheme." So far as may be necessary this Scheme shall operate retrospectively.

The Municipal Borough created by the said Charter shall, from and after the commencement of this Scheme, be placed and thenceforward be under the jurisdiction of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the borough of Ealing acting by the Council of the borough as the Sanitary Authority for the said borough.

Dissolution of Urban District Council.

The Urban District Council of Ealing and their powers, privileges, duties, rights, obligations, and liabilities shall continue and be deemed to have continued to exist until the commencement of this Scheme, unaffected in any manner whatsoever by the grant of the said Charter or the creation of the said borough, and immediately from and after the commencement of this Scheme the Urban District Council of Ealing shall be and the same are hereby abolished and shall thenceforth be dissolved and cease to exist.

Transfer of Jurisdiction, Fowers, Rights, Property, &c.

All the jurisdiction, powers, duties, and property vested in or possessed by the Urban District Council of Ealing, or by any person or body in trust for them or any of their members as such (and not otherwise dealt with, or transferred by, or under any part of this Scheme) shall vest in the Mayor, Aldermen and Burgesses of the borough of Ealing, and shall be held and applied for sanitary and other municipal and public purposes of the said borough.

All duties and liabilities, which, immediately before the commencement of this Scheme, attached to and were enforceable against the Urban District Council of Ealing or their property, shall attach to and be enforceable against the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the borough of Ealing and their property.

Any investigations, legal proceedings, or remedy, in respect of any debt, liability, penalty, or forfeiture due to or incurred by, or on behalf of the Urban District Council of Ealing before the commencement of this Scheme, may be continued, prosecuted, and enforced by, or against, the Mayor, Altermen, and Burgesses of the b. rough of Ealing.

The term "property" in this Scheme means in l includes all property, real and personal, and all things in action, and all rights of common and commonable rights, and rights to toll, and all franchises, privileges, and rights, and all charters,

records, deeds, books and documents, and all rights and claims to relief, and all rights to avoid contracts or otherwise, and includes any estate or interest, legal or equitable, in or in respect of any property so defined.

The District Fund and the General District Rate of the said borough shall take the place of, and be substituted for, the District Fund and General District Rate of the Urban District Council of Ealing, and all sums of money respectively payable to, from, or out of, and all liabilities charged upon or attaching to the last-mentioned District Fund or General District Rate, shall be charged upon the District Fund and General District Rate of the borough.

All the rights, powers, estates, and property of and in the said Victoria Hall, exercisable by attaching to and vested in the Local Board of the District of Ealing, and their successors, under the said indenture of the sixth of November, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, or otherwise, shall pass to be exercisable by attach to and vest in the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the borough of Ealing, for the same trusts and the same purposes and subject to the same conditions as are in the said deed specified.

Acts, Orders, and Regulations.

Every reference in the hereinbefore recited Deed of the sixth of November, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, or in the hereinbefore mentioned Acts, Orders, or Regulations, as altered by any General or Local Acta, Orders, Schemes, Agreements, or Authoritie, before the commencement of this Scheme, or in any other Act, Order, Bye-law, Regulation, Scheme, Indenture, Power, or Authority, whatsoever applicable to the Urban District of Ealing at the commencement of this Scheme to the Local Board of Ealing or to the Urban District Council of Ealing, shall be deemed and construed to be a reference to the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the borough of Ealing, acting by the Council, and every reference or incorporation by the said or any other Acts, Orders, Bye-Laws, Regulations, Schemes, Agreement, and Authority to or of any provision of "The Public Health Act, 1875," the Acts amending or enlarging the same, shall be deemed and construed to be a reference to or incorporation of the corresponding provisions of "The Public Health Act, 1875," and other Acts applicable in the case of a Municipal Borough.

Any regulations under the Dairies, Cow Sheds, and Milk Shops Order, and any Bye-laws made by the Local Board or District Council and in force in the Urban District of Erling at the commencement of this Scheme, shall, unless repealed or revoked by other Regulations or Bye-laws duly made, continue in force, and be enforced within the borough in like manner and with the like effect as if the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burg-sses, acting by the Council and their officers, and the borough were referred to therein, instead of the Local Board, or Urban District Council as the case may be, and their officers and the district.

Savings.

Notwithstanding the incorporation of the borough and the provisions of this Scheme, all rates, assessments, compositions, charges, mortgages, leases, conveyances, deeds, documents, acts, matters, and things made, entered into, or done before the commencement of this Scheme, by, to, or with reference to the Urban District Councit of Ealing or their predecessors, shall be as good, valid, and effectual to all intents and purposes whatsoever, for, against, and with reference to the Mayor, Aldermen and Burgesses of the Borough

of Ealing, as if the same had been made, entered into, or done by, to, or with reference to the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the Borough of Ealing, instead of the said Urban District Council or their predecessors, and may be proceeded on, and enforced in the same manner in all respects as if the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the Borough of Ealing, instead of such Urban District Council or their predecessors had been party or privy to the same, and been named or referred to therein.

The accounts of the Urban District Council of Ealing and their officers shall be (as soon as conveniently may be) audited by the District Auditor in like manner, and subject to the like powers, duties, provisions, and right of appeal as if the Charter had not been granted and the provisions of sections 247 and 250 of "The Public Health Act, 1875," as amended by "The District Auditors Act, 1879," and any regulations duly issued by the Local Government Board with respect to the audit of accounts of Local Boards or Urban District Councils and of their officers shall apply to such audit, and the provisions of this scheme with respect to the said Urban District Council shall be construed so as to admit of such exceptions as may be necessary to enable such audit to be duly made, but such exceptions shall be strictly limited in time, extent, character, and operation to the purposes of such audit. Any sums certified by the District Auditor at such audit to be due from any person shall be paid by such person to the Borough Treasurer.

Compensation to Officers.

In case any Officer of the Urban District Council of Ealing who shall have been employed by the Local Board or Urban District Council of Ealing for a period of five years shall not be employed by the Council of the said borough nor offered by the said Council a position in their employ of a similar character and of an equal value to that formerly held by him, he shall be entitled to be paid by way of compensation for the loss of his position out of the funds of, or under the control of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the borough of Ealing acting by the Council as the Urban Sanitary Authority for the said municipal borough such gratuity or annual allowance and for such period as on a full consideration of the circumstances of the case may seem to the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, or any two or more of them to be a reasonable and just compensation for the loss of his position, and the said Commissioners in awarding the said compensation shall be guided by the principles which would be applicable in the case of an award of compensation under the provisions of the "Superannuation Act, 1859," to a person retiring or removed from the public service in consequence of the abolition of his office provided that no special minute within the meaning of the said Act stating any special grounds for granting such allowance shall be necessary or be made, provided nevertheless that if any such officer be so employed by the said Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses and discharged by them (otherwise than for misconduct) within two years of the commencement of this Scheme, he shall be entitled to compensation in the same manner as if he had not been employed by the said Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses, provided that the term Officer shall include only persons employed by the said Local Board or Urban District Council whose salaries or emoluments are payable at intervals of not less than one month, and no other persons, provided also that the said Lords Commissioners, or any two or more

of them shall be the sole judges as to the right; title, or claim of any officer to any compensation whatever, and as to the amount thereof, and the said Lords Commissioners or any two or more of them shall be the only judges upon any question which may arise under this clause, and further every determination of the said Lords. Commissioners upon any such right, title, claim, amount, or question, shall be absolutely final and conclusive, and every such officer shall have such rights only under this clause as the said Lords Commissioners or any two or more of them consider just and reasonable. Any determination of the said Lords Commissioners or any two or more of them may be evidenced by writing under the hands of any two of them.

Foreign Office, March 16, 1901. INTRODUCTION OF FIRE-ARMS INTO SPAIN.

WITH a view to obviating the inconvenience caused to British travellers entering Spain by ignorance of the regulations governing the introduction of fire-arms into that country, His Majesty's Ambassador at Madrid has forwarded the following information on the subject to His Majesty's Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs:—

Travellers entering Spain with fire arms must in all cases obtain a permit from the Governor of the Province of the place of entry. These permits are obtainable on application through one of His Majesty's Consular Officers.

On receipt of the permit the duties, as stated under numbers 69, 70, and 71 of the Custom House Tariff, have to be paid.

As, however, under Royal Orders of June 23rd, 1900, and January 26th, 1901, exception is made in favour of guns temporarily imported by sportsmen, travellers in possession of permits whose stay in Spain does not exceed six months, can obtain passes at the custom houses which hold good for that time, by registering the full description of their weapons.

Modification of former Order and Alteration of Boundaries of Scheduled District. 1.—(1.) The Suffolk (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) No. 27295. Order of 1901 (No. 3) is hereby modified in

manner hereinaster appearing.

(2.) The Scheduled District for the purposes of the above-mentioned Order and this Order shall after the commencement of this Order be the District described in the Schedule to this Order.

Movement within Scheduled District with Licence for Slaughter.

2.—(1.) An animal (not being in a Foot-and-Mouth Disease Infected Place) may be moved from any premises in the Scheduled District to a slaughter-house within such District provided that the animal is marked as required by this Article and accompanied by a Movement Licence (in the form set forth in the Schedule to the Suffolk (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1901 (No. 3) or to the like effect) granted by an

Inspector of the Local Authority of the place from which the animal is to be moved.

(2.) The Licence shall only be granted on a Declaration of the owner of the animal or his agent authorized in writing for this purpose to the effect:

(i.) that the animal is not affected with Footand-Mouth Disease and has not during the preceding twenty-eight days been in any way exposed to the infection of such disease; and

(ii.) that the movement of the animal is not prohibited by Notice of an Inspector of the Local Authority or of the Board given under any Order of the Board;

and every such Declaration shall be annexed to

the Licence granted thereon.

(3.) The Licence shall be in force for not more than four days, inclusive of the day of issue, and shall specify the name and address of the person to whom the Licence is granted, the number and description of the animals to be moved, and the name or description of the place or premises from which and the slaughter-house to which the animals are to be moved.

(4.) Every animal shall, before the movement is commenced, be marked by and at the expense

of the owner in manner following:

Cattle.—By the clipping of a broad arrow A about six inches long on the left hind quarter of each of the cattle and by the clipping of

the hair off the end of the tail.

Sheep.—By the clipping of a broad arrow A on the forehead of each of the sheep, and by the painting or stamping of the letter M, about six inches long, on both sides of each of the sheep with the following composition namely:—Rosin, five parts; oil of turpentine, two parts; and blue or red ochre, one part; melted and used warm; or with some other adhesive composition of a blue or red colour.

Swine.—By the painting or stamping of the letter M, about six inches long on both sides of each of the swine with the composition above mentioned.

(5.) Every animal shall be moved by the nearest available route and shall be slaughtered after its arrival at the slaughter-house without unnecessary delay.

Movement within Scheduled District with Licence

for purposes other than Slaughter.

3.—(1.) An animal (not being in a Foot-and-Mouth Infected Place) may be moved from any premises in the Scheduled District to any other premises in such District for purposes of feeding, isolation, or lambing, or for breeding purposes, provided that the animal is accompanied by a Movement Licence (in the form set forth in the Schedule to the Suffolk (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1901 (No. 3) or to the like effect) granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the place from which the animal is to be moved.

(2.) The Licence shall only be granted on a Declaration of the owner of the animal or of his agent authorized in writing for this purpose to the

effect:

(i.) that the animal has been on the premises from which it is to be moved for a period of at least twenty-eight days immediately before the granting of the Licence, and that no other cattle, sheep, goats, or swine have been brought on to those premises within such period; and

(ii.) that the animal is not affected with Footand-Mouth Disease and has not during the preceding twenty-eight days been in any way exposed to the infection of such disease; and (iii.) that the movement of the animal is not prohibited by Notice of an Inspector of the Local Authority or of the Board given under any Order of the Board;

and every such Declaration shall be annexed to

the Licence granted thereon.

(3.) The Licence shall be in force for not more than four days, inclusive of the day of issue, and shall specify the name and address of the person to whom the Licence is granted, the number and description of the animals to be moved, and the name or description of the place or premises from which and the place or premises to which the animals are to be moved.

(4.) A Licence for movement for breeding purposes shall, if marked with the words "For Breeding Purposes," be available for the movement of the animal back to the premises from which it was moved under the Licence, provided that such movement takes place within the four days during which such Licence is available.

(5.) Every animal shall be moved by the nearest available route, and be accompanied by the

Licence.

4. This Order shall come into operation on the twentieth day of March, one thousand nine hundred and one.
