Translation of Circular No. 6477 of the Imperial and Royal Marine Board, to all the Imperial and Royal Offices and Officers and Subordinate Port and Sanitary Offices and Officers.

By decree of the Imperial and Royal Ministry of Commerce, dated 28th April, No. 19067, issued in union with the Imperial and Royal Ministry of the Interior, and with the Royal Hungarian Ministry of Commerce, it has been ordered as follows

Vessels which have touched ports infected by plague, cholera, or yellow fever under suspended pratique, will be treated as under "suspended pratique," also in the case of their having received on board the post (parcels and samples excepted), provided that, on taking the post on board, the necessary precautions have been observed in order to avoid any contamination whatsoever.

This last circumstance will have to be proved by an Official Certificate.

This is made known for direction and guidance. Trieste, May 29th, 1901.

Translation of Circular No. 7161 of the Imperia^I and Royal Marine Board, to all the Imperial and Royal Offices and Officers and Subordinate Port and Sanitary Offices and Officers.

By order of the Imperial and Royal Ministry of Commerce transmitted by telegram, dated June 9th, 1901, No. 2268, the Marine Board (at Trieste), in consequence of the spreading of plague in Lower Egypt, has ordered that henceforth arrivals from Egypt, without exception, will again be subjected to a rigorous medical visit.

This is made known, in addition to Government Circulars of November 5th, 1900, No. 13135, and of May 4th, 1901, No. 5429, for direction and guidance, drawing at the same time the attention to the regulation of Article VII of Government Circular of June 17th, 1897, No. 5684.

ART. 1er. Les dispositions qui font l'objet des articles 1er à 4 de l'arrêté royal du 5 Avril, 1897, susvisé, sont rendus applicables aux provenances du delta du Nil contaminés par la peste bubonique.

ART. 2. Ces provenances, arrivant par mer, seront soumises à la station sanitaire de l'Escaut et dans les ports d'Ostende et de Nieuport ainsi qu'à Selzaete, au régime stipulé par les chapitres II, III, et IV du règlement sanitaire général annexé à la Convention sanitaire internationale de Venise, en date du 19 Mars, 1897.
