The KING has been graciously pleased to approve of the Decoration of the Victoria Cross being delivered to the representatives of the undermentioned Officers, Non-commissioned Officer, and men who fell during the recent operations in South Africa in the performance of acts of valour which would, in the opinion of the

Commander-in-Chief of the Forces in the Field, have entitled them to be recommended for that distinction had they survived:—

Captain D. R. Younger, Gordon Highlanders.

This Officer, during the action near Krugersdorp, on the 11th July, 1900, volunteered for and took out the party which successfully dragged a Royal Artillery waggon under cover of a small kopje, though exposed to a very heavy and accurate fire at only 850 yards range. He also accompanied the second party of volunteers who went out to try and bring in one of the guns. During the attempt he was mortally wounded, dying shortly afterwards. His cool and gallant conduct was the admiration of all who witnessed it, and, had Captain Younger lived, the Field-Marshal Commanding-in-Chief in South Africa, would have recommended him for the high award of the Victoria Cross, at the same time as Captain W. E. Gordon, of the same Regiment.

Lieutenant R. J. T. Digby Jones, Royal Engineers, and No. 459 Trooper H. Albrecht, Imperial Light Horse.

Would have been recommended for the Victoria Cross had they survived, on account of their having during the attack on Waggon Hill (Lady-smith) of 6th January, 1900, displayed conspicuous bravery, and gallant conduct in leading the force which re-occupied the top of the hill at a critical moment just as the three foremost attacking Boers reached it, the leader being shot by Lieutenant Jones, and the two others by Trooper Albrecht.

Lieutenant and Adjutant G. H. B. Coulson, King's Own Scottish Borderers, 7th Mounted Infantry.

This Officer during a rear-guard action, near Lambrecht Fontein, on the 18th of May, 1901, seeing Corporal Cranmer, 7th Mounted Infantry, dismounted, his horse having been shot, remained behind and took him up on his own horse. He rode a short distance, when the horse was shot, and both Lieutenant Coulson and the Corporal were brought to the ground. Lieutenant Coulson told Corporal Cranmer to get along with the wounded horse as best he could, and he would look after himself. Corporal Cranmer got on the horse and rode away to the

column. No. 4792 Corporal Shaw (Lincolns), 7th Mounted Infantry, seeing Lieutenant Coulson's position of danger, rode back through the rear-guard, and took him up on his horse. A few minutes later Corporal Shaw was shot through the body, and there is reason to believe that Lieutenant Coulson was wounded also, as he fell off his horse. Corporal Shaw fell off a few minutes later.

This Officer on many occasions throughout the Campaign displayed great coolness and gallantry under fire.

No. 3264 Sergeant A. Atkinson, Yorkshire Regiment.

During the battle of Paardeborg, 18th February, 1900, Sergeant A. Atkinson, 1st Battalion Yorkshire Regiment, went out seven times, under heavy and close fire, to obtain water for the wounded. At the seventh attempt he was wounded in the head, and died a few days afterwards.

No. 3733 Private J. Barry, 1st Battalion Royal Irish Regiment.

During the night attack on the 7th and 8th January, 1901, on Monument Hill, Private Barry, although surrounded and threatened by the Boers at the time, smashed the breach of the Maxim gun, thus rendering it useless to its captors, and it was in doing this splendid act for his country that he met his death.

The following General Order, dated 16th May, 1902, publishing a Despatch from Major M. J. Tighe, D.S.O., regarding the attack and capture of Nodiz Fort in Mekran, has been received from the Government of India:—

No. 415.—The Right Honourable the Governor-General in Council is pleased to direct the publication of the subjoined letter from the Adjutant-General in India, dated the 5th February, 1902, submitting, under the orders of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief in India, a despatch from Major M. G. Tighe, D.S.O., 27th Baluch Light Infantry, reporting the particulars of the attack and capture of Nodiz Fort, in Mekran, on the 20th December 1901.

From Major-General H. L. Smith-Dorrien, D.S.O., Adjutant-General in India, to the Secretary to the Government of India, Military Department, —(No. 362-F-C,—“Special and Miscellaneous,”—dated Poona, the 5th February, 1902)

I am directed to forward for the information of the Government of India the accompanying detailed report* of the attack and capture of Nodiz Fort, on the 20th December, 1901, by a party of troops under the command of Major M. J. Tighe, 27th Baluch Light Infantry.

2. The Commander-in-Chief is of opinion that the attack was well planned and skilfully carried out by Major Tighe, and he desires to bring his services to the notice of the Government of India. His Excellency also considers that Lieutenant J. B. Corry, Royal Engineers, and Lieutenant G. P. Grant, 27th Baluch Light Infantry, deserve credit for the gallant manner in which they led their men, and Lieutenant E. G. Hart, Murree Mountain Battery, for the manner in

which he worked the two guns under his command. His Excellency considers that the services of these officers are deserving of recognition.

Memorandum from Brigadier-General J. H. S. Craigie, Commanding the Sind District, to the Deputy Adjutant-General, Bombay Command, Poona,—(No. A-8-53, dated Karachi, the 4th January, 1902).

Submitted, in continuation of this office telegram No. 5382, dated 23rd December, 1901.

2. I would wish also to express my appreciation of the very effective manner in which Major Tighe planned and conducted the attack on Nodiz Fort, and the good services rendered by the officers, British and native, and of all ranks serving under his command.

Memorandum from General Sir R. C. Low, G.C.B., Commanding the Forces, Bombay, to the Adjutant-General in India.—(No. 336-A, dated Poona, the 17th January, 1902).

Submitted for the information of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief in India.

I quite agree with the General Officer Commanding, Sind District, in his commendations on this well-arranged action.

From Major M. J. Tighe, D.S.O., 27th Baluch Light Infantry, Commanding the Escort to the Political Agent, Kalat, to the Assistant Adjutant-General, Sind District, Karachi.—(Dated Nodiz, the 21st December, 1901.)

I have the honour to forward herewith my report of the capture of Nodiz Fort on the 20th instant.

On December the 16th, at Turbat, Colonel C. E. Yate, C.S.I., C.M.G., Agent to the Governor-General, Baluchistan, informed me that this stronghold would probably have to be taken. Nodiz Fort is situated about eight miles west of Kalatuk, on the Turbat-Tump road, and was occupied by three outlaws named Mahomed Ali Khan, Durd Mahomed Khan, and Sheran, and a following of ruffians and desperadoes.

The reasons which led to the outlawing of Mahomed Ali Kahn and his brother Mahomed Umra Khan, both Norsherwani Sirdars, are unnecessary to give, but the depredations committed by these men throughout this district have been very great. Mahomed Umra Khan is in Persia. They seized Nodiz Fort, at one time partially dismantled, and rebuilt it, intending no doubt to use it as a base for further operations. They were besieged by the Nazim of Kej with a force of about one thousand men.

The information received by me from native sources was so contradictory that I placed no reliance on it, and determined to examine the position myself and if possible carry it by assault with the escort infantry (27th Baluch Light Infantry), not waiting for the guns, which, with the cavalry, were marching towards Turbat from Nutall.

On the 17th I proceeded to Nodiz and was accompanied by Captain Hulseberg, 27th Baluch Light Infantry, and Lieutenant Corry, Royal Engineers, Colonel Showers, Political Agent, Kalat, also went with us.

On arrival there the Nazim explained the situation to me, and that he had erected ten strong sangars at distances varying from 400 to 600 yards round the fort, which were occupied by night; by day the occupants retiring to a safe distance from the enemy. He had not attacked the fort, as he considered the place too strong. He appeared to have but little confidence in the

trustworthiness of his men, and sympathy undoubtedly existed between many of our own people and the outlaws. We proceeded to reconnoitre the position from the north side, coming under a lively Martini fire. I could plainly see that the fort was not only much larger than I had been led to believe, but was a really strong one (the description of this fort is given later on), and would, if stormed by infantry alone, cost heavily, especially as the enemy possessed a number of Martini and Snider rifles, and were plentifully supplied with ammunition. The Nazim further informed me that he had besieged the place for fifty-one days, and had lost some men killed and wounded.

On my return to Kalatuk I informed Colonel Yate that I was prepared to assault the place for him at any time, if necessary, but at a heavy loss; and that, in my opinion, it would be wiser to wait for the guns and avoid anything even smacking of a check, which would have a very bad effect in the country.

Colonel Yate quite agreed with me, and the Nazim was directed to redouble his efforts for the next two or three days.

I also wrote to Lieutenant Orton to hurry on the guns.

On the 18th I moved the camp to Nodiz and pitched it about two miles from the fort, and that day and the next were spent by all the British Officers in carefully reconnoitring it. It was difficult to get close to it, as the enemy had the ranges marked and opened fire on any one seen. About 7 P.M. Lieutenant Orton, 26th Baluchistan Regiment, arrived with the 5th Bombay Cavalry escort under Lieutenant Maunsell, having covered 65 miles in 36 hours. On the 20th, at 9 A.M., the two guns, Murree Mountain Battery, under Lieutenant E. G. Hart, and 50 rifles, 27th Baluch Light Infantry, arrived. They had marched 59 miles between 7 A.M. on the 18th and 9 A.M. on the 20th. I gave them a rest of one hour and a half, and then marched into action.

The various small parties left camp timed to arrive at their respective positions, round the fort, simultaneously. A copy of my orders (attached) for the attack shows the necessary detail.

The direction of the attack was kept secret to the last moment.

The gun position, about 550 yards from the fort, was somewhat exposed, but it was the only one from which the battlements of the south-west flanking defences of the fort, and which side was the one selected to be assaulted, could be properly shelled.

The guns came under rifle fire directly they appeared in sight, and which continued till they got into action. The enemy's fire was fortunately high, and the scrub about afforded some shelter from view. The teams were protected in a nullah close by.

At 11.20 the first gun fired. Meanwhile, the Baluchis to the south-west advanced rapidly through the date trees, and coming under fire, trickled up to a karez and some cotton fields within 200 yards of the fort, and which offered good cover. Selected marksmen then fired on the loopholes. The enemy's fire was very heavy, but only two casualties occurred up to this, the men availing themselves of every particle of cover and moving steadily on. The enemy's fire was hard to locate; not only was there no smoke, but they were perfectly protected. Lieutenant Orton's party had also moved to within short range, and engaged the enemy on the east side.

Lieutenant Hart continued firing steadily at the flank defences, demolishing all the loop-holed

battlements on the towers and leaving the walls, which, being very thick, would not have been affected by small guns.

When he had completed this he sounded the battery call and turned his fire on to the main tower. The enemy, who had vacated the loopholes when shelled, finding the gunners' attention directed elsewhere, promptly returned and re-opened a wild fire. The assaulting party, with the sappers, had meanwhile crept closer up under shelter of a karez, and I directed Lieutenant Corry to breach the wall with gun-cotton. He and his party advanced under the shelter of some old dilapidated mat huts, covered by a careful fire on the loopholes by Lieutenant Grant's men, but finding that the wall near the south-west tower had been sufficiently breached by gun fire, returned with the information.

I stopped the guns firing and had the charge sounded. The storming party, with bayonets fixed, and splendidly led by Lieutenants Corry and Grant, rushed the breach, Colonel Showers accompanying them. The supports, with Captain Hulseberg, now came up, and secured the outer wall and the south-west bastion, now in ruins. The storming party on rushing in were met with a furious fire and a counter-charge of swordsmen, and a *melée* ensued. The swordsmen were driven back into cover, and both Lieutenants Corry and Grant, as well as several men, fell wounded, shot from the western tower. The men, many of whom were very young soldiers, seeing their officers fall, lost their heads and retired to the breach again, bringing away the wounded and rifles. From my position on the ruined south-west tower I saw this temporary check, and ordered the reserves up to a position under the north-west walls of the fort, and as I could not find the gun-cotton party, who were mixed up with the infantry, to enlarge the breach, I ordered up the guns. The men were distributed round the fort and the south-west bastion occupied, and wherever they could they loop-holed the walls with their bayonets and fired on the enemy's loopholes.

A survey of the interior of the fort disclosed three reduits—the western one a particularly strong one, with tiers of loopholes. I also noted that the shell proof head covers of these buildings, resting on date palm logs, could be brought down by shell fire on to the heads of the defenders, and that they were visible from a date grove about a hundred yards from the south of the fort. It was necessary to press the enemy as hard as possible, and finish with a final bayonet assault.

The guns came into action in the date patch mentioned, and under the enemy's fire one gunner was severely wounded.

Lieutenant Hart worked his guns with the greatest calm and deliberation, and soon not only brought down the roofs of the two centre reduits, but set them on fire. The enemy quitted them and gave themselves up to Lieutenant Orton on the east side.

But the western reduit still held out, and this was shelled and the top blown in. I had the cease fire sounded and the men with Captain Hulseberg swarmed in to the assault, but spared the plucky foe, who threw down their arms and surrendered.

I was well aware of the risk I ran in bringing the guns up so close, but it was the only way in which the persistent riflemen in the reduits could be silenced, and the walls of these were too high to be scaled. The fight ended at 1.25 P.M.

Considering the heavy rifle fire brought to bear on the attacking party our casualties were very small, and were—

and some men slightly wounded. Subadar Alladad Khan, 27th Baluch Light Infantry, in the rush, fell down a karez and hurt his knee very badly.

The expenditure of gun ammunition was very great, but small guns have little effect on the formidable mud battlements of these Mekrani forts and absolutely none on the walls. Fourteen killed, seventeen wounded, and sixty-three unwounded prisoners were found in the fort; twenty-five Martinis, ten Sniders, and many percussion guns and *jezails*. The inside of the fort was strewn with dead camels, donkeys and other animals killed by shell fire, and the place had been well provisioned, and there was rifle ammunition in abundance.

Mahomed Ali Khan was killed, and Durd Mahomed and Sheran were wounded. Among the prisoners were 33 Persians. On the 21st I blew up the fort with gun-cotton, and had the walls knocked down. I was decidedly disappointed to find the small effect gun-cotton had on the thick mud walls.

In concluding this report I have the honour to bring to the notice of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief the gallant behaviour of the undermentioned Officers:—

(a) Lieutenant J. B. Corry, Royal Engineers (Bombay Sappers and Miners), for the gallant way he advanced to breach the wall of the fort and afterwards, with Lieutenant G. P. Grant, led the stormers into it and engaged the enemy's swordsmen till wounded. He was hit twice.

(b) Lieutenant G. P. Grant, 27th Baluch Light Infantry, who led the storming party, and, with Lieutenant Corry, rushed the breach and also fought the enemy's swordsmen till shot down. This Officer was twice wounded, and when brought outside begged to be allowed to lead the men on again.

Both these Officers behaved very bravely and charged some way ahead of the men. I also wish to submit the name of the following Officers as deserving of notice:—

Lieutenant E. G. Hart, Royal Artillery (Murree Mountain Battery), for the splendid way in which he worked his guns at close range under fire. This young Officer brought on his guns by forced marches, and on the 20th, after a tiring night march and only one-and-a-half hours' rest at the end of it, was sent into action. It was, I consider, entirely due to the accurate shooting

of this section that the infantry were able to storm the position as soon as they did and with such small loss of life. The calm, deliberate way in which they were worked in the dangerous second position, within a hundred yards of the fort and under rifle fire, was the admiration of every one present.

Captain H. Hulseberg, 27th Baluch Light Infantry, for the indefatigable manner in which he helped me as Adjutant to the various branches of the service which composed the escort. His arrangements worked like clockwork, and there was not a hitch from beginning to end. This Officer's name was brought to notice at the conclusion of the Uganda Expedition for the work he did there.

I shall in due course submit the names of Native Officers and men considered worthy of mention.

Colonel Yate and the Baluch and Brahui Sirdars were present at the fight.

Copy of Camp Orders re Attack on Nodiz Fort.

Nodiz, the 20th December, 1901.

43. The attack on Nodiz fort will take place this morning, immediately after the arrival of the mountain guns from Turbat.

The orders for the attack are as under:

i. A guard of 40 rifles will be detailed to guard the camp. Particular attention should be paid to the karez west of the camp.

ii. The Nazim's levies will be directed to occupy their present sangars round the fort, and on no account to leave them.

iii. The guns, with an escort of 10 rifles, will take up a position to the south-east of the fort, and will have as their objectives—

(a) The loop-holed tops of the west flank towers;

(b) The top of the main tower;

when the tops of the west flank towers have been demolished, the Officer Commanding the guns will sound his battery call.

This will be the signal to the infantry that the gun fire has been turned from the west flank tower to the main tower.

Captain Hulseberg will guide the guns to the position selected, and will rejoin the infantry.

The infantry will be disposed as follows:—

(a) Forty rifles, covering party—Lieutenant Grant.

Sappers and Miners—Lieutenant Corry.

Fifty rifles, supports.

The whole under Captain Hulseberg.

Eighty rifles reserve, at disposal of Officer Commanding. This will form the main infantry attack, which will be directed on the south-west bastion of the fort, through the date groves.

(b) Fifty rifles under Lieutenant Orton will push their way to the east side of the fort and occupy the mosque which is outside the fort, or take up such a position as will prevent the enemy escaping.

(c) The cavalry will take up a position in rear of the guns, ready for pursuit.

(d) Hospital and reserve ammunition with the reserves.

(e) The position of the Officer Commanding will be with the supports.

v. The battery call will be the signal for the gun-cotton party to advance.

vi. No bugles will be sounded except by order of the Officer Commanding.

vii. Sketch of position will be given to all British Officers.

The following General Order, dated 4th July, 1902, publishing a report from Major-General C. C. Egerton, C.B., D.S.O., on the operations undertaken against the Mahsud Waziris, has been received from the Government of India:—

No. 611.—His Excellency the Governor-General in Council is pleased to direct the publication of the following letter from the Adjutant-General in India, dated the 24th April, 1902, forwarding a report from Major-General C. C. Egerton, C.B., D.S.O., A.D.C., on the operations undertaken against the Mahsud Waziris between the 24th November, 1901, and the 8th January, 1902.

2. His Excellency in Council agrees with the Commander-in-Chief in his appreciation of the conduct of the operations under the direction of Major-General Egerton, and of the services rendered by the Officers and men under his command.

From Major-General H. L. Smith-Dorrien, D.S.O., Adjutant-General in India, to the Secretary to the Government of India, Military Department,—(No. 1916-A, "Disturbances," dated Simla, the 24th April, 1902).

I am directed by the Commander-in-Chief to submit, for the information of the Government of India, the accompanying report from the General Officer Commanding, Punjab Frontier District, on the late operations in Waziristan.

2. It will be remembered that the Mahsud Waziris having incurred the displeasure of the Government of India by numerous acts of aggression, and having obstinately refused to pay the fines thereon assessed, it was determined to blockade the tribe. A cordon of troops was, therefore, drawn from Wana to Datta Khel through Sarwaki and Jandola, which from the commencement of the cold weather of 1900 hemmed them in from their usual trade with our stations in the plains. Although put to considerable straits for many of their accustomed commodities of life, the Mahsuds since November, 1900, showed such activity in raiding on and beyond the blockade cordon, even to the extent of capturing some of our Militia and Border Police posts, that the Government of India determined, while maintaining the blockade, to fight the tribe with its own weapons, and to send raiding parties into their country to exact reprisals. This course, for many reasons, was deemed preferable to the old system of sending in an expedition, and has had the desired effect.

3. His Excellency is certain that the Government of India will agree with him in thinking that the admirable work done by the troops under circumstances which rendered their duties specially arduous and trying, is deserving of all praise, and reflects the greatest credit on all engaged in the blockade and the concluding operations detailed in the report.

4. The Commander-in-Chief would specially draw attention to the fact that columns on four different occasions penetrated into the very heart of the Mahsud country with a minimum of transport, indeed at times with none whatever, and inflicted on the enemy probably more serious losses than they have ever experienced before.

The present operations differed so considerably from the tactics of a regular expedition that

in the first series of operations the Mahsuds were taken completely by surprise. Their heavy loss in men (which, with such a comparatively sparse population, is to them a more serious matter than is generally understood), combined with the heavy losses in cattle and the destruction of crops and defences, should prove a salutary lesson to them, and His Excellency hopes that the severe punishment meted out to the Mahsuds on this occasion will eventually bear good results.

5. Sir Power Palmer desires specially to bring to the notice of the Government of India the excellent services of Major-General C. C. Egerton, C.B., D.S.O., A.D.C., under whose able direction the blockade and concluding active operations were brought to a successful termination. His Excellency also trusts that the Officers mentioned in this report will be considered deserving of commendation for their good work and valuable assistance, and desires to draw special attention to the many acts of conspicuous gallantry brought to notice.

From Major-General C. C. Egerton, C.B., Commanding the Punjab Frontier District, to the Adjutant-General in India (through the Deputy Adjutant-General, Punjab Command),—(No. 854-B, "Disturbances—Mahsud Blockade," dated Abbottabad, the 15th March, 1902).

I have the honour to submit for the information of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief in India, the following report on the raids undertaken against the Mahsud Waziris since the 24th November, 1901.

2. During the hot weather the Mahsuds, who had been under blockade since November, 1900, had been very active in raiding on and beyond the blockade cordon, even capturing some of our Militia and Border Police posts.

3. It was therefore arranged that the reliefs for the Dera Ismail Khan garrison and the blockading force should be simultaneously brought down to the Dera Ismail Khan border, and utilized for raiding purposes in conjunction with the blockade troops.

First Series of Operations.

4. The first series of operations was directed against the Mahsuds of the Khaisara and Shahur, combined with demonstrations from Jandola into the Takhi Zam, and from Datta Khel against the north-western portion of Mashud territory.

5. The conduct of these operations was entrusted to Brigadier-General L. Denning, D.S.O., commanding the Derajat District. Their general object was to destroy all Mahsud defences, capture as many prisoners and cattle as possible, to carry off, or destroy, all grain and fodder found; and to return to their basis on the fourth day, after having inflicted all the damage possible.

The force was divided into four columns as under:—

No. 1 Column.—From Datta Khel, under Lieutenant-Colonel V. C. Tonnochy, 3rd Sikhs.

No. 2 Column.—From Jandola, under Colonel H. N. McRae, C.B., Aide-de-Camp, 45th Sikhs.

No. 3 Column.—From Sarwaki, under Lieutenant-Colonel R. W. MacLeod, 29th Punjab Infantry.

No. 4 Column.—From Wana, under Lieutenant-Colonel W. E. Bunbury, 28th Punjab Infantry.

A Royal Engineer Officer and demolition party was attached to each column.

6. The operations were carried into effect as follows:—

No. 1 Column moved out from Datta Khel on November 23rd, and marched via the Shuidar Narai to Dodgul, where it bivouacked on the

night of the 24th. On the 25th Dodgul was destroyed, and the force proceeded down the Shuran Algad and bivouacked at a place called Bitt Malik Shahi (marked on the map as Mahsud), not far from the Razmak Kotal. On November 26th a reconnaissance was made towards the Shaktu. No opposition was met with. On November 27th Colonel Tonnochy made a dash for Makin, a considerable portion of which was destroyed. The force then retired to their bivouac at Bitt Malik Shahi. This was a very brilliant feat of arms, but at the same time a somewhat risky one, as had the column, as was probable, been heavily followed up, it would have been in a somewhat serious position. However, the result justified Colonel Tonnochy's judgment and enterprise, and had a marked effect upon the enemy. On November 28th, the column returned to Datta Khel, being followed up half-heartedly by the enemy for part of the way.

No. 2 Column.

No. 2 Column left Jandola on the night of the 24th November, and proceeded to Kot Shingi, which was partially destroyed. At Kot Shingi, serious opposition was encountered, and as there had been several casualties, Colonel McRae decided to return to Jandola, which he reached on the afternoon of the 25th, being followed up by the enemy to within about four miles of Jandola and having suffered about twenty casualties. Next day the column reconnoitred up to the Shahur Tangi, and returned the same day, not having encountered any opposition.

No. 3 Column.

No. 3 Column left Sarwakai in the early morning of November 25th, and penetrated to Badshah Khan's village. They returned to Sarwakai on November 27th.

No. 4 Column.

No. 4 Column left Wana on the night of the 24th November, and proceeded via the Insar Narai into the Khaisara Valley. During this and the three following days this column, aided by a small mixed column detached from the Wana garrison under Captain A. E. McBarnet, 5th Punjab Cavalry, on the 25th and 27th, completely gutted the Khaisara villages. The column returned to Wana on the 28th.

7. Simultaneously with the operations of the above columns the Southern Waziristan Militia, under Major R. Harman, D.S.O., operated in the Shaman Khel country, rendering excellent service.

8. Feeling it to be of great importance that the blow thus struck should be followed up as quickly as possible, General Denning, in consultation with the Commissioner on special duty, Mr. W. Merk, C.S.I., now submitted proposals for further operations, and at the same time asked for two additional battalions to enable him to carry them out. The proposals received sanction, and two additional regiments, viz., the 52nd Pioneers and the 38th Dogras, together with two sections of a field hospital, were despatched to Tank. In the meantime, I had been directed to proceed to Tank and assume control of the operations, and four additional regiments were being sent me.

Second Series of Operations.

9. On the 4th December, 1901, Brigadier-General Denning marched to Kot Shingi, which was destroyed, and bivouacked at Derajat Kalai. General Denning had subdivided his force into two columns under Colonel H. N. McRae, C.B., A.D.C., 45th Sikhs, and Lieutenant-Colonel W. du G. Gray, 1st Punjab Infantry.

10. The next day (5th) the force moved out, destroying several villages. The troops were then ordered to bivouac: Lieutenant Gray's column, with the baggage, leading, and Colonel McRae's column covering the retirement. Lieutenant-Colonel Gray's column met with little or no opposition, and the march was continued to Guri Khel, where bivouac was formed. Meanwhile, the rear column under Colonel McRae became heavily engaged, and owing to the unauthorized withdrawal of a picquet, his left flank was so seriously threatened that he deemed it necessary to retake the position. By this time it was nearly dark, so Colonel McRae decided to remain where he was for the night, and continued his march next day across the Umar Raghza to Guri Khel, where he arrived about 11 A.M.

11. The force remained in bivouac at Guri Khel during the 6th. The enemy made frequent attacks on the picquets, but were invariably repulsed, on one occasion at the point of the bayonet by a company of the 29th Punjab Infantry under Captain H. A. Vallings.

12. The enemy were now seen in large numbers working round both flanks, and fearing for the safety of a convoy which he had ordered to come out from Jandola with supplies, General Denning resolved to retire on Jandola.

13. On the 7th December the force retired to Murga Band, the enemy following up the picquets and rear-guard. On one occasion they attempted to rush a picquet of the 29th Punjab Infantry under Captain Vallings, but were repulsed with a loss of forty killed.

14. Their losses on this and the previous day must have been very heavy, as they made no further attempt to follow up the column, which returned to Jandola on the evening of the 8th. The retirement on this day was covered by the 38th Dogras, under Colonel F. G. Vivian, which I had sent out from Jandola for that purpose.

Third Series of Operations.

15. The previous operations towards the Shinkai had shown General Denning that large villages were situated in the Dwe and Tre branches of the nullah, while at the same time the Splitoi had not yet been visited. Proposals were therefore submitted for operations in that portion of the country. In the meantime the following movements had taken place:—

On the 10th December a column under Lieutenant-Colonel A. F. Hogge, 23rd Pioneers, marched from Jandola to Sarwakai, which it reached on the 11th. On the 15th December a reconnaissance under Colonel Hogge was made to Turan China; no opposition was met with. On the 17th December a demonstration was made by Major F. G. Lucas, D.S.O., 5th Gurkhas, commanding at Wana, into the Khaisara.

16. On the 19th December a force left Jandola under command of Brigadier-General Denning, and proceeded to Umar Raghza. No opposition was encountered.

17. On the same date a column left Sarwakai under command of Lieutenant-Colonel Hogge, 23rd Pioneers, and proceeded up the Shahur. Their orders were to move into the Splitoi and, having hurried this valley, to cross the range forming its northern boundary, and to effect a junction with General Denning's force on the evening of the 21st at Darakai, in the Tre Shinkai.

18. General Denning's operations in the meantime had been as follows:—

On the 20th December, the force moved to Ahmadwan, and thence up to the Trenullah for some three or four miles, the enemy offering but slight resistance. Heliographic communication

was established during the day with Colonel Hogge's column from Sarwakai. The force bivouacked near Paridal. On 21st December a force of 550 rifles under Major Harman, D.S.O., Commandant, Southern Waziristan Militia, covered the left flank, while the main body moved down the Tre to meet the Sarwakai column. Slight opposition was encountered. After being joined by Colonel Hogge's column, the whole force bivouacked at Dwe Shinkai. On the 22nd December, leaving the two pioneer regiments to guard the bivouac, the remainder of the force moved up the Dwe Shinkai in three columns.

No. 1 Column (Colonel McRae) reconnoitred towards the Wacha Khwar, and met with some opposition.

No. 2 Column (Colonel Gray) moved east, and No. 3 Column (Colonel Vivian) moved south-east.

On the 23rd General Dening detached a column under Lieutenant-Colonel Gray into the Wacha Khwar, while Major Drew, with the 29th, was detached to the Guri Khel villages, north of Ahmadwan. He himself with the rest of the force returned to Guri Khel. Some opposition was encountered. The whole force bivouacked at Guri Khel. In the meantime, on the 22nd, I had detached a column from Jandola, under the command of Lieutenant-Colonel H. Godfray, 9th Bombay Infantry; it covered the retirement of General Dening's force. The whole force returned to Jandola on the 24th December. On this day a small column from Sarwakai, in conjunction with some Bhittanis, raided into the Danaoti nullah.

Fourth Series of Operations.

19. In the meantime, the extra regiments had arrived, and troops were now placed in position for another series of operations in the north-eastern and eastern portions of Mahsud territory.

20. The object of these operations was to punish the Shabi Khel and other Mahsud sections having settlements in the Shaktu, Sharanna, and Shuza Algads.

21. Three columns advanced simultaneously from Datta Khel, Janikhel and Jandola, respectively.

No. 1 Column, Jandola, Brigadier-General L. Dening, D.S.O., consisted of 30 sabres, 4 guns, and 2,450 rifles.

No. 2 Column, Colonel H. N. McRae, C.B., A.D.C., 45th Sikhs, consisted of 4 guns and 1,400 rifles.

No. 3 Column, Datta Khel, Lieutenant-Colonel V. C. Tonnochy, 3rd Sikhs, consisted of 2 guns and 1,400 rifles.

Besides the above, some 300 of the Northern Waziristan Militia, under Captain A. F. Ferguson-Davie, D.S.O., and 300 of the Southern Waziristan Militia, under Major R. Harman, D.S.O., were employed to crown the Babargarh range and prevent the Mahsuds from escaping into the Bhittani country.

On the 1st January, 1902, No. 1 Column moved from Jandola up the Takhi Zam to Kot Shingi, where it bivouacked.

No. 2 Column to Kirkanwam at the mouth of the Shaktu.

No. 3 Column from Datta Khel via Manirogha to Wachfakiran in the Khaisara.

The Northern Waziristan Militia moved to Kirkanwam, and the Southern Waziristan Militia to the Torkhar Narai in the Bhittani county.

No opposition was encountered.

2nd January, 1902.—No. 1 Column detaching a party of 600 rifles under Major Drew, 29th Punjab Infantry, to search the hills to the east of Zeriwam, moved on to Shilmanzai Kach,

whence it crossed a kotal, over which a route connects the Zam with Shuza. The rear-guard was slightly engaged. The force bivouacked, on the kotal. No. 2 Column marched up the Shaktu to Mandwam Kach, where it bivouacked encountering slight opposition. No. 3 Column marched to Waladin, where some resistance was encountered. January 3rd.—No. 1 Column marched to the junction of the Shuza and Wesh-tanai Algads and bivouacked there. No. 2 Column moved on to the Sodgarh range and down into the Sheranna, and destroyed the chief settlements of the Jalal Khels. No. 3 Column marched down the Shaktu and bivouacked on the Khar Kach, sending a force along the Ziarat range. January 4th.—No. 1 Column moved up the Shuza, pushing out columns to north and west. No. 2 Column, sending two guns and 500 infantry with the baggage, proceeded over the Sodgarh range. No. 3 Column, leaving their baggage in bivouac with a guard, proceeded to Barai Narai. January 5th.—No. 1 Column moved down the Shuza to the junction of the Wariamana. No. 2 Column proceeded to Kikarai, where it bivouacked, effecting a junction with No. 3 Column. No. 3 Column moved out over the Barai Narai on to the watershed of the Takhi Zam. The enemy opposed them all day and followed up the retirement till after dark. On return to bivouac, No. 3 Column joined force with No. 2. January 6th.—No. 1 Column marched to Murghaband. Nos. 2 and 3 Columns moved up the Shaktu. 7th January.—No. 1 Column moved to Jandola; Nos. 2 and 3 Columns marched to Dosalli. 8th January.—The two columns returned to Datta Khel.

22. The troops, or rather the greater portion of them, had now been marching and fighting since the 24th November and much needed a rest. I therefore withdrew the bulk of the Jandola Column into standing camp at Zam, the 38th Dogras and the 2nd Gurkhas to Miranshab, and the Murree Mountain Battery, the 3rd Gurkhas and the 27th Punjab Infantry to Baran on the Bannu border. These places were selected with a view to further operations, should such be necessary. The Militia returned to their usual stations.

23. Great damage had been inflicted on the Mahsud settlements in the Shaktu; they had lost heavily both in men and live-stock, and the knowledge that our troops could penetrate anywhere and everywhere into their territory, had convinced them of their inability to cope with us. A deputation of Saiads from Kaniguram was sent in to ask for a cessation of hostilities until they could hold a jirga, and discuss matters amongst themselves. The Commissioner on special duty agreed to a suspension of hostilities for some days, and also consented to receive their jirga on their complying with certain preliminary conditions. These have since been complied with and the blockade raised.

24. I beg to commend the services of the troops employed in the blockading force to the favourable notice of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief. They have had hard marching and hard fighting on occasions. They have bivouacked in the open for nights on end, and throughout their conduct has been exemplary. I trust that His Excellency may see fit to commend their services to Government.

25. I desire to commend for special recognition by His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief in India the names of the following Officers whose conspicuous gallantry has been prominently brought to my notice:—

Captain C. O. Swanston, 18th Bengal Lancers, Deputy-Assistant Adjutant-General.—On the 6th

January, 1902, Captain S. H. Sheppard, Royal Engineers, with a demolition party, had gone to blow up a tower, which it was believed had been evacuated by the enemy. On getting up to it, fire was opened from the upper story of the tower and one of the demolition party was wounded. Captain Sheppard got his party with the wounded man under cover of a shed, the wall of which protected them from the tower; but they could get no further, being hampered by the wounded man. Captain Swanston, who had been sent with a message to Captain Sheppard to tell him that guns were about to open fire on the tower, after the first discharge of the guns told some men who were near him to open fire at the tower, while he himself at great personal risk went across to Captain Sheppard's party, and the two Officers together then took the wounded man down the slope to a place of safety.

Captain D. A. D. McVean, 45th Sikhs.—For conspicuous gallantry on the 5th December, 1901, when Colonel McRae had ordered the retaking of a position which had been prematurely evacuated by one of his picquets. The incident is thus described by Colonel McRae: "Seeing that it was of the utmost importance to reach the summit where there was a sangar before the Mahsuds, he (i.e., Captain McVean) ran up to the top, thereby getting ahead of his men. He arrived at the top at the same time as a Mahsud and fired at him with his revolver, which twice missed fire. The Mahsud had two shots at him, one of which passed through his breast pocket, the other breaking his right wrist.

26. The gallant conduct of the following Officers also merits commendation:

Major W. Kirkpatrick, 1st Punjab Infantry.

Lieutenant E. C. Alexander, 1st Punjab Infantry.—On the 25th November, 1901, at Kot Shingi, during the retirement of the picquets, these two Officers, accompanied by two sepoys (who have been recommended for the Order of Merit), went back under fire for a hundred and fifty yards to bring in the body of Subadar Muhammad Gul, who had been killed during the retirement.

Captain W. H. Cox, Indian Medical Service.—For attending to the wounded in the firing line under a heavy fire.

Captain S. H. Sheppard, Royal Engineers.—Twice mentioned in Column Commander's despatches.

Captain F. T. Stewart, 45th Sikhs, Lieutenant L. L. Wheatley, D.S.O., 45th Sikhs, Captain H. A. Vallings, 29th Punjab Infantry.—For gallantry and forward leading on several occasions.

27. As regards Native ranks I attach (as Appendix D*) a list of men selected from among those mentioned on various occasions whom I would recommend for admission to the Order of Merit. With this list is a statement showing briefly the nature of the services rendered by each individual.

28. I also have the pleasure to bring to the favourable notice of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief the services of the following Officers:—

Personal Staff.

Captain R. G. Munn.—36th Sikhs, Aide-de-Camp.

Second Lieutenant J. B. Egerton.—3rd Punjab Cavalry, Orderly Officer. Both these Officers accompanied columns in the field and were brought to favourable notice by Column Commanders.

General Staff.

Major R. G. Egerton, Assistant Adjutant-General, is a Staff Officer of great ability, to whom I am much indebted for advice and assistance since I assumed control of the operations. He accompanied the troops during the third phase of the operations and was brought to favourable notice by General Denning in his report. I beg to bring his services specially to notice for favourable consideration.

Captain C. O. Swanston, Deputy-Assistant Adjutant-General, is an excellent Staff Officer. He accompanied Colonel McRae's column during the last series of operations, and was highly reported on, both for efficiency as a Staff Officer and gallantry in action.

Captain J. A. Wilson, Deputy-Assistant Adjutant-General, was sent as an additional Staff Officer, and has been of great assistance. He accompanied Lieutenant-Colonel Tonnochy's column in the last series of operations as Staff Officer, and was favourably reported on.

Captain A. S. Hamilton, Deputy-Assistant Quartermaster-General for Intelligence, was attached to General Denning's Staff, and has been very favourably mentioned.

Colonel G. McBride Davis, M.D., C.B., D.S.O., Indian Medical Service, Principal Medical Officer, is an Officer of very great practical experience and administrative ability, to whose power of organization it is largely due that the medical arrangements have been able to cope with the situation.

To Captain A. Mullaly, Chief Supply and Transport Officer, the whole blockading force is greatly indebted. It is principally due to his great energy and exertions that it has been possible to conduct operations from so many and so widely separated bases. I have never met a more efficient departmental Officer, and most strongly recommend him for some mark of appreciation of his services.

Brigade Staff.

29. Brigadier-General L. Denning, D.S.O., Commanding the Derajat District, was in charge of the blockade operations from August last. To him fell the task of putting into execution the plan of counter-raiding operations which had been decided on, and of arranging details, and to him is chiefly due the measure of success which has attended them.

Personal Staff.

Second Lieutenant H. Denning, Orderly Officer, accompanied General Denning throughout the operations and was favourably reported on.

Brigade Staff.

Major P. Malcolm, Assistant Adjutant-General, Derajat District.

Captain E. L. Sullivan, Deputy-Assistant Adjutant-General, Derajat District.

On these two Officers has fallen the brunt not only of the work connected with the operations in November and December, 1901, but of that caused by the large extra number of troops serving in the district. I commend them both to His Excellency's favourable consideration.

Lieutenant-Colonel W. A. Mawson, Indian Medical Service, Principal Medical Officer, Derajat District, had charge of the medical arrangements during the passive blockade and was largely responsible for these during the active operations. Before the arrival of the field hospitals he had, with scanty means, to provide for the medical needs of a number of regiments which arrived with hospitals on the relief scale, and this he did in an efficient manner. He has displayed administrative ability and rendered valuable service.

Column Commanders.

30. Colonel H. N. McRae, C.B., A.D.C., 45th Sikhs, a very capable commander and highly reported on by General Denning.

Lieutenant-Colonel W. du G. Gray, 1st Punjab Infantry, though never in actual charge of an independent column, had command of sub-columns on several occasions, and was favourably reported on by General Denning and Colonel McRae for his intelligence and resource, and knowledge of hill warfare. In this I concur.

Lieutenant-Colonel V. C. Tonnochy, 3rd Sikhs, has shown himself a very enterprising commander. His surprise of Makin and subsequent withdrawal with very trifling loss was certainly the most brilliant episode in the active blockade operations.

Lieutenant-Colonel A. F. Hogge, 23rd Pioneers, has commanded independent columns on two occasions and shown himself an able commander.

Lieutenant-Colonel W. E. Bunbury, 28th Punjab Infantry, commanded the Wana Column during the first series of operations, with marked success.

Lieutenant-Colonel R. W. MacLeod, 29th Punjab Infantry, commanded the Sarwakai Column during the first operations.

31. I append, for His Excellency's information, a list of Officers whose services have been brought to notice by General Denning and other Commanders of Columns.

32. Though the political and military authorities were not amalgamated during the operations, I must acknowledge my great indebtedness to the Commissioner on special duty, Mr. W. R. H. Merk, C.S.I., C.S., for his ready assistance and co-operation in all military operations undertaken or proposed, and also bring to special notice the following Officers of Militia:—

Major R. Harman, D.S.O., Commandant, Southern Waziristan Militia.

Captain A. F. Ferguson-Davie, D.S.O., Commandant, Northern Waziristan Militia.

33. The troops in the operations are tabulated, showing when employed, in Appendix B.

34. I am submitting the detailed reports of Column Commanders, Medical Department, and reconnaissance reports separately, together with the nominal roll of casualties (Appendix A) for information and record.

35. The summary of casualties* during the operations is as per margin; also the total losses† inflicted on the Mahsuds as ascertained by the local authorities.

issued by the Officer Administering the Government of Malta:—

No. 180.

Government Notice.

His Honour the Officer Administering the Government, having heard the opinion of the Council of Health, has been pleased to repeal Government Notice No. 171 of the 10th July, 1902, and to direct that the following regulations be observed as regards vessels and passengers, viz.:—

Infected places.

1. The following countries are, for purposes of quarantine, to be treated as infected:

- (a.) Arabia (excepting Persia and Aden);
- (b.) China;
- (c.) Egypt;
- (d.) India;

2. And the following ports:—

- (a.) Ports in the Persian Gulf.

Infected vessels.

3. Infected vessels are vessels which have, or have had, on board, during the voyage or the preceding 20 days, cases of cholera, yellow fever, plague, or any disease with symptoms which, in the opinion of the Chief Government Medical Officer, resemble the symptoms of the said diseases.

Vessels which are not allowed to enter the harbour, but are allowed to communicate with Quarantine Establishments.

4. Infected vessels.

5. Vessels with pilgrims from the East, when not carrying a recognized Medical Officer.

6. Vessels from infected places, when not carrying a recognized Medical Officer.

Vessels allowed to load in quarantine.

7. Vessels arriving at Malta without a clean bill of health.

8. Infected vessels when carrying a recognized Medical Officer and not having on board an actual case of the diseases mentioned in paragraph 3 on board.

9. Vessels from infected places not having on board an actual case of the diseases mentioned in paragraph 3, on arriving within 10 days from departure.

10. Vessels with pilgrims from the East when carrying a recognized Medical Officer.

Vessels from infected places admitted to pratique.

11. Vessels without a clean bill of health, or from infected places, will be admitted to pratique after 10 days from date of departure, *except vessels from Egyptian Ports which will not be admitted to pratique before the lapse of 21 days from date of arrival.*

Medical Inspection.

12. All vessels and passengers on arrival are subject to medical inspection.

Passengers.

13. Passengers, before landing, must declare on oath before a Marine Police Officer that they have not been in, or have not communicated with *Egypt within the last 21 days.* Otherwise they shall remain in quarantine to complete 21 days from departure *on board the vessel by which they shall have arrived.*

14. Passengers, before landing, must also declare on oath before a Marine Police Officer that they have not been in, or have not communicated with the infected places mentioned in Article 1, *except Egypt,* within 10 days. Otherwise they shall remain in quarantine to complete 10 days from departure.

15. Passengers arriving on vessels without a clean bill of health shall complete 10 days quarantine from departure.

16. Passengers arriving from infected places, *except Egypt,* more than 10 days after departure are allowed to land in free pratique after strict medical inspection and thorough disinfection of their persons, effects, and luggage, if the inspecting Medical Officer is satisfied that they are in good health.

17. Passengers not otherwise provided for are subjected to the restrictions applicable to the vessels on which they arrive.

18. When 20 days have elapsed from the last case of plague, cholera, or other disease against which restrictions have been in force with regard to a country or place declared to be an infected place, *except Egypt,* a notice will be issued by the Collector of Customs to the effect that the place or port is no longer to be dealt with as infected.

N.B.—Vessels that carry a doctor and pass through the Suez Canal without taking on board either cargo or passengers, will not be considered infected by contact with Canal Pilots taken on board from a disinfecting station, or by coaling and provisioning at Port Said under restrictions approved by the Chief Government Medical Officer.

The word “passengers,” as used in this Notice, includes the crew.

ORDER OF THE BOARD OF
AGRICULTURE.

(DATED 8TH AUGUST 1902.)

BURY ST. EDMUNDS (SWINE-FEVER)
ORDER OF 1902.

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 and 1896, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :

*Provisions of Markets and Fairs (Swine-Fever)
Order of 1896 applied to the Borough of
Bury St. Edmunds.*

1.—(1.) The provisions of the Markets and Fairs (Swine-Fever) Order of 1896 shall apply to the borough of Bury St. Edmunds, but no swine, fat or store, shall be moved out of the said borough, except as expressly authorized by this Order.

(2.) Nothing in this Article shall be deemed to apply to the movement of swine where they are moved through that borough by railway from a place outside that borough to another place outside that borough without unnecessary delay and without the swine being untrucked or rebooked within that borough.

(3.) Swine may be moved with a Licence of an Inspector of the Board or of a person authorized by the Board to grant the same, which Licence will only be granted where the Board, after inquiry, are satisfied that exceptional circumstances render the movement necessary or expedient.

*Exclusion of Borough of Bury St. Edmunds from
Scheduled Order.*

2 From and after the commencement of this

Order, the borough of Bury St. Edmunds shall cease to form part of the Swine-Fever Infected Area declared by the Order described in the Schedule hereto: Provided that such withdrawal shall not invalidate or make unlawful anything done under such Order and the Swine-Fever (Infected Areas) Order of 1896 before the commencement of this Order, or interfere with the institution or prosecution of any proceeding in respect of any offence committed against, or any penalty incurred under, those Orders before the commencement of this Order.

Offences.

3. If a pig is moved in contravention of this Order, the owner of the pig, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the pig, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the pig is moved, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

Commencement.

4. This Order shall come into operation on the twelfth day of August, one thousand nine hundred and two.

Short Title.

5. This Order may be cited as the BURY ST. EDMUNDS (SWINE-FEVER) ORDER OF 1902.

BYE LAWS AND REGULATIONS

made by

THE GREAT ORME TRAMWAYS COMPANY,

Under the powers conferred on the Company by the Tramways Act, 1870.

Application of Bye-laws.

1. The Bye-laws and Regulations hereinafter set forth shall extend and apply to all cars of the Company and to all places with respect to which the Company have power to make Bye-laws or Regulations.

Entering or leave Car in motion.

2. No passenger shall enter or leave, or attempt to enter or leave any car while the same is in motion, or at any other than that place appointed by the Company for passengers to enter or leave the car.

Smoking.

3. No passenger shall smoke in any car.

Musical instruments.

4. No passenger or other person shall, while travelling in any car, play or perform upon any musical instrument.

Being intoxicated or using obscene language.

5. Any person found in a car or elsewhere upon the Company's premises in a state of intoxication or using obscene or abusive language or writing obscene or offensive words on any part of the Company's stations or cars, or committing any nuisance, or otherwise interfering with the comfort of other passengers, shall be immediately removed from the Company's premises.

Damaging property.

6. Any person who wilfully cuts or tears any lining or window strap or curtain, removes or defaces any number plate, or breaks or scratches any window of a car used on the tramway, or who otherwise, except by unavoidable accident, damages, defaces or injures any such car or any station or other property of the Company, is hereby subjected to a penalty prescribed by these Bye-laws and Regulations in addition to the amount of any damage for which he may be liable.

Passengers.

7. Any person whose dress or clothing might, in the opinion of any servant of the Company, soil or injure the linings or cushions of a car, or the dress or clothing of any passenger, or a person who, in the opinion of any servant of the Company, might for any other reason be offensive to passengers, shall not be entitled to enter or remain in any station or car, and may be prevented from entering such station or car, and shall not enter any station or car after having been requested not to do so by any servant of the Company, and, if found in any station or car, shall, on request of any servant of the Company, leave the station or car upon the fare (if paid) being returned.

Prepayment of Fare.

8. No passenger will be allowed to enter any car or to travel on the tramway without having first paid the fare.

Tickets.

9. Each passenger shall show his or her ticket (if any) when required to do so to the conductor, or any duly authorized servant of the Company; and shall also, when required so to do, deliver up his or her ticket or pay the fare legally demandable for the distance travelled over by such passenger.

Artizans' Tickets.

10. A person not being an artisan, mechanic, or daily labourer, within the true intent and meaning of the Acts of Parliament relating to the

Company, shall not use or attempt to use any ticket intended only for such artisans, mechanics, or daily labourers.

Travelling on steps, &c.

11. No passenger shall be permitted to travel on the roof, steps, brake, platform, or footboard of any car, or in any portion of any car not intended for the conveyance of passengers; and any passenger persisting in doing so after being warned to desist by the conductor in charge, or any duly authorized servant of the Company, shall be liable to be summarily removed.

Fares accepted where there is room.

12. The fares will only be accepted and the passengers admitted to the cars conditionally upon there being room therein.

Full Cars.
