(a.) In the vaults now existing in the said churchyard and belonging to James Woodgate Arbuthnot and Henry Charles Lee Steere, burial may be allowed subject to the condition that every coffin buried in such vaults be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented:

(b.) In the earthen grave now existing in the said churchyard in which the body of John Sheldrake is buried, the burial may be allowed, at or below the depth of five feet from the surface of the ground, of the body of any member of his family:

(c.) In the said portion of the churchyard, in any grave space in which no interment has heretofore taken place, the burial may be allowed, at or below the depth of five feet from the surface of the ground, of the body of any person for whom or of any member of a family for which such grave space has been reserved and appropriated as a burial place with the exclusive right of burial therein.

Now, therefore, His Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representations, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the twenty-eighth day of September next:
