The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven, and of the Act of the fifth year of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria (Session 2) chapter twenty-six duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the fifteenth day of March, in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, in the words and figures following, that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven, and of the Act of the fifth year of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria (Session 2), chapter twenty-six, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for authorizing certain alterations and improvements at the episcopal house of residence belong-

ing to the See of Ely which is situate at Ely.
"Whereas the Right Reverend Frederic
Henry, now Bishop of Ely, is desirous that certain permanent alterations and improvements should be made at the said episcopal house of residence situate at Ely and has submitted to us the particulars of such proposed alterations and improvements and we have approved the same.

"And whereas the said Bishop is also desirous and it appears to us to be expedient that towards the cost of effecting the said proposed alterations and improvements a sum not exceeding two thousand two hundred and fifty pounds (being a sum which together with balance outstanding of the sum of five hundred pounds borrowed upon the same security under the authority of the statutes hereinbefore mentioned does not exceed two years' income of the See) should be provided by borrowing the same by way of mortgage upon the security of all and every part of the lands tenements and hereditaments endowments or emoluments which now belong or may hereafter belong to the Bishoprick

of Ely.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said

"Now therefore with the consent of the said

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Frederic Henry, Bishop of Ely (testified by his having affixed his signature and episcopal seal to this scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that the said Bishop be authorized to borrow from the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne for the augmentation of the maintenance of the poor clergy and that the said Governors be empowered to lend under the provisious of the above-mentioned Acts a sum not exceeding two thousand two hundred and fifty pounds and that as a security for the same the said Bishop do mortgage all and every part of the lands tenements and hereditaments and

endowments or emoluments which now belong or may hereafter belong to his said See to the said Governors by deed for the term of twentyfive years or until the said sum of two thousand two hundred and fifty pounds, with the interest for the same as hereinafter mentioned, and all costs and charges which may attend the recovery thereof, shall be fully paid and satisfied and that such principal sum shall be repaid with interest in manner following, that is to say, during and in respect of the first period of twelve months of the said term of twenty-five years computed from the day of the date of the mortgage, no part of the said principal sum shall be repayable, but the said Bishop or his successors shall yearly at the end of the second period of twelve months so computed and at the end of every such like period of twelve months thereafter, pay to the said Governors their successors or assigns one twentieth part of the said principal sum until the whole thereof shall be repaid, and shall also at the end of the first and each succeeding period of twelve months, computed as aforesaid, pay interest at the rate of four pounds per centum per annum on the said principal sum or so much thereof as shall from time to time remain unpaid. And if and when it shall happen that either the principal or the interest directed to be paid as hereinbefore mentioned shall be in arrear and unpaid for the space of forty days after the same shall have become due it shall and may be lawful for the said Governors their successors and assigns to recover the same and the costs and charges attending the recovery thereof by distress and sale in the like manner as rents may be recovered by landlords or lessors from their tenants by the laws in force at the time of such distress and sale and that such mortgage deed shall be in the form and to the effect to be approved by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, and shall bind as well the said Frederic Henry, now Bishop of Ely, as every succeeding Bishop of Ely, until the principal money and interest costs and

charges shall have been paid off and discharged. "And we further recommend and propose that the said sum of two thousand two hundred and fifty pounds shall be paid to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, and that the receipt of our Joint Treasurers for the time being endorsed on the said mortgage deed shall be a good and sufficient discharge to the said Governors and their successors for the same, who shall not be bound or required to see to the application thereof, and that upon the receipt of the said sum of two thousand two hundred and fifty pounds the whole or any part thereof shall be applied by us at such times and in such manner as shall appear to us to be expedient towards effecting the said proposed alterations and improvements at the episcopal house of residence situate at Ely as aforesaid.

And we further recommend and propose that the Bishop of Ely for the time being shall at his personal charge insure against loss or damage by fire and keep insured the said episcopal house of residence situate at Ely as aforesaid the said insurance to be for a sum of eighteen thousand two hundred pounds and to be effected in one or more of the public offices of insurance in London or Westminster to be approved by us and that in case of loss or damage by fire to the same house of residence the moneys receivable in respect of the said insurance shall be paid over to us by the said Bishop and shall with any interest or accumulations thereon be applied by us in rebuilding or repairing the same house of residence with the concurrence of the said Bishop of Elv. Bishop of Ely.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in conformity with the provisions of the herein named Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council: Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Ely.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-seven, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the twenty-ninth day of March, in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, in the words following, that is to say:—

"And whereas by an Order of Her said late Majesty in Council, bearing date the nineteenth day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine, and published in the London Gazette on the twenty-sixth day of the same month, the alternate right of patronage of the said district and new parish of Saint Cuthbert, Newcastle-upon-Tyne, theretofore exercised under the twenty-first section of the said Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, by the Bishop of Newcastle, was transferred by way of exchange to Your Majesty Your heirs and successors.

"And whereas a capital sum of one thousand pounds sterling has been contributed and paid to the credit of our account at the Bank of England by Thomas George Gibson, of the city and county of Newcastle-upon-Tyne, Solicitor, and the Right Reverend Arthur Thomas, Bishop of Newcastle, towards the augmentation of the endowment of the said district and new parish of Saint Cuthbert, Newcastle-upon-Tyne, and for the benefit of the Vicar or Incumbent thereof, and we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, have in respect of the said sum, agreed with the said Thomas George Gibson and Arthur Thomas, Bishop of Newcastle, and have undertaken to provide and pay by equal quarterly payments on the first day of February, the first day of May, the first day of August, and the first day of November in each and every year to the Vicar or Incumbent of the said district and new parish of Saint Cuthbert, Newcastle-upon-Tyne being duly licensed thereto) the yearly sum of thirty pounds so long as the said capital sum shall remain in our hands.

"And whereas the said capital sum of one thousand pounds sterling was so contributed and paid by the said Thomas George Gibson and Arthur Thomas, Bishop of Newcastle, as aforesaid upon the understanding that (such arrangement appearing to us expedient) the whole right of patronage of the said district and new parish of Saint Cuthbert, Newcastle-upon-Tyne, and of the nomination of the Vicar or Incumbent thereto should be assigned to the Bishop of Newcastle for the time being in the manner which is hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas it has been made to appear to us that the assignment of the patronage and right of nomination and presentation of and to the said district and new parish of Saint Cuthbert, Newcastle-upon-Tyne, which has been proposed to us by the said Thomas George Gibson and Arthur Thomas, Bishop of Newcastle, as

aforesaid may properly be effected.

"Now therefore we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that the whole right of patronage of the said district and new parish of Saint Cuthbert, Newcastle-upon-Tyne, and of the nomination of the Vicar or Incumbent thereto shall without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette be assigned to and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Arthur Thomas, now Bishop of Newcastle, and by his successors in the same Bishoprick for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in conformity with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Act or of any other Act of

Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council: Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify

the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Newcastle.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of · Her said late Majesty in Council, bearing date the eighteenth day of February in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four and published in the London Gazette on the third day of March in the same year, part of the parish of Bishopwearmouth, in the said county of Durham and in the said diocese of Durham, was assigned as a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Paul situate at Ryhope in the said parish of Bishopwearmouth, and the said district chapelry was named 'The District Chapelry of Ryhope.

"And we further represent recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of

Parliament.

"The SCHEDULES to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

"THE FIRST SCHEDULE.

"The territory to be dissevered from the new parish of Ryhope, in the county of Durham and in the diocese of Durham, and to be annexed to the new parish of Saint Barnabas, Middle Hendon, in the same county and diocese, being all that portion of the said new parish of Ryhope which is bounded upon the north-east, upon the north-west and upon the south-west by the said new parish of Saint Barnabas, Middle Hendon, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the south-east and upon the east, by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Barnabas, Middle Hendon, from the said new parish of Ryhope crosses the middle of Ashby-street, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of Ashby-street for a distance of thirteen chains and a half or thereabouts to its junction with Commercial-road, and extending thence northward along the middle of Commercial-road for a distance of twelve chains Barnabas, Middle Hendon, have become new land a half or thereabouts to the boundary which

And whereas by the Medical Act (1886) Amendment Act, 1905, it is provided that for the purposes of the Medical Act, 1886, where any part of a British Possession is under a central and also under a local legislature, His Majesty may, if he thinks fit, by Order in Council, declare that the part which is under the local legislature shall be deemed a separate British Possession.

And whereas the Province of Nova Scotia, in the Dominion of Canada, is under a local legislature, and affords, in His Majesty's opinion, to the registered medical practitioners of the United Kingdom such privileges of practising in Nova Scotia as to His Majesty seems just.

Now, therefore, His Majesty doth hereby, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, order, direct, and declare that the Province of Nova Scotia shall be deemed to be a separate British Possession, and that the Second Part of the Medical Act, 1886, shall be deemed to apply to the said Province of Nova Scotia.

And whereas by divers Orders in Council made under the said Acts, Her said Majesty has seen fit to constitute a Police Court Division and to assign the same to the Police Court called the Worship-street Police Court, and from time to time to alter and define the extent of such Division:

And whereas His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, has deemed it expedient that the said Police Court should be removed to a certain new building, situate in Old-street, in the Metropolitan Borough of Shoreditch, in the county of London, and within the Metropolitan Police District, and that such new Police Court should thenceforth be known and called by the name of the Old-street Police Court.

1. The expression "Shop Goods" shall include:—

or any firework (other than a toy firework) containing its own means of ignition, whether or not named in the foregoing list of "Shop Goods," or any firework liable to explode violently.

The expression "toy firework" means a firework containing such small quantity of explosive of the Fifth (Fulminate) Class as is specified in the definition of such firework in a List of Authorized Explosives signed by a Government Inspector and in force for the time being, and includes amorces, throwdowns, and crackshots.

2. In reckoning the amount which may be kept on registered premises, as prescribed by the said Order in Council of the twenty-sixth October, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six, every two pounds (2 lbs.) of "Shop Goods" shall be deemed to be equivalent to one pound (1 lb.) of manufactured fireworks*.

3. Notwithstanding anything contained in the said Order in Council, dated the twenty-sixth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six, the substantial receptacle therein prescribed for the keeping of explosive under Mode B may be a japanned or tinned iron or steel trunk or box, a wooden box, a cupboard, a drawer, or where "Shop Goods" only are contained therein, a glass show case, provided that the said show case is not situated in the shop window.

When such receptacle contains only "Shop Goods," and is so situated as not to be readily accessible to mischievous persons, it shall not be required to be locked, provided that it is kept closed at all times when fireworks are not being actually placed therein or withdrawn therefrom.

WHEREAS by the Extradition Acts, 1870 to 1895, it was amongst other things enacted that, where an arrangement has been made with any foreign State with respect to the surrender to such State of any fugitive criminals, His Majesty may, by Order in Council, direct that the said Acts shall apply in the case of such foreign State; and that His Majesty may, by the same or any subsequent Order, limit the operation of the Order, and restrict the same to fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in the part of His Majesty's dominions specified in the Order, and render the operation thereof subject to such conditions, exceptions, and qualifications as may be deemed expedient;

And whereas a Treaty was concluded on the nineteenth day of April, one thousand nine hundred and five, between His Majesty and the President of the Republic of Nicaragua, for the mutual extradition of fugitive criminals, which Treaty is in the terms following:—

Treaty between the United Kingdom and the Republic of Nicaragua for the Mutual Surrender of Fugitive Criminals.

Hrs Majesty the King of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, Emperor of India, and His Excellency the President of the Republic of Nicaragua, having determined, by common consent, to conclude a Treaty for the extradition of criminals, have accordingly named as their Plenipotentiaries:

His Majesty the King of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, Emperor of India; Herbert William Broadley Harrison, Esquire, Companion of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, His Majesty's Chargé d'Affaires in the Republic of Nicaragua; and His Excellency the President of Nicaragua; Doctor Adolfo Altamirano, Minister of Foreign Affairs; who, after having communicated to each other their respective full powers, found in good and due form, have agreed upon the following Articles:—

ARTICLE I.

The High Contracting Parties engage to deliver up to each other those persons who, being accused or convicted of a crime committed in the territory of the one Party, shall be found within the territory of the other Party, under circumstances and conditions stated in the present Treaty.

ARTICLE II.

Extradition shall be reciprocally granted for the following crimes and offences:—

- 1. Murder, or attempt or conspiracy to murder.
- 2. Manslaughter.
- 3. Administering drugs or using instruments with intent to procure the miscarriage of women.
 - 4. Rape.
- 5. Carnal knowledge, or any attempt to have carnal knowledge of a girl under the age of puberty, according to the laws of the respective countries.

Tratado entre le Gran Bretaña y la República de Nicaragua para la extradición recéproca de criminales fugitivos.

Su Majestad el Rey del Reino Unido de la Gran Bretaña é Irlanda y de los dominios británicos de allende los mares, Emperador de la India, &c., &c., y El Presidente de la República de Nicaragua, habiendo determinado, por mútuo acuerdo, concluir un tratado para la extradición de criminales, han nombrado por sus Plenipotenciarios, al efecto:

Su Majestad el Rey del Reino Unido de la Gran Bretaña é Irlanda, &c.; al Señor Herbert William Broadley Harrison, Caballero, Socio de la muy distinguida Orden de San Miguel y San Jorge, Encargado de Negocios de Su Majestad Británica en Nicaragua; y el Señor Presidente de la República de Nicaragua; al Señor Doctor Don Adolfo Altamirano, Ministro de Relaciones Exteriores; quienes, habiéndose comunicado sus respectivos Plenos Poderes, y halládolos en debida forma, han convenido los artículos siguientes:—

ARTICULO I.

- 13. Threats, by letter or otherwise, with intent to extort money or other things of value.
 - 14. Perjury, or subornation of perjury.
 - . 15. Arson.
- 16. Burglary or house-breaking, robbery with violence, larceny, or embezzlement.
- 17. Fraud by a bailee, banker, agent, factor, trustee, director, member, or public officer of any Company.
- 18. Obtaining money, valuable security, or goods by false pretences; receiving any money, valuable security, or other property, knowing the same to have been stolen or unlawfully obtained.
- 19. (a.) Counterfeiting or altering money or bringing into circulation counterfeited or altered money.
- (b.) Knowingly making without lawful authority any instrument, tool, or engine adapted or intended for the counterfeiting of the coin of the realm.
 - 20. Forgery, or uttering what is forged.
 - 21. Crimes against bankruptcy law.
- 23. Any malicious act done with intent to endanger the safety of any persons travelling or being upon a railway.
- being upon a railway.

 23. Malicious injury to property, if such offence be indictable.
- 24. Piracy and other crimes or offences committed at sea against persons or things which, according to the laws of the High Contracting Parties, are extradition offences.
- 25. Dealing in slaves in such a manner as to constitute a criminal offence against the laws of both States.

Extradition shall also be granted for participation in any of the aforesaid crimes, provided such participation be punishable by the laws of both Contracting Parties.

Extradition may also be granted at the discretion of the State applied to in respect of any other crime for which, according to the laws of both the Contracting Parties for the time being in force, the grant can be made.

Provided that the surrender shall be made only when, in the case of a person accused, the commission of the crime shall be so established as that the laws of the country where the fugitive or person so accused shall be found would justify his apprehension and commitment for trial if the crime had been there committed; and, in the case of a person alleged to have been convicted, on such evidence as, according to the laws of the country where he is found, would prove that he had been convicted.

Extradition shall not be granted if, according to the laws of either country, the maximum punishment for the offence charged is imprisonment for less than one year.

ARTICLE III.

No Nicaraguan shall be delivered up by the Government of Nicaragua to the Government of the United Kingdom, and no subject of the United Kingdom shall be delivered up by the Government thereof to the Government of Nicaragua.

Procederá también la extradición por la participación en cualquiera de los crímenes mencionados si esa participación fuese penada por las leyes de ambas Partes Contratantes.

También procederá la extradición á discreción del Estado á que se pida respecto de delitos por los cuales, según las leyes vigentes de las Altas Partes Contratantes, sea de concederse.

La entrega se hará únicamente si la comisión del crimen por la persona acusada se probare de tal manera que las leyes del país donde el fugitivo ó persona acusada se encuentre, autoricen su captura ó encausamiento, si en él se hubiere cometido el crimen; y tratándose de una persona que se pretenda haber sido sentenciada, será preciso que se pruebe esta circunstancia según las leyes del país donde aquella se encuentre.

No se otorgará la extradición si, conforme á las leyes de cualquiera de los dos paises, el maximun de la pena del delito de que se trate, sea prisión por menos de un año.

ARTICULO III.

No entregará el Gobierno de Nicaragua al Gobierno del Reino Unido, á ningún nicaraguense; y el Gobierno del Reino Unido no entregará á ningún súbdito suyo al Gobierno de Nicaragua.

ARTICLE IV.

The extradition shall not take place if the person claimed on the part of the Government of the United Kingdom, or the person claimed on the part of the Government of Nicaragua, has already been tried and discharged or punished, or is still under trial in the territory of Nicaragua or in the United Kingdom respectively for the crime for which his extradition is demanded.

If the person claimed on the part of the Government of the United Kingdom, or if the person claimed on the part of the Government of Nicaragua, should be under examination for any crime in the territory of Nicaragua or in the United Kingdom respectively, his extradition shall be deferred until the conclusion of the trial and the full execution of any punishment awarded to him.

ARTICLE V.

The extradition shall not take place if, subsequently to the commission of the crime, or the institution of the penal prosecution or the conviction thereon, exemption from prosecution or punishment has been acquired by lapse of time, according to the laws of the State applied to.

ARTICLE VI.

A fugitive shall not be surrendered if the offence in respect of which his surrender is demanded is one of a political character, or if he prove that the requisition for his surrender has in fact been made with a view to try or punish him for an offence of a political character.

ARTICLE VII.

A person surrendered can in no case be kept in prison or be brought to trial in the State to which the surrender has been made for any other crime, or on account of any other matters than those for which the extradition shall have taken place. This stipulation does not apply to crimes committed after the extradition.

ARTICLE VIII.

The requisition for extradition shall be made through the Diplomatic Agents, or duly recognised Consuls-General of the High Contracting Parties respectively.

The requisition for the extradition of an accused person must be accompanied by a warrant of arrest issued by the competent authority of the State requiring the extradition, and by such evidence as, according to the laws of the place where the accused is found, would justify his arrest if the crime had been committed there

If the requisition relates to a person already convicted, it must be accompanied by a sentence of condemnation passed against the convicted person by the competent Court of the State that makes the requisition for extradition.

A sentence passed in contumaciam is not to be deemed a conviction, but a person so sentenced may be dealt with as an accused person.

ARTICULO IV.

No se efectuará la extradición si la persona reclamada por el Gobierno del Reino Unido ó él de Nicaragua hubiese sido ya juzgada y absuelta ó castigada, ó se le estuviere juzgando en Nicaragua ó en el Reino Unido respectivamente, á causa de un delito por el cual se reclama la extradición.

Si la persona reclamada por el Gobierno del Reino Unido ó él de Nicaragua estuviere juzgándose en los respectivos territorios, se deferirá la extradición hasta la conclusión del juicio y plena ejecución de la sentencia condenatoria que recaiga.

ARTICULO V.

No se efectuará la extradición, si cometido el delito ó iniciada la causa, ó pronunciada la sentencia penal llegare el caso de prescripcion por razón de tiempo conforme á las leyes del Estado requerido.

ARTICULO VI.

Si el delito por que se reclama la extradición fuere de carácter politico, ó si se probare, bien sea por el reclamado, que la demanda de extradición, ha sido, en realidad, hecha con la mira de juzgarle ó castigarle por delito de carácter politico, no tendrá lugar la extradición.

ARTICULO VII.

La persona extraida, no podrá en ningún caso mantenerse en prisión ó someterse á juicio en el Estado al cual se haya concedido su extradición, por ningún otro delito, ni por razón de ningún otro asunto que aquellos por los cuales se hubiese concedido la extradición. Esta estipulación no es aplicable á los delitos cometidos después de la extradición.

ARTICULO VIII.

La demanda de extradición se hará por medio de los agentes diplomáticos ó Cónsules-Generales debidamente reconocidos, de las Altas Partes Contratantes respectivamente.

La demanda de extradición de una persona acusada debe ir acompañada de la órden de detención emitida por la autoridad competente del Estado que pida la extradición, y de las pruebas que, según las leyes del país donde el acusado se encuentre, permitan su detención si allí hubiera cometido el delito.

Si la demanda se refiere á una persona ya sentenciada, se acompañará la sentencia condenatoria pronunciada por el tribunal competente del Estado que haga la demanda.

La sentencia pronunciada en contumacia no se tendrá por pasada en autoridad de cosa juzgada; pero la persona así sentenciada puede ser tratada como acusada.

ARTICLE IX.

If the requisition for extradition be in accordance with the foregoing stipulations, the competent authorities of the State applied to shall proceed to the arrest of the fugitive.

The prisoner is then to be brought before a competent Magistrate, who is to examine him and to conduct the preliminary investigation of the case, just as if the apprehension had taken place for a crime committed in the same country.

ARTICLE X.

The extradition shall not take place before the expiration of fifteen days from the apprehension, and then only if the evidence be found sufficient, according to the laws of the State applied to, either to justify the committal of the prisoner for trial, in case the crime has been committed in the territory of the said State, or to prove that the prisoner is the identical person convicted by the Courts of the State which makes the requisition.

ARTICLE XI.

In the examinations which they have to make in accordance with the foregoing stipulations, the authorities of the State applied to shall admit as entirely valid evidence the sworn depositions or statements of witnesses taken in the other State, or copies thereof, and likewise the warrants and sentences issued therein, provided such documents are signed or certified by a Judge, Magistrate, or officer of such State, and are authenticated by the oath of some witness, or by being sealed with the official seal of the Minister of Justice, or some other Minister of State.

ARTICLE XII.

If sufficient evidence for extradition be not produced within two months from the date of the apprehension of the fugitive, he shall be set at liberty.

ARTICLE XIII.

All articles seized which were in the possession of the person to be surrendered at the time of his apprehension shall, if the competent authority of the State applied to for the extradition has ordered the delivery thereof, be given up when the extradition takes place; and the said delivery shall extend, not merely to the stolen articles, but to everything that may serve as a proof of the crime.

ARTICLE XIV.

The High Contracting Parties renounce any claim for the reimbursement of the expenses incurred by them in the arrest and maintenance of the person to be surrendered and his conveyance till placed on board ship; they reciprocally agree to bear such expenses themselves.

ARTICULO IX.

Si la demanda de extradición fucre conforme con las estipulaciones anteriores, la autoridad competente del Estado á que se haga, procederá á la detención del fugitivo.

El detenido será puesto en seguida á disposición de un Juez competente, que le tomará declaración indagatoria y tendrá á su cargo la investigación sumaria del caso, exactamente como si la detención se hubiere efectuado por delito cometido en el mismo país.

ARTICULO X.

No se efectuará la extradición antes de quince días contados desde la fecha de la detención, y unicamente si la prueba que se presente fuere bastante según las leyes del Estado á que se reclama, ya para el eujuiciamiento del detenido si el delito se hubiera cometido en el territorio de dicho Estado, ó para su identificación si hubiere sido condenado por tribunales del Estado que lo reclame.

ARTICULO XI.

En las investigaciones que harán las autoridades del Estado á que se pida la extradición, conforme á las estipulaciones que anteceden, admitirán como enteramente válidas las pruebas deposiciones juradas ó declaraciones de testigos que se tomen en el otro Estado, ó copias de las unas y las otras, y también las órdenes y sentencias en él emitidas, debiendo tales documentos estar firmados ó certificados por un Juez, Magistrado ó empleado del Estado y autenticados por Secretario ó testigos ó sellados con el sello oficial del Ministro de Justicia ó de otro Ministro de Estado.

ARTICULO XII.

Si no se produjere dentro de dos meses de la fecha de la detención del fugitivo, suficiente prueba para fundar la extradición, el fugitivo scrá puesto en libertad.

ARTICULO XIII.

Al efectuarse la extradición, se entregarán los artículos embargados que se hallen en poder de la persona reclamada al tiempo de su detención, si la autoridad competente del Estado á quien se haya pedido la extradición ordenase su entrega; y esta comprenderá no solo los efectos robados, sino también cuanto pueda servir como prueba del delito.

ARTICULO XIV.

Las Altas Partes Contratantes renuncian toda pretensión al reembolso de los gastos que sufraguen en la detención y mantenimiento de las personas reclamadas y su conducción á bordo de un buque. Recíprocamente sufragarán esos gastos.

ARTICLE XV.

The stipulations of the present Treaty shall be applicable to the Colonies and foreign possessions of His Britannic Majesty. The requisition for the surrender of a fugitive criminal, who has taken refuge in any of such Colonies or foreign possessions, shall be made to the Governor or Chief authority of such Colony or possession by the chief Consular officer of Nicaragua in such Colony or possession.

Such requisitions may be disposed of (subject always, as nearly as may be, to the provisions of this Treaty) by the said Governor or chief authority, who, however, shall be at liberty either to grant the surrender or to refer the matter to his Government.

His Britannic Majesty shall, however, be at liberty to make special arrangements in the British Colonies and foreign possessions for the surrender of Nicaraguan criminals who may take refuge within such Colonies and foreign possessions, on the basis, as nearly as may be, of the provisions of the present Treaty.

The requisition for the surrender of a fugitive criminal from any Colony or foreign possession of His Britannic Majesty shall be governed by the rules laid down in the preceding Articles of the present Treaty.

ARTICLE XVI.

The present Treaty shall come into force ten days after its publication, in conformity with the forms prescribed by the laws of the High Contracting Parties. It may be terminated by either of the High Contracting Parties by a notice not exceeding one year, and not less than six months.

It shall be ratified, and the ratifications shall be exchanged in London within the period of six months from the date of signature.

In witness whereof the respective Plenipotentiaries have signed the same, and affixed thereto their respective seals.

Done in duplicate at Managua, the nineteenth day of April, one thousand nine hundred and five.

ARTICULO XV.

Las estipulaciones del presente Tratado serán aplicables à las colonias y posesiones de ultramar de Su Majestad Británica. El requerimiento para la entrega de un reo fugitivo que se haya refugiado en cualquiera de tales colonias ó posesiones de ultramar, lo formulará el agente consular superior de Nicaragua en aquella colonia ó posesión, dirigiéndolo al Gobernador ó autoridad superior de la misma. De estos requerimientos conocerá y resolverá dicho Gobernador ó autoridad superior, sujeto siempre en cuanto sea posible á lo que este Tratado previene; pero tendra libertad de conceder la extradición ó de someter el asunto á su Gobierno.

Sin embargo Su Majestad Británica tendrá libertad para efectuar arreglos especiales en las colonias británicas ó posesiones de ultramar, basados en cuanto sea posible, en las estipulaciones del presente Tratado, á fin de hacer la entrega de los reos nicaraguenses.

La demanda de extradición de un criminal fugitivo de cualquier colonia ó posesión de ultramar de Su Majestad Británica, se ajustará á las reglas prescritas en los artículos precedentes de este Tratado.

ARTICULO XVI.

El presente Tratado entrará en vigor diez días después de su publicación, de acuerdo con las formas prescritas por las leyes de las Altas Partes Contratantes. Cualquiera de las dos Altas Partes Contratantes podrá tenerlo por terminado notificando al efecto á la otra Parte dentro de un término que no sea de menos de seis meses ni más de un año.

Este Tratado se ratificará y las ratificaciones se canjearán en Londres dentro del término de seis meses contados desde la fecha de la firma.

En fe de lo cual, los respectivos Plenipotenciarios han firmado el presente Tratado y selládolo con sus sellos.

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, and in virtue of the authority committed to Him by the said recited Acts, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the 25th day of May, one thousand nine hundred and six, the said Acts shall apply in the case of the Republic of Nicaragua, under and in accordance with the said Treaty:

Provided always that the operation of the said Acts shall be and remain suspended within the Dominion of Canada so long as an Act of the Parliament of Canada passed in 1886, and entitled "An Act respecting the Extradition of Fugitive Criminals," shall continue in force there, and no longer.

WHEREAS Their Highnesses the Sultans and Chiefs of the Federated Malay States of Perak, Selangor, Negri Sembilan and Pahang respectively have expressed a desire that an appeal shall lie from the Court of Appeal, being the Supreme Court having jurisdiction in civil matters, in the said States respectively to His Majesty in Council, and have severally expressed the desire to confer upon His Majesty power and jurisdiction by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council to entertain and decide such appeals.

And whereas in pursuance of such desire and in order to give effect thereto Their Highnesses in Council have enacted for the States of Perak, Selangor, Negri Sembilan and Pahang respectively enactments to amend the law relating to the constitution and powers of the Civil and Criminal Courts, shortly entitled "The Courts Enactment

And whereas by each of such enactments it is, amongst other things, provided that from any judgment or order of the Court of Appeal in any civil matter an appeal may be made to His Majesty in Council subject to such rules and regulations as may from time to time be prescribed by Order of His Majesty in Council.

And whereas it is expedient to make such rules and regulations as aforesaid for appeals from the Court of Appeal of the Federated Malay States to His Majesty in Council.

Now, therefore, it is hereby ordered by the King's Most Excellent Majesty by and with the advice of His Privy Council as follows:

- 1. This Order may be cited as the Federated Malay States Appeals Order in Council, 1906.
- 2. In this Order the following expressions have the meanings hereby assigned to them, that is to say:-
- · "The .Federated Malay States" means the Malay States of Perak, Selangor, Negri Sembilan and Pahang.
- "Court of Appeal" means the Court of Appeal of the Federated Malay States.
- "Prescribed" means prescribed by Rules of Court made under the provisions of any enactment in that behalf for the time being in force in the Federated Malay States or any of them.
- 3.—(1) Where a final Judgment or Order of the Court of Appeal made in a civil action involves the amount or value of five hundred pounds or upwards, any party aggrieved thereby may, within the prescribed time, or, if no time is prescribed, within fifteen days after the same is given or made, apply by motion to the Court of Appeal for leave to appeal to His Majesty the King in Council.
- (2) The applicant shall give security to the satisfaction of the Court to an amount not exceeding five hundred pounds for the prosecution of the appeal, and for such costs in the event of the dismissal of the appeal for want of prosecution as the Court of Appeal may award, and for payment of all such costs as may be awarded to any respondent by His Majesty in Council, or by the Lords of the Judicial Committee of His Majesty's Privy Council.
 - (3) He shall also pay into the Court of Appeal i

- At the Court at Buckingham Palace, the 11th | a sum estimated by that Court to be the amount of the expense of the making up and transmission to England of the transcript of the record.
 - (4) If security and payment are so given and made within two months from the filing of the motion-paper for leave to appeal, then, and not otherwise, the Court of Appeal shall give leave to appeal, and the appellant shall be at liberty to prefer and prosecute his appeal to His Majesty in Council according to the Rules for the time being in force respecting appeals to His Majesty in Council from His Colonies, or such other Rules as His Majesty in Council from time to time thinks fit to make concerning appeals from the Court of Appeal.
 - (5) In any case the Court of Appeal, if it considers it just or expedient to do so, may give leave to appeal on the terms and in the manner aforesaid.
 - 4.—(1) Where leave to appeal to His Majesty in Council is applied for by a person ordered to pay money or do any other act, the Court of Appeal shall direct either that the order appealed from be carried into execution, or that the execution thereof be suspended pending the appeal, as the Court thinks just.
 - (2) If the Court directs the order to be carried into execution, the person in whose favour it is made shall, before the execution of it, give security to the satisfaction of the Court for performance of such order as His Majesty in Council may think fit to make.
 - (3) If the Court directs the execution of the order to be suspended, the party against whom it is given shall, before an order for suspension is made, give security to the satisfaction of the Court for performance of such order as His Majesty in Council may think fit to make.
 - 5. This Order shall not affect the right of His Majesty at any time, on the humble petition of a person aggrieved by a decision of the Court of Appeal, to admit his appeal thereon on such terms and in such manner as His Majesty in Council may think fit, and to deal with the decision appealed from in such manner as may be just..
 - 6. His Majesty in Council may at any time alter, add to, or revoke this Order.

And the Right Honourable the Earl of Elgin, one of His Majesty's principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

HEREAS by Treaty, grant, usage, sufferance, or other lawful means, His Majesty the King has jurisdiction within the dominions of His Highness the Sultan of Zanzibar:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in this behalf by "The Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890," or otherwise in His Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the

advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

PART I .- PRELIMINARY.

1. This Order may be cited as "The Zanzibar Order in Council, 1906."

The limits of this Order are the Islands of Zanzibar and Pemba, including the territorial waters thereof, and any islets within those waters, which islands and waters are in this Order (except when the context requires a different construction) included in the expression "Zanzibar."

2. This Order is divided into Parts, as follows:—

Part I. Preliminary.

Part II. Application and effect of Order.

Part III. Constitution of Courts.

Part IV. Application of the Decrees of the Sultan of Zanzibar.

Part V. Criminal matters.

Part VI. Civil matters.

Part VII. Miscellaneous.

Part VIII. Repeal and transitory Provisions.

3. In this Order-

"The Secretary of State" means one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State;

"Treasury" means the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury;

"The British Agent" means His Majesty's Agent and Consul-General for Zanzibar;

"British subject" includes a subject of His Majesty by birth or naturalization;

"British protected person" means a person (a) who being a native of any place beyond the dominions of the Sultan of Zanzibar, which is under the Protectorate of His Majesty, is temporarily within the limits of this Order; or (b) who by virtue of "The Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890," or otherwise, enjoys His Majesty's protection in Zanzibar;

"British ship" includes a British ship within the meaning of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1894," and also a ship owned by a British-protected person, provided that it is not registered under a foreign flag;

"Zanzibar subject" means a subject of the Sultan of Zanzibar;

"Foreigner" means a subject or citizen of a State in amity with His Majesty, other than Zanzibar, and any person under or claimed as being under the protection of such State;

"Treaty" includes any Convention, Agreement, or Arrangement, made by or on behalf of His Majesty with any State or Government, King, Chief, people, or tribe, whether the Sultan of Zanzibar is or is not a party thereto;

"Administration" means (unless a contrary intention appears from the context) letters of administration, including the same with will annexed, or granted for special or limited purposes, or limited in duration;

"Ship" includes any vessel used in navigation, however propelled, with her tackle, furniture, and apparel, and any boat or other craft;

"Offence" means any act or omission made punishable by any law for the time being in force;

"Imprisonment" means imprisonment of either description, namely—(1) rigorous, that is, with hard labour, or (2) simple;

- "Month" means calendar month;
- "Will" means will, codicil, or other testamentary instrument;
- "Oath" or "affidavit" includes affirmation or declaration;
 - "Person" includes Corporation;

Words importing the plural or the singular may be construed as referring to one person or thing, or to more than one person or thing, and words importing the masculine as referring to females (as the case may require).

- 4.—(1.) Where this Order confers a power or imposes a duty, the power may be exercised and the duty shall be performed from time to time as occasion requires.
- (2.) Where this Order confers a power or imposes a duty on the holder of an office, then, unless a contrary intention appears, the power may be exercised and the duty shall be performed by the holder of the office for the time being, or by a person duly appointed to act for him.
- (3.) Where this Order confers a power to make rules, regulations, or orders the power shall be construed as including a power exercisable in the like manner, and subject to the like approval and conditions (if any), to rescind, revoke, amend, or vary the rules, regulations, or orders.
- 5. In the event of the death, incapacity, removal or absence from Zanzibar of the British Agent for the time being, all and every the powers, authorities, and immunities by this Order granted to him shall, until His Majesty's further pleasure is signified through the Secretary of State, be vested in the Senior Consular officer in His Majesty's service for the time being in Zanzibar.

PART II.-APPLICATION AND EFFECT OF ORDER.

- 6.—(1.) This Order extends to British subjects, to British protected persons, to foreigners with respect to whom the Sultan of Zanzibar has decreed or the Sovereign or Government whose subjects or citizens they are or under whose protection they are or are claimed as being, has, by Treaty or otherwise, agreed with His Majesty for, or consented to the exercise of jurisdiction by His Majesty and to Zanzibar subjects in the regular service of such foreigners; and the expression "person subject to this Order" shall be construed accordingly.
- (2.) This Order also extends to (a) the property and all personal or proprietary rights and liabilities in Zanzibar of persons subject to this Order; (b) British ships, with their boats, and the property on board thereof; and (c) foreign ships belonging to persons who are, or if they were in Zanzibar would be, persons subject to this Order, so, however, that jurisdiction over such foreign ships shall not be exercised otherwise than according to the practice of the High Court in England in the exercise of jurisdiction over foreign ships.
- (3.) This order also extends, in the cases and according to the conditions specified in this Order, to Zanzibar subjects and to foreigners not otherwise subject to this Order.
- 7. If any question arises whether the Sovereign or Government of any country has agreed with His Majesty for or consented to the exercise of jurisdiction by His Majesty over all or any of his or their subjects or citizens or over persons under or claimed as being under his or their protection, it shall be referred to the

Secretary of State, and a certificate under his hand and seal shall be conclusive on the question, and judicial notice shall be taken thereof.

Provided that nothing herein shall be held to abridge or take away the jurisdiction of the Court to determine whether any particular individual is or is not a subject or citizen of such Sovereign or Government, or under or claimed as being under his or their protection.

PART III.—CONSTITUTION OF COURTS.

- 8.—(1.) There shall be a Court styled "His Britannic Majesty's Court for Zanzibar," hereinafter referred to also as "the Court for Zanzibar" and "the Court."
- (2.) Subject to the other provisions of this Order, all His Majesty's jurisdiction in Zanzibar for the hearing and determination of suits shall be, and is hereby, vested in the Court for Zanzibar.
- (3.) There shall be a Judge, and as many Assistant Judges of the Court as may from time to time be required, who shall respectively be appointed by His Majesty by warrant under His Royal sign manual.
- (4.) The Judge and the Assistant Judges shall hold office during the pleasure of His Majesty.
- (5.) A person appointed to be Judge or Assistant Judge must be a member of the bar of England, Scotland, or Ireland, and must be of not less than five years' standing on appointment as Judge, and of not less than four years' standing on appointment as Assistant Judge.
- (6.) The Court shall also comprise a Magistrate, who shall be appointed by the Secretary of State. The Magistrate shall be a member of the bar of England, Scotland, or Ireland of not less than three years' standing at the date of his appointment, and shall hold office during pleasure.
- (7.) Subject to any Rules of Court, the Judge shall make any such arrangements as he thinks fit for the distribution of the business of the Court.
- 9. During a vacancy in the office of Judge, or in case of the illness or incapacity of the Judge, or of his absence from Zanzibar, the Secretary of State may appoint a fit person to act as Judge, but unless or until such appointment is made, the Assistant Judge or Senior Assistant Judge shall act as Judge.

An Acting Judge shall, during the continuance of his appointment, have all the power and authority of the Judge.

10. During a vacancy or temporary vacancy in the office of Assistant Judge, or in case of the absence, or illness, or other incapacity of an Assistant Judge, the Judge may, by writing under his hand and the seal of the Court, appoint any fit person, approved by the Secretary of State, or by the British Agent, to act as an Assistant Judge for the time therein mentioned or during the vacancy, as the case may be; but every such appointment shall be revocable, at pleasure, by the Judge; by writing under his hand and the seal of the Court, or by the Secretary of State.

The person so appointed shall, during the continuance of his appointment, have all the power and authority of an Assistant Judge.

11. The Court shall have a seal bearing the style of the Court, and a device approved by the Secretary of State; but the seal in use at the commencement of this Order shall continue to be used until a new seal is provided.

12. Subject to the directions of the Secretary of State, the Judge may appoint such and so many persons to be Registrars, Clerks, Bailiffs, Interpreters, and other officers of the Court as he thinks fit, and may remove from office any person so appointed.

Any Registrar of the Court, and any other officer of the Court designated in this behalf by the Judge, may administer oaths, and take affidavits, declarations, and affirmations.

- 13.—(1.) The Secretary of State may, if he thinks fit, appoint subordinate Courts to be held at places in Zanzibar, and may appoint a competent person to hold any such Court, under such designation, and with such remuneration as he may direct, and may assign to any such Court such jurisdiction as he may think fit, and may assign the district in and for which each such Court shall act, and may determine the description and number of the officers to be attached to any such Court and the mode of their appointment and removal, and their duties and remuneration, and any matters incident to any of the above-mentioned purposes.
- (2.) Any person appointed under the provisions of this Article shall be removable by authority of the Secretary of State.
- (3.) The Court for Zanzibar shall have within the district of any such subordinate Court an original jurisdiction concurrent with the jurisdiction thereof, and shall also have such appellate jurisdiction therefrom as may be assigned to it in the Order of the Secretary of State.
- (4.) During the absence, illness, or other incapacity of a person appointed by the Secretary of State to hold a subordinate Court the Judge may, by writing under his hand and the seal of the Court, appoint any fit person approved by the British Agent as a substitute; but every such appointment shall be revocable at pleasure by the Judge by writing under his hand and the seal of the Court or by the Secretary of State.

PART IV.—Application of the Decrees of the Sultan of Zanzibar.

- 14. Subject to the other provisions of this Order, and to any Treaties for the time being in force relating to Zanzibar, the Court shall apply to all persons subject to this Order the Decrees of the Sultan of Zanzibar, provided that they have been countersigned by the British Agent.
- 15. The enactments described in the First Schedule to "The Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890," shall apply to Zanzibar as if Zanzibar were a British Colony or possession, but subject to the provisions of this Order and to the exceptions, adaptations, and modifications following, that is to say:—
 - (i.) The British Agent is hereby substituted for the Governor of a Colony or British possession, and the Court for Zanzibar is hereby substituted for a Superior Court or Supreme Court and for a Magistrate or Justice of the Peace of a Colony or British possession.
 - (ii.) For the portions of the Merchant Shipping Acts, 1854 and 1867, referred to in the said Schedule, shall be substituted Part XIII of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1894."
 - (iii.) In section 51 of "The Conveyancing (Scotland) Act, 1874," and any enactment for the time being in force amending the same, the Court for Zanzibar is substituted for a Court of Probate in a Colony.

- (iv.) With respect to "The Fugitive Offenders Act, 1881,"—
- (a.) So much of the 4th and 5th sections of the said Act as relates to sending a report of the issue of a warrant, together with the information, or a copy thereof, or to the sending of a certificate of committal and report of a case, or to the information to be given by a Magistrate to a fugitive, shall be excepted, and in lieu of such information, the person acting as the Magistrate shall inform the fugitive that in the British possession or Protectorate to which he may be conveyed he has the right to apply for a writ of habeas corpus or other like process.
- (b.) So much of the 6th section of the said Act as requires the expiration of fifteen days before issue of a warrant shall be excepted.
- (c.) The British Agent shall not be bound to return a fugitive offender to a British possession unless satisfied that the proceedings to obtain his return are taken with the consent of the Governor of that possession.
- (d.) For the purposes of Part II of the said Act, Zanzibar, the East Africa and Uganda Protectorates, British India, Aden, Mauritius, and all British possessions and Protectorates in Africa south of the Equator shall be deemed to be one group of British possessions.

PART V.—CRIMINAL MATTERS.

- 16.—(1.) The Court for Zanzibar shall have full criminal jurisdiction over all persons subject to this Order.
- (2.) The Court shall exercise criminal jurisdiction over Zanzibar subjects accused of committing an offence against any person subject to this Order, and in such cases there shall be no appeal to the High Court of Bombay.
- .(3.) The Court shall have such appellate jurisdiction from the Criminal Courts of the Sultan of Zanzibar as may be assigned to it by decree of the Sultan countersigned by the British Agent.
- (4.) The Magistrate shall exercise such jurisdiction over natives of Africa who are subject to this Order, and subject to such rights of appeal to or revision or confirmation by the Judge or one or more of the Assistant Judges of the Court, as may from time to time be conferred upon him by Decree of the Sultan, countersigned by the British Agent.
- 17. Where a person subject to this Order is accused of an offence the cognizance whereof appertains to the Court for Zanzibar, and it is expedient that the offence be inquired of, tried, determined and punished in a British possession, the accused may, under "The Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890," section 6, be sent for trial to Bombay.

The Court may, where it appears so expedient, by warrant under the hand of a Judge and the seal of the Court, cause the accused to be sent for trial to Bombay accordingly.

The warrant shall be sufficient authority to any person to whom it is directed to receive and detain the person therein named, and to carry him to and deliver him up at Bombay according to the warrant.

Where any person is to be so sent to Bombay, the Court before which he is accused shall take the preliminary examination, and, if it seems necessary and proper, shall bind over such of the proper witnesses as are persons subject to this Order in their own recognizances to appear and give evidence on the trial.

- 18.—(1.) If a person subject to this Order, having appeared as prosecutor or witness at a preliminary examination, refuses to enter into a recognizance to appear at the trial to prosecute or give evidence, the Court may send him to prison, there to remain until after the trial, unless in the meantime he enters into a recognizance.
- (2.) But if afterwards, from want of sufficient evidence or other cause, the accused is discharged, the Court shall order that the person imprisoned for so refusing be also discharged.
- 19.—(1.) In cases of murder or culpable homicide, if either the death or the criminal act which wholly or partly caused the death happened in Zanzibar, a Court acting under this Order shall have the like jurisdiction over any person subject to this Order who is charged either as a principal offender or as an abettor, as if both the criminal act and the death had happened in Zanzibar.
- (2.) In the case of any offence committed on the high seas, or within the Admiralty jurisdiction, by any person subject to this Order, who at the time of committing such offence was on board a British ship, or on board a foreign ship to which he did not belong, a Court acting under this Order shall have jurisdiction as if the offence had been committed within Zanzibar.
- (3.) In cases tried under this Article no different sentence can be passed from the sentence which could be passed in England if the offence were tried there.
- 20. The Court may, if it thinks fit, by general order, prescribe the manner in which and the places in Zanzibar at which, sentences of imprisonment are to be carried into execution.
- 21.—(1.) Where an offender convicted before the Court is sentenced to imprisonment, and the Court, proceeding under section 7 of "The Fereign Jurisdiction Act, 1890," authority in that behalf being hereby given to it, considers it expedient that the sentence should be carried into effect within His Majesty's dominions, the place shall be a place in some part of His Majesty's dominions out of the United Kingdom the Government whereof consents that offenders may be sent thither under this Article.
- (2.) The Court may, by warrant under the hand of a Judge and the seal of the Court, cause the offender to be sent to Bombay, or other such place as aforesaid, in order that the sentence may be there carried into effect accordingly.
- (3.) The warrant shall be sufficient authority to any person to whom it is directed to receive and detain the person therein named, and to carry him to and deliver him up at the place named, according to the warrant.
- 22.—(1.) Where it is proved that there is reasonable ground to apprehend that a person subject to this Order is about to commit a breach of the public peace—or that the acts or conduct of a person subject to this Order are or is likely to produce or excite to a breach of the public peace—the Court may, if it thinks fit, cause him to be brought before it, and require him to give security to the satisfaction of the Court, to keep the peace, or for his future good behaviour, as the case may require.
- (2.) Where a person subject to this Order is convicted of an offence before the Court, the Court may, if it thinks fit, require him to give security to the satisfaction of the Court for his future good behaviour, and for that purpose may (if need be) cause him to be brought before the Court.

- (3.) In either of the foregoing cases, if the person required to give security fails to do so, the Court may order that he be deported from Zanzibar to such place and for such period as the Court directs.
- 23. Where it is shown by evidence on oath, to the satisfaction of the British Agent, that any person subject to this Order is conducting himself so as to be dangerous to peace and good order in Zanzibar, or is endeavouring to excite enmity between the Sultan or people of Zanzibar and His Majesty, or is intriguing against His Majesty's power and authority in Zanzibar or against the authority of the Sultan of Zanzibar, the British Agent may, if he thinks fit, by Order order that person to be deported from the Protectorate to such place and for such period as he shall direct:

Provided that where such person is a foreigner no such order shall be made by the British Agent without the concurrence in writing of the Consul of the State to which such foreigner belongs.

- 24.—(1.) In any case of deportation under this Order, the place to which the person is ordered to be deported shall be a place in some part (if any) of His Majesty's dominions to which the person belongs, or the Government of which consents to the reception of persons deported under this Order, or a place under the Protectorate of his Majesty, or in the country out of His Majesty's dominions to which the person belongs.
- (2.) An appeal shall not lie against an order of deportation made under this Order.
- (3.) The person to be deported shall be detained in custody until a fit opportunity for his deportation occurs.
- (4.) He shall, as soon as is practicable, and in the case of a person convicted, either after execution of the sentence or while it is in course of execution, be embarked in custody under the warrant of the British Agent or of the Court on board one of His Majesty's vessels of war, or, if there is no such vessel available, then on board any British or other fit vessel bound to the place of deportation.
- (5.) The warrant shall be sufficient authority to the commander or master of the vessel to receive and detain the person therein named, and to carry him to and deliver him up at the place named according to the warrant.
- (6.) If any master of a British ship, after a reasonable remuneration for the conveyance of a deported person has been tendered or paid to him, refuses or fails to carry such person to the place named, he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding 750 rupees.
- (7.) The expenses of deportation shall be defrayed in such manner as the Secretary of State, with the concurrence of the Treasury, may direct: Provided that where an order of deportation is made by the Court, the Court may order the person to be deported to pay all or any part of the expenses of his deportation.
- (8.) An order of deportation made, either by the British Agent or the Court, shall be reported to the Secretary of State forthwith, together with a statement of the grounds on which it has been made; and if made by the Court, shall be reported in like manner to the British Agent.
- (9). If any person deported under this or any former Order returns to Zanzibar without permission in writing of the Secretary of State (which permission the Secretary of State may give), he shall be guilty of an offence against

- this Order, punishable with imprisonment for a term which may extend to two months, or with fine which may extend to 1,000 rapees, or to both; and he shall also be liable to be forthwith again deported.
- 25. Any person convicted of an offence against any Decree, Law, Order, or Regulation in force in Zanzibar, for the breach of which no penalty is provided, shall be liable to imprisonment for a period not exceeding six months, or to a fine not exceeding 500 rupees, or to both.
- 26. When a warrant or order of arrest is issued by a competent judicial authority in the East Africa Protectorate or in the Uganda Protectorate for the apprehension of a person who is accused of crime committed in that Protectorate, and who is, or is supposed to be, within Zanzibar, and that warrant or order is produced to any Court acting under this Order, the Court may back the warrant or order, and the same, when so backed, shall be sufficient authority to any person to whom it was originally directed, and also to any constable or officer of the Court by whom it is backed, and to any person named on the back of the warrant or order, to apprehend the accused person at any place within the limits of this Order and to carry him to and deliver him up within the jurisdiction of the authority issuing the warrant or order.

PART VI.—CIVIL MATTERS.

- 27. The Court for Zanzibar shall have full civil jurisdiction over all persons subject to this Order.
- 28.—(1.) The Court for Zanzibar shall hear and determine all civil questions, claims, or disputes arising between any Zanzibar subject and any person subject to this Order, whether the former is either plaintiff or defendant.
- (2.) The High Court of Bombay shall not exercise jurisdiction in any such suit.
- 29.—(1.) The Court shall have Admiralty jurisdiction within the limits of this Order, and over vessels and persons coming within the same.
- (2.) The following enactments of "The Colonial Courts of Admiralty Act, 1890," that is to say, section 2, sub-sections (2) to (4); sections 5 and 6; section 16, sub-section (3); shall apply to the Court as if that Court were a Colonial Court of Admiralty, and as if Zanzibar were a British possession; and for the purpose of this application the expressions "judgment" and "appeal" shall in the enactments so applied have the same respective meanings as are assigned thereto in section 15 of the said Act.
- (3.) The duties of the Admiralty Registrar shall, until the Judge with the approval of the Secretary of State shall otherwise order, be performed by an Assistant Judge.
- 30.—(1.) The Court shall endeavour to obtain, as early as may be, notice of the death of every person subject to this Order dying and leaving property to be administered, and all such information as may serve to guide the Court with respect to the securing and administration of his property.
- (2.) On receiving notice of the death of such a person, the Court shall put up a Notice thereof at the Court house, and shall keep the same there until probate or administration is granted, or, where it appears to the Court that probate or administration will not be applied for, or cannot be granted, for such time as the Court thinks fit.
 - (3.) The Court shall, where the circumstances

- of the case appear so to require, as soon as may be, take possession of the property in Zanzibar of the deceased, or put it under the seal of the Court (in either case, if the nature of the property or other circumstances so require, making an inventory), and so keep it until it can be dealt with according to law.
- (4.) All expenses incurred by the Court in so doing shall be the first charge on the property of the deceased, and the Court shall, by sale of the property or part thereof, or otherwise, provide for the discharge of these expenses.
- 31. When a person subject to this Order dies intestate, his property shall, until administration is granted, vest in the Judge.
- 32. If any person named executor in a will takes possession of, and administers or otherwise deals with, any part of the property of the deceased, and does not obtain probate within one month after the death, or after the termination of any proceeding respecting probate or administration, he shall be liable to pay double the amount of the fee chargeable on obtaining probate, and he shall also be liable to a fine not exceeding 1,000 rupees.
- 33. The production of a grant of probate or of letters of administration shall, in all cases, be necessary to establish the right to recover any part of the estate or effects of any deceased person, subject to this Order, situate in Zan-
- 34. If any person other than the person named executor, or the administrator, or an officer of the Court, takes possession of and administers, or otherwise deals with, any part of the property of the deceased, he shall, as soon as practicable, notify the fact and the circumstances to the Court, and shall furnish to the Court all such information as the Court requires, and shall conform to any directions of the Court in relation to the custody, disposal, or transmission of the property, or the proceeds thereof, and, in case of any contravention of this Article, he shall be liable to pay double the amount of the fee chargeable on obtaining probate or letters of administration, and shall also be liable to a fine not exceeding 1,000 rupees.
- 35.—(1.) When the peculiar circumstances of the case appear to the Court so to require, for reasons recorded in its proceedings, the Court may, if it thinks fit, of its own motion, or otherwise, grant letters of administration to an officer or practitioner of the Court or to such other person as it may think fit.
- (2.) The person so appointed shall act under the direction of the Court, and shall be indemnified thereby; and if he is a practitioner shall not act otherwise than as administrator in relation to
- (3.) He shall publish such notices, if any, as the Court thinks fit, in Zanzibar or elsewhere.
- (4.) The Court shall require and compel him to file, in the proper office of the Court, his accounts of his administration, at intervals, not exceeding three months.
- (5.). The accounts shall be audited under the direction of the Court.
- (6.) All expenses incurred in behalf of the Court in execution of this Article shall be the first charge on the estate of the deceased in Zanzibar; and the Court shall, by the sale of the estate, or otherwise, provide for the discharge of those expenses.
- 36. All real or immovable property situate in

- to any person, subject to this Order, dying after the commencement of this Order, shall be deemed to be personal estate, and the devolution thereof, in case of intestacy, shall be regulated according. to the law of the person's domicile for the time being relating to personal estate or movable property.
- 37.—(1.) Where a Court of Probate in the United Kingdom, or in any British possession to which "The Colonial Probates Act, 1892," for the time being extends, has granted probate or letters of administration or confirmation in respect of the estate of a deceased person, the probate letters or confirmation so granted may, on being produced to and a copy thereof deposited with the Court, be sealed with the seal of the Court, and thereupon shall be of the like force and effect, and have the same operation as if granted by the Court.
- (2.) Provided that the Court shall, before sealing any probate letters or confirmation under this section, be satisfied either that all probate or estate duty has been paid in respect of so much of the estate situate in Zanzibar as is liable to such duty, or that security has been given in a sum sufficient to cover the property (if any) in Zanzibar, and may require such evidence (if any) as it thinks fit as to the domicile of the deceased
- (3.) The Court may also, if it thinks fit, on the application of any creditor, require, before sealing, that adequate security be given for the payment of debts due from the estate to creditors residing in Zanzibar.
- (4.) For the purposes of this Article, a duplicate of any probate letters of administration or confirmation, sealed with the seal of the Court granting the same, or a copy thereof certified as correct by or under the authority of the Court granting the same, shall have the same effect as the original.
- 38. Where it appears to the Court that the value of the property or estate of a deceased person does not exceed £50, the Court may, notwithstanding anything contained in this Order, without any probate or letters of administration, or other formal proceeding, pay thereout any debts or charges, and pay, remit, or deliver any surplus to such persons, subject to such conditions (if any) as the Court thinks proper, and shall not be liable to any action, suit, or proceedings in respect of anything done under this Article. Every proceeding of the Court under this Article shall be recorded in the Minutes.

PART VII.-MISCELLANEOUS.

- -(1.) Where it is proved that the attendance of any person subject to this Order to give evidence, or for any other purpose connected with the administration of justice, is required before a Court of the Sultan of Zanzibar, the Court for Zanzibar may, if it thinks fit, in a case and in circumstances in which the Court for Zanzibar would require the attendance of that person before the Court, order that he do attend as required. The order may be made subject to conditions as to payment or tender of expenses or otherwise.
- (2.) If the person ordered to attend, having reasonable notice of the time and place at which he is required to attend, fails to attend accordingly, and does not excuse his failure to the satisfaction of the Court for Zanzibar, or if, when so attending to give evidence, he wilfully gives false evidence, or refuses to be sworn or to give evidence, he shall, independently of any other Zanzibar, and belonging at the time of his death liability, be liable to be punished with imprison-

ment for a term which may extend to two months, or with fine which may extend to 1,000 rupees, or with both.

40. If a person subject to this Order-

- 1. Wilfully obstructs, by act or threat, any Court of the Sultan of Zanzibar in the performance of its duty; or
- 2. Within or close to the room or place where such a Court is sitting, wilfully misbehaves in a violent, threatening, or disrespectful manner, to the disturbance of the Court or to the intimidation of suitors or others resorting to the Court; or
- 3. Wilfully insults any member or officer of such a Court in his going to, or returning from, any place of sitting or office of the Court;

He shall, on conviction before the Court for Zanzibar, be liable to be punished with imprisonment for a term which may extend to two months, or with fine which may extend to 1,000 rupees, or with both.

- 41.—(1.) Every agreement for reference to arbitration between a person subject to this Order, on the one hand, and a person not subject to this Order, on the other hand, may, on the application of any party, be filed for execution in the proper office of the Court.
- (2.) The Court shall thereupon have authority to enforce the agreement and the Award made thereunder, and to control and regulate the proceedings before and after the Award, in such manner and on such terms as the Court may think fit.
- (3.) If a person subject to this Order wilfully gives false evidence in an arbitration, he shall, on conviction before the Court for Zanzibar be liable to the same punishment as if he were convicted of giving false evidence in a proceeding in that Court.
- 42.—(1.) A non-testamentary instrument to which a person subject to this Order is a party, executed after the 28th day of November, 1893, and purporting or operating to create, declare, assign, limit, or extinguish, whether in present or in future, any right, title, or interest, whether vested or contingent to, in, or over immovable property situate in Zanzibar, shall not affect any immovable property comprised therein, or be received as evidence of any transaction affecting that property, unless—
 - (a.) If the instrument was executed before the commencement of this Order, it has been registered at the registration office of the Zanzibar Government, or at His Majesty's Consulate, or at some other Consulate in accordance with the rules, if any, applicable to the registration of such instruments;
 - (b.) If the instrument was executed after the commencement of this Order, it has been registered in accordance with the Decrees of the Sultan of Zanzibar in force for the time being.
- (2.) Provided that nothing in this Article shall make any instrument inadmissible in evidence in any criminal proceeding.
- 43.—(1.) Notwithstanding anything in this Order, the Court for Zanzibar shall not exercise any jurisdiction in any proceeding whatsoever over the British Agent, or his official or other residences, or his official or other property.
- (2.) A person attached to or being a member of His Majesty's Agency and Consulate-General shall not, in giving evidence before the Court, be counselled or allowed to answer any question or produce any document if, in the opinion of the British Agent, signified by him personally or

in writing to the Court, the answering or production thereof would be injurious to His Majesty's service.

- 44. The Judge may make Rules of Court-
- (a.) For regulating the pleading, practice and procedure in the Courts established under this Order with respect to all matters within the jurisdiction of the respective Courts;
- (b.) For regulating the practice where any party wishes to appeal;
- (c.) For regulating the means by which particular facts may be proved in the said Courts;
 - (d.) For prescribing any forms to be used;
- (e.) For prescribing or regulating the duties of the officers of the said Courts;
- (f) For prescribing scales of costs and regulating any matters in connection therewith.
- (g.) For prescribing and enforcing the fees to be taken in respect of any proceedings under this Order, not exceeding, as regards any matters provided for by "The Consular Salaries and Fees Act, 1891," fees fixed and allowed from time to time by any Order in Council made under that Act;
- (h.) For prescribing the allowances to be made in criminal cases to complainants, witnesses, jurors, assessors. interpreters, medical practitioners, and other persons employed in the administration of justice, and the conditions upon which an order may be made by the Court for such allowances;
- (i.) For taking and transmitting depositions of witnesses for use at trials in a British possession or in the United Kingdom;
- (k.) For regulating the mode in which legal practitioners are to be admitted to practise as such, and for withdrawing or suspending the right to practise on grounds of misconduct, subject to a right of appeal to the High Court at Bombay.

Where under any Act of Parliament which is applicable to Zanzibar Rules may or are required to be made in England by the Lord Chancellor or any Judicial authority, the powers of this Article shall include a power to make such Rules for the purposes of that Act so far as applicable.

Rules framed under this Article shall not have effect until approved by the Secretary of State, and, so far as they relate to fees and costs, sanctioned by the Treasury; but in case of urgency declared in any such Rules with the approval of the British Agent, the same shall have effect unless and until they are disapproved by the Secretary of State, and notification of such disapproval is recorded and published by the Judge.

Until such Rules have been made, or in relation to matters to which they do not extend, the Court may follow and employ any Rules, practice, or forms heretofore in use in the Court and in force immediately before the commencement of this Order, with any modifications or adaptations which may be necessary.

- 45. The Court may, in any case, if it thinks fit, on account of the poverty of a party, or for any other reason, to be recorded in the Minutes, dispense with or remit the payment of any fee in whole or in part.
- 46.—(1.) Payment of fees payable under any Rules to be made in pursuance of this Order, and of costs and of charges and expenses of witnesses,

prosecutions, punishments, and deportations and of other charges and expenses, and of fines respectively payable under this Order, may be enforced under order of the Court by seizure and sale of goods, and, in default of sufficient goods, by imprisonment as a civil prisoner for a term not exceeding one month, but such imprisonment shall not operate as a satisfaction or extinguishment of the liability.

(2.) Any bill of sale or mortgage, or transfer of property made with a view of avoiding seizure or sale of goods or ship under any provision of this Order, shall not be effectual to defeat the

provisions of this Order.

47.—(1.) The British Agent may countersign Decrees made by the Sultan of Zanzibar in the exercise of his authority over his dominions, and such Decrees shall thereupon become binding on all persons subject to this

(2.) The British Agent shall observe any general or special instructions of the Secretary of State with reference to the submission of any Decrees issued or proposed to be issued by the Sultan to the Secretary of State before so countersigning them; but nothing in this provision shall affect the validity of a Decree when countersigned by the British Agent.

(3.) The British Agent shall, at the first available opportunity, transmit to the Secretary of State an authenticated copy of any Decree of

the Sultan countersigned by him.

(4.) The British Agent may at any time publish a notice that his counter-signature to any Decree published by the Sultan is revoked, and such Decree shall then cease to be binding on all persons subject to this Order accordingly.

- 48. Subject to the other provisions of this Order, all expenses of removal of prisoners and others, and the expenses of deportation and of the sending of any person to Bombay, or to any part of His Majesty's dominions or Protectorates, including expenses of maintenance, shall be defrayed in such manner as the Secretary of State, with the concurrence of the Treasury, directs.
- 49.—(1.) If an officer of the Court employed to execute an order loses, by neglect or omission, the opportunity of executing it, then, on complaint of the person aggrieved and proof of the fact alleged, the Court may, if it thinks fit, order the officer to pay the damages sustained by the person complaining, or part thereof.

(2.) The order may be enforced as an order directing payment of money.

50.—(1.) If a clerk or officer of the Court, acting under pretence of the process of authority of the Court, is charged with extortion, or with not paying over money duly levied, or with other misconduct, the Court may, if it thinks fit, inquire into the charge in a summary way, and may for that purpose summon and enforce the attendance of all necessary persons as in an action, and may make such order for the repayment of any money extorted, or for the payment over of any money levied, and for the payment of such damages and costs, as the Court thinks fit.

(2.) The Court may also, if it thinks fit, on the same inquiry, impose on the clerk or officer a fine not exceeding 50 rupees for each offence.

(3.) A clerk or officer punished under this Article, shall not, without the leave of the Court, be liable to an action in respect of the same matter; and any such action, if already or afterwards begun, may be stayed by the Court in such manner and on such terms as the Court thinks fit.

. (4.) Nothing in this Article shall be deemed to '

prevent any person from being prosecuted under any other law for any act or omission punishable under this Article, or from being liable under that other law to any higher punishment or penalty than that provided by this Article. Provided that no person shall be punished twice for the same offence.

51. Not later than the 31st March in each year the Judge shall send to the Secretary of State a report on the operation of this Order up to the 31st December in the previous year showing, for the then last twelve months, the number and nature of the proceedings, criminal or civil, taken under this Order, and the result thereof, and the number and amount of fees received, and such other information, and being in such form as the Secretary of State from time to time

PART VIII.—REPEAL AND TRANSITORY Provisions.

- 52. On the commencement of this Order, the following Orders in Council shall be repealed, that is to say:-
 - "The Zanzibar Order in Council, 1897."
 - "The Zanzibar Order in Council, 1903."
 - "The Zanzibar Order in Council, 1904."

Provided as follows:-

(1.) Where other provision is not made by Decree of the Sultan countersigned by the British Agent, any law practice or procedure established by or under the said repealed Orders and all Acts of any legislature in India now in force in Zanzibar shall remain in force until such other provision is made.

(2.) Every appointment of a Judge or other officer and every Court established and existing at the commencement of this Order, shall, until other provision is made, continue to be as if this

Order had not been passed.

(3.) All legal proceedings begun under the said repealed Orders and pending at the com-mencement of this Order, shall be continued as if this Order had not been passed.

(4.) All regulations and rules made under the said repealed Orders, shall remain in force until otherwise provided by Decree of the Sultan,

countersigned by the British Agent.

53.—(1.) Until other provision is made by Decree of the Sultan of Zanzibar, countersigned by the British Agent, and subject to the other provisions of this Order, the Code of Criminal Procedure and the other enactments relating to the administration of criminal justice in India, applicable to Zanzibar at the commencement of this Order, shall have effect as if Zanzibar were a district in the Presidency of Bombay; and an Assistant Judge shall be deemed to be the Magistrate of the district; the Judge shall be deemed to be the Sessions Judge; the High Court of Judicature at Bombay (hereinafter called the High Court of Bombay) shall be deemed to be the High Court; and the powers both of the Governor-General in Council and of the Local Government under those enactments shall be exercisable by the Secretary of State, or, with his previous or subsequent assent, by the Governor-General of India in Council.

(2.) Provided, however, that no sentence of death passed by the Court for Zanzibar shall

require confirmation by the High Court.

54. Where a person entitled to appeal to the High Court of Bombay from any Judgment or order passed in the exercise of criminal jurisdiction under this Order desires so to appeal, he shall present his Petition of appeal to the Court for Zanzibar, and the Petition shall with all practicable speed be transmitted by the Court for Zanzibar to the High Court, with certified copies of the charge (if any) and proceedings, of all documentary evidence admitted or tendered, of the depositions, of the notes of the oral testimony, and of the judgment or order, and any argument on the Petition of appeal that the appellant desires to submit to the High Court.

55. The Court for Zanzibar shall postpone the execution of the sentence pending the appeal, and shall, if necessary, commit the person convicted to prison for safe custody, or detain him in prison for safe custody, or shall admit him to bail, and may take security, by recognizance, deposit of money, or otherwise, for his payment of any fine.

56. Until other provision is made by Decree of the Sultan of Zanzibar, countersigned by the British Agent, and subject to the other provisions of this Order, the Code of Civil Procedure, "The Bombay Civil Courts Act, 1869," the Indian Succession Act, and the other enactments relating to the administration of civil justice in India applicable to Zanzibar at the commencement of this Order shall have effect as if Zanzibar were a district in the Presidency of Bombay: the Judge shall be deemed to be the District Judge, and the Assistant Judge, the Joint District Judge, of the district, and the Court for Zanzibar, the District Court or Principal Civil Court of Original Jurisdiction in the district; the High Court of Bombay shall be deemed to be the highest Civil Court of Appeal for the district, and the Court authorized to hear appeals from and to revise the decisions of the District Court; and the powers, both of the Governor-General in Council and the Local Government, under those enactments shall be exercisable by the Secretary of State, or, with his previous or subsequent assent, by the Governor-General of India in Council.

57. Where any person entitled to appeal to the High Court of Bombay from any Decree or Order made by the Court for Zanzibar in the exercise of civil jurisdiction under this Order desires so to appeal, he shall give security to the satisfaction of the Court, and to such amount as the Court thinks reasonable, for prosecution of the appeal, and for payment of any costs that may be ordered by the High Court of Bombay on the appeal to be paid by the appellant, and shall comply with such terms and conditions and take such steps as shall be prescribed by Rules of Court.

58. This Order shall commence and have effect as follows:—

(1.) As to the making of any warrant or appointment under this Order, immediately from and after the date of this Order.

(2.) As to the framing of Rules of Procedure or Regulations, and the approval thereof by the Secretary of State, immediately from and after the date of this Order.

(3.) As to all other matters and provisions comprised and contained in this Order, immediately from and after the expiration of one month after this Order is first exhibited in the public office of the Court, for which purpose the Judge is hereby required forthwith, on receipt by him of a copy of this Order, to affix and exhibit the same conspicuously in the public office of the Court, and he is also hereby required to keep the same so affixed and exhibited during one month from the first exhibition thereof; and notice of the time of such first exhibition shall, as soon thereafter as practicable, be published in Zanzibar in such manner as the Court directs; and, notwithstanding anything in this Order, the time of the expiration of the said month shall be deemed to be the time of the commencement of this Order.

(4.) Proof shall not in any proceeding or matter be required that the provisions of this Article have been complied with, nor shall any act or proceeding be invalidated by any failure to comply with any of such provisions.

59. A copy of this Order shall be kept exhibited

conspicuously in the Court at Zanzibar.

Printed copies shall be provided and sold at such reasonable price as the Court directs.

And the Right Honourable Sir Edward Grey, Baronet, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein.

Plate Act, 1904 (4 Edw. VII. c. 6), it is
provided that:—

1.—(1) Where for the purpose of complying

with sections fifty-nine and sixty of the Customs Act, 1842, or section ten of the Revenue Act, 1883, any plate has to be assayed, stamped, and marked, or where for any other purpose any plate or article imported from a foreign part is brought to an Assay Office in the United Kingdom to be assayed, stamped, or marked, the plate or article shall be marked in such manner as His Majesty may determine by Order in Council so as readily to distinguish whether the plate or other article was wrought or made in England, Scotland, or Ireland, or was imported from foreign parts, and such mark or marks shall be deemed to be a compliance with the said Acts.

- (2) Any person, who, after a date fixed by His Majesty by Order in Council, brings or causes to be brought any plate or other article to be assayed, stamped and marked at an Assay Office, shall state in writing, in manner provided by His Majesty by Order in Council, whether the plate or article was wrought or made in England, Scotland, or Ireland, or was imported from foreign parts, but it shall not be necessary to make such statement in writing where any plate or other article is brought to an Assay Office in charge of an officer of customs, under the provisions of the Revenue Act, 1883, for the purpose of being assayed, stamped, or marked as having been imported from foreign parts.
- (3) Where any person, who, after the date fixed as aforesaid, brings or causes to be brought any plate or other article to be assayed, stamped, and marked at an Assay Office, does not know and is not able to state whether the plate or other article was wrought or made in England, Scotland, or Ireland, or was imported from foreign parts, such person shall make a state-ment in writing to that effect in the manner prescribed in this section, and the plate or other article referred to in the said statement shall be stamped and marked as if it were imported from foreign parts.
- (4) If any person knowingly makes a false statement under this section he shall be liable, on summary conviction, under the Summary Jurisdiction Acts, to a fine not exceeding five pounds for every article in respect of which the false statement is made.
- (5) The Customs Act, 1842, shall apply as if a reference to the mode of marking required under this Act were substituted for a reference to the mode of marking under that Act.
- (6) His Majesty may, by Order in Council, revoke, vary, or add to any Order in Council made under this Act.

And whereas by Order in Council dated the twenty-fourth day of October, one thousand nine hundred and four, flis Majesty did determine the mark or marks to be stamped or marked upon any plate or article imported from foreign parts brought to an Assay Office in the United Kingdom to be assayed, stamped, or marked at an Assay Office and did determine the form of the statement in writing to be made by any person other than an officer of customs bringing or causing to be brought any plate or article to be assayed, stamped, and marked at an Assay

And whereas it has been found expedient (i) to vary the said Order in Council of the twentyfourth day of October, one thousand nine hundred and four, by altering the particular marks to be used by the assay authorities of London, Sheffield, Glasgow and Dublin, and (ii) to alter the form of the statement in writing set out in Part II. of the Schedule to the said Order and to effect these alterations it has been determined to revoke the said Order in Council of the

twenty-fourth day of October, one thousand nine hundred and four:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council and in exercise of the powers vested in Him by the above recited provisions doth as from the dates hereinafter respectively specified revoke the said Order in Council of the twenty-fourth day of October, one thousand nine hundred and four, and doth determine that as from the said dates respectively:-

(1) The mark or marks to be stamped or marked upon any plate or article imported from foreign parts brought to an Assay Office in the United Kingdom to be assayed, stamped or marked shall be the mark or marks described in the first part of the schedule hereto and the

The Fraternity or Company of Goldsmiths of the City of Dublin,

shall respectively cause to be stamped or marked upon any plate or article imported from foreign parts and brought to an Assay Office in the United Kingdom to be assayed, stamped, or marked the respective mark or marks described in the first part of the schedule hereto.

(2) The statement in writing to be made by any person other than an Officer of Customs who brings or causes to be brought any plate or article to be assayed, stamped, and marked at an Assay Office shall be in the form and signed in the manner set out in the second part of the schedule hereto.

This Order shall come into operation and take effect as from and after the twenty-ninth May, one thousand nine hundred and six, except so far as regards the Assay Offices of Sheffield and Glasgow and as regards those Offices this Order shall come into operation and take effect as from and after the first July, one thousand nine hundred and six.









All animals of the species mentioned below intended for importation into these Islands, must be accompanied by a certificate from the British Consular Authority, or, where there is no such authority, from the local Government Authority, stating the number of cases of infectious or contagious disease affecting such animals which have been officially reported at the places of origin and shipment, during the three months immediately preceding the date of embarkation and the number and description of the animals shipped.

Title.

I. This Order may be cited as the Wild Birds Protection (City of Nottingham) Order, 1906.

BIRDS.

Additions to the Schedule of the Act of 1880.

II. The Wild Birds Protection Act, 1880, shall apply within the City of Nottingham to the following species of Wild Birds in the same manner as if those species were included in the schedule to the Act:-

Certain Birds protected during the whole of the Year.

III. During the period between the 31st day of July in any year and the 2nd day of March following, the killing or taking of any of the following species of Wild Birds is prohibited throughout the City of Nottingham:

Avocet, Bittern, Bullfinch, Bunting (all species), Buzzard, Honey Buzzard, Chaffinch, Crossbill, Dipper, Goldfinch, Great Crested Grebe, Greenfinch, Hoopoe, Kingfisher, Kite, Common Linnet, Nightingale, Nightjar, Nuthatch, Oriole, Osprey, Owl (all species), Redpole, Great Grey Shrike, Red-backed Shrike, Siskin. Warbler (all species), Waxwing, Woodpecker (all species), Golden-crested Wren, Wryngel Wryneck.
