

W HEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Commission dated the fifth day of March, one thousand nine hundred and seven, to nominate and appoint His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales, in His Majesty's absence from His Realm in foreign parts, to hold on His Majesty's behalf, His Privy Council, and to signify thereat His approval of any matter or thing whereunto His Royal Highness should be so authorized by writing under His Majesty's behalf any matter or thing for the purposes of the said Commission whereunto His Royal Highness should be authorized in manner aforesaid:

And whereas the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and fourteen, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the twenty-first day of February, in the year one thousand nine hundred and seven, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the thirtythird and thirty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and fourteen, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the church and cure (hereinafter called 'the said benefice') of Blackawton, in the county of Devon, and in the diocese of Exeter.

"Whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Blackawton is vested for an estate in fee simple without incumbrances in the Reverend Thomas Francis Boultbee, Clerk in Holy Orders, now Vicar or Incumbent of the vicarage of Loddiswell, in the said county of Devon.

"And whereas the said Thomas Francis

"And whereas the said Thomas Francis Boultbee is desirous that the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Blackawton now vested in him as aforesaid should be transferred to and be vested in the Bishop for the time being of the said diocese of Exeter.

"And whereas the Right Reverend Archibald, now Bishop of Exeter, is willing to accept such transfer, and in token of such his willingness and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the diocese which by the Acts in the hereinbefore mentioned Act recited or by some or one of them is made necessary, he the said Archibald, Bishop of Exeter, has executed this scheme as hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas the transfer of the patronage of the said benefice of Blackawton which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed will in our opinion tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the parish or district in or in respect of

which the right of patronage or advowson so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or exists, that is to say, in the

parish of Blackawton.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Thomas Francis Boultbee (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) and with the consent of the said Archibald, Bishop of Exeter (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presenta-tion to the said benefice of Blackawton now vested in him, the said Thomas Francis Boultbee as aforesaid, shall be transferred to the said Archibald, Bishop of Exeter, and his successors in the same bishoprick, and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Archibald, Bishop of Exeter, and by his successors in the same bishoprick for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any

other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has approved at the Council held under the authority of the said Commission: Now, therefore, His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales, being authorized in that behalf by writing under His Majesty's Sign Manual, doth hereby, by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, on behalf of His Majesty, ratify the said scheme, and order and direct that the same and every thereof shall be effectual in immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and further on His Majesty's behalf, by and with the like advice, doth hereby direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Exeter.

and figures following, that is to say:-

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting under the provisions of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter ninety-four, the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four, and the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninetyfour, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme or representation for altering the boundaries of the new parish of Saint George, Wigan, the new parish of Saint Thomas, Wigan, the new parish of Saint Andrew, Wigan, the new parish of Saint Michael and All Angels, Wigan, and the new parish of Saint Mark, Newtown, Pemberton, all in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Liverpool.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date the third day of April in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-three and published in the London Gazette on the first day of August in the same year a certain part of the parish of All Saints, Wigan, in the said county of Lancaster and at that time in the diocese of Chester, but now in the said diocese of Liverpool, was assigned as a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint George, Wigan, and the said district chapelry was named 'The District Chapelry of Saint George, Wigan.'

"And whereas by the authority of an Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date the eleventh day of February in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two and published in the London Gazette on the twentyfourth day of the same month a certain part of the said parish of All Saints, Wigan, was assigned as a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Thomas, Wigan, and the said district chapelry was named 'The District Chapelry of

Saint Thomas, Wigan.'
"And whereas by the authority of an Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date the twenty-fourth day of March in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one and published in the London Gazette on the twentyeighth day of the same month certain contiguous portions of the said parish of All Saints, Wigan, and of the new parish of Pemberton, in the county of Lancaster and at that time in the said diocese of Chester, but now in the said diocese of Liverpool, were constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and the said district was named 'The District of Saint Andrew, Wigan.'

"And whereas by the authority of an Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date the first day of April in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one and published in the London Gazette on the fifth day of the same month a certain part of the said parish of All Saints, Wigan, was assigned as a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Michael and

All Angels, Wigan, and the said district chapelry was named 'The District Chapelry of Saint

Michael and All Angels, Wigan.

"And whereas by the authority of an Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date the twelfth day of December in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one and published in the London Gazette on the twenty-second day of the same month a consolidated chapelry was assigned to the consecrated church of Saint Mark, Newtown, Pemberton, situate in the said new parish of Pemberton and the said consolidated chapelry was named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Mark, Newtown, Pemberton.

"And whereas the said district chapelry of Saint George, Wigan, the said district chapelry of Saint Thomas, Wigan, the said district of of Saint Andrew, Wigan, the said district chapelry Saint Michael and All Angels, Wigan, and the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Mark, Newtown, Pemberton, have become new parishes of the character contemplated by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, by the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, and by the abovementioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four.

"And whereas it has been represented to us, and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint George, Wigan, the said new parish of Saint Thomas, Wigan, the said new parish of Saint Andrew, Wigan, the said new parish of Saint Michael and All Angels, Wigan, and the said new parish of Saint Mark, Newtown, Pemberton, should be altered in the manner which is herein-

after mentioned.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Francis James, Bishop of Liverpool (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of an Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint George, Wigan, the said new parish of Saint Thomas, Wigan, the said new parish of Saint Andrew, Wigan, the said new parish of Saint Michael and All Angels, Wigan, and the said new parish of Saint Mark, Newtown, Pemberton, shall be altered so that (firstly) all those portions of the said new parish of Saint George, Wigan, of the said new parish of Saint Thomas, Wigan, and of the said new parish of Saint Michael and All Angels, Wigan, which are described in the first schedule hereunder written and are delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed and are thereon coloured pink shall be dissevered from such new parishes and shall be restored to and shall in future form part of the said parish of All Saints, Wigan, and (secondly) all that portion of the said new parish of Saint George, Wigan, which is described in the second schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the said map or plan hereunto annexed and is thereon coloured blue shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said new parish of Saint Thomas, Wigan; and (thirdly) all that portion of the said new parish of Saint George, Wigan, which is described in the third schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed and is thereon coloured yellow shall be dissevered from such new parish from the said new parish of Saint Thomas,

and shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said new parish of Saint Michael and All Angels, Wigan, and (fourthly) all that portion of the said new parish of Saint Michael and All Angels, Wigan, which is described in the fourth schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed and is thereon coloured violet shall be dissevered from such new parish and shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said new parish of Saint Andrew, Wigan, and (fifthly) all that portion of the said new parish of Saint Michael and All Angels, Wigan, which is described in the fifth schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed and is thereon coloured green shall be dissevered from such new parish and shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said new parish of Saint Mark, Newtown, Pemberton.

"And we further represent, recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts or any of them or any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULES to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference:-

"THE FIRST SCHEDULE.

"The territory to be restored to the parish of All Saints, Wigan, in the county of Lancaster

and in the diocese of Liverpool, being:

"1. All that portion of the new parish of Saint George, Wigan, in the said county and diocese, which is bounded upon the west partly by the said parish of All Saints, Wigan, and partly by the new parish of Saint Thomas, Wigan, in the said county and diocese, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the south, upon the east and upon the north, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Thomas, Wigan, from the said new parish of Saint George, Wigan, at the junction of Chapel-lane with Darlingtonstreet, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of Darlington-street, for a distance of ten chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries Darlington-street across the River Douglas, upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint George, Wigan, from the new parish of Saint Catherine, Wigan, in the said county and diocese, and extending thence first north-eastward, then north-westward and then northward along the last-mentioned boundary (thereby following the middle of the River Douglas) for a distance of fifteen chains or thereabouts to the centre of Scholes Bridge which carries the street called Millgate over the said river, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of Millgate for a distance of six chains and a half or thereabouts to its junction with Chapel-lane, upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint George, Wigan, from the said parish of All Saints, Wigan.

"II. And also all that contiguous portion of the said new parish of Saint Thomas, Wigan, which is bounded upon the north-west and upon the north-east by the said parish of All Saints, Wigan, upon the east by the above-described portion of the said new parish of Saint George, Wigan, and upon the remaining side, that is to say, upon the south-west by an imaginary line

Wigan, at the junction of Chapel-lane with Kingstreet, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of King-street for a distance of four chains or thereabouts to its junction with Rodney-street, upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Thomas, Wigan, from the said parish of All Saints, Wigan.

"III. And also all that portion of the new parish of Saint Michael and All Angels, Wigan, in the said county and diocese, which is bounded upon the south-east by the said parish of All Saints, Wigan, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the east, upon the northwest, upon the west and upon the south-west, by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the boundary which divides the said parish of All Saints, Wigan, from the said new parish of Saint Michael and All Angels, Wigan, crosses the middle of the North Union line of the London and North-Western Railway, and extending thence northward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of one mile and thirteen chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Michael and All Angels, Wigan, from the parish of Standish, in the said county and diocese, and extending thence south-westward along the lastmentioned boundary for a distance of fifty-three chains or thereabouts to the point in the middle of Wellfield-lane where such boundary meets the boundary which divides the new parish of Saint Andrew, Wigan, in the said county and diocese, from the said new parish of Saint Michael and All Angels, Wigan, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of Wellfield-lane eastward along the middle of Wellfield-lane (thereby following in part the last-mentioned boundary) for a distance of twenty-eight chains or thereabouts to its junction with Gidlow-lane, and extending thence first southward and then south-eastward along the middle of Gidlow-lane for a distance of forty-four chains or thereabouts to its junction with Park-road, and extending thence westward along the middle of Park-road for a distance of eleven chains or thereabouts to its junction with Moss-street, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of Mossstreet for a distance of six chains or thereabouts to its junction with Woodhouse-lane, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of Woodhouse-lane for a distance of one chain and a half or thereabouts to its junction with Railway-street, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of Railway-street for a distance of nine chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries the Wigan and Southport line of the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway across such street and continuing thence south-westward in precisely the same direction and in a straight line for a distance of seven chains or thereabouts to a point in the middle of the Leeds and Liverpool Canal, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the said canal for a distance of four chains or thereabouts to the point where the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Michael and All Angels, Wigan, the new parish of Saint Mark, Newtown, Pemberton, in the said county and diocese, and the said parish of All Saints, Wigan, all meet.

"THE SECOND SCHEDULE.

"The territory to be dissevered from the said new parish of Saint George, Wigan, and to be annexed to the said new parish of Saint Thomas, Wigan, being:—

"All that portion of the said new parish of Saint George, Wigan, which is bounded upon the east by the said new parish of Saint Catherine, Wigan, upon the south partly by the new parish

of Saint Mary, Ince in Makerfield, and partly by the new parish of Saint James, Wigan, both in the said county and diocese, upon the northwest by the said new parish of Saint Thomas, Wigan, and upon the remaining side, that is to say, upon the north-east by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Thomas, Wigan, from the said new parish of Saint George, Wigan, at the junction of Chapel-lane with Darlington-street, and extending thence southeastward along the middle of Darlington-street for a distance of ten chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries such street across the River Douglas, upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint George, Wigan, from the said new parish of Saint Catherine, Wigan.

"THE THIRD SCHEDULE.

"The territory to be dissevered from the said new parish of Saint George, Wigan, and to be annexed to the said new parish of Saint Michael and All Angels, Wigan, being:—

"All that portion of the said new parish of Saint George, Wigan, which is bounded upon the west by the said new parish of Saint Michael and All Angels, Wigan, upon the north by the said parish of Standish, upon the north-east by the new parish of Haigh and Aspull, in the said county and diocese, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the east and upon the south, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Haigh and Aspull from the said new parish of Saint George, Wigan, at the point where the River Douglas is joined by the stream called Yellow Brook, and extending thence generally southward along the middle of the River Douglas for a distance of fifty chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the middle of the footpath which passes to the south of Saint Mary's Roman Catholic Chapel and Presbytery, and leads into the street called Standishgate, and extending thence north-westward to and along the middle of the said footpath for a distance of eleven chains or thereabouts to the junction of the said footpath with the street called Standishgate, upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint George, Wigan, from the said new parish of Saint Michael and All Angels, Wigan.

"THE FOURTH SCHEDULE.

"The territory to be dissevered from the said new parish of Saint Michael and All Angels, Wigan, and to be annexed to the said new parish of Saint Andrew, Wigan, being:—

"All that portion of the said new parish of Saint Michael and All Angels, Wigan, which is bounded upon the north-west by the said new parish of Saint Andrew, Wigan, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the north, upon the east, upon the south-east and upon the south-west, by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Andrew, Wigan, from the said new parish of Saint Michael and All Angels, Wigan, diverges from the middle of Wellfield-lane, and extending thence southeastward along the middle of Wellfield-lane for a distance of six chains or thereabouts to its junction with Gidlow-lane, and extending thence first southward and then south-eastward along the middle of Gidlow-lane for a distance of forty-four chains or thereabouts to its junction with Park-road, and extending thence westward along the middle of Park-road for a distance of eleven chains or thereabouts

to its junction with Moss-street, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of Moss-street for a distance of six chains or thereabouts to its junction with Woodhouselane, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of Woodhouse-lane for a distance of one chain and a half or thereabouts to its junction with Railway-street, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of Railway-street for a distance of nine chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries the Wigan and Southport line of the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway across such street and continuing thence south-westward in precisely the same direction and in a straight line for a distance of seven chains or thereabouts to a point in the middle of the Leeds and Liverpool Canal, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the said canal for a distance of sixteen chains or thereabouts to the point where the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Michael and All Angels, Wigan, the said new parish of Saint Mark, Newtown, Pemberton, and the said new parish of Saint Andrew, Wigan, all meet.

"THE FIFTH SCHEDULE.

"The territory to be dissevered from the said new parish of Saint Michael and All Angels, Wigan, and to be annexed to the said new parish of Saint Mark, Newtown, Pemberton, being:—

"All that portion of the said new parish of Saint Michael and All Angels, Wigan, which is bounded upon the south-east, upon the southwest and upon the north-west by the said new parish of Saint Mark, Newtown, Pemberton, and upon the remaining side, that is to say, upon the north-east by an imaginary line commencing at the point in the middle of the Leeds and Liverpool Canal where the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Mark, Newtown, Pemberton, the said new parish of Saint Andrew, Wigan, and the said new parish of St. Michael and All Angels, Wigan, all meet, and extending thereabouts to the point where the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Michael and All Angels, Wigan, the said parish of All Saints, Wigan, and the said new parish of Saint Mark, Newtown, Pemberton, all meet."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme or representation have been transmitted to the Patrons and to the Incumbents of the cures affected by the arrangements which are contemplated by such scheme or representation and such Patrons and Incumbents have respectively signified their assent thereto.

And whereas the said scheme or representation has been approved at the Council held under the authority of the said Commission: Now, therefore, His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales, being authorized in that behalf by writing under His Majesty's Sign Manual, doth hereby, by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, on behalf of His Majesty, ratify the said scheme or representation, and order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales doth further, on His Majesty's behalf, by and with the like advice, direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Liverpool.

And whereas by section twenty-six of "The Pluralities Act 1838" after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, "chapelries, and other places or districts may "be separated from the parishes or mother churches to which they belong, with great advantage, and places altogether extra-paro-" chial may in some instances with advantage be "annexed to parishes or districts to which they " are contiguous, or be constituted separate "parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "That when with " respect to his own diocese it shall appear to the " Archbishop of the Province, or when the Bishop " of any diocese shall represent to the said Arch-" bishop that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, "place or district within the diocese of such Archbishop, or the diocese of such Bishop, as "the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any parish or mother church and either be constituted a separate benefice "by itself or be united to any other parish to " which it may be more conveniently annexed, or " to any other adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, " place, or district, parochial or extra-parochial, " so as to form a separate parish or benefice, or that any extra-parochial place may with advan-" tage be annexed to any parish to which it is " contiguous, or be constituted a separate parish " for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said Archbishop or Bishop shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his considera-"tion) describing the mode in which it appears "to him that the alteration may best be effected. "and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent-charges, and "other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, " and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, " may be made with justice to all parties in-"terested; and if the patron or patrons of the " benefice or benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or " their hands to such scheme, or to such modifi-"cation thereof as the said Archbishop may "approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full " consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any " such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall " certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to His Majesty in Council, it shall " be lawful for His Majesty in Council to make an "Order for carrying such scheme, or modifica-" tion thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas by section eight of the Church Building Act, 1839, it is, amongst other things, further enacted, "That when by any Order of " His Majesty in Council, as aforesaid, a separate "parish for ecclesiastical purposes is constituted, the same shall, on registration thereof, and with the consent in writing of the Incumbent " or Incumbents of the benefice or benefices to " be thereby affected, become a perpetual curacy "and benefice, and the minister thereof, duly " nominated and licensed thereto, and his suc-"cessors, shall be a body politic and corporate, "with perpetual succession, and may receive and take to himself and his successors all such " lands, tenements, tithes, rent-charges and here-" ditaments as shall be granted unto him or them, " and such perpetual curate shall thenceforth " have, within the limits of the district parish "formed under the Church Building Acts, for "the church of such perpetual curacy, sole and " exclusive cure of souls, and shall not in any-" wise be subject to the controul or interference " of the Incumbent or Incumbents of the benefice " or benefices to be affected by such Order, if he " or they shall have consented to such Order as " aforesaid."

And whereas the Right Reverend Charles, Lord Bishop of Birmingham, hath represented in a writing, dated the eighteenth day of September, one thousand nine hundred and six, to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows:—

"I, the Right Reverend Charles, Lord Bishop of Birmingham, beg leave to represent to your Grace, that there is in the county of Worcester within my diocese the vicarage of Yardley, the parish whereof comprises amongst other places the district of Hall Green. This district is more particularly defined in the schedule hereunder written and on the plan attached to the scheme hereunder written and is coloured round with a blue verge line and is hereinafter referred to as 'the said proposed new parish of Hall Green.'

"That the population of the said parish of Yardley is estimated to be seven thousand.

"That the population of the said proposed new parish of Hall Green is estimated to be one thousand.

"That there is a consecrated church known as Marston's Chapel, situate within the said proposed new parish of Hall Green, convenient for the use of the inhabitants thereof.

"That the patronage of the said chapel is vested in the trustees for the time being of the charity founded by the will of Job Marston, dated twenty-fourth May, one thousand seven hundred and one, confirmed by Act of Parliament of the first year of Queen Anne, and now regulated under a scheme made by the Charity Commissioners, dated twentieth January, one thousand nine hundred and three.

"That the net annual value of the benefice of Marston Chapel aforesaid is two hundred and eighty pounds or thereabouts.

"That the Incumbent of the said chapel consents to the scheme hereinafter proposed.

"That the net annual value of the said benefice of Yardley is two hundred and seventy nine pounds.

"That the patronage of the said benefice of Yardley, being a vicarage, is vested in the Reverend Frederic Sutton Dodd and Cyril Dodd, Esquire, K.C., and the said Reverend Frederic Sutton Dodd is the Incumbent thereof.

"That the Incumbent of the said benefice consents to the scheme hereinafter proposed.

"That it appears to us that under the provisions of the Acts of Parliament passed in the sessions held in the first and second years of the reign of Her late Majesty, chapter one hundred and six, and the second and third years of the same reign, chapter forty-nine, the said district of Hall Green may advantageously be separated from the said parish of Yardley and constituted a separate parish and benefice for ecclesiastical purposes.

"That pursuant to the directions contained in the twenty-sixth section of the first-mentioned Act of Parliament, I the said Lord Bishop have drawn up a scheme in writing appended to this representation describing the mode in which it appears to me the separation above proposed may be best effected and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested. And I do submit the same to your Grace to the intent that your Grace may, if on full consideration and enquiry you shall be satisfied with the said scheme, certify the same and such consents as aforesaid to His Majesty in Council.

And whereas the said scheme drawn up by the said Bishop and the consents referred to in the said representation are as follows:—

"SCHEME.

"It is proposed that the district of Hall Green, in the parish of Yardley, and county of Worcester, and diocese of Birmingham, coloured dark buff, and surrounded with a blue line on the plan attached hereto, and more particularly defined in the schedule hereunder written shall be separated from the said parish of Yardley to which it now belongs, and be constituted a separate benefice and a parish for ecclesiastical purposes under the name or style of the parish or benefice of Hall Green, of which the said chapel, situate within the said district and now known as Marston's Chapel, shall be the parish church.

"That the vicar of Yardley shall cease to have cure of souls within the said proposed parish or benefice of Hall Green, and that the inhabitants of the said proposed parish or benefice of Hall Green shall be exonerated from all liability to repair the parish church of Yardley or any other church or chapel now or hereafter to be erected within that parish.

"That the said proposed parish or benefice of Hall Green shall be subject to the same ecclesiastical jurisdiction as the said benefice of Yardley, and that the incumbent of the said proposed parish or benefice shall have exclusive cure of souls within the limits of the same.

"That two churchwardens shall be chosen annually in the accustomed manner and at the time when churchwardens are usually appointed in or for such proposed parish or benefice, and every person so appointed shall be duly admitted and shall do all things pertaining to the office of churchwarden as to ecclesiastical matters within the said proposed parish or benefice.

"That baptisms, churchings, marriages and burials shall be performed in the church of the said proposed parish or benefice, and all fees and payments for the same and other ecclesiastical dues, offerings and emoluments usually payable to the incumbent of a benefice as shall arise therein shall thenceforth belong and be paid to the incumbent of the said proposed parish or benefice of Hall Green.

"That the parishioners of the said proposed parish or benefice shall not be entitled to any accommodation in the parish church of Yardley.

"That the patronage or right of nomination of a Minister to serve the proposed parish or benefice of Hall Green shall be vested in the trustees for the time being of Marston's Charity aforesaid for ever.

"That no alteration shall be made in the endowment arising from glebe lands, tithes or rent charges belonging to the benefice of Yardley.

"That no alteration shall be made as to the patronage of the said benefice of Yardley.

"SCHEDULE.

"with justice to all parties interested; and if
"the patron or patrons of the benefice or bene"fices to be affected by such alteration shall
"consent in writing under his or their hands to
"such scheme, or to such modification thereof
"as the said Archbishop may approve, and the
"said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and
"inquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme, or
"modification thereof, and shall certify the same
"and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to
"His Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for
"His Majesty in Council to make an Order for
"carrying such scheme, or modification thereof,

"That pursuant to the directions of the twenty-sixth section of the Act one and two Victoria chapter one hundred and six, as amended by the Pluralities Act, 1887, I have drawn up in writing a scheme appended to this representation describing the mode in which it appears to me that the alterations above proposed may be best effected and how the changes consequent upon such alterations in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent charges and other ecclesiastical dues, rates and payments and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested and I submit the same to your Grace together with the consents in writing of the respective Patrons and Incumbents of the benefices of the said parishes of Halesowen and Frankley to the intent that your Grace may if you shall be satisfied with the said scheme certify the same and such consents to His Majesty in Council.

And whereas the said scheme drawn up by the

said Bishop and the consents referred to in the said representation are as follows:—

"SCHEME.

"It is proposed that the district or portion of land described in the schedule hereto and delineated in the accompanying map and thereon verged pink shall be separated from the parish of Halesowen in the diocese of Worcester, to which it belongs and be annexed to and united with the parish of Frankley in the diocese of Birmingham for ecclesiastical purposes.

"That the Incumbent of the said parish of Frankley shall have exclusive cure of souls within the hamlet of Illey so transferred to the parish of Frankley.

"That all ecclesiastical offices shall be performed for the inhabitants of the said hamlet of Illey in the parish church of Frankley, and that the fees for all such offices and all other such ecclesiastical dues offerings and emoluments usually payable to the Incumbent of a benefice as shall arise or become payable within or in respect of the said hamlet of Illey shall belong to the Incumbent of the said parish of Frankley.

"That the unredeemed tithe or corn rent charge amounting to ten pounds seventeen shillings and six pence or thereabouts per annum arising from, or in respect of, the lands within the said hamlet of Illey, coloured green on the plan attached hereto, shall belong to the rector of Frankley, but no other change shall be made in regard to glebe lands, tithes, or tithe rent charges, compositions in lieu of tithes, endowments or other annual payments of or belonging to the benefices of the parishes herein referred to nor in respect to patronage.

"That the inhabitants of the said district shall be entitled to accommodation in the church of the parish of Frankley to which it is proposed the said district shall be annexed and in common with the parishioners of that parish and shall not henceforth be entitled to any accommodation in the church of the parish of Halesowen from which they shall be separated except nevertheless any person or persons (if any) possessing a legal right by faculty or otherwise to the exclusive use of any pews or sittings in the last mentioned church and who may not be willing to relinquish and give up the same.

"That the Right Reverend Huyshe, Lord Bishop of Worcester, has represented unto us (amongst other things):

"That pursuant to the directions of the twenty-sixth section of the Pluralities Act, 1837, as amended by the Pluralities Act, 1887, the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a scheme in writing describing the mode in which it appears to him that the proposed alterations may best be effected and how the changes consequent upon such alterations in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction glebe lands tithes rent charges and other ecclesiastical dues rates and payments and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested which scheme together with the consents thereto in writing of the Right Reverend Charles Lord Bishop of Birmingham (within whose diocese the parish of Frankley is situated) the Right Honourable Viscount Cobham, the patron or person entitled to present to both the said benefices of Halesowen and Frankley in case the same or either of them were now vacant, the Reverend John Charles Hill, M.A., Rector of the Rectory of Halesowen, and the Reverend Owen Henry Wethered, M.A., Rector of the Rectory of Frankley, has been transmitted to us by the said Lord Bishop for our consideration.

"The representation of the said Lord Bishop and the consents above referred to are hereunto annexed.

"And whereas by section twenty-six of the Act, 1838, after reciting Pluralities "Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, "chapelries, and other places or districts may be "separated from the parishes or mother churches "to which they belong, with great advantage, "and places altogether extra-parochial may in "some instances with advantage be annexed to parishes or districts to which they are con-"tiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for "ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "That when with respect to his "own diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop "of the Province, or when the Bishop of any "diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop "that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, "or district within the diocese of such Arch-"bishop, or the diocese of such Bishop, as the "case may be, may be advantageously separated "from any parish or mother church, and either be "constituted a separate benefice by itself or be "united to any other parish to which it may be "more conveniently annexed, or to any other "adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or "district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to " form a separate parish or benefice, or that any "extra-parochial place may with advantage be "annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous, "or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesias-tical purposes; and the said Archbishop or "Bishop shall draw up a scheme in writing (the "scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to "the said Archbishop for his consideration) "describing the mode in which it appears to him "that the alteration may best be effected, and how "the changes consequent on such alteration in "respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe "lands, tithes, rent charges, and other ecclesias-"tical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect "to patronage and rights to pews, may be made "with justice to all parties interested; and if the "patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices "to be affected by such alteration shall consent "in writing under his or their hands to such "scheme, or to such modification thereof as the "said Archbishop may approve, and the said "Archbishop shall, on full consideration and "inquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme, or " modification thereof, and shall certify the same "and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to "His Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for "His Majesty in Council to make an Order for "carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, " as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas by section six of the Church Building Act, 1839, it is, amongst other things, enacted, That any such scheme as aforesaid may be drawn up according to the regulations and directions in the said first-recited Act contained, subject to the consent, in writing, of the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected thereby, under his or their hands, notwithstanding the vacancy of such benefice or benefices, and that it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council thereupon to make an Order for carrying such scheme into effect, and that such Order, being registered in the registry of the diocese as directed by the said first-recited Act, shall come into operation, and shall be forthwith binding on all persons whatsoever notwithstanding such vacancy or vacancies.

And whereas the Right Reverend John, Lord Bishop of Saint David's, hath represented in a writing dated the twenty-first day of July, one thousand nine hundred and six to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows:—

"I, the Right Reverend John, Lord Bishop of Saint David's, do, in pursuance of the Plurulities Act, 1838, hereby represent to your Grace that there is in the county of Pembroke and my diocese of Saint David's the vicarage of Saint David's which is a distinct and separate civil parish defined by well-known metes and bounds and having a population that by the census of one thousand nine hundred and one amounted to one thousand seven hundred and thirty-nine.

"That there is also in the same county of Pembroke and my diocese of Saint David's the vicarage of Llanhowell, which is also a separate and distinct civil parish defined by well-known metes and bounds adjoining the said parish of Saint David's, and has a population that by the census of one thousand nine hundred and one amounted to one hundred.

"That there is in the said parish of Saint David's a consecrated church or chapel of ease known as the church of Saint James the Great Carnhedryn.

"That the benefice of Saint David's is now held by the Reverend David James Jones, and has a vicarage house or residence.

"That the benefice of Llauhowell is now vacant, and has also a vicarage house or residence.

"That the patronage or right of presentation to the said vicarage of Saint David's as well as that of the said vicarage of Llanhowell is vested in the Dean and Chapter for the time being of the cathedral church of Saint David's.

"That the net annual value of the said benefice of Saint David's is about two hundred and eighty pounds, and that there is also a yearly sum of one hundred and twenty pounds paid by the Ecclesiastical Commissioners towards the salary of an Assistant Curate for such benefice.

"That the net annual value of the said benefice of Llanhowell is about one hundred pounds.

"That it appears to me that a portion of the said parish of Saint David's, including the said church or chapel of ease of Saint James the Great Carnhedryn and more particularly described and delineated in the scheme appended to this representation and in the map or plan annexed thereto being thereon edged with pink and having a present population of about four hundred and an area of four thousand one hundred and fifty acres or thereabouts, may, under the provisions of the Pluralities Act, 1838, and the Church Building Act, 1839, be

advantageously separated from the said parish of Saint David's and annexed to the said adjoining parish of Llanhowell for ecclesiastical purposes.

"That it does not appear that any of the inhabitants of the said parish of Saint David's have any right by faculty or otherwise to the exclusive use of any of the pews or sittings in the said church or chapel of ease of Saint James the Great Carnhedryn, nor does it appear that any of the inhabitants of the portion of the parish of Saint David's so proposed to be separated from that parish have any such right to the exclusive use of any of the pews or sittings in the cathedral or parish church of Saint David's.

"That it is proposed that the said church of Saint James the Great Carnhedryn should cease to be a chapel of ease to the parish of Saint David's and should become a chapel of ease to the parish of Llanhowell.

"That pursuant to the direction contained in the twenty-sixth section of the said first mentioned Act of Parliament I the said Lord Bishop have drawn up a scheme in writing appended to this representation describing the mode in which it appears to me that the alteration above proposed may be best effected and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rentcharges and other ecclesiastical dues, rates and payments and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested. And I do submit the same to your Grace together with the consents in writing of the Dean and Chapter of the cathedral church of Saint David's the patrons of the said vicarages of Saint David's and Llanhowell and of the Reverend David James Jones, clerk, vicar of the said vicarage of Saint David's in order that your Grace may if on full consideration and inquiry you shall be satisfied with the said scheme certify the same and such consents to His Majesty in Council.

And whereas the said scheme drawn up by the said Bishop and the consents referred to in the said representation are as follows:—

"SCHEME.

"It is proposed to separate from the said parish of Saint David's all that portion of the said parish of Saint David's containing four thousand one hundred and fifty acres or thereabouts and more particularly delineated and described in the map or plan attached hereto being thereon verged pink and bounded on the north and north-west by Saint George's Channel, on the west and south-west by the remaining portion of the parish of Saint David's, on the north-east by the parish of Llanrhian, on the east and south-east by the said parish of Llanhowell and on the south by the parish of Whitchurch and separated from the remainder of the parish of Saint David's by an imaginary line starting in the north from Rock Ddualit on the coast line and running in an easterly direction up to Ffos-y-mynach to a point by the corner of a field bounded by a stone wall, thence southwards by the side of the wall to the top of the lane known as Feidr-y-garn and thence along such lane to the farm known as Trelleidr, thence east and south bounding the wall of the easternmost house of the hamlet and running into the lane known as Feidr Mynydd uchaf and along such lane first towards the east, then southeast and then due south into the main road from

Saint David's to Llanrhian at a point where such lane ends in such road, then along the said road in a north-easterly direction for a distance of about one hundred yards to a gateway on the east side of such road where the gateway leads into Dowrog-road and from such gateway along the Dowrog-road first south-east, then south, then south-east again and then east passing Drwsgobaith, thence south-east by a winding road into the main road leading from Saint David's to Letterston and from the point where the Dowrog-road runs into the main road, along such maid road towards Saint David's for a distance of one hundred and fifty yards, more or less, to a gateway on the south-east side of the road, which gateway leads into a very narrow lane called Feidrlas, first south-east then north-east for a distance of sixty yards or thereabouts to a point in the south side of the said lane where a hedge runs due south and then south-east crossing a hedge and then south into the boundary which divides the said parish of Saint David's from the parish of Whitchurch at a point where the said boundary between the said two parishes of Saint David's and Whitchurch is drawn to the north of the moor known as Waun Llandruidion.

"That the said parish of Llanhowell so enlarged shall be subject to the same ecclesiastical jurisdiction as the said parish was subject to before being so enlarged.

"That baptisms churchings and burials in respect of the inhabitants of the said portion of the parish of Saint David's so to be separated from that parish and united to the said parish of Llanhowell shall hereafter be performed either in the parish church of Llanhowell or in the said church or chapel of ease known as Saint James the Great Carnhedryn and that the fees for all such offices in relation thereto usually payable to the Incumbent of a benefice shall belong to the Incumbent of the said benefice of Llanhowell.

"That the Incumbent of the said parish of Illanhowell shall also have cure of souls within the limits of the said portion so to be united to such parish as part of his parish.

"That the right of patronage or presentation to the said benefice of Llanhowell shall remain

"That the inhabitants of the said portion of the parish of Saint David's so to be separated therefrom and united to the said parish of Llanhowell shall be exonerated from all liability (if

any such now exists) to repair the cathedral

as heretofore.

church of Saint David's or any other church or chapel now or hereafter to be erected in the said parish of Saint David's.

of the Reverend David James Jones the Incumbent of the said benefice of Saint David's, has been transmitted to us by the said Lord Bishop for our consideration.

"The representation and scheme of the said Lord Bishop and the consents above referred to are hereunto annexed.

"And we the said Lord Archbishop being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with the said scheme do hereby pursuant to the said Pluralities Act 1838 certify the same and such consents as aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for carrying the said scheme into effect.

ORDER OF 1907.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1903, the Dogs Act, 1906, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Power to make Regulations.

- 1.—(1.) The Local Authority of any of the Districts specified in the Schedule to this Order may, in accordance with the provisions of this Order, make Regulations, with a view to the prevention of worrying of cattle (including sheep), for requiring that dogs or any class of dogs shall, during all or any of the hours between sunset and sunrise, be kept by the owners thereof under control in manner prescribed by the Regulations.
- (2.) The Regulations may apply to the whole or any part of the District, and may exempt any class of dogs either generally or under prescribed conditions.

Confirmation of Regulations.

2.—(1.) Regulations made under this Order shall not take effect unless and until they have been submitted to and confirmed by the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries,

- (2.) Unless the Board otherwise direct, the following provisions shall apply—
 - (i.) Notice of intention to apply for confirmation of any Regulations shall be given in one or more of the local newspapers circulating within the District in two successive issues two weeks at least before the making of the application.
 - (ii.) For two weeks at least before an application, a copy of the Regulations proposed to be confirmed shall be kept at the office of the Local Authority of the District, and be open during office hours thereat to the inspection of ratepayers of the District without fee or reward.
 - (iii.) The Clerk of the Local Authority shall on the application of any such ratepayer furnish him with a copy of the proposed Regulations on payment of sixpence.
- (3.) A copy of any Regulations made by a Local Authority under this Order, signed and certified by the Clerk of that Local Authority to be a true copy and to have been duly confirmed, shall be evidence, until the contrary is proved, in all legal proceedings, of the due making, confirmation, and existence of the Regulations, without further or other proof.

Seizure of Dogs where Regulations are Contravened.

3. Any dog in respect of which an offence is being committed against a Regulation made under this Order may be seized and treated as a stray dog under the powers conferred by section three of the Dogs Act, 1906.

Extension of Definition in Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

4. Dogs shall be animals for the purposes of the following sections of the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894 (namely):—

Section forty-three (powers of police);

Section forty-four (powers of inspectors);

and also for the purposes of all other sections of the said Act containing provisions relative to or consequent on the provisions of those sections and this Order, including such sections as relate to offences and legal proceedings.

Local Authority to enforce Order.

5. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1903, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Movement of Swine into out of or within Scheduled District.

1. No swine shall be moved into or out of the District described in the Schedule to this Order, hereinafter referred to as the Scheduled District, or be moved along over or across a highway or thoroughfare within the Scheduled District; provided that nothing in this Order shall be deemed to apply to the movement of swine into or out of the Scheduled District where they are moved through such District by railway from a place outside such District to another place outside such District without unnecessary delay and without the swine being untrucked or rebooked within such District.

Local Authority to enforce Order.

2. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

Offences.

- 3.—(1.) If a pig is moved in contravention of this Order, the owner of the pig, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the pig, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the pig is moved, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.
- (2.) If any person with a view unlawfully to evade or defeat the operation of this Order allows

a pig to stray, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

4. This Order may be cited as the Lincoln and District (Swine-Fever) Prohibition of Movement Order of 1907.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1903, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

PART I.

Application of Swine-Fever (Regulation of Movement) Order of 1903.

1. From and after the commencement of this Order the provisions of the Swine-Fever (Regulation of Movement) Order of 1903 shall apply to the Area described in the First Schedule to this Order, hereinafter referred to as the Scheduled Area.

Provision as to Local Regulations.

2. The powers of the Local Authorities of the Districts comprised in the Scheduled Area to make regulations under the Swine-Fever Order of 1894, as to movement, exposure, or sale of swine, shall be suspended during the operation of this Order, and all such regulations in force at the commencement of this Order shall thereupon cease to operate.

PART II.

Restriction on movement of Swine within Scheduled

Area.

- 3.—(1.) Swine shall not be moved along, over, or across a highway or thoroughfare in the Scheduled Area unless they are accompanied by the licence required by this Article.
 - (i.) In the case of movement from premises outside the Scheduled Area to premises in the Scheduled Area the licence shall be that required by the Swine-Fever (Regulation of Movement) Order of 1903.
 - (ii.) In the case of movement from any lair market or saleyard in the Scheduled Area specially authorised under the last-mentioned Order, the licence shall be that required by Article 5 of that Order, and the movement shall be subject to the conditions stated in that Article.
 - (iii.) In the case of movement from any other market or saleyard, or from any exhibition, in the Scheduled Area, the swine must be accompanied by a licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the market saleyard or exhibition is situate. In such case no declaration is required.
 - (iv.) In any other case of movement along over or across a highway or thoroughfare in the Scheduled Area, the swine must be accompanied by a Movement Licence authorising such movement (in the Form A set forth in the Second Schedule to this Order or to the like effect, granted by the Local Authority of the District in which the swine are when the Licence is granted. The Licence shall be in force for not more than four days inclusive of the day of issue, and shall only be granted on a declaration (in the Form B set forth in the Second Schedule to this Order or to the like effect), signed by the owner of the swine or his agent authorised in writing for this purpose. Every person to whom application is made for a Licence shall, so far as is practicable, before granting the same, satisfy himself as to the correctness of the declaration, and that the proposed movement is necessary or expedient. The declaration shall be retained by the person granting the Licence and disposed of by him as may be directed by the Local Authority on whose behalf the Licence was granted.
 - (2.) The swine shall be moved by the nearest available route and without unnecessary delay.

Movement of Swine for Breeding Purposes with Licence.

4.—(1.) A Licence under this Order expressly granted for the movement of swine from premises in the Scheduled Area to any premises for breeding purposes shall be available as a Licence under this Order for the movement of the swine by the nearest available route and without unnecessary delay back to the premises from which they were moved under the Licence: Provided that such movement shall take place within the four days or less period during which the Licence is available.

(2.) No Licence shall be granted for movement of swine for breeding purposes to premises in the Scheduled Area from premises not in the Scheduled Area.

Movement from Ireland.

5. This Order does not apply to swine which are being moved under and in accordance with the provisions of the Swine-Fever (Movement from Ireland) Orders of 1904 and 1906 or either of those Orders

Regulation of Sales in Scheduled Area.

- 6. No market, fair, sale, or exhibition of swine shall be held in the Scheduled Area unless it is authorised by the Local Authority of the District (which authority the Local Authority are hereby empowered to grant), or unless it is a sale held in accordance with the following conditions:
 - (i.) All the swine exposed at the sale must have been on the premises where the sale is held for a period of at least twenty-eight days immediately before the date of the sale;
 - (ii.) The swine must not be affected with swine-fever or have been exposed to the infection of swine-fever during the said period; and
 - (iii.) The sale must not be held in a Swine-Fever Infected Place, and the movement of the swine must not have been prohibited by Notice of an Inspector of a Local Authority or of the Board given under any Order of the Board.

Straying of Swine on Highways.

7. No pig shall be allowed to stray on a highway or thoroughfare or on the sides thereof in the Scheduled Area.

Construction.

8. Part II of this Order shall be read as one with the Swine-Fever (Regulation of Movement) Order of 1903 in its application to the Scheduled Area.

Commencement.

9. This Order shall come into operation on the twenty-ninth day of April, nineteen hundred and seven.

Short Title.

10. This Order may be cited as the Dorset-SHIRE (SWINE-FEVER) ORDER OF 1907.
