HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of the Act of the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter fifty, and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the nineteenth day of December, in the year one thousand nine hundred and seven, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her late Majesty Queeu Victoria, chapter fifty, and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting an exchange of the patronage of the benefice (being a rectory) of Saint Andrew, Droitwich, with Saint Mary, Witton, the benefice (being a rectory) of Saint Nicholas, Droitwich, the benefice (being a vicarage) of All Saints, Evesham, with Saint Lawrence, Evesham, the benefice (being a rectory) of Naunton Beauchamp, which four benefices are situate in the county of Worcester, and in the diocese of Worcester, the benefice (being a rectory) of Exhall with the chapelry of Wixford annexed, and the benefice (being a vicarage) of Fillongley, which two benefices are situate in the county of Warwick and in the said diocese of Worcester, for the patronage of the benefice (being a rectory) of Abenhall otherwise Abinghall, in the county of Gloucester and in the diocese of Gloucester, the benefice (being a vicarage) of Clevedon, the benefice (being a rectory) of Rowberrow, the benefice (being a vicarage) of Tickenham, which three benefices are situate in the county of Somerset and in the diocese of Bath and Wells, the benefice (being a vicarage) of Kilpeck and the benefice (being a vicarage) of Walford on Wye, which last named benefices are situate in the county of Hereford and in the diocese of Hereford.

"Whereas the advowsous or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said six benefices of Saint Andrew, Droitwich, with Saint Mary, Witton, Saint Nicholas, Droitwich, All Saints, Evesham, with Saint Lawrence, Evesham, Naunton Beauchamp, Exhall with Wixford, and Fillongley (which six benefices are hereinafter called 'the six first hereinbefore mentioned benefices') are vested in Your Majesty, Your heirs and successors and such patronage is exercised on behalf of Your Majesty by the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain for the time being.

"And whereas the advowsons or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said six benefices of Abenball otherwise Abinghall, Clevedon, Rowberrow, Tickenham, Kilpeck and Walford on Wye (which six benefices are hereinafter called 'the six secondly hereinbefore mentioned benefices') are vested in the Bishop of Worcester for the time being,

"And whereas the Right Honourable Robert Threshie, Baron Loreburn, now Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain and the Right Reverend Huyshe Wolcott, now Bishop of Worcester, have respectively signified to us their desire that the patronage of the said twelve benefices may be rearranged by way of exchange in the manner which is hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas we have made due inquiry and calculation as to the circumstances and relative value of the said twelve benefices and of the patronage thereof respectively and we do hereby certify to Your Majesty in Council that the circumstances and present values of the said twelve benefices and also the value of each of the said twelve benefices in Your Majesty's books are as set forth in the schedule hereunto annexed.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said Robert Threshie, Barou Loreburn, and with the consent of the said Huyshe Wolcott, Bishop of Worcester, acting as such Bishop (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have signed and sealed this scheme) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to each of the six firstly hereinbefore mentioned benefices and the church thereof shall be assigned and transferred from Your Majesty Your heirs and successors and shall become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time and at all times be exercised by the said Huyshe Wolcott, Bishop of Worcester, and his successors in the same Bishoprick for ever, and that in exchange for the same the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to each of the six secondly hereinbefore mentioned benefices and the church thereof shall in like manner and upon and from the same date be assigned and transferred from the said Huyshe Wolcott, Bishop of Worcester, and from his successors and shall become and be absolutely vested in Your Majesty, Your heirs and successors for ever and shall and may from time to time and at all times be exercised on behalf of Your Majesty by the said Robert Threshie, Baron Loreburn, or other the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain for the time being.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifth and sixth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and eight, and of the Act of the twenty-first and twenty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-seven, which Acts are known as "The Ecclesiastical Leasing Acts," duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the nineteenth day of December, in the year one thousand nine hundred and seven, in the words following, that is to say:

the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifth-and sixth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and eight, and of the Act of the twenty-first and twenty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-seven, which Acts are known as "The Ecclesiastical Leasing Acts," have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme relating to the rectory and parish of Cantrelf, with the chapelry of Nantddu in the county of Brecknock and diocese of Saint David's.

"Whereas the annual value of the benefice of Cantreff with Nantddu, that is to say, of the rectory of the parish of Cantreff with the chapelry of Nantddu aforesaid (hereinafter called the said benefice), has been improved by means of certain leases of the minerals underlying portions of the glebe lands of the said benefice which leases were granted under the authority of the said Acts by former Rectors or Incumbents of the said benefice or of the perpetual curacy of Nantddu before its union with the rectory of Cantreff.

"And whereas the reats, royalties, and other reservations by the said leases reserved and made payable to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, have from time to time as the same have been received by us been invested in accordance with the provisions in that behalf contained in the said Acts, and of such investments there remain standing in the name of us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, first, a sum of seven thousand four hundred and ninety-six pounds sixteen shillings and sixpence India three pounds per centum stock, secondly, a sum of twenty-two thousand seven hundred and fiftythree pounds nineteen shillings and fivepence London County three pounds per centum stock, and thirdly, a sum of four thousand four hundred and twenty-one pounds three shillings and sevenpence Metropolitan Consolidated three pounds per centum stock, all which said sums of stock are now held by us in trust to pay the Rector or Incumbent for the time being of the said benefice the annual interest or dividends from time to time arising or accruing therefrom or thereupon, but subject nevertheless to the provisions contained in the said Acts with respect to making a certain portion of the improved value arising to the said benefice from the said leases payable to us for the benefit of our common fund to be applied as in the said Acts

"And whereas the improvement in the annual value of the said benefice arising from or by means of the said leases exceeds the annual sum of one thousand pounds, and after the appropria-

At the Court at Buckingham Palace, the 29th I tion hereinafter recommended to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, for the benefit of our common fund, of the sum of ten thousand pounds London County three pounds per centum stock the average annual income of the said benefice will not be left at a less sum than six hundred pounds.

> "Now, therefore, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that as from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme the sum of ten thousand pounds London County three pounds per centum stock (being part of the sum of twenty-two thousand seven hundred and fifty-three pounds nineteen shillings and fivepence London County three pounds per centum stock hereinbefore mentioned) shall cease to be held by us for the benefit of the Rector or Incumbent of the said benefice and shall be held by us for the benefit of our common fund to be applied as in the said Acts mentioned.

> And we further recommend and propose that as from the said day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme all the rents, royalties, and other reservations which shall become payable to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, under and by virtue of the two indentures of lease described in the schedule hereto (being two of the leases by means whereof the annual value of the said benefice has been improved as aforesaid) or of any renewal or renewals of such leases or either of them or of any lease or leases that may hereafter be granted of the minerals or any part of the minerals demised by the said indentures of lease or either of them shall cease to be paid to us for the benefit of the Rector or Incumbent of the said benefice and shall be paid to us for the benefit of our common fund to be applied as in the said Acts mentioned.

> "And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE.

"First. An indenture of lease dated the twentyfifth day of March one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six and granted by the Reverend James Price then Incumbent of the perpetual curacy of Nantddu with the consent and approval of us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners and of the Reverend John James Evans as then patron of the said perpetual curacy and of the Lord Bishop of Saint David's whereby there was demised to George Thomas Clark and the Right Honourable Henry Austin Bruce both therein described for a term of fifty-four years from the twenty-fifth day of March one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six coal ironstone and fireclay underlying certain lands containing about eightyfour acres situate in the parish of Merthyr Tydfil in the county of Glamorgan and belonging to the said perpetual curacy.

"Secondly. An indenture of lease dated the twenty-first day of May one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six and granted by the Reverend John James Evans then Rector or Incumbent of the said benefice (and since deceased) with the consent and approval of us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners and of David Evans therein described and the said John James Evans as then patrons of the said benefice whereby there was demised to the Powells Tillery Steam Coal Company Limited for a term of twenty-one years from the first day of July one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four coal ironstone and fireclay underlying certain other lands containing thirty-four acres three roods and nine perches situate in the parish of Aberystruth in the county of Monmouth and belonging to the said benefice."

And whereas the notices of the foregoing scheme, which are required by the hereinbefore mentioned Acts have been given by the said Commissioners to the patrons of the said benefice of Cantreff with Nantddu and the said patrons have not made any objection to the said scheme:

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council: now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Saint David's.

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter seventy, of the Act of the fourteenth and tifteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the nineteenth day of December, in the year one thousand nine hundred and seven, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter seventy, of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Anselm, Streatham, situate within the parish of Streatham, in the county of Surrey and in the diocese of Southwark.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of Streatham, and of the new parish (sometime particular district) of Saint Peter,

Streatham, in the said county and diocese, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such parish and new parish.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that certain contiguous portions (being the portions containing the population aforesaid) of the said parish of Streatham and of the said new parish of Saint Peter, Streatham, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Anselm, Streatham, situate as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Edward Stuart, Bishop of Southwark, as such Bishop, with the consent of the Most Noble Herbrand Arthur, Duke of Bedford, a Knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, as the Patron of the rectory of the said parish of Streatham, and with the consents of the Reverend Charles Southey Nicholl, of Christ Church Vicarage, Streatham, in the said county of Surrey, Clerk in Holy Orders, of Charles Dingwall, of number 40, Eastcheap, in the city of London, Esquire, of Alan Bruce Charles Bellamy, of Oakdene, Gleneldon-road, Streatham, in the said county of Surrey, Esquire, of the Reverend the Honourable Victor Alexander Seymour (commonly called Lord Victor Alexander Seymour), of number 78, Cornwall-gardens, London, S.W., Clerk in Holy Orders, and of Frederick Bernard Palmer, of number 10, Leigham Court-road, Streatham, in the said county of Surrey, Journalist, as the Patrons of the vicarage of the said new parish of Saint Peter, Streatham (in testimony whereof they, the said consenting parties, have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Streatham and of the said new parish of Saint Peter, Streatham, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Anselm, Streatham, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Anselm, Streatham.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Anselm, Streatham, comprising:—

"All those contiguous portions of the parish of Streatham and of the new parish (sometime particular district) of Saint Peter, Streatham, both in the county of Surrey and in the diocese of Southwark, which are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the new parish of Emmanuel, Streatham, in the said county and diocese, from the said parish of Streatham, at the centre of the bridge which carries the South London, Sutton, and Peckham Line of the London, Brighton, and South Coast Railway across Potters-lane, and extending thence north-east-

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter seventy, of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Donat, situate at Abercynon, within the parish of Llanwonno, in the county of Glamorgan, and in the diocese of Llandaff.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of Llanwonno and of the parish of Llanfabon, in the said county and diocese, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such parishes.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that certain contiguous portions (being the portions containing the population aforesaid) of the said parish of Llandonno and of the said parish of Llandahon should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Donat situate at Abercynon as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Joshua Pritchard, Bishop of Llandaff, as such Bishop, with the consent of the Reverend David Thomas Griffiths, Clerk in Holy Orders, Vicar or Incumbent of the vicarage of the parish of Llantrisant, in the said county and diocese, and as such Vicar or Incumbent, the Patron of the vicarage of the said parish of Llanwonno, and with the consent of the Dean and Chapter of the cathedral church of Llandaff as the Patrons of the rectory of the said parish of Llanfabon (in testimouy whereof they the said Joshua Pritchard, Bishop of Llandaff, and the said David Thomas Griffiths have respectively signed and sealed this representation and the said Dean and Chapter have caused their common or capitular seal to be affixed hereto), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Llanwonno and of the said parish of Lianfabon which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed

into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Donat, situate at Abercynon as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Donat, Abercynon.'

"We therefore humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Donat, Abercynon, comprising:—

"I. All that portion of the parish of Llanwonno, in the county of Glamorgan and in the diocese of Llandaff, which is bounded upon the east by the parish of Llanfabon, upon the north-east by the consolidated chapelry of Saint Matthias, Treharris, upon the north and upon the north-west by the new parish of Saint Winefred, Penrbiwceibr, all in the said county and diocese, and upon the remaining side, that is to say, upon the southwest, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Winefred, Penrhiwceibr, from the said parish of Llanwonno at the point where the road leading from Gilfachrhŷd joins the old Roman or parish road called Hoel-y-gelli, and extending thence generally south-eastward along the middle of the last-mentioned road for a distance of two miles and thirty chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries the line of the Taff Vale Railway across such road and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of such line of railway for a distance of one chain or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries the said line of railway across the River Clydach, and extending thence first north-eastward and then south-eastward along the middle of such river for a distance of twelve chains or thereabouts to its junction with the River Taff upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Llanwonno from the said parish of Llanfabon.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting under the provisions of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter ninety-four, of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four, and of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme or representation for altering the boundaries of the new parish of Saint John, Moordown, and the new parish of Saint Augustin, Bournemouth, both in the county of Southampton and in the diocese of Winchester.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of Her said late Majesty in Council, bearing date the seventeenth day of March in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four and published in the Loudon Gazette on the twentieth day of the same month portions of the parochial chapelry of Holdenhurst and of the new parish of Saint Peter. Bournemouth, both in the said county of Southampton and in the said diocese of Winchester, were constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and such district was named 'The District of Saint John, Moordown.'

"And whereas the said district of Saint John, Moordown, has become a new parish of the character contemplated by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, by the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, and by the above mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four.

"And whereas by the authority of another Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date the seventh day of August in the year one thousand nine hundred and published in the London Gazette on the fourteenth day of the same month portions of the said new parish or

Saint John, Moordown, of the district of Saint Stephen, Bournemouth, and of the new parish of the Holy Trinity, Bournemouth, both in the said county of Southampton and in the said diocese of Winchester, were constituted a separate district or new parish for spiritual purposes and the same is a new parish of the character afore-said and was named 'The New Parish of Saint Augustin, Bournemouth.'

"And whereas it has been represented to us and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint John, Moordown, and of the said new parish of Saint Augustin, Bournemouth, should be altered in the manner which is hereinafter mentioned.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Herbert Edward, Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint John, Moordown, and of the said new parish of Saint Augustin, Bournemouth, shall be altered so that all that portion of the said new parish of Saint John, Moordown, which is described in the schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed and is thereon coloured pink shall be dissevered from such new parish and shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said new parish of Saint Augustin, Bournemouth.

"And we further represent, recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing, recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

"The territory to be dissevered from the new parish of Saint John, Moordown, in the county of Southampton, and in the diocese of Winchester; and to be annexed to the new parish of Saint Augustin, Bournemouth, in the same county and diocese, being all that portion of the said new parish of Saint John, Moordown, which is bounded upon the east by a detached portion of the new parish of the Holy Trinity, Bourne-mouth, in the said county and diocese, upon the south by the said new parish of Saint Augustin, Bournemouth, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the west and upon the north, by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Augustin, Bournemouth, from the said new parish of Saint John, Moordown, crosses the middle of Heron Court-road, and extending thence northward along the middle of Heron Court-road for a distance of twenty-seven chains or thereabouts to its junction with Markhamroad, and extending thence eastward along the middle of Markham-road for a distance of twentyfour chains or thereabouts to its junction with Charminster-road, upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint John, Moordown, from the said detached portion of the new parish of the Holy Trinity, Bournemouth."

And whereas the said scheme or representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council: nov, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme or representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Winchester.

N pursuance of the Spring Assizes Act, 1879, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Most Honourable Privy Council, to order as follows :---

- 1. The Northern and Salford Divisions (as defined by the Order in Council of the 4th day of May, 1864) of the County of Lancaster shall, for the purpose of the next Spring Assizes, be united together under the name of the Spring Assize County, No. 2.
- 2. The said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County shall be held at Manchester.
- 3, The Court at the said Spring Assizes at Manchester shall have jurisdiction to try any prisoner committed in the said Spring Assize County who may be brought before it, and shall have the same powers with respect to the trial of and passing sentence upon such prisoner as a Court of Oyer and Terminer and Gaol Delivery would have had at the Assizes in the county where, but for the said Spring Assizes Act, 1879, such prisoner would have been tried.

The provisions of Section thirteen of the Sheriffs Act, 1887, shall apply to the execution of any capital sentence passed at such Assizes as herein mentioned; provided that the expression in the said section "the Sheriff of such county" shall mean the Sheriff of the county in which the prisoner so sentenced would have been tried if the Spring Assizes Act, 1879, had not been passed.

- 4. The Sheriff of the County of Lancaster shall act for the purpose of the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County.
- 5. The precepts of the Judges to the said Sheriff shall direct him to summon the Grand Jurors and Petty: Jurors from the County of Lancaster. 1. . . .
- 6. The Gaol Delivery precept of the Judges to the said Sheriff shall direct him to cause the prisoners from all the prisons in the said Spring Assize County who under the provisions of this Order will have to be tried at Manchester, to be brought there, and the Sheriff shall cause such prisoners to be brought accordingly without any Writ of Habeas Corpus.
- 7. All Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Coroners, Escheators, Stewards, Bailitis, Gaolers, Constables, Officers, and persons having authority and being under an obligation to attend the Assizes for either Division comprised in the said Spring Assize County, or to certify, transmit, or deliver to the Court of Assize, or the proper officer thereof, any indictment, inquisition, recognizance, examination, deposition, or document, shall have the same authority, and be under the same obligation to attend at the said Spring Assizes held for the said Spring Assize County, and to certify, transmit, or deliver to the Court of Assize, or the proper officer thereof, such indictment, inquisition, recognizance, examination, deposition, or document.
- 8. In all indictments and presentments at the said Spring Assizes the venue laid in the margin thereof shall, in addition to the name of the

committed, contain the words "Spring Assize County, No. 2."

- 9. Any person who after the date of this Order, and before the said Spring Assizes, enters into a recognizance to appear and prosecute, or give evidence, or to appear and answer before a Court of Oyer and Terminer or General Gaol Delivery, to be holden for either of the Divisions. constituting the said Spring Assize County, shall be bound to attend at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County.
- 10. In all cases in which the like recognizances have been entered into in respect of any offence committed in either of the Divisions constitutingthe said Spring Assize County prior to the making of this Order, such recognizances shall be deemed to have been entered into for attendance at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County, and every person bound by such recognizance shall be bound to appear at such last-mentioned Spring Assizes or forfeit his recognizance.
- 11. Ten days before the day fixed for the opening of the Commission at Manchester, a list of the prisoners to be removed for trial at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County so far as the same list can then be made out, shall, together with a short statement of the offences with which they are charged, be transmitted by the Gaoler of each prison in which such prisoners may be, to the Sheriff of the county of Lancaster, and the said Sheriff shall cause to be inserted in one or more newspapers in the Spring Assize County the said list and statement, and a notice that the persons bound by recognizances to appear and prosecute or give evidence for or against the prisoners so removed shall appear and prosecute and give evidence at Manchester.
- 12. It shall be lawful for the Gaoler of the Gaol in which prisoners who are to take their trial at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County shall be in custody, three days before the day upon which the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County are appointed to be held, to send, without any writ of Habeas Corpus, such prisoners to His Majesty's Gaol at Strangeways, Manchester, in the county of Lancaster, for the purposes of their trial, and to take all proper steps for their transmission to the said Gaol, and their maintenance by the way and the Gaoler of the said Gaol shall receive such prisoners into his charge and custody on their arrival, and shall keep and maintain them in the said Gaol until they are either ordered to be discharged or remanded by proper authority, or until they shall have been tried and sentenced, and proper arrangements have been made for their being sent back to the prison from which they were sent for trial, or sent to any other prison which has been duly appointed as an alternative for such prison. It, however, the said Gaol has itself been duly appointed as an alternative prison for the prison from which such prisoners were sent to trial, the Governor of the said Gaol shall, subject to the orders of the Secretary of State, keep and maintain in the said Gaol such prisoners after sentence, until they are discharged in due course of law.
- 13. The Clerk of Assize at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County, shall have all powers of taxation of Bills of Costs, expenses of prosecution and witnesses, and all other powers necessary for checking and paying county where the offence is charged to have been I such costs relating to the trial of prisoners that

the Clerk of Assize in the county where such I prisoners were committed would have had if such prisoner had been tried at the Assizes held in such last-mentioned county.

Where any person is committed for trial, or is bound by any recognizance to appear and answer, in the said Spring Assize County, any Judge of the High Court of Justice, or the committing Justice or Justices of any two of the Justices of the county or place from which he is committed or admitted to bail, may, upon the mitted or admitted to ball, may, upon the application of such person, direct the Treasurer of the county of place where such person was committed, or entered into any recognizance to appear and answer as aforesaid, to advance to such person a sum not exceeding 201. to enable him to defray the travelling expenses of such of his witnesses as may have been bound by recognizances to appear on his labels and the recognizances to appear on his behalf, and the Treasurer shall advance such sum; and shall deduct it out of the amount ultimately allowed in respect of such witnesses.

- 14. In any case where money is ordered by the Court at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County to be paid in respect of costs and expenses of prosecutors and witnesses, the same shall be paid by the Treasurer of the county or place by whom the same would have been payable had a like order been made by a Court of Oyer and Terminer or Gaol Delivery in the county where the trial would have taken place but for the Spring Assizes Act, 1879, and this Order; and every such Treasurer, or some known agent on his behalf, shall attend the said Spring Assizes during the sitting of the Court to pay all such orders.
- 15. Where the Court at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County remand a prisoner or adjourn any trial, or otherwise make an order respecting a prisoner committed for trial but not acquitted or convicted, the Court may make such order with respect to the removal of such prisoner to a prison in the county or place in which he was committed for trial as to the Court seems just, and the prisoner may be removed accordingly, without any Writ of Habeas Corpus.
- 16. Except where the context otherwise requires, terms used in this Order shall have the same meaning as that which the same terms have in the Spring Assizes Act, 1879.
- 17. This Order, unless earlier revoked, shall be in force during the continuance of the Spring Assizes, 1908.

- 2. The said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County shall be held at Leeds.
- 3. The Court at the said Spring Assizes at Leeds shall have jurisdiction to try any prisoner committed in the said Spring Assize County who may be brought before it, and shall have the same powers with respect to the trial of and passing sentence upon such prisoner as a Court of Oyer and Terminer and Gaol Delivery would have had at the Assizes in the county where, but for the said Spring Assizes Act, such prisoner would have been tried.

The provisions of Section thirteen of the Sheriffs Act, 1887, shall apply to the execution of any capital sentence passed at such Assizes as herein mentioned; provided that the expression in the said Section "the Sheriff of such County." shall mean the Sheriff of the County in which the prisoner so sentenced would have been tried if the Spring Assizes Act, 1879, had not been A first out outside program passed.

- 4. The Sheriff of the County of York shall alone act for the purpose of the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County, and subject to the provisions of this Order shall have jurisdiction for that purpose over the whole district constituting the said Spring Assize County, and precepts and other documents relating to the said Spring Assizes shall be addressed to him alone.
- 5. The Gaol Delivery precept of the Judges to the said Sheriff shall direct him to summon the Grand Jurors and Petty Jurors from the County of York; and the Jurors so summoned shall be deemed to be good and lawful men of the body of the several counties constituting the said Spring Assize County; and the Grand and Petty Jury formed out of those Jurors shall be deemed to be a Grand and Petty Jury respectively of the body of the said Counties respectively, and shall have jurisdiction accordingly.
- 6. The precepts of the Judges to the said Sheriff shall direct him to cause the prisoners from all the prisons in the said Spring Assize County who under the provisions of this Order will have to be tried at Leeds, to be brought there, and the Sheriff shall cause such prisoners to be brought accordingly without any writ of Habeas
- 7. In all matters not before specifically mentioned the precepts to the said Sheriff shall direct him to issue, and he shall issue the like notices, precepts, warrants, and documents, and perform the same acts (mutatis mutandis) as if he were Sheriff for the whole of the said Spring Assize County, and all Under Sheriffs, Bailiffs, Constables, and Officers in the said Spring Assize County shall obey accordingly.
- 8. The said Sheriff shall, as to all matters in relation to such Spring Assizes for which no specific provision is made by this Order, have the same power, jurisdiction and responsibility as if he were Sheriff for the whole of the said Spring Assize County, except that this provision shall not authorize the said Sheriff to carry sentences1. The North and East Riding Division and into execution outside the county of York, or to

levy outside the said County fines imposed or recognizances estreated at the said Spring Assizes.

- 9. All Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Coroners, Escheators, Stewards, Bailiffs, Gaolers, Constables, Officers, and persons having authority and being under an obligation to attend the Assizes for either of the Counties comprised in the said Spring Assize County, or to certify, transmit, or deliver to the Court of Assize or the proper officer thereof any indictment, inquisition, recognizance, examination, deposition, or document, shall have the same authority, and be under the same obligation to attend at the said Spring Assizes held for the said Spring Assize County, and to certify, transmit, or deliver to the Court of Assize, or the proper officer thereof, such indictment, inquisition, recognizance, examination, deposition, or document. - 10. In all indictments and presentments at the said Spring Assizes, the venue laid in the margin thereof shall, in addition to the name of the county where the offence is charged to have been committed, contain the words "Spring Assize County, No. 3."

Any person who after the date of this Order and before the said Spring Assizes, enters into a recognizance to appear and prosecute, or give evidence, or to appear and answer before a Court of Oyer and Terminer or General Gaol Delivery, to be holden for any of the Counties constituting the said Spring Assize County, shall be bound to attend at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County.
- 12. In all cases in which the like recognizances have been entered into in respect of any offence committed in any of the Counties constituting the said Spring Assize County prior to the making of this Order, such recognizances shall be deemed to have been entered into for attendance at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County, and every person bound by such recognizance shall be bound to appear at such last-mentioned Spring Assizes, or forfeit his recognizance.
- 13. Ten days before the day fixed for the opening of the Commission at Leeds, a list of the prisoners to be removed for trial at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County, so far as the same list can then be made out, shall, together with a short statement of the offences with which they are charged, be transmitted by the Gaoler of each prison in which such prisoners may be, to the Sheriff of the County of York, and the said Sheriff shall cause to be inserted in one or more newspapers in the Spring Assize County the said list and statement, and a notice that the persons bound by recognizances to appear and prosecute or give evidence for or against the prisoners so removed shall appear and prosecute and give evidence at Le-ds.
- 14. It shall be lawful for the Gaoler of the Gaol in which prisoners who are to take their trial at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County shall be in custody, three days before the day upon which the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County are appointed to be held, to send, without any Writ of Habeas Corpus, such prisoners to His Majesty's Gaol at Leeds for the purposes of their trial, and to take all proper steps for their transmission to the said Gaol, and their maintenance by the way, and

the Gaoler of the said Gaol shall receive such prisoners into his charge and custody on their arrival, and shall keep and maintain them in the said Gaol until they are either ordered to be discharged or remanded by proper authority, or until they shall have been tried and sentenced, and proper arrangements have been made for their being sent back to the prison from which they were sent for trial, or sent to any other prison which has been duly appointed as an alternative for such prison. If, however, the said Gaol has itself been duly appointed as an alternative prison for the prison from which such prisoners were sent to trial, the Governor of the said Gaol shall, subject to the orders of the Secretary of State, keep and maintain in the said Gaol such prisoners after sentence, until they are discharged in due course of law.

15. The Clerk of Assize at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County shall have all powers of taxation of Bills of Costs, expenses of prosecution and witnesses, and all other powers necessary for checking and paying such costs relating to the trial of prisoners that the Clerk of Assize in the county where such prisoners were committed would have had if such prisoner had been tried at the Assizes held in such last-mentioned county.

Where any person is committed for trial, or is bound by any recognizance to appear and answer, in the said Spring Assize County, any Judge of the High Court of Justice, or the committing Justice or Justices, or any two of the Justices of the county or place from which he is committed or admitted to bail, may, upon the application of such person, direct the Treasurer of the county or place where such person was committed, or entered into any recognizance to appear and answer as aforesaid, to advance to such person a sum not exceeding 20L, to enable him to defray the travelling expenses of such of his witnesses as may have been bound by recognizances to appear on his behalf, and the Treasurer shall advance such sum, and shall deduct it out of the amount ultimately allowed in respect of such witnesses.

- 16. In any case where money is ordered by the Court at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County to be paid in respect of costs and expenses of prosecutors and witnesses, the same shall be paid by the Treasurer of the county or place by whom the same would have been payable had a like order been made by a Court of Oyer and Terminer or Gaol Delivery in the county where the trial would have taken place but for the Spring Assizes Act, 1879, and this Order; and every such Treasurer, or some known agent on his behalf, shall attend the said Spring Assizes during the sitting of the Court to pay all such orders.
- 17. Where the Court at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County remand a prisoner or adjourn any trial, or otherwise make an order respecting a prisoner committed for trial but not acquitted or convicted, the Court may make such order with respect to the removal of such prisoner to a prison in the county or place in which he was committed for trial as to the Court seems just, and the prisoner may be removed accordingly without any Writ of Habeas Corpus.

And whereas by an Order of His Majesty in Council bearing date the eleventh day of August, one thousand nine hundred and two, and entitled "The East Africa Order in Council, 1902," provision was made for the administration of the government of the said Protectorate by a Commissioner:

And whereas by a further Order of His Majesty in Council bearing date the twenty-second day of October one thousand nine hundred and six, it was provided that a Governor should be appointed for the said Protectorate in place of a Commissioner:

And whereas by the fifteenth and sixteenth Articles of the last recited Order provision was made for the administration of the government of the said Protectorate in the absence of the Governor, and it is desirable to make other provision in lieu thereof:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers on that behalf by the Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890, or otherwise, in His Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered as follows:—

I. This Order may be cited as "The East Africa Order in Council, 1907."

II. Articles XV and XVI of the above recited Order in Council of the twenty-second day of October, one thousand nine hundred and six, are as from the coming into operation of this Order hereby revoked without prejudice to anything lawfully done thereunder, and in place thereof the following articles shall be substituted and take effect:—

"XV. Whenever the office of Governor is vacant, or if the Governor become incapable or be absent from the Protectorate, or is from any cause prevented from acting in the duties of his , office, the person appointed by His Majesty to be Lieutenant-Governor of the Protectorate, or if there be no such officer therein, or such officer be unable to act, then such person or persons as His Majesty may appoint under His Sign Manual and Signet, and in default of any such appointment the Senior Member of the Executive Council shall, during His Majesty's pleasure, administer the Government of the Protectorate, first taking the oaths hereinbefore directed to be taken by the Governor and in the manner herein prescribed, which being done, the Lieutenant-Governor or any other such administrator as aforesaid is hereby authorized, empowered, and commanded to do and execute, during His Majesty's pleasure, all things that belong to the office of Governor according to the tenour of this Order, and according to His Majesty's Instructions as aforesaid, and the Laws of the Protectorate. Provided that the Governor during his passage by sea to or from any part of the Protectorate, or when, in the exercise or discharge of any powers or duties by this Order in Council or otherwise conferred or imposed upon him, he is in any territories adjacent to or near to the Protectorate, shall not be considered to be absent from the Protectorate.

"XVI. In the event of the Governor having occasion at any time to be temporarily absent for a short period from the seat of Government, or, in the exercise or discharge of any powers or duties by this Order in Council or otherwise conferred or imposed upon him by His Majesty, to visit any territories adjacent to or near to the Protectorate, he may by an instrument under the Public Seal of the Protectorate appoint the Lieutenant-Governor, or if there be no such officer, or such officer is absent or unable to act, then any other person to be his Deputy within any part of the Protectorate, and in that capacity to exercise, during his pleasure, such of the powers hereby vested in the Governor, except the powers. of suspension and pardon, as shall in and by such instrument be specified and limited, but no others. The appointment of such Deputy shall not affect the exercise by the Governor himself of any of his powers or authorities. Such Deputy shall, in the discharge of his office, conform to and observe all such instructions as the Governor shall address to him for his guidance."

III. His Majesty, His heirs and successors, in Council may at any time revoke, alter, or amend this Order.

IV. This Order shall be read and proclaimed within the Protectorate, and shall thereupon commence and come into operation.

ORDER OF THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 29TH FEBRUARY 1908.)

NORTHAMPTON AND DISTRICT (MUZZLING AND CONTROL OF DOGS) ORDER OF 1908.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1903, and of every other power enabling mentioned.

I them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Extent and Enforcement.

1. This Order applies to and shall be in force in the district described in the schedule to this Order (in this Order referred to as the scheduled district), and shall be enforced by the Local Authority.

Movement of dogs out of scheduled district prohibited.

2. No dog shall be moved out of the scheduled district, but this Article shall not apply to the movement of a dog through the scheduled district by railway from a place outside the said district to another place outside the said district without unnecessary delay and without being rebooked within the scheduled district.

Control of dogs in public places.

3.—(1.) A dog in or on any public place in the scheduled district shall at all times be efficiently muzzled with an effective wire cage muzzle and shall also, between one hour after sunset and one hour before sunrise, be led by a person with a collar and chain or other attachment.

(2.) The provisions of this Article shall not apply to any dog confined in a suitable hamper, crate, box, or other receptacle, so constructed as to render it impossible for such dog while so confined to bite any person or animal.

Control of dogs not in public places.

- 4. A dog on any premises in the scheduled district, not being a public place, shall, subject as hereinafter mentioned, be kept under control by being—
 - (i.) confined in a kennel or other enclosure from which the dog cannot escape; or
 - (ii.) secured to some premises by a collar and chain; or
 - (iii:) efficiently muzzled with an effective wire cage muzzle, and also led by a person with a collar and chain or other attachment;

Provided that, between one hour before sunrise and one hour after sunset, it shall be sufficient if the dog while on any premises, not being a public place, is either muzzled or led as above mentioned. Seizure, detention, and disposal of unmuzzled dogs.

5.—(1.) Any dog found in or on any public place, which is not muzzled or is not led in manner prescribed by this Order, may be seized by the Local Authority or by the police and any dog so seized shall be dealt with by the Local Authority as follows:

(i.) If the dog is diseased or suspected or has been bitten by a diseased or suspected dog

it shall be forthwith slaughtered.

(ii.) If the dog has been exposed to the infection of rabies it shall be detained, slaughtered, or otherwise dealt with as the Local Authority think expedient, but so that the dog shall not, while detained by the Local Authority, be allowed to come in contact with any other

(iii.) In any other case the dog shall be detained in some proper place, and be there kept for such period as the Local Authority think expedient: Provided that where the person having charge of or the owner of a dog so detained is known, the Local Authority shall cause notice to be forthwith given to such person or owner of the fact of the dog having been so seized and detained, and the dog shall, without prejudice to the recovery of any penalty for the infringement of this Order, be given up to such person or owner on payment of the reasonable expenses incurred in respect of such detention. If the dog so seized and detained has not been claimed by such person or owner within three days after the seizure, or, where such person or owner is known, within two days after the aforesaid notice has been given, the Local Authority may cause the dog to be sold or destroyed in a manner to cause as little pain as possible.

(2.) No dog so seized shall be given or sold

for the purposes of vivisection.

(3.) Every dog shall for the purposes of this Article be deemed to have been exposed to the infection of rabies which has been in the same shed, stable, building, kennel, field, or other place or otherwise in contact with any diseased or suspected dog, or which has in any other way been exposed to the infection of rabies.

Temporary provision as to muzzling of dogs in

public places.
6. Until the ninth day of March, nineteen hundred and eight (including that day) a dog in the scheduled district need not be muzzled if it is led by a person with a collar and chain or other attachment.

Offences. 7.—(1.) If a dog is moved in contravention of this Order, the owner of the dog, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the dog, and the consignee or other person re-ceiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the dog is moved shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(2.) If any dog is not kept under control in manner prescribed by this Order the owner of the dog and the person for the time being in charge thereof, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty

of an offence against the Act of 1894.
(3:) If any dog found in or on any public place is not muzzled or is not led in manner prescribed by this 'Order, the owner of the dog, and the person for the time being in charge during all or any of the hours between sunset

thereof, and the person allowing the same to be in or on such public place in contravention of this Order, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Interpretation.

8. In this Order-

"The Act of 1894" means the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894. "Disease" means rabies, "diseased" means

affected with rabies, and "suspected" means

suspected of rabies:
"Public place" includes any street, highway, thoroughfare, public bridge, royal park, public park garden or pleasure ground, common, uninclosed land, or other place to which the public have for the time being

Other terms have the same meaning as in the Rabies Order of 1897.

Short Title.

9. This Order may be cited as the NORTH-AMPTON AND DISTRICT (MUZZLING AND CONTROL OF DOGS) ORDER OF 1908.

KENT (CONTROL OF DOGS) ORDER OF 1908:

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1903, the Dogs Act, 1906, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Power to make Regulations.

1.—(1.) The Local Authority of any District specified in the Schedule to this Order may, in accordance with the provisions of this Order, make Regulations, with a view to the prevention of worrying of cattle (including sheep), for requiring that dogs or any class of dogs shall, and sunrise, be kept by the owners thereof under control in manner prescribed by the Regulations.

(2.) The Regulations may apply to the whole or any part of the District, and may exempt any class of dogs either generally or under prescribed conditions.

Confirmation of Regulations.

2.—(1.) Regulations made under this Order shall not take effect unless and until they have been submitted to and confirmed by the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries.

(2.) Unless the Board otherwise direct, the

following provisions shall apply-

(i.) Notice of intention to apply for confirmation of any Regulations shall be given in one or more of the local newspapers circulating within the District in two successive issues two weeks at least before the making of the application.

(ii.) For two weeks at least before an application, a copy of the Regulations proposed to be confirmed shall be kept at the office of the Local Authority of the District, and be open during office hours thereat to the inspection of ratepayers of the District without fee or reward.

(iii.) The Clerk of the Local Authority shall on the application of any such ratepayer furnish him with a copy of the proposed Regulations on payment of sixpence.

(3.) A copy of any Regulations made by a Local Authority under this Order, signed and certified by the Clerk of that Local Authority to be a true copy and to have been duly confirmed, shall be evidence, until the contrary is proved, in all legal proceedings, of the due making, confirmation, and existence of the Regulations, without further or other proof.

> Seizure of Dogs where Regulations are Contravened.

3. Any dog in respect of which an offence is being committed against a Regulation made under this Order may be seized and treated as a stray dog under the powers conferred by section three of the Dogs Act, 1906.

Extension of Definition in Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

4. Dogs shall be animals for the purposes of the following sections of the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894 (namely):-

-Section forty-three (powers of police); Section forty-four (powers of inspectors); and also for the purposes of all other sections of the said Act containing provisions relative to or consequent on the provisions of those sections and this Order, including such sections as relate to offences and legal proceedings.

Local Authority to enforce Order.
5. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

6. This Order may be cited as the Kent (CONTROL OF DOGS) ORDER OF 1908.


