Fourth Division Escort, Royal Horse Guards, dismounted.

A Guard of Honour of the Scots Guards was mounted in the Horse Shoe Cloister.

On arrival at the Chapel, the Officer commanding the London District and his Staff, the Aides-de-Camp, the Deputations of Officers from Foreign Navies and Armies, and the Head Quarter Staff of the Army, arranged themselves on either side of the steps leading to the West Door and followed the Suites of the Foreign Royal Guests into the Chapel.

The Pursuivants, Heralds, and Lyon, Ulster and Norry Kings of Arms, moved up the Nave of the Chapel, ranging themselves on either side of the entrance to the Choir, and Garter King of Arms, accompanied by Black Rod, passed into the Choir to be in readiness to pronounce the Styles of His late Majesty.

At the West Door of the Chapel the Royal Remains were received by—

The Archbishop of Canterbury,
 The Archbishop of York;
 The Bishop of Winchester, Prelate of the Order of the Garter,
 The Bishop of Oxford, Chancellor of the Order of the Garter,
 The Dean of Windsor, Registrar of the Order of the Garter,

with the Canons, Minor Canons, Lay Clerks and Choristers of St. George's Chapel.

The Procession moved up the Nave headed by the Choir and Clergy, and the Opening Sentences of the Burial Service and the Psalm "Lord, Thou hast been our Refuge," were chanted.

The Gold Sticks and White Staves proceeded on either side of this Procession into the Choir.

Behind the Coffin, which was immediately preceded by The Earl Marshal, The Lord Steward, and the Lord Chamberlain, walked The King, the other members of the Royal Family, the Royal Representatives and the remainder of the Procession; those who had ranged themselves outside the West Door fell in after the suites of the Special Envoys.

His Majesty The King, Chief Mourner, with Queen Alexandra, stood at the Head of the Coffin, followed by The German Emperor with The Empress Marie Féodorovna and the other Sovereigns present, the Royal Princes and the Foreign Representatives.

The Lord Chamberlain of His Majesty's Household took his place at the Foot of the Coffin.

The Lesson was read by The Dean of Windsor, followed by the Anthem, "His body is buried in peace: but His name liveth for evermore."

The Prayers were read by The Archbishop of Canterbury, and the Sentence, "I heard a voice from Heaven" was sung.
