

The Prayer, "Almighty God, with Whom do live the spirits of them that depart hence in the Lord," was said by The Bishop of Winchester, which was followed by the Hymn, "My God, my Father, while I stray."

The Collect was said by The Archbishop of York.

Sir Alfred Scott Scott-Gatty, Garter Principal King of Arms, pronounced the Styles of His late Most Sacred Majesty of Blessed Memory :—

"Thus it hath pleased Almighty God to take out of this transitory life unto His Divine Mercy, the late Most High, Most Mighty, and Most Excellent Monarch, Edward VII., by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India, and Sovereign of the Most Noble Order of the Garter.

"Let us humbly beseech Almighty God to bless with long life, health and honour, and all worldly happiness, the Most High, Most Mighty, and Most Excellent Monarch, Our Sovereign Lord George, now, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India, and Sovereign of the Most Noble Order of the Garter."

"GOD SAVE THE KING."

The Hymn, "Now the labourer's task is o'er," was sung, and The Archbishop of Canterbury pronounced the Benediction.

The Company Colour of the King's Company of the Grenadier Guards was handed to The King by Field-Marshal His Royal Highness The Duke of Connaught, and placed on the Coffin by His Majesty.

As the sentence of committal to the Grave was read by The Archbishop of Canterbury, earth was cast upon the Coffin by Lieut.-Colonel Sir Charles Frederick, Master of the Household to His late Majesty.

Knights of the Most Noble Order of the Garter were present in St. George's Chapel.

The Ambassadors and the other Chefs-de Mission of the Corps Diplomatique were accompanied and shown into seats reserved for them in the Chapel by the Hon. Arthur Walsh, C.V.O., Master of the Ceremonies, the Hon. R. Moreton, M.V.O., Marshal of the Ceremonies, and R. F. Synge, Esq., C.M.G., Deputy-Marshal of the Ceremonies.

His Majesty's Body Guard of the Honourable Corps of Gentlemen at Arms, under the Command of the Lieutenant, Colonel Sir Henry Hugh Oldham, C.V.O., Standard Bearer, Colonel Sir Aubone Fife, C.V.O., Clerk of the Cheque and Adjutant, Lieut.-Colonel Henry A. Fletcher, C.V.O., and Officiating Sub-Officer, Captain J. H. Waller, M.V.O., were on duty in the Choir of the Chapel, and The King's Body Guard of Yeomen of the Guard, under the Command of the Lieutenant, Colonel Sir Reginald Hennell, D.S.O., Ensign, Major E. H. Elliot, M.V.O., and Clerk of the Cheque and Adjutant, Captain Houston French, were on duty in the Nave.

Minute guns were fired in the Long Walk at Windsor while the Procession moved from Windsor Station to St. George's Chapel.

Full Dress was worn, with a Band of Crape on the left arm.
