upon the boundary which divides the said: isolated portion of the paxish of Bingley from the new parish of Cullingworth, in the said county and diocese, and extending thence first north-eastward and then in various directions along the last-mentioned boundary (thereby following in part the middle of Halifax Road and in part the middle of Staples Lane) for a distance of fifty-eight chains and a half or thereabouts to the point where such boundary meets the boundary which divides the said new parish of Cullingworth from the said new parish of Ingrow with Hainworth, and extending thence generally eastward along the lastmentioned boundary and along the bouudary which divides the said new parish of Cullingworth from the said parish of Bingley for a distance in all of fifty-seven chains or thereabouts to the point near the house called Eller Carr where the last-mentioned boundary crosses the middle of Keighley Road, and extending thence northward along the middle of Keighley Road for a distance of fifty-two chains and a half or thereabouts to the point where such road is crossed by the boundary which divides the said parish of Bingley from the said new parish of Ingrow with Hainworth, and extending thence northward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of eight chains and a half or thereabouts to the point where it crosses the middle of the road leading from Ryecroft to Hainworth, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-mentioned road for a distance of forty-five chains and a quarter or thereabouts to its junction at Hainworth with the road leading to Hill Top and Hainworth Crag, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last-mentioned road for a distance of twelve chains or thereabouts to its junction near Hill I'op with the road leading past the eastern side of the house and premises known as The Whins towards Cross Roads, and extending thence first north-westward and then south-westward along the middle of the last-mentioned road for a distance of twenty-one chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the south-eastern end of the fence forming the north-eastern boundary of the close numbered 1473 upon the ordnance map of the civil parish of Keighley published in the year one thousand nine hundred and eight upon the scale of twenty-five inches to a mile and also upon the map or plan which is annexed to this representation, and extending thence first northwestward to and along the said fence and then in various directions along the fences forming the northern boundaries of the closes numbered 1471 and 1470 upon the said maps for a distance in all of six chains and a quarter or thereabouts to the north-western end of the fence forming the northern boundary of the said close numbered 1470, and extending thence westward in a straight line for a distance of one chain and three-quarters or thereabouts to the point where the fence forming the southern boundary of the close numbered 1467 upon the said maps meets the western side of Elainworth Crag Road, and extending thence north-westward along the last-mentioned fence and along the wall or fence forming the southern boundary of the house and premises known as number 223, Halifax Road, for a distance of one chain and a half or thereabouts to the point where such wall or fence meets the eastern side of Halifax Road,
and extending thence first north-westward to and then north-eastward along the middle of Halifax Road for a distance of six chains or thereabouts to its junction with Damems Lane, and extending thence north-westward in a straight line (thereby crossing the Halifax Thornton and Keighley branch line of the Great Northern Railway, Damems Road, the River Worth, and the Keighley and Worth - Valley branch line of the Midland Railway) for a distance of eight chains and a half.or thereabouts to the point where the fence forming the western boundary of the last-mentioned line of railway meets the fence forming the northern boundary of the close numbered 1451 upon the said maps and extending thence first westward along the last-mentioned fence and then first northward, then north-westward, then westward, then southward and then again westward along the fences forming generally the northern boundaries of the closes numbered 1450, 1440, 1441, and 1444. upon the said maps for a distance of thirty chains and a half or thereabouts to the point where the last-mentioned fence meets the fence forming the northern boundary of the close numbered 1028 upon the ordnance map of the civil parish of Oakworth published in the year one thousand nine hundred and eight upon the scale of twenty-five inches to a mile and upon the said map or plan which is annexed to this representation, and exteiiding thence first westward along the last-mentioned fence and then south-westward along the fences forming the western boundaries of the said close numbered 1028 and of the close numbered 1026 upon the last-mentioned maps for a distance in all of seventeen chains or thereabouts to the point where the last-mentioned fence meets the northern side of Goose Cote' Lane, and extending thence first southward to the middle of Goose Cote Lane and then first westward and then north-westward along the middle of such lane for a distance of twentysix chains and a half or thereabouts to its junction with Keighley Road, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of Keighley Road for a distance of four chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the parish of Keighley, in the said county and diocese, from the said new parish of Ingrow with Hainworth, and. extending thence first south-westward then south-eastward and then westward along the last-mentioned boundary (thereby in one part continuing to follow the middle of 'Keighley Road and in another part following the middle of Sykeslane) for a distance of seventeen chains and a half or thereabouts to the point where such boundary meets the boundary which divides the said new parish of Oakworth from the said new parish of Ingrow with Hainworth, and extending thence first south-eastward and then in various directions along the last-mentioned boundary (thereby following in part the right bank of the River Worth) for a distance of seventy chains or thereabouts to the point at or near the junction of the River Worth with the stream called Bridgehouse Beck where the boundaries of the said new parish of Oakworth, the said new parish of Saint Michael, Haworth, and the said new parish of Ingrow with Hainworth all meet, at which point the said imaginary line commenced."
