WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and fourteen, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fourteenth day of March, in the year one thousand nine hundred and twelve, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the thirtythird and thirty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirtynine, and the Act of the thirty-first and thirtysecond years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and fourteen, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your. Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the church and cure (hereinafter called 'the said benefice') of Marldon, in the county of Devon and in the diocese of Exeter.

"Whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Marldon is vested for an estate in fee simple in possession free from incumbrances in the Right Honourable Walter Stafford, Earl of Iddesleigh (hereinafter called 'the said Lord Iddesleigh') and John George Edmund Templer, of Lindridge, Bishop's Teignton, in the said county of Devon, Esquire.

"And whereas the said Lord Iddesleigh and the said John George Edmund Templer are desirous that the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Marldon, now vested in them as aforesaid, should be transferred to and be vested in the Right Reverend Archibald, now Bishop of the said diocese of Exeter, and his successors in the same bishoprick.

"And whereas the said Archibald, Bishop of Exeter, is willing to accept such transfer,

and in token of such his willingness and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the diocese which by the Acts in the hereinbefore mentioned Act recited or by some or one of them is made necessary, he, the said Archibald, Bishop of Exeter, has executed this scheme as hereinafter mentioned.

"And whereas the transfer of the patronage of the said benefice of Marldon which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed will in our opinion tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the parish or district in or in respect of which the right of patronage or advowson so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or exists, that is to say in the parish of Marldon.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the said Lord Iddesleigh and of the said John George Edmund Templer (in testimony whereof they have severally signed and sealed this scheme) and with the consent of the said Archibald, Bishop of Exeter (in testimony whereof he has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Marldon, now vested in them the said Lord Iddesleigh and the said John George Edmund Templer as aforesaid, shall be transferred to the said Archibald, Bishop of Exeter, and his successors in the same bishoprick, and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Archibald, Bishop of Exeter, and by his successors in the same bishoprick for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been

approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with
the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts. And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Exeter.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date the nineteenth day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty, and published in the London Gazette on the twenty-fifth day of the same month, a consolidated chapelry was assigned to the conse-crated church of Saint Andrew, situate in Monton Lane, in the parish of Eccles, in the said county of Lancaster and in the said diocese of Manchester, and the said consolidated chapelry was named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Andrew, Eccles.

"And whereas the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Andrew, Eccles, has under the provisions of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, become a new parish of the character contemplated by that Act, by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, and by the above mentioned Act of the thirtysecond and thirty-third years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four.

And whereas it has been represented to us and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Andrew, Eccles, should be altered in the manner which is hereinafter mentioned,

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Edmund Arbuthnott, Bishop of the said diocese of Manchester (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation), We, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Andrew, Eccles, shall be altered so that all that portion of the said parish of Eccles, which is described in the Schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed and is thereon coloured pink, shall be dissevered from such parish and shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said new parish of Saint Andrew, Eccles.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of Her said late Majesty in Council bearing date the fourth day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, and published in the London Gazette on the following day, a separate district for spiritual purposes was constituted out of the parish of Worksop, in the said county of Nottingham, and at that time in the diocese of Lincoln, but now in the said diocese of Southwell, and such district was named 'The District of Saint John, Worksop.'

"And whereas the said district of Saint John, Worksop, has become a new parish of the character contemplated by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, by the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, and by the above mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four.

"And whereas it has been represented to us and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint John, Worksop, should be altered in the manner which is hereinafter mentioned.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Edwyn, Bishop of Southwell (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint John, Worksop, shall be altered so that all that portion of the said new parish of Saint John, Worksop, which is described in the Schedule hereunder written, and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed and is thereon coloured pink, shall be dissevered from such new parish and shall be restored to and shall in future form part of the said parish of Worksop.

"And we further represent, recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing, recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts or of any of them or of any

other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

"The territory to be dissevered from the new parish of Saint John, Worksop, in the county of Nottingham and in the diocese of Southwell, and to be restored to the parish of Worksop in the same county and diocese, being:—All that portion of the said new parish of Saint John, Worksop, which is bounded upon the east and upon the south by the said parish of Worksop, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the west, upon the north-west, and upon the north, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Worksop from the said new parish of Saint John, Worksop, at the centre of the bridge which carries the road leading from Bridge Street to the road called Bridge Place across the River Ryton, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of such bridge and along the middle of Bridge Place for a distance in all of ten chains and three-quarters or thereabouts to the centre of the Bridge which carries Bridge Place across the Chesterfield Canal, and extending thence eastward along the middle of the Chesterfield Canal for a distance of twenty-four chains and a quarter or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries Kilton Road across the Chesterfield Canal, and extending thence first northward, then north-eastward, and then eastward along the middle of Kilton Road, for a distance of twenty-six chains and a quarter or thereabouts to its junction with Kilton Lane, upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint John, Worksop from the said parish of Worksop.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter seventy, of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Augustine, Grimsby, situate within the parish of Great Grimsby in the county of Lincoln and in the diocese of Lincoln.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of Great Grimsby and of the parish of Clee, in the said county and diocese, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the Schedule hereunder written, there is collected togther a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such parishes.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that certain contiguous portions (being the portions containing the population aforesaid) of the said parish of Great Grimsby and of the said parish of Clee, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Augustine, Grimsby, situate as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Edward Lee, Bishop of Lincoln, as such Bishop, and also as the patron in right of his See, both of the vicarage of the said parish of Great Grimsby and of the vicarage of the said parish of Clee (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all

those contiguous portions of the said parish of Great Grimsby and of the said parish of Clee, which are described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Augustine, Grimsby, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Augustine, Grimsby.'

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal Wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The consolidated chapelry of Saint Augustine, Grimsby, comprising: -All those contiguous portions of the parish of Great Grimsby, and of the parish of Clee, both in the county of Lincoln and in the diocese of Linwhich are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the new parish of All Saints, Grimsby, in the said county and diocese, from the said parish of Great Grimsby at the centre of the bridge which carries the East Lincolnshire line of the Great Northern Railway across Wintringham Road, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of Wintringham Road for a distance of sixteen chains and a half or thereabouts to its junction with Ainslie Street, and extending thence southward along the middle of Ainslie Street for a distance of fourteen chains or thereabouts to its junction with Welholme Road and with the road called Park Drive, and extending thence first southward, then south-westward and then again southward along the middle of Park Drive for a distance of twenty-eight chains or thereabouts to its junction with Weelsby Road and with the road called Park Avenue, and extending thence southward along the middle of Park Avenue and along a line in continuation thereof for a distance in all of thirty-three chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said parish of Great Grimsby from the said parish of Clee, and extending thence first southward, then westward, then again southward, then again westward and then again southward along such boundary for a distance of twentyone chains or thereabouts to the point where it meets the boundary which divides the parish of Scartho, in the said county and diocese, from the said parish of Clee, and extending thence first eastward and then in various directions (generally south-eastward) along the last mentioned boundary for a distance of one mile and twenty-four chains or thereabouts to the point where it crosses the middle of the said East Lincolnshire line of the Great Northern Railway, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the said line of railway (thereby crossing the boundary of the said parish of Clee and following in part the boundary which divides the said new parish of All Saints, Grimsby, from the said parish of Great Grimsby) for a distance of one mile and greyenty three shains or thereshouts to the seventy-three chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries such line of railway across Wintringham Road, at which point the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts. And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Lincoln.

WHEREAS by section 26 of Pluralities Act, 1838, after reciting that, "Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, chapelries, and other places or districts may be separated from the parishes or mother churches to which they belong, with great advantage, and places altogether extraparochial may, in some instances, with advantage be annexed to parishes or districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for ecclesiastical purposes, it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That when with respect to his own diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop of the province, or when the Bishop of any diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place or district within the diocese of such Archbishop, or the diocese of such Bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any parish or mother church, and either be constituted a separate benefice by itself or be united to any other parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a separate parish or benefice, or that any extra-parochial place may with advantage be annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes: And the said Archbishop or Bishop shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his consideration) describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rentcharges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties in-terested; and if the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such scheme, or to such modification thereof as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall,

on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to His Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to make an order for carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas the Right Reverend Edward, Lord Bishop of Southwark, hath made a representation in writing to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows:—

- "I, Edward, by Divine permission Bishop of Southwark, do in pursuance of the twenty-sixth section of the Act of Parliament of the first and second years of the reign of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, cap. 106, hereby represent to your Grace
- "1. There is in the county of Surrey and my diocese of Southwark the vicarage of Mortlake, the parish whereof lies adjoining to the ecclesiastical parish of Kew and the consolidated chapelry of St. Luke, Richmond, and contains, according to the census of one thousand nine hundred and one, a population of eight thousand one hundred and seventy-seven, but now contains a population of seventeen thousand.
- "2. The net annual value of the benefice of Mortlake arising from tithe rentcharge, dividends from the Ecclesiastical Commissioners and Queen Anne's Bounty, surplice fees, pew rents, and Easter offerings is four hundred and twenty-five pounds.
- "3. In the same county and diocese is the vicarage of Kew, the ecclesiastical parish whereof contains, according to the census of one thousand nine hundred and one, a population of two thousand six hundred and ninetynine.
- "4. The net annual value of the benefice of Kew arising from tithe rentcharge and other sources is four hundred and eighty pounds.
- "5. In the same county and diocese is the consolidated chapelry of St. Luke, Richmond, which contains, according to the census of one thousand nine hundred and one, a population of three thousand six hundred and eighty-five.
- "6. The net annual value of the benefice of St. Luke, Richmond, arising from pew rents, dividends from the Ecclesiastical Commissioners and Queen Anne's Bounty, Easter offerings, surplice fees, and other sources is three hundred pounds.
- "7. It appears to me (1) that a certain district of the ecclesiastical parish of Mortlake, being contiguous to the ecclesiastical parish of Kew, may under the provisions of the said Act of the first and second Victoria, cap. 106, and of the Act of the second and third years of the same reign, cap. 49, be advantageously separated from the said ecclesiastical parish of Mortlake and united to the said ecclesiastical parish of Kew, and also (2) that a certain other district of the said parish of Mortlake, being contiguous to the said consolidated chapelry of St. Luke, Richmond, may, under the provisions of the said Acts, also be advantageously separated from the said ecclesiastical parish of Mortlake and united to the said consolidated chapelry of St. Luke, Richmond.
- "8. The Very Reverend William Moore Ede, D.D., Dean of the Cathedral Church of

- Christ and of the Blessed Mary the Virgin of Worcester, and the Chapter of the same church are the patrons of the said benefice of Mortlake, His Most Gracious Majesty The King is the patron of the said benefice of Kew, and I, the Bishop aforesaid, am the patron of the said benefice of St. Luke, Richmond.
- "9. The Reverend Horace Granville Monroe is the present Incumbent of the said benefice of Mortlake, the Reverend William Henry Bliss is the present Incumbent of the said benefice of Kew, and the Reverend Paul Martin Chamney is the present Incumbent of the said benefice of St. Luke, Richmond.
- "10. Pursuant to the directions contained in the twenty-sixth section of the said first-mentioned Act of Parliament, I, the said Bishop. have drawn up a scheme in writing, appended to this representation, describing the two areas or districts of the ecclesiastical parish of Mortlake so as aforesaid proposed to be annexed to the said ecclesiastical parish of Kew and the said consolidated chapelry of St. Luke, Richmond respectively, and the mode in which it appears to me the alterations may be best effected and how the changes consequent thereon in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested. And I do hereby submit the same to your Grace, together with the consents in writing of the said patrons and of the said Reverend Horace Granville Monroe and the said Reverend William Henry Bliss, and in case you shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied therewith, I request that your Grace will be pleased to certify the same and the consents of the patrons thereto to His Majesty in Council."

And whereas the said scheme drawn up by the said Bishop is as follows:—

"SCHEME.

- "1. It is proposed to separate a district from the ecclesiastical parish of Mortlake, in the county of Surrey and diocese of Southwark, and unite such district for ecclesiastical purposes to the adjoining ecclesiastical parish of Kew, in the same county and diocese.
- "It is further proposed that such district shall consist of all that northern portion of the said parish of Mortlake which is bounded on the north-west in part by the said parish of Kew and in part by the parish of St. Luke, Richmond, in the county and diocese aforesaid, on the north-east in part by the said parish of Kew and in part by the River Thames, on the south or south-west by High Park Road, and on the south-east by West Hall Road, by the lane continuing therefrom to the dock belonging to the main drainage works and by the said dock, and such district is coloured pink, and indicated by the letter A on the annexed plan.
- "2. It is also proposed to separate a certain other district from the said ecclesiastical parish of Mortlake and unite such district to the consolidated chapelry of St. Luke, Richmond aforesaid.
- "It is further proposed that such district shall consist of all that portion of the said parish of Mortlake which is bounded on the west in part by the said parish of St. Luke, Richmond, and in part by the parish of

Christ Church, Richmond, in the county and diocese aforesaid, on the north or north-east by High Park Road and Mortlake Road, on the east by Mortlake Road and Clifford Avenue, and on the south or south-east by an imaginary line running along the centre of the London and South-Western Railway from the southern end of Clifford Avenue to the eastern boundary of the said parish of Christ Church, Richmond, and such district is coloured green, and indicated by the letter B on the annexed plan.

"The inhabitants of the said districts shall not in future be entitled to any accommodation in the parish church of Mortlake (except nevertheless any person or persons possessing a legal right by faculty or otherwise to any pew or sitting within the said church, and who may not be willing to relinquish and give up the same), and shall be exonerated from all liability to repair the said church, but shall be entitled to accommodation in the parish churches of the parishes to which such districts shall be respectively annexed, and shall be liable, subject to the provisions of the Compulsory Church Rates Abolition Act, 1868, to the repairs of such churches.

"The Incumbent of the parish of Kew shall have the sole and exclusive cure of souls within the above-mentioned district coloured pink and marked A on the said plan, and all the fees for churchings, marriages, and burials, and other ecclesiastical offices solemnized and performed at the church and churchyard of such parish in respect of the inhabitants of such district shall belong to and be received by such Incumbent.

"The Incumbent of the consolidated chapelry of St. Luke, Richmond, shall have the sole and exclusive cure of souls within the above-mentioned district, coloured green and marked B on the said plan, and all the fees for churchings, marriages, and burials, and other ecclesiastical offices solemnized and performed at the church and churchyard of such parish in respect of the inhabitants of such district shall belong to and be received by such Incumbent.

"No alteration shall be made in the patronage or endowments of any of the above-mentioned benefices."

And whereas the Very Reverend William Moore Ede, Dean of the Cathedral Church of Christ and of the Blessed Mary the Virgin, of Worcester, and the Chapter of the same church, as patrons, and the Reverend Horace Granville Monroe, as Incumbent of the said vicarage of Mortlake, the Right Honourable Herbert Henry Asquith, First Lord of the Treasury, on behalf of His Majesty the King as patron, and the Reverend William Henry Bliss as Incumbent of the said vicarage of Kew, and the said Lord Bishop of Southwark as patron, and the Reverend George E. Catlin as Incumbent of the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Luke, Richmond, have signed the consents following:—

"That, pursuant to the directions contained in the 26th section of the said Act of Parliament, the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a scheme in writing, describing the mode in which it appears to him that the proposed alterations may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alterations in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rentcharges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested, which scheme, together with the consents thereto in writing of the Very Reverend William Moore Ede, D.D., Dean of the Cathedral Church of Christ and of the Blessed Virgin, of Worcester, and the Mary the Chapter of the same church, the patrons or persons entitled to present to the said benefice of Mortlake in case the same were now vacant, the Reverend Horace Granville Monroe, the Incumbent of the same benefice, the Right Honourable Herbert Henry Asquith, K.C., M.P., First Lord of His Majesty's Treasury, on behalf of His Most Gracious Majesty the King, the patron or person entitled to present to the said benefice of Kew in case the same were now vacant, the Reverend William Henry Bliss, the Incumbent of the same benefice, and the said Lord Bishop of Southwark, the patron or person entitled in right of his See to collate to the said benefice of St. Luke, Richmond, in case the same were now vacant, has been transmitted to us by the said Lord Bishop for our consideration.

"The representation and scheme of the said Lord Bishop and the consents above referred to are hereunto annexed.

"And we, the said Archbishop, being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with the said scheme, do hereby, pursuant to the said Pluralities Act, 1838, certify the same and such consents as aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may, in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do, make and issue an Order for carrying the said scheme into effect.

Thence by Pensthorpe Hall along the Norwich Road to Guist.

On the East, from Guist southwards along the road leading to County School Station, and thence along the Wymondham and Wells Railway to East Dereham and Wymondham Station. left to Steppingley, and thence to Millbrook. Thence by Millbrook Station to Marston Moretaine, thence through Kempston to the river Ouse—thence along the river to Milton Ernest. Thence by the road through Thurleigh and Bolnhurst. Thence by Bushmead Cross, to the county boundary, and along the county boundary to St. Nects. From St. Neots by the main road through Godmanchester to Huntingdon. Thence by the road through Hartford, Wyton, Needingworth, to the Ferry Inn, on the river Ouse. - 1. "Each of the dues authorized to be levied by the said scale shall, for a period of three years from the date of coming into operation of this Order, be subject to a reduction of 17½ per centum beyond the reduction of 12½ per centum provided for by the said Order in Council of the 10th day of August, 1903, and the said dues as so reduced by the said Order in Council of the 10th day of August, 1903, and by this Order shall be levied and the said rules construed accordingly."
- .2. "This Order in Council shall come into operation as and from the 1st day of April,

1909, and as and from the coming into operation of this Order the recited Order in Council dated the 1st day of December, 1906, shall be repealed."

Majesty in Council, upon the representation of the Local Government Board, that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of the Local Government Board, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial grounds or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order that no new burial ground shall be opened in such city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require) that, after a time men-tioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require: Provided always that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please His Majesty to order the same to be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered: Provided also that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and the Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such Parish:

And whereas the Local Government Board, after giving to the Incumbent and the Churchwardens of the Parish of Eglwysilan, in the county of Glamorgan, ten days' previous notice of their intention in that behalf, have made a representation to His Majesty in Council that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial ground in the Civil Parish of Eglwysilan aforesaid, save with the previous approval of the Local Govern ment Board, should be prohibited, and that burials should be discontinued in the said Parish as hereinafter directed:

And whereas His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 29th day of February last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council, on the 8th day of April last, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, as it is hereby ordered, that no new burial ground shall be opened in the said Civil Parish save with the previous approval of the Local Government Board, and that burials in the said Parish shall be discontinued as follows, viz.:

EGLWYSILAN.—Forthwith and entirely in the Ainon Baptist Church, Tongwynlais, in the Parish of Eglwysilan, in the County of Glamorgan; and in the Burial Ground attached thereto, except as follows:—

(a) In any walled grave now existing in the said burial ground burial may be allowed

of the body of the widow or widower of the person heretofore buried in such grave, subject to the condition that every coffin buried in such grave be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b) In any earthen grave now existing in the said burial ground, and being enclosed with a kerb or railing or having a monument upon it, the burial may be allowed of the body of the widow or widower of the person heretofore buried in such grave, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.

The following Statute made by the University of Oxford on the 7th May, 1912, amending the existing Statutes of the said University, has been submitted for the approval of His

Majesty in Council, and notice of its having been so submitted is hereby published in accordance with the provisions in that behalf contained in "The Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877":—

STATUTE MADE BY THE UNIVERSITY OF OXFORD, ON THE 7TH MAY, 1912.

Whereas it is expedient to amend the provisions of Statt. Tit. VII, sect. 1 § 7, "Of the Denyer and Johnson Scholarships in Theology," the University enacts as follows:—

- 1. In Statt. Tit. VII, sect. 1, cl 1 (p. 250, ed. 1911), the words "Theological Scholarships" shall be struck out, and the words "Scholarships for the encouragement of the study of Theology" shall be substituted.
- 2. Ibid., cl. 1, all the words after the words "as was provided by" to the end of the clause shall be struck out, and the words "The Oxford University Act, 1862" shall be substituted.
- 3. Thid., after cl. 1 the following new clauses shall be inserted:—
 - "2. There shall be two Scholarships, each tenable for one year, a Senior Scholarship of the value of £120, and a Junior Scholarship of the value of £60. But if in any year the income of the endowment fund shall be insufficient to meet the charges upon it, the payments to the two scholars shall abate in proportion
 - "3. One senior scholar shall be elected every year, if a fit candidate present himself. Candidates must be members of the University who have passed all examinations necessary for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts, and who, on the last day of the month in which the election is fixed to take place, have not exceeded ten years from the date of their matriculation.
 - "4. Every senior scholar elected shall, unless he shall have received from the Board of the Faculty of Theology exemption from the requirement, be required to spend at least four months of his tenure of the scholarship in residence abroad for the purpose of study at some place or places approved by the Board; but the Board shall have power to authorize the payment of such part of the emoluments of the scholarship as it may deem reasonable to a scholar who shall have failed to complete his period of residence abroad; and the Board shall further have power to require a scholar to produce such evidence of diligence in the prosecution of his studies as it may think expedient.
 - "5. The Senior Scholarship shall not be awarded to the same person more than twice.
 - "6. One Junior Scholar shall be elected every year, after examination, if a fit candidate present himself. The emoluments of the scholarship shall be paid to the scholar before the end of the term in which he is elected. The Junior Scholarship shall not be awarded to the same person a second time."

GEORGE THE FIFTH, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India, To all to whom these Presents shall come. Greeting:

Whereas Her late Majesty Queen Victoria did by a Warrant, under Her Royal Sign Manual, countersigned by one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and bearing date, at Her late Majesty's Court at Windsor, the thirteenth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine, make, ordain and establish Statutes for the government of the Royal Victorian Order:

And whereas Her late Majesty Queen Victoria was graciously pleased to institute and create a Medal entitled the Royal Victorian Medal to be awarded to such persons as might have rendered or should thereafter render extraordinary, or important, or personal services to Her late Majesty, Her Heirs and Successors, and who had merited or might thereafter merit Her Royal Favour or the favour of Her Majesty's Successors:

And whereas We are desirous of confirming the institution of the Royal Victorian Medal by a Warrant under Our hand, and of supplementing the said Statutes of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria by additional Statutes in regard to the habits, collar and robes to be

worn by Us as Sovereign of this Royal Order and by the Knights Grand Cross of the Order and in regard to the said Medal:

Now therefore, We do by these Presents confirm the institution of the Royal Victorian Medal, and order that the following additional Statutes be added to the Statutes of the thirteenth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine:—

XXIV. It is ordained that Our habits and robes, as Sovereign of this Royal Order, shall be of the same material and fashion as are hereinafter appointed for the Knights Grand Cross, save only with those alterations which may befit and distinguish Our Royal Dignity, and it is further ordained that the Sovereign for the time being and the Knights Grand Cross shall, upon all great and solemn occa-sions to be appointed, wear mantles of dark blue satin, edged with red satin two inches in width, the edging of the collar being half an inch wide, lined with white silk, and the said mantles shall be fastened by a cordon of dark blue silk and gold, having two dark blue silk and gold tassels attached thereto, on the left side of which mantles shall be embroidered a representation of the Star of a Knight Grand Cross of the said Royal Order. And We do command that the Knights Grand Cross of this Royal Order shall wear on all days usually termed "Collar Days" a collar of gold, composed of octagonal pieces and oblong per-forated and ornamental frames alternately, linked together with gold; the said pieces shall be edged and ornamented with gold, and shall each contain upon a blue enamelled ground a gold rose jewelled with a carbuncle, and the said frames shall be of gold, and shall each contain a portion of the inscription "Victoria Britt. Reg. . . . Det. Fig. Ind. Imp." in letters of white enamel; in the centre of the said collar shall be within a perforated and ornamental frame of gold an octagonal piece, enamelled blue, edged with red, and charged with a white saltire, thereon a gold medallion of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria's effigy, from which shall hang the Cross of the Order.

XXV. It is ordained that the foregoing Statute shall not apply to those Honorary Knights Grand Cross who as such have not received collars, or to any Knight Grand Cross who has restored the collar of this Order upon receiving a collar of an Order of higher rank and precedence.

XXVI. It is ordained that all Knights Grand Cross and Honorary Knights Grand Cross who have received collars of this Order shall make arrangements for their return to the Chancery of the Order in the event of the said Knights receiving collars of an Order of higher rank and precedence or of their decease, and We are pleased to declare that every person who receives a collar of this Order shall upon receiving the collar give a written undertaking and promise so to do.

XXVII. It is ordained that the Medal instituted and created by Her late Majesty Queen Victoria shall be designated and styled "The Royal Victorian Medal."

XXVIII. It is ordained that the said Royal Victorian Medal shall be a circular Medal of silver-gilt, silver or bronze, having on the obverse Our Royal Effigy, and on the reverse Our Royal and Imperial Cypher upon an ornamental shield within a wreath of laurel, in base

a scroll, thereon the words "Royal Victorian | Medal."

XXIX. It is ordained that the Medal shall be worn on the left breast of the coat or outer garment pendent to a riband of the breadth of one inch and a quarter of the same colour and pattern as that appointed for the members of Our said Royal Victorian Order.

XXX. It is ordained that any person whom by an especial Warrant under Our Royal Sign Manual We declare to have forfeited the Royal Victorian Medal shall return the said Medal, together with Our grant of the same, to the Chancery of the Royal Victorian Order, and that his name shall be erased from the register of those upon whom the said decoration shall have been conferred.

WHEREAS His late Majesty Our Beloved Father King Edward VII, by a Warrant dated the 17th day of August, 1908, did institute and create a new Decoration to be designated "The Territorial Decoration";

AND WHEREAS it was ordained by the said Royal Warrant what persons should be eligible for this Decoration;

Fourthly.—It is ordained that no person shall be eligible for this Decoration who is in possession of the Volunteer Officers' Decoration, nor shall he be nominated thereto unless be—

- (1) is or was a Commissioned Officer and has served for twenty years on the Active List of Our Territorial Force, including commissioned service in the Senior and Junior Divisions of Our Officers Training Corps; previous commissioned service in Our Yeomanry Cavalry, Imperial Yeomanry or Volunteer Force; previous service qualifying for the Colonial Auxiliary Forces' or Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve Officers' Decoration; and all service, while holding a Volunteer Officers' Commission, as an acting or honorary officer of a Cadet Corps, or Cadet Battalion, after attaining the age of seventeen years;
- (2) is recommended by the Commanding Officer of the Unit in which he has served;
- (3) is duly certified by the District Military Authorities in which the Unit is located, as having been an efficient and thoroughly capable Officer, in every 'way deserving of such a Decoration;

Provided nevertheless and We do hereby declare that half of any time during which an Officer of Our Territorial Force may have served on the Active List in the ranks of Our said Force, or in the ranks of Our Yeomanry Cavalry, Imperial Yeomanry, or Volunteer Force, after attaining the age of seventeen years; or in the ranks of a Cadet Corps or Cadet Battalion which belonged to the organization existing before the 21st May, 1910; or as a Cadet in the Senior Division of Our Officers Training Corps, after attaining the age of seventeen years; shall reckon as qualifying service towards the twenty years required as aforesaid.

Provided also and We do further declare that commissioned service shall not reckon as qualifying service towards the twenty years required as aforesaid, in the case of:

- (i.) A University candidate for a Commission in Our Regular Army, except for the period or periods of service with a Contingent of Our Officers Training Corps.
- (ii.) An Officer transferred to the Unattached List after the 31st March, 1911, except one who is transferred for duty with Our Officers Training Corps.
- (iii.) An Officer whose military services are available only on mobilization, except for the period or periods of mobilized service.

The following Resolution of the Court of Tynwald of the Isle of Man was, on the 7th day of May, 1912, approved by the Board of Trade in pursuance of powers vested in them by the above-mentioned Acts:—

At a Tynwald Court holden at Douglas, the 12th day of March, 1912.

This Court having, on the requisition of His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, considered the advisability of appointing, under the provisions contained in the Isle of Man Harbours Acts, 1872 to 1911 (Acts of the Imperial Parliament), the payment of dues by vessels entering the harbours of this Isle, or on goods landed from vessels in any harbour or on any quay or pier, or shipped by vessels in any harbour or from any quay or pier:

Resolved,-

- (1) That this resolution shall relate to such parts only of the several harbours of Castletown, Douglas, Peel, Ramsey, Port St. Mary, Laxey, Port Erin, and Derbyhaven as are hereinafter described (that is to say):—
 - Castletown Harbour.—The whole of the South Pier, commonly called the New Pier, and that part of the harbour which lies inside a straight line drawn due north to the shore from the outer extremity of the said pier:
 - Douglas Harbour.—The whole of the Victoria and Battery Piers, and that part of the harbour which lies inside a straight line drawn from the north-east corner of the outer end of the Victoria Pier to the south-east corner of the outer end of the Battery Pier:
 - Peel Harbour.—The whole of the outer Breakwater, and that part of the harbour which lies inside a straight line drawn from the outer end of the Breakwater and at right angles to such Breakwater, in a southerly direction to the shore:
 - Ramsey Harbour.—The whole of the Queen's Pier and of the South and North Piers, and that part of the harbour which lies within a straight line drawn from the extreme outer end of the South Pier to the extreme outer end of the North Pier:
 - Port St. Mary Harbour.—The whole of the Alfred Pier, and that part of the harbour which lies within a straight line drawn from the extreme outer end of the said pier, north-west or thereabouts, to the gate entering into Chapel Bay:
 - Laxey Harbour.—The whole of the Pier and the Breakwater or Jetty, and that part of the harbour lying within the line of the south side of such pier produced until it meets at right angles a line drawn through the south-east side of such Breakwater:
 - Port Erin Harbour.—The whole of the Breakwater and that part of the harbour lying within such Breakwater and a straight line drawn due north from the outer end of the said Breakwater to the land:

Derbyhaven Harbour.—The whole of the Breakwater and that part of the bay lying within the said Breakwater and a line drawn from the south end of the said Breakwater in a due westerly direction to the shore:

all such parts of the said respective harbours hereinbefore described being hereinafter called or referred to as "the said harbours."

- (2) That, subject to the approval of the Lords of the Committee of His Majesty's Privy Council for Trade, from and after the expiration of one calendar month after the publication of this resolution in the London Gazette, the following dues shall be payable by vessels entering any of the said harbours or using any of the said piers, quays, or breakwaters, or on goods landed from any vessel in any of the said harbours or on any of the said piers, quays, or breakwaters, or in any way brought into any of the said harbours, or shipped by vessels in any of the said harbours or from any of the said piers, quays, or breakwaters:—
 - On all goods landed or brought into a harbour from any vessel (other than fresh fish from a fishing vessel), per ton Threepence.
 - On all goods shipped by or on any vessel in a harbour, per ton Three half-pence.
 - For every fishing vessel of not more than twelve tons, and for every vessel licensed by the Isle of Man Harbour Commissioners to ply for hire as a pleasure-boat engaged as a fishing vessel during a portion of the year only, for the year, or any portion of the year commencing on any 1st day of April Ten shillings.
 - For every other fishing vessel for the year commencing on any first day of April, at the option of the vessel

One pound.

For every lighter or barge, owned by any local authority, leaving a harbour and re-entering such harbour without having entered any other harbour, per ton

One half-penny.

For every vessel used for purposes of exhibition, or any similar purpose, per ton Sixpence.

- For every vessel windbound, or calling for sailing orders, stores for crew, or bunker coal; and fishing vessels for which annual dues have not been paid, per ton One penny.
- For every vessel not landing or embarking passengers, or being a vessel not made liable to dues under any of the foregoing clauses, per ton ... Two pence.

In addition to the aforesaid dues there shall be paid:—

- For every vessel, other than a fishing vessel during the period for which an annual due has been paid, laid up or lying in a harbour to which this resolution applies longer than twelve months, per ton ... Sixpence.
- And upon the expiration of each subsequent period of six months, per ton

 Sixpence.
- For every fishing vessel which has paid such annual sum laid up or lying in a

harbour after the expiration of the year in respect of which the said due has been paid, per ton ... Threepence.

And upon the expiration of each subsequent period of six months, per ton

Threepence.

For the purpose of this resolution, the expression "local authority" means within the borough of Douglas, the Municipal Corporation of such borough, and elsewhere within this Island, the Commissioners of the Local Government District; and the expression "fishing vessel" shall mean a vessel exclusively or chiefly engaged in fishing.

Provided always that, with respect to the said dues, the word "goods" shall not be considered to include the stores or ballast of any vessel.

Provided also, that with respect to goods consigned to one of the said harbours, and brought into another of such harbours, and transhipped therein for conveyance to the harbour to which such goods are consigned, no dues shall be payable at the harbour where such transhipment takes place; and, for the purpose of this proviso, goods shall be deemed to be transhipped whether directly transferred from one vessel to another, or indirectly by being landed in a harbour and shipped on the same or another vessel for the purpose before mentioned within seven days after having been landed therein.

Provided also, that the tonnage of vessels in respect of which dues shall be payable shall be the registered tonnage, or the tonnage ascertained in the like manner as the registered tonnage, and that this resolution shall not apply to any vessel used in navigation which is propelled solely by oars, or which is of a burden of less than five tons, or to any vessel exempt by law from the payment of dues.

Provided also, that in the case of fishing vessels the yearly dues payable shall, as provided by law, be considered as payable for all the said harbours, and not for each harbour.

And provided also, that this resolution shall not apply to any vessel for which a composition in lieu of dues hereinbefore referred to shall have been paid during the time for which such composition shall extend:

Resolved also, that, on the foregoing resolution commencing and taking effect, the resolution of this Court, dated the 11th day of March, 1890, appointing the payment of dues by vessels and on goods at the harbours of Castletown, Douglas, Peel, Ramsey, Port St. Mary, and Laxey shall be and stand revoked.
