A PROCLAMATION FOR A BANK HOLIDAY.

GEORGE R.I.

WE, considering that it is desirable that Wednesday, the twenty-sixth day of June instant, should be observed as a Bank Holiday in the City of Cardiff, and in pursuance of the provisions of "The Bank Holidays Act, 1871," do hereby, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council and in exercise of the powers conferred by the Act aforesaid, appoint Wednesday, the twenty-sixth day of June instant, as a special day to be observed as a Bank Holiday throughout the City of Cardiff, under and in accordance with the said Act, and We do, by this Our Royal Proclamation, command the said day to be so observed, and all Our loving subjects to order themselves accordingly.

> Given at Our Court at Buckingham Palace, this twenty-fourth day of June, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and twelve, and in the Third year of Our Reign.
