A PROCLAMATION

Under the Munitions of War Acts, 1915 and 1916.

GEORGE R.I.

HEREAS by section three of the Munitions of War Act, 1915, as amended by the Munitions of War (Amendment) Act, 1916, it is provided that the differences to which Part 1 of the first-mentioned Act applies are differences as to rates of wages, hours of work, or otherwise as to terms or conditions of or affecting munitions work, and also any differences as to rates of wages, hours of work, or otherwise as to terms or conditions of or affecting employment on any other work of any description, if that Part of that Act is applied to such a difference by His Majesty by Pro--clamation, on the ground that in the opinion of His Majesty the existence or continuance of the difference is directly or indirectly pre-judicial to the manufacture, transport, or supply of Munitions of War; and it is also provided that the said Part of the said Act may be so applied to such a difference at any time, whether a lock-out or strike is in existence in connection with the difference to which it is applied or not: Provided that if in the case of any industry the Minister of Munitions is satisfied that effective means exist to secure the settlement without stoppage of any difference arising on work other than on munitions work, no Proclamation shall be made under the said section with respect to any such difference:

And whereas a difference within the meaning of the said section exists between employers and persons employed on the work of card room and blowing room operatives in the Lancashire Cotton Mills as to rates of wages, hours of work, and otherwise as to terms and conditions of or affecting employment on the work carried on by such operatives:

And whereas the Board of Trade have investigated the matter and the Minister of Munitions, having considered the results of the investigation made by the Board of Trade and their representations to him, is not satisfied that effective means exist to secure the settlement of the said difference without stoppage, being a difference arising on work other than munitions work:

And whereas in Our opinion the existence or continuance of the said difference is directly and indirectly prejudicial to the manufacture, transport, and supply of Munitions of War:

Now, Therefore, We, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, are pleased to proclaim, direct and ordain, that Part I. of the Munitions of War Act, 1915, shall apply to the said difference.

A PROCLAMATION

FOR PROHIBITING THE IMPORTATION OF CERTAIN ARTICLES INTO THE UNITED KINGDOM.

GEORGE R.I.

HEREAS by Section forty-three of the Customs Consolidation Act, 1876, it is provided that the importation of arms, ammunition, gunpowder, or any other goods may be prohibited by Proclamation:

And whereas it is expedient that the importation into the United Kingdom of certain goods should be prohibited as hereinafter provided:

Now, therefore, We, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, in pursuance of the said Act and of all other powers enabling Us in that behalf, do hereby proclaim, direct and ordain, as follows:—

As from and after the date hereof, subject as hereinafter provided, the importation into the United Kingdom of the following goods is hereby prohibited, viz.:—

Gold, manufactured or unmanufactured, including gold coin and articles consisting partly of or containing gold;

All manufactures of silver other than silver watches and silver watch cases;

Jewellery of any description.

Provided always, and it is hereby declared, that this prohibition shall not apply to—

- (a) Any such goods which are imported under licence given by or on behalf of the Board of Trade, and subject to the provisions and conditions of such licence; or
- (b) Gold consigned for delivery at, and sale to, the Bank of England.

The Prohibition of Import (No. 11) Proclamation, 1916, is hereby revoked.

This Proclamation may be cited as the Prohibition of Import (No. 12) Proclamation, 1916.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS under the Defence of the Realm (Amendment) (No. 3) Act, 1915, His Majesty has power, by Order in Council, to define any area wherein it appears to His Majesty, on the grounds specified in the said Act, to be expedient for the purpose of the successful prosecution of the present War, that the sale and supply of intoxicating liquor should be controlled by the State, and to apply to such area so defined the Regulations issued by His Majesty in pursuance of the said Act under the Defence of the Realm Consolidation Act, 1914:

And whereas His Majesty in Council, in pursuance of the said first-mentioned Act, has issued the Defence of the Realm (Liquor Control) Regulations, 1915, under the said last-mentioned Act:

And whereas by an Order in Council, dated the 6th day of July, 1915, His Majesty was pleased to apply the said Regulations and any Regulations amending the same to an Area more particularly described in paragraph 10 of the Schedule to the said Order:

And whereas by an Order in Council, dated the 10th day of November, 1915, the said area was extended in manner therein provided, and the said Regulations and any Regulations amending the same were thereby applied to an area known as the North East Coast Area and defined in the Schedule to the said lastmentioned Order:

And whereas it appears to His Majesty to be expedient that the said North East Coast Areashould be extended, and that the Petty Sessional Division of Morpeth Ward, in the County of Northumberland, and the Parishes of Roxby, Borrowby, Hinderwell, Ellerby, Mickleby, Ugthorpe, and Newton Mulgrave, in the Petty Sessional Division of Waitby Strand, in the North Riding of the County of York, should be added thereto:

And whereas it appears to His Majesty that it is expedient for the purpose of the successful prosecution of the present War that the sale and supply of intoxicating liquor in the area thereby constituted and defined and specified in the Schedule hereto should be controlled by the State on the grounds that war material is being made, loaded, unloaded, and dealt with in transit therein, and that men belonging to His Majesty's Military Forces are assembled therein:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

The Defence of the Realm (Liquor Control) Regulations, 1915, and any Regulations-amending the same, shall be, and are, hereby applied to the area defined and specified in the Schedule hereto.

SUPREME COURT, ENGLAND. PROCEDURE.

THE RULES OF THE SUPREME COURT (COSTS),. 1916. DATED FIFTH DAY OF DECEMBER, 1916.

We, the Rule Committee of the Supreme-Court, hereby make the following Rules:—

- 1. Clauses Nos. 106 and 107 of Appendix N of the Rules of the Supreme Court, 1883, shall be amended by increasing the charges specified in Clause No. 106 from 1s. 3d. to 1s. $4\frac{1}{2}d$., and those specified in Clause No. 107 from 1d. to $1\frac{1}{4}d$.
- 2. During the continuance of the present war and for a period of six months thereafter the charges specified in Clause No. 106 shall be further increased from 1s. $4\frac{1}{2}$ d. to 1s. $5\frac{1}{4}$ d.
- 3. Order 66, Rule 7c, shall be amended by increasing the payments therein specified to 1d. for every copy.
- 4. Where any account or charge to which these Rules apply shall result in a fraction of 1d. in the total, the said fraction shall be reckoned as 1d.
- 5. These Rules may be cited as the Rules of the Supreme Court (Costs), 1916.

And we, the said Rule Committee, hereby certify under the Rules Publication Act, 1893,

that on account of urgency the said Rules should come into immediate operation, and we hereby make the said Rules to come into operation forthwith as Provisional Rules.

DEFENCE OF THE REALM (LIQUOR CONTROL).

GENERAL ORDER F THE CENTRAL CONTROL BOARD (LIQUOR TRAFFIC) REGULATING THE SALE AND SUPPLY OF INTOXICATING LIQUOR ON CHRISTMAS DAY IN ENGLAND AND WALES.

We the Central Control Board (Liquor Traffic) in pursuance of the powers conferred upon us by the Acts and Regulations relating to the Defence of the Realm here by make the following General Order:—

Areas to which the Order Applies.

1. This Order applies to all areas or parts of areas situate in England or Wales to which the

Defence of the Realm (Liquor Control) Regulations, 1915, have been applied.

Hours during which Intoxicating Liquor May be Sold on Christmas Day.

- 2. The hours during which intoxicating liquor may (subject to the provisions of Article 3 hereof) be sold and supplied on Christmas Day in licensed premises and clubs whether for consumption on or off the premises shall be as follows:—
 - (a) In such part of the Western Border Area as is situate in England, the hours between 12.30 p.m. and 2.30 p.m. and 6.30 p.m. and 9 p.m. for consumption on the premises, and the hours between 12.30 p.m. and 2.30 p.m. and 6.30 p.m. and 8 p.m. for consumption off the premises.

.(b) In the Welsh Area and the West Gloucestershire Area, the hours between 12.30 p.m. and 2.30 p.m. and between 6 p.m. and 9 p.m. for consumption on the premises, and the hours between 12.30 p.m. and 2.30 p.m. and between 6 p.m. and 8 p.m. for consumption off the premises.

(c) In each of the other areas, the hours during which by the provisions of Article 2 of the Orders of the Board for the said areas such sale or supply for consumption on or off the premises is permitted on Sundays.

And Article 2 of each of the said Orders of the Board shall be read as if the provisions of this Article were inserted therein.

Sale of Spirits for Consumption Off the Premises Prohibited.

3. No spirits to be consumed off the premises shall be sold or supplied in any licensed premises or club or be dispatched or taken therefrom on Christmas Day, and Article 3 of each of the said Orders shall be read as if the provisions of this Article were inserted therein.

DEFENCE OF THE REALM (LIQUOR CONTROL).

GENERAL ORDER OF THE CENTRAL CONTROL BOARD (LIQUOR TRAFFIC) FOR RELAXING, IN ENGLAND AND WALES, FOR THE DAYS PRECEDING CHRISTMAS, CERTAIN OF THE RESTRICTIONS IMPOSED UPON THE DISPATCH OF INTOXICATING LIQUOR FROM LICENSED PREMISES.

We the Central Control Board (Liquor Traffic) in pursuance of the powers conferred upon us by the Acts and Regulations relating to the Defence of the Realm hereby make the following General Order.

Areas to which the Order Applies.

1. This Order shall apply to all areas or parts of areas situate in England or Wales to which the Defence of the Realm (Liquor Control) Regulations, 1915, have been applied.

Duration of the Order.

2. This Order shall be in force on the 18th, 19th, 20th, 21st, 22nd, and 23rd days of December, 1916.

Effect of Order.

3. During such time as this Order is in force the provisions of the Article entitled "Saving Provisions" in the Orders of the Board for the aforesaid areas authorising the dispatch from licensed premises in the forenoon of intoxicating liquor for delivery at a place more than five miles distant shall apply to the dispatch of such liquor for delivery at any place notwithstanding that the same be not more than five miles distant: Provided always that nothing herein shall be deemed to authorise the dispatch of spirits on Saturday, the 23rd day of December.

Other Provisions of the Order to Remain in Force.

4. Save as by this Order expressly provided, the provisions of each of the said Orders shall remain in full force.

All ships (other than British ships of less than 3,500 tons gross tonnage, when trading coastwise or to or from the Channel islands, or to or from the Port of Brest or any French Channel Port north and east of Brest, and not carrying passengers) whilst navigating in the waters from Gravesend to London Bridge or vice versa, must be conducted by Pilots licensed by the London Trinity House.

The Pilot Steamers attached to the Downs Station will cruise in the vicinity of a position two miles southeast of Deal Pier.
 - (b) GREAT YARMOUTH, where ships from the North Sea bound for the River Thames or the English Channel can obtain Pilots capable of piloting as far as the Downs.

The Pilot Steamer attached to the Great Yarmouth Station will cruise between the position of the wreck of the Corton Light-Vessel (Lat. 52° 31½' N., long. 1° 50' E.) and the South Scroby Buoy.

(c) THE SUNK LIGHT-VESSEL, where ships trading with Netherlands Ports, but no others, can obtain Pilots for the River Thames and the Downs.

The Sunk Pilot Steamer will be on her station between the hours of 7.30 a.m. and 4.30 p.m. only.

(d) Pilots can also be obtained at London for the Downs and Great Yarmouth (including the River Thames and approaches).

Note.—The Pilots referred to in this Notice are the Pilots licensed by the London Trinity House and no others.

II. RIVERS THAMES AND MEDWAY, &c.

1. All traffic into and out of the River Thames must pass through the Edinburgh Channels, or through the Black Deep south of the Knock John and Knob Light-Buoys, and through the Oaze Deep, until further notice.

No vessels are to remain under way in the above-mentioned Channels between a line drawn from London Stone to No. 3 Sea Reach Light-Buoy and thence to Canvey Point on the west, and the Sunk Head Buoy or a line joining the positions of the South Long Sand and East Shingles Buoys, on the east, from one hour after sunset until one hour before sunrise.

Vessels at anchor within these limits must not exhibit any lights from one hour after sunset until one hour before sunrise. No merchant or other private vessel is, however, to be at anchor in the Black Deep, and the Main Channel of the Thames, to the southward of a line joining a position in lat. 51° 38′ N., long. 1° 21′ E., D3 Buoy, East Knock John Buoy, Knob Light-Buoy, West Oaze Buoy, Nore Light-Vessel and Nos. 1, 2 and 3 Sea Reach Buoys, from one hour after sunset until one hour before sunrise, and no vessel is to anchor in the Black Deep Channel between the parallel of lat. 51° 40′ N., and the Sunk Light-Vessel from one hour after sunset until one hour before sunrise except such Southbound vessels as are unable to proceed further south owing to darkness or thick weather.

Anchorage for merchant or private vessels is also prohibited in the West Swin, and in the area enclosed on the east by a line joining North Knob and Knob Light-Buoys, on the west by a line joining South Shoebury Light-buoy and Nore Light-Vessel, and on the north by a line joining North Knob and South Shoebury Light-buoys.

All other Channels are closed to navigation.

The Nore Examination Anchorage is reserved for vessels under examination before entry into the Medway, and also for vessels on Government service which have left the Medway and are awaiting orders as to route,

- Coasting vessels are not to be under way nor exhibit any lights in the East Swin or Wallet between sunset and sunrise.
- 3. (a) Cruising of yachts and pleasure craft is prohibited in the Thames Estuary, rivers Thames, Colne, Blackwater, Medway, and adjoining creeks so far as the tide flows.
- (b) The Estuary of the Thames mentioned above in paragraph (a) is to be considered to include the north coast of Kent from North Foreland to Sheerness, and the coast of Essex from Shoeburyness to the Naze.
- 4. (a) The cruising of yachts and other pleasure craft under sail, steam, or otherwise mechanically driven, and under oars, in the Crouch and Roach rivers will be permitted under the following restrictions.

- (b) Cruising is permitted in the Crouch west of a line drawn in a 0° (N. 14° E. Mag.) and a 180° (S. 14° W. Mag.) direction through Nass Point. Cruising is also permitted in the Roach as far as Paglesham Hard, but owners of yachts are to intimate their intention to proceed up the Roach to the Coast Guard, Burnham, before leaving, and report their return.
 - (i.) No yachts may anchor in the Crouch between Burnham Coast Guard Station and Nass point.
 - (ii.) Landing in the Roach may be permitted only at Paglesham Hard, and permits are to be exhibited to the Military Patrol stationed there.
- (c) Local craft used for business purposes are subject to the foregoing regulations, but may in certain instances be allowed in prohibited areas, if permission in writing has been previously obtained from the Naval or Military Authorities.
- (d) All pleasure craft of any description are prohibited from being under weigh between the hours of 4 p.m. and 8 a.m.
- (e) Pleasure craft using the area mentioned in paragraph (b) in which cruising is permitted must obtain a licence from the local Police.
- (f) If more than one craft is used, a separate licence is required for each.
- (g) The name must be marked legibly on every craft. All open, half-decked and other craft must have the number and distinguishing letter of the licence clearly painted on each side of the bow.
- (h) The licence must be carried in the craft, and is to be available for inspection.
- (i) Boats licensed for hire may be taken out by British subjects other than those in whose names the licences are made out, provided that they be returned to the licensees by 4 p.m. on the day of hire. The licence for the boat must be carried by the person hiring it.
- (j) Owners of boats anchored within sight of Burnham Coastguard Station may go on board their boats up to 10.0 p.m., provided that a permit to do this has been obtained from the Senior Naval Officer, Brightlingsea, and provided also that the boat remains at anchor.
- 5. The use of the Swin and Wallet Channels by sailing barges and small trading vessels engaged in coastwise traffic along the Essex coast is permitted, subject to compliance with the following restrictions:—
 - (a) Each vessel must obtain from the Customs a special clearance card, which is to be kept available for inspection by the Patrol Officers, on demand.
 - (δ) A red ensign is to be displayed while navigating the Middle Deep and Swin Channel.
 - (c) No vessel may be under way after dark, except as provided for hereinafter.
 - (d) When at anchor in the Wallet, Ray Sand, and Whitaker Channels, or in the Rivers Colne, Blackwater, and Crouch, all lights are to be screened so that they will not show outboard.
 - (e) No vessel may anchor in the River Crouch in the area indicated in Section II, Sub-section 4, paragraph b (i.); or in the River Blackwater in the areas bounded by a line drawn in a 0° (N. 14° E. Mag.) anda 180° (S. 14° W. Mag.) direction, through Ramsey Stone to the opposite shore, and a

line drawn through the Tollesbury and Mersea Oyster Fishery Company's Beacon on Thurslet Spit and the same Company's Beacon on the south side of the river, and extended to the north and south shores of the River.

(f) To enable vessels to save their tides they will be permitted to navigate the Rivers Colne, Blackwater, and Crouch at night above the following places:—

River Roach above Quay Reach.

River Crouch above Burnham Coast Guard Station.

River Blackwater above Ramsey Island

River Colne above Brightlingsea Creek.

They are to anchor immediately, should they be ordered to do so by the Naval or Military Authorities.

- (g) Vessels are to carry out all instructions received from the Naval Officers in command of vessels patrolling these Channels and Rivers.
- (h) No vessels are to enter or pass through the defended area in the Middle Deep and Swin Channels until they have been boarded and examined by the vessels stationed there for that purpose.

(Note.—The Examination Officers will board South-bound vessels in the vicinity of the Whitaker Spit. Those leaving Thames and Medway will be boarded near the Mouse Light-Vessel.)

The Boarding Officers will give Masters of vessels instructions as to the course they are to steer when passing through the defended area

- (i) Vessels reaching the entrance to the defended area within one hour of sunset will not be allowed to pass through till daylight.
- 6. All vessels, other than those of British Nationality or those of the Allied Nations, are prohibited from entering the Medway and Swale rivers.

All Neutral Aliens are prohibited from entering the Medway and Swale rivers in British vessels, and this applies to Aliens carried in British ships or barges as pasengers or part of crew; the limits of the prohibited area are defined as from the Outer Bar buoy in the River Medway to Rochester bridge, and the whole of the River Swale from the light on Queenborough spit to Columbine spit buoy. tion is drawn to the necessity of shipowners and charterers satisfying themselves that no Neutral Aliens are on board vessels sent to the Rivers Medway and Swale.

"Port Authority shall mean every description of vessel used in sea navigation other than a licensed barge. "Licensed barge" shall mean an open barge duly licensed by the Port Authority for the carriage of carbide of calcium on the Thames.
"Duly licensed place of storage" shall mean any place where carbide of calcium may be kept in accordance with a licence granted pursuant to the Petroleum

place where carbide of calcium may be kept in accordance with a licence granted pursuant to the Petroleum Act, 1871, and an Order in Council dated the 8th day of August, 1911.

"Thames" shall mean so much of the River Thames as is between an imaginary straight line drawn from high-water mark on the bank of the

River Thames at the boundary line between the parishes of Teddington and Twickenham, in the county of Middlesex, to high-water mark on the Surrey bank of the river immediately opposite the first mentioned point and an imaginary straight line drawn from the London Stone at the entrance to Yantlet Creek, in the county of Kent, to the City Stone opposite to Canvey Island. in the county of Essex, including so much of the River Lee and Bow Creek respectively as are below the south boundary stones in the Lee Conservancy Act. 1868, mentioned, and all locks, cuts, and works within the said portions of rivers and creeks; but not any dock, lock, canal, or cut existing at the passing of the Thames Conservancy Act, 1894, and constructed under the authority of Parliament and belonging to any body corporate established under such authority or any bridge over the River Thames belonging to or vested in any county council or municipal authority or to or in any railway company.

"Harbour Master" shall mean and apply to each of the harbour masters and any person authorized by the Port Authority to assist them or to perform the duties of a harbour master.

duties of a harbour master.

3. The owner or master of every ship carrying carbide of calcium as cargo shall, on entering the Thames, immediately give notice of the quantity of such carbide of calcium to the harbour master, at his

office at Gravesend.

4. The hold of every ship carrying carbide of calcium shall be efficiently ventilated from the time of entering the Thames until all the carbide of calcium has been discharged, or until the ship has

left the Thames.

5. No carbide of calcium shall be discharged from any ship except into a licensed barge at a place previously approved in writing by the harbour master, or at a wharf, jetty or place approved for that purpose by the Port Authority in writing under the hand of their secretary, and no carbide of calcium shall be placed in or conveyed by any vessel on the Thames other than a licensed barge or a ship about to proceed beyond the seaward limit of the Port of London.

6. All carbide of calcium discharged from any ship shall be removed without unnecessary delay to some duly licensed place of storage or beyond the limits of the Thames.

7. A licensed barge having taken on board carbide any ship except into a licensed barge at a place previ-

the Thames.

7. A licensed barge having taken on board carbide of calcium shall forthwith proceed to its destination, so that there shall be no delay in the removal of such carbide of calcium to some duly licensed place of storage or beyond the limits of the Thames.

8. Carbide of calcium shall only be brought into or carried on the Thames in hermetically closed metal receptacles of such strength and construction or so protected as not to be liable to be broken or to become defective or insecure in conveyance otherwise become defective or insecure in conveyance otherwise

become defective or insecure in conveyance otherwise than by gross negligence or extraordinary accident.

9. No package of carbide of calcium shall be opened within the limits of the Thames except in some duly licensed place of storage.

10. Every reasonable precaution shall be taken to prevent the contact of water or moisture with the carbide of calcium, and whenever any such contact shall have occurred on a ship or licensed barge the master thereof shall forthwith give notice of such contact to the harbour master and take every reasonable precaution to prevent the ignition of the gas evolved. evolved.

11. Every package of carbide of calcium shall be labelled with a label bearing in conspicuous characters the words :-

"Carbide of Calcium.

"Dangerous if not kept dry.

"The contents of this package are liable, if brought into contact with moisture, to give off a highly inflammable gas,"

and the name and address of the sender. 12. Every ship entering the Thames and carrying carbide of calcium shall, whilst anchored or moored in the Thames, be watched by a competent person on

board such ship, to be appointed for that purpose by the master or other person in charge. 13. The owner or master of every ship entering the Thames and carrying carbide of calcium, or the owner of the carbide of calcium, shall, when so required by of the carbide of calcium, shall, when so required by the harbour master or other officer duly appointed by the Port Authority, or by any police constable, show to such officer or constable all carbide of calcium under his control or upon his ship, and shall afford every reasonable facility to enable such officer or constable to inspect and examine such carbide of calcium so as to ascertain whether these Bye-laws are duly observed.

shall have the meanings assigned thereto in the Petro-

15. The penalties for offences against these Byelaws are those provided by the Petroleum Acts.
