A PROCLAMATION

RELATING TO THE IMPORTATION OF CERTAIN
ARTICLES INTO THE UNITED KINGDOM.

GEORGE R.I.

WHEREAS by Section forty-three of the Customs Consolidation Act, 1876, it is provided that the importation of arms, ammunition, gunpowder, or any other goods may be prohibited by Proclamation:

And whereas by certain Proclamations entitled Prohibition of Import Proclamations the importation of certain goods has been prohibited accordingly:

And whereas it is expedient that the importation into the United Kingdom of certain other goods should be prohibited:

Now, therefore, We, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, in pursuance of the said Act and of all other powers enabling Us in that behalf, do hereby proclaim, direct and ordain as follows:—

As from and after the date hereof, subject as hereinafter provided, the importation into the United Kingdom of the following goods is hereby prohibited, viz.:—

Molasses and invert sugar and all other sugars and extracts from sugar which cannot be completely tested by the polariscope, and on which Customs duty is not otherwise charged.

Plaiting of all descriptions not otherwise prohibited.

Rattans and malacca canes.

Weighing machines, scales and balances of all descriptions not otherwise prohibited.

Wood flour.

Provided always, and it is hereby declared, that this prohibition shall not apply to any such goods which are imported under licence given by or on behalf of the Board of Trade, and subject to the provisions and conditions of such licence.

This Proclamation may be cited as the Prohibition of Import (No. 23) Proclamation, 1918.

Given at Our Court at *Buckingham Palace*, this Twenty-second day of *March*, in the year of our Lord One thousand nine hundred and eighteen, and in the Eighth year of Our Reign.

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the date for the purpose of the enactment hereinbefore recited shall be the first day of April, 1918.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 3rd day of March, 1918, in the words following, viz.:—

"Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions, as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

"And whereas we are of opinion that Pay and Allowances at special rates should be paid to Officers and Men of the Naval Labour Companies serving in France who have been transferred from the Army Service Corps to the Royal Marines as the Royal Marine Labour Corps:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to sanction payment to such Officers and Men of the Pay and Allowances set forth in the accompanying Schedule, with retrospective effect as from the date of transfer except as otherwise provided therein.

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in the several items covered by this proposal.

" SCHEDULE.

"PAY AND ALLOWANCES OF OFFICERS AND MEN OF THE ROYAL MARINE LABOUR CORPS.

"The Officer in command:

To receive consolidated pay of £750 per annum, as from 9th February, 1918.

The Officer in command prior to the 9th February, 1918, and the Officers of Companies:

To receive the normal rates of pay and

allowances authorized for the Army Service Corps.

The Officers in charge of Companies of more than 550:

To receive Command Money at the rate of 3s. per diem, as from 9th February, 1918.

The Officers in charge of Companies of 250—550:

To receive Command Money at the rate of 2s. per diem, as from 9th February, 1918.

The Men of the Companies:

To receive special Labour rates as previously authorized in the Army Service Corps, *i.e.*, 3s. per diem for labourers (Privates), 4s. per diem for gangers (Corporals) and 6s. per diem for foremen (Sergeants), and to receive Separation Allowances at the rates authorized for the Army.

Men enlisted in the Army under the provisions of Army Order 283 of 1914, and subsequently transferred with the Naval Labour Companies to the Royal Marine Labour Corps, to receive a bounty of £5 on discharge from the Service for causes other than misconduct."

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by the Summer Time Act, 1916, it is provided that during the prescribed period in each year in which the Act is in force the time for general purposes is to be one hour in front of Greenwich Mean Time; and it is further provided that His Majesty may in any year subsequent to the year 1916 by Order in Council made during the continuance of the present War declare the Act to be in force during that year, and in such case the prescribed period for that year shall be such period as may be fixed by Order in Council:

And whereas by Order in Council of 23rd May, 1916, the Act was extended, with certain adaptations, to the Isle of Man under the title of "The Summer Time (Isle of Man) Act, 1916":

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to declare, and it is hereby declared, that the Summer Time (Isle of Man) Act, 1916, shall be in force during the year 1918, and the prescribed period in that year shall be from two o'clock in the morning Greenwich Mean Time on Sunday, the 24th day of March, until two o'clock in the morning Greenwich Mean Time on Monday, the 30th day of September.

WHEREAS by the Isle of Man (War Legislation) Act, 1914, His Majesty has power to extend to the Isle of Man any Act which, in the opinion of His Majesty, was passed for the purpose of meeting any emergency created by the present War, subject to adaptations for the purpose of making the Act applicable to the Isle of Man:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the National Registration (Amendment) Act, 1918, shall extend to the Isle of Man, subject to the following adaptations:—

In Section 1 after the words "National Registration," there shall be read the words "(Isle of Man)."

In the second Paragraph of Section 2 (1), in the third Paragraph of Section 3 (1), and in Section 4 (1) and (2), for the words "Commencement of this Act" there shall be substituted the words "Order in Council extending this Act to the Isle of Man."

In the first Paragraph of Section 2 (1), and in Section 3 (2), for the words "Commencement of this Act," there shall be substituted the words "Date of the Order in Council extending this Act to the Isle of Man."

In Section 2 (2) for the word "thirteen" there shall be substituted the word "fourteen."

In Section 4 (2) for the words "United Kingdom;" wherever the same occur, there shall be substituted the words "Isle of Man."

In Section 5 (1) for the words "fifteenth day of February" there shall be substituted the words "fifth day of April."

In Section 5 (2), and in Section 6 (4), for the words "under the Summary Jurisdiction Acts" there shall be substituted the words "before a High Bailiff or two Justices of the Peace."

For Section 7, the following provision shall be substituted:—

"Any Order of His Majesty in Council made under Section 7 of the National Registration (Amendment) Act, 1918, shall, as from the date of such Order becoming operative, apply to the Isle of Man, as if made under this Act, so long as such Order remains in force."

In Section 10 (1) for the words "Director-General of National Service," there shall be substituted the words "Lieutenant-Governor."

In Section 10 (2) for the word "thirteen" there shall be substituted the word "fourteen."

In Section 12 (1) after the words "National Registration (Amendment)," and "National Registration," respectively, there shall be read the words "(Isle of Man)."

For section 12 (3) the following provision shall be substituted:—

"(2) This Act shall come into operation on the twenty-first day after the date of the Order in Council extending the same to the Isle of Man."

And whereas by Order in Council dated the 17th day of December, 1914, His Majesty was pleased to order that the Defence of the Realm Consolidation Act, 1914, and the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, should extend to the Isle of Man, subject to the adaptations therein contained:

And whereas the said Act and Regulations have been amended by certain other Acts and Regulations, which said Acts and Regulations have been extended to the Isle of Man by various subsequent Orders in Council, subject to the adaptations therein contained:

And whereas the said Regulations have been further amended by a certain Order in Council made on the 10th day of January, 1917, and it is desirable to extend certain provisions of such Order in Council to the Isle of Man:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that Subsection (2) of Regulation 2F, contained in the said Order in Council of the 10th day of January, 1917, shall extend to the Isle of Man subject to the following adaptation:—

For the words "Food Controller" or "Controller," wherever the same occur, there shall be substituted the words "Lieutenant Governor."

PRESENT,

WHEREAS by an Order in Council, dated the 10th January, 1910, and known generally as the Civil Service (Consolidating) Order in Council, 1910, and hereinafter referred to as the "Principal Order," it is provided that, with certain provisions and exceptions, the qualifications of all such persons as may seek or be proposed for appointment to any situation or employment in any of His Majesty's Civil Establishments shall, before they are so appointed, be tested by or under the directions of the Civil Service Commissioners; and that no person (save as excepted thereby) shall be appointed to any such Establishment until a Certificate of his qualification shall have been issued by the Civil Service Commissioners declaring that he has satisfied them, among other things, that he is free from any physical defect or disease which would be likely to interfere with the proper discharge of his duties:

And whereas it is expedient that the said requirement should be modified with respect to persons whose health has been impaired by

reason of service in His Majesty's Forces in the present War:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. This Order shall apply only to persons whose health has been impaired by reason of service in His Majesty's Forces during the present War.

2. Subject to the conditions as to age, character, and knowledge and ability, prescribed by Clause 3 of the Principal Order being satisfied, the Civil Service Commissioners may issue Certificates of qualification in favour of persons to whom this Order applies if the Commissioners are satisfied that they are at the moment fit to discharge the duties of the situation or employment which they seek or to which they are proposed for appointment, and that they are likely to render effective service for 15 years, or, in the case of persons already serving in unestablished positions which lead in the normal course to establishment, for 10 years.

The certificate issued under this Clause shall be known as a "Modified (War) Certificate," but shall, subject to the provisions of this Order as to sick leave, for all purposes have the same force and effect as a certificate issued under Clause 3 of the Principal Order.

3. In the application to the case of Officers holding Modified (War) Certificates of the sick leave rules laid down in Clause 19 of the Principal Order the following modification shall be made, that for the first five years of service after the date of the certificate any civil pay allowed during sick leave in excess of 36 week days in the aggregate in any year shall be reduced to such amount as, with any pension or retired pay and allowances payable by the Ministry of Pensions in respect of the period of sick leave, will not exceed the full civil pay of the office in respect of that period.

Provided that in the case of an officer who, if he had retired on the ground of ill-health at the commencement of the period of sick leave, would have been qualified for a pension, if the amount of the reduced civil pay during sick leave is less than the pension which, if he had so retired, would have been payable to him in respect of the period of sick leave, it may, with the consent of the Treasury, be increased to an amount not exceeding the amount of such pension.

4. Where the Civil Service Commissioners are unable to decide whether a person is or is not likely to render effective service for 15 or 10 years, as the case may be, they may, if they think fit, issue in such person's favour a "Special Recommendation" under which he may be employed for such period to be specified in the recommendation as the Commissioners may, subject to any regulations made by them, think fit, but the issue of such a recommendation will not entitle a person to be regarded as a "Civil Servant" within the meaning of Section 12 of the Superannuation Act, 1887.

At the end of the period fixed by the recommendation the Commissioners will reconsider the case, and, if they are satisfied that the conditions enabling them to grant a Modified (War) Certificate are fulfilled, they shall grant such a certificate, and if not so satisfied they may either extend the period of the special recommendation or terminate it, in which case the Officer will cease to be employed in an office to which Part I. of the Principal Order applies.

In determining whether a Modified (War) Certificate can be granted in favour of an Officer in whose favour a special recommendation has been issued the periods of 15 and 10 years' effective service respectively mentioned in Clause 2 of this Order shall be reckoned as from the beginning of service under the special recommendation.

5. Clauses 2 to 4 of this Order shall not apply to persons whose health has been impaired by reason of service in His Majesty's Forces during the present War and who, being already in possession of a Civil Service Certificate in respect of a pensionable office, are appointed to an office not in the ordinary course of promotion in the same Department. In such a case the Civil Service Commissioners may issue a certificate (which shall be required as heretofore) notwithstanding that the condition as to freedom from physical defect or disease specified in Clause 3 of the Principal Order is not satisfied, if the Officer is certified by the Head of his Department to be fit for the duties of his existing office.

Provided that, if the office to which he is to be appointed is one which appears to the Head of the Department concerned and to the Commissioners to be such as to require special physical qualifications, the Officer must satisfy the Commissioners that he possesses those qualifications.

WHEREAS by an Ordinance enacted by the Governor and Legislative Council of Ceylon shortly entitled "The Appeals (Privy Council) Ordinance, 1909," provision was made for regulating the procedure on Appeals from the Supreme Court of Ceylon to His Majesty in Council:

And whereas by the said Ordinance it was (amongst other things) enacted that, from and after the commencement of that Ordinance, the right of parties to civil suits or actions in the Supreme Court to appeal to His Majesty in Council against the Judgments and Orders of such Court should be subject to and regulated by the limitations and conditions prescribed by the Rules set out in Schedule I. thereto, or by such other Rules as might from time to time be made by His Majesty in Council:

And whereas it is expedient to amend the said Rules as hereinafter appears:—

It is hereby ordered by the King's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, that the Rules numbered 2, 3 (a), 21, and 25 in Schedule I. of the hereinbefore recited Ordinance be, and the same are hereby, revoked, and that the Rules hereunder set out shall be substituted for the same.

RULE 2.—Application to the Court for leave to appeal shall be made by petition within thirty days from the date of the judgment to be appealed from, and the applicant shall, within fourteen days from the date of such judgment, give the opposite party notice of such intended application.

RULE 3 (a).—Upon the condition of the appellant within a period of one month, from the date of the hearing of the application for leave to appeal, unless the Court shall, on the ground of the absence of the appellant from the Colony or for some other special cause, on application made to it, before the expiration of such period have granted an extension thereof, entering into good and sufficient security, to the satisfaction of the Court, in a sum not exceeding three thousand rupees for the due prosecution of the appeal, and the payment of all such costs as may become payable to the respondent in the event of the appellant not obtaining an order granting him final leave to appeal, or of the appeal being dismissed for non-prosecution, or of His Majesty in Council ordering the appellant to pay the respondent's costs of the appeal (as the case may be).

RULE 21.—Where an appellant, having obtained an order granting him conditional leave to appeal, and having complied with the conditions imposed on him by such order, fails thereafter to apply within one week from the date of his having so complied to the Court for an order granting him final leave to appeal, the Court may, on an application in that behalf made by the respondent, or of its own motion, on such notice to the parties as it shall think reasonable in the circumstances, rescind the order granting conditional leave to appeal, and declare the appeal to stand dismissed for non-prosecution, notwithstanding the appellant's compliance with the conditions imposed by such

order, and may give such directions as to the costs of the appeal and the security entered into by the appellant as the Court shall think fit, or make such further or other order in the premises as, in the opinion of the Court, the justice of the case requires.

RULE 25.—Where an appellant having obtained final leave to appeal, fails to show due diligence in taking all necessary steps for the purpose of procuring the despatch of the record to England, the Court may, on an application in that behalf made by the respondent, or of its own motion, on such notice to the parties as it shall think reasonable in the circumstances, declare the appeal to stand dismissed for non-prosecution without express order of His Majesty in Council and the costs of the appeal and the security entered into by the appellant shall be dealt with in such manner as the Court may think fit to direct.

And it is hereby further ordered that this Order in Council shall take effect in the Colony of Ceylon on such day as shall be named for that purpose by any Proclamation issued by the Officer administering the Government of that Colony.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 6th and 7th years of His Majesty King William the Fourth, Chapter 77, of the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 113, and of the Act of the 37th and 38th years of Her said Majesty, Chapter 63, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme bearing date the 28th day of February, 1918, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

“We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 6th and 7th years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, Chapter 77, of the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 113, and of the Act of the 37th and 38th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 63, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for making certain new arrangements with respect to the Archdeacons of Barnstaple and Totnes, in the Diocese of Exeter, and for constituting a new Archdeaconry within the said Diocese of Exeter, and for endowing such new Archdeaconry:

“Whereas the said Diocese of Exeter now comprises three Archdeacons, and no more, namely, the said Archdeaconry of Barnstaple, the Archdeaconry of Exeter, and the said Archdeaconry of Totnes:

“And whereas the Right Reverend William, Bishop of Exeter, has represented to us, and it appears to us to be expedient, that the arrangements which are hereinafter recommended and proposed with respect to the said Archdeacons of Barnstaple and Totnes, and with respect to some of the Rural Deaneries within such Archdeacons, should be made, and that a new Archdeaconry should be constituted within the said Diocese of Exeter, and should comprise the Rural Deaneries which are hereinafter

recommended and proposed to be comprised therein, and which are at present within the said Archdeaconry of Totnes, and that such new Archdeaconry should be endowed in the manner which is hereinafter recommended and proposed:

“And whereas it appears to us to be undesirable that procurations, synodals, visitation fees, and induction fees, should be received by the Archdeacon of the said proposed new Archdeaconry:

“And whereas it has been made to appear to us that by reason of the discontinuance of the collection of the said fees there will be no annual income available for the said proposed Archdeaconry from fees, dues, and emoluments, and that the grant hereinafter recommended and proposed will not be such as to raise the annual income of the said proposed Archdeaconry to an amount exceeding £200:

“Now, therefore, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, with the consent of the said William, Bishop of Exeter, (testified by his having signed and sealed this Scheme), humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day upon which any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme shall be published in the London Gazette, and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, *first*, the Rural Deanery of Holsworthy shall be transferred from the said Archdeaconry of Barnstaple to the said Archdeaconry of Totnes, and, *secondly*, one new Archdeaconry shall be created within the said Diocese of Exeter, and such Archdeaconry shall be named ‘the Archdeaconry of Plymouth,’ and shall comprise and consist of the Rural Deaneries of Three Towns, Plympton, and Tavistock, all at present in the said Archdeaconry of Totnes.

“And we further recommend and propose that the Rural Deans and other the Clergy and the Inhabitants generally of the said proposed Archdeaconry of Plymouth shall be under and subject to the archidiaconal jurisdiction, authority, and control, of the Archdeacon of such proposed Archdeaconry for the time being, and that such Archdeacon shall have and exercise all the rights, powers, and duties of an Archdeacon within the limits of his Archdeaconry.

That the Statutory List be varied and added to as set forth in the Schedule hereto.

NOTE (1).—All persons or firms resident, carrying on business or being in the United Kingdom are prohibited from having, with any person or firm mentioned in this List, or in any List issued under the Trading with the Enemy (Statutory List) Proclamation, any dealings other than such as are expressly authorised by paragraph 5 of the Proclamation. A List (The Consolidated List No. 46A) consolidating all previous Lists, was published on the 1st February, 1918, which together with Lists Nos. 47, 48 and 49 of the 15th February, 1st March and 15th March, 1918, respectively, and the List herewith annexed, contains all the names which up to this date are included in the Statutory List.

Additions to and variations in these Lists will be published at intervals approximately of two weeks.

The Lists are published in the London Gazette and reproduced in the Board of Trade Journal, and separate copies of all Lists may be obtained at a small cost from the Superintendent of Publications, His Majesty's Stationery Office, Imperial House, Kingsway, W.C.

†NOTE (2).—Where a person or firm mentioned in the List has more than one address in the country, or group of countries under which the name of the person or firm appears, all dealings in that country, or in any country in the group, with such person or firm are prohibited, even in cases where one only of the addresses or one only of the countries is specifically mentioned.

NOTE (3).—Trading is prohibited under the Trading with the Enemy Proclamations of 25th June and 10th November, 1915, with any person or firm of enemy nationality resident or carrying on business in China, Siam, Persia, Morocco, Liberia or Portuguese East Africa. Persons or firms in the United Kingdom are therefore prohibited from trading with any person or firm of enemy nationality in any of those countries, even though such person or firm is not mentioned by name in the Statutory List.

NOTE (4).—In order to minimise as far as possible any inconvenience which may be caused to British traders by the dislocation of export trade owing to the inclusion in the Statutory List of a former connection, the Foreign Trade Department is collecting and classifying the names of non-enemy firms who may be able to act as substitutes for firms mentioned in the Statutory List. A considerable amount of information is already available at the Foreign Trade Department, and it is in many cases possible to suggest the names of satisfactory substitutes for individual firms on the Lists, without the necessity of referring the matter abroad.

The Department is, however, prepared on application to enquire of His Majesty's Representatives abroad for the names of suitable substitutes. When the applicant wishes this done by telegraph he is required to undertake to pay the cost of telegraphic correspondence. It would greatly facilitate the work of the Foreign Trade Department if applicants in making enquiries would specify the particular trade or trades for which substitutes are required. *General enquiries for new connections abroad should be addressed to The Comptroller*

NOTE (5).—The Statutory List for each country is telegraphed, on the day of issue, to His Majesty's Representative in that country, who is instructed to notify accordingly British Consular Officers, to whom persons abroad should apply for information as to names on the List. Persons and firms in the United Kingdom with agencies or branches abroad would, however, be well advised to furnish such agencies or branches with issues of the List as they appear. The names on the Lists for all countries in Central or South America are also notified to His Majesty's Ambassador at Washington, who transmits them to H.M. Consul-General at New York and to other centres in the United States likely to be interested.

NOTE (6).—It is not unusual for firms in Holland and the Netherland East Indies to be registered under names commencing with descriptive terms such as "Handel Maatschappij" (Trading Company) or "Naamlooze Venootschap" (Limited Liability Company). In such cases it has been found more convenient to publish the firm under its proper name followed by the general descriptive term "Handel Maatschappij" or "Naamlooze Venootschap" (N.V.) as in the case of an English company. For instance Handel Maatschappij van den Berg & Company, and Naamlooze Venootschap de Komeet v/h Dumonceau Frères will be found under "Berg" and "Komeet" respectively, and not under "Handel" or "Naamlooze."

Whitehall, March 20, 1918.

The KING has been pleased to award the Decoration of the Albert Medal to Lieutenant (temporary Captain) Charles William Fiske, 5th Battalion, East Kent Regiment, and to Lieutenant Clifford Foy, 10th Battalion, The Manchester Regiment, in recognition of their gallantry in saving life. The circumstances are as follows:—

On the 14th December, 1917, while bombing practice was being carried out at Margate under the supervision of Captain Fiske, a man threw a live bomb which failed to clear the parapet and fell back into the pit. Captain Fiske at once placed himself under cover expecting that the man would do likewise. On finding, however, that the man had lost his head and was unable to move, Captain Fiske ran back into the pit, seized the man, forced him into a corner and covered him with his own body. In the subsequent explosion Captain Fiske was wounded in both thighs.

Captain Fiske by his gallant action undoubtedly saved the man from death or severe injury.

On the 7th September, 1917, while bombing practice was being carried out under the supervision of Lieutenant Foy, one of the party withdrew the pin from a live bomb

and, when in the act of throwing it, dropped the bomb and fainted, falling upon the bomb. Lieutenant Foy at once lifted the man off the bomb and carried him to a place of safety.

A short time afterwards another man threw a bomb which hit the parapet and fell back into the pit. He made no endeavour to run out of the pit, whereupon Lieutenant Foy entered the pit and dragged him out.

On the same occasion a third man threw a live bomb which hit the parapet and rolled to the side. He was running out to throw the bomb farther away when Lieutenant Foy stopped him by tripping him up and dragged him into safety.

By these repeated acts of gallantry Lieutenant Foy undoubtedly saved the men concerned from serious injury or death.

His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to award the Edward Medal to Thomas Anderson and James Edward Tierney, late members of the crew of the Liverpool Salvage Association's vessel "Ranger," now in the temporary service of the Admiralty, and to George Gale, late foreman stevedore of the Admiralty at Portland Dockyard, who unhappily lost their lives under the following circumstances:—

On the 31st of August, 1917, during salvage operations on board the steamship "Great City," the holds of which were known to be heavily charged with gas arising from decomposing grain, one of the stevedore's men noticed some pieces of wood floating towards the pump and, contrary to strict orders, went down in order to pick the wood up so as to prevent the pump from choking. While in the act of doing this, he was overcome by gas and fell into the water. Anderson, who had some time previously suffered from gas poisoning, and, therefore, knew the gravity of the risk, at once went to his assistance and succeeded in holding him up while a rope was being sent down to him, but before this could reach him he was also overcome and fell into the water. Tierney and Gale then went to the rescue, but both were also overcome.

Anderson, Tierney and Gale undoubtedly lost their lives in an endeavour to save the lives of their fellow workman.

THE HORSES ORDER, 1918, DATED MARCH 18, 1918, MADE BY THE BOARD OF TRADE PURSUANT TO REGULATIONS 2F AND 2JJ OF THE DEFENCE OF THE REALM REGULATIONS.

The Board of Trade, deeming it expedient to exercise the powers conferred upon them by the Defence of the Realm Regulations, as respects horses, hereby order as follows:—

1. The Controller of Horse Transport may by licence authorise such dealers or other persons in such form and subject to such conditions, if any, as he shall think fit, to purchase a horse or horses from any person to whom a

licence has been granted by or on behalf of the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries in England and Wales, or in Scotland by the Board of Agriculture for Scotland, authorising him to sell such horse or horses to a person authorised by the Controller of Horse Transport.

2. Where a horse has been so purchased by a dealer who holds a licence granted by the Controller of Horse Transport, he shall not sell that horse to any person other than a dealer registered as such with the Board of Trade or to a person holding a licence granted by the Controller of Horse Transport.

3. Licences authorising the purchase of such horses from dealers may be granted by the Controller of Horse Transport in such form and subject to such conditions as he shall think fit.

4. The Controller of Horse Transport on behalf of the Board of Trade may take possession of any horse which is not being used wholly or mainly in agriculture, either absolutely or by way of hire, subject to such terms, other than compensation, as he may direct.

5. Where pursuant to the provisions of Regulation 2JJ the compensation to be paid in respect of any horse taken is to be determined by arbitration, the arbitrator shall, in default of agreement, be appointed by the President for the time being of the Shire Horse Society.

6. This Order does not apply to Ireland.

7. Infringements of this Order are summary offences under the Defence of the Realm Regulations.

8. This Order may be cited as the Horses Order, 1918, and shall come into force on the 1st April, 1918.

THE RATTAN AND MALACCA CANES ORDER, 1918, DATED THE 20TH MARCH, 1918, MADE BY THE BOARD OF TRADE IN PURSUANCE OF THE POWERS CONFERRED UPON THEM BY REGULATIONS 2F, 2G, AND 2JJ OF THE DEFENCE OF THE REALM REGULATIONS.

The Board of Trade, deeming it expedient to exercise the powers conferred upon them by the Defence of the Realm Regulations as respects Rattans and Malacca Canes, hereby order as follows:—

1. All persons holding or having power to sell or dispose of stocks of Rattan and/or Malacca Canes exceeding five hundredweight shall, on or before the 30th day of March, 1918, make a return thereof to the Controller of Timber Supplies, Caxton House, Westminster, S.W. 1, giving the following particulars:—

(a) The quantities held of each size and quality, which are to be separately stated.

(b) The place where such stocks are lying, or, if afloat, the name of the ship.

2. The said return shall include:—

(a) Goods belonging to the holder and

stored in docks, yards, warehouses, or elsewhere.

(b) Goods arrived at a home port of which possession has not yet been taken.

(c) Goods on passage to the United Kingdom.

(d) Goods unlifted abroad.

(e) Goods held for shippers or third parties and goods held or reserved for customers but still undelivered, stating the name and address of the persons owning or on whose behalf the goods are held.

3. The person making the return shall include in one return all stocks held by him or over which he has power of sale or disposal.

4. From the date hereof until further notice no person shall, without a permit issued by, or on behalf of, the Controller of Timber Supplies, sell or purchase, whether in the United Kingdom or elsewhere, Rattan or Malacca Canes (except walking sticks or other articles manufactured before the date of this Order), provided that a permit shall not be required for such sale or purchase if the quantity sold or bought in any single transaction does not exceed 112 pounds in weight and if the total purchases without a permit by any one person do not exceed 224 pounds in weight in any calendar month, and if the seller in each transaction without a permit obtains from the purchaser a certificate that the purchase is in accordance with this condition.

The seller shall forward to the Controller of Timber Supplies within seven days of the last day of each month a schedule of the quantities so supplied, together with the purchaser's certificates relating thereto.

5. This Order may be cited as the Rattan and Malacca Canes Order, 1918.

DEFENCE OF THE REALM REGULATIONS.

In pursuance of the powers conferred upon the Admiralty by Regulation 35A of the Defence of the Realm Regulations, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty hereby make the following Rules:—

1.—Application.

Save as hereinafter provided, these Rules shall apply to every person employed or being in or about any store, magazine, wharf or other premises or any vessel, vehicle, receptacle or

place in or upon which *oil in bulk* or any ammunition or explosive substance, or any highly inflammable substance required for the production thereof, is handled, carried, stored or deposited, or where the same may happen to be.

2.—Smoking, Tobacco, Matches, Lights, Etc.

No person shall while he is employed or is in or about any such premises, vessel, vehicle, receptacle or place as aforesaid, either smoke or have in his possession any cigar, cigarette, tobacco, pipe or contrivance for smoking, any match or apparatus for producing light or any lamp, light or fire of any description, except as authorised by an Officer, as hereinafter defined.

3.—Searching.

Any Police Constable or Officer, as hereinafter defined, may search at any time any person entering or being in or about any such premises, vessel, vehicle, receptacle or place as aforesaid, and may examine any such person's clothing and any bag, basket, parcel or other article he may be carrying; and any person entering or being within any such premises or place as aforesaid shall, if so required by any Police Constable or Officer as aforesaid, submit to be searched, and shall comply with any reasonable directions or regulations given or made with the object of enabling the same to be carried out. Provided that in no case shall any female person be searched by or in the presence of anyone but a female person.

4.—Intoxication.

No person in a state of intoxication shall enter or be permitted to remain in or about any such premises, vessel, vehicle, receptacle or place as aforesaid.

5.—Definition.

For the purpose of these Rules "Officer" shall mean any person having authority to superintend or direct work of the kind to which Defence of the Realm Regulation 35A applies.

6.—Saving.

Provided that nothing in these Rules shall apply to any place or premises in respect of which Rules have already been made—whether under Regulation 35A or otherwise—by the Secretary of State, the Admiralty, the Army Council or the Ministry of Munitions.

Any person failing to comply with the above Rules will be guilty of an offence against the Defence of the Realm Regulations and liable on summary conviction to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a period not exceeding six months or to a fine not exceeding £100, or both.

ADMIRALTY NOTICE TO MARINERS.

No. 414 of the year 1918.

ENGLAND, EAST COAST.

River Humber and Approaches—Pilotage, Traffic and Fishing Regulations.

Former Notice.—No. 819 of 1918; hereby cancelled.

Mariners are hereby warned that, under the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, the following Regulations have been made by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and are now in force:—

1. That portion of the Humber which lies between two straight lines, drawn from shore to shore, as follows:—(1) a line drawn 225° (S. 61° W. Mag.) through Spurn lighthouse, (2)

drawn 344° (North Mag.) from the east side of Barrow haven, will be referred to as the "port" in these regulations.

2. Shipowners and local agents are warned that their vessels should be directed to conform to the following regulations:—

(I) Except under exceptional circumstances merchant vessels will be free to enter or leave the port during the hours of Official day.

(II) Before entering the port merchant vessels must receive permission and the necessary instructions from the Examination steamer, and before leaving they must obtain permission through the Collector of Customs at Hull, Grimsby, or Goole, as the case may be.

(III) Shipowners and local agents are advised to time the arrival of their vessels at the port for daylight.

(IV) Vessels desiring to enter the port from seaward are, unless previously met by the Examination steamer, to proceed to the Southern Examination anchorage (except during strong northerly or easterly winds, when they should proceed to the Northern Examination anchorage) and there anchor.

(V) The Examination steamer will be met in the Examination area between Bull light-vessel and Chequer Shoal buoy.

The Examination steamer will be distinguished by the following means:—

By Day.—A white ensign, and at the foremast head the special flag mentioned in Part II of Admiralty Notice to Mariners No. 170 of 1918. When the port is closed 3 red balls will be hoisted in addition to the special flag.

By Night.—Three lights vertically, 3 feet apart, conspicuously displayed at the end of a yard so as to show an unbroken light round the horizon. When the port is closed these lights will be red, when it is open they will be white.

NOTE.—These lights are in addition to the ordinary navigation lights.

(VI) There are two Examination anchorages. The northern is to be used in strong northerly and easterly winds. The southern is to be used under all other conditions.

The Northern Examination anchorage comprises those portions of Hawke road and Middle shoal included between the intersection of the following lines of bearing:

(1) Skeffling church bearing 18° (N. 34° E. Mag.).

(2) Skeffling church bearing 4° (N. 20° E. Mag.).

(3) Spurn lighthouse bearing 120° (S. 44° E. Mag.).

(4) Extreme of Spurn point bearing 115° (S. 49° E. Mag.).

The Southern Examination Anchorage comprises the area bounded as follows:—

(1) On the north by the Bull sand.

(2) On the south by the three fathom contour line northward of Tetney haven.

(3) On the east by the line joining the Bull light-vessel and entrance to Tetney haven.

(4) On the west by a line parallel to and 7 cables from the eastern limit (3).

NOTE.—When the Southern Examination anchorage is full of shipping further arrivals should anchor eastward of and as near to it as possible.

The Examination area is that portion of the river enclosed by an irregular line drawn from

the Bull light-vessel to the extreme of Spurn point, thence to the Chequer Shoal buoy, thence to a point 210° (*S. 46° W. Mag.*) of and distant 7 cables from Bull light-vessel and thence to Bull light-vessel.

3. All pilotage certificates granted to masters and mates for the whole or any part of the Humber Pilotage district are suspended, and further all vessels (irrespective of draught, size, or nationality, but with the exception of those provided for in paragraph 4) bound to or from any place on the Humber must be conducted by licensed pilots over the whole or any part of the waters between Hull and the Outer Pilotage station of the Humber Pilotage district, which station, until further notice, will be situated in the neighbourhood of the Bull light-vessel.

4. In the case of lighter inter-dock traffic and of small British vessels engaged in local traffic above Immingham, pilotage by licensed pilots is not compulsory.

5. During the hours of official night, and during fog with visibility of less than half-a-mile, no traffic is permitted to move on the Humber below Paull point.

6. Every vessel shall endeavour to approach the Humber in sufficient time to enable such vessel to obtain a pilot and arrive at her destination, or at a position in which she is permitted to anchor, before the commencement of official night, but, should occasions arise when a vessel is delayed through unforeseen or unpreventable circumstances from arriving in time, she may approach the Examination steamer, from whom she will receive directions as to anchoring until the end of official night. The Examination steamer will be found in the neighbourhood of the Bull light-vessel after the commencement of official night. In the event of an incoming vessel being unable immediately to find the Examination steamer in these circumstances, she is to remain in the vicinity of the Bull light-vessel, but shall not cross the line drawn 225° (*S. 61° W. Mag.*) through Spurn lighthouse without permission. Outward bound vessels shall not pass Hawkins point later than 45 minutes before the commencement of official night.

7. Vessels when leaving the Humber must proceed direct to sea. Should it be necessary to wait for the weather to moderate or clear, they must remain inside the river at an authorised anchorage.

The pilot lobbies will be notified when the existence of fog outside the river is known.

8. All vessels proceeding into or out of the Humber must be navigated by way of Hawke and Sunk roads passing to the northward of the Bull light-vessel, except those outward-bound from Grimsby, which may cross the Middle shoal passing at once into the channel north of the Middle.

NOTE.—The five-fathom channel through the Sunk and Hawke roads is very narrow at the western entrance and also at a point north of the Middle light-vessel; deep-draught vessels steaming against the tide when approaching the buoys marking these portions of the channel should endeavour to avoid passing other vessels between them by easing engines to allow ships with the tide under them to get through first. Smaller vessels outward-bound should pass close to the southward of the buoys marking the south side, and those inward-bound close to the northward of the buoys marking the north side,

or the narrow portions of the channel, provided always that their draught of water and the state of the tide will admit.

9. Sailing vessels of 50 tons register and upwards when entering or leaving the Humber must be towed through the Boom Defence gateways. Should tugs not be available, inward-bound vessels may anchor north-westward of the No. 2 Lower Middle light-float at a distance of not more than $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles from it, but they must not bring the before-mentioned light-float to bear to the southward of 128° (*S. 36° E. Mag.*).

10. All vessels entering or leaving Grimsby docks must pass to the southward of the No. 4 Lower Burcom buoy except those making use of the channel southward of the Burcom shoal (hereinafter called the Burcom channel), which are exempted from this condition, but no vessel may cross the Burcom shoal between the No. 5 Middle Burcom and No. 4 Lower Burcom buoys. Vessels using the Burcom channel must pass into and out of its western end to the eastward of No. 6 Upper Burcom buoy, and through a gateway at its eastern end 220 feet wide, each side of which is marked by a dolphin surmounted by a black triangle supported on a white pole. No vessel is permitted to tow more than two craft at one time through this gateway.

Vessels making use of this gateway are cautioned to keep well in the middle of the opening and are subject to the following regulations:—

(1) Vessels navigating against the tide must in all cases give way to those navigating with the tide.

(2) No vessel must approach the defences in this part of the river nearer than a quarter of a mile except to pass through the before-mentioned gateway or to enter or leave the docks or old outfall.

(3) No vessel may tow more vessels at one time than she can safely navigate through the gateway, and under no circumstances is the tow to comprise more than two craft.

(4) Distant signals will be shown from the flagstaff on the West Pier at the Grimsby Dock entrance as follows:—

(a) Two black balls will denote that the gateway is open.

(b) Three black balls will denote that the gateway is closed.

(c) No signal being hoisted denotes that traffic is suspended.

When signal (b) three black balls is hoisted, no vessel may approach the gateway, and when traffic is suspended no vessels, other than H.M. Ships on special duty, may use the gateway.

11. Prohibited Anchorage areas:—

(I.) Anchorage is prohibited for all vessels between two lines:—

(a) Joining Stone Creek Coast Guard flagstaff and the eastern extremity of the eastern jetty at Immingham.

(b) Joining the riverward beacon of the two centre measured mile beacons on Sunk island and the northernmost of two clumps shown southward of Stallingborough on Admiralty Chart No. 109. The latter line passes through the position of No. 6 Upper Burcom buoy.

(II.) No merchant vessel shall anchor (except when granted special permission) between the before-mentioned prohibited anchorage area (I.) and the line of transit of the eastern

measured mile beacons on Sunk island produced to the Lincolnshire shore or (except as provided for in paragraph 9) to the northward of the line of the Killingholme leading lights or within $1\frac{1}{2}$ cables of any of the Admiralty mooring buoys.

(III.) Anchorage is prohibited between the following lines:—

(a) A line joining New Clee railway station and Patrington church.

(b) A line joining Middle light-vessel and No. 4 Lower Burcom buoy, extended to both banks of the Humber.

(IV.) Anchorage is prohibited to merchant vessels to the southward of a line joining No. 4 Lower Burcom buoy and Spurn lighthouse, or to the eastward of a line joining Cleethorpes pier pavilion and Skeffling church, except so far as the Examination anchorages are concerned.

(V.) No vessel of any description may anchor on the south side of the Bull sand between the western limit of the Southern Examination anchorage described in paragraph 2 of this notice and a line drawn through the Cleethorpes Sewer outfall beacon (on which a red light is exhibited in peace time) in a direction 60° (*N. 76° E. Mag.*), passing through a point 299° (*North-west Mag.*) distant 7 cables from Spurn lighthouse; nor on the north side of the Bull sand between the before-mentioned line of bearing passing through the Cleethorpes Sewer outfall and a line joining Spurn lighthouse and the Bull light-vessel produced to the Bull sand; nor within 3 cables of the No. 4 Lower Burcom buoy.

12. No neutral vessel may lay alongside any of the piers or jetties in the Humber at night without special permission.

13. No merchant vessels or boats, etc., will be allowed to approach within a quarter of a mile of any defence work (except to pass through the Boom gateways or to enter or leave the old outfall or docks at Grimsby) or to go alongside any Government ship, vessel, lighter, or any other Government craft, or any Government establishment, without special permission. All vessels proceeding up and down the Humber are to pass at a distance at least three cables from H.M. Ships, if the depth of water and circumstances of navigation permit.

14. All vessels employed in laying moorings, raising wrecks, etc., must be passed at slow speed, propelling engines being eased at least 300 yards before reaching such vessels and so continued for 150 yards after passing them. While the said mooring or wreck raising craft are at work they will each fly a red flag.

15. Anchor lights are to be reduced in power and screened as prescribed in Part V. of Admiralty Notice to Mariners No. 373 of 1918.

Vessels anchored in the Humber westward of a line joining Cleethorpes pier pavilion and Skeffling church are to exhibit anchor lights as mentioned above, except that between Immingham and the before-mentioned line they are to be reduced in brilliancy so as to be invisible at any greater distance than half a mile. All vessels at anchor outside the Eastern Boom and in the Southern Examination anchorage are to exhibit anchor lights during official night, such lights to be screened from overhead and reduced in brilliancy so as to be invisible at any greater distance than half a mile.

This order will not absolve the Masters of craft at anchor from keeping a sharp look-out and giving warning on the approach of any craft under way.

Anchor lights authorised by these orders are never on any account to be extinguished; the order "Out Lights" will not apply to them.

Bow and masthead steaming lights are to be as prescribed in Part V. of Admiralty Notice to Mariners No. 373 of 1918.

Other lights are to be as prescribed in Part V. of Admiralty Notice to Mariners No. 373 of 1918, and this order also applies to vessels in dock or alongside quays and jetties. Notwithstanding anything in these orders, dredgers may be permitted to work at Hull and Immingham at night provided all their lights are extinguished within half-an-hour of issue of the general order "Out Lights."

The above orders apply to vessels of every description, other than H.M. ships. The latter should, however, comply so far as the visibility of anchor lights eastward of Immingham is concerned.

16. No vessel is permitted to tow more than three craft at one time through a gateway of the Boom defence or more than two through the gateway in the Burcom channel described in paragraph 10. Owners of tugs may apply to the Humber Conservancy Board for pilot licences for the masters of their vessels which will enable them to pilot their own vessels and river craft comprising their tow (in certain parts of the river). The number of craft towed will be restricted according to the power of the tug.

17. Humber Rule No. 18 is to be strictly enforced. No sound signals other than navigation signals authorised by the Regulations for preventing Collisions at Sea, and by Humber Rules Nos. 14 to 16 (inclusive) at all times of the day or night, and No. 17 during the day only, are on any account to be used by vessels in any part of the Humber, the Old Harbour at Hull, or within any of the docks at Hull, Immingham and Grimsby.

18. Owners of small vessels plying in the vicinity of the Humber are instructed not to paint their craft light *grey*, and are hereby directed to have any vessels so coloured repainted. They are warned that small vessels painted *grey* run a great risk of being fired upon in mistake for submarines. Vessels painted *black* run the least risk.

19. Fishing in the Humber.—No vessel is allowed to fish in the Humber below Hull without a permit from the Admiralty port officer; all fishing, shrimping, trawling, or whelking in this portion of the river in areas other than those for which permits are granted is prohibited.

Pleasure boats will be granted fishing permits on application to the Admiralty Port Officer. The holding of these permits will remove the restriction as to the limits within which pleasure boats may ply for hire contained in paragraph 20 below, provided they do so with the object of catching fish.

No registered fishing boat or mechanically propelled craft will be granted a pleasure permit except for the purpose of fishing, but when they cannot fish their owners may apply to the Admiralty Port Officer for special permission

to ply for hire providing that the succeeding clause of this Notice is complied with.

No able-bodied professional fisherman or boatman between the ages of 18 and 60 may be employed on land or sea in connection with any boat for which a pleasure permit has been issued.

Nothing in this notice will exempt vessels from any obligation to register or procure licences as now required by local authorities.

20. Pleasure boats of every description on the Humber must be provided with permits to be provided by the Admiralty Port Officer, Dock Offices, Immingham.

Regulations affecting small craft in the vicinity of Cleethorpes:—Pleasure boats may ply for hire at Cleethorpes only between the Eastern and Western Sewer Outfall beacons, and must keep within a distance of one mile from the shore, except under the conditions stated in paragraph 19. Notwithstanding anything in these orders, rowing boats may pass along the shore at Cleethorpes, but they must keep within 400 yards of the high-water mark of spring tides.

21. Excursions by Water.—Excursions by water are limited to the River Humber above Hull, and Rivers Ouse and Trent. Excursion steamers will not be allowed to ply without a permit from the Admiralty Port Officer, Dock Offices, Immingham, and in no case are they to pass to the eastward of an imaginary line joining Victoria Dock entrance, Hull, and the east beacon on Skitter Ness.

22. Patrol of Internal Waterways.—The internal waterways of the port will be policed by Naval patrol vessels and by the Humber Conservancy Board under the direction of the Naval authorities.

Captains and Masters of Merchant Vessels and persons in charge of barges or boats of any kind are hereby warned to observe any orders which may be given to them by Naval patrol vessels or the duly authorised officers of the Humber Conservancy Board.

23. All instructions given by Officers in command of H.M. ships, Patrol vessels or Examination steamers, or the duly authorised officers of the Humber Conservancy Board, are to be implicitly and promptly obeyed even should they conflict with these orders.

24. Warning.—Warning is hereby given that vessels disobeying the above regulations will be liable to be fired on.

Variation.—16° W.

Note.—This Admiralty Notice to Mariners is a revision of the former Notice quoted above.

Caution.

This Admiralty Notice to Mariners is issued under the provisions of the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, and failure to comply strictly with the directions contained in it will constitute an offence against those Regulations.

Any person found guilty of such an offence is liable to severe penalties both of imprisonment and fine.

Any person aiding or abetting the commission of such an offence is himself guilty of an offence against the Regulations.

Attention is also drawn to the fact that any infringement of the directions contained in this

Admiralty Notice to Mariners is liable to result in the detention of the ship or vessel.

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Notices of Dissolution of Partnership will not be inserted unless signed by the Partners named therein, or by their legal representatives; and the signature or representative character of the signatory must be verified by Statutory Declaration made by a Solicitor of the Supreme Court.

A Notice of Dissolution of Partnership not signed by all the Partners, or their legal representatives, must be accompanied by a Statutory Declaration made by a Solicitor of the Supreme Court to the effect that such notice is given in pursuance of the terms of the partnership to which it relates.
