By the Lords of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

WHEREAS it is provided by Section 2 of the Customs (Exportation Prohibition) Act, 1914, that any Proclamation or Order in Council made under Section 8 of the Customs and Inland Revenue Act, 1879, as amended by the Act now in recital, may, whilst a state of war exists, be varied or added to by an Order made by the Lords of the Council on the recommendation of the Board of Trade:

And whereas it is provided by Section 2 of the Customs (Exportation Restriction) Act, 1914, that any Proclamation made under Section 1 of the Exportation of Arms Act, 1900, may, whether the proclamation was made before or after the passing of the Act now in recital, be varied or added to, whilst a state of war exists, by an Order made by the Lords of the Council on the recommendation of the Board of Trade:

And whereas by a Proclamation, dated the 10th day of May, 1917, and made under Sec-

tion 8 of the Customs and Inland Revenue Act, 1879, and Section 1 of the Exportation of Arms Act, 1900, and Section 1 of the Customs (Exportation Prohibition) Act, 1914, the exporta-tion from the United Kingdom of certain articles to certain or all destinations was prohibited:

And whereas by subsequent Orders of Council the said Proclamation was amended and added to in certain particulars:

And whereas there was this day read at the Board a recommendation from the Board of Trade to the following effect:-

That the Proclamation, dated the 10th day of May, 1917, as amended and added to by subsequent Orders of Council, should be further amended by making the following amendments in and additions to the Schedule to the same:-

Now, therefore, Their Lordships, having taken the said recommendation into consideration, are pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the same be approved.

Whereof the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs and Excise, the Director of the War Trade Department, and all other persons whom it may concern, are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

Also (11) Stipulations of the Convention of Commerce and Navigation between France and Egypt, November 26th, 1902 (Article xxvi.), in virtue of which reciprocal mostfavoured-nation treatment is assured in respect of the importation of the goods of the two countries.

In giving notice of denunciation of the above Conventions, the French Government have intimated their readiness to come to an arrangement whereby the various Conventions will remain in operation even after the period of denunciation has expired, subject to three months' notice on either side. This proposal is still under consideration.

The KING has been pleased to award the Albert Medal in each of the following cases in recognition of gallantry displayed in saving

Second Lieutenant John Patrick Tunn, 9th

Battalion, Australian Imperial Force.

On the 19th July, 1918, as some Australian troops were advancing to an attack in France. one of the men tripped on some wire and a rifle grenade fell from his rifle to the ground with Second Lieutenant Tunn, who the pin out. was about 10 yards away, saw what had happened, and ran back and picked up the grenade. In doing so he also tripped on the wire and the grenade fell from his hand. He picked it up again, and as he did so it exploded and blew off his right hand, besides wounding him in the head. The men were unhurt.

Second Lieutenant Stanley Martin Reckie,

M.M., Royal Fusiliers.

At Newmarket, on the 19th July, 1918, a bomb thrown during practice failed to clear the parapet and rolled back into the pit. The man who had thrown it lost his head, and instead of running out of the pit ran into a corner away from the entrance. Second Lieutenant Reekie, the bombing officer, who was in a position of safety, saw that there was no time to get the man out of the pit, and deliberately entered the pit and stood between the man and the bomb, shielding him with his The bomb exploded and the officer was seriously wounded, but the man escaped injury.

Private James McLaughlin, 1/5th Battalion, Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders, attached 157th Light Trench Mortar Battery.

On the 2nd August, 1918, Private McLaughlin, in the course of his duty, was examining a tokes Mortar shell in a

gunpit in which there were nine other men and about 150 Stokes shells, when the striker of the shell gave way and ignited the fuse, timed to explode in thirteen seconds. McLaughlin warned the others, and, taking the shell with him, ran from the pit by the narrow rear exit and along a sap which he had difficulty in reaching, as the ground was slippery. It was necessary to traverse this sap for some distance to ensure that the inevitable explosion did not affect the men or the shells in the gunpit. The shell exploded as Mc-Laughlin was throwing it clear and blew off his hand. It is stated that his action undoubtedly saved the lives of all the men in the gunpit.

Board of Trade, Whitehall Gardens, 15th October 1918.

The KING has been graciously pleased to confer the Decoration of the Albert Medal upon Maurice Lister, an assistant butcher in the Mercantile Marine.

The steamship on which Lister was serving was torpedoed and at once began to settle down and finally disappeared twenty minutes after being struck.

Lister and a pantry boy, both of whom were on their first voyage, were below in a cooling chamber when the explosion occurred, and they

both received serious injuries.

When Lister regained consciousness he found that both his ankles were helpless. He made his way to the top of the stairs, but found that the door was jammed. There was, however, a hatchway opening overhead, and Lister placed some of the planking, which had been blown up, against this opening in order to clamber up the planking and escape. Hearing cries of distress at this moment, however, he returned and searched the chamber on his hands and knees until he found the other boy with both legs broken, and managed by half dragging and half supporting him to get him up the planking to the steps leading to the deck. Other members of the crew then assisted both boys into boats, which were picked up after several days. The pantry boy, after being taken to hospital, succumbed to his injuries.

In pursuance of an Act for better preserving the Navigation of the River Mersey (5 & 6 Vic., cap. 110), we, Grayson and Shepheard, Surveyors, 606, Royal Liver Building, Liverpool, on behalf of Messrs. H. and C. Grayson, Limited, Shipbuilders and Engineers, Garston, hereby give you notice that we propose to construct at Garston, in accordance with plans and sections deposited at the Office of the Mersey Conservancy, a 9" drain in the foreshore of the River Mersey, adjoining the river wall of the shipyard belonging to Messrs. It is proposed to commence the work as soon as permission is given. The drain will be laid in the course of a week, and it will not project into, or exclude, impede or interrupt the tidal or other waters of the River Mersey.

EAST SUSSEX AND KENT (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1918 (No. 4).

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

PART I.

Modification of Orders.

1. The East Sussex and Kent (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1918, hereinafter referred to as "the principal Order," and the East Sussex and Kent (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1918 (No. 3), hereinafter referred to as Order (No. 3), are modified in manner hereinafter appearing.

Division of Scheduled District into Three Zones.

2.—(1.) The Scheduled District described in the principal Order shall for the purposes of this Order be divided into the three Zones described in the Schedule to this Order (hereinafter referred to respectively as Zone I, Zone II, and Zone III), to which the provisions hereinafter set forth shall apply.

(2.) If any farm (except any detached part) is partly within and partly without a Zone, the whole shall be deemed to be within the Zone, and where the farm extends to two Zones, the whole shall be deemed to be in the

inner Zone.

PART II.

PROVISIONS AS TO ZONE I.

Continued Prohibition of Movement in Zone I.

3. The prohibition of movement of animals contained in the principal Order shall apply without modification to Zone I.

Prohibition of Markets, &c., of Animals in

4. No market, fair, sale, or exhibition of animals shall be held in Zone I.

PART III.

PROVISIONS AS TO ZONE II.

Movement into and within Zone II.

- 5.—(1.) The provisions of Order (No. 3) applicable to the Zone described in the First Schedule thereto shall cease to apply to that Zone, and shall apply to the Zone II described in the Schedule hereto.
- (2.) For the purpose of movement into Zone II for immediate slaughter, Zone III shall be treated as if it were not in the Scheduled District.

Prohibition of Markets, &c., of Animals.

6. No market, fair, sale, or exhibition of animals shall be held in Zone II.

PART IV.

PROVISIONS AS TO ZONE III.

Free Movement into and within Zone III.

- 7. The prohibition of movement of animals contained in the principal Order shall not apply to any movement of animals—
 - (a) within Zone III; or
 - (b) into Zone III from premises situate outside the Scheduled District.

Prohibition of Movement out of Zone III except in certain cases.

8. No animal shall be moved out of Zone III, except for the purpose of movement for slaughter into Zone II, under and in accordance with the provisions of Article 5 of this Order.

Holding of Markets, &c., in Zone III.

9. The prohibition of the holding of markets, fairs, sales or exhibitions of animals in Zone III, which is contained in Article 4 of Order (No. 3), is hereby revoked.

PART V. GENERAL.

Movement of Animals through Zones.

10. For the purposes of this Order an animal shall not be deemed to be moved into or out of a Zone where it is moved through such Zone by railway from a place outside such Zone to another place outside such Zone without unnecessary delay and without the animal being untrucked within such Zone except for the purposes of feeding or watering the animal within a railway station premises where such untrucking takes place.

Commencement.

11. This Order shall come into operation on the fourteenth day of October, nineteen hundred and eighteen.

Short Title, &c.

12. This Order may be cited as the East Sussex and Kent (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1918 (No. 4), and shall be read with the Orders referred to in Article 1.

MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES FIXED FOR MALE WORKMEN UNDER THE AGE OF 18 YEARS IN CERTAIN AREAS IN ENGLAND, TO COME INTO OPERATION ON THE 21ST OCTOBER, 1918.

The Agricultural Wages Board (England and Wales), duly established and constituted under Section 5 (1) of the above Act and the Regulations made by the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries dated the 8th November, 1917, having given the Notice prescribed by the said Act and having considered all objections duly lodged with them, and having had regard to the provisions of sub-sections (6) and (7) of the said Section, hereby give Notice as required by sub-section (4) of the said Section and by paragraph 4 of the Agricultural Wages Regulations, 1918, that they have fixed the following minimum rates of wages, and the following differential rates for overtime employment, as here-

inafter defined, for male workmen under the age of 18 years employed in agriculture for time-work in the areas hereinafter described, and have defined for the purpose of the application of such differential rates for overtime the employment which is to be treated as overtime employment as follows, that is to say:—

1. The wages payable for employment in agriculture in the several areas shortly described in column 1 of Table I., hereinafter set forth and more fully described in the Schedule to this Order, of male workmen of the respective ages mentioned in column 3 of the said Table shall be not less than wages at the respective minimum rates mentioned in the said column 3 for the number of hours of employment specified in column 2 of the said Table, and the differential rates for overtime employment in the case of the said workmen, respectively, shall be the rates per hour mentioned in column 2 of Table II. hereinafter set forth.

2. Provided that where a whole-time workman to whom this Order applies is employed by the week or any longer period the wages payable to him for the hours of work agreed between him and the employer in any week (excluding hours of overtime employment) shall not be less than the amount set out in column 3 of the foregoing Table I. and applicable to him notwithstanding that those hours of work are less than the hours mentioned in column 2 of the said Table.

3. Provided also that in the case of a workman to whom this Order applies the minimum rates and overtime rates shall during the first two months of his employment in agriculture, be 20 per cent. less than the rates which but for this provision would be applicable to him under the preceding clauses of this Order.

4. For the purposes of the above rates the following employment is defined as overtime employment, that is to say:—

(a) All employment in summer in any week (excluding Sunday) in excess of the number of hours of employment in summer specified in column 2 of the said Table I. in relation to the area in question.

(b) All employment in winter in any week (excluding Sunday) in excess of the number of hours of employment in winter specified in the said column 2 in relation to the area in question.

(c) All employment on a Sunday.

5. For the purpose of the above rates the expressions "employment in summer" and "employment in winter" shall, as regards any area above-mentioned, bear the same respective meanings as they bear in the Order of the Agricultural Wages Board fixing minimum rates of wages for male workmen of the age of 18 years and over employed in agriculture in that area.

6. The above rates shall apply (according to the terms above set forth) to all male workmen under the age of 18 years who are wholly or partly employed in agriculture within the meaning of Section 17 (1) of the Corn Production Act, 1917, in any of the areas above-mentioned, during such time as they are so employed.

7. For the purpose of the above rates the hours of work shall not include meal times, but shall include any time during which, by reason of weather conditions, an employer has prevented from working a workman who was present at the place of employment and ready to work.

MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES FIXED FOR MALE Workers in Merioneth and Montgomery to Come Into Operation on the 21st **OCTOBER**, 1918.

The Agricultural Wages Board (England and Wales), duly established and constituted under Section 5 (1) of the above Act and the Regulations made by the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries dated the 8th November, 1917, having given the Notice prescribed by the said Act and having considered all objections duly lodged with them, and having had regard to the provisions of sub-sections (6) and (7) of the said Section, hereby give Notice, as required by Section 5 (4) of the above Act, and by paragraph 4 of the Agricultural Wages Regulations, 1918, that they have fixed the following minimum rates of wages and the following differential rates for overtime employment, as hereinafter defined, for male workmen of 18 years of age and over employed in agriculture for time-work in the area comprising the administrative counties of Merioneth and Montgomery, and have defined for the purpose of the application of such differential rates for overtime the employment which is to be treated as overtime employment as follows, that is to say:

1. The wages payable for employment of any male workman of 18 years of age and over employed wholly or mainly as a Stockman, Teamster, Carter or Shepherd shall be not less than wages at the minimum rate of 35s. for a week consisting of the hours of employment, whether on weekdays or on Sunday, customary in the above area, in the case of a workman so employed.

2. The wages payable for employment of all other male workers in agriculture of 18 years of age and over shall be not less than wages at the following minimum rates, that

is to say:

(a) In respect of employment in summer (as hereinafter defined) 30s. for 54 hours.

Incoming vessels are not to approach within half a mile of the ship-passages while they are open to outgoing vessels. All vessels entering or leaving Tor Bay during darkness must exhibit their side lights.

Vessels approaching Tor bay in foggy weather

should sound the regulation fog-signal and proceed with great caution.

ANCHORAGE REGULATIONS.

All orders given by the patrols are to be strictly carried out.

Vessels entering Tor bay anchorage in order to bunker at Brixham, and westbound vessels in ballast which are weather-bound and unable to round Start Point are to anchor as directed in Brixham roads to the westward of a line drawn in a 0° (N. 16° E. Mag.) direction from Brixham breakwater light, and to the southward of a line drawn in a 90° (S. 74° E. Mag.) from Goodrington.

Sailing vessels are to anchor as directed on the inshore side of a line drawn in a 219° (N. 45° W. Mag.) direction through Brixham breakwater light, clear of the fairway into Brixham harbour.

All other vessels are to anchor as directed on entering.

REGULATIONS FOR BRIXHAM FISHING VESSELS.

No fishing vessel is on any account to attempt to pass through the ship-passages during the hours of darkness.

Fishing vessels are not to leave Brixham harbour until permission has been obtained from the Port Fishery Officer. The three organised fleets working from Brixham are to follow the motions of the Admiral of their fleet in respect to leaving harbour.

The conduct of these fleets is dealt with by

local orders.

In addition to the restrictions to fishing laid down in Admiralty Notices to Mariners:—

Trawling or drifting is prohibited within two miles of the obstruction in any direction.

The laying or nets, crab or any other pots, or anchoring for the purpose of fishing with hand lines is entirely prohibited within half a mile of the obstruction in any direction.

REGULATIONS RESPECTING SMALL CRAFT AND PLEASURE BOATS.

The following regulations are to apply to all small craft and pleasure boats (exclusive of bona fide commercial fishing craft sailing under fishing permits) using the harbours of Brixham, Paignton and Torquay.

No small craft or pleasure boat will be per-

mitted to go outside the ship-passages.

Small craft with amateur fishing permits can obtain special permission to pass through the ship-passages between the hours of sunrise and sunset provided they keep within the three-mile limit from their port. Such permission must be obtained from the Senior Naval Officer, Torquay, through the Station Officer of the Coastguard Station.

Small craft must not go alongside, or hold communication with any vessel in the anchorage unless special permission from the Senior Naval Officer has been obtained to do so.

Variation.—16° W.
