A PROCLAMATION

REGULATING THE DISTRIBUTION OF PRIZE MONEY TO THE FLEET.

GEORGE R.I.

WHEREAS by the Naval Agency and Distribution Act, 1864, it is provided that money distributable among the Officers and Crews of any of Our Ships of War in respect of Awards made in the several cases therein mentioned, so far as full provision respecting the distribution thereof is not made by or under any Act of Parliament other than that Act, shall be distributed under the direction of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty in the shares in that behalf specified in any Royal Proclamation or Order in Council:

And whereas by the Naval Prize Act, 1918, it is provided that if We are pleased to signify Our intention to make a grant of Prize Money to Our Fleet out of the proceeds of Prizes captured in the present War, such Prize Money shall be of such amounts and payable to such members of Our Naval and Marine Forces and in such manner as We by Proclamation or Order in Council may determine:

And whereas We were pleased by Our Proclamation of the 15th August, 1918, to order and direct that the net produce of all such Prizes captured during the present War as shall be declared by the Tribunal appointed under the said Act to be Droits of the Crown, and of all other sums which under that Act shall be paid into the Naval Prize Fund, shall be for the entire benefit and encouragement of the Officers and Men of Our Naval and Marine Forces as defined in the above-mentioned Act, and shall be distributable in accordance with the said Act, and, further, that when the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty shall judge that there is a sufficient sum standing to the credit of the Naval Prize Fund to warrant it, a distribution shall be made in the shares and proportions and in the manner and in accordance with the Regulations We may hereafter announce by Our Royal Proclamation to such members of Our Naval and Marine Forces as may be qualified to share therein, or in case of their death to their representatives:

We do therefore now make known to all Our loving Subjects, and to all others whom it may concern, by this Our Proclamation, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, that Our Royal Will and Pleasure is and We do hereby order and direct that the said distribution shall be made in the shares and proportions hereafter mentioned at such time as the Admiralty may determine to those members of Our Naval and Marine Forces as aforesaid who have during the present War performed

service at Sea in Our Ships and Vessels of War in accordance with the following Regulations or in case of their death to their representatives:—

1. Service at sea shall be defined as having been borne for service at sea on the books of a seagoing Ship of War which goes to sea or on the books of a parent Ship for service in armed seagoing tenders.

2. Offensively Armed Auxiliary Vessels serving with Our Fleet shall be deemed Ships of War, including Armed Boarding Vessels, Trawlers, Drifters, and Vessels of the Auxiliary Patrol.

3. In any case of difficulty the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are empowered to determine what Vessels or Classes of Vessels shall be regarded as Ships of War for the purposes of the distribution and what nature of service afloat shall be considered as sea service and harbour service respectively.

4. As regards Our Royal Naval Air Service, trained Pilots and Observers, the crews of Our Naval Airships and others who have had to fly continuously at sea shall, while borne on the books of one of Our Ships and attached to a Naval Air Station, be considered to have been performing service at sea, but no service at a Training Establishment or whilst employed on shore for service with Our Army or the Armies of any of Our Allies shall be so considered.

5. Participation at the full rate shall be allowed to each individual Officer and Man who has performed service at sea as above defined for a period of not less than 30 months, between the 4th August, 1914, and 11th November, 1918, or such later date as may be fixed by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, to cover the cases of Officers and men taking part in subsequent hostilities at sea. For lesser periods the rate shall be proportionate to the number of months so served, one month to be the minimum period of service at sea to qualify for participation, and final broken periods of 15 days or more to count as one month, but no one who shall be qualified to participate in the distribution shall be allotted a less amount than £1.

6. The maximum rates which could have been earned to be allowed, irrespective of actual time served at sea, in all cases in which, before completion of the qualifying period, Officers and Men lose their lives in action or by other casualty whilst on service at sea, or either die, are invalided, or are certified as medically fit for shore service only, as a result of wounds or injuries so received.

7. A similar rate to be allowed in all cases in which Officers and Men die or are invalided on account of disease attributable to the Service, provided that at least ten months of the qualifying period has been served.

8. Prisoners of War captured, under circumstances which cast no reflection on themselves, whilst serving afloat or disembarked from seagoing Ships of War for operations on shore, shall receive the maximum rate which could have been earned, irrespective of the time served at sea.

The cases of individuals interned in Neutral Countries shall be decided by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty.

9. Each individual shall be allotted the number of shares, according to the scale appended, due to the rank or rating in which he has served at sea, and if in more than one

the number due to the higher, provided that such rank or rating has been held during service at sea for at least six months (including paid acting time), and that any subsequent reduction or reversion has not been due to misconduct.

10. Commodores and other Officers serving as Chief of Staff or Captains of the Fleet shall share as if they were in command of a Squadron or Ship.

11. The Officers in command of Motor Boats and Launches shall receive the shares of Officers of their rank not in command.

12. All persons temporarily employed in Our Naval Forces shall share in the classes to which the ranks or ratings to which they are temporarily appointed may belong or be deemed equivalent.

13. Supernumerary Officers and Men doing duty on Our Ships and Vessels of War shall share according to the ranks which they hold in the Service.

14. No person who has incurred forfeiture of Prize Money under the Naval Discipline Act, or who is discharged from the Service for misconduct, shall be entitled to share.

15. In the event of any difficulty arising with respect to any of these Regulations, or if any case should occur not herein provided for, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty shall be competent to issue such directions thereon as may appear just and expedient.

The distribution is to be made so that each Officer and Rating entitled to participate shall receive shares according to his class as set forth in the following scales—the relative ranks mentioned being those laid down in the Regulations and Instructions for the government of Our Naval Service, the Instructions for the government of the Coast Guard Service, and the Regulations for the government of the various classes of the Reserve, or, if not so laid down, as determined by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty:—

A PROCLAMATION

LICENSING TRADE WITH ALSACE-LORRAINE.

GEORGE R.I.

WHEREAS by Our Proclamation, dated the 9th day of September, 1914, called the Trading with the Enemy Proclamation No. 2, certain prohibitions therein specifically set forth as regards trading, or having commercial or financial transactions, with persons resident or carrying on business in the German Empire, or Austria-Hungary, were imposed upon persons resident, carrying on business, or being in Our Dominions:

And whereas by Our Proclamations, dated the 8th day of October, 1914, the 7th day of January, 1915, and the 14th day of September, 1915, Our first-mentioned Proclamation has been amended as in such Our Proclamations appears:

And whereas by the 8th paragraph of Our first-mentioned Proclamation it was provided that nothing in that Proclamation should be taken to prohibit anything which should be expressly permitted by Our Licence:

And whereas by the terms of the Armistice agreed upon between the Associated Governments and the German Empire, the territories of Alsace-Lorraine, part of the German Empire, are now in the occupation of the Armies of the Associated Governments, and it is expedient to allow trade and commercial and financial transactions with persons resident or carrying on business in the territories of Alsace-Lorraine:

Now, therefore, We, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, give and grant full licence and authority unto, and do hereby permit, all persons resident, carrying on business, or being in Our Dominions, to trade and have commercial and financial transactions with any person resident or carrying on business in the territories of Alsace-Lorraine (other than and except any persons with whom the President of the French Republic shall order persons resident in France not to trade or have commercial or financial transactions) in as full and ample a manner as if the said territories did not form part of the German Empire, but formed part of the territories of the Republic of France:

Provided always that any Licence which may be necessary in respect of any transaction under any prohibition of export or prohibition of import for the time being in force in the United Kingdom, or in respect of any remittance of money out of the United Kingdom prohibited by the Regulation numbered 41. D. of the Defence of the Realm Regulations, is first obtained:

Provided also that this Our Licence shall not permit any person to pay to or for the benefit of any person resident or carrying on business in the said territories any sum of money which by the terms of the Trading with the Enemy

Amendment Acts, 1914 and 1915, or either of them, is required to be paid to the Custodian appointed under the Trading with the Enemy Amendment Act, 1914, but such sums must be paid to the said Custodian:

Provided also that this Our Licence shall not permit any person to pay or deliver to or on behalf of any persons resident or carrying on business in the said territories any sum of money or property of which by the terms of the Trading with the Enemy Amendment Acts, 1914 and 1915, or either of them, notice has been or ought to have been given, prior to the date of this Our Proclamation, to the said Custodian.

LICENSING TRADE WITH THE TERRITORIES OF AUSTRIA-HUNGARY IN THE OCCUPATION OF THE ARMIES OF THE ASSOCIATED GOVERNMENTS.

WHEREAS by Our Proclamation, dated the 9th day of September, 1914, called the Trading with the Enemy Proclamation No. 2, certain prohibitions, therein specifically set forth as regards trading or having commercial or financial transactions with persons resident or carrying on business in the German Empire or Austria-Hungary, were imposed upon persons resident, carrying on business, or being in Our Dominions:

And whereas by Our Proclamations, dated the 8th day of October, 1914, the 7th day of January, 1915, and the 14th day of September, 1915, Our first-mentioned Proclamation has been amended as in such Our Proclamations appears:

And whereas by the 8th paragraph of Our first-mentioned Proclamation it was provided that nothing in that Proclamation should be taken to prohibit anything which should be expressly permitted by Our Licence:

And whereas by the terms of the Armistice agreed upon between the Kingdom of Italy and Austria-Hungary, certain territories of Austria-Hungary have been evacuated by the Austro-Hungarian Armies, and are now in the occupation of the Armies of the Associated Governments, and it is expedient to allow trade and commercial and financial transactions with persons resident or carrying on business in the territories so occupied by the Armies of the Associated Governments:

Now, therefore, We, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, give and grant full licence and authority unto, and do hereby permit, all persons resident, carrying on business, or being in Our Dominions, to trade and have commercial and financial transactions with any person resident, or carrying on business, in the territories occupied as aforesaid by the Armies of the Associated Governments, in as full and ample a manner as if the said territories did not form part of Austria-Hungary,

but formed part of territories belonging to one of the Governments with which Our Government is associated:

Provided always that any Licence which may be necessary in respect of any transaction under any prohibition of export or prohibition of import for the time being in force in the United Kingdom, or in respect of any remittance of money out of the United Kingdom prohibited by the Regulation numbered 41.D. of the Defence of the Realm Regulations, is first obtained:

Provided also that this Our Licence shall not permit any person to pay to or for the benefit of any person resident, or carrying on business, in the said territories, any sum of money which by the terms of the Trading with the Enemy Amendment Acts, 1914 and 1915, or either of them, is required to be paid to the Custodian appointed under the Trading with the Enemy Amendment Act, 1914, but such sums must be paid to the said Custodian:

Provided also that this Our Licence shall not permit any person to pay or deliver to or on behalf of any person resident or carrying on business in the said territories any sum of money or property of which by the terms of the Trading with the Enemy Amendment Acts, 1914 and 1915, or either of them, notice has been or ought to have been given, prior to the date of this Our Proclamation, to the said Custodian.

And whereas it appears to Us that the said Proclamation should be revoked:

Now, therefore, We, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, hereby proclaim, direct and ordain, that the said Proclamation of the Seventeenth day of July, 1915, shall be, and the same is hereby, revoked.

A PROCLAMATION

REVOKING A PROCLAMATION, DATED THE 28TH DAY OF JULY, 1915, PROHIBITING THE IMPORTATION OF UNSET DIAMONDS INTO THE UNITED KINGDOM.

GEORGE R.I.

WHEREAS by a Proclamation, dated the twenty-eighth day of July, 1915, made in pursuance of Section 43 of the Customs Consolidation Act, 1876, We thought fit, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, to prohibit the importation of unset diamonds into the United Kingdom:

And whereas it appears to Us that the said Proclamation should be revoked:

Now, therefore, We, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, hereby proclaim, direct and ordain, that the said Proclamation of the twenty-eighth day of July, 1915, shall be, and the same is hereby, revoked.

Given at Our Court at *Buckingham Palace*, this Tenth day of *February*, in the year of our Lord One thousand nine hundred and nineteen, and in the Ninth year of Our Reign.

WHEREAS by an Order in Council, dated the twenty-eighth day of November, nineteen hundred and fourteen, His Majesty was pleased to make regulations (called the "Defence of the Realm Regulations") under the Defence of the Realm Consolidation Act, 1914, for securing the public safety and the defence of the realm:

And whereas the said Act has been amended by the Defence of the Realm (Amendment) Act, 1915, the Defence of the Realm (Amendment) (No. 2) Act, 1915, and the Munitions of War Act, 1915, and other enactments:

And whereas the said regulations have been amended by various subsequent Orders in Council:

And whereas it is expedient further to amend the said regulations in manner hereinafter appearing:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the following amendments be made in the said regulations:—

1. The following regulation shall be substituted for Regulation 39DD:—

"39DD.—(1) Except under and in pursuance of a licence granted by the Shipping Controller, no British ship registered in the United Kingdom shall proceed to sea on any voyage whatsoever, and no British ship whatsoever shall proceed to sea from any port in the United Kingdom: Provided that the foregoing provisions shall not apply (a) to sailing ships, (b) to steamers of less than 500 tons gross tonnage, or (c) to steamers proceeding to sea on voyages from a port in

the British Islands to any other port in the British Islands.

(2) A licence under this regulation may be granted in respect of ships of any class, or voyages of any class, or in respect of any special ship or ships, or any special voyage or voyages, and may be granted so as to be in force for any time and subject to any terms or conditions specified therein. At the time that application for a licence is made a copy of any charter party entered into in respect of the voyage for which the application is made shall be forwarded to the Shipping Controller.

(3) If any ship obtains or attempts to obtain clearance outward for the purpose of proceeding, or attempts to proceed, or proceeds, to sea in contravention of this regulation, or if in the case of any ship there is a failure to comply with any terms or conditions contained in a licence granted under this regulation in respect of that ship, the owner, the disponent, the agent and the master thereof, shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations, and if the ship is at the time of the commission of the offence, or is subsequently at any time, found at any port of, or within the territorial waters adjacent to, the United Kingdom, it may be detained in the same manner as if it were a ship liable to be detained under the Merchant Shipping Acts, 1894 to 1916.

(4) There shall be included in every contract for the charter of any ship to which this regulation applies a provision making the validity of the contract or charter party conditional upon the granting from time to time of such licences as may be required under this regulation.

(5) In this regulation the expressions 'ship' and 'British ship' have the same meaning as in the Merchant Shipping Acts, 1894 to 1916, and the expression 'disponent' in relation to any ship includes any person responsible for the management or control of the ship."

2. Regulation 39DDD is hereby rescinded and shall be omitted.

3. This Order shall come into operation on the thirty-first day of March, nineteen hundred and nineteen.

- (a) A small Corps Headquarters;
- (b) A large Works Headquarters;
- (c) Ten Works Companies;
- (d) One Miscellaneous Trades Company:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to sanction the establishment of the Corps of Royal Marine Engineers with pay and allowances at the rates shown below:—

"To Officer Commanding — Graded as Assistant Adjutant General—

Pay at the rate of £750 a year.

"To Engineer Officers and Men—

Pay at rates authorized for Royal Engineers in Your Majesty's Army.

"To Ex-Army Men enlisted in the Royal Marine Engineers—

Payment of Bounty in respect of enlistment as authorized for Your Majesty's Army.

"To Royal Marine Officers, Warrant Officers, Non-Commissioned Officers, and Men employed with the Royal Marine Engineers, but not in receipt of pay at rates authorized for Royal Engineers in Your Majesty's Army —Payment of Allowances as follow:—

River Humber and Approaches—Pilotage, Traffic and Fishing Regulations.

Former Notice.—No. 825 of 1918; hereby cancelled.

Mariners are hereby warned that, under the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, the following Regulations have

been made by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and are now in force:—

1. That portion of the Humber which lies between two straight lines, drawn from shore to shore, as follows:—(1) a line drawn 225° (*S. 61^{\circ} W. Mag.*) through Spurn lighthouse, (2) drawn 344° (*North Mag.*) from the east side of Barrow haven, will be referred to as the "port" in these regulations.

2. Shipowners and local agents are warned that their vessels are to conform to the following regulations:—

(I.) Except under exceptional circumstances merchant vessels will be free to enter or leave the port during the hours of Official day.

(II.) _____ | _____

(III.) Shipowners and local agents are advised to time the arrival of their vessels at the port for daylight.

3. All pilotage certificates granted to masters and mates for the whole or any part of the Humber Pilotage district are suspended, and further all vessels (irrespective of draught, size, or nationality, but with the exception of those provided for in paragraph 4) bound to or from any place on the Humber must be conducted by licensed pilots over the whole or any part of the waters between Hull and the Outer Pilotage station of the Humber Pilotage district, which until further notice will be situated in the neighbourhood of the Bull light-vessel.

4. In the case of lighter inter-dock traffic and of small British vessels engaged in local traffic above Immingham, pilotage by licensed pilots is not compulsory.

5. During the hours of official night, and during fog with visibility of less than half-a-mile, no traffic is permitted to move on the Humber below Paull point; also when these conditions prevail no vessel shall approach within a radius of five miles from Humber light-vessel.

6. Every vessel shall endeavour to approach the Humber in sufficient time to enable such vessel to obtain a pilot and arrive at her destination, or at a position in which she is permitted to anchor, before the commencement of official night. _____ | _____

7. _____ | _____

The pilot lobbies will be notified when the existence of fog outside the river is known.

8. All vessels proceeding into or out of the Humber must be navigated by way of Hawke and Sunk roads passing to the northward of the Bull light-vessel, except those outward-bound from Grimsby, which may cross the middle shoal passing at once into the channel north of the Middle.

NOTE.—The five-fathom channel through the Sunk and Hawke roads is very narrow at the western entrance and also at a point north of the Middle light-vessel; deep-draught vessels steaming against the tide when approaching the buoys marking these portions of the channel should endeavour to avoid passing others be-

tween them by easing engines to allow ships with the tide under them to get through first. Smaller vessels outward-bound should pass close to the southward of the buoys marking the south side, and those inward-bound close to the northward of the buoys marking the north side, of the narrow portions of the channel, provided always that their draught of water and the state of the tide will admit.

9. Sailing vessels of 50 tons register and upwards must be towed through the Boom Defence gateways. Should tugs not be available, sailing vessels entering the Humber may anchor temporarily north-westward of the No. 2 Lower Middle light-float at a distance of not more than $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles from it, but they must not bring the before-mentioned light-float to bear to the southward of 128° (*S. 36^{\circ} E. Mag.*)

10. All vessels entering or leaving Grimsby must pass to the southward of the No. 4 Lower Burcom B.W.V.S. buoy, except those making use of the channel southward of the Burcom shoal (hereinafter called the Burcom channel), which are exempted from this condition, but no vessel may cross the Burcom shoal between the No. 5 Middle Burcom and No. 4 Lower Burcom B.W.V.S. buoys. Vessels using the Burcom channel must pass into and out of its western end to the eastward of No. 6 Upper Burcom B.W.V.S. buoy, and its eastern end by a passage of 220 feet wide, each side of which is marked by a dolphin surmounted by a black triangle supported on a white pole. No vessel is permitted to tow more than two craft at one time through this passage.

Vessels making use of this passage are cautioned to keep well in the middle of the opening and are subject to the following regulations:—

(1.) Vessels navigating against the tide must in all cases give way to those navigating with the tide.

(2.) No vessel must approach the defences in this part of the river nearer than a quarter of a mile except to pass through the before-mentioned passage or to enter or leave the docks or old outfall at Grimsby.

(3.) No vessel may tow more vessels at one time than she can safely navigate through the passage, and under no circumstances is the tow to comprise more than two craft.

(4.) Distant signals controlling the small gateway will be shown from the flagstaff on the West Pier at the Grimsby Dock entrance as follows:—

(a) Two black balls will denote that the passage is open.

(b) Three black balls will denote that the passage is closed.

(c) No signal being hoisted denotes that traffic is suspended.

When signal (b) three black balls is hoisted, no vessel may approach the passage, and when traffic is suspended no vessels, other than H.M. Ships on special duty, may use the passage.

11. Prohibited areas:—

(I.) Anchorage is prohibited for all vessels between the following lines:—

(a) Joining Stone Creek Coast Guard flagstaff and the eastern extremity of the eastern jetty at Immingham.

(b) Joining the riverward beacon of the two centre measured mile beacons on Sunk island and the northernmost of two clumps shown southward of Stallingborough on Admiralty Chart No. 109. The latter line passes through the position of No. 6 Upper Burcom buoy.

(II.) No merchant vessel shall anchor (except when granted special permission) between the before-mentioned prohibited anchorage area (I.) and the line of transit of the eastern measured mile beacons on Sunk island produced to the Lincolnshire shore or (except as provided for in paragraph 9) to the northward of the line of the Killingholme leading lights or within $1\frac{1}{2}$ cables of any of the Admiralty mooring buoys.

(III.) Anchorage is prohibited between the following lines:—

(a) Joining New Cleve Railway station and Patrington church.

(b) Joining Middle light-vessel and No. 4 Lower Burcom B.W.V.S. buoy, extending to both banks of the Humber.

(IV.) Anchorage is prohibited to merchant vessels to the southward of a line joining No. 4 Lower Burcom B.W.V.S. buoy and Spurn lighthouse, or to the eastward of a line joining Cleethorpes pier pavilion and Skeffling church, except so far as the Examination anchorages are concerned.

(V.) No vessel of any description may anchor in the area defined by the following lines:—

On the East.—By a line joining Spurn lighthouse and Bull light-vessel produced to the Lincolnshire shore.

On the South.—By the dry contour line of Haile sand.

On the West.—By the line of bearing Cleethorpes sewer outfall beacon (on which a red light is exhibited) in a 240° (S. 76° W. Mag.) direction.

On the North.—By Wyke bight.

(VI.) No merchant vessel of any description may enter, pass through or remain in the area bounded as follows, without special permission:—

(1) On the North by the bearing Skitter Haven No. 8 B.W.V.S. buoy 55° (N. 71° E. Mag.)

(2) On the South by the bearing Killingholme Oil Fuel jetty, 235° (S. 71° W. Mag.)

(3) On the East by a line joining the before-mentioned No. 8 buoy and Killingholme No. 7 light-float.

(4) On the West by the Lincolnshire River bank.

12. No neutral vessel may lie alongside any of the piers or jetties in the Humber at night without special permission.

13. No merchant vessels or boats, etc., will be allowed to approach within a quarter of a mile of any defence work (except to pass through the Boom gateways or to enter or leave the old outfall or docks at Grimsby) or to go alongside any Government ship, vessel, lighter, or any other Government craft, or any Government establishment, without special permission. _____ | _____.

14. All vessels employed in laying moorings, raising wrecks, etc., must be passed at slow

speed, propelling engines being eased at least 300 yards before reaching such vessels and so continued for 150 yards after passing them. While the said mooring or wreck raising craft are at work they will each fly a red flag.

16. No vessel is permitted to tow more than three craft at one time through a gateway of the Boom defence or more than two through the passage in the Burcom channel described in paragraph 10. Owners of tugs may apply to the Humber Conservancy Board for pilot licences for the masters of their vessels which will enable them to pilot their own vessels and river craft comprising their tow (in certain parts of the river). The number of craft towed will be restricted according to the power of the tug.

17. Humber Rule No. 18 is to be strictly enforced. No sound signals other than navigation signals authorised by the Regulations for preventing Collisions at Sea, and by Humber Rules Nos. 14 to 16 (inclusive) at all times of the day or night, and No. 17 during the day only, are on any account to be used by vessels in any part of the Humber, the Old Harbour at Hull, or within any of the docks at Hull, Immingham or Grimsby.

18. Owners of small vessels plying in the vicinity of the Humber are instructed not to paint their craft light *grey*, and are hereby directed to have any vessels so coloured repainted. They are warned that small vessels painted *grey* run a great risk of being fired upon in mistake for submarines. Vessels painted *black* run the least risk.

19. Fishing in the Humber.—No vessel is allowed to fish in the Humber below Hull without a permit from the Admiralty Port Officer; all fishing, shrimping, trawling, or whelking in this portion of the river in areas other than those for which permits are granted is prohibited.

22. Patrol of Internal Waterways.—The internal waterways of the port will be policed by Naval patrol vessels and by the Humber Conservancy Board under the direction of the Naval authorities.

Captains and Masters of Merchant Vessels and persons in charge of barges or boats of any kind are hereby warned to observe any orders which may be given to them by the Naval Patrol vessels or the duly authorised officers of the Humber Conservancy Board.

23. All instructions given by Officers in command of H.M. ships, Patrol vessels or Examination steamers, or the duly authorised officers of the Humber Conservancy Board, are to be implicitly and promptly obeyed even should they conflict with these orders.

Notice is hereby given that, under the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, the following Regulations have been made by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and are now in force:—

(1) *Southwold to Newcome Sand—Prohibited Anchorage.*

Anchorage is prohibited within the following area:—

Limits:

(a) *On the North.*—By a line drawn from Kessingland, about 2 miles northward of Covehithe, in a 90° (S. 76° E. Mag.) direction for a distance of 3½ miles from the shore.

(b) *On the South.*—By a line drawn from Walberswick Railway station, near Southwold, in a 109° (S. 57° E. Mag.) direction for a distance of 3 miles 6½ cables from the shore.

(c) *On the East.*—By a line drawn from the eastern extremity of limit (a) in a 181° (S. 15° W. Mag.) direction for a distance of 9 cables, thence in a 193° (S. 15° W. Mag.) direction for a distance of 3 miles 9 cables, thence in a 200° (S. 34° W. Mag.) direction to the eastern extremity of limit (b).

(2) _____

The regulation prohibiting vessels, other than H.M. ships, from moving in Yarmouth roads during the night is no longer in force.

(3) *The Wash, Boston—Compulsory Pilotage at Night.*

1. No vessel shall proceed through Clay Hole to Boston (or vice versa) at night without having on board a duly licensed Pilot.

2. For the purposes of this Order "Night" shall begin half an hour after sunset and shall terminate half an hour before sunrise.

(4) *River Tyne Boom Defence—Entrance Signals and Traffic Regulations.*

The following signals will be displayed to indicate that the Boom is *Open to Traffic*:—

By Day - - 2 Black balls, vertical.

By Night - 2 White lights, vertical.

The above signals will be hoisted on board H.M.S. *Satellite* and at the following Distant Signal stations:—

(a) For Incoming Traffic.—At the light-house on the end of the North arm of the breakwater.

(b) For Outgoing Traffic.—At Ballast hill. Shipping at Dunstan and Tyne docks should ascertain by telephone from H.M.S. *Satellite* whether they can proceed down river. A telephone for this purpose is kept at the Staith Master's office, Dunstan, and at the Dock Master's office, Tyne docks.

The absence of these signals will denote that the Boom is *Closed to Traffic*.

Vessels entering or leaving the Tyne, after passing the pier heads when bound inwards, and after passing Hay Hole point when bound outwards, are to so regulate their speed that until the line of the Boom is passed they shall not come within a distance of 200 yards from their stern to the stern of the next vessel ahead proceeding in the same direction. Whilst navigating between Hay Hole point and the pier heads, no vessel should attempt to overhaul and pass ahead of another vessel proceeding in the same direction.

When crossing the line of the Boom, all vessels are to preserve a mid-channel course as far as is consistent with safe navigation. Vessels of 25 feet draught and above are to stop their engines when crossing the line of the Boom at or about the time of low water.

Incoming and outgoing vessels must not cross the line of the Boom at the same time. Vessels proceeding against the tidal stream must so regulate their speed that any vessels proceeding with the tide shall first pass the obstruction.

No vessel is to anchor in the area bounded as follows:—

(a) *On the West.*—By a line drawn from the south-west corner of Dockwray square to the east end of Salmons quay;

(b) *On the East.*—By a line drawn from Prior's Stone to the Volunteer Life Brigade house;

provided only that a vessel proceeding to the oil jetty at South Shields may let go her anchor; if necessary, within the line of moorings off the said jetty; such vessels, however, are not to anchor to the eastward of a line drawn from Lloyd's Hailing and Signal station to the Life

boat house and slip on Commissioner's wharves.

With the above exceptions, the Rules and Regulations for the Navigation of the Tyne are to be adhered to.

(1) *Falmouth Harbour Approach—Traffic Regulations.*

Former Notices.—Nos. 1287, 1421 of 1918, and No. 4 of 1919.

All vessels bound to or from Falmouth harbour must pass between the two light-buoys situated at a distance of about 3 miles south-westward from St. Anthony point lighthouse as shown on charts, and maintain a course 0° (*N. 17° E. Mag.*) and 180° (*S. 17° W. Mag.*), respectively, for a distance of a quarter of a mile from the light-buoys.

Any instructions given by the patrol vessels should be strictly observed. Vessels proceeding eastward must obtain instructions as to the route to be followed before attempting to leave the anchorage.

Vessels entering Falmouth harbour must close the Drifter stationed about half a mile to the southward of the two light-buoys defining the ship-passage.

This Drifter regulates inward-bound and outward-bound traffic.

Inward-bound vessels will be given priority over outward-bound vessels in respect of passage through the ship-passage.

Signals:

To indicate that the ship-passage is clear for inward-bound vessels the Drifter will display:

(a) By Day ... No signal.

(b) By Night... Two horizontal red lights.

To indicate that the ship-passage is clear for outward-bound vessels, the Drifter will display:—

(a) By Day ... A black shape.

(b) By Night ... Two horizontal white lights.

During fog the Drifter will remain close to the ship-passage, and will sound the following signals:—

(a) Under normal conditions when no vessel is passing either way, the Drifter will sound "K" (— — — —) on her whistle every two minutes. This signal is intended to indicate the position of the Drifter and of the ship-passage.

(b) When an inward-bound vessel is heard approaching, the Drifter will sound letter "W" (— — — —) on her whistle to indicate that the ship-passage is clear for inward-bound vessels.

(c) When an outward-bound vessel is heard approaching, the Drifter will sound letter "O" (— — — —) on her whistle to indicate that the ship-passage is clear for outward-bound vessels.

When passing Falmouth from any direction or approaching the Port from the eastward, vessels should not approach St. Anthony point within a distance of 4 miles between the bearings of 327° (*N. 16° W. Mag.*) and the ship-passage.

Vessels approaching Falmouth in foggy weather should be careful to sound the regulation fog-signal and to proceed with great caution when within a depth of 30 fathoms at all states of the tide.

When the ship-passage is clear for inward-bound traffic, no outward-bound vessel may approach within half a mile of the ship-passage; and when the signals indicate that outward-bound traffic may pass through the ship-passage, no inward-bound vessel may approach within half a mile of the ship-passage.

During the hours of darkness all vessels entering or leaving Falmouth harbour must exhibit their side-lights.

(2) *Penzance Bay—Traffic Regulations.*

All vessels bound to or from Penzance bay must pass between the two light-buoys situated at a distance of about 1½ miles south-eastward from St. Paul church, north-westward of Mousehole, as shown on charts, and maintain a course 0° (*N. 17° E. Mag.*) and 180° (*S. 17° W. Mag.*), respectively, for a distance of a quarter of a mile from the light-buoys.

Vessels approaching from the eastward must keep to the southward of the parallel of lat. 50° 02' N., until reaching a position about 3 miles southward of the ship-passage, which should then be steered for.

Any instructions given by the patrol vessels should be strictly observed.

Inward-bound vessels will have priority over outward-bound vessels in respect of passage through the ship-passages.

Vessels entering Penzance bay must close the Drifter, stationed about half a mile to the southward of the two light-buoys defining the ship-passages.

This Drifter regulates inward-bound and outward-bound traffic.

The signals exhibited by this Drifter are as prescribed for Falmouth in Part (1) of this Notice.

Vessels making Mounts bay in foggy weather should be careful to sound the regulation fog-signal and to proceed with great caution when within a depth of 25 fathoms at all states of the tide.

When the ship-passages is clear for inward-bound traffic, no outward-bound vessel may approach within half a mile of the ship-passages; and when the signals indicate that outward-bound traffic may pass through the ship-passages, no inward-bound vessel may approach within half a mile of the ship-passages.

During the hours of darkness, all vessels entering or leaving Penzance bay must exhibit their side-lights.

Before attempting to leave Penzance bay, outward-bound vessels must obtain instructions as to the route to be followed.

The Patrol vessels at the entrance to Falmouth and Mounts bay on observing vessels, during dark nights and foggy or misty weather, proceeding on a course prejudicial to their safety, have instructions to fire a blank charge as a signal for such vessels to stop.

Such vessels should act accordingly and continue to blow their whistles until approached by the Patrol vessels, who will then pilot them to the ship-passages or clear of danger.

Tor Bay Approaches—Traffic Regulations.

Former Notices.—Nos. 1176, 1288, 1419 of 1918, and No. 5 of 1919.

Two ship-passages have been established as follows:—

Northern ship-passages, 600 feet wide, marked by light-buoys on either side, situated $5\frac{1}{2}$ cables, 142° (S. 22° E. Mag.), from the Ore Stone Δ . This ship-passages is to be used by:—

(1) All vessels approaching Tor Bay from the eastward.

Such vessels should make a position one mile, 44° (N. 60° E. Mag.), from the ship-passages

and enter on a course 224° (S. 60° W. Mag.) till half a mile beyond the ship-passages.

(2) All eastbound vessels leaving Tor Bay.

Such vessels should steer so as to pass through the ship-passages on a course 44° (N. 60° E. Mag.) and should continue on this course for one mile, when course is to be altered to join the route in force.

Southern ship-passages, 600 feet wide, marked by light-buoys on either side, situated 7 cables, 84° (S. 80° E. Mag.), from Berry Head light-house. This ship-passages is to be used by:—

(1) All vessels approaching Tor Bay from the southward and westward.

Such vessels should make a position 1 mile, 144° (S. 20° E. Mag.), from the ship-passages, and enter on a course 324° (N. 20° W. Mag.) till half a mile beyond the ship-passages.

(2) All south and west bound vessels.

Such vessels should steer so as to pass through the ship-passages on a course 144° (S. 20° Mag.) and should continue on this course for a mile beyond the ship-passages, when course is to be altered to join the route in force.

Caution is necessary when entering southern ship-passages as the stream sets obliquely across the entrance. A Drifter regulates the inward and outward bound traffic through each ship-passages.

Inward-bound vessels will be given priority over outward-bound vessels in respect of passage through the ship-passages.

Signals:

To indicate that the ship-passages is clear for inward-bound vessels, the Drifter will display:

(a) By Day ... No signal.

(b) By Night ... Two horizontal red lights.

To indicate that the ship-passages is clear for outward-bound vessels, the Drifter will display:—

(a) By Day ... A black shape.

(b) By Night ... Two horizontal white lights.

During fog the Drifter will remain close to the ship-passages, and will sound the following signals:

(a) Under normal conditions when no vessel is passing either way, the Drifter will sound "K" (— — —) on her whistle every two minutes. This signal is intended to indicate the position of the Drifter and of the ship-passages.

(b) When an inward-bound vessel is heard approaching, the Drifter will sound letter "W" (— — —) on her whistle to indicate that the ship-passages is clear for inward-bound vessels.

(c) When an outward-bound vessel is heard approaching, the Drifter will sound letter "O" (— — —) on her whistle to indicate that the ship-passages is clear for outward-bound vessels.

No outgoing vessel is to approach within half a mile of the ship-passages unless this signal is displayed and permission has been given to proceed.

Incoming vessels are not to approach within half a mile of the ship-passages while they are open to outgoing vessels. All vessels entering or leaving Tor Bay during darkness must exhibit their side lights.

Vessels approaching Tor Bay in foggy weather should sound the regulation fog-signal and proceed with great caution.

ANCHORAGE REGULATIONS.

All orders given by the patrols are to be strictly carried out.

Vessels entering Tor bay anchorage in order to bunker at Brixham, and westbound vessels in ballast which are weather-bound and unable to round Start Point are to anchor as directed in Brixham roads to the westward of a line drawn in a 0° (*N. 16° E. Mag.*) direction from Brixham breakwater light, and to the southward of a line drawn in a 90° (*S. 74° Mag.*) from Goodrington.

Sailing vessels are to anchor as directed on the inshore side of a line drawn in a 219° (*N. 45° W. Mag.*) direction through Brixham breakwater light, clear of the fairway into Brixham harbour.

All other vessels are to anchor as directed on entering.

REGULATIONS FOR BRIXHAM FISHING VESSELS.

No fishing vessel is on any account to attempt to pass through the ship-passages during the hours of darkness.

Fishing vessels are not to leave Brixham harbour until permission has been obtained from the Port Fishery Officer. The three organised fleets working from Brixham are to follow the motions of the Admiral of their fleet in respect to leaving harbour.

The conduct of these fleets is dealt with by local orders.

In addition to the restrictions to fishing laid down in Admiralty Notices to Mariners:—

Trawling or drifting is prohibited within two miles of the obstruction in any direction.

The laying of nets, crab or any other pots, or anchoring for the purpose of fishing with hand lines is entirely prohibited within half a mile of the obstruction in any direction.

REGULATIONS RESPECTING SMALL CRAFT AND PLEASURE BOATS.

The following regulations are to apply to all small craft and pleasure boats (exclusive of *bona fide* commercial fishing craft sailing under fishing permits) using the harbours of Brixham, Paignton and Torquay:—

No small craft or pleasure boat will be permitted to go outside the ship-passages.

Small craft with amateur fishing permits can obtain special permission to pass through the ship-passages between the hours of sunrise and sunset provided they keep within the three-mile limit from their port. Such permission must be obtained from the Senior Naval Officer, Torquay, through the Station Officer of the Coastguard Station.

Small craft must not go alongside or hold communication with any vessel in the anchorage unless special permission from the Senior Naval Officer has been obtained to do so.
